3.Vice-Chancellor's Review:

Vice-Chancellor's Report

It is with great pleasure and a sense of pride that I present the Annual Report of University of Colombo for the year 2012.

I am delighted to report that the University of Colombo was ranked as the No. 1 University in Sri Lanka, the 8th in South Asia and 1447th in the world by the beginning of the year 2012 in a web-ranking conducted among the Universities and Colleges world over.

This was possible as a result of sound management decisions taken by the governing authority, the Council, the academic directions given by the highest academic authority, the Senate, the commitment and sheer hard work of the Academic, Academic Support, Administrative and other staff and the performance of the students both at undergraduate and postgraduate levels.

The University has been striving hard to improve its ranking further in South Asia and globally. In furtherance of achieving our objectives and targets, monitoring the implementation of policies and strategies, setting up a framework of regular performance appraisals and quality assurance exercises are important aspects.

A very conducive environment prevailed in the University for teaching, learning, research and other related activities. About fourteen Memorandum of Understanding were signed with international universities and agencies for furthering academic ties and related collaborative programmes. A reasonable number of foreign students were affiliated to our University and our students had attachments in various foreign universities under credit transfer system.

In addition to academic activities, the students were heavily involved in co-curricular activities such as sports, debates, aesthetic and cultural events and community based extension programmes. The University of Colombo emerged as the over-all Champions for the sixth consecutive year in the Inter-University Sports Championship.

This is the first time the University emerged champions in all three categories, namely women's championship, Men's championship and overall Championship.

Our students also participated in sports, debates etc. in foreign universities as well.

Lack of adequate land for expansion and insufficient financial provisions for much needed new buildings hampered the speedy development of the University.

I take this opportunity to thank the Council, Senate, Acting Registrar, Bursar, academic, Administrative and all other staff of the University. Special thanks are due to the undergraduate students for their cooperation with the management of the University.

- University of Colombo signed a MOU with Mobitel Telecom (Pvt) Ltd. on 10th October 2012. This is another initiative towards enhancing Private-Public Partnership in the Higher Education sector.
- University of Colombo, Institute for Agro Technology and Rural Sciences, received the Award of Best Initiative and Best Innovation in Open Distance Learning for K-12 and Higher Education at World Education Summit 2012 held during 23rd -24th July at New Delhi.
- The 3rd International Conference on Holistic Medicine was held during 17th -18th November 2012 at the Senate Hall, University of Colombo. This was organized jointly by the University of Colombo, Mahatma Gandhi University, Kerala, India, Queensland University of Technology, Brisbane, Australia & University of Ballarat, Victoria, Australia.

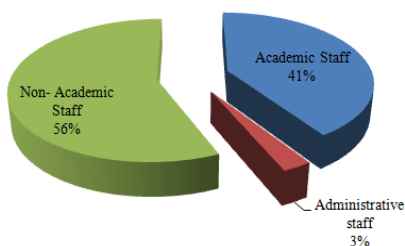

In 2012 the University continued to deliver its academic activities through its seven faculties and 43 departments of study.

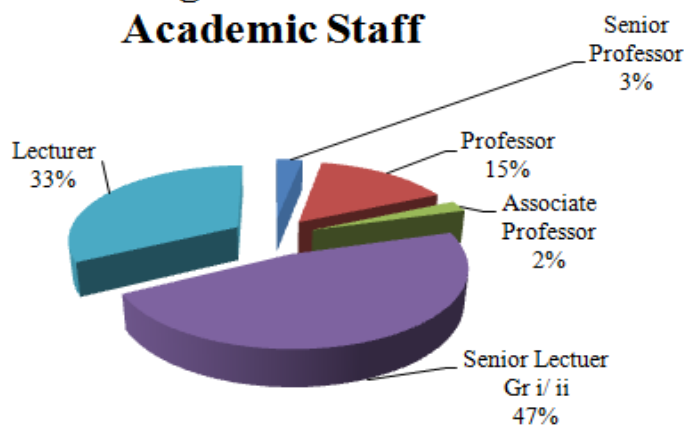

ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE

The University of Colombo with a proud history of over 142 years continues in its endeavour to meet the challenges of maintaining its position as a “Metropolitan University, Modern and International in Outlook and Character”. The location of the University affords the student population all the advantages of a “Metropolitan University”, with easy access to international information/resource

centres, libraries, theatres, sports complexes etc. Its central location within the City of Colombo provides easy access to a wide range of cultural, entertainment and business facilities. Backed by its long and proud history, together with a solid academic and administrative infrastructure which has stood the test of time, the University has progressed towards its goals in accordance with the Performance Improvement Strategic Plan by embracing modern and innovative approaches to teaching, research, and service to the community. The University of Colombo has a multi-cultural, multi-ethnic, multi- religious student and staff population, fostering social harmony, cultural diversity, equal opportunity and unity. The faculties, campus, institutes and school of the university functioned very smoothly in a conducive environment for teaching, learning and research without any interruption during the year under review.

The University has been ranked as the No. 1 University in Sri Lanka and the 8th in South Asia and the 1447th in the world in a World Wide Web ranking of the Universities and Colleges at the beginning of 2012. The University strives very hard to improve its position further in South Asia and internationally.

2. Faculties, Campus, Centres and Units

2.1 FACULTY OF ARTS

Introduction

The Faculty of Arts, located between the Reid Avenue and Prof. Stanley Wijesundara Mawatha, is the largest Faculty in terms of student enrolment. The Faculty has nine academic Departments comprising the Departments of Demography, Economics, English, Geography, History, International Relations, Political Science & Public Policy, Sinhala and Sociology. In addition, Faculty has six Teaching Units comprising Arabic & Islamic Civilization Unit, English Language Teaching Unit, Computer Unit (comprising the Student Computer Unit and the Computer Teaching Unit), Journalism Unit, Mathematics Unit and Pali & Buddhist Studies Unit. Those Departments and Units offer courses in the Humanities and Social Sciences. Apart from undergraduate BA Programme of Study, several Departments offer extension programmes and Postgraduate programmes leading to Masters, MPhil and Ph.D. degrees. Many students, who successfully complete four year BA programme, eventually register for postgraduate degree programmes offered by Departments of the Faculty. However, the Academic activities of year 2012 were disrupted due to trade union actions launched by Academic and Non Academic Staff for a period of four months.

During the year 2012, Prof Athula Ranasinghe functioned as the Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Mr R. Logendra functioned as the Senior Assistant Registrar of the Faculty.

Mission of the Faculty

The Mission of the Faculty is “to promote collectively scholarship, critical inquiry, competencies and skills in the Social Sciences and Humanities in keeping with the highest academic and ethical standards in teaching, research, training and evaluation. To provide students with not only specific skills and competencies but also a broad social and humanistic orientation, so that they could fit into the changing world of work with a sense of social responsibility and moral commitment”.

Major Events of the Faculty of Arts -2012

The Annual Faculty Review Workshop of the Faculty of Arts was held on 02nd and 03rd April, 2012 in Kukuleganga Resort, Molkawa. The Workshop was organized with the following five objectives in mind.

1. Establishing standards for Curricula and Assessment
2. Improving IT Skills
3. Enhancing English Language Skills
4. Inculcate Research Culture and Development
5. Staff –Student Affairs & Welfare

Five teams worked on these issues and status reports together with tentative action plan to improve the current situation were presented at the review workshop. At the end of the workshop the action plan was developed to meet the above objectives. These action plans will be effective for the first year students enrolled from 2012/13 academic year.

During the year under review, the Faculty academic staff contributed to the Annual Research Symposium of the University of Colombo which was held on 16th and 17th August 2012 under the theme “Converging Technologies & Sustainable Communities” by providing 26 Research papers. The Academic staff members attached to the Department of Demography, Economics, Geography, Sinhala, Sociology and English Language Teaching Unit, Journalism Unit, Pali & Buddhist Studies Unit contributed for presenting the papers.

During the year 2012 too, as in the previous years, major attention was given to organizing student participation at the South Asian Student Meet (SAESM) by the Department of Economics. The Department has been involving in this programme since 2004. Dr. N. Ravinthirakumaran, Deputy Coordinator of SAESM, took the lead role in encouraging students to submit papers and prepare their presentations for the event that was held from 17th December 2012 to 22nd December 2012 at Kathmandu, Nepal. Dr. N. Ravinthirakumaran with 10 undergraduate students participated in this event.

The Department of Economics also organized the 1st Annual International Conference – Sri Lanka Economic Research Conference of the Sri Lanka Forum of University Economists on 29th and 30th November 2012 and also the Undergraduate students from the Lahore School of Economics visited the Colombo University from 16th December to 23rd December 2012.

The 2nd Annual Research Symposium of the Department of Sinhala was held on 10th December 2012 at the M.B. Ariyapala Auditorium. At this event several scholars representing all universities of Sri Lanka presented their academic papers under the general theme of ‘New Trends in Sinhala Studies’.

The 125th Commemoration Ceremony of Kumaratunga Munidsa, including a literary seminar was held on 12th November 2012 at the Department of Sinhala. According to MOU signed between University of Colombo and Beijing Foreign Language University, 08 Chinese students have been enrolled for studying Sinhala at the Department of Sinhala.

The students and academic staff exchange programme between Department of English and the Institute of Anglistik, Justus Liebig University, Germany was successfully continued in 2012. Three students and two academic staff members from the Department were selected to visit Germany in the first semester of 2012 and 03 students from JLU enrolled for the second semester at the Department of English.

The Department of Sociology, University of Colombo has re-launched its seminar series for 2012. Eminent scholars from various disciplines will be making presentations throughout the year 2012. The Department signed MOU with the Department of Sociology at Virginia Tech University, USA for collaborative research and staff and student exchange programs. Discussions have been carried out to implement similar programme with the Deakin University, Australia.

Faculty Appointments

Dr. D. Mendis attached to the Department of English resigned from the Post of Director of Studies w.e.f. 26.03.2012 and Prof. Gameela Samarasinghe attached to the Department of Sociology was appointed as the Acting Director of Studies with effect from 09.05.2012.

Dr. Chandrasiri Niriella continued as the Co-ordinator of the Information and Documentation Centre (IDC).

Undergraduate Programs

In the year 2012, the total undergraduate population in the Faculty numbered over 2261 students. Admission of the 2011 (A/L) batch delayed due to the Advanced Level Examination issue. The course unit system is continued by offering a range of course units to students including internship component for credit.

The Department of Demography also offered courses for General and Special Degree students. The Department continued to offer Demography as a subject for the General Degree and as a second and third subject for other Special Degree students.

The Department of Economics continued to offer the Special Degree Programme in Economics and the General Degree programme. For the first year programme 132 students offered Economics as a subject. In total, the number of students who offered Economics as a special subject in 2nd, 3rd and 4th years was 197. The Department continued to provide courses in Sinhala, Tamil and English mediums whilst giving an opportunity for those who are competent in English to answer in English Language even in cases where lectures were conducted bilingually. All final year students of the Special Degree Programme in Economics were attached to different public and private institutions for a period of three months to undergo an internship Training programme.

The Department of English continued to offer a range of course units for the General and Special Degrees in English Literature, English Language and ELT, and Cultural Studies. The Department has also increased the number of students admitted under the Additional Intake of new entrants, and teachers of English who have completed their First Examination externally. Course units in English Language & ELT have especially helped those students to equip themselves as graduate Teachers of English, Trainers in various Institutes, policy planners etc.

The Department of Geography continued to offer courses for General and Special Degree students. The mission of this department was to continue the task of developing new areas of teaching in the undergraduate programmes

The Department of History continued to offer courses for General and Special Degree students. After the bifurcation in year 2010, now it continues as a separate Department.

The Department of International Relations offers General and Special Degree courses. It has become one of the most sought subjects by the first year undergraduates. Due to this, the Department has decided to take the most number of students, compared to other Departments, for Special degree courses.

The Department of Political Science & Public Policy continued to offer courses for General & Special Degree students and Department of Sinhala also offered courses for General & Special Degree students. The Department of Sinhala organized a series of monthly seminars for encouraging students' research ability.

The Department of Sociology offered a Special Degree program in Sociology as well as Sociology as a subject for the General Degree. The Department continues to improve its infrastructure and other facilities mostly using its own generated funds in order to create better Learning Environment for its undergraduates.

Pali & Buddhist Studies unit offered four major study programs for the undergraduates: Buddhist Studies (General Degree), Buddhist Studies (Special Degree), Pali Studies (General Degree) and one year Modern Chinese Language Programme.

In the year 2012 also, the English Language Teaching Unit, continued to serve all six faculties (offering undergraduate courses) except FGS of the University of Colombo with intensive and ongoing courses. These courses are offered with the objective of enhancing the English proficiency level of the undergraduate students. This year 2012, ELTU introduced on line teaching material on the Learning Management System of the university for the students of the Faculties of Arts, Finance and Management and Law.

Arabic & Islamic Civilization Unit (ICV Unit) in the year 2012 was strengthened by developing its infrastructure facilities in order to give better teaching and learning experience for its undergraduates.

Mathematics is an interdisciplinary subject for various disciplines and the Mathematics Unit (MU) offered three course units for students of the Faculty of Arts.

The Journalism Unit engaged in a syllabus review in the year 2012 in order to offer Special degree programs in the near future and also for the establishing as a separate Department.

Extension Courses and Community Service Delivery Programmes -2012.

A number of Extension Courses were offered by the Faculty of Arts during 2012, providing professional enhancement skills to the community at large and enabling the Faculty to remain the largest contributor to the University Development Fund amounting to nearly Rs. 07 million annually.

The Department of Demography conducted a three day training programme on Manpower Planning and Forecasting for 25 staff grade officers in the Department of Manpower and Employment in April 2012.

The Department of Economics offered two diploma courses: A Diploma in Tourism and Travel Economics and Hotel Management, and a Diploma in Micro Finance.

The Department of English ran Extension Courses in English catering to about 3000 members of the general public, and undertook consultancy services to various government and private institutions. It offered Certificate Courses in English for Careers (Part 1 & 2), and English for Law (Part 1 & 2). It also conducted Diploma courses in Advanced English for Administrative and Academic Purposes, and English for Teachers of English (DETE) and a Diploma in English for English Medium Instruction Teachers (DEEMIT).

The Department of International Relations offered two extension courses titled Certificate Course in International Relations (CCIR) and Certificate Course in Conflict, Peace, and Reconciliation (CPR).

The Department of Political Science and Public Policy started new Certificate programme “Certificate Course in Politics and Governance” in March 2012.

The Department of Sinhala also commenced a new Diploma Programme in Sinhala in late 2011 and continued in year 2012.

The ELTU offered Certificate Courses in Business English (Preliminary and Intermediate Levels), and e-Diploma in Business English in M-learning platform.

The Journalism Unit continued to conduct the Diploma in Journalism in 2012 as well.

Postgraduate Courses- 2012

The Faculty offered a number of postgraduate courses in 2012.

The Department of Demography continued the Postgraduate Diploma in Population Studies Programme in year 2012 which was commenced in the year 2010.

The Department of Economics offered the M.Phil/ Ph.D in Economics, MA in Economics, MA in Financial Economics, Post- Graduate Diploma in Economic Development (DED) programme and Postgraduate Diploma in Tourism Economics & Hotel Management. The Postgraduate Symposium 2012 of the Department of Economics of the University of Colombo was held on the August, 2012. The Symposium was organized with the aim of giving an opportunity to the postgraduate students of the Department of Economics to showcase their research and presentation skills.

The Department of English continued to offer the MA/M.Phil in English (by research) during the year 2012 also. The Department of Geography commenced the Postgraduate Diploma in Environment and Regional Development Programme in August 2011 and continued in the year 2012 as well. The Department of History offered a Post Graduate Research Degree in History (MA & MPhil).

The Department of International Relations also continued its Masters in International Relations (MAIR) and M.Phil in International Relations (by research).

The Department of Political Science and Public Policy conducted programs towards the MA by research and the Department continued the MA in Political Science programme by course work and research in collaboration with the University of Oslo, Norway. The Department of Sinhala commenced the Masters in Sinhala Programme in November 2011 and continued same in year 2012.

The Department of Sociology conducted three postgraduate programs: Post-graduate Diploma in Applied Sociology, M.Phil in Sociology programs and MA in Sociology during the year 2012.

Pali and Buddhist Studies Unit is awaiting the approval of the University Council and UGC to commence the Postgraduate Diploma in Buddhist Studies Programme and Masters in Buddhist Studies Programme.

2.3 FACULTY OF GRADUATE STUDIES

The FGS of the University of Colombo is one of the leading postgraduate degree awarding institutions in Sri Lanka. With the introduction of liberalized policies in 1977, the market for higher education has changed significantly. In fact, a bachelor's degree is now considered a basic qualification for academic or employment prospects and postgraduate training has become an essential component of career development.

The FGS was established by the Faculty of Graduate Studies Ordinance No: 03 of 1987. It is headed by the Dean of the Faculty, and managed by the Board of Graduate Studies, accountable to the Senate and the Council of the University of Colombo. The Boards of studies constituted under the ordinance, the Board of Study for Development Studies and the Board of Study for Professional Studies function as the first layer of policy making and forward their recommendations to the Faculty Board for approval. The Faculty Board reviews these decisions and recommends them for Senate approval.

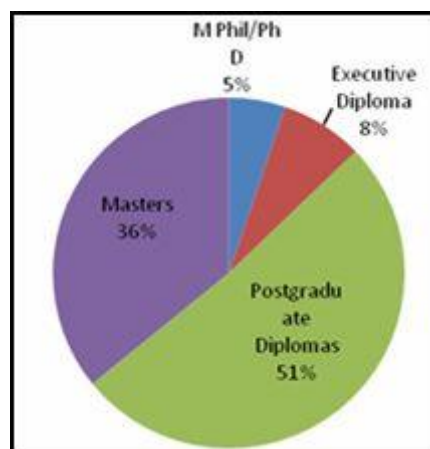

The introduction of online teaching in 2007 was a major step towards offering greater flexibility to students in terms of selection of courses, their duration, new methods of teaching, learning and evaluation. The other important development was the introduction of highly structured M Phil/ Ph D programme in 2012 for the benefit of students interested in multi-disciplinary studies.



The FGS conducted two (02) Executive Diplomas and fifteen (15) Postgraduate Diploma programmes and seventeen (17) Masters programmes and two (02) MPhil/PhD programmes during the year under review. The Faculty continued its MPhil in Clinical Psychology programme and restructured its MPhil/ PhD degree programme including minor amendments to its by-laws. Due to the increased demand for admission to the Postgraduate Diploma in Business Management (PgD. BM), Masters in Business Studies (MBS) and Postgraduate Diploma in Development Studies (PgD.DS) programmes, the Faculty took steps to enroll two batches of students (weekdays and week –ends) for each of these programmes during the year.

Quality enhancement is one of the key priorities of the Faculty and two (02) strategies have been adopted to realize this objective

- curriculum development by revising and updating existing study programmes,
- provide knowledge inputs to students through well qualified staff drawn from the university and industry

These strategies also strengthen the linkage between university and industry. In 2012, the FGS managed to maintain its student enrolment levels in spite of competitive pressures from public and private sector service.

2.5 FACULTY OF MANAGEMENT & FINANCE

Introduction

Drawing upon rich traditions of the University of Colombo, the Faculty of Management and Finance is committed to pursue excellence in research, teaching, and community services, while making all efforts to be the center of excellence for management and finance education in Sri Lanka. Since its inception in 1994, the Faculty of Management and Finance has grown in its capacity in terms of the academic departments, degree programs offered strength of academic staff and the size of student intake for the past 18 years. The gradually expanding industry requirements for managerial talents have been the major impetus behind the growth of operations of the faculty at both undergraduate and postgraduate levels. The increasing demand for the Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) program offered by the Faculty could be witnessed by the annually increasing Z-score requirement to secure a place in this program. In recent years, the number of applications received for Master of Business Administration (MBA) program has also been increased reflecting an ever growing demand for the postgraduate studies in business at the University of Colombo.

426 new BBA students were enrolled to the faculty in 2011/2012 academic year. In response to the fast changing character of the world of business, the faculty introduced a new curriculum for BBA program two years ago featuring a blend of knowledge and skill orientation with a precisely defined provision for internship training for final year undergraduates. A new student management system was introduced dividing all first year students into 03 groups consisting from 10 members. One academic staff member was allocated for two teams and team works were performed in every Tuesday from 01 pm to 04 pm. The objective of this program was to develop team work skills and social and ethnic cohesion. During the year under consideration, students were enrolled into 3rd year following new curricula of BBA program. Two new specializations called International Business and Management Organizational Studies were implemented. The Faculty could obtain approval to start Executive Master of Business Administration (EMBA) program during the year 2012. The faculty had submitted a proposal to UGC to develop computer laboratory for BBA students under the quality enhancement project and received Rs.12 million. The faculty also submitted a proposal for HETC grant under the UDG program and won the grant of Rs. 20 million during the year 2012. The faculty organized sports day, several industrial visits, visiting lectures, workshops and academic and non academic staff interaction session during the year 2012

On postgraduate front, Postgraduate and Mid-career Development Unit of the Faculty of Management and Finance conducts four MBA programs catering to more than 400 postgraduate students at any given point in time. Steps have been taken to appoint a committee to revise the MBA curriculum with the aim of aligning the programme to the changing requirements in the world of work and also to change the programme so that it would appeal to international students as well.

Faculty of Management and Finance, and hSenid Biz, a leading global Human Resource (HR) solutions provider, signed a Memorandum of Understanding during the year and hSenid Biz donated their award winning HR information system, HRM Enterprise to the faculty. The faculty also signed a Memorandum of Understanding with Brandix Lanka Ltd. to provide internship and training opportunities for the Faculty of Management & Finance students and for staff training. In addition to that a Memorandum of Understanding was signed with the Tsukuba University, Japan to enhance students in MBA programs.

Staff Information

Professor H.D. Karunaratne continued as the Dean of the Faculty. Ms. A. Abeyratne, Assistant Registrar, National Institute of Library and Information Sciences was acting as the Assistant Registrar of this Faculty from 19-01-2012 to 01-04-2012. Mr. M.H. Nafar was appointed as permanent Senior Assistant Registrar of this Faculty with effect from 02-04-2012.

Dr. AAC Abeysinghe, Mr. W.A.S.P. Weerathunga, Dr. AA Azeez, Dr. Pavithra Kailasapathy, Dr. J.A.S.K. Jayakody and Dr. K. Kajendra continued as Heads of the Departments of Accounting, Business Economics, Commerce & Finance Human Resources Management, Management

&Organizations Studies and Marketing respectively. As Dr. J.A.S.K. Jayakody was on overseas leave with effect from 01-10-2012 Dr. R. Senathiraja was appointed to act for the Head, Department of Management & Organizations Studies.

There were sixty one (61) members in the permanent academic staff comprised two (02) Professors, one (01) Associate Professor, thirty seven (37) Senior Lecturers, three (03) Lecturers and eighteen (18) Probationary Lecturers. In addition, the Faculty has two (02) Computer Instructors. By the end of year 2012, seven (07) members of the academic staff were on leave for their postgraduate studies and four (04) members were on Sabbatical leave and one (01) member was on vacation leave. During the year under consideration one (01) senior lecturer and two (02) lecturer(probationary) were recruited to the faculty.

Meetings

The Faculty Board met ten (10) times during the year under review. In addition to Departmental meetings, joint-departmental staff meetings were held regularly in order to discuss some routine matters. The Curriculum Development Committee, Faculty Examinations Committee, Higher Degrees Committee, Faculty Research Committee had their regular meetings.

International Research Conference and other International Affairs

During the year under consideration, Faculty was active in the international front as well. The Faculty organized its 7th International Research Conference on Management and Finance on 14-12-2012 successfully. The Conference which was co-chaired by Dr. DTD Kodagoda and Dr. HMN Padmasiri created a unique platform for local authors to meet with their international counterparts to deliberate and debate their research papers in mutually beneficial atmosphere.

2.6 FACULTY OF MEDICINE

The Faculty of Medicine is the second oldest medical school in Asia and the forerunner of university education in this country. For nearly a century it was the only medical school in the island and its contribution to the health of the nation by way of providing health services, medical education and medical research is difficult to measure. At present there are 14 Departments. There are 6 Units in addition to these departments - the Malaria Research Unit, the Human Genetics Unit, Allied Health Sciences Unit, the Medical Education Development and Research Centre (MEDARC), the Curriculum Implementation Unit and the Audio-Visual Unit.

In addition to training medical graduates, the Faculty plays an important role in training paramedical staff by participating in the training programmes of the School of Radiography, School of Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy, ECG Recordists Training Programme, Optometrist Training Programme, Nurses Training School, and the Post Basic Nurses Training School.

The Faculty of Medicine continued under the deanship of Professor Rohan W Jayasekara. Mr. PMS Bandara, Ms. HGD Sriyani and Mr. Kolitha Bandara continued as Deputy Registrar, Assistant Registrar and Senior Assistant Bursar respectively.

New students were not admitted to the Faculty during the year concerned and therefore the entire calendar of dates was rescheduled to accommodate them in March 2013. Twenty seven (27) students of the AL 2005 batch of Physiotherapy students, the first batch to enter the Allied Health Sciences Unit, completed their final year examinations.

Seventy nine (79) students from fifteen (15) countries including the United Kingdom, United State of America, Australia, New Zealand, India, China, Norway etc. attended foreign elective programmes in the departments of Clinical Medicine, Paediatrics, Surgery, Obstetrics & Gynaecology, Community Medicine, Parasitology and Forensic Medicine during the year.

In the Faculty of Medicine the Postgraduate programmes are conducted by course work as extension courses. The other Postgraduate Degrees awarded by the Faculty are limited to those based on Research. Two students completed Ph.Ds and one student completed the M.Phil during the year.

With a student population of over one thousand one hundred (1,100), and academic and non-academic staff amounting to about four hundred and fifty (450), space is an acute problem in the Faculty. The B.Sc. Physiotherapy programme is conducted in a rented house with difficulties as it is located far away from the Faculty premises. Insufficient canteen and student areas for students are the critical issues that have to be rectified in the near future.

The Following are the major achievements/events during the year under review.

1. The 44th Asia Pacific Academic Consortium for Public Health (APACPH) International Conference – 2012 under the theme of "MILLENNIUM DEVELOPMENT GOALS BEYOND 2015: THE CHALLENGE FOR PUBLIC HEALTH" was successfully held from 14th to 17th October, 2012. The APACPH is an international organization, comprising many of the largest and most influential schools of Public Health in the Asia-Pacific Region and dedicated to improving professional education for Public Health. The mega event which was the biggest conference organized by a university in Sri Lanka included five plenary, five guest lectures, twenty two symposia, forty four oral presentations, five hundred and twenty three posters and four hundred and forty foreign registrants out of eight hundred who were registered.
2. The Annual Research Symposium of the Faculty of Medicine, University of Colombo was held successfully on 17th August 2012 at the New Building Auditorium. This event was organized in conjunction with the University Research Symposium of the University of Colombo. Professor Narada Warnasuriya graced the occasion as the Chief Guest. Dr. LPJ Upul Senarath, Senior Lecturer in Community Medicine who was the recipient of the University of Colombo award of Excellence in Research:2008-10, delivered the Faculty Oration on "Combating child malnutrition in Sri Lanka: Strategies for scaling-up proven nutritional interventions". Thirty four scientific papers (18 oral presentations and 16 poster presentations) were also presented at the symposium.
3. The 1st International Certificate Course in Laboratory Animal Science in the Asian Region organized by the Department of Physiology was held from November 28, to December 9, 2011 at the Faculty. This has been organized in collaboration with the Utrecht University, Netherlands.
4. The workshop on an introduction to Genetic Diagnostic Laboratories was held on February 6 and 7, 2012. It was conducted by resource persons from the European Molecular Quality Network (EMQN), Cytogenetic European Quality Assessment (CEQA) and Biochemical Genetics External Quality Assessment (EQA) under the auspices of the EuroGentest – the European Genetic Testing Consortium. The workshop was organized by the Human Genetics Unit and the National Science Foundation of Sri Lanka. The Sri Lanka Accreditation Board endorsed it and 30 participants from the Genetic Diagnostic Laboratories in Sri Lanka had participated.
5. The Ethics Review Committee of the Faculty received renewal of SIDCER/FERCAP Recognition for 2012-2016. The Award was presented to the Chairperson and the members of ERC during the 12th Forum for **Ethical Review Committees in Asia and Western Pacific** (FERCAP) General Assembly held in Colombo on 21st November 2012 in the presence of the Chairperson, FERCAP, Dr. Kenji Hirayama and ERC members from numerous committees in the region.
6. Establishment of the Physiotherapy Clinics at the Allied Health Sciences Unit in view of;
 - a. providing an outpatient basis / clinical case centered education for the students at the AHSU
 - b. to develop their physiotherapy skills, behavioural sciences, managerial skills
 - c. developing clinical and professional skills of the demonstrators / probationary lecturers currently employed at the AHSU
 - d. providing a better and effective service to patients, disabled children and elderly
 - e. conducting research based on the clinics.
7. The ASCEND Research Network 2012 was held on 18th June 2012 where 25 professionals from Australia, Malaysia and India started training in 2011 and another 26 new trainees joined the programme on 18th August 2012.

8. Community Medicine Student Scientific Sessions was successfully concluded on 13th August 2012 with the participation of students of the AL/2005 and 2006 batches and with Emeritus Professor Dulitha Fernando as the Chief Guest.
9. The Department of Community Medicine was designated as a **WHO Collaborating Centre for Training & Research in Occupational Health**.
10. A donation of Rs. 1 million was made by the family of the late Professor V. Sivalingam, who was the Founder Professor of the Department of Parasitology of the Faculty and the first Professor/Chair/Head of this department for award of a Gold Medal and Cash Award for the most outstanding student in Parasitology.
11. The Faculty members participated and supported the “Health Camp” which was organized by the University of Colombo Staff Recreation and Welfare Society for the University staff on February 22, 2012.
12. The first ever Colombo Medical School Alumni Association Scientific Congress and Reunion was held on 09th September 2012 at Bentota Beach Hotel, Bentota.
13. **“Wassana Diyawara 2012”** one of the annual projects which is organized by the Medical Students Buddhist Society (MSBS) was successfully completed on January 8, 2012 at Kelegama, Nikaweratiya in the Kurunegala district. This project involved provision of several facilities to the local school and temple, thalassaemia screening and a health camp including the following.

Established a Research and Development Center for Mathematical Modelling at the Department of Mathematics.

Started graduate level research with 5 postgraduate research students in the area.

Two new senior lecturers were recruited to the department of Zoology: they are Dr. Erandathie Lokupitiya (research area, climate change) and Dr. Sampath Seneviratne (research area, Evolutionary Ecology). They will be developing new courses for undergraduate and postgraduate programmes as well as start research in their own fields of work.

Dilmah Conservation (a part of the Dilmah Group) has offered to build a climate change research station for the department of Zoology in one of their tea estate lands in Nawalapitiya. It is hoped that this station will be built in the first quarter of 2013.

2.8 SRI PALEE CAMPUS

a. Brief introduction

The Sri Palee Campus was established in 1996 as the Western Campus and subsequently changed its name as the “Sri Palee Campus” and affiliated to the University of Colombo from 1998 in terms of Section 27 (1) of the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978.

The Campus continued to function with two Departments namely, the Department of Mass Media and the Department of Performing Arts during the year 2012. Inadequate senior academic staff hindered the process of elevating these two Departments to the status of Faculties. 2.11 NATIONAL EDUCATION RESEARCH AND EVALUATION CENTRE (NEREC)

1. (a) Introduction

The National Education Research and Evaluation Center (NEREC) was established with the assistance of the World Bank in the year 2000 in the Faculty of Education, University of Colombo, Sri Lanka. The General Education Project 2 and the Teacher Education and Teacher Deployment Project of the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Education and Cultural Affairs provided the basic support in terms of financial assistance to establish the NEREC. The main objective of the NEREC is to be engaged in Research in the field of Education and provide advice to Education planners. Educational Testing, Evaluation and Training are its other functions.

(b) Achievements

Since the inception of NEREC it has completed 28 research studies in various fields such as National Assessment of Achievement of Grade 04, Grade 08 and Grade 10, Second National Language, Social Cohesion, School Based Management, etc.

(c) Future Plans

- A study on National Assessment of Achievement of Grade 08 Students in Sri Lanka (2012) is ongoing. This project is carried out with the leadership of the Ministry of Education, Sri Lanka and the sponsorship of World Bank. The extended plan of the project was developed having several discussions with core members of the NEREC research team, Ministry of Education and various other groups which are involved in secondary education development in Sri Lanka. 2.14 HEALTH CENTER

Medical Staff

There are two public health inspectors, two nurses, one pharmacist and one laboratory technical officer.

Laboratory technical officer passed away on 07.11.2012 and this post is now vacant.

Services:

In addition to routine medical and dental treatment following are some additional services provided by the health center.

- All new entrants are given a medical questionnaire to be filled by their practitioners. The filled questionnaire is filed at Health centre.
- All Medical students undergo a comprehensive Medical checkup by UMO.
- All new recruits to University services (University of Colombo /UGC/PGIM/IIM/Horana Sripalee) are examined by University Medical officer regarding fitness for duty and relevant investigations done.
- Similarly all employees of these institutions are also examined for extension of service.
- Medical and fitness screening of students for special events of sports such as weight lifting, rowing, wrestling, Road races etc.
- The staff of UGC/PGIM/IIM is provided with health care facilities.

Public Health Service.

The spraying of insecticide to potential mosquito breeding places as a routine public health services activity is carried out. The problems of frequent blocks in the sewage system are resolved by outsourcing the services of private contractors and the municipality when health centre sanitary laborers were unable to do this job. A special program was carried out covering hostels canteens and all University buildings during dengue epidemics.

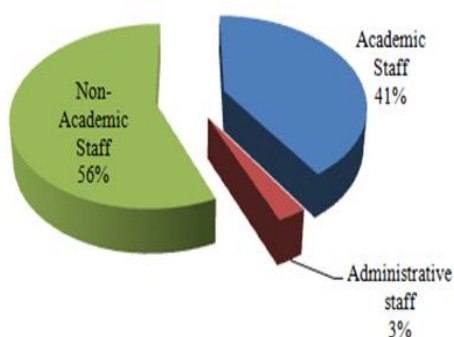

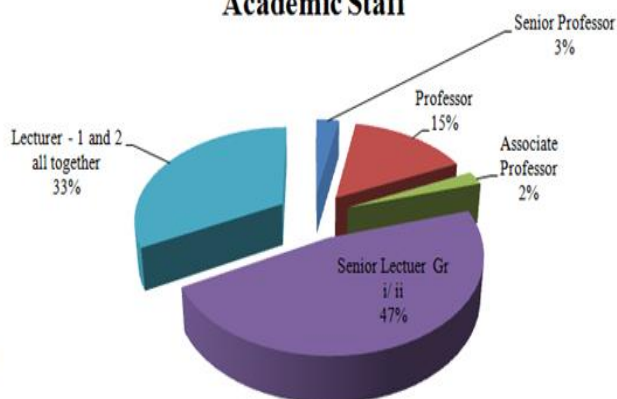

Government and foreign funding are available for academics through processes of competitive application.

The University received 7 Higher Education for Twenty First Century (HETC) Grants from World Bank including UDG, QIG, HRD and EDP grants.

Also the University received Rs. 75 million from the treasury as a research grant. The University used the funds to award Postgraduate Research Scholarships, Collaborative Research Grants and Infrastructure Development Grants and improve University and Faculty research promotional activities.

University Annual Research Symposium for the year 2012 was held successfully on 16th August 2012 at the Senate Hall, University of Colombo on the theme “Converging Technologies & Sustainable Communities”. Honourable Judge Professor C. G. Weeramantry, former Vice President, International Court of Justice and former Judge of the Supreme Court of Sri Lanka was delivered the Keynote address. Professor Simon Chesterman, Dean, Faculty of Law, National University of Singapore, Professor Ranjith Senaratne, Vice Chairman, UGC and Mr. Janaka Jayalath, Director, Mobitel Sri Lanka (Pvt) Ltd. delivered the guest lectures

Faculties held their Faculty Research Symposia separately and a large number of papers were presented at the Symposia.

University Research Grants.

Thirty (30) academics were awarded Postgraduate Research Scholarships, Collaborative Research Grants and Infrastructure Development Grants under the Ministry of Higher Education Grant scheme of “Upgrading six (06) Universities to the International Level”.

Research Forums

During the year under consideration Faculty of Management & Finance organized its 7th International Research Conference on Management and Finance on 14-12-2012 successfully. The Conference which was co-chaired by Dr. DTD Kodagoda and Dr. HMN Padmasiri created a unique platform for local authors to meet with their international counterparts to deliberate and debate their research papers in mutually beneficial atmosphere.

The Faculty of Arts, Department of Economics also organized the 1st Annual International Conference – Sri Lanka Economic Research Conference of the Sri Lanka Forum of University Economists on 29th and 30th November 2012.

The 2nd Annual Research Symposium of the Department of Sinhala, Faculty of Arts was held on 10th December 2012 at the M.B. Ariyapala Auditorium. At this event several scholars representing all universities of Sri Lanka presented their academic papers under the general theme of ‘New Trends in Sinhala Studies’.

The Annual Research Symposium of the Faculty of Medicine, University of Colombo was held successfully on 16th August 2012. This event was organized in conjunction with the University Research Symposium of the University of Colombo. Dr. Narada Warnasooriya, Former Vice Chancellor, Sri Jayewardenepura University & Senior Professor of Paediatrics graced the occasion as the Chief Guest. The scientific programme was of high quality and included guest lectures by Professor Athula Perera, Senior Professor of Agricultural Biology & Director PGIA and Professor Ravi Silva, Director, Advanced Technology Institute, Head of Nano-Electronics Centre, Advanced Technology Institute (ATI), University of Surrey

The 44th Asia Pacific Academic Consortium for Public Health (APACPH) was hosted by the Faculty of Medicine during 13th- 18th October 2012 with the participation of global experts in the field of public health and related specialties in medicine and the allied health professions. The University Presidents Meeting was held at the Senate Hall of the University of Colombo a prestigious event chaired by the Vice Chancellor, University of Colombo, Sri Lanka. It was attended by 43 University Presidents, Vice-Presidents, Vice Chancellors and Deans from leading Universities in the Asia Pacific Region.

The 3rd International Conference on Holistic Medicine was successfully conducted at the Senate Hall of the University of Colombo during 17th- 18th November 2012 with the participation of several global experts in the field. The Inauguration of the Conference was held on 17th November under the patronage of Hon. S.B. Dissanayake, Minister of Higher Education and it was attended by Ms. Rita O’Sullivan Country Director, Asian Development Bank. Keynote Addresses at the Conference were delivered by, Professor Acram Taji, Director International Graduate Research, Queensland University of Technology, Australia; Professor Wasantha Gunathunga, Faculty of Medicine, University of Colombo, Dr. Isaac Golden, General Practitioner in Holistic Medicine, Founder of the Australasian College of Hahnemannian Homoeopathy and Dr. Senaka Pilapitiya, Faculty of Medicine and Allied Sciences, Rajarata University.

Students of the Department of Economics participated at the South Asian Economics Students Meet (SAESM) was held from 17th December 2012 to 22nd December 2012 at Kathmandu, Nepal.

Dr. Abdul Kalam, Former Indian President delivered a lecture on “Dynamics of Education and Confluence of Civilization”

6. INTERNATIONAL UNIT UNIVERSITY OF COLOMBO

1. Vision Statement

The University of Colombo has a strong commitment towards developing strategic links with internationally recognized centres of academic excellence towards becoming a global player in knowledge production through high quality teaching and research. Established in 2008, the International Unit of the University of Colombo seeks to foster and develop such linkages through international collaborations with renowned universities, educational centres, academic programmes, professional academic associations and international organizations through student exchange programs, staff mobility programs, conferences, seminars, workshops and joint research.

2. Mission Statement

The International Unit of the University of Colombo (IUUC) was established to facilitate the development of international links of the University of Colombo, provide relevant information on the University of Colombo to prospective international students, liaise with faculties, and help overseas faculty and students affiliated to the University of Colombo with their stay in Colombo.

Since its inception in 2008, the IUUC has been instrumental in promoting international collaborations of the University of Colombo. The IUUC currently has a number of successful student exchange and staff mobility programs as well as a number of successful scholarship programs with the Erasmus Mundus scholarship scheme of the European Union.

The objectives of the IUUC:

To promote collaborative and innovative research between the University of Colombo and partner universities/ institutions

1. Implement new study abroad programs and develop existing partnerships
2. Create Postgraduate opportunities for University of Colombo faculty abroad and develop curricula through institutional links and faculty exchange
3. Strengthen E-learning and distance learning programs for postgraduate students and development of Information Technology
4. Organize joint conferences, seminars and workshops with partner universities
5. Establish new research opportunities for undergraduate and postgraduate students with partner institutions and strengthen existing Research networks

In keeping with above objectives, in 2012, the IUUC took part in a number of activities and formed new links with universities and institutions abroad.

Collaborations with International Universities and Research Institutes

- **Queensland University of Technology (QUT), Australia**

In November 2012, the University of Colombo signed a Memorandum of Understanding with Queensland University of Technology, Australia to promote collaborations in areas of mutual interest between the two universities. The signing of the agreement took place following a visit by Professor Acram Taji, Director of International Graduate Research at QUT. The signing of the agreement formalised long-standing links between QUT, Australia and the University of Colombo.

Students and staff exchange, research collaborations, and joint PhD supervision were identified as the key areas of focus under the agreement. An awareness session on 'research collaborations and Higher Degree Research (HDR) opportunities' was conducted by Dr. Tony Sahama of QUT on 28 December 2012 at the University of Colombo. Both universities are now working on drafting a specific agreement for joint PhD supervision.

- **The Children's Hospital & the Institute of Child Health, Lahore, Pakistan**

In November 2012, the Faculty of Medicine of the University of Colombo and the Children's Hospital & the Institute of Child Health, Lahore, Pakistan signed a Memorandum of Understanding in order to explore the possibilities of cooperation in the following areas: exchange of information in fields of mutual interest, joint research activities, exchange of invitations to scholars and postgraduate students to participate in conferences and symposia, and exchange of faculty and postgraduate students for clinical training and research.

- **Tianjin Medical University, China**

In October 2012, the University of Colombo entered into an agreement with Tianjin Medical University China in order to promote academic and cultural exchange between the two universities.

- **The Graduate School of Business Sciences of the University of Tsukuba, Japan**

In September 2012, the University of Colombo and the University of Tsukuba, Japan entered into an agreement to promote a short-term study programme in International Business between the Faculty of Management and Finance, University of Colombo and the Graduate school of Business Sciences at Tsukuba university. As a result of this collaboration, the first group of MBA students from the University of Colombo will be registering at Tsukuba University by 31 March 2013.

- **Massey University, New Zealand**

A high-profile delegation from Massey University, New Zealand visited the University of Colombo in August 2012 to formally sign a Memorandum of Understanding between the two universities. The visit was Massey University's third to the University of Colombo, following two successful visits previously in early 2012 and 2011. The delegation was headed by the Vice-Chancellor of Massey University, the Honourable Steve Maharey. Under the terms of agreement reached by the two universities, student exchange and joint PhD supervision were identified as the main avenues for collaboration.

- **Potential Collaborations for 2013**

Following successful discussions initiated in 2012, the University of Colombo is also looking forward to collaborations with the research organisation, 'Plant and Food Research', New Zealand. Links in the areas of student and staff exchange as well as joint colloquia are avenues of potential collaboration identified for a partnership consequent to successful discussions with the University of York, UK.

Student Exchange Programmes

Since 2008, the University of Colombo has been taking part in two very successful student exchange programmes in partnership with the University of La Trobe, Australia and Justus Liebig University (JLU) Giessen, Germany. A student from the Sri Palee Campus was selected in 2012 to follow a semester of study abroad at La Trobe University, commencing February 2013.

- Three students from the Department of English successfully completed a semester at JLU, Giessen from March-

August 2012. Three exchange students from JLU, Giessen arrived in Colombo in October 2012 and are currently following courses at the Departments of English and Economics. They will be affiliated to the University of Colombo until April 2013.

Staff Exchange and Mobility Programmes

- **Justus Liebig University, Giessen Germany:**

In 2012, Dr. Dushyanthi Mendis and Dr. Shermal Wijewardene of the Department of English were affiliated to the Justus Liebig University, Giessen, Germany on short-term lectureships under the MoU between JLU, Giessen and University of Colombo. Dr. Andrea Rummel from JLU, Giessen visited the University of Colombo in July 2012 to discuss the progress of the partnership so far and to complete the necessary funding applications for both student and staff exchange programmes for the next two years. The collaboration between the two universities is funded by the DAAD (German Academic Exchange Service).

Erasmus Mundus Staff Mobility Programme:

Professor Sirimal Abeyratne from the Department of Economics, Faculty of Arts participated in the Staff Mobility Programme of the Erasmus Mundus Action 2 2011/2012 at the University of Trento, Italy. Following his visit, Prof. Abeyratne is currently exploring the possibilities for collaborations and, strengthening institutional links between the University of Trento and the University of Colombo.

Dr. Lakshman Weddikarage from the Faculty of Education also took part in an Erasmus Mundus Staff Mobility Programme at the University of Duesto, Spain. As part of the follow-up of his mobility programme, arrangements are being made to initiate a student exchange program between the Faculty of Psychology and Education, Deusto and the Faculty of Education, University of Colombo.

Sri Lanka Government scholarships for Foreign Students 2012

The University of Colombo received 20 applications for the above scholarship scheme through the Ministry of Higher Education. So far, 10 applications have been accepted by the Faculties of Arts, Science, Graduate Studies and UCSC for their postgraduate degree programmes. These applications are now going through the pre-registration process via the Ministry of Higher Education. Four applications are pending consideration by the Faculties of Education, Management and Finance, and Law

7 CAPITAL WORKS & PLANNING

Introduction

Seven (07) buildings projects, Five (05) Renovation and Improvement projects and an Information Technology Infrastructure Development project were in progress during the year 2012.

Main Building Projects

The Cabinet approval was received to commence the new building complex for the Faculty of Graduate Studies by using university generated funds of Rs.152 million during the year under review. The construction work is expected to commence in early 2013. The construction activities of the six storied building for Clinical Medicine & Auditorium of the Faculty of Medicine has been completed and building was taken over by the University and is being used for academic activities. The generated fund based construction of a multipurpose

building for the University of Colombo (Construction of Examination Hall for the University of Colombo) received the approval from the Cabinet of Ministers during the year under review and is expected to commence the construction by mid 2013. The University decided to commence the stage one by using generated funds of Rs.150 million so that a few stories of this building could be used for academic purpose on completion. The University decided to construct the largest building complex (with an approximate floor area of 36176m² with fourteen stories excluding ground floor, lower and upper basements) in the University of Colombo for the Faculty of Medicine. It is expected to progress bidding process for the stage two (Construction up to first floor slab level excluding Auditorium) by the beginning of 2013 and to commence construction activities by mid 2013. The preliminary work of Expansion of Canteen and Student Facilities of the Faculty of Science also was completed. The preliminary work of the Extension to the Faculty of Education Building and for the Faculty of Management and Finance East Wing project also progressed during the year under review.

Major Buildings Renovation and Improvement projects

The Project of Renovation and Improvements to the New Arts Theatre (NAT), University of Colombo was completed and also stage two progressed during the year under review and ready for the functions. The Refurbishment of Existing Building at No.11, Hewa Mawatha, Colombo 07 also progressed and expected to be ready for occupation by Mid 2013. Construction of an extension to the pavilion –two exercise rooms to the Pavilion also progressed during year 2012. Construction of a Lift Well and Supply and Installation of the Ten Passenger Lift of the Administration Building (Including Civil Work), University of Colombo also progressed in the year under review and it is expected to be functioned by Mid 2013. The bidding process for the construction of Toilet complex for the East Wing building of the Faculty of Management and Finance also progressed during the year under review.

Information Technology Infrastructure Development project

An Information Technology Infrastructure Development project of Fibre Cabling of Ring Network, branch network segments, supply and installation of the proposed fault tolerant ring network and the edge network, stage one for the University of Colombo was completed.

All the projects, Building projects, Renovation and Improvement projects and an Information Technology Infrastructure Development project were monitored continuously by the Buildings Committee and the Planning and Development Committee.

Current Status of Main Buildings Projects

- a). The Cabinet approval was obtained to commence the stage one of the new building complex for the Faculty of Graduate Studies by using university generated funds of Rs.152 million, so that completion of a few stories of this building could be used for academic purposes. The bidding process was completed and expected to commence construction activities by early 2013.
- b). The construction activities of the six storied building for Clinical Medicine & Auditorium of the Faculty of Medicine was completed and the University took over the building.
- c). The generated fund based construction of a Multipurpose building for the University of Colombo (Construction of Examination Hall for the University of Colombo) received the approval from the Cabinet of Ministers during the year under review and the University decided to commence the stage one by using generated funds of Rs.150 million so that a few stories of this building could be used for academic purposes on completion. So, it is intended to proceed with bidding process and commence the construction activities by mid-2013.

- d). The Piling work of the largest building project of the University of Colombo for the Faculty of Medicine with an approximate floor area of 36276 m² with fourteen stories excluding ground floor , lower and upper basements was completed. The University also carried out a feasibility study covering all aspects including investment and cost benefit analysis to explore the possibilities to construct the above building project in the University of Colombo for the Faculty of Medicine on Public Private Partnership (PPP) basis. It is expected to commence bidding process for the stage two (Construction up to first floor slab level excluding Auditorium) by the beginning of 2013 and to commence construction activities by mid-2013.
- e). The expansion of Canteen and Student Facilities of the Faculty of Science was approved by the Department of National Planning. The preliminary work of the project was commenced and the Schematic Designs of the said building were prepared. The University is planning to commence the construction work of the project as soon as the approval from the Cabinet of Ministers is received.
- f). The preliminary work for the Extension to the Library Building for the Faculty of Science was progressing and expected to submit concept papers for the approval of the Department of National Planning.
- g). Preliminary work for the new project of Extension of Administration Building was commenced during the year under review.
- h). The preliminary work for the construction of Building Complex for Canteen, Lecture Halls and Tutorial Rooms, Examination Halls and Computer Laboratory and Office Facilities to the Faculty of Management and Finance was progressing and expected to submit concept papers for the approval of the Department of National Planning by mid 2013.

Current Status of Major Buildings Renovation and Improvement projects

- k). The Project of Renovation and Improvements to the New Arts Theatre (NAT), University of Colombo was completed and will be taken over by February 2013 .
- l). The Refurbishment of Existing Building at No.11, Hewa Mawatha, Colombo 07 for University of Colombo also progressed and expected to be ready for occupation by February 2013.
- m). Construction of a Lift Well and Supply and Installation of the Ten Passenger Lift of the Administration Building (Including Civil Work) , University of Colombo also progressed during year under review and it is expected to function by mid-2013.
- n). Construction of an extension to the pavilion –two exercise rooms to the Pavilion also progressed during year 2012 and expected to be ready for utilization by early 2013.
- o). The bidding process for the construction of Toilet complex for the East Wing building of the Faculty of Management and Finance also progressed during the year under review and expected to be ready for utilization by early 2013.

Results for the year

The operating expenses of the University for the year was Rs. 1417.4 Million compared to Rs.1,249.8 Million for the previous year.

Staff cost during the year was Rs. 1,065.9 Million compared to Rs. 936.9 Million during the previous year. Staff costs constituted 75 % of the operating expenses of the University.

As a policy student tuition fees are recognized on revenue only on the receipt of fees.

3. Cash and Investments

The university maintains a portfolio of cash and investments. The long term receipts such as Endowments, Scholarships, etc. have been invested in Fixed Deposits and the temporary surpluses of cash are invested in Call Deposits. A sum of Rs. 58.8 Million has been received during the year 2012 as interest from investments relating to the cash investments on temporary basis. We have been compelled to maintain a certain amount of cash balance in some of the current accounts to meet urgent needs with regard to consultancy projects.

4. Conclusion

The University was able to achieve the expected targets for the year 2012 mainly because of the high contributions received from Postgraduate Education and Research and Consultancy Services offered by the University in addition to the contribution given by the Treasury. The University continued to reduce its dependency on treasury funds with regard to operational activities except for salaries, supplies and utilities. This was by promoting the consultancy services and increasing the earning capacity from Postgraduate & Other Extension Courses and thereby generating external income.



1. Notes to the Financial Statements

University of Colombo

1. Corporate Information

University of Colombo has been incorporated under the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978. The main administration is located at the College House, No. 94 Cumaratunge Munidasa Mawatha, Colombo 3. The Financial Statements of the University of Colombo are prepared for the year ending 31st December 2012.

2. Significant Accounting Policies

2.1 Basis of preparation

The Financial Statements of the University of Colombo are prepared under the historical cost convention in conformity with Sri Lanka Public Accounting Standards of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Sri Lanka. All accounting policies adopted by the university are applied consistently with those of the previous year, where necessary comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to the changes, in presentation of current year figures.

2.2 Events after the date of the Statement of Financial Position

All material events after the date of the Statement of Financial Position are considered and appropriate adjustments or disclosure made in the financial statements where necessary.

2.3 Assets and the basis of their Valuation

2.3.1 Property, Plant & Equipment, Lab & Teaching Equipment

Property, Plant & Equipment and Lab. & Teaching Equipment include the items purchased out of government grant, research grants, internally generated funds, and donations.

2.3.2 Lands and Buildings and Other Assets

Property Plant & Equipment and Lab & Teaching Equipment are stated at cost or revaluation value less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation has been charged to the Statement of Financial Performance on a straight line basis, over the estimated useful life of the assets as follows.

Depreciation is provided from the year of purchase and up to the year of sale based on the period used, with full depreciation being provided in the month of purchase and sale of assets.

2.3.3 Amortization

Amortization is recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful life of the assets.

2.3.4 Revaluation of the Property, Plant and Equipment

Furniture and Office Equipment and Lab and Teaching Equipment have been revalued as at 31.12.2009 and Motor Vehicles revalued as at 31.12.2010 by the Chief Valuer of the Department of Valuation except Sri Palee Campus.

The carrying amount of the above mentioned assets has been increased by Rs.129,422,478.90 as at 31.12.2010 as a result of revaluation, and the surplus has been credited to the revaluation surplus reserve.

2.3.5 Fully Depreciated Asset

Fully depreciated asset as given below have been included in the carrying amount of Fixed Asset Rs.3,132,394,649. These asset have been used for operating activities of the University during 2012.

2.4 Inventories & Stocks

Inventory – Maintenance and Inventory – Stationery accounts represents the cost of inventories. The cost of the inventories is arrived at by using the First in, First out (FIFO) basis.

2.5 Current Assets

Current Assets classified in the Balance Sheet are those which will be recovered within one year after the Statement of Financial Position date.

2.5.1 Cash in Hand

Cash & cash equivalents of Rs.98,186,029 include Rs 198,137 received on 31-12-2012. Cash in hand has been deposited in the bank accounts on 01-01-2013.

2.6 Receivables

A sum of Rs 41,597,721.61 is due from employees on account of Breach of Contracts as at 31.12.2012.

2.7 Current Liabilities

Liabilities classified as Current Liabilities in the Statement of Financial Position are those that fall due for payment within one year from the Statement of Financial Position date. All known Liabilities have been accounted for in preparing the Financial Statements.

2.7.1 Research Grant

Research grant of Rs. 93,850,000 have been awarded to university staff up to 2012 out of Internationalization of Universities in Sri Lanka Grant. This grant has been disclosed under Capital Grant Unspent Note 14.

2.8. Provision for Gratuity

Provision has been made in the Financial Statements for retiring gratuities payable under the payment of Gratuity Act No. 12 of 1983, based on the amount payable if all employees retire on the date of the Statement of Financial Position, subject to the assumption that every employee would be entitled to the payment even if any or some of them may not have completed the minimum period of service required to be eligible for the payment under the Act on the date of the Statement of Financial Position.

2.9 Contingent Liabilities

No provision has been made in the accounts with regard to liabilities arising out of litigation. The total estimated amount of liabilities as at 31st December 2012 is Rs. 2.5 million.

2.10 Income and Expenditure

2.10.1 Government Grants

Grants received from the General Treasury of the Government of Sri Lanka, and Tuition Fees received from the foreign and local students are recognized as income in the period in which the related costs are recognized.

Government grants utilized to acquire assets less liabilities are recognized as unspent grant.

The total Capital Grants received for the year was Rs.263 M which has been used as follows:

2.10.2 Recognition of Revenue

- (a) The Government Recurrent Grants are recognized in the period in which they are received. Student Tuition Fees are recognized as revenue only on the receipt of fees.
- (b) Interest income received and receivable for the period is recorded as revenue in the Statement of Financial Performance as except for the investment income earned on externally restricted endowment, for which only the amount made available for spending is related as revenue. In the year where the investment income earned is in excess of the amount made available for spending, the excess is recorded as a direct as a direct increase in endowment.
- (c) Sums of Rs. 23,708,676.66, Rs. 1,550,252.31 and Rs. 1,406,423.33 have been received as interest from investments relating to the University of Colombo Development Fund, Centre for Human Rights, and National Education Research and Evaluation Centre respectively and they are added to the fund.
- (d) The fees on fee-levying courses recognized to the income statement based on the stage of completion of each courses as at end of year.

Lecture fees and payments relating to future periods are shown in the Statement of Financial Position as deferred income.

2.10.3 Recognition of Expenses

- (a) All expenses incurred in respect of undergraduate education have been charged to the government recurrent grant.
- (b) All expenditure incurred in the acquisition, or improvement of assets of a permanent nature in order to carry on or increase the learning capacity of the students has been treated as capital expenditure.
- (c) Expenses are recognized in the income statement on the basis of direct association between cost incurred in the running of the University and in maintaining the capital assets in a state of efficiency has been charged to revenue in arriving at the surplus/deficit for the year.

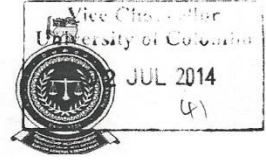

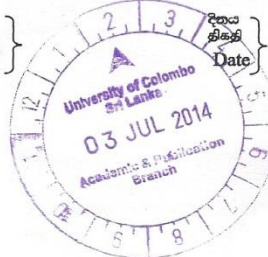

Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements of the University of Colombo for the year ended 31 December 2012 in terms of Subsection 108 (1) of the University Act, No. 16 of 1978.

The audit of financial statements of the University of Colombo for the year ended 31 December 2012 comprising the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2012 and the detailed financial performance statement and cash flow statement for the year then ended and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154(1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read in conjunction with Subsection 107 (5) of the University Act. No. 16 of 1978. My comments and observations which I consider should be published with the Annual Report of the University in terms of Subsection 108 (1) of the University Act, appear in this report. A detailed report in terms of Subsection 108 (2) of the University Act was furnished to the Vice Chancellor of the University on 08 November 2013.

1:2 Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard and for such internal control as the management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatements whether due to fraud or error.

1:3 Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit. I conducted my audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards. Those Standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatements of the financial

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statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the University's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the University's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. Sub-sections (3 and 4) of Section 13 of the Finance Act, No. 38 of 1971 give discretionary power to the Auditor General to determine the scope and the extent of the audit.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified audit opinion.

1:4 Basis for Qualified Opinion

My opinion is qualified based on the matters described in paragraph 2.2 of this report.

2. Financial statements

2:1 Qualified Opinion

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matters described in paragraph 2:2 of this report, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the University of Colombo as at 31 December 2012 and its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard.

2.2 Comments on Financial Statements.

2.2.1 Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

Fully Depreciated Assets

The fully depreciated assets of the University which were being utilized aggregating to a sum of Rs.212,758,120 had not been reviewed depending on their useful life span and disclosed in the statements of financial positions on a reasonable value.

2.2.2 Accounting Deficiencies

In the examination of the financial statements for the year under review the following accounting deficiencies were observed.

- (a) Even though a sum of Rs. 9,870,322 and Rs.18,640,016 respectively received as application fees for the external courses and registration fees during the year under review had to be brought to the accounts as income for the year under review, application fees amounting to

Rs.961,500 and registration fees amounting to Rs.3,272,500 had been brought to the accounts as deferred income under non- current liabilities.

- (b) The Post Graduate course on Human Rights and Democracy in Asia Pacific Region (Asia Pacific Masters) 2011/2012 conducted by the Human Rights Education Centre of the Faculty of Law of the University of Colombo had been completed on 27 April 2012. Even though the entire income of the course amounting to Rs.12,075,047 should have been brought to the accounts as income, a sum of Rs.1,315,073 had only been credited to the Statement of Financial Performance after deducting a sum of Rs.6,520,945 for the expenses, transferring a sum of Rs.1,407,736 to the funds and bringing to the accounts a sum of Rs.4,146,366 as deferred income.
- (c) Teaching activities for the 2010/2011 batch of the Post Graduate Course conducted by the Faculty of Education of the University of Colombo had been completed on 31 December 2012 and course fees amounting to Rs.13,644,002 deducting a sum of Rs.3,150,000 required for the teachers training programme had to be brought to the accounts as income. Instead, a sum of Rs.720,850 had only been credited to the Statement of Financial Performance while deducting a sum of Rs.7,764,237 as expenses and bringing to the accounts a sum of Rs.9,029,765 as deferred income.
- (d) The surplus income of 74 coursers as at the final date of the year under review amounting to Rs. 71,520,554 had been credited to the Graduate Study Faculty Building Fund instead of crediting it to the University Fund.

2.2.3 Lack of Evidence for Audit.

Particulars pertaining to the researches carried out by 15 lecturers included in the tested sample of 100 lecturers had not been furnished to audit and a sum of Rs. 1,480,177 had been paid to the said lecturers in the year under review in respect of research allowances.

2.2.4 Accounts Receivable and Payable

Action had not been taken to settle the balances existed in inter current accounts as at the end of the year and surplus income of 217 courses amounting to Rs.124,038,130 had been included in the Statement of Financial Position as debtors and creditors.

2.2.5 Non-compliance with Laws, Rules and Regulations.

Following instances of non-compliance were observed.

Reference to Laws, Rules and Regulations

Non-compliance

(a) Section 6 (1) (a) of the Public Contract Act No.03 of 1987.

Although every tenderer should be registered with the Registrar of Public Contract in case of cost of a contract exceeds Rs.5 million, contractors and the contract agreements pertaining to the renovation and improvement of the New Arts Theatre amounting to Rs.20,204,939 and the landscaping project of the Science Faculty amounting to Rs.9,026,077 had not been so registered.

(b) Section 99 (1) of the University Act No.16 of 1978

(i) Even though all the funds including entire income earned by the University shall be a portion of the University Fund, contrary to that the Colombo University had taken action to establish the University Development Fund on the decisions of the Council without the Treasury approval.

(ii) On the recommendation of the Financial Committee of the University Developments Funds had been established for various Faculties and Departments. A sum of Rs.119,069,767 had been collected by 75 of those funds at the end of the year under review and the expenditure had been a sum of Rs.73,754,623.

(c) Section 2.8.4 of Government Procurement Guidelines.

Even though the Technical Evaluating Committee shall include an expert member of the relevant subject, such a member had not been included in the Technical Evaluating Committee appointed for the contract for renovation and improvement of New Art Theatre valued at Rs.20,204,939.

3. Financial Review

3.1 Financial Results

According to the financial statements presented, the operation of the University for the year ended 31 December 2012 had resulted in a deficit of Rs.1,280,656,942 before taking into account the government grant for recurrent expenditure as compared with the previous year's deficit of Rs.1,194,550,697. The financial results of the year under review had become a surplus of Rs.33,033,435 after taking into account the government grant of Rs.1,313,690,377 for recurrent and maintenance expenditure. The previous year's surplus had increased up to Rs.69,382,819 due to taking into account the government grant for recurrent expenditure amounting to Rs.1,263,933,516. As such, a

decrease of Rs. 36,349,384 after taking in to account the government grant for recurrent expenditure as compared with the previous year was observed.

4 Operating Review

4.1 Management Inefficiencies

Surplus of the external courses and consultation charges of the Kothalawala Defense College are the sources of income of the University Development Fund which was established under the University Council Memorandum No.88/10 without a Treasury approval. However, surpassing the said requirements a sum of Rs.26,775,342 representing 10 per cent of the budgeted income of the external courses had been credited to the Development Fund by various faculties under the University of Colombo Circular No.21 of 21 October 2000 during the year under review. The above contradictions of the management with regard to management of the income of the external courses were observed as unfavorable condition of the financial control.

4.2 Contract Services.

A sum of Rs.30,314,352 had been paid for the security services of the University during the year under review. It was observed in the course of physical verification conducted at 11 a.m on 04 December 2012 that 12 officers had not been deployed to 09 locations according to the scheduled plan.

4.3 Amount due from Lecturers who had breached Agreements

Thirty seven lecturers had breached the agreements by the end of the year under review and the amount recoverable was a sum of Rs.41,597,721.

A sum of Rs.11,966,890 recoverable from 11 lecturers due to failure to ascertain their particulars and failure to comply with the Court verdicts despite they had been granted, a sum of Rs.4,337,122 which had been indicated that action was being taken to recover from the University Provident Fund and recoverable from 13 lecturers and sum of Rs. 1,790,241 recoverable from the lecturer who had discontinued the service had not been recovered for a long period of time.

4.4 Idle and Underutilized Assets.

Following observations are made.

- (a) The Generator valued at Rs.350,000 installed at the Faculty of Graduate Studies had been idle since 07 years.
- (b) Office equipment valued at Rs.13,268,669 had been purchased for the medical clinic building. Since this equipment had been purchased before the completion of the contract activities of the building, they had been idle for more than a period of 1 ½ years.
- (c) Approved cadre of the drivers of the University is 24 and the actual cadre is 21. Accordingly, the number of vacancies is 03. The total number of drivers is 16 and vehicles allocated as one vehicle for the Vice- Chancellor, 10 vehicles for other staff and additional 5 vehicles for the medical faculty. The number of drivers who could be deployed to drive remaining 16 vehicles out of the 32 fleet of vehicles was 05. This situation had been an obstacle for the efficient performance of the activities of the other Sections and 11 vehicles had been underutilized constantly.

4.5 Inefficiencies in the Contract Administration.

Following matters are observed.

- (a) The contract of the building constructed for learning and examination activities of Clinical Science Division of the Faculty of Medicine had been awarded to a value of Rs.47,644,945 to a private construction company on 17 December 2004. In terms of the contract agreement even though it had been scheduled to be completed in 18 months, the contract had been completed on 08 April 2013 after a lapse of more than 8 years. A sum of Rs.92,353,867 had been incurred by the University for this construction and it exceeds 93.8 per cent of the initial contract value.
- (b) Substandard chairs had been purchased at a cost of Rs.7,227,023. It was observed at the physical verification that, rubber bushes, arms and cushions of most of the chairs had

detached and reverse of the seat of the chairs had been covered with stapler pins and the tables purchased had been devoid of the required standard.

4.6 Reconstruction and Control of Hostels

Following observations are made.

- (a) The Thelawala hostel which is capable of accommodating nearly 500 students situated in a land extent of 01 acre 01 rood and 32.58 perches and repaired at a cost of Rs.22 million, remained closed from 2010. The cost of these assets as at 31 December 2012 had been indicated as Rs.25,352,000 in the financial statements and the Vice-chancellor had informed that repairs had been initiated since April 2013 in order to convert this hostel into a women hostel.
- (b) Abnormal usage of water was observed from several hostels and the use of water per student had ranged between Rs.2,317 to Rs.9,861.
- (c) Abnormal usage of electricity was observed from several hostels and the use of electricity per student had ranged between Rs.1,341 to Rs.8,953.
- (d) The Green Path Bikku Hostel which is capable of accommodating 50 Bikku students had been obtained on monthly rental basis of Rs.130,000 and an adjacent building has also been obtained on 01 July 2011 by paying consolidated monthly rental of Rs.205,000. However, only 37 students had been provided with hostel facilities by May 2012. Hostel facilities for these bikku students could have been provided within a one hostel.

5.2 Procurement Activities

Following observations are made.

- (a) A Master Procurement Plan including activities expected to be fulfilled at least within a period of three years in terms of the Section 4.2.1. (a) and 4.2.3 of the Procurement Guidelines had not been prepared and the procurement schedule including time frames and steps of each Procurement Plan had not been included in the Procurement Plan prepared for the year under review.
- (b) Notwithstanding the source of funds in terms of the Section 1.3.2 of the above circular even though all the procurement activities should be included in the Procurement plan in terms of the Section 4.2 said plan, purchasing amounting to Rs.84,276,916 made during the year under review had not been included in the said plan.

5.3 Staff Vacancies.

There were 216 vacancies in the academic and non- academic staff of the University during the year under review. Accordingly, 136 vacancies existed in the academic staff and out of which 73 had obtained sabbatical leave. The University had incurred a sum of Rs.12,264,835 in respect of visiting lecturers during the year under review.



Liberalization of the external sector of Sri Lanka had begun in the late 1970s, long before many countries in the South Asian region as well as many countries in the developing world embarked to do so. Since then Sri Lanka has been considered by many commentators as a pioneer in liberalization effort and as an example of a small open economy. Sri Lanka engaged in negotiations of multilateral trade liberalization under the auspices of the World Trade Organization. In addition, the country has also entered into regional as well as bilateral treaties in order to liberalize trade at regional and bilateral level.

However, three and a half decades later, the external sector is in turmoil and the country was compelled to seek financial assistance from the IMF in the form of Standby Agreements. It is quite common that external sector performance tends to be bleak temporarily during the recessionary periods of world business cycles as export markets could be lost due to low income, low demand, low investment and low production spiral of a recession. Sri Lankan data shows, however, that the poor performance of the external sector is primarily due to fundamental weaknesses in the export and import sector of the country rather than recessionary trends in the main export markets. The trade balance of the country has continually been a large deficit throughout the post liberalization period, though the overall balance of the balance of payment has shown small positive numbers in certain years. The large deficit of trade account was cushioned mainly by inflows of private transfers in the form of remittances of expatriate workers living abroad, leading to a smaller deficit in the current account than in the trade account. Recent movements in the exchange rates of Sri Lanka exemplify this fundamental weakness and the inability of the monetary authorities to support the external sector using exchange rate as a main tool.

The objective of this paper is twofold: First, to identify the fundamental weakness of the external sector of Sri Lanka and the reasons for such weaknesses, Second, to propose possible remedial measures to overcome the fundamental weakness of the external sector based on the experiences of other countries.

Abstract

'Scenario Building as a costing technique in estimating prevention and treatment of NCDs'

Introduction:

Currently the Non-communicable diseases (NCDs) are a major health problem in the country, and are likely to worsen given the demographic transition in progress. NCDs apart from being a major health issue also pose serious financing problems at both system and household level. While primordial and primary prevention are clearly the way forward, attention also needs to be paid to secondary and tertiary prevention. Creating the policy environment necessary to support the financing of such health services in the country necessitates a strong evidence base.

Diabetes Mellitus (DM) is chosen for in-depth study as it is a major burden on the health system at present and the work already carried out in this context will provide the necessary initial evidence on which this study will be based.

Four different prevention levels will be focused on, in the context of diabetes:

- Primordial prevention in the form of health education to the general public
- Primary prevention in terms of health education on diet and exercise among the population group 40 to 60
- Secondary prevention in terms of screening for diabetes
- Tertiary prevention in relation to diabetic clinics at different levels of the health system (tertiary, secondary and primary care)

Cost-benefit analysis will be used to evaluate the different interventions, with cost savings being used to proxy for benefits.

Objectives:

- (1) Evaluating the primordial, primary, secondary and tertiary prevention strategies in the context of diabetes
- (2) Developing a systematic costing template for costing prevention of DM through primordial, primary, secondary and tertiary prevention interventions
- (3) Providing a systematic costing template that can be modified and used in costing other non-communicable diseases.

Methodology

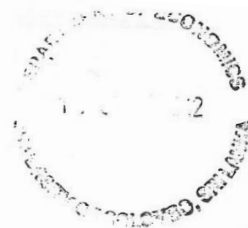
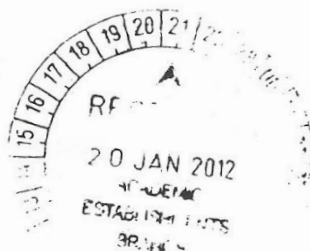
- Methodological survey of costing literature
- Empirical Literature Review of international publications relating to NCDs
- Synthesizing evidence from local costing studies relating to DM and other NCDs
- Developing costing template for different prevention interventions as they relate to Diabetes Mellitus using the Scenario Building Approach
- Costing the different prevention interventions for DM using the Scenario Building Approach
- Proposing necessary measures for generalizing and adopting this costing template for other NCDs

Limitations: Scenario Building technique is criticized even by practitioners, as providing a ballpark estimate rather than a totally accurate cost estimate. However given the limited availability of data in the Sri Lankan hospital and health system context, such a rough and ready measure could play a useful role in determining the choice of appropriate prevention strategies

Abstract

Major economic contributions by women to Sri Lankan Economy

Major contribution of women to the economy of Sri Lanka can be specifically identified to the three sectors in this study during the last few decades. The country has a total population consists of nearly half the number as of females. Significant participation of women in the productive activities in the Tea Sector, Garment Sector and Migrant Employment sector is the main focus of this research analysis. The relative importance among Sri Lankan total industrial exports of 74.9% the share of Garments 46.2%, and among total agricultural exports of 23.9% the share of Tea exports is 16.7%. Remittances of the Migrant labour from middle Eastern countries contribute 60% to total remittances to the Sri Lankan economy. Majority of this workers consist of unskilled domestic female labour.

Historical reasons have made the Tea plantations being the largest women labour force participation sector from the pre to post independent period to the present time. Next manufacturing sector dominated by the Garment sector also is exclusively consists of major female labour force participation. European countries ensured the continuous buying markets for our tea products. Next followed by the open economic policies since the late seventies promoted the garment export markets in Europe and US with concessional trade for our export products. Thirdly due to globalization and easy mobility across borders for employment enabled the unskilled labour. An opportunity for women to proceed for work in the service sector in Middle eastern countries resulting in large sums of foreign remittances in the form of valuable hard currencies to the Sri Lankan economy.

Despite the benefits to the nation the challenges faced by the women labour force are many and deserve attention in different areas for policy remedial action by the government. Majority of the female labour force and their families live in poverty with poor standard of living conditions lacking education, health and housing facilities which needs to be addressed by the state on a priority basis. This research study is to examine how to develop Bandaranaike International Airport (BIA) in Katunayake, Sri Lanka as one of most demanded aviation centers in Asia.



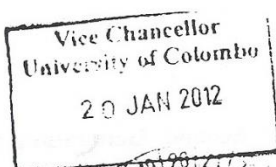

Identity Formation Among the Second Generation Sri Lankan Tamil Diaspora: A Sociological Study of Sri Lankan Tamils in Canada and Switzerland.

The nature of the political developments that have taken place since independence brought changes in ethnic relations specially between Tamils and Sinhalese. Conflict emerged among Sinhalese and Tamils. Ethnic and nationalists identities played significant role and mobilized people. Language and religion had and have been playing a central role making civilians to be divided along the lines of ethnic identity. Owing to the instability of political situation and insecurity in the country many Tamils, young and old fled the country and sought asylum in India, Europe, Canada, America and Australia. Following this it was also became a trend that many people left the country, seeking asylum in Europe and other parts of the world. Currently a significant number of Sri Lankan Tamil people live in many parts of the world.

This study aims at understanding the new relationships between home and abroad. The younger generation, who are born and brought up in foreign countries where their parents sought asylum, their experience and perception about their identity would be analyzed in the study. In other words this study tries to explore the different issues about youths in relation to their conception about citizenship, nationality and identity of their own.

The changing nature and explanation of contemporary migration flows, the revival of the idea of 'diaspora' as a means of capturing some of the cultural and social meanings of multi-locality and the emergence of 'transnationalism' as a central concept in understanding how global identities are constructed 'from below' and 'on the move' (Vertovec and Cohen: 1999, xiii).

The word "diaspora" is derived from the Greek verb *speiro* (to sow) and the preposition *dia* (over). When it is applied to humans, the ancient Greeks thought of diaspora as migration and colonization. But in the contemporary global condition this word gives different meanings to different people. For an instance, for Jews, Africans, Indians and Sri Lankans, this particular word acquires a more sinister and brutal meaning. Diaspora also

signifies a collective trauma, banishment, where one dreams of home but live in exile (Cohen, 1997).

The available literature reveals that there is no single universally accepted definition for the concept 'diaspora'. Scholars agree and disagree on certain characteristics which define the nature and meaning of diaspora. However, all agree on one aspect that any diaspora is a group of people originated in a land other than which it currently resides. The social, economic and political networks of diasporic people cross the borders of nation-states. It is also pointed out that diasporic people are of a minority group in an alien country and live in a multi-locality. Vertovec (1998) denotes that at least there are three discernible meanings of the concept 'diaspora'. These meanings, according to Vertovec, are; 'diaspora' as social form, 'diaspora' as a type of consciousness, and 'diaspora' as mode of cultural production.

Diaspora can be defined as any ethnic collectivity which does not have a territorial base within a given polity where it lives. Diasporic forms of longing, memory, and identification are shared by a broad spectrum of minority and migrant populations. Dispersed migrants even though they are separated from their homelands by politics and territories increasingly have relations with homeland and relatives owing to the modern technologies of transport and communication. They imagine, as Anderson puts it (1991) that they are part of the community of their land of origin or of their parents.

The word diaspora is closely associated with enslavement, exile and loneliness. A people are scattered owing to the traumatic experiences of historical events with includes discrimination, torture and holocaust. Contrary to this view, it may fairly be stated that, voluntary migration also takes place for various reasons. Victim diaspora can also be found in the historical and contemporary situations. Indeed diasporas can be seen as galvanizing a new creative energy outside the natal homeland (Cohen, 1995).

People's whose sense of identity is centrally defined, Clifford depicts, by collective histories of displacement and violent loss cannot be "cured" by merging into a new national community (Clifford: 1994, 307). Diasporic existence is not temporary or short time. They dwell outside home country for a long time, and maintain communities in host

countries. Even though diasporic communities live permanently in host countries they frequently or less frequently visit homeland and their kin and clan.

Sri Lankan Tamil Diaspora

It has to be stated that a few studies have been made on Sri Lankan Tamil diaspora. Cheran, to mention, has worked on Sri Lankan Tamil diaspora. Other than this there are few worked on Tamil diaspora of Indian origin (Jain, 1968, 1970). However it can be stated that there is a significant number of Sri Lankan Tamil diaspora all over the world. Sri Lankan Tamil diaspora live in India, Canada, America, Australia Europe and South Africa. A significant number of Sri Lankan Tamils left Sri Lanka after the 1983 riots and their existence is roughly three decades. Sri Lankan Tamil diaspora consists only three generations: parents, children and grand children whose number is very insignificant with the exception of Canada, United Kingdom and Italy.

Sri Lankan Tamils certainly constitute a diaspora and have become a popular subject of study and research by various scholars (Cheran, 2004). They are a powerful transnational community with major epicenters in Italy, Canada and United Kingdom. The Tamil diaspora is largely made up of refugees and former-refugees. According to UNHCR, between 1980-1992, a total number of 256, 307 people of Sri Lankan origin applied for asylum in Europe, one of the top ten groups of asylum seekers during this period (UNHCR, 2001). Between 1987-2001 Sri Lanka was among the top three source countries for refugee claimants in Canada. Tamil diaspora consists of an estimated 700, 000 people settled in Canada, Europe, Australia, America and South Africa and India.

It has been claimed that identities in contemporary society are being fragmented. In the recent past, individuals would have had a number of central elements to the construction of their identity: family, locality, nation, social class, ethnicity, and gender, to mention a few. At the same time, it is claimed that identities are more fluid in contemporary societies. People can change their identities over their lifetime. They can choose whom they want to be in a society in which traditional loyalties are broken down. Giddens (1991), for example, argues that one of the key features of modernity is what he calls 'the reflexive project of the self'. Individuals reflect on their own identity and continuously rework it.

Among these diasporic communities there are significant number of second generation population. This second generation population who are either born in countries where their parents settled or went to these countries shortly after their nativity. One common feature is that whether they are born in their countries of residence or settled at the very early age, they are educated and brought up in countries different from their parents. Their social background in which they are brought up, their educational background and, their language ability are different from their parents. As it is stated elsewhere in this essay there have been very few studies done on Sri Lankan diaspora. However, as far as one's knowledge is concerned there are no studies done specifically on the second generation Sri Lankan Tamil diaspora. In this context this study tries to understand the general profile of these second-generation Tamil diasporic population living in Canada and Switzerland.

A Model for Community Mental Health in Sri Lanka: A Challenge for Social Work

Background and the Focus of the Study

In the context of mental health, the social circumstances and positions are fundamental causes of the mental health problems, while at the same time recognising the “symptoms of mental illnesses” have consequences for people’s self-concepts and social well-being, which in turn, affect the cause of mental health problems. Spaniol and Koehler (cited in Repper and Perkins 2003: 94) have described how the negative personal and societal attitudes surrounding mental health problems, often leave the person disconnected from themselves, from others, from their environment, and from meaning and purpose in life. The stigma attached to mental health problems is a fact, and recovery rates are poor in Sri Lanka and much of this is evidence of poor community attitudes (Chandraratna 2008). “Being mentally ill” is not only a stigma attached to the person who has a mental health problem, but also to her or his family as well. The importance of designing strategies to tackle stigma attached to the mental health service users is highly emphasised in the Mental Health Policy of Sri Lanka (Mental Health Directorate 2005). Readmission of discharged service users over and over again to the mental health institutions and non-acceptance of them by their relatives, are the main issues prevalent in the field of mental health at present. In Sri Lanka, about 3,000 service users live in the main mental health institutions around Colombo. Many of them have stayed in these institutions over several years and have lost contact with their families and communities. Over 70% of them have the potential to be reintegrated into society (WHO 2005).

It is evident from the above brief account, the limitations of the treatment models that exist in Sri Lanka in serving people with mental health problems and in understanding the process of recovery. Recovery in mental health involves a great deal more than symptom control. Reintegrating the person who has a mental health problem with the community should be a part of the recovery process (Repper and Perkins 2003).

Over the recent years, there has been a growing interest in the social aspects of mental health, both in terms of seeking to understand the causes of mental distress, and what forms of support and interventions may be most helpful in assisting people with mental health problems to

maintain and achieve acceptable social roles (Ramon and Williams 2005; Repper and Perkins 2003). A range of community-based services have been developed, as a result, in some countries for providing support and resources necessary for the continuity of care; integrated care, cutting across service domains of different sectors; and supportive environments in community settings allowing service users to remain out of the institutions (WHO 2005). However, majority of the mental health services in Sri Lanka are provided by the state in institutional settings, and mental health approaches are predominantly tied up to the medical model (Chandraratna 2008).

Some scholars (Saleebey 2002) show that despite grounding to difficult conditions, the community has the will and the resources to help itself and knows what is best for itself. These resources usually exist outside the usual matrix of social and human service agencies (Saleebey 2002). It is emphasised that, enabling access to community resources including housing, education, work, and friendships is critical to recovery (Wallcraft 2005: 202). Creating new resources from community facilities to provide for those in need is also one of the focuses of the community based approach (Payne 1995). Significant efforts to mobilise underused resources in the community were noticeable in community care reforms in UK and USA during 1980s and 1990s (Payne 1995).

The Research Objectives and Research Questions

The main objective would be to develop a model for community care. The study specifically investigates the following research questions:

- How do the positions within the social structure, expose people to mental health problems?
- How does the label being “mentally ill” affect the person’s social relationships within the family and the community?
- What are the priority needs of the people with mental health problems to be addressed in order to enhance their social well-being?
- What are the resources that the community possesses in order to enhance the social well-being of the people with mental health problems?
- How could the resources of the community be utilised in order to enhance the social well-being of the people with mental health problems?

Conceptual Framework

“Mentally Ill”

The concept “Mentally ill”, which is controversial, covers different perspectives, and concerns the people with mental health problems, their families, other members of the community, and medical professionals. In this context, consideration is given to all these different perspectives such as the views of the persons with mental health problems, their family members, mental health professionals, traditional healers etc. Such an approach will be useful in identifying the contradictory views of the term “mentally ill” and its different social constructions in the Sri Lankan context, and would be helpful to examine different levels at which the individuals with mental health problems are devaluated.

Social Well-Being

In the recovery process of mental health, there is less to do with the “disorder” itself and more to do with complex interactions between the person and the social environment (Wallcraft 2005: 201). Further, the importance of focusing on the socioenvironmental context is emphasised, which leads to develop mental health problems, and the resources that can be mobilised to mitigate the threats of stressful experience (Repper and Perkins 2003). Recovery involves overcoming not only the challenge of mental health difficulties themselves, but also the effects of the discrimination and exclusion which accompany them (May 2000). Therefore, social well-being is a main concept which is focused on in the recovery process of mental health.

There was a growing tendency among the social scientists to operationalise the concept of social well-being, after the World Health Organisation reformulated its definition of health following World War II, during a period when the social health of societies was in question. Some scholars developed scales to measure the dimensions of social well-being (Larson 1993). According to Larson social well-being is composed of two elements: social adjustment and social support. Social adjustment is a combination of satisfaction with relationships, performance in social roles and adjustment to one’s environment. Social support is composed of the number of contacts in one’s social network, and satisfaction with those contacts. In the present study, the term social

well-being refers to the performance of social roles in everyday life, positive and satisfying relationships with the relatives, peers, neighbours, colleagues etc.; participation in cultural, sporting, religious, educational and such social activities.

Community and Community Resources

Confusion about views of the community has been an aspect of social and political debate since the nineteenth century. These views have influenced community care services. Central to all these debates is the notion that in a community, there is solidarity among people who share similar lifestyles. The argument presented by Baldwin (Payne 1995: 7-10) regarding the concept of community care is very productive for the purpose of this study in the context that the traditional Sri Lankan society has undergone a series of transformations. Baldwin rejects 'locality' as the basis for community in favour of the solidarity relationships. He 'defines community' in his model of community care as residing in very local networks, with closely interacting relationships between multi-disciplinary teams and empowered service users. The term community will be used in the present study in the above sense. Voluntary groups, informal organisations, different networks of social relationships, religious and traditional medical institutions at community level, psychiatrists, mental health social workers, and public health officers working at community level are referred to as community resources. In this study, mobilisation of community resources refers to the usage of the above resources in order to help the person with mental health problem to access the roles, relationships, activities and resources necessary for recovery.

Methodology

The study begins with a detailed description of the structure of the mental health services in Sri Lanka. Secondary sources will be basically used for this inquiry.

In the initial stage, a convenience sampling will be selected based on few mental health institutions in Sri Lanka. Mental Health Institution at Angoda, 3 psychiatric units of the Base Hospitals in the Colombo District, and *Manasa* at Neelammahara which provides Ayurvedic treatment, will be made use of for this purpose. Informal interviews will be conducted with the service users linked to the above institutions. Apart from the individuals with mental health

problems, one or two family members who will be accompanying them will also be interviewed. As data analysis proceeds, those who are likely to generate information of more relevance to the concepts that are emerging as important will be included in the sample for an in-depth study. It includes the service users embodying diverse socio demographic characteristics with the objective of analysing how positions within the social structure shape exposure to mental stress and resulting consequences for their social well-being. Sample size is also implied by grounded theory approach. Qualitative information will be collected from them, for which the case study method and the in-depth interview method will be used.

Interviews will take a narrative approach, requesting service users and their family members to disclose how the label “mentally ill” affect their social roles and the social relationships with the community, and what are their priority needs to be addressed in order to enhance their social well-being. Also with the objective of identifying their experiences with regard to the negative attributes linking to the label “mental illness”, the service users will be requested to reveal how their mental health problems were conceptualised by their family members, neighbours, friends, colleagues, and health professionals. These views would be used to identify different levels at which the individuals with mental health problems are devaluated. Interviews will be recorded and transcribed.

In order to open up potential avenues for analysis, a coding scheme will be developed from the early empirical data and predetermined themes covering research questions. In the next stage of data analysis, these codes will be further linked to each other in theoretical and conceptual models. Research investigations will be further expanded as new topics emerge from the analysis based on the initial coding.

Based on the above analysis, the community and community resources will be identified in order to help the persons with mental health problems to access the roles, relationships, activities and resources necessary for recovery.

Participatory method will be used as a tool for mobilising community resources in order to help the persons with mental health problems to access the roles, relationships, activities, and

resources necessary for recovery. Community interviews will be conducted as a route for developing participatory practice. These interviews will be used as an exploratory tool to identify the resources that the community possesses and the ways in which those resources could be utilised in order to enhance the social well-being of the people with mental health difficulties. The community will determine the agenda for the participatory research based on the priority needs for social well-being defined by service users and their family members.

1. "An analysis of the concept of cultural/religious 'zones of peace' and its significance for peacebuilding: a primary research conducted on Kataragama."
A research conducted with Dr. Maneesha S. Wanasinghe - Pasqual; Zones of Peace examines the existence of traditional religious-cultural zones of peace in Sri Lanka and how ordinary people interpret their relevance. The research also examines the academic understanding of the concept and explores the potential benefits of these zones of peace in transforming the post-war society and building peace.
- 2 **Human Security: Initiatives taken for dispersing Environmental Peace in Post War Sri Lanka.**

Post war economic development of Sri Lanka is closely linked with initiating environmental protection mechanisms. Three major drivers behind this can be clearly identified: high population growth rate; reconstruction of war torn areas powered by growing developmental projects; and demographic shifts, including the relocation of IDPs and intense urbanization. In this context the paper will evaluate the success of the measures taken by the GOSL for the improvement of environmental standards by minimizing the levels of environmental degradation related to postwar development projects. Theoretical emphasis is based on the concept of human security in which the paper will investigate the decreasing importance of geo-strategic considerations and the necessity to implement a national strategy for a comprehensive security framework considering the non-military dimensions of security

Professor Nayani Melegoda, Department of International Relations

Currently on Sabbatical leave (1 December 2011 to 30 November 2012) on a Japan Foundation Fellowship to research on "Afghanistan: Peacebuilding issues." I have been here at the Hiroshima Peace Science Research Center, University of Hiroshima, Japan since December 2011 and started on my research on Afghanistan.

I will do my first presentation of this research at the Research forum of the Graduate School of International Development and Cooperation, Hiroshima University on 20th January 2012. The topic is Statebuilding in Afghanistan from Bonn 2001 to Bonn 2011. The research is about Statebuilding since the end of War on Terror in Afghanistan. It begins from Bonn 2001 where victors agreed on Statebuilding as an urgent step necessary in the context of peacebuilding in that country. The research focuses on the UN sanctioned Light footprint approach in Statebuilding in Afghanistan on the lines of Bonn mandate of 2001. By the end of 2003 spoilers emerge in Afghanistan resulting in delays of the planned agenda. The two main areas of Statebuilding, DDR and SSR are yet to be realised example the DDR program funded by Government of Japan was a complete failure, it is an experiment the Japanese government will not repeat again. Bonn 2011 conference brought the lead nations together once again to discuss further Statebuilding in Afghanistan in the light of the withdrawal of American troops at the end of 2013.

It is essential to investigate the roles Pakistan, Russia, China, and Iran in the Statebuilding exercise of Afghanistan. Each one of them aspires for a prominent role in the way of international relations with that country for varied reasons. Also the security dimension of South Asia invites the big power in South Asia, India to be interested in that country which has trained the guerrilla fighters of Kashmir for a long time. For the big powers, USA and China, South Asia as a region is too important to be simply ignored and peacebuilding in Afghanistan is vital for sustainable peace in the region. It is hoped that a publication of a research paper Titled "From light footprint to Unflinching Steps: Statebuilding in Afghanistan" to be published in the Hiroshima Peace Science Monograph of March 2012.

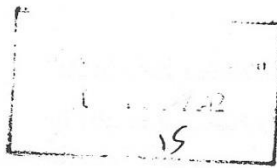

Economic role of Female heads of households in Sri Lanka

(ABSTRACT)

Female Headed Households (FHHs) are singled out as a key poverty group in development policy. The supporting evidence highlights that female heads in comparison to male, have to carry both productive and reproductive roles, their household size is smaller and invariably lack adult members in the working age group and have higher dependency ratios. Further, the overall disadvantages that women have such as lack of resources and lower wages compared to males, aggravate their poverty. However the conventional definition of head of household does not emphasize economic support to the household. The argument of the research is that similar to other countries, many women who are identified as heads of households in Sri Lanka are actually not the primary economic contributors to the household; and from a poverty perspective this overstates the number of households headed by women. In return the definition can also exclude a significant proportion of women who are actually the main or sole income earner but are by definition lives in male headed households. The research intends to see what economic role is played by the female heads of households and thus discuss certain limitations of operationalizing the current definition of household head adopted in Sri Lanka in relation to poverty.

For this purpose a household survey will be carried out in 6 Grama Niladari divisions in Kandy district of Sri Lanka, covering urban, rural and estate sectors (I hope to extend this to Matara and Colombo districts depending on time and finances) in early 2012. The survey will use questionnaire method and the target group will be female heads of households.

CHANGING ROLE OF THE FAMILY AND AGEING IN SRI LANKA

Introduction

The main objective of this study is to investigate the changing role of the family and ageing in Sri Lanka. Unlike other developing countries, Sri Lanka is currently experiencing a rapid growth of elderly population. Although population ageing process in the developed countries has occurred gradually and over a relatively long stretches of time, the age structure in developing countries is changing more rapidly and much more concentrated during a short period of time (United Nations 2001, 2007, 2008). Among South Asian countries Sri Lanka has shown comparatively improvement of social and demographic process. As a result, Sri Lanka is currently experiencing a significant increase in the ageing population parallel to changes observed in status as well as role of the family structure. In most of the developing countries, speedy decline of fertility and mortality along with the migration as well as modernization of the societies have created different types of changes in the family structure, its role and subsequently changed the process of the ageing population together with the care for the elderly (Silva 2004). Rapid transition of the age-sex structure in developing countries has emerged different set of challenges. A compressed transition toward an older population age structure generates a completely different set of challenges which we are only identifying and ill-prepared to solve (Palloni. A, 2009). In Sri Lanka, although experiencing its demographic and social advancement, ageing is occurring at a lower level of economic development compared to experiences of developed countries (Jones, 1988). Therefore, its impact on family and the society will be substantial and different. However, the present author believes that it is imperative to investigate the relationship between changing role of the family and ageing in Sri Lanka where the above mentioned changes have been occurring at faster rate during past few decades.

Major Objective:

The major objective is to investigate the relationship between the changing role of the family and ageing in Sri Lanka.

Specific Objectives:

1. To explore and describe the nature, trends and patterns of changing role of the family in Sri Lanka
2. To discover and describe the extent, nature and speed of population ageing
3. To explore the implications of changes in the family for the well-being of elderly
4. To explore the implications, changing patterns of internal and international labour migration for care for the elderly at family, community and national level
5. To investigate the impact of changing intergenerational roles on the population ageing in Sri Lanka
6. To describe the policy implications of population ageing arising from the changing role of the family

The present study expects that the above objectives will successfully describe the relationship between changing role of the family and population ageing in Sri Lanka as it attempts to examine the magnitude as well as how the changing role of the family affects elderly population and most importantly the policy implications of population ageing arising from the changing role of the family.

Methodology

Research Design

The research design of this study will be a mixed method study combining both quantitative and qualitative approaches in order to understand the relationship between changing role of the family and ageing in Sri Lanka. Therefore, the aim of this study is to accommodate both quantitative and qualitative approaches in order to come up with a more comprehensive picture about the problem. In order to establish macro-level causal relationship between the two phenomena studied, secondary data will be obtained from various available sources. In particular, secondary data will be obtained from the secondary data sources such as data collected from the Department of Census and Statistics, Registrar General Department, Demographic and Health Surveys in Sri Lanka, and from various UN sources. Furthermore, these data will offer a great opportunity to analyze the nature, trends, rapidity of ageing population as well as changing nature, trends and role of the family in Sri Lanka. It is expected that such an effort will not only provide an opportunity to obtain the magnitude of the relationship but also the direction of the relationship. Primary data will be obtained through a semi-structured questionnaire and case studies methodologies.

Sampling

Geographical area of study

The area of study will be the Galle district in Sri Lanka as the data from the Department of Census and Statistics in 2001 Galle District shows that the highest number of elderly people live in this district. Two DS divisions among the total of 18 will be selected, one from the most urbanized area called Galle for Graverts D.S. Division and the most rural area named as Neluwa DS Division. Such a selection will accommodate population aging issues prevalent in both urban and rural localities.

Selection of the sample

Sample will be selected proportionately with the use of total elderly population distributed in the each GN divisions of the selected two DS divisions. 400 households will be selected which consists of one or more elderly people. Urban and rural sample also will be selected proportionately with the use of total elderly population distributed in GN Divisions of the selected urban and rural DS Divisions.

Sample size

Total size of the sample will be 400 and it is believed this will provide enough information to understand the relationship between changing family roles and population ageing in Sri Lanka.

Data Analysis

Since the study aims at analyzing parental and children generations' experiences in terms of changing family roles and intergenerational transfer of wealth in the context of population ageing issues, both cohort and period approaches will be employed to analyze data gathered for the study.

Firstly, quantitative analysis will be carried out in order to establish causal relationships between variables with the use of both By-variate and multi-variate analyses depending on the type of analysis demanded by each chapter on its research questions. In this regard, both SPSS and Excel software packages will be used.

Secondly, qualitative information gathered through both semi-structured questionnaires as well as via case studies will be analyzed to provide sufficient explanation for the observed relationship between different variables of the changing family roles and population ageing.

The following abstract was submitted to the Annual Session of the Population Association of America (PAA), USA , which is going to be held in San Francisco in July 2012 and now we as a Co-author) are analyzing the data to present the paper at the Annual Session.

Measures of Unmet Need for Contraception in Sri Lanka using the 2006/7 Demographic and Health Survey, *K.A.P. Siddhisena and Deborah S. DeGraff*

We propose to update two earlier studies of unmet need for contraception in Sri Lanka, as described below, using the 2006/7 Demographic and Health Survey.

Using data from the 1987 Demographic and Health Survey of Sri Lanka, DeGraff and de Silva (1991) derived alternative measures of unmet need for contraception among married women aged 15 to 49, highlighting how the results varied depending on the assumptions made about a number of measurement issues (e.g., how to treat use of traditional contraceptive methods, abstinence or unwanted current pregnancy in the measurement of unmet need). The estimates of unmet need ranged from about 6 percent using the narrowest definition of unmet need, to about 31 percent using the broadest concept of unmet need. The study further analyzed these results according to key socioeconomic and demographic characteristics of the respondents to pinpoint where unmet need is concentrated.

In a later study, DeGraff and de Silva (1996) adopted a very different approach to measuring unmet need for contraception. Rather than using a traditional preference-based measure, where the distinguishing characteristic is whether the respondent desires more children, the second study developed a health-based measure of unmet need. This approach identifies women who would experience an elevated health risk associated with pregnancy, either for themselves or for their baby, but who are not using contraception. Again, the 1987 DHS was used to apply this measure. That analysis yielded estimates of unmet need ranging from about 4 percent to about 23 percent, again varying according to the assumptions made about selected measurement issues. Furthermore, the analysis showed that the traditional preference-based measures of unmet need identified between 50 and 90 percent of women classified as having health-based unmet need, whereas the remainder (10 to 50 percent) constituted a distinct group of women.

In the 20 years following the 1987 DHS in Sri Lanka, the already high contraceptive prevalence rate among married women aged 15 to 49 increased further, from 61.7 percent to 68 percent, and the modern contraceptive use rate increased from 40.6 percent to 52.8 percent (Sri Lanka Department of Census and Statistics 2008). These recent figures suggest progress in reducing the incidence of unmet need for contraception. In view of these changes, it would be interesting to revisit the earlier studies to assess how the various measures of unmet need have changed over time. Such analysis could contribute to efforts towards further progress in meeting the contraceptive needs of the population and reducing pregnancy-related health issues. The proposed analysis would derive the same set of measures of unmet need for contraception using the 2006/7 DHS data.

Unmet Need for Contraception among Married Women Aged 15 to 49: An Initial Measure

One definition of unmet need for contraception among women in union would consider the following categories of women to *not* be in need: those currently using any form of contraception, those unable to bear children, and those who desire to have an additional child soon (either the current pregnancy or soon if not pregnant and not using contraception). Under this definition, the remainder would be considered to have unmet need for contraception. This residual group includes the following: currently pregnant women not coded as wanting the pregnancy now, women who are not coded as pregnant and are not using contraception who do not indicate they want another child, and women who are not coded as pregnant and are not using contraception who indicate they want another child but not soon. Based on the above tabulations, this definition of unmet need among women in union yields the following result.

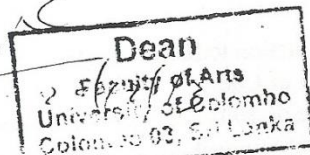

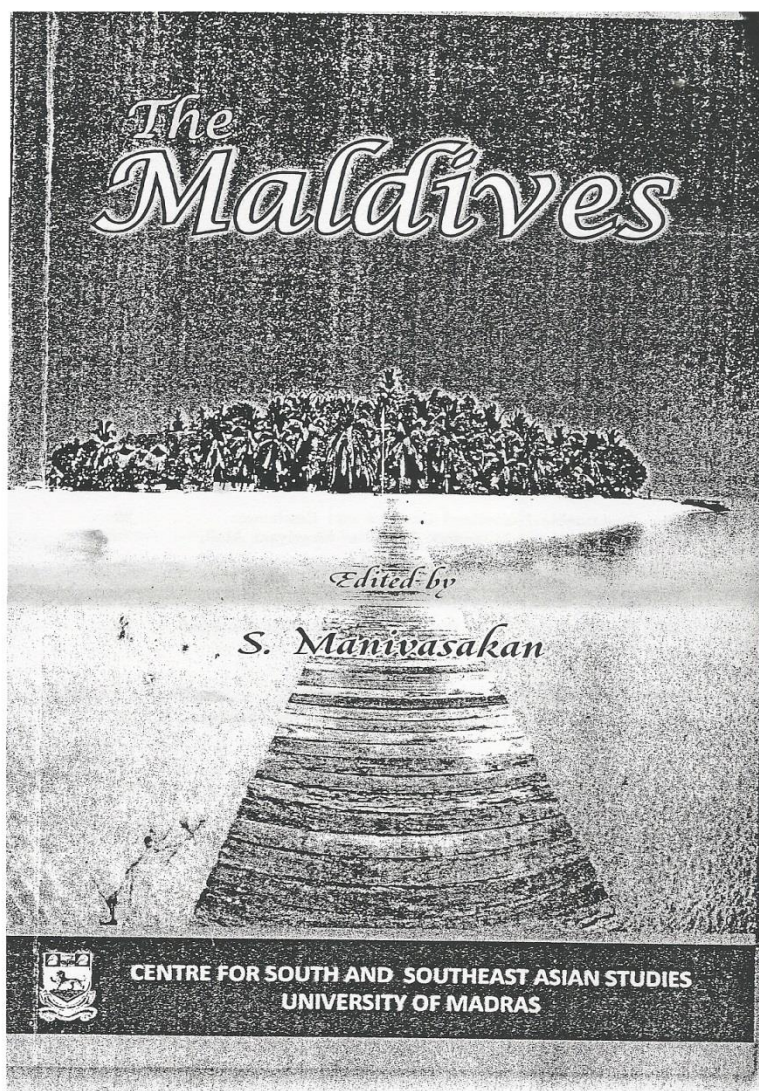

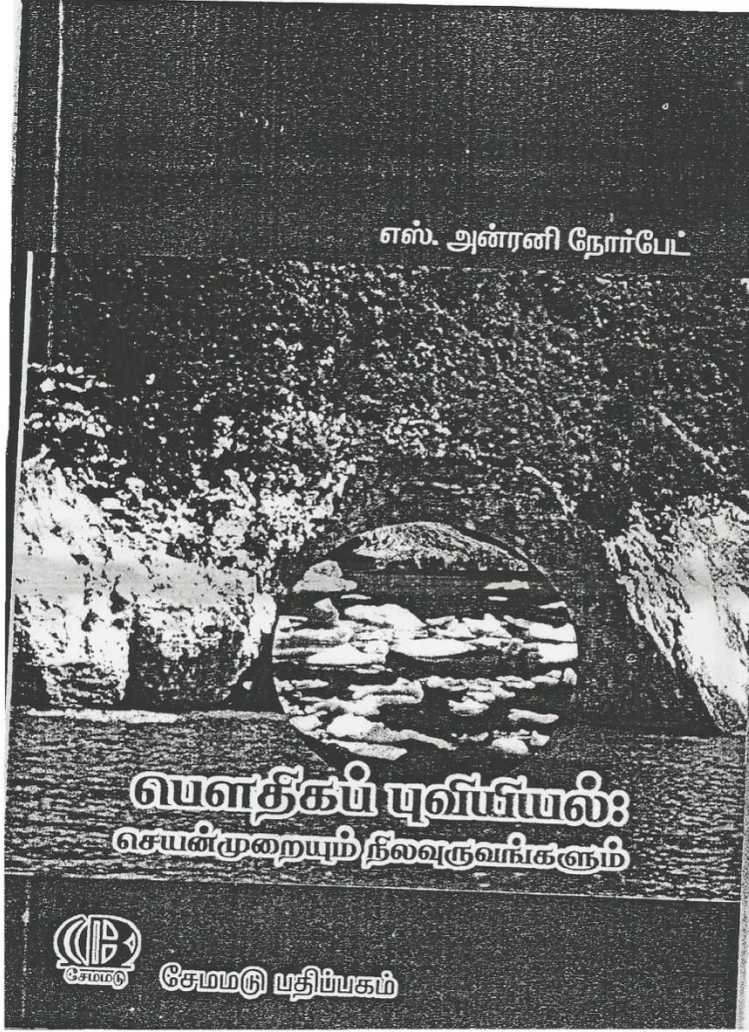

EXPLANATION ON AUDIT QUERY OF RESEARCH ALLOWANCE IN THE YEAR 2012

I joined the University of Colombo on 23rd August 2012; hence the first salary I received in the year 2012 is on September 2012. As per my pay slips I have not been paid a 'research allowance' throughout the months of 2012 since my employment.

As I was a new recruit I did not even know of such allowance till the department in 2013 notified me. I applied for a research allowance initially in April 2013 for the year 2013 and was paid a sum of LKR 48,606.25 on June 2013, as areas for research allowance for the preceding five months; January to May 2013. Since then I have been paid LKR 9721.25 as a research allowance for each month till December 2013.

Taking these factors to account I do not know how I have been audited on a payment I haven't received. I would be grateful if you could look in to the matter and correct the records as necessary.

Government Procurement Guidelines - 2006

The Government Procurement Guidelines -2006 are issued with the approval of the Cabinet of Ministers in order to enhance the transparency of Government procurement process to minimize delays and to obtain financially the most advantageous and qualitatively the best services and supplies for the nation.

The Guidelines on Government Tender Procedure (Revised Edition, 1997), Revised Guidelines on Government Tender Procedure for Projects assisted by the Foreign Financing Agencies (Revised Edition- 2000) and Treasury circulars pertaining to the Guidelines on Government Tender Procedure issued upto 20.10.2005 are hereby repealed and are replaced by these Guidelines.

Unlike the current Guidelines, these Guidelines have two components; The Guidelines & the Manual. The Manual will be issued separately. The provisions of these Guidelines will be **effective from 01.02.2006** in respect of all procurements of Goods, Works and Services other than the Selection and Employment of Consultants. These guidelines are applicable to the ongoing tenders in which bidding documents or pre-qualification documents are issued after the effective date of these Guidelines.

These Guidelines have been drafted in association with the major funding agencies such as the World Bank, the Asian Development Bank and the Japan Bank for International Cooperation, to ensure that the Government Procurement Guidelines are harmonized to the maximum extent in order to use for the foreign funded projects as well.

GOVERNMENT PROCUREMENT GUIDELINES

CHAPTER I

GENERAL

1.1 Purpose

- 1.1.1 The purpose of these Guidelines is to set forth the procedures that should be adhered to by the PE, in carrying out any Procurement Action financed in whole or in part by GoSL or a Foreign Funding Agency.

1.2 Objectives

- 1.2.1 The Procurement process should ensure:-

- (a) maximizing economy, timeliness and quality in Procurement resulting in least cost together with the high quality;
- (b) adhering to prescribed standards, specifications, rules, regulations and good governance;
- (c) providing fair, equal and maximum opportunity for eligible interested parties to participate in Procurement;
- (d) expeditious execution of Works and delivery of Goods and Services;
- (e) compliance with local laws and regulations and international obligations;
- (f) ensuring transparency and consistency in the evaluation and selection procedure; and
- (g) retaining confidentiality of information provided by bidders.

1.3 Scope of Application

- 1.3.1 These Guidelines repeal, replace or otherwise supersede all previous guidelines, circulars and financial regulations issued by the Treasury and the Department of Public Finance on the subject of procurement except those relating to disposal of inventory items and divestiture of public assets.
- 1.3.2 Guidelines are applicable to all Procurements, irrespective of the source of funding.

Guidelines of Foreign Funding Agencies

- 1.3.3 In the case of a Foreign Funded Project, if the Foreign Funding Agency mandates the use of Procurement Guidelines of such funding

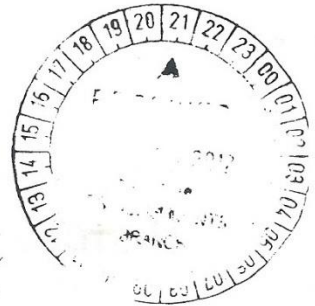
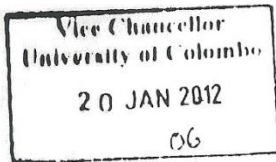

Muslim Political Parties in Post Colonial Sri Lanka

The change from the first past the post election system to the proportional representation system in Sri Lanka in the 1980s saw the emergence of many political parties with small constituencies. Some of these were parties with ethnic minority constituencies. The most famous of these is probably the Sri Lanka Muslim congress. While the SLMC had significant successes under its founder leader- Ashraff, and gave voice to Muslim disaffection in the eastern Province during the conflict, it's later years have been rife with internal conflict. Today there are at least three other registered political parties with constituencies in the Northern and Eastern Provinces that lay claim to Ashraff's legacy, and each claim some electoral success. Currently all these parties are with the government. Since the emergence of the SLMC there have been ministers in successive governments who have had very powerful cabinet positions. These resulted in developing patronage practices with relationships that were almost feudal in form and few policy level changes for the Muslim constituencies. This paper will trace the emergence and success of Muslim ethnic politics since the formation of the SLMC and look at the different practices through which ethnic identity based rights claims were made for Muslim communities by their political leadership. It will try to assess the consequences to Muslim communities of such practices at the level of maintain good interethnic relationships and defining Muslims' place in Sri Lanka's political framework.

History after the war

This research project investigates growing importance of “History” as a domain of ideological struggle in the Post-War Sinhala-Buddhist South of Sri Lanka. Seeing from the perspective of post-war reconciliation between various ethno-religious communities, imagination of the past plays a major role. I will attempt to approach the existing discourses of ethno-religiously defined historical texts by way of deconstructing them.

While it is well-known that the interpretation of the past of the island is one of the battlefields of the Sinhala and Tamil ethnic politics in Sri Lanka, there is no adequate explanation as to how the ethno-political function of “history” has been possible irrespective of the presence of strong empirical scholarly tradition in the historical scholarship. The explanation has to be found in the way in which methodologically empirical and ostensibly ideologically-neutral scholarly discourse and the hegemonized popular understanding of “history of Sri Lanka” have been articulated into one discursive construction. This discursive construction functions as a “Charter of Right” for the Sinhala-Buddhist, especially in the context of the escalating ethno-nationalist tension. In other words, it was through a particular version of the past of the island that Sinhala-nationalists built their case against the ethno-nationalist claims of Tamils. Quite understandably, Tamil nationalists are vehemently opposed to this construction, but still failed to build a more attractive version to the public as well as to the scholars.

Subsequent to the military defeat of Tamil Ethno-nationalism, the importance of non-military battle-fronts has gained momentum. Sinhala-Buddhist pilgrims flocking in to Jaffna peninsula and sites claimed to be linked with the early Buddhist activities of the island have become their popular destinations. These visitors are highly emotional about the “historical significance” of these places and being watched by politically sensitive Tamils with utmost caution. To add more fuel to the tension, Sinhalized names of these places, which were hitherto restricted to the discourse of virtually unknown group of Sinhala intellectuals, are now displayed openly in these places.

In the meantime archaeologists are also busy with making further inroads to this “territory of distorted history” in order to discover remnants of the “true history”, again to the delight of Sinhala-Buddhist pilgrims and to the fury of politically sensitive Tamils.

History after the War: Challenges for Post War Reconciliation

The end of the war is certainly not the end of the conflict that led to the military confrontation between the military forces of Sri Lanka state and the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE). This conflict surfaces in different guises, military episode being only one. It is well-known that conflicting interpretation into the past of the island by conflicting parties is a major factor in the conflict.¹ When the military confrontation was the dominant form of the conflict the importance of other forms were less evident. With the military episode is completely over by now, non military aspects of the conflict have come to the fore. It is in this context that the renewed role of "history" in the Sri Lanka ethnic conflict has to be discussed.

In the collective imagination of the 'Sinhala-Buddhist South', the 'Tamil North' occupies very special place. In short, it is a place to be conquered and occupied. To the Sinhala-Buddhist mind the "North" is very much part of the Sinhala-Buddhist territory. This territory has long been illegitimately occupied by Tamils, or, according to more sophisticated versions, mostly by former Sinhalese who have metamorphosed into Tamils following some maneuvering by elite groups and European colonial rulers. Such Sinhala nationalist propagandists as Nalin de Silva and Suriya Gunasekera impressively articulate this view.² Although this explanation is restricted to a limited group who are very well familiar with their literature, there is a general consensus among ordinary Sinhala-Buddhists about the Sinhala-Buddhist ownership to the North.

This Sinhala-Buddhist perception towards the Tamil North is very much part of the ideology of the Post-Colonial Sri Lanka state. In this ideology, the territorial integrity of the state is articulated in a very special way. In the minds of the Sinhala-Buddhist, "*Lankawe ekeeyabhwaya*" (Unity/unitariness of Sri Lanka) is not a notion of modern territorially based statehood or constitutionalism, but a historically constituted notion that is well represented in the Sinhala-Buddhist parlance "*dedahas pansiya wasarak tisse pevethi ekeeya rajjaya*" (United state that existed for the last 2500 year).

The notion of island (*dvipa*) formed the part of the ruling ideology of Anuradhapura, at least at the time of the Mahawamsa was compiled in the 6th century CE. Apparently there were two sources of this ideology of 'islandness'. One is the outsiders perception where the geographical entity was identified as social entity as well. For reasons that is not clear, a powerful group of inhabitants in the island, at least a section of which formed the ruling elite of Anuradhapura, came to be known as *sihala* and the island was named by many outsiders as the 'Island of *sihalas* (*sihaladipa* or its variant *serendib* as pronounced by Arabians). The other source of this ideology is the world view of the *bikkhus* (community of Buddhist monks) who formed a decisive social agent in the pre-modern historical development of the island. The idea that the island is the place that destined to preserve Buddhism in its pure form for five thousand years was central to the world view that was propagated at least by a dominant section of the *bikkhu* community, who were probably close to the ruling elite. The notion *dhammadipa* perfectly encompassed this world view. Attempts were made through mythical traditions to link this world view with the wishes of living Buddha himself, where he prepared the island for the ordained task by way of visiting the island three times and asking the god *sakra* to protect Wijaya and his retinue.³

Through the articulation of this ideology, the post-colonial ruling elite sanctified the existing territoriality of the state. In the context that the existing territoriality is being constantly put into question by the Tamils not only through alternative ideology but also politico-military means, upholding this sanctified tradition is immensely significant.

Although the comprehensive military victory over the LTTE was celebrated in massive scale and the entire Sinhala-Buddhist populace responded to it as if they achieved the ultimate victory over the Tamil North, there is also wider acceptance, at the same time, that the mission is not fully accomplished.⁴ There are a number of fronts to fight in: taming and de-nationalizing Tamil politics, discrediting the Tamil Diaspora, changing the demography in the North, etc. In addition, the reconstitution of the “historic” Sinhala-Buddhist North (and East) is also recognized as a prominent task.

Post-war politico-ideological interventions in relation to the North are fascinating and quite significant. Apart from continued military presence and “development process” as defined by the Sinhala state in line with neo-liberal doctrine, there are ideologically driven interventions. Pilgrimage is such an interesting phenomenon. Sinhala-Buddhist pilgrims who are flocking into Jaffna peninsula in large numbers engage in a much more significant politico-ideological act than a religious act. Beneath the official rhetoric of brining about ethnic harmony through North-South people to people encounters, these pilgrimages certainly ones that reproduce conflicting interests between Sinhala and Tamil ethno-nationalist identity politics. Although pilgrimage has provided much needed economic benefits for the North, they have at the same time created a sense of anxiety among politically and ideologically conscious Tamils.

The major ideological inspiration for these Sinhala-Buddhist pilgrims is arguably the discourse of “Sinhala-Buddhist heritage in the North and East” (*uturu negenahira Sinhala bauddha urumaya*). The most vigorous propagators of this ideology, with the moral, institutional, material, political support of the state and, particularly unofficial backing of the military, became very active in the post-war context. In their point of view the most important task of the post-war reconstitution of the North (and East) is to re-establish the historical rights of the Sinhala-Buddhists in this territory.⁵

As permanent residents of the North territory is unlikely to be converted to the Sinhala-Buddhist ideology, the strategy that propagators of the Sinhala-Buddhist ideology have adopted is to create an alternative and parallel space of social relations in competition with that of Tamils. It is possible to compare this strategy with the one that Sinhala-Buddhists have adopted in relation to Buddhists sites in India.

Buddhist sites in North India and Nepal, for which Sinhala-Buddhists use the name *dambadiva* form a part of the imaginary Sinhala-Buddhist territory. *Dambadiva*, as found in the Sinhala Buddhist imagination, is not a location of the geography of South Asia. Therefore *dambadiva vandanava* is a pilgrimage to the imagined part of the Sinhala-Buddhist territory. Moreover, this is not a visit to a foreign land either. The usual term *rata yanava* (going abroad) would not be used for this journey. It would simply be referred to as *dambadiva yanava* (going *dambadiva*, not even 'going to India').

If the ultimate realization of the Sinhala-Buddhist territoriality in relation to *dambadiva* is the pilgrimage, the case of North-bound pilgrimage is different. As mentioned at the beginning, the North, unlike *dambadiva*, is, in the mind of the Sinhala-Buddhist, a place to be conquered and occupied. If they are satisfied, in the case of *dambadiva*, only with preserving Buddhists sites in India as pilgrim destinations, something more has to be achieved in the North. As a religious act of ordinary devotees, pilgrimage to the North is of course an end in itself. For the politically and ideologically conscious pilgrims, this is more than that. They are quite conscious of the broader significance of their journey. They share the view that the historical sequence that is linked the modern Sinhala-Buddhist with early Buddhist affairs in the island has been broken in the North by way of *de-buddhisization* and *de-sinhalization* and its Sinhala-Buddhist heritage has to be re-established.

The decisive feature of this post-war Sinhala-Buddhist imagination of the North is that it is solely based on the historical consciousness of Sinhala-Buddhists and runs completely against the Tamil nationalist and Southern non-nationalist political imaginations of the post-war North.

Sinhala names are the original ones. Such example as Sinhalized Mūladīpa in place of Tamil Mulathiv and Kandurugoda in place of Kandarodai.

Especially, it runs against the notion of 'traditional Tamil homelands' which is the political core of the Tamil historical consciousness.

There is an important factor that gives an extra advantage to the Sinhala-Buddhist historical consciousness. The historical narrative that is linked with the latter is generally compatible with the dominant paradigm of the modern historical scholarship in Sri Lanka. That is the reason why dominant figures in the Sri Lankan historical scholarship such as K.M. de Silva has questioned the 'traditional Tamil homeland' theory as mythical and grounded in political interests of Tamil nationalism, without trying to question the mythical basis of dominant paradigm, which supports the Sinhala-Buddhist consciousness and the political interests of the Sinhala-Buddhist ruling elite.⁶

Conclusion

Seeing from the point of view of a post-war reconciliation that accommodates the legitimate demands of Tamils in the North and East, the renewed importance of 'history' in shaping the post-war dynamics of the ethno-political conflict will certainly pose a major challenge to those who wish to overcome the horizons of nationalist imaginations in a new post war rethinking of politics. In a context where extreme Sinhala-Buddhist nationalism is unprecedentedly strong and ideologically aggressive as well as provides the ideological support for the political system that excludes Tamils, need for building up an alternative discourse of history become more than a naïve academic pursuit. It is a profound political and ideological task that has to be given a high priority.

Human Security: Initiatives taken for dispersing Environmental Peace in Post War Sri Lanka.

Post war economic development of Sri Lanka is closely linked with initiating environmental protection mechanisms. Three major drivers behind this can be clearly identified: high population growth rate; reconstruction of war torn areas powered by growing developmental projects; and demographic shifts, including the relocation of IDPs and intense urbanization. 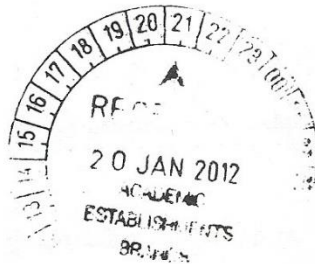

Abstract

Major economic contributions by women to Sri Lankan Economy

Major contribution of women to the economy of Sri Lanka can be specifically identified to the three sectors in this study during the last few decades. The country has a total population consists of nearly half the number as of females. Significant participation of women in the productive activities in the Tea Sector, Garment Sector and Migrant Employment sector is the main focus of this research analysis. The relative importance among Sri Lankan total industrial exports of 74.9% the share of Garments 46.2%, and among total agricultural exports of 23.9% the share of Tea exports is 16.7%. Remittances of the Migrant labour from middle Eastern countries contribute 60% to total remittances to the Sri Lankan economy. Majority of this workers consist of unskilled domestic female labour.

Historical reasons have made the Tea plantations being the largest women labour force participation sector from the pre to post independent period to the present time. Next manufacturing sector dominated by the Garment sector also is exclusively consists of major female labour force participation. European countries ensured the continuous buying markets for our tea products. Next followed by the open economic policies since the late seventies promoted the garment export markets in Europe and US with concessional trade for our export products. Thirdly due to globalization and easy mobility across borders for employment enabled the unskilled labour. An opportunity for women to proceed for work in the service sector in Middle eastern countries resulting in large sums of foreign remittances in the form of valuable hard currencies to the Sri Lankan economy.

Despite the benefits to the nation the challenges faced by the women labour force are many and deserve attention in different areas for policy remedial action by the government. Majority of the female labour force and their families live in poverty with poor standard of living conditions lacking education, health and housing facilities which needs to be addressed by the state on a priority basis. High lighting facts with suggestions for implementing to meet the problems and change the status quo would help to attain the goals specified in the vision to move forward in making of Sri Lanka as the 'Miracle of Asia.'

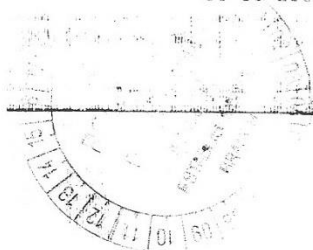

Legal Structures, Subjects, and Cosmopolitan Spaces in Contemporary South Asian Global Fiction

This research examines the fraught relations between juridical structures and cosmopolitan cultural spaces and subjects as depicted in contemporary South Asian global novels. It will examine novels such as Arvind Adiga's *The White Tiger*, Kiran Desai's *The Inheritance of Loss*, Michael Ondaatje's *Anil's Ghost* for their representations of the effects of colonialism and uneven flows of globalization on the current cultural/ economic/political landscapes of the formerly colonized nations. While much of the theory and criticism on globalization and transnational fiction focus on the effect of global cultural, economic, capital flows that are seen as crucial in defining the geographical/social spaces and identities of the subjects of these texts, the impact of the juridical structures in producing these spaces and subjects remain largely unexplored. I argue that law, as a significant part of social formation, has an equally important effect on subject constitution and the conceptualization of these spaces. While globalization has augured (uneven) economic development and cultural homogeneity in the cosmopolitan cultural spaces such as Bombay, Delhi, and Colombo, these spaces remain essentially distinct from the West in the above literary representations in the frequent breakdown of law and order. I intend to explore the disintegration of law and order in

these spaces and the identity constitution outside the law which is depicted in these texts to be a result of a corrupt post-colonial nation-state, as well as the effects of globalization. I explore how these spaces, which seemingly appear as cosmopolitan sites of global modernity, are thus represented as underdeveloped, uncivilized, and anarchic sites and the characters remain "legal minors," thus reproducing colonialist structures of thinking about the "orient."

Law, as a potent ideological and repressive state apparatus, relies on cultural forms to legitimate and naturalize its content and secure the consent of citizens to its decrees. According to Joseph Slaughter in *Human Rights Inc.*, literature performs a vital ideological function in disseminating legal norms and shaping societal perceptions of law. Slaughter further maintains that, in an era of intense globalization, "legal and literary forms cooperate to disseminate and legitimate norms of human rights, to make each other's common sense legible and compelling" (Slaughter 3). However, contrary to Slaughter's claims, the South Asian global novels profess an ambivalent engagement with the legal structures and the hegemonic human rights discourses, revealing a critical consciousness of the juridical apparatus in relation to the state and its citizens.

First, this research will analyze Michael Ondaatje's *Anil's Ghost*, which is set in a turbulent era in Sri Lanka's political history in the early 1990's. The narrative presents the failed intervention of Anil Tissera, who is a forensic scientist, to bring justice to the victims of violence in Sri Lanka. While seemingly deploying a hegemonic Western discourse on human rights, naturalizing and normativizing its content, the narrative also interrogates its decrees and assumptions and reveals the limits of international law. Next, this research will examine



Arvind Adiga's *White Tiger*, a novel that revolves around an Indian driver named Balram and his eventual coming into being as a self-made entrepreneur within the structures of globalization and transnational capital. Balram's process of individuation as an entrepreneur is predicated upon his recognition and developing of an (il)legal consciousness influenced by everyday social relations within the existing socio cultural, and juridical configurations. Third, I will examine Kiran Desai's *The Inheritance of Loss* and its portrayal of the predicament of a working class Nepali, whose status as an illegal migrant shapes his identity and experiences of the developed world.
