Review

The National Institute of Social Development, which operates under the purview of the Ministry of Rural Development, Social Security and Community Empowerment, is the only higher education institution in Sri Lanka providing social work education. This institution was established under the provisions of Section 25 of the University Grants Commission, No. 16 of 1978. Accordingly, in 2005 it was granted the authority to award the Bachelor's Degree in Social Work, and in 2008 the authority to award the Postgraduate Degree in Social Work. All the degrees, postgraduate degrees, higher diploma, diploma, certificate courses and training and research programs implemented by the institution have been prepared based on the needs assessment reports to suit the national needs. These curricula are in accordance with the SLQF of the University Grants Commission.

The Bachelor's Degree and the Master's Degree in Social Work are the main academic programs conducted by the School of Social Work. In addition, Advanced Diploma and Diploma programs in Social Work are offered. A key feature of these programs is the development of skills through practical field training combined with theoretical knowledge. The Training Division conducts both short-term and long-term training programs, as well as Diploma courses, certificate courses, and short-term training based at regional centers in Ampara, Thalawa, and Kilinochchi. In addition, training programs are implemented to develop the capabilities of officers in the field of social development according to the demands of government and non-government institutions throughout the island. Also, several diploma courses in counseling and advanced diploma courses in counseling are conducted as fee-levying courses. The necessary arrangements have been made to start the Higher Diploma Course in Counseling and develop it into a degree course, and the current curriculum has been submitted for approval to the Ministry of Higher Education .

The Division of Social Development Policy, Research, and Publications carries out research, publishes findings, and organizes conferences and research studies. Research reports and publications produced by the Division, based on its studies, can be extensively utilized for the advancement of social development and social welfare. In addition to the above main divisions, several academic and support centers have been established to ensure the quality of the institution's academic programs. These include the Center for Quality Assurance, the Department of Social Work Studies, the Department of Humanities and Gerontology Studies, the Department of Social Sciences and Social Development Studies, the Department of Counseling and Psychology Studies, the Student Welfare Division, the Curriculum Development Center, and the Center for Gender Studies.

Three affiliated training centers of the institution have been established in Thalawa (Anuradhapura), Ampara, and Kilinochchi. The primary objective of establishing these regional centers is to extend the programs conducted at the main office in Seeduwa to Sinhala, Tamil, and Muslim communities living across different regions of Sri Lanka.



The construction of the 100,000 square-foot building complex for our institution in the Liyanagemulla, Seeduwa area is now 98.19% complete. Upon completion of this building complex, the institution will be able to increase the number of students admitted for academic programs and will also have the capacity to introduce and conduct new courses in line with the country's prevailing needs.

Graduates who have successfully completed the Institute's social work degree programs are in great demand in the job market and are mainly working as social work professionals in countries such as Australia, the United States, New Zealand, etc. This has not only contributed to personal development but also to the earning of foreign exchange for the country. Furthermore, graduates of our Institute have also secured employment opportunities in both the government and non-government sectors, and have utilized their professional skills for the betterment of the society.

At present, the initial work is underway to upgrade the institution to university status and in parallel, work has begun to establish academic facilities including the initiation of new degree courses. This will expand the opportunity for a large number of students to access higher education. We have successfully implemented the quality assurance process supervised by SCAQA (Standing Committee on Accreditation and Quality Assurance) to ensure the excellence of all our academic programs. This institution has been making a commendable contribution to achieving sustainable development goals through a history of 72 years.

1.1 Introduction

The National Institute of Social Development is a higher education institution operating under the Ministry of Rural Development, Social Security and Community Empowerment. The National Institute of Social Development offers undergraduate, postgraduate and diploma courses in social work related to social development, social welfare and social empowerment, as well as diploma courses in counselling. It operates under the provisions of the National Institute of Social Development Act No. 41 of 1992 and is the only state institution providing social work education in Sri Lanka. With the aim of promoting social work education, in the year 2005, the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka, on the recommendation of the University Grants Commission, declared the National Institute of Social Development as a degree-awarding institution under Section 25 A of the Universities Act, No. 16 of 1978, and granted the permission to award the Master of Arts in Social Work and the Bachelor of Arts in Social Work.

School of Social Work

The School of Social Work (SSW) is the largest and oldest division of the National Institute of Social Development. Professional Social Work education was started with the initiation of non-governmental organizations in Sri Lanka in 1952. It was renamed the Ceylon School of Social Work in 1964 and the Sri Lanka School of Social Work in 1972, functioning as a government institution. SSW conducts professional education programs in social work and is recognized by the University Grants Commission. Initially, only short-term training programs were conducted by the institute. Presently, the School of Social Work conducts the main academic programs namely, the Diploma in Social Work (SWD) since 1978, two-year program Higher Diploma in Social Work program (HDSW) since 2013, the Bachelor of Social Work since 2005 and Masters in Social Work since 2008 and also several short terms and part-time outreach programs. The Bachelor's degree in Social Work, by order under Section 25 A of the Universities Act No.16 of 1978, published in the Gazette Extraordinary No.1395/15 of June 01, 2005, and the Master of Social Work degree by order under section 25A of the Universities Act No.16 of 1978 published in the Gazette Extraordinary No. 1557/7 of July 07, 2008.



The aims and objectives of implementing these programs can be stated as follows.

Objectives

1. Introducing new programs for social work education.
2. Upgrading existing educational programs.
3. Upgrading the use of IT and English in social work education.
4. Design and implement programs for professional recognition.
5. Producing social work professionals for social development and social empowerment

Introduction to Master's Degree Programme in Social Work



(Degree Awarding Ceremoney – 2024)

The first batch of the Master's program in Social Work, the first ever in Sri Lanka, commenced under the sponsorship of the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA), implemented by Queen's University, Kingston, Canada, in collaboration with the Ministry of Social Services and Social Welfare.

The aim of the Master of Social Work degree program is to produce a professionally qualified and managerially competent workforce to serve in the provision of the social welfare system and thereby promote the social development and well-being of the country's citizens. The program is designed to provide participants with advanced knowledge in social work and to provide practical training to change attitudes so that they can actively participate in policy-making as leaders in the field of social development.

Objectives of the Master of Social Work (MSW) Programme

The main objective of the Master's program in Social Work is to meet the demand in the public and private sectors for upgrading the competencies of graduates/other equally qualified individuals already engaged in social work to provide opportunities to graduates from other disciplines and other equally qualified personnel to obtain advanced knowledge in social work to meet the urgent need for professional social workers in the country at the managerial level.

Subject content of the course

The curriculum of the Master's Degree consists of subjects related to social sciences as well as courses related to the subject of Social Work. Students should also complete two-field training and a research dissertation to gain theoretical knowledge as well as practical knowledge. Subjects such as Sociology for Social Work, Psychology for Social Work, Philosophy of Social Work, Understanding Sri Lankan Society, Social Welfare Programs in Sri Lanka, Globalization and Social Welfare, Social Work and Human Rights, Social Work Management, Social Policy, Research Methods for Social Work as well as basic field training and community work; and research dissertation and provide students with the opportunity to gain practical knowledge and skills.

This program is designed according to the Sri Lanka Qualification Framework and is offered with an international standard scoring. Therefore, the students who have completed the Master's Degree in Social Work at our institute have a high level of potential for employment abroad.

Bachelor of Social Work



(Degree Awarding Ceremony – 2024)

The Bachelor of Social Work degree program conducted by the NISD aims to produce professional social workers with a good grasp of social work values, capable of managing social welfare services, competent to engage in good quality teaching and research, and promote peace and harmony in a multi- ethnic Sri Lanka. The Bachelor's Degree in Social Work is a 4-year full-time course. It consists of 08 semesters, classroom lectures, and concurrent and block field placements. The Bachelor's degree course in Social Work is a full-time four-year program, comprising of the first year made equivalent to the diploma in social work, the second year made equivalent to the Higher Diploma in social work, and the 3rd and the 4th year running as the 3rd and 4th BSW years revamped with revised curricula.

The Bachelor of Social Work in particular is a unique programme because it offers not only theoretical knowledge but also practical training unlike any other social sciences degree course offered by other universities in Sri Lanka. During classroom lectures, students are attached to field training to change their knowledge and attitudes, and field activities are conducted under the guidance and supervision of agency, field, and faculty supervisors. The syllabus of this Bachelor's degree course consists of subjects of social sciences as well as specific courses of social work and provides students with comprehensive knowledge. It is also mandatory for students to engage in individuals, families, social groups, organizations, and community activities through field training, and to prepare reports on those activities. In addition, students should conduct research, plan and launch activities based on the findings, and prepare a research report.

In addition, students who obtained foreign scholarships from institutions such as NORAD, AUS-AID, Common Wealth, and Indian Government scholarships have gone abroad to pursue higher education. These students are in high demand internationally and they have high-level job opportunities.

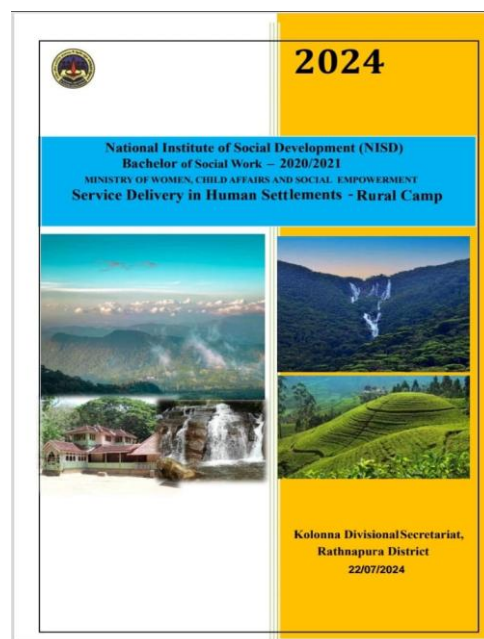

Programme on Service Delivery in Human Settlements 2024





The Rural Camp, undertaken by the third-year students of the BSW 2020/2021 batch, was successfully conducted from July 22nd to August 1st in the Kolonna Divisional Secretariat of the Rathnapura District. This field-based programme encompassed all 29 Grama Niladhari divisions under the jurisdiction of the Kolonna Divisional Secretariat and provided students with an immersive, real-world learning experience.

As part of the camp, students were placed in residential field settings for a continuous period of 10 days, during which they carried out comprehensive community assessments and interacted directly with residents and local stakeholders. Through these engagements, students were able to identify a range of social, economic, and service-related issues affecting the communities. Particular emphasis was placed on identifying gaps in public service delivery, the limited awareness among the population about existing government services, and a notable lack of coordination and communication between the community and administrative officials. This hands-on experience not only enhanced the students' practical competencies in social work but also contributed to generating valuable insights that could inform future interventions and policy recommendations for the region.

Training Division

Introduction

The Training Division, one of the four main divisions of the institutional structure of the National Institute of Social Development, was established in the year 2004. This division operates under a Director of Training and there are two Senior Training Officers and 06 Grade I Training Officers employed in this Division. In addition, one Management Assistant of Grade I, two Management Assistants of Grade II, one Management Assistant of Grade III and one Office Assistant are attached to this Division.

The responsibilities assigned to the Training Division under the Action Plan of 2024 include conducting studies and promoting social welfare systems and social development programs; introducing and promoting innovative approaches in social work and social development education, including the use of technology in social work; collaborating with other institutions with similar objectives; and conducting training courses and educational programs for officers engaged in social welfare as well as for other staff members.

The training division conducts training programs related to development sectors and also organizes training programs for other government and non-government institutions. Based on the demand for social welfare and social development, it carries out continuous professional development programs, identifies training needs, and conducts community-based training programs for community leaders and field officers focusing on community development. In addition, the division introduces and conducts academic courses related to social welfare and social development. Furthermore, training programs are organized through regional training centers and their affiliated areas. Expanding these educational activities further, the division is also taking steps towards initiating a Bachelor of Science (Honours) degree program in Counseling.

The Training Division organizes both long-term and short-term training programs and courses, as well as other vocational programs. The academic courses thus organized include: Higher Diploma in Counseling, Diploma in Counseling, Certificate Course in Counseling, Diploma in Gerontology and Elder Care, Diploma



in Child Protection, Diploma in Social Care, Diploma in Community-Based Rehabilitation, Certificate Course in Child-Centered Community Development, Certificate Course in Special Education Teaching, and Certificate Course in Social Work.

These programs can be conducted in Sinhala, English, and Tamil, and the medium of instruction is determined according to the demand for the respective academic program. Based on the requests received by the Training Division, the following types of short-term training programs are also organized.

These include training programs on counseling intervention techniques, counseling related to rehabilitation services, substance abuse counseling, soft skills, basic skills for case management, basic skills for working with families, basic skills for working with groups, basic skills for working with communities, leadership, conflict management, happy family approaches, assessment in counseling, stress and psychological counseling, counseling for unexpected pregnancies, managing social phobia, social care, life skills for balancing work environment and daily life, child development, social work interventions for children with special needs, workshops on project writing, workshops on community project management, counseling interventions for elder care, strategies for poverty reduction and sustainable livelihood development, community development for conflict resolution, and training programs on community-level management and capacity building.

Degree Programs

Introduction of the Bachelor of Science (Honours) Degree Program in Counselling

Introduction

In the socio-cultural context of Sri Lanka, individuals face a variety of challenges, creating a need for professional intervention to address them. To meet this academic need, the National Institute of Social Development has undertaken the necessary preparations to launch a degree program in counselling. The expected objectives of this degree program include defining the roles, responsibilities, and values of counselling education, conducting research and supervision in counselling practice, and providing professional counselling services to at-risk groups and vulnerable populations.

Following the submission of the proposal for new courses under the proposed Bachelor of Science (Honours) Degree Program in Counselling, the members of the Special Committee for Accreditation and Quality Assurance (SCAQA) provided recommendations on how it should be further developed. Accordingly, the revisions will be carried out under the guidance and administrative instructions of the institution.

Launch of Degree Programs in Anthropology and Gerontology

The proposed degree programs in Anthropology and Gerontology underwent a review of course revisions by the members of the Special Committee for Accreditation and Quality Assurance (SCAQA). Accordingly, the necessary follow-up actions will be carried out under the guidance and administrative instructions of the institution.



Diploma Courses

Diploma in Counseling

Introducton

The Training Division of the National Institute of Social Development conducts the Diploma in Counselling as a weekend study program. This program has been designed in accordance with the guidelines of the University Grants Commission and the Sri Lanka Qualifications Framework (SLQF). The objective of the program is to produce professional counsellors with sound knowledge, skills, attitudes, and psychological competence. The program aims to develop quality professionals in the counselling field, enhance the professional skills of counselling practitioners, and strengthen their intervention capabilities. This diploma program is conducted in Sinhala, Tamil, and English and has a duration of 12 months. It includes a 3-month field training component and is structured as a weekend program. The total credit units for the program are 30, comprising 405 hours of lectures and 150 hours of field training, totaling 555 hours. The Diploma in Counselling consists of nine academic subjects along with field training and study tours.



Diploma in English

Introduction

The Training Division of the National Institute of Social Development conducts the English Diploma Program as an online weekday study program. This program has been designed in accordance with the guidelines of the University Grants Commission and the Sri Lanka Qualifications Framework (SLQF). The objective of the program is to produce proficient individuals with strong English language skills in writing, reading, and speaking. The program also aims to develop proper grammatical usage, correct pronunciation, and effective application of English within society. The duration of this program is 4 months and it includes daily sessions. The total credit units for the program are 30, and the English Diploma Program consists of six subjects.

Locations Where the Diploma in Counselling Program Was Conducted in 2024

In 2024, the Diploma in Counselling program was conducted at several locations by the National Institute of Social Development. These included the Seeduwa Main Center (offering Sinhala, Tamil, and English mediums), the Thalawa/Kurunegala Regional Center, the Ampara Regional Center (Sinhala and Tamil mediums), Kandy (Sinhala and Tamil mediums), Kilinochchi (Tamil medium), Madakalapuwa (Tamil medium), Jaffna (Tamil medium), and Trincomalee (Tamil medium).

Regional Center for Social Work Training, Research and Field Learning - Thalawa





Introduction

The Thalawa Regional Training Center of the National Institute of Social Development is located in the Moragoda Grama Niladhari Division of Thalawa Divisional Secretariat in the Anuradhapura District of North Central Province. It is located facing the Anuradhapura-Kurunegala main road, 2km away from Thalawa town towards the city of Anuradhapura.

At present the Thalawa Regional Training Center owns approximately 05 acres of land and consists of a two storied building. In the ground floor of the main building there are 02 office rooms and 02 small accommodation rooms with 02 detached rooms with 35 beds and a dining room. In the upstairs there are 02 small accommodation rooms and 01 VIP room with a lecture hall.

Establishment

Following a proposal by the Hon. Bert Premalal Dissanayake, Member of Parliament for Anuradhapura District and Minister of Social Services, the construction of this building complex for the Bandaranaike National Institute of Social Development was initiated. The foundation stone was laid on 26th February 1999 by Her Excellency President Chandrika Bandaranaike Kumaratunga of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka, with the participation of the Hon. Speaker of Parliament, Dr. K. B. Ratnayake, upon the invitation of Hon. Bert Premalal Dissanayake.

Objectives of Establishment

The Thalawa Regional Training Center was officially opened on 31st March 2002 by Hon. Ravindra Samarawira, Minister of Social Welfare. The primary objective of establishing this center was to provide social work education, training, and research services to the region. Additionally, it aims to support the improvement of the quality of life of all individuals and to provide assistance at the regional level through its programs and initiatives.

Vision of the Regional Center

To be an active partner in promoting the quality of life of all as a branch of the Center for Excellence both locally and internationally in the field of Social Work Education Training and Research.

Using as a Residential Center

The Thalawa Regional Training Centre of National Institute of Social Development is also used for residential purposes. The main building has 01 VIP room (air conditioned) and 03 small rooms (with 03 beds each). In addition, accommodation can be provided for 36 persons. The main lecture hall (60x30 feet) has about 80 seats.

The dormitories of the Center are used for training programmes for both public and private sector as well as for residential needs at rates fixed by the institute. This provides additional revenue to the institute as well as a great service at the national level. Also, the Thalawa Regional Training Center is the only Centre in the

National Institute of Social Development that provide accommodation for field students as well as field study tours and training programmes. The Regional Centre has also become a great resource for student education by providing residential facilities to those students who come from far away places to participate in the Diploma & Higher Diploma programmes conducted by the NISD.

Responsibilities of the Research Division:

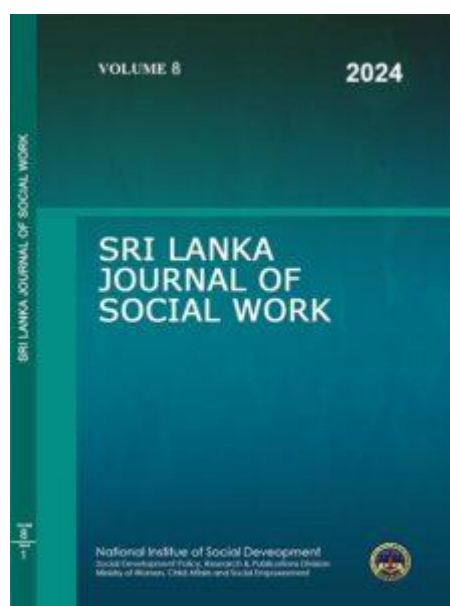
- Identify areas for social research and surveys and prepare necessary plans for the formulation of social work and social policies.

The Academic Publications by the Research Division

Sri Lanka Journal of Social Work

Although Social Work as a subject has not yet become widely popular in the country, there is an increasing demand for it at present. Therefore, to enhance knowledge of Social Work among social science students, the Social Development Policies, Research, and Publications divisions of the National Institute of Social Development publishes the *Sri Lanka Social Work Journal* semi-annually. This journal provides researchers and students engaged in social work research and academics with exposure to research and scholarly areas of interest, while also offering guidance to advance the discipline of Social Work.

Each research paper is subjected to double-blind review by a subject-specific peer review panel relevant to the field of Social Work.



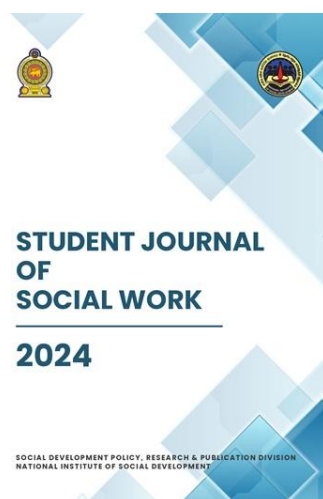
Sri Lanka Journal of Social Sciences

The *Social Science Journal* is published as a multi-disciplinary academic journal on a semi-annual basis. It includes a wide range of social science topics and provides researchers and scholars with space for research and academic writing. As a semi-annual journal, it aims to establish the necessary framework to disseminate knowledge within the field of social sciences. The journal is designed to facilitate the advancement of the discipline and the dissemination of contemporary research literature, enabling both local and international researchers, as well as scholars engaged in academic writing, to contribute to and publish scholarly work relevant to their field. This makes it a particularly significant platform for academic engagement.



Student Journal of Social Work

For the year 2024, the *Social Work Student Journal* publishes scholarly articles by Social Work degree candidates across various subfields of the discipline to foster academic discussion. The annual *Social Work Student Journal* is published under the theme of Social Work Intervention for Community Development, following a trilingual policy, and includes scholarly and research articles. This academic publication is designed to build scholarly competence by enabling students to exchange knowledge in their respective specialized fields, thereby disseminating Social Work knowledge within the Sri Lankan social context. The journal is published annually by the National Institute of Social Development.



Newsletter

The National Institute of Social Development publishes an annual newsletter. The 2024 edition has been prepared to include statements and educational information related to the Institute. Staff Capacity Development Program – 2024

Our mission is to uphold and advance a centralized - quality education and to sustain a process of continuous improvement in all aspects of teaching, learning, and student support, in alignment with the vision and mission of the National Institute of Social Development.

The Centre for Quality Assurance is committed to establishing and sustaining a culture of quality within the Institute by fostering excellence in teaching and learning. At the CQA, we are dedicated to ensuring educational excellence, promoting a culture of continuous educational enhancement, and maintaining a strong focus on improving the quality of teaching, learning, and research. Our ultimate aim is to provide our students and staff with the highest-quality higher education experience built on sound academic standards and best practices.

Our goals

- Ensuring compliance of institutional procedures with quality assurance mechanisms and national standards.
- Enhancing the quality of education through the continuous application of quality assurance practices.

- Establishing quality assurance cells and defining their duties and responsibilities.



- Organizing workshops, seminars, and appropriate training to build capacity at all levels of the institution and to promote a culture of quality assurance.
- Reviewing existing procedures to further improve teaching and learning.
- Conducting quality assurance reviews and implementing follow-up actions.
- Coordinating with the Non-State Higher Education Division and other quality assurance-related institutions.
- Updating the website to improve web-based rankings.

In 2024, the Center for Quality Assurance (CQA) of the National Institute of Social Development (NISD) implemented several key programs to strengthen institutional quality assurance, improve academic staff capacity, and comply with national higher education standards. The programs conducted are as follows:

1. Workshop on Stakeholder Consultation - 24 January 2024, Open University of Sri Lanka: Stakeholder engagement on the feasibility and need for new degree programmes.
2. Quality Assurance Workshop and Special Meeting on Developing the Process - June 28, 2024, staff, AAB and Governing Council involved in developing strategic action plans.
3. Workshop on SER Writing, Institutional Review and Program Review - 11 July 2024, moderated by Professor Shirantha Heenkenda : Quality Assurance Strengthening staff capacity in processes and external review compliance.
4. Workshop on LMS and Web-based Facilities - 29 October 2024, NISD: Conducted by Dr. Tharanga Ratnayake to enhance digital education.

The activities of this center was funded from the treasury allocation for the year 2024 and Rs. 4.12 million has been incurred.

Programs Conducted with the National Institute of Social Development Fund

Quality Assurance Center

In addition to the Treasury provisions, an expenditure of Rs. 7.36 million was borne by the National Institute of Social Development Fund for the following programs of this Center:

1. Preparation of curricula for new degree programs and submission to the Ministry of Higher Education.
2. Conducting the Institutional Review carried out by the Ministry of Higher Education and making the required payments for it.
3. Developing and completing a new website for the Institute.
4. Completion of networking for the Wing B building.



Department of Social Work

This department was established to initiate new postgraduate programs, and at present, curricula have been developed for a Doctoral Degree program, a Master of Philosophy (M.Phil.) program, and a Master's Degree program. For this purpose, Rs. 0.85 million has been spent from the funds of the National Institute of Social Development.

Department of Anthropology and Gerontology

This Department was established to initiate new degree programs. Revised proposals for the Special Degree in Anthropology and the Special Degree in Gerontology have been prepared and submitted to the Ministry of Higher Education. An expenditure of Rs. 0.12 million has been incurred from the National Institute of Social Development Fund for this purpose.

Department of Social Sciences and Social Development Studies

The revised proposal for the Special Degree in Social Sciences has been submitted to the Ministry of Higher Education. An amount of Rs. 0.071 million has been spent for this from the National Social Development Institutions Fund.

Department of Psychology and Counseling

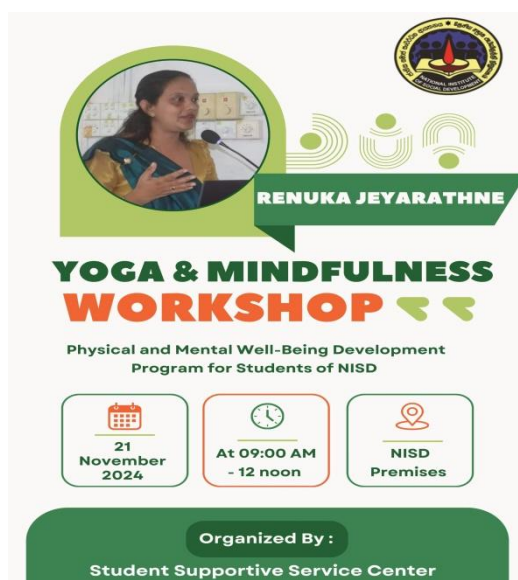
To initiate new degree programs, this Department was established. The revised syllabus of the Degree Programme in Psychology and Counselling has been submitted to the SCAQA Panel and further revised in line with its recommendations. For this purpose, an expenditure of Rs. 0.133 million has been incurred from the National Institute of Social Development Fund.

Workshops and programs were conducted for students' welfare in 2024 utilizing funds from the National Institute of Social Development.

Curriculum Development Center

This is a permanent center established to ensure that the curriculum development and review process of the National Institute of Social Development is carried out in compliance with the approved curriculum policies and regulations.

Composition

This center consists of three members and operates under the Quality Assurance Center.



Functions of the Curriculum Development Center

1. Coordinating curriculum related to certificate, diploma, and degree programs under the guidance of the Director General of the National Institute of Social Development.
2. Reviewing, evaluating, and reporting on all new programs, courses, or revisions to existing programs.
3. Providing consultation and support to relevant departments whenever curricular changes are required.
4. Engaging in discussions with relevant departments and stakeholder groups on curricular matters and responding to questions when necessary.
5. Studying trends and policies related to curriculum development.
6. Communicating curriculum developments through the official website of the National Institute of Social Development.
7. Informing subcommittee members about the roles, responsibilities, policies, and procedures of the Curriculum Development Center as needed.
8. Providing necessary guidance in preparing curriculum content and all other syllabus-related matters for course manuals.
9. With the approval of the Director General, inviting any individual with expertise/skills relevant to the objectives of the Curriculum Development Center to participate in meetings.
10. Preparing reports, new formats, templates, and other relevant documentation in line with the decisions of the Center.
11. Conducting regular meetings of the Curriculum Development Center.
12. Reporting the outcomes of such meetings at Faculty Board meetings.

As per the decision of the Governing Council meeting held on 31.07.2024, it was decided to establish a new Curriculum Development Center to replace the Curriculum Development Committee that had been in place since 2023. Accordingly, a provision of Rs. 1 million was allocated. From this amount, physical resources including one laptop, one multimedia projector, and one desktop computer valued at Rs. 650,000.00 were purchased.

Library

Under the Library Development Program, Rs. 0.564 million from the funds of the National Institute of Social Development was spent on initial activities related to the digitalization of the library.

Center for Gender Studies

The Center for Gender Studies was established on 09.01.2024. In accordance with the vision and mission of the institution, the annual work plan of the Center for Gender Studies was implemented as follows.

1. On 05 February 2024, under the leadership of Senior Lecturer Dr. Anusha Edirisinghe of the University of Kelaniya, the first advisory committee meeting was held to provide guidance to the Gender Studies Center.
2. To provide foundational knowledge on gender studies, several students and members of the academic and non-academic staff of the Institute were nominated to participate in the Gender and Cyber Violence Workshop organized on 09 March 2024 by the Gender Studies Center of the University of Kelaniya.
3. Under the Gender Studies Center, a Gender Club was established, with 308 students enrolling as members, actively participating in gender-related programs and research activities.
4. Resources were provided to facilitate basic gender awareness during a two-day program organized by the Ministry of Women, Child Affairs, and Social Empowerment to commemorate International Women's Day.
5. Members of the Center participated in the panel discussion "Empower Women for Climate Justice" organized by the Foundation for Innovative Social Development.



6. A two-day awareness program on gender was conducted on 31 July and 1 August 2024, targeting the community and school students in the Suriyakanda Divisional Secretariat Division. Members of the Institute's academic staff contributed resources for this program.
7. On 02 August 2024, students enrolled in the Gender Club conducted school-based gender awareness programs targeting the Ganemulla Education Zone.
8. On 13 August 2024, with the support of Senior Lecturer Dr. Anusha Edirisinghe, the first-year students of the Bachelor of Social Work program were engaged in a gender awareness program organized by the Gender Studies Center.
9. On 08 December 2024, with the support of Senior Lecturer Dr. Anusha Edirisinghe, students enrolled in the Gender Club participated in a gender awareness program organized by the Gender Studies Center.

Registrar's Division

In 2024, the Registrar Division enrolled 162 undergraduate students through the online admission process. In addition, the division was responsible for conducting the examinations of the Bachelor of Social Work degree program and organizing the annual graduation ceremony. For these activities, a total expenditure of Rs. 1.5 million was incurred in 2024.

Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements and Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements of the National Institute of Social Development for the year ended 31 December 2024 in terms of Section 12 of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

1. Financial Statements

1.1 Qualified Opinion

The audit of the financial statements of the National Institute of Social Development for the year ended 31 December 2024 comprising the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2024 and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in equity and cash flow statement for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies, was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154(1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read in conjunction with provisions of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 and Finance Act No. 38 of 1971. My report to Parliament in pursuance of provisions in Article 154 (6) of the Constitution will be tabled in due course.

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matters described in the basis for Qualified Opinion section of my report, the accompanying financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Institute as at 31 December 2024, and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

1.2 Basis for Qualified Opinion

- (a) Due to incomplete presentation of 35 journal entries amounting to Rs.120,718,042 in the financial statements submitted during the year under review without mentioning the narration, it was not possible to examine the reconciliation details of those transactions.
- (b) The expenditure incurred for the purchase of office equipment and networking of the building for the National Institute of Social Development related to the year under review amounted to Rs.649,605 and Rs.3,338,268 respectively was adjusted against to the Consolidated Fund.

I conducted my audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards (SLAuSs). My responsibilities, under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of my report. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified opinion.



1.3 Other information included in the Institute's 2024 Annual Report.

The other information comprises the information included in the Institute's 2024 Annual Report but does not include the financial statements and my auditor's report thereon, which I have obtained prior to the date of this auditor's report. Management is responsible for the other information.

My opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and I do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with my audit of the financial statements, my responsibility is to read the other information identified above when it becomes available and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or my knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

When I read the Institute's 2024 Annual Report, if I conclude that there are material misstatements therein, I am required to communicate that matter to those charged with governance for correction. If further material uncorrected misstatements are existed those will be included in my report to Parliament in pursuance of provisions in Article 154 (6) of the Constitution that will be tabled in due course.

1.4 Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of financial statements that give a true and fair view in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards, and for such internal control as management determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Institute's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Institute or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Institute's financial reporting process.

As per Section 16(1) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, the Institute is required to maintain proper books and records of all its income, expenditure, assets and liabilities, to enable annual and periodic financial statements to be prepared of the Institute.



1.5 Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

My objective is to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Institute's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of the management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Institute's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Institute to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

I communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during my audit.



2. Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

2.1 National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018 include specific provisions for following requirements.

2.1.1 I have obtained all the information and explanation that required for the audit and as far as appears from my examination, proper accounting records have been kept by the Institute as per the requirement of section 12 (a) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

2.1.2 The financial statements presented is consistent with the preceding year as per the requirement of section 6 (1) (d) (iii) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

2.1.3 The financial statements presented includes all the recommendations made by me in the previous year as per the requirement of section 6 (1) (d) (iv) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

2.2 Based on the procedures performed and evidence obtained were limited to matters that are material, nothing has come to my attention;

2.2.1 to state that any member of the governing body of the Institute has any direct or indirect interest in any contract entered into by the Institute which are out of the normal cause of business as per the requirement of section 12 (d) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

2.2.2 to state that the Institute has not complied with any applicable written law, general and special directions issued by the governing body of the Institute as per the requirement of section 12 (f) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

- (b) Paragraph 3.1 of Public Administration Circular No. 30/2016 dated 29 December 2016 The consumption of fuel must be re-tested after a period of 12 months from each fuel test or after running a distance of 25,000 kilometres or after carrying out a major repair to the engine, whichever occurs first. 08 vehicles owned by the Institute had not been tested for fuel combustion and internal controls regarding the vehicles were also weak.

2.2.3 to state that the Institute has not performed according to its powers, functions and duties as per the requirement of section 12 (g) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

2.2.4 to state that the resources of the Institute had not been procured and utilized economically, efficiently and effectively within the time frames and in compliance with the applicable laws as per the requirement of section 12 (h) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

(a) In the year 2017, a treasury provision of Rs.1000 million was allocated for the construction of a building of the National Institute of Social Development and the contract was awarded to the State Engineering Corporation under the Design and Built Procurement Methodology at a contract value of Rs.818.795 million (excluding VAT and contingent costs) subject to the approval of the Procurement Committee appointed by the Cabinet of Ministers, with a start date of September 19, 2017 and completion date of April 04, 2020. The total annually provision allocated by the Budget Department for the construction of the building from 2017 to 2024 was Rs. 2,181.13 million. The following observations are made in this regard.

(i) Although the Wing B section of the building was completed and handed over, it had been accepted with significant defects including water leaks in the walls, cracks in the walls at places and unevenness in the tiled areas. Rs.45.55 million had been spent on paving stones and a different type of paving stones had been purchased instead of the paving stones that were to be purchased according to the bid specifications. An estimate of Rs.21.537 million had also been approved in addition to the contract value. The contract period had been extended on eight occasions due to the crisis conditions prevailing in the country and on two occasions due to the delay in compensating for the damages caused by price fluctuations. The first and second floors of Wing A, which had not been completed due to the lack of space to hold classes, had been used to hold classes.

(ii) According to a physical inspection conducted on 30 October 2024, the ground floor of Wing B of the two building complexes and an area of 2,511.25 square feet of the third floor of Wing A were left to be tiled. The tiles that had been laid were of poor quality in some places. It was found that the ceramic tiles to be used as per the bid specifications were not of the required standard and without taking into account the finishing using raw materials that did not comply with the standard, Rs.45.554 million was paid to the contractor. Scratches were



observed in some places on some walls and the price variation calculated as per the Cabinet approval given to compensate for the price variations dated 14 December 2021 was Rs.63.68 million (excluding VAT) Even though the building was not constructed in accordance with the standards, the price variations had been paid.

- (iii) Although construction was carried out from 2017 to 2024, it had not been possible to achieve the expected results as expected up to the date of this report.
- (b) The student paying vouchers used for the relevant payments by the students, receiving services from the Social Development Institute's College of Social Services, the Secretariat's Office and the Training Division had been given to other institutions (regional centers) by the sections. Due to this, it was not possible to check the proper collection and accounting of income and copies of the vouchers that should have been given to the relevant parties had been given to the Accounts Division. It was observed that the procedures for accounting income were not followed properly and weaknesses in internal control led to opportunities for irregularities in accounting income and that problems arose in repaying the fees charged for courses due to students dropping out of courses midway.

3. Other Matters

- (a) There was no separate current account opened for the fund to deal with the receipts and expenditure related to the National Institute of Social Development Fund and transactions had been made through a current account that was currently maintained. That account records all transactions related to course fees and all transactions related to the fund had also been made through it.
- (b) Rs.120,000 which had been given to an external institution as an advance for holding the annual convocation ceremony of the institution had not been settled by the end of the year under review.
- (c) The Kelaniya Student Hostel, which had an assessed value of Rs.10,600,000 and was owned by the institution, remained vacant with the goods in use since June 2020 up to the date of the report. The hostel had been unused for more than 04 years and since it had not been properly maintained, the hostel was deteriorating, but the management had not taken appropriate action regarding this property promptly.

The Report containing the comments of the Director General regarding the observations contained in the report of the Auditor General in terms of Section 12 of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 on the Financial Statements and other legal and regulatory requirements of the National Institute of Social Development for the Year ended 31 December 2024

1.2 Basis for the Opinion Expressed

(a) For the audit of the financial statements for the year 2024, a soft copy of the general ledger was submitted along with supporting schedules for Journal Entries 1–35. Additionally, the aforementioned 35 journal entries were provided separately as a file with supporting documents for audit purposes. I hereby confirm that maximum cooperation was extended regarding any issues arising from these 35 journal entries during the audit. I also undertake to ensure that in the future, primary transaction information and journal entries will be submitted together with properly organized financial statements.

The Institute does not maintain a separate current account for the Fund, and all transactions related to the Fund are carried out through Account 38. I undertake to establish and maintain a separate account for the National Social Development Institutions Fund in the future.

(b) The expenditure of Rs. 649,605/- and Rs. 3,338,268 /- was made from the National Institute of Social Development Fund under the approval of the Governing Council for the purchase of office machinery and computers for the institution and the networking of the Seeduwa win (B) building respectively and the payment was made through Account 38. Our institution does not maintain a separate current account for the National Institute of Social Development Fund, and transactions related to the National Institute of Social Development Fund are also carried out through Account 38. I ensure that a separate account is opened and maintained for the National Institute of Social Development Fund in the future.

2.2.2 Non-compliance with rules, regulations and management decisions, etc.

(a)

(i) **M.R. 1644** - I hereby inform that the necessary actions are being taken to send the daily running charts and monthly summaries to the audit prior to the 10th day of the following month. Accordingly, steps have been initiated to submit the relevant records to the audit from May 2025 onwards.

(ii) **M.R. 1645** - Instructions have been issued to ensure that logbooks for all vehicles under the Institute's custody are maintained and updated accurately. I hereby confirm that these actions have been completed.



(b) Section No. 3.1 of Public Administration Circular No. 30/2016 dated 29th December 2016

- Necessary arrangements have been made to complete the fuel combustion tests in 2025.

2.2.4

(a) From 2017 to 2024, Sum of Rs. 2181.13 million has been provided as treasury allocation for the construction of the building. The construction contract was awarded to the State Engineering Corporation on 19.09.2017, and the agreement was signed on 04.10.2017. Accordingly, construction work commenced in November 2017. Although Treasury provisions were allocated for construction activities from 2017 to 2024, the payments for the bills submitted by the State Engineering Corporation were made by the Ministry after certification by the Engineer-in-Charge. As of December 2024, payments had been made to the State Engineering Corporation for 63 bills submitted.

(i) Since the institution, which had been operating in a rented building in the Koswatta area of Rajagiriya, was granted Cabinet approval through decision No. AMP/19/0045/132/005 dated 27.02.2019 to be relocated to the Seeduwa area from 2020 onwards, it became necessary to move the institution into Wing B of the building complex that was under construction at Liyanagemulla, Seeduwa, although the construction work was not fully completed. Accordingly, Wing B of the building was taken over; however, continuous requests were made to the State Engineering Corporation to rectify the deficiencies identified in the building.

According to the specifications, ceramic floor tiles should have been purchased for the flooring. However, due to the increase in construction material prices and the shortage of construction materials between 2020 and 2022, equivalent substitute materials, as specified in the bidding documents, were used for tiling. In accordance with the Cabinet Memorandum submitted in consideration of the request made by the State Engineering Corporation in accordance with the Cabinet Decision No. AMP/21/2084/306/094 dated 2021.02.06 regarding the compensation for price fluctuation of construction materials, Rs. 63.68 million (excluding VAT) was paid by the Cabinet Decision No. AMP/24/1437/629/015 dated 2024/07/09. Further, according to the contract extension letter submitted by the State Engineering Corporation on 10.01.2024, they have stated that the construction will be completed within 04 months after making payments for the price variation. Accordingly, payments for the price variation have been made in the months of November and December 2024.

In addition to the initial estimate allocated for the building, modifications were made to the front view and site layout to better suit an academic institution. Accordingly, approval was granted under Cabinet Decision No. 19/0445/132/005 for an additional sum of Rs. 21.537 million.



By 31 March 2025, the State Engineering Corporation was informed to complete and hand over the partitioning of the ground floor and first floor of Wing A of the building. Accordingly, the partitioning work was completed and handed over, after which the Administration, Finance, Audit, and Registrar divisions were immediately relocated to Wing A. The space thereby vacated in Wing B was allocated for student lectures and other activities.

(II). By letter No. (2017-65-02)A/011 dated 15 March 2022, the Project Architect of the State Engineering Corporation informed that due to the shortage of Rosell tiles, production-related difficulties, and the high demand prevailing in the country, the supply of tiles would be delayed. Considering the recommendation of the technical officer appointed by the Ministry in this regard, approval was granted by the Secretary to the Ministry to use Lanka Tiles as an equivalent substitute specified in the tender documents. Accordingly, by letter No. NISD/DA/SEEDUWA/2022 dated 04 April 2022, the Director General of the Institute granted approval to use Lanka Tiles for flooring. As a result, a portion of the second and third floors was laid with Lanka Tiles. Payments for these tiles had been made by June 2024. According to the audit inspections conducted on 30 October 2024, among the identified deficiencies, the remaining areas of Wing B that had not yet been tiled and the unfinished areas of the third floor of Wing A were completely tiled, thereby finalizing the work. Payments for price variations have been made based on the approval of the Cabinet of Ministers obtained for making payments due to price variations in construction materials. Retention has been made in the cost estimate of the building to correct the deficiencies in the construction and to check the quality and make payments.

(III) Wing B of the III building complex has been used for academic and administrative purposes since 2020. All other parts of Wing A building, except for the auditorium on the 3rd floor and part of the 2nd floor, have been in use since 2023.

(b) The relevant divisions have been informed regarding this matter. It was instructed not to hand over the Paying Voucher books issued to the divisions when issuing to the regional centers; instead, they should be issued directly through the stores to the regional centers. Furthermore, the relevant divisions were informed of this arrangement, and instructions were also given to ensure that once a voucher book is completed, a new book is issued immediately without delay.

3. Other matters

(A) Until now, a current account has not been maintained for the funds of the National Institute of Social Development, and in the future, I will take steps to open a current account with the approval of the Governing Council to conduct transactions related to the funds of the National Institute of Social Development .

(b) Since the Institute's Annual Convocation was scheduled to be held in July 2024, an advance payment of Rs. 120,000.00 was made to the BMICH to reserve the date. However, due to issues that arose in the release of examination results, the event was postponed to October 2024. As it was not possible to secure another date from the BMICH within the year, it was decided to hold the Convocation at the Nelum Pokuna Theatre.



Although the Registrar of the Institute requested both verbally and in writing for the refund of the advance payment made to BMICH, the BMICH Management informed that the refund could not be made.

(c) With the relocation of the Institute to Liyanagemulla, Seeduwa in 2020, students moved out of the Kelaniya hostel and obtained accommodation around Seeduwa. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, which began in March 2020, all lectures of the Institute's courses were conducted online. In 2022, an estimate of Rs. 3.1 million was obtained from the Technical Officers of the Kelaniya Divisional Secretariat Office for the renovation of the Kelaniya hostel. Based on the guidance of the Governing council, as per Board Paper No. 29/03/2023 and the decision made at the Governing council meeting held on 30.06.2023, it was instructed to make arrangements to use the hostel either to provide accommodation facilities for the staff or to offer accommodation to the students of the University of Kelaniya.

Although action was taken accordingly, neither the staff members nor the students of the University of Kelaniya made use of the hostel. Consequently, through Board Paper No. 62/04/2024, the Council instructed that the hostel be leased out to another party for an adequate rental income. However, although attempts were made in this regard, the requests received included conditions that the building should first be renovated. Taking into consideration the government's 2023 valuation of the building at Rs. 10.06 million, along with the cost already incurred for renovations, the Governing Council, at its meeting held on 04.10.2024, instructed that a detailed report on the hostel be submitted. This detailed report was subsequently presented to the Governign Council on 13.12.2024 through Board Paper No. 144/12/2024. With the change of members in the Governign Council in 2025, the matter was once again submitted for decision-making at the Council meetings held in February and March 2025.

Thereafter, at the Audit and Management Committee meeting of the institution held on 04.03.2025, it was discussed that the possibility of utilizing the building for the use of either the National Secretariat for Elders or the Secretariat fo the Persons with Disabilities, which function under the Ministry, should be explored. Accordingly, those institutions carried out inspections of the building. However, as no request was made from them, the Governign Council, at its meeting on 21.03.2025 (Board Paper No. 15/03/2025), instructed that steps be taken to reconfirm the ownership of the property, to conduct a fresh valuation of the property, and to submit a Cabinet Memorandum with a detailed report clearly justifying the need to sell the building and purchase a new one in the vicinity of Seeduwa.
