1.1.1 INTRODUCTION



Although this Department provided Security and care to prisoner's in its early days, it has now gone beyond that and has become social reformatory that properly rehabilitates prisoners.

PRISON commenced as a result of the judicial reforms introduced by Cameron in British Imperialist Era in 1832. Welikada Prison was established compatible with British Bostal System in terms of the Legal and Court Ordinance no. 18 of 1844. By the Prison Act no.16 of 1877, this service was structured and regulated under a separate department directly under control of the Commissioner of the Prisons with the effect from 16th July, 1905. With development of society, this service turns out to be very crucial. As a result, the Bogambara Prison was built in the form of the “Been Field’ Prison in England in 1875. Today, prison that evolved this way, has become an essential and specific institute before the complexities of present-day society. Accordingly, prison system consists of 04 closed prisons, 18 remand prisons, 02 correctional centers for young offenders, 10 work camps, 02 open work camps, 23 prison lockups, and 01 prison school, are under the control of Superintendents of Prisons. There are about 38,695 convicted and remand prisoners under prison custody.

Department, administered under the Ministry of Justice and National Integration, provided only protection and custodial care for prisoners during its commencement. However, today it has evolved beyond that, becoming a social correctional center that leads inmates toward a formal rehabilitation process. As a department dedicated to the socialization of individuals into virtuous citizens—transforming “imprisoned hands into productive ones”—the Prison Department has utilized its Performance Report-2025 to showcase efforts taken to rehabilitate and reintegrate inmates into society as responsible citizens.

5 Making provisions for training to strengthen correctional field.

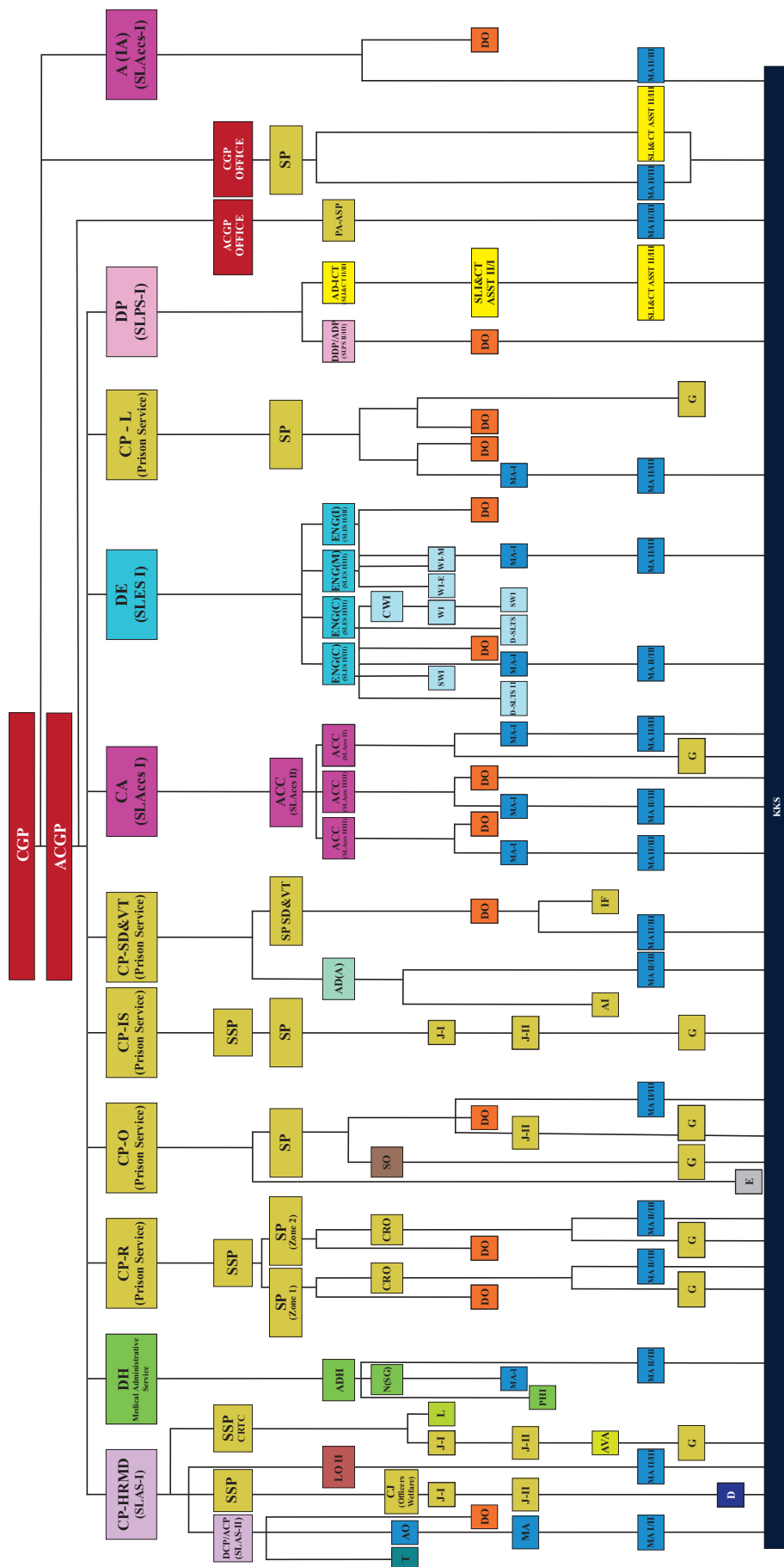
6 Making a desired social background for inmates after rehabilitation and social reintegration as better citizens as timely requirement.

ORGANIZATIONAL CHART - DEPARTMENT OF PRISONS

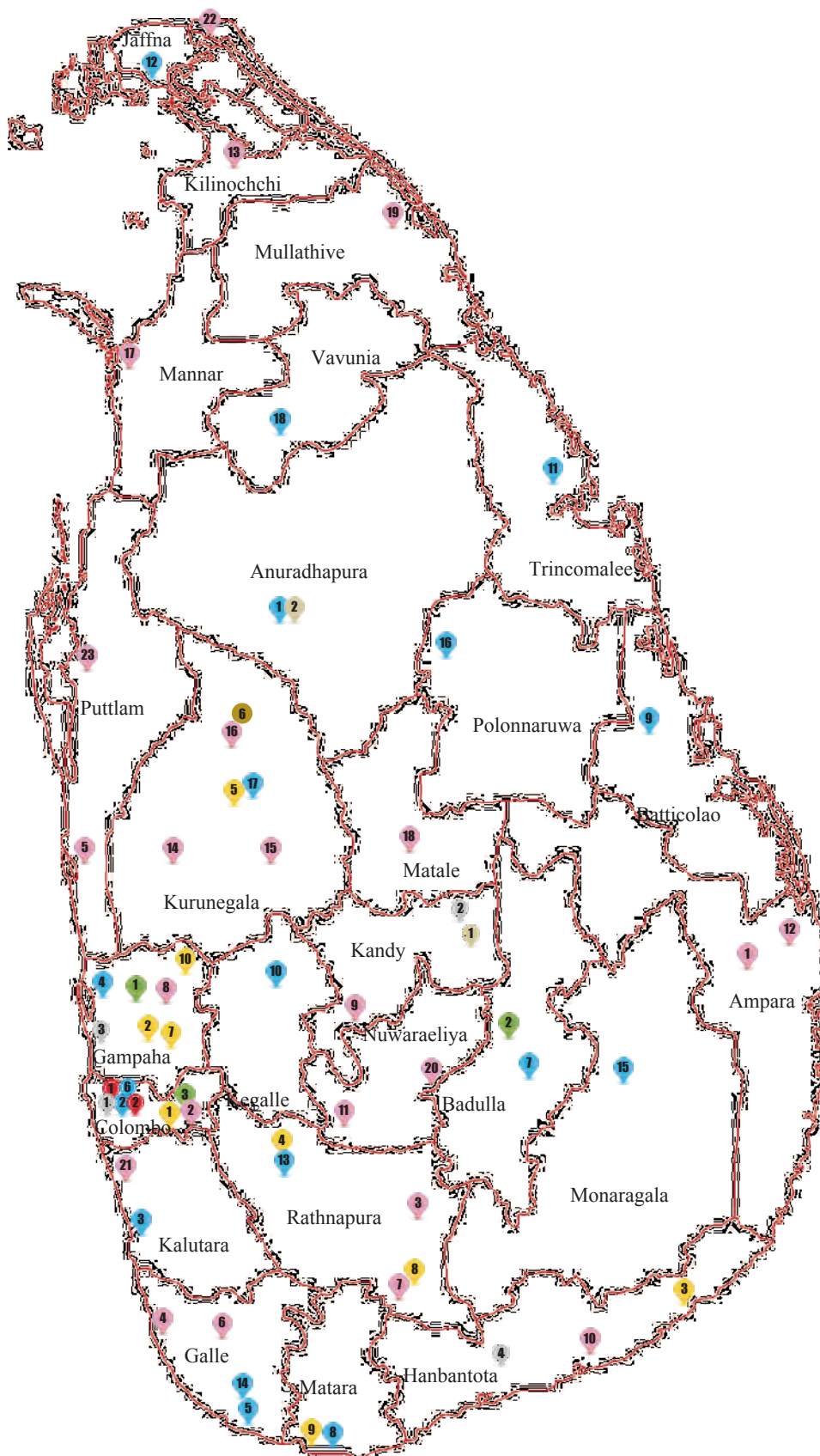

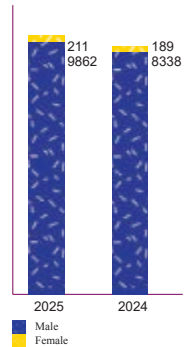


1.2.1 NO. OF INMATES CONVICTED BY COURT OF LAW FROM 01.01.2025 TO 31.12.2025

1.2.3 NO. OF INMATES AS AT THE LAST DAY OF EACH MONTH - MORNING UNLOCK - 2025



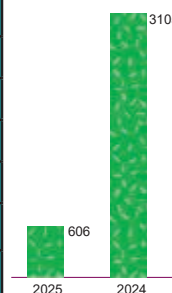

Achievement -



The Annual Performance Report- 2024 of the Department of Prisons was honored with the Silver Award in the Government Departments Category at the 2025 Awards Ceremony, jointly organized by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Sri Lanka and the Association of Public Finance Accountants of Sri Lanka (APFASL)



In alignment with the '**Rich Nation - Beautiful Life**', National Policy Framework, Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), and the priorities identified under the Ministry of Justice and National Integration, prison reforms were implemented across nine broad sectors during the year 2025 through the Annual Action Plan and donations from international organizations. The progress achieved in the process of carrying out these projects and prison reforms is as follows

Reducing prison congestion and improving residential facilities



Plans and designs to relocate the Colombo Prison Complex (consisting of Welikada Prison, Colombo Remand Prison, New Magazine Prison, and the Female Ward), the Prison Hospital, and the Center for Research, Correctional Training and Development to the Millewa area in Horana—along with the Prison

Headquarters to Battaramulla and the Prison Headquarters Official Quarters to Malabe—have been developed in collaboration with the Ministry of Urban Development and Housing and the Urban Development Authority (UDA). Following the fulfillment of all preliminary requirements in accordance with relevant Cabinet approvals, the procurement and other subsequent activities were initiated by the UDA. Although the project was temporarily suspended as per the Ministry of Finance Circular No. 3/2022 dated April 26, 2022, discussions were held in 2023 under the chairmanship of the Hon. State Minister of Justice, Prison Affairs, and Constitutional Reforms regarding the possibility of its resumption. During these discussions, the UDA highlighted that the 2021 cost estimates for constructing the prison complex in Horana had significantly increased, and that the required funds could no longer be fully met solely through the investment value of the land where the Borella Prison Complex is currently situated. Accordingly, the Hon. State Minister instructed that a feasibility study be conducted on proposed alternative methods to implement the project. Furthermore, instructions were given by the UDA to obtain an updated valuation of the Borella Prison Complex land from the Department of Valuation. Following this directive, the updated valuation has been requested and obtained from the Department of Valuation.

Accordingly, the Hon. State Minister instructed to study the feasibility of implementing the project through proposed alternative methods and to obtain the current market valuation of the Borella Prison Complex land from the Department of Valuation. Consequently, a request was submitted to the Department of Valuation, and the updated valuation has been successfully obtained.



Construction of official quarters for New Dumbara Prison in Palkelele has achieved 100% physical progress. Furthermore, the contract of water



tank and water supply systems reached 94% physical progress in 2025. Accordingly, out of the Rs. 450.0 million allocation for the year 2025, Rs. 196.95 million, approximately 43.76% has been utilized.

Moreover, a total allocation of Rs. 1,782 million has been made through the budget to be re-leased in installments to complete remaining 13 contracts within 2025–2028. Under this scope, cabinet approval was granted to constructions of Maximum Security Unit, Youth Offenders' Detention Buildings (Section 02), Detention Buildings (Section 03 and Section 05), Fitness and Recreation Center, water tank and external drainage system and internal roads system by the State Engineering Corporation under the consultancy of the Central Engineering Consultancy Bureau (CECB). The State Engineering Corporation has already completed the relevant building plans and designs. Furthermore, the Cabinet Memorandum regarding the submission of Advance Payment Bonds



& Performance Securities was approved on December 30, 2025. Consequently, a part of the advance payment has been made, & all preliminary requirements have been finalized to start the primary building construction works.





Construction of prison buildings at the Pallansena Prison, which commenced in 2020, was completed in 2025 with an expenditure of Rs. 5.6 million. Only a minor modification to the wastewater system remains to be completed. Currently, measures have been taken to occupy the buildings and accommodate inmates.



Construction of the Lock up in Gampola commenced in late 2023 and by 2025, 98% of the construction work has been completed with an expenditure of Rs. 1.76 million



Construction commenced in 2024 for the administrative building and warehouse at Mahara Prison, which were destroyed during the 2020 riot. This project was initiated following the concurrence of the Department of National Planning and Cabinet



approval, with a total estimated cost of Rs. 316.0 million Construction of warehouse at an expenditure of Rs. 22.56 million was carried out in 2025 by the National Engineering Research and Development Centre (NERDC) under a direct contracting method. Furthermore, contract for construction of the administrative building was awarded in 2025, and an advance payment of Rs. 61.59 million has been made.





A wide range of tasks to improve residential sanitary facilities such as construction and repair of toilets for inmates, construction of accessible toilets for the disabled, renovation of kitchens in prisons, improvement of bathing areas, provision of water facilities, and enhancement of overall sanitary conditions in prison wards, have been carried out at institutional level using allocations. Furthermore, repair work for the Bogambara wastewater treatment system was carried out in 2025 at a cost of Rs. 9.5 million.

Steps were taken to obtain consultancy services from the National Water Supply and Drainage Board (NWSDB) for construction of sewerage and water systems at the Polonnaruwa, Negombo, ita, and Wariyapola Prisons that had remained at the discussion stage for several years and a Cabinet Memorandum was submitted and approved to have

the procurement processes handled by the National Water Supply and Drainage Board to prevent further procurement delays caused by the shortage of technical officers.

Accordingly, a payment of Rs. 288.60 million was made to the National Water Supply and Drainage Board for construction of the sewerage system at the Kuruwita Prison



Reconstruction of the wall at the Kegalle Remand Prison damaged due to a land slide, was commenced in 2024. A cost of Rs. 7.13 million was incurred in 2024, followed by Rs. 12.2 million in 2025 and approximately 70% of the repair work has been completed.



As a solution to prison congestion, construction of one temporary ward for each at the Welikada, New Magazine, and Colombo Remand Prisons situated in the Colombo Prison Premises, was started in late 2025. An expenditure of Rs. 6.93 million was incurred in 2025 for these projects which are being constructed using prison labor, are scheduled to be completed in 2026.



A project has been implemented to install firewood-efficient stoves using NERDC technology at a cost of Rs. 6.33 million at the Galle, Kegalle, and Polonnaruwa Prisons. It will enable a reduction in

firewood consumption. Upon success of the project, these stoves are scheduled to be expanded gradually to other prisons as well.



Action was taken to obtain the approval of the Department of National Planning for the demolition of two dilapidated buildings at the Kalutara Remand Prison and the construction of two new two-story buildings in their place. Under the consultancy of the National Engineering Research and Development Centre (NERDC), the preparation of estimates, plans, and designs was completed. Furthermore, the preparation of bidding documents and the necessary arrangements to initiate the procurement process were carried out during the year 2025



As an answer to prison overpopulation, special discussions were held and thereby preliminary steps were taken in 2025 to obtain necessary approvals for expansion of the Wariyapola Prison and the relocation of the Matara Prison presently situated within the Matara Fort to the Kotawilawatta area. Furthermore, required provisions for projects has been proposed under the Budget-2026.

Steps were taken to obtain the approval of the Department of National Planning for the construction of two buildings and the remaining section of the perimeter wall at the Watareka Prison. In 2025, preliminary approvals were secured following the submission of a Cabinet Memorandum to offer the contract to the State Engineering Corporation (SEC) under a direct contracting method. This project involves the design and construction of the buildings and the wall at the Watareka Work Camp using prefabricated technology. Furthermore, steps have been taken to secure necessary provisions (funding) for these works for the year 2026.

Prison Management Reforms



At a time when many countries in the region have transformed their prison services into correctional services, the Department of Prisons -Sri Lanka is also transitioning toward a Correctional Service under the theme "Leaders in Corrections." To maintain the professionalism of this service, the committee appointed for this purpose is currently reviewing the drafted amendments to the Service Minute. In relation to this, work was undertaken in 2024 to prepare the recruitment procedures for 21 positions and obtain the approval of the Public Service Commission. Additionally, the recruitment procedures for two positions in the Regulatory Service Category were prepared in 2024 and submitted to the Ministry of Justice, receiving approval from the Public Service Commission in 2025. Moreover, recruitment procedures have been prepared and submitted to the Ministry of Justice and National Integration for seven further positions, including Agricultural Overseer, Agricultural Instructor, Audio-Visual Assistant, Vocational Instructor, Industrial Supervisor, and Industrial Foreman.

INTERNAL AFFAIRS UNIT





In accordance with the Anti-Corruption Act No. 9 of 2023, an Internal Affairs Unit has been established within the Department of Prisons. This initiative aligns with the new national program launched jointly by the Presidential Secretariat and the Commission to Investigate Allegations of Bribery or Corruption (CIABOC) to set up internal affairs units across all state institutions. Accordingly, if anyone becomes aware of any irregularity, corruption, or fraud

within this Department, they may submit information or complaints—either nominally or anonymously—to the Internal Affairs Unit located on the Department premises through the established reporting channels.

In accordance with the Anti-Corruption Act No. 9 of 2023, the Presidential Secretariat together with the Commission to Investigate Allegations of Bribery or Corruption (CIABOC) have jointly started a program to establish Internal Affairs Units (IAU) in all government institutions. Parallel to this initiative, an Internal Affairs Unit has now been established within the Department of Prisons. Accordingly, if anyone becomes aware of any irregularity, corruption, or fraud occurring within the department, they may submit information or complaints—either nominally or anonymously to the Internal Affairs Unit located on the department premises through the established reporting mechanism.



The Internal Affairs Unit organized and implemented a program to raise awareness among officers on the definition of "bribery and corruption," the relevant legal framework, and the importance of maintaining a public service free from bribery and corruption.





Establishing New Positions and Increasing Cadre Positions:



The approved cadre of the Department of Prisons in 2013 stood at 7,872 positions. However, in 2025, two new positions, Engineer (Electrical) and Cook were included to the approved cadre. Additionally, steps were taken to increase the approved number of personnel for several existing positions.

Accordingly, as of December 31, 2025, the total approved cadre for the Department of Prisons is 7,949, showing an increase in approved cadre as follows:

Prison Cadre Capacity Development



Step was taken to shift the Center for Research and Training in Corrections of the Department of Prisons previously located within the Colombo Prison premises, to a building in the Angunakolapelessa Prison. During 2025, the necessary measures were carried out to provide essential facilities and residential accommodations for officers at this new location.



Initial discussions and plans were carried out to obtain modern technological training facilities including smart classrooms, computer labs, auditorium with translation capabilities, and library facilities with the help of the United Nations Development Program (UNDP) for the training center established in Angunakolapelessa Prison. Accordingly, the UNDP identified relevant in-frastructure requirements and commenced the supply and installation process in 2025. This initiative aims to enhance the quality of capacity building for Prison officers and will further enable them to participate in online training courses.



With the aim of making a prison staff with profound academic knowledge in Criminology and Criminal Justice, the department has enrolled 03 officers in the BSc (Special) Degree in Criminology and Criminal Justice. A financial allocation of

Rs.315,000.00 was allotted to university studies going for 03 years.



Two formal theoretical and practical training programs covering all subject areas of the prison sector have been implemented for the newly recruited Jailor groups 104 A and 104 B. Under this initiative, 325 new officers have successfully completed their training.



Nineteen (19) Nursing Officers, who were qualified but not selected for recruitment by the Ministry of Health, were recruited to the Department of Prisons. Subsequently, a training program was conducted to provide these officers with an understanding of the nature of duties within the Prison Department.



With the aim of streamlining daily prison administration and updating the data system, a one day specialized training program on data collection and processing was provided for 60 prison officers.



A five-day (05) training program was conducted for 30 officers of the Sri Lanka Prison Emergency Action and Tactical Force regarding the accurate intelligence gathering. This program covered the theoretical knowledge essential for an intelligence officer to specialize in confidential investigations, as well as the field Application of Knowledge



three-day specialized training program (Batch 04) was successfully implemented to enhance proficiency in firearm usage, maintenance, and safe handling among officers who are assigned to armed duties to ensure the security of prisons. A group of 293 personnel, including apprentices and officers undergoing specialized training, participated in this comprehensive theoretical and practical course. A financial allocation of Rs. 2,712,690.00 was spent for training, taking a significant step toward further

strengthening the security protocols of the prison system.



With the intention of providing officers with modern trends and specialized professional knowledge relevant to the scope of the Prison Department, 12 officers were directed to train-ings conducted by recognized external state and professional institutions. An expenditure of Rs. 668,500.00 was incurred for this purpose.



A 21-day specialized training program was successfully provided for 04 selected officers to give a comprehensive understanding of the new responsibilities and the scope of duties of Class II Jailors who have received promotions.

International Expert Group Meetings held with the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC)



With the aim of reforming the prison system to international standards, an officer from the Department of Prisons actively participated in the Expert Group Meetings on Crime Prevention and Criminal Justice (Open-Ended Intergovernmental Expert Group Meetings) organized by the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC). The first session was held over five days from January 27 to 31, 2025, and the second

session lasted four days from April 01 to 04, 2025, in Vienna, Austria. As the expert group meeting focused on finding solutions through an international collective for issues such as recidivism and the resulting prison overcrowding, it shared a valuable opportunity for international knowledge exchange

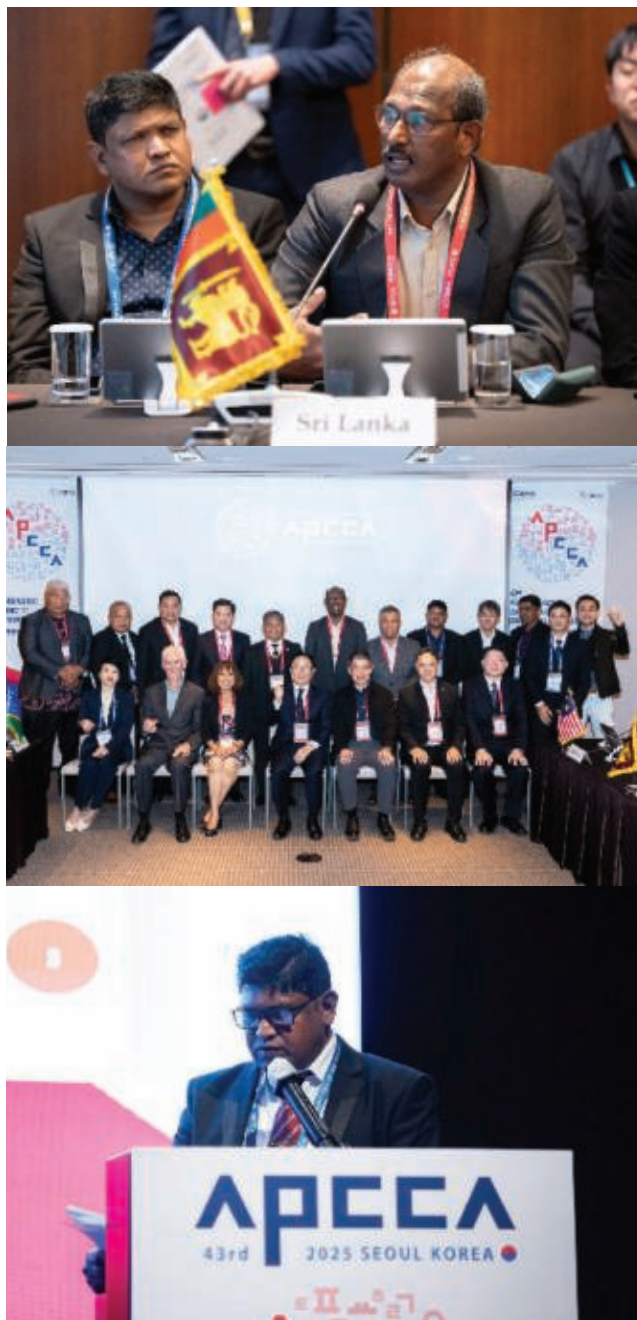


Two officers representing the Department of Prisons participated in the conference organized by the International Corrections and Prisons Association (ICPA), held in Turkey for six days from October 26 to 31, 2025. This participation provided an opportunity to exchange knowledge and experiences regarding prison institutions in various countries worldwide. Furthermore, it enabled the officers to update their understanding of modern concepts, technology, prison

structures, and innovative methodologies identified through global research.



Two officers representing the Department of Prisons-Sri Lanka, participated in the Asian and Pacific Conference of Correctional Administrators (APCCA) held in South Korea for 05 days from November 09 to 13, 2025. This conference facilitates the sharing of knowledge and experiences on various dimensions of correctional administration among regional countries, aiming to modernize prison systems through innovation and establish a more forward-looking correctional system throughout the region.



Reformation of Prison Acts



Attention has been drawn to further amend Rule 80, which was made by the Minister of Justice under Section 94 of the Prisons Ordinance (Chapter 54) (originally published in Gazette No. 7093 of March 19, 1920) and subsequently amended by Extraordinary Gazette No. 2288/15 dated July 12, 2022, due to certain issues identified during its practical implementation.



The Department of Prisons has reviewed the draft Bill prepared by the Legal Draftsman, along with the observations provided by the Hon. Attorney General. In 2025, the department informed the Ministry of Justice and National Integration that it is appropriate to hold a discussion regarding the Department's observations on the draft, specifically focusing on matters that are deemed to require further amendments. The Ministry of Justice has requested that the relevant proposals be submitted in writing, in order to facilitate discussions with the Law Commission.



Several committees were appointed to incorporate modern legal concepts such as Penal Policy and House Arrest, and their proceedings have been carried out. Accordingly, based on the Cabinet Approvals received for the committee recommendations on the concept of House Arrest, the Legal Draftsman has formulated the necessary new legislation.

Streamlining the Prison Security Process



Under the initiative to streamline the prison security process, preliminary steps were taken in 2025 to renovate the CCTV systems at the Galle, Boossa and Angunakolapelessa prisons with the assistance of the Sri Lanka Navy.



The UNODC granted the essential computer facilities to launch the Virtual Courts Project in prisons in the Southern Province, enabling inmates to appear for court proceedings online from within the prison premises. The relevant construction work was completed, and all necessary equipment, including digital screens and furniture, was provided. In addition, step was under-taken to complete the construction of the Virtual Court Facilities at the Kalutara Prison within 2025.





Procurement Procedure were conducted in 2025 to purchase four (04) Parcel Scanners and four (04) Body Scanners for four prisons, and steps have been taken to award the contracts as well. An advance payment of Rs. 33.52 million was made in 2025 for the body scanners scheduled to be delivered in 2026.



To streamline the security processes in prisons, forty-five (45) 9mm pistols were purchased in 2025 at a cost of Rs. 63 million.



Measures were taken in 2025 to purchase forty (40) buses and ten (10) vans for escorting in-mates. At a cost of Rs. 679.68 million. Out of these, 30 buses and 10 vans have already been handed over to respective prisons, while remaining 10 buses are scheduled to be supplied in 2026.



Watch towers and water tanks were constructed in 2025 at a cost of Rs.15.67 million to streamline the security of the Wariyapola, Anuradhapura, and Boossa Prisons. Furthermore, the planning and design work for construction of watchtowers at the Pallansena Prison were completed in 2025 and construction scheduled to be completed in 2026.



The planning and design work for the project to construct the visitors' room at the Wariyapola Prison were completed in 2025, and its construction is scheduled to be commenced in 2026.



The construction of the electric fence commenced in 2024, was successfully completed in 2025 with a total expenditure of Rs. 12.83 million at the Weerawila Open Prison Camp.

Upgrading Prison Medical Services



The Ministry of Health filled the vacancy for the post of Director (Medical Services) within the Department of Prisons in 2025. Additionally, the cadre for Public Health Inspectors (PHI) was officially approved up to 07 positions during the same year.



Strengthening Administration, Leadership, and Health Systems

Quarterly review meetings for Medical Officers-in-Charge, covering all 28 prison health units, have been initiated, with two meetings completed in 2025. Furthermore, quarterly coordination meetings for Public Health Inspectors (PHI) across all prisons have commenced, strengthening preventive health services, supervision, surveillance, and epi-demic preparedness.



Emergency and Intensive care capacity

Emergency Treatment Units (ETU) have been established in 12 out of the 28 prisons. This has significantly enhanced emergency response

capabilities and reduced the necessity for patient transfers to external hospitals.

Infrastructure development and service expansion

A specialized prison hospital was operated at the Vavuniya Prison, improving access to secondary-level healthcare in the Northern Province. Similarly, a 10-bed inpatient ward was established at the Batticaloa Prison, strengthening inpatient capacity and the continuity of clinical care.

Development of Specialized Prison Hospitals

Prison hospitals at Welikada, Mahara, Bogambara, and Angunakolapelessa have been designated as specialized facilities, introducing specialist services in Internal Medicine, Surgery, Dermatology, and Psychiatry. Radiology services have commenced at the Welikada Prison Hospital, with plans to introduce cardiology clinics. While specialist services have begun in most centers, efforts are ongoing to address the shortage of medical officers at the Angunakolapelessa facility.

Oral Health Services

In coordination with Regional Directors of Health Services (RDHS), arrangements have been made to conduct bi-weekly mobile dental clinics for prison hospitals, significantly improving inmates' access to oral healthcare.

Strengthening Public Health and Preventive Services

Since there are only 07 permanent PHIs attached to the Department, inter-sectoral coordination has been established to bridge the gaps in island-wide coverage. A mechanism has been developed to obtain duty coverage from Area PHIs via the RDHS offices, ensuring weekly inspections by the nearest Medical Officer of Health (MOH) divisions.

Integration of Medicine Management and Supply Chain

With special approval from the Secretary to the Ministry of Health, prison hospitals have been included as a 'Special Hospital' category in the 'Swastha' drug management system. This grants access to a full range of medicines, ensuring the availability of all essential drugs and the reliability of the supply chain.

Establishment of Drug and Therapeutic Committees (DTC)

Quarterly DTC meetings have been established within the prison health services, with two meetings already conducted. These meetings have strengthened rational prescribing practices and pharmacovigilance. Systematic supervisory visits have been successfully carried out in over 60% of the 36 prisons during this period.

Program Integration and Policy Alignment

Integration with the National STD/AIDS Control Program) and the National Program for Tuberculosis Control and Chest Diseases has been enhanced. This facilitates a robust system for disease prevention, diagnosis, treatment, and referral linkages within the prison structure. Structural discussions have been initiated to strengthen maternal and child health services within the prison health system.





DIAGNOSTIC AND PREVENTIVE HEALTH CAMPS

In conjunction with the Prison Day celebrations held from August 10th to 23rd, 2025, screening programs for Non-Communicable Diseases (NCDs) and eye examinations were conducted in selected prisons. Out of 6,345 staff members across 22 prisons, 2,132 individuals were screened. This initiative facilitated early detection of potential health issues, referrals for appropriate further medical investigations and timely preventive interventions





Diabetes Policy Reforms

Previously, insulin-dependent patients were managed primarily through hospital admission. Following Multidisciplinary Team (MDT) reviews, these patients are now safely managed within prison wards. This approach prevents unnecessary hospitalizations while maintaining high standards of clinical safety and care.



Management and Optimization of Pulmonary Tuberculosis

By identifying inefficiencies in the long-term hospitalization of pulmonary TB patients and adhering to national-level policy decisions, a new protocol has been implemented. Patients are now transferred back to prison wards after a two-week initial stabilization period to continue their treatment uninterrupted.



Mental Health and Continuity of Care

Coordinated Care Pathways have been established for inmates with psychological and psychiatric needs. This ensures the continuity of mental health services during critical transitions, such as court appearances, transfers between institutions, and final release.



Management of Prolonged Hospital Stays

A formal mechanism has been introduced for patients requiring inpatient treatment for more than 28 days. A medical board, appointed with the approval of the Director General of Health Services, reviews these cases to ensure prompt action. Inmates with complex medical conditions requiring prolonged hospitalization are managed within hospitals under the supervision of a Ministry of Health Medical Board, which includes the Director of Prison Health Services.



Monitoring of Sanitation and Hygiene

To strengthen infection control, food safety, and environmental hygiene standards, regular inspections and monitoring are conducted across prison canteens, kitchens, wards, and staff quarters.



Enhancing Health Services for Incarcerated Women

Female wards have been formally established and are currently operational in Bogambara, Angunukolapelessa, & Negombo prisons. Steps have been taken to meet health requirements of female inmates in accordance with national standards by deploying dedicated medical and nursing staff and allocating specialized clinical spaces.



To ensure sanitation within prisons, five (05) gully bowers were purchased in 2025 at a cost of Rs. 89.56 million.



Steps to Strengthen Inmate Rehabilitation Process & Effective Use of the Workforce



With the main objective of the Department of Prisons being to systematize the custody, and care for inmates while rehabilitating them into good citizens for social reintegration, various programs were conducted prisons island wide to coincide with the 27th Prisoners' Day. Sponsored by the regional sub-committees of the Prisoners' Welfare Association, these initiatives aimed to improve the physical, mental, and spiritual development of inmates through all religious programs, health clinics, sports and personality development sessions, family reunion programs, and drug prevention workshops.



Under a budget allocation of Rs.100 million, identified programs were implemented to provide national level vocational qualifications and develop professional skills for 10,456 inmates in all prisons ensuring their time in prison on productive skill building. 252 programs have been completed at a cost of Rs. 64.3 million up to now. Simultaneously, building facilities are being developed for institutions that currently lack adequate space to conduct rehabilitation programs.





Under the Action Plan-2025 of the Department of Prisons, 180 rehabilitation programs were successfully carried out in all prisons island wide. While Rs. 10 million was initially allocated for prisoners rehabilitation, only Rs.8.70 million was utilized for these programs, benefit-ing a total of 6,608 inmates.



A ceremony organized by the "Friends of Prisoners' Children" organization, to distribute school equipment to inmates' children at Welikada Prison was held under the patronage of the Governor of the Western Province, Mr. Hanif Yusu at the Welikada prison. Awards were presented to 06 children who achieved outstanding results in the 2024 G.C.E. (O/L) and (A/L) examinations. Bank accounts were opened and granted to 15 children enrolled for the 2025 academic year.



To effectively utilize prison labor and boost the agricultural sector, the department purchased three tractors in 2025 at a cost of Rs. 15.75 million. These vehicles were officially handed over to heads of Weerawila, Batticaloa, and Pallekelle prisons, where paddy and various other crops are cultivated.



"Sira Sara Shilpa 2025", Industrial Exhibition and Trade Fair, featuring creative works of prison inmates, was held for the third consecutive year on June 15, 16, and 17, 2025, at the Diyatha Uyana in Battaramulla. Event was organized with several key

objectives like enhancing vocational skills of inmates, connecting products by inmates to the public to boost sales, and opening doors for inmates to secure better employment based on their talents and providing them with a "second chance" to reintegrate into society as productive residents.



Construction of the Vocational Training Building began in 2024, was completed this year with an investment of Rs. 10.06 million to enhance the vocational education level of inmates.

Furthermore, an electric fence was installed in collaboration with the National Engineering Research and Development Centre to overcome the threat of wild elephants affecting crops at the Weerawila camp. Therefore, this facility has been transformed into a center where inmate labor is productively utilized for successful agricultural and vocational training activities.



To make the operations of the bakery units at the Anuradhapura and Thaldena Prisons more systematic and efficient, two Spiral Dough Machines were provided in 2025 at a cost of Rs. 6.03 million. Furthermore, the procurement process to purchase a similar machine for the Wel-ikada Bakery has commenced this year.



Plans were made to install poly tunnels, sprinkler irrigation systems, and drip irrigation systems to develop agricultural lands in the Anuradhapura, Pallansena, Weerawila, and Pallekele Open Prison Camps. These initiatives aim to increase agricultural production and educate inmates about modern technological Agri inputs as an alternative to traditional methods. Accordingly, these development activities were carried out in the Anuradhapura, Pallansena, and Weerawila camps in 2025 at a cost of Rs. 3.02 million. Although the scheduled work at the Pallekele camp could not be completed as planned due to Cyclone Ditva, the remaining work is set to be carried out in 2026.





Steps were taken to increase the annual budgetary allocation for the agricultural and industrial activities of the Department of Prisons up to Rs. 250.0 million this year. This has enabled an increase in the funds allocated to various industrial sectors in prisons.



Dhamma Sermon, “Sipiri Gedara Sitha Niwana Sadaham Ama Wessa” organized by the Negombo Prison, was led by the Venerable Master of Arts, Kathnoruwe Siridhamma Thero, who serves as the Principal of the Sri Palitha Vidyayathana Pirivena in Nikaweratiya Samadarapitiya and the Chief Incumbent of the Historical Ganewewa Purana Rajamaha Vihara. The primary objective of organizing such programs is to heal minds of inmates through Dhamma teachings.



Implementation of the e Prison Concept



Inmate Information Management System (PIMS) will be implemented in every prisons enabling digitalization of inmate data like inmate admission, release etc. which was previously managed manually. 100 Computers were purchased and distributed at a cost of Rs. 22.43 million during the year. Accordingly, it is expected that the operations of the Food Formula Department, Warehouse, and Healthcare sectors will also be conducted through this system in the future using those computers.



A significant challenge in implementing the Prisoner Information Management System within the prison system has been the severe shortage of officers with Information Technology (IT) expertise. To address this gap, a request was made to increase the specialized staff. Consequently, 18 positions for Information and Communication Technology Assistants have been approved. Furthermore, given the professional nature of these roles, a formal request has been submitted to the Department of Management Services to seek approval for converting these into departmental-grade positions.



Recognizing the necessity of a biometric system for identifying inmates, basic steps were taken in 2025, in collaboration with the UNDP, to acquire the biometric system currently used by the Police Criminal Records Division, with appropriate modifications for the Department of Prisons. The Sri Lanka Police has agreed to grant 50% of the ownership rights of the software free of charge. The Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) for this transfer has been drafted and is scheduled to be signed following bilateral discussions. Furthermore, the United Nations Development Program (UNDP) has agreed to supply the software and all required accessories and equipment for Prisons



32 Laptops were purchased at a cost of Rs.8.08 million and distributed to prisons to strengthen the E-Visit Service carried out by the Department of Prisons. Facility enables family members and relatives of inmates to register for the service and communicate with inmate thereby stream-lining and easing their coordination process.



In 2025, a Cyber Security Readiness Audit was conducted for the Department of Prisons with the support of SLCERT to focus on ensuring cyber security and data protection for the departmental website, information systems, and IT infrastructure. Recommendations provided through audit are scheduled to be implemented in the future.

Improving prison cadre facilities, improving their welfare and developing their sports skills

Basic arrangements were made this year to fill vacancies for 30 Class II Rehabilitation officers, 126 Class II Jailors, 356 Sergeants, and 505 Prison Guards.



Renovation work on the old building at the Prison Headquarters, which was commenced in 2024, was successfully completed in 2025 at a cost of Rs.10.2 million.



To ensure formal and efficient office operations at the Prison Headquarters and all other prisons, 250 computers were purchased at a cost of Rs. 73.79 million.



As a solution to the shortage of storage facilities at the Prison Headquarters, shipping containers have been purchased and developed into necessary infrastructure.



The 85th Anniversary and Scholarship Award Ceremony of the Prison Department Mutual Provident Fund Co-operative Society was held once again. During the event, scholarships were awarded to 68 children of members who successfully selected to universities.





The State Service Cricket Tournament was held recently with the participation of numerous state institutions. The Department of Prisons fielded three teams under Categories A, B, and C, and the Prison 'A' Team successfully qualified for the grand final.



Approval from the Department of National Planning has been granted to the project to construct barracks at the Mahara, Bossa, and Negombo prisons. Steps have been taken to carry out these constructions under a direct contract basis with the National Engineering Research and Development Centre (NERDC). Accordingly, construction of barracks at the Negombo Prison has already commenced, while planning and design phases for the Mahara and Bossa barracks have been completed.



Representing Sri Lanka at the 23rd Asian Masters Athletics Championships held in Chennai, India, Ms.M.A. Priyadarshani Mantreerathne (attached to the Watareka Open Prison Camp) and Mr. S.S. Dahanayake (attached to the Colombo Remand Prison) achieved significant victories. Ms. Priyadarshani Mantreerathne won a Gold medal in the 80m hurdles, a Bronze medal in the 300m hurdles, and two Silver medals in the 4x100m and 4x400m relay events. Mr. S.S. Dahanayake secured two Silver medals in the 100m and 200m sprints and a Bronze medal in the 4x100m relay event, bringing honor to the Mother Lanka.



With the objectives of fostering fellowship among officers at the Prison Headquarters and popularizing the game of cricket among staff, a friendly cricket tournament organized by the Prison Headquarters Sports and Welfare Association was held grandly at the Colombo Prison Ground. The event was presided over by the Commissioner General of Prisons and featured the participation of cricketers Mr. Matheesha Pathirana, Mr. Ashen Bandara, and Mr. Sadisha Rajapaksa.





Construction of barracks and toilet system at the Vavuniya Prison was completed this year at a cost of Rs. 10.4 million.



Construction of the Jailor and Sergeant rest rooms at the Monaragala Prison commenced this year, achieving 50% physical progress. Rs. 2.32 million was spent as an advance payment to the construction.



Construction of officers' barracks at the Badulla Prison was initiated under contract in 2025, and an advance payment of Rs. 3.33 million has been made.



Renovation work on the Anuradhapura Prison Circuit Bungalow was completed this year at a cost of Rs. 9.78 million.



Planning and design phases of construction project of Sergeant and Guard barracks and toilet system at the Pallansena Prison were completed this year and construction work is due to be begun next year.



As per a health sector survey, approximately 45% of prison officers are at risk of Non-Communicable Diseases (NCDs). Recognizing that rapid improvement of residential facilities is essential to prevent staff turnover and ensure the security of the prison system, a Cabinet Memorandum has been approved to carry out

constructions worth Rs.75.0 million of barracks at the Welikada and Anuradhapura prisons and an additional Rs. 75.0 million to modernize existing barracks and sanitation systems in all prisons across the island using cost-effective technology by the State Engineering Corporation (SEC) on a direct contract basis. The State Engineering Corporation has already participated in field inspections at Welikada and Anuradhapura prisons to plan upcoming construction work.

Challenges -



1. Prison congestion and Difficulties in Classification of Prisoners

The most significant challenge facing the prison system is severe overcrowding therefore it has become impossible to classify inmates based on the nature of their offenses. The inability to provide minimum space and facilities required for an inmate in terms International Standards has turned prison management and the fulfillment of basic needs into a critical issue.



2. Infrastructure Development and Limited Space

The majority of prisons are located in the heart of major cities. Being situated in densely populated areas makes it extremely difficult to find extra land required to expand prison premises. Furthermore, since existing buildings are very old and dilapidated, limited space available to install modern technological equipment has delayed implementation of modern prison concepts.



3. Obstacles to the Rehabilitation Process and Social Reintegration

Due to increase in number of inmates, it has become difficult to systematically conduct vocational training, education, and psychological counseling services. Specifically, the lack of a structured pardon system for long-term prisoners has led to a sense of hopelessness regarding their future. This contributes to unrest within prisons and creates additional pressure on the officers.



4. Human Resource Shortages and Maintaining Professional Standards

Present cadre of the Department of Prisons was approved in 2013, which is entirely inadequate relative to inmate population today. The loss of the internationally accepted inmate to officer ratio has posed a significant challenge to both prison security and general administration. Existing issues in the promotion procedures for officers and the salary disparities compared to parallel services in the prison system have led to a decline in their professional motivation. Furthermore, the shortage of technical officers has made the maintenance of prison facilities a major challenge. Simultaneously, the lack of IT professionals poses an additional hurdle for the Department of Prisons in advancing through digital and information technology systems.



5. Officer Welfare and Threat Management

Living standards for prison officials including official quarters, barracks, and healthcare facilities remain at an extremely minimum level. In addition, officers have to face severe pressures when managing organized criminals and high-profile underworld figures.



6. Security Systems and Control of CO Items

Inadequacy of modern technical scanners and inspection tools required to prevent prohibited items such as narcotics and mobile phones entering into prisons, is a major challenge encountered by the prison. Under these limited facilities, it has become difficult to control smuggling operations that are carried out with extreme sophistication. Furthermore, the annual budget allocations are not sufficient for the procurement, repair, and maintenance of such technical equipment. Consequently, there is an urgent need to recruit skilled personnel trained in handling and operating modern technical infrastructure.



7. Health

Inability to maintain specialist medical services within prisons and the shortage of medical officers for essential institutions remain major obstacle. Furthermore, the lack of permanent Public Health Inspectors (PHIs) to cover all prisons poses a significant.

Due to severe overcrowding in prisons, there is a high risk of spreading skin diseases, Tuberculosis (TB), and Sexually Transmitted Diseases (STD/HIV).

It is a significant challenge to maintain the deteriorated wastewater systems in old prisons and sanitary standards in kitchens due to high cost & constant supervision.

Future Goals -



1. Infrastructure and Prison System Development

- i. Complete all construction and establish other services at the Pallekele Prison before the year 2028.
- ii. Expedite the completion of the security wall, residential buildings, and other essential infrastructure at the Watareka Prison to alleviate the severe congestion in the Colombo Prison Complex.
- iii. It was proposed to relocate the old prison located within the Matara Fort to the Kotavila Watta area, thereby releasing the land for the historic Matara City Development Plan while providing a modern facility for inmates.
- iv. Further expand the existing space at the Wariyapola Prison to provide a solution to the general overcrowding within the prison system.

v. Rapidly complete the construction of the administrative building underway at the Mahara Prison to create a modern office space for officers.

vi. Conduct essential maintenance on dilapidated buildings in prisons such as Welikada with archaeological value, to prevent the risk of collapse.

vii. Rehabilitate the Kalutara Prison by constructing new buildings to replace those dilapidated by now.

viii. Based on a decision by the National Security Council, it is proposed to establish a high-tech, high-security prison on Maanthivu Island specifically for high-profile criminals and inmates who should be detained in maximum security.

ix. Expediently complete the construction of new barracks at Mahara, Boossa, Negombo, Anuradhapura, and Welikada to enhance the job satisfaction and efficiency of prison officers.

x. As an immediate remedy to severe overcrowding, steps will be taken to temporarily acquire unused government buildings and develop them into temporary prisons. These buildings will be renovated in accordance with minimum international standards to provide necessary sanitary and security facilities for inmates.



2. Technological and Security Modernization

i. Installation of modern security cameras (CCTV), parcel scanners, and mobile signal jammer systems to prevent prohibited items from entering into prisons.

ii. Introduction of a Biometric Data System for effective Inmate Information Management.

iii. Expansion of Virtual Court Facilities across prisons

island-wide to overcome difficulties in producing inmates before court.

iv. Implementation of recommendations given by the audit on cyber security readiness provided by SLCERT.



3. Inmate Welfare and Rehabilitation

i. Implementation of National Vocational Qualification (NVQ) training programs targeting female inmates and young offenders.

ii. Introduction of a appropriate aftercare methodology to facilitate the social reintegration of inmates after finishing their sentences.

iii. Standardize inmate rehabilitation by utilizing prison labor for productive economic purposes during the rehabilitation period.



4. Administration and Human Rights

i. Amendment to the Prisons Ordinance and related legislation.

ii. Updating the Recruitment Procedure and Service Minute to elevate the prison service to a professional standard.

iii. Reviewing the staff of the Prisons Department and submitting relevant reports

iii. Speedy implementation of recommendations made by the Human Rights Commission of Sri Lanka and the Auditor General (as per 2018 and 2023 reports).

iv. Implementation of recommendations from the committee report appointed regarding the Mahara Prison Riot.



5. Health and sanitation

- i. Establishment of Emergency Treatment Units (ETU) in remaining 16 prisons that are lack in ETUs and thereby minimizing the need to transfer inmates to external hospitals.
- ii. Working towards obtaining ISO or national-level hygiene certification to ensure food safety and cleanliness in prison kitchens and canteens.
- iii. Expediting the systematic construction of wastewater systems at Kuruwita, Polonnaruwa, and Negombo Prisons that are assigned to the National Water Supply and Drainage Board to manage sewage and wastewater while minimizing Inconvenience to the public.

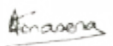

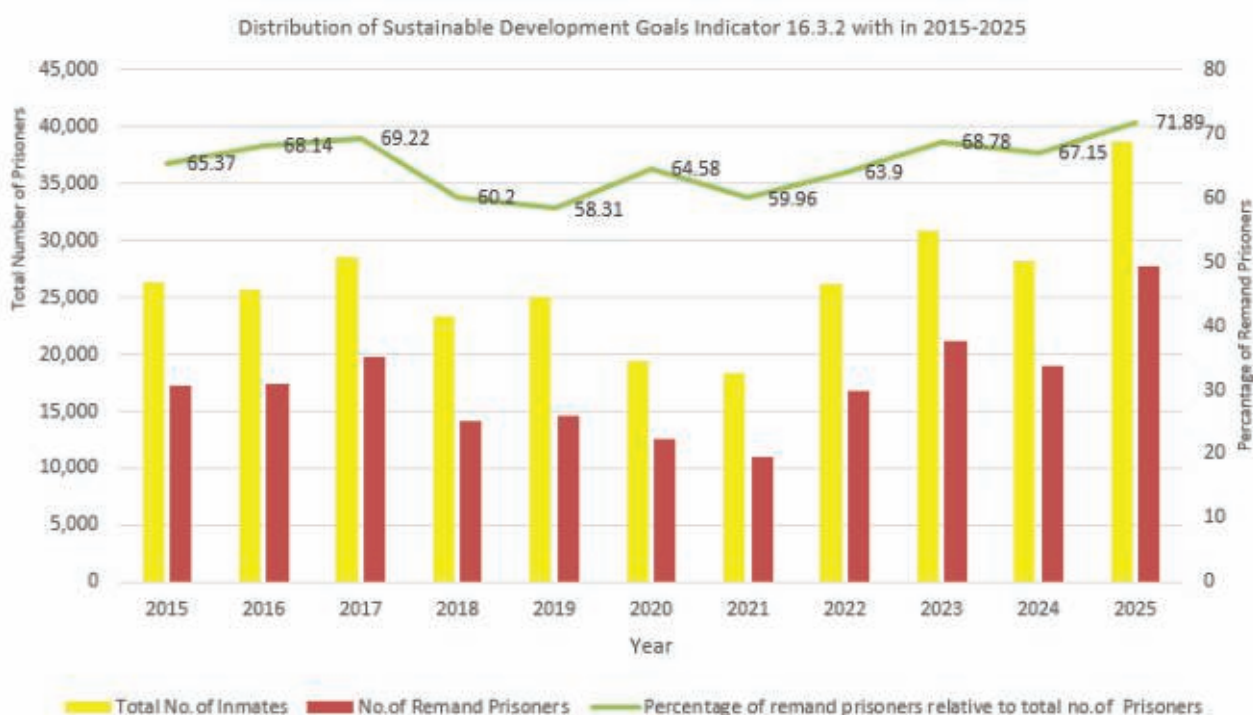
5.2 BRIEFLY DESCRIBE ACHIEVEMENTS AND CHALLENGES IN ACHIEVING THE SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS

5.2.1 CHALLENGES IN ACHIEVING TARGET 16.2

Under the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), the specific achievement indicator directly identified for the Department of Prisons is Indicator 16.3.2: "Remand prisoners as a proportion of the overall prison population.". The following table illustrates the progression of this indicator over the past 10 years relative to the base year of 2015.

76.9% of the total annual admissions are remand prisoners. Accordingly, it is observed that the annual ratio of Convicted to Remand Prisoners, which stood at 1:5 in 2020, 1:4 in 2021, 1:4 in 2022, and 1:3 in 2023, has remained constant at 1:3 through the years 2024 and 2025.

As specified by the Sustainable Development Council, the value of the indicator has been calculated based on the international criterion of the total number of inmates remaining as at December 31st each year, in accordance with the global definition of the indicator.

Remand prisoners refer to the group of suspects who have not been convicted by law. According to the Sri Lanka Prison Statistics and Data 2025- Draft, a total of 192,271 annual admissions (including both convicted and remand prisoners) were recorded in 2025. Out of this total, 44,405 were convicted prisoners, while 147,866 were Remand Prisoners. This means that

populations signals to society a potential challenge to the credibility of the criminal justice system. Efforts to narrow this gap are currently underway through comprehensive studies and the continuous participation of all relevant stakeholders.

However, management of remand population is also influenced by several factors beyond the direct administration of the Department of Prisons, such as:

- I. The increase in the number of unresolved cases and continuous court adjournments.
- II. The delays in Government Analyst Reports in certain instances.
- III. The inability of detainees to meet bail conditions.

IV. The improper operation of the Bail Act.

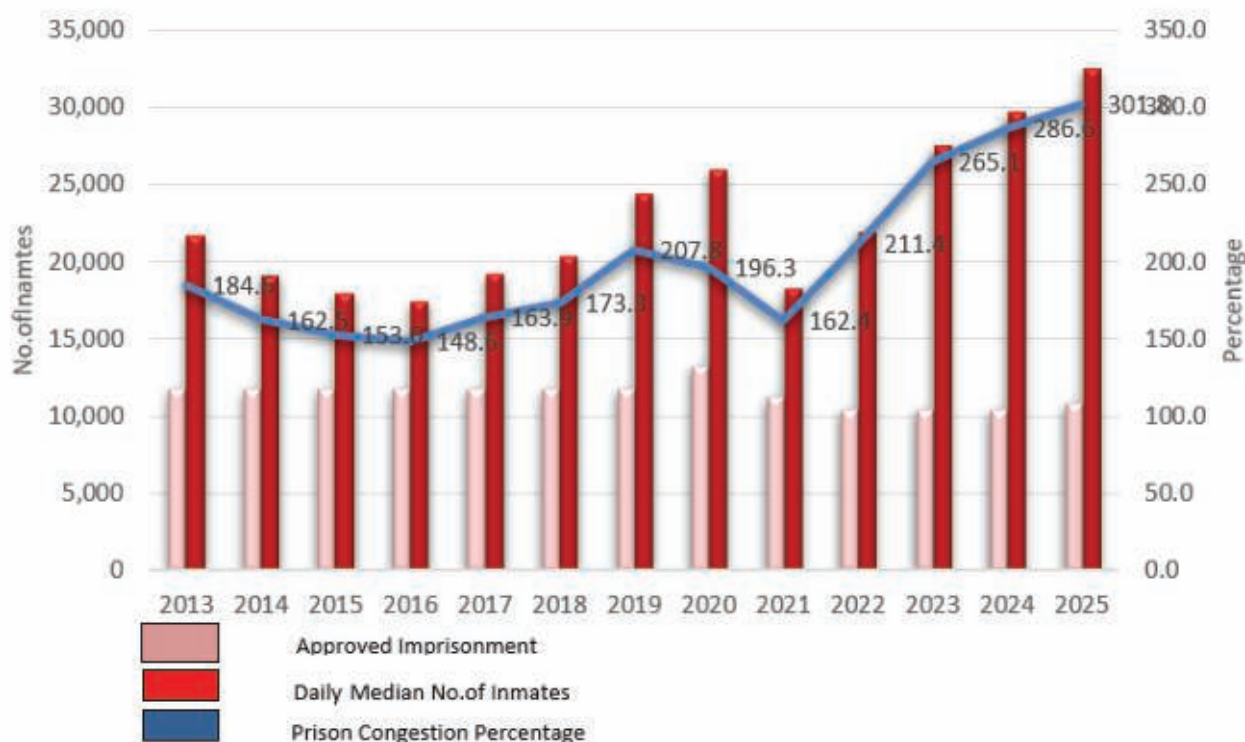
V. The Increase in no. of Inmates being remanded for drug-related offenses.

While the primary role of the Department of Prisons is to detain inmates committed by courts island-wide, the daily increase in the suspect population remains a major challenge. Although progress in SDG Indicator 16.3.2 is reflected by a reduction in the number of suspects, achieving this task lies outside the direct control of the Department of Prisons. The Department's capacity is limited to reporting relevant data and existing conditions to the responsible authorities. Consequently, the Sustainable Development Council has identified reporting of data for this indicator as the responsibility of the Department of Prisons, while the responsibility for taking action to achieve progress in the indicator lies with the Ministry of Justice (including the Government Analyst's Department), the Judiciary, and the Sri Lanka Police under the Ministry of Public Security.

While it is the primary responsibility of the Department of Prisons to detain individuals committed by courts across the island, the daily increase in the number of remand suspects remains the most significant challenge facing the Department. Although progress in SDG Indicator 16.3.2 is measured by the reduction of the remand population, this factor remains outside the direct control of the Department of Prisons. The Department's role is limited to reporting relevant data and current conditions to the responsible governing bodies. Recognizing this, the Sustainable Development Council has designated the reporting of data for this indicator as the responsibility of the Department of Prisons. However, the mandate to implement actions and achieve actual progress in this indicator is shared across several key institutions, including the Ministry of Justice, the Government Analyst's Department, and the Sri Lanka Police under the Ministry of Public Security.

According to the Sri Lanka Prison Statistics– 2025 (draft), the total authorized capacity for inmates in the prison system is 10,801. However, given the current

high daily average inmate population, the system is experiencing an overall congestion rate of 301.3%, as detailed below. No. of remand prisoners can make a significant impact on total capacity.

Furthermore, many prisons are ancient with several dilapidated buildings that they are now abandoned as unfit for occupancy. Location of these prisons near urban court complexes presents a significant space restriction, as there is insufficient land available for expansion. Consequently, the rapid growth in remand population poses a massive challenge in providing residential facilities with minimum international standards, as well as in maintaining adequate sanitary facilities and essential services proportional to the number of inmates.

The Department of Prisons has initiated a Five-Year Strategic Plan to reach these goals. This plan identifies specific short-term, medium-term, and long-term measures which are being implemented with the participation of all relevant parties. Measures already undertaken by the Department are as follows:

- i. Information on remand prisoners for long period has been forwarded to the Attorney General's Department to address and prevent further judicial delays.
- ii. Detailed lists, including case numbers of inmates held long-term due to delays in forensic analysis, have been submitted to the Government Analyst's Department with formal requests to speed the issuance of reports.
- iii. Necessary reports have been submitted to relevant courts to secure trial dates for cases currently without fixed dates and to facilitate further legal action.
- iv. Reports on inmates who are in custody solely due to their inability to pay bail, have been provided to the Ministry of Justice and the Judicial Service Commission.
- v. A project proposal for House Arrest and Area Restrictions, alternatives to remand widely used in

regional countries, was submitted to the Ministry of Justice. Following this, a committee chaired by a Supreme Court Judge studied the feasibility of the concept. Based on the committee's recommendations and subsequent Cabinet approval, the Legal Draftsman has drafted the necessary new legislation.

vi. Proposals have been made to Hon. Magistrates to consider imposing alternative bail conditions for remand prisoners who are physically or financially unable to satisfy their current bail terms.

vii. The Inspector General of Police (IGP) has been informed about implementing measures to avoid remand prisoners for offenses where bail or rehabilitation are more appropriate, such as minor traffic violations or possession of small quantities of narcotics for personal use.

viii. To address the long-term detention of individuals under the Prevention of Terrorism Act (PTA), information regarding these remandees is being submitted to the committee appointed by the President to amend the Act. This initiative aims to expedite legal proceedings, ensure that formal charges are filed against those currently held without them, and facilitate the release of eligible individuals either through bail or acquittal.

ix. Furthermore, reports have been submitted to the Ministry of Justice, the Judicial Service Commission, and the Police Department concerning inmates remanded under Section 54 of the Poisons, Opium, and Dangerous Drugs Ordinance. These reports are intended to explore the legal feasibility of amending charge sheets under Section 78, thereby enabling more efficient judicial action for those held on drug-related offenses.

x. In a move toward rehabilitation rather than incarceration, preliminary measures were taken to establish a dedicated treatment center in Weerawila for drug users, supported by the necessary legal frameworks. This center was launched in 2021 with a capacity of 350 residents. Additionally, drug rehabilitation programs have been implemented

across eight prison work camps under the "Ama Divi Ridma" and "Namodishta" initiatives. These efforts are designed to reduce the number of drug-related remandees while providing productive, therapeutic rehabilitation for those in need.

xi. To prevent the use of toxic narcotics and dangerous drugs, a dedicated task force was established under the leadership of the Hon. Minister of Justice, Prison Affairs and Constitutional Reforms and the Hon. Minister of Public Security. This task force, which includes the participation of the Commander of the Navy, comprises representatives from all key stakeholder institutions, including the Ministry of Justice, and the Ministries of Health, Defense, and Education, as well as the Attorney General's Department and the Police. Through this collaborative effort, measures have been taken to address the incarceration of drug users and to consider further actions to alleviate the resulting overcrowding within the prison system.

Due to a number of factors that are beyond the direct control of this Department, there has been a significant rise in the number of remand detainees thereby resulted in an inability to achieve expected progress in indicators connected to departmental data for the realization of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) mentioned above. Furthermore, achieving progress for the Sustainable Development Goal Indicator 16.3.2 under the Department of Prisons requires a collective effort involving all institutions within the national criminal justice chain. Consequently, the Department of Prisons does not have the independent capacity to implement the programs and projects necessary to exert a direct impact on these outcomes.

However, the Ministry of Justice, in collaboration with the Sustainable Development Council, has appointed committees to identify existing challenges and steer efforts toward achieving the performance indicators related to Goal 16. To support this, representatives from the Department of Prisons have submitted all relevant information, activities, and reports necessary to achieve Target 16.3.2. Furthermore, the Ministry of Justice has developed a dedicated action plan for

Target 16.3, which is currently being implemented at the ministerial level and across its affiliated institutions. Under this action plan, the Ministry of Justice, its affiliated institutions, and the Department of Prisons have implemented the following activities during the years 2024-2025:

I. Plans and designs have been completed to relocate old prisons located in urban areas to suburban environments in compliance with international minimum standards. This includes shifting the Colombo Prison Complex to Millewa, Horana.

II. Preliminary approvals and fund allocations were secured in 2025 for expanding the Wariyapola Prison, constructing buildings for remand prisoners at Wataraka, and replacing dilapidated structures at the Kalutara Prison with new prison buildings.

III. To mitigate current congestion, construction of temporary holding wards has commenced at Welikada, Colombo Remand, and New Magazine prisons. Similar temporary wards are in the planning stages for the Kalutara, Wariyapola, and Kuruwita prisons.

IV.: Efforts are underway to rebrand the prison service as a "Correctional Service" to enhance professionalism. The recruitment procedures under the drafted Correctional Service Constitution have been prepared and approved.

V. Virtual Court facilities have been introduced in several prisons within the Southern Province. This year, the facility was successfully established at the Kalutara Prison.

X. Infrastructure is being upgraded to facilitate the implementation of a comprehensive Prisoner Information Management System (PIMS).

VI. Requirements to speed up the issuance of Government Analyst reports have been identified and are being fulfilled.

VIII. To control the inmate population, alternative punishments are being introduced. Cabinet approval has

been granted to refer the study report on implementing "House Arrest" in Sri Lanka to the Legal Draftsman for the preparation of necessary legislation.

XII. Committee studies have commenced regarding the implementation of non-custodial measures in accordance with the United Nations Standard Minimum Rules (The Tokyo Rules).

XIII. Activities are underway to amend Prison Rules and Sentencing Policies.

5.2.2 TARGETED 16.6 ACHIEVEMENTS AND CHALLENGES OF ACCOMPLISHING GOALS

A total budget allocation of Rs.20,380.0 million was granted to the Department of Prisons for the year 2025, (comprising Rs. 15,773.0 million for recurrent expenditure and Rs. 4,607.0 million for capital expenditure) and total expenditure incurred during the year amounted to Rs. 16,936.63 million (consisting of Rs. 14,691.70 million for recurrent expenditure and Rs. 2,244.92 million for capital expenditure). Accordingly, the Department of Prisons and its affiliated institutions have utilized 83.10% of the total approved provisions.

6.2 STAFF MANAGEMENT (STATEMENT OF FACTS)

Existing approved cadre of the Department of Prisons was approved by the Department of Management Services through the letter dated September 24, 2013. Although an approved cadre of 7,949 officers was recommended based on the data and requirements of that period, the rapid increase in inmates population today has shown insufficiency in cadre relative to today needs.

Even within the existing approved cadre, there are currently over 1,630 vacancies, resulting in an immense work load for officers currently in service. Facing the dual challenges of exceeding inmate's capacity and staff shortages, it has become common for a single officer to cover the duties of several individuals and to remain on duty continuously for several days. This situation directly leads to severe occupational stress and job dissatisfaction among officers.

Furthermore, the acute shortage of technical officers within the Department serves as a major obstacle to institution's physical development. Due to the lack of adequate staff to provide the necessary technical guidance and supervision for the maintenance and

construction of the prison system, there is a significant risk that capital allocations for these projects can not be utilized efficiently within the stipulated timeframe. Shortage of human resource has made difficult to deploy officers for essential security, administrative, and technical works. This negatively impacts institutional security, inmate welfare, physical resource improvement, and the overall quality of the rehabilitation process. Decline in job satisfaction and resulting physical exhaustion reduces officer efficiency, remaining a primary challenge in achieving the performance targets of the entire department.

Having identified prevailing condition, a special committee has been appointed to review the approved cadre in line with modern requirements. Steps are being taken to update the number of positions accordingly, while simultaneous efforts are underway to fill existing vacancies as quickly as possible.

6.4 CONTRIBUTION OF TRAINING PROGRAMS TO PERFORMANCE OF THE INSTITUTION

Systematic training and development programs can be identified as the primary strategic tool for ensuring the overall performance and professional quality of the Department of Prisons. This process begins with the Training Needs Analysis stage, where the gap between the current skills of prison officers and the expected standards of duty is precisely identified. Target-oriented training programs are then designed based on these findings.

This specifically aims to update the daily subject knowledge of officers within the prison system, raise awareness regarding new rules and timely reforms, and enhance job satisfaction by motivating officers working

within a stressful duty environment. Evaluations conducted at the conclusion of the training, along with qualitative and quantitative feedback provided by Heads of Institutions (e.g., Superintendents of Prisons) once officers return to service, have confirmed a significant impact. These training programs strengthen the overall performance of the department by encouraging discipline and enhancing the professional competence of officers.
