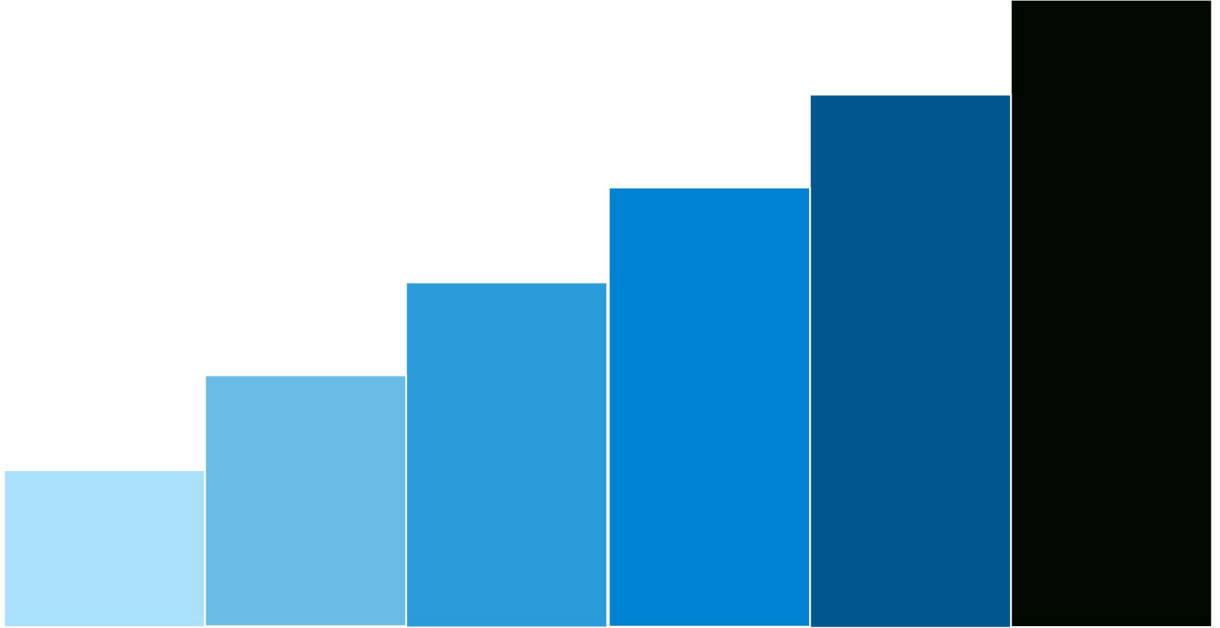

## Message from the Director

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It is a pleasure for me to present the Annual Report of the PGIM for the year 2020.

The PGIM remains the country's sole institute responsible for specialist training of medical and dental practitioners. Our 23 Boards of Study and 37 Specialty Boards conduct 135 programmes of study leading to MD and MSc degrees, PG Diplomas, PG Certificates, and Board Certification of specialists. Currently, there are 3855 Postgraduate trainees, including 986 new entrants, enrolled for these programmes. In 2020, we conducted 115 examinations, awarded 434 MD and 61 MSc degrees, 186 PG Diplomas, 10 PG Certificates, and Board Certified 235 specialists.

Prospectuses for three new training programmes (Master of Military Medicine, MD and Board certification in Laboratory Molecular Pathology, Post MD subspecialty training and Board Certification in Clinical Genetics) have been completed. Two PG Diploma programmes were upgraded to master's level. During 2019, 3 curricula and prospectuses of existing programmes were revised and 12 more are in the process of being revised.

Construction on our new academic building at Rodney Street was completed and became operational in August 2019. Furniture and office equipment for the building was purchased utilizing our generated funds.

The PGIM faced a unique set of challenges as a result of COVID19. Despite the lockdown and restrictions imposed by the pandemic, the PGIM managed to maintain a high level of functionality, by converting most activities to the online mode, and by moving towards a paperless office. The PGIM implemented health and safety measures in keeping with national guidelines, ensuring the safety of staff, trainers and trainees.

I take this opportunity to thank members of the Board of Management, Boards of Study, Specialty Boards, Examination Boards, Trainers and Examiners for their contributions to the PGIM this year. I wish to especially commend our administrative, academic, clerical and another support staff for their commitment and diligence.

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## **HISTORICAL BACKGROUND**

Medical education in Sri Lanka commenced in 1870 with the establishment of the Ceylon Medical College, which became the Faculty of Medicine in 1942 when the University of Ceylon was established. No postgraduate medical examinations were conducted by the University of Ceylon until 1952 when examinations for the degrees of MD and MOG commenced, followed by the degree of MS the next year.

At that time, there was no structured or organized postgraduate training. Postgraduate medical training was obtained in the United Kingdom and qualifications such as MRCP, FRCS, FFARCS, MRCOG, FRCR, MRCPATH, MRCPsych, FDSRCS etc awarded by the professional colleges in the UK were recognized for consultant appointments by the Ministry of Health and universities. In 1973, the Advisory Committee on Postgraduate Medical Education recommended to the Government that a supervised in-service training period of 3 years followed by an examination should replace training abroad. Accordingly, the Institute of Postgraduate Medicine (IPGM) was established in 1976 under provisions of the University of Ceylon Act No. 1 of 1972, and was attached to the University of Colombo. It was formally inaugurated on the 2<sup>nd</sup> of March 1976 by Dr. Halfdan Mahler, Director General of the WHO. Professor K.N. Seneviratne was appointed as its first Director.

However, the newly set-up IPGM was at a disadvantage as examinations of the UK professional Colleges continued to be conducted in Colombo, and local doctors preferred these to IPGM examinations. A review of the work of the institute became necessary. The government decided to stop the UK professional colleges from conducting foreign postgraduate medical examinations in Sri Lanka and to grant full recognition and preference to postgraduate medical degrees of the institute with effect from the 1<sup>st</sup> of January, 1980.

In order to achieve the objectives of the institute, it was re-established in 1979 under the provisions of the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978, and renamed the Postgraduate Institute of Medicine (PGIM). Dr. S.A. Cabraal was appointed as its first Director. Accordingly, PGIM Ordinance No: 1 of 1980 made under the provisions of the Universities Act referred to above came into force on the 10<sup>th</sup> of April, 1980. Boards of Study for various specialties were re-organized and courses of instruction and examinations were arranged for different specialties. They were Anaesthesiology, Community Medicine, Dental Surgery, Family Medicine and General Practice, Medicine, Obstetrics & Gynaecology, Ophthalmology, Pathology, Paediatrics, Psychiatry, Radiology and Surgery. In 1985, four more Boards of Study, Forensic Medicine, Microbiology, Otolaryngology, and Clinical Oncology were established. Professor R.G. Panabokke was appointed Director in 1990. Boards of Study in Medical Administration and Dermatology were established in 1994 and the Board of Study in Venereology in 2001. Dr. J.B. Peiris was appointed Director in 1995, followed by Professor Lalitha Mendis in 2002, Professor Rezvi Sheriff in 2006, Professor Jayantha Jayawardana in 2012 and Professor H. Janaka de Silva in 2014. The post of Deputy Director was established in 2011, and this post has been held by Professor Jayantha Jayawardana, followed by Professor Prashantha Wijesinghe, Professor Chrishantha Abeysena and Professor Senaka Rajapakse. Amendments to the 1980 Ordinance took effect on the 1<sup>st</sup> of July 2014 and 23<sup>rd</sup> of February 2018. Several new Boards of Study and Specialty Boards were established under the amended Ordinance.

## **Goals**

- Achieve consistently high standards in teaching-learning, training and research.
- Enhance training programmes to meet national health care needs.
- Contribute to formulate health and medical educational policies of the country.
- Extend and expand the activities of the institution in postgraduate medical education and research.
- Expand infrastructure facilities to ensure quality and accommodate the growing educational needs of the institute.

## **Objectives**

- Produce human resources for health of high quality and sufficient quantity to meet the national demand.
- Maintain and improve skills and competencies of health personnel through continuing education.
- Innovate and design methodology that will facilitate in continuing education of medical personnel.
- Inculcate constructive attitudes and promote the habit of self-learning among the medical personnel.
- Promote the use of available resources and appropriate technology with regard to postgraduate education.
- Inculcate the concept of using a health care team approach in solving health problems.
- Evaluate medical education programmes in order to obtain information with regard to flaws and pointers for improvement.
- Arrange in-service programmes where preventive and curative care and nursing care are well integrated.
- Develop educational links with foreign institutions for mutual benefit in order to maintain high standards of postgraduate medical education in Sri Lanka. To be a financially and administratively independent institute, internationally recognized centre of excellence, producing specialists of high professional standards to meet the health needs of the country and contribute to regional and world health in a responsive manner.

### **14.1 Academic Activities**

#### **14.1.1. Registration**

The PGIM conducted 135 postgraduate courses during the year 2020 leading to MD & Board Certification, Masters, Postgraduate Diploma and Certificates under the direct guidance of 23 Boards of Study, 33 Specialty Boards and 4 Interim Specialty Boards.

A total of 3876 Postgraduate trainees including 986 new entrants were enrolled to undergo training programmes leading to degrees of MD and Board Certification, Masters, Postgraduate Diploma and Certificates. of them 3428 trainees were undergoing training programmes locally and while 448 were training in overseas recognized training centres.

#### **14.1.2. Academic Emphasis**

The academic emphasis in the year 2020 was also centered on introducing of new training programmes and the revision of curricula and prospectuses to enhance the quality of the exiting training programmes bench marking with the internationally accepted curricula and incorporating the latest techniques.

Series of workshops were held during this year too for trainers and examiners and relevant topics in order to equip them with new techniques, examination formats to enhance the quality, maintain the accepted standards of training programmes and examination from based on the recommendations of the reports of External Examiners of MD Examination from the Centres of Excellence in the United Kingdom, Australia, Singapore, India, USA, Pakistan and Turkey.

### **Medical Education Resource Centre (MERC)**

The year 2020 was another successful year for the Medical Education Resource Center (MERC), where it was in the forefront of many an activity conducted by the PGIM.

### **ACADEMIC ACTIVITIES**

##### **Board of Study in Multidisciplinary Studies**

- 1. Pg Certificate in Medical Education, Pg Diploma in Medical Education and MD in Medical Education:** The Postgraduate Certificate in Medical Education is a ten months part time course which leads to the Master of Medical Education course.  
Fifteen candidates joined the PG Certificate in Medical Education Training in 2020.  
Two trainees started their Post MD local training in 2020 and other two trainees continue their Pre MD. One Trainee started her Post MD foreign training.
- 2. MSc in Medical Toxicology:** This is a two years distance learning programme based on an online platform using the Moodle learning management system. Twenty-one local trainees and eighteen foreign trainees from the 2<sup>nd</sup> batch sat for the Medical Toxicology Part I examination in 2020. Six local trainees and ten foreign trainees passed Medical Toxicology part I examination. Four foreign trainees and sixteen local candidates continue with their 2<sup>nd</sup> year of the MSc Medical Toxicology training programme.

### **Career Guidance Unit PGIM**

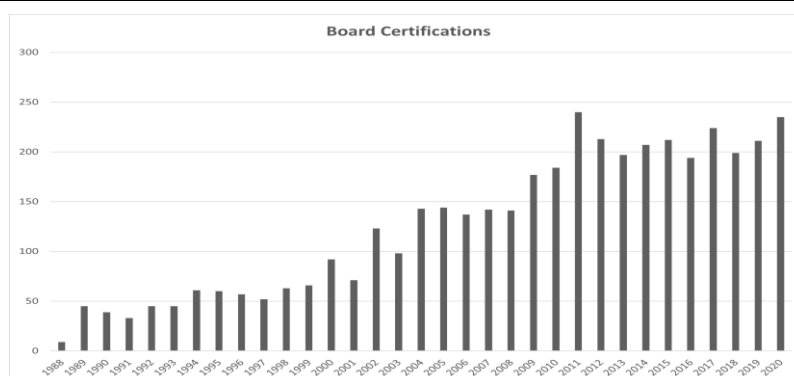

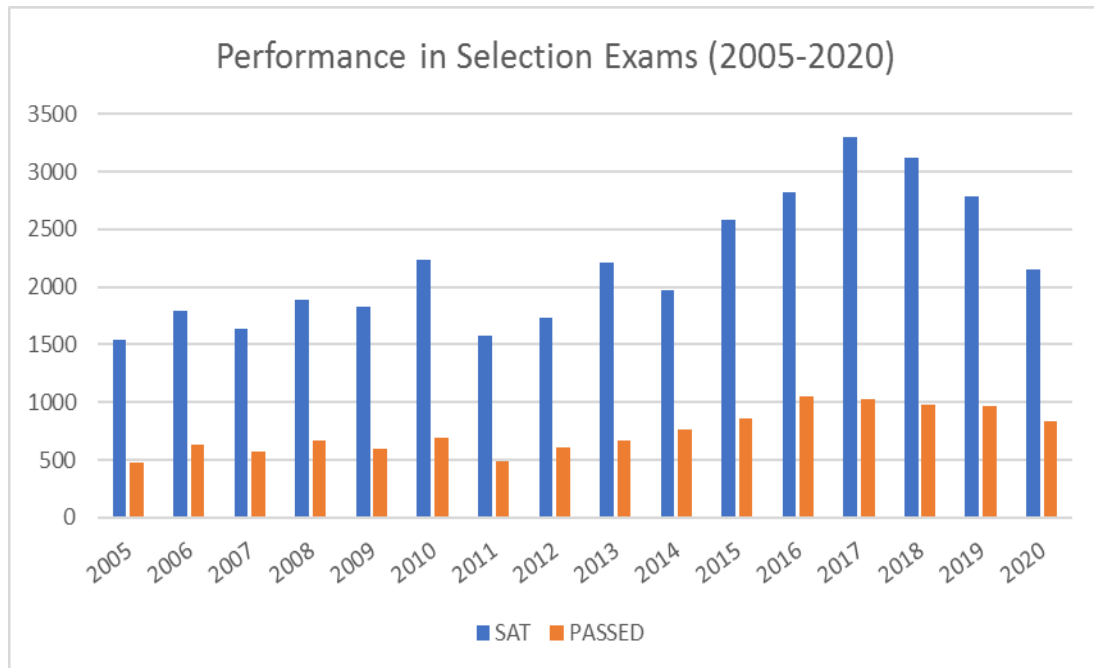

### **14.5.Finance**

#### **Significant Accounting Policies for the Year Ended 31<sup>st</sup> December 2020**

##### **1. Basis of Accounting**

The Financial Statements of the Postgraduate Institute of Medicine has been prepared on the historical basis of accounting, whereby the transactions are recorded at values prevailing at the dates when the assets were acquired, the liabilities were incurred and funds obtained; in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards laid down by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Sri Lanka and adopted by the UGC.

##### **2. Conversion of Foreign Currencies**

All foreign currency transactions are accounted for at the exchange rates prevailing at the date of the transactions; gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transaction and from the transaction of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognized in the income statement. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at exchange rates prevailing on the balance sheet date.

##### **3. Revenue Recognition**

###### **I. Government Grants (Recurrent)**

All Government Grants pertaining to recurrent expenditure is recognized at the time of actual funds received.

###### **II. Government Grant (Capital)**

Government Grant received for Capital assets acquisition is shown under Unspent Grant and transferred to Capital Grant Spent when the asset is acquired. During the year amortization amount recognized to the income statement over the expected life of the related assets.

### III. Course Fee

Course fees are recognized over the period of instruction. Where adequate information is not available to make such allocation to different financial periods, fees are recognized as income on a cash basis but the fees receivable for the year 2020 has been taken in to account.

### IV. Investment Income

Investment income is recognized on accrual basis.

## 4. Inventories

### I. Stationery

Stocks of stationery and other miscellaneous items are valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value. In general, cost is determined on a First in First out (FIFO) basis.

## 5. Assets and bases of their valuation

### I. Property Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Property Plant and Equipment are recorded at cost of purchase together with any incidental expenses there on. The assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Assets received as grant have been valued at their fair value.

#### **Impairment**

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount, such reduction is recognized as an expense immediately.

#### **Gain or loss on disposal**

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with carrying amount. These are included in the income statement.

#### **Depreciation**

Assets, for which dates of purchase are known, depreciation is provided in proportion to the number of months completed or such assets were used from the date of purchase. Assets of which exact date of purchase is not known depreciation is provided for the whole year in which they were purchased. Depreciation will be provided on the year of the sale/disposal in proportion to the number of months the assets over the estimated useful life of assets.

Depreciation is charged on all property plant & equipment on the straight line basis to write off the cost over the estimated useful lives as follows.

• Cloaks	-	20%	per annum
• Electricity Distribution	-	10%	per annum

## **II.Intangible Assets**

An intangible asset is an identifiable non-monetary asset without physical substance. The assets shall be measured initially at cost. The cost of intangible asset comprises its purchase price, including import duties and non-refundable purchase taxes, after deducting trade discounts.

After initial recognition, an intangible asset shall be carried at its cost less any accumulated amortization and any accumulated impairment loss.

### **Impairment**

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount, such reduction is recognized as an expense immediately.

### **Gain or Loss on Disposal**

Gain or losses on disposal on intangible assets shall be determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset. These shall be recognized in profit or loss and included in the income statement.

### **Amortization**

The depreciable amount of intangible asset with a finite useful life shall be allocated on the straight line basis to write off the cost over the estimated useful lives. Assets of which exact date of purchase is not known amortization is provided for the whole year in which they were purchased. Amortization will be provided on the year of the sale/disposal in proportion to the number of months the assets over the estimated useful life of assets.

Amortization is charged on intangible asset as follows.

• Software	-	20%	per annum
• Online Books	-	20%	per annum

## **6. Receivables**

Receivables are stated at the amounts that they are estimated to realize.

### **Interest Receivable**

Interest receivable is at the balance sheet date calculated as per rates confirmed by the respective banks.

## **7. Cash & cash equivalents**

Cash & cash equivalents comprise cash & bank balances and short term investments.

## **8. Cash flow statement**

The cash flow statements have been prepared using the “Indirect Method” for the purpose of the statement of cash flow. Cash & cash equivalents are comprised cash & bank balances, short term deposits less bank overdraft.

## **9. Employee Benefits**

### **Defined benefit plans**

Provision is made in the accounts for retirement gratuities at rates applicable under the payment of Gratuity Act No. 12 of 1983. Although employees should complete a minimum period five years of continued employment to qualify for gratuity payments under the Act, provision is made from the commencement of employment on the assumption that all employees intend to continue in employment to at least five years. As per the Commission Circular Number 05/2019 issued by University Grant Commission, Academic Allowance paid for Academic Staff and MCA paid to Non-Academic staff, also considering for the purpose of calculation of Gratuity with effect from 01.06.2019.

### **Defined Contribution Plans -UPF & ETF**

Employees are members of the University Provident Fund and Employees Trust Fund. Contribution to defined contribution plans, UPF,EPF,& ETF are recognized as an expense in the income statement as incurred.

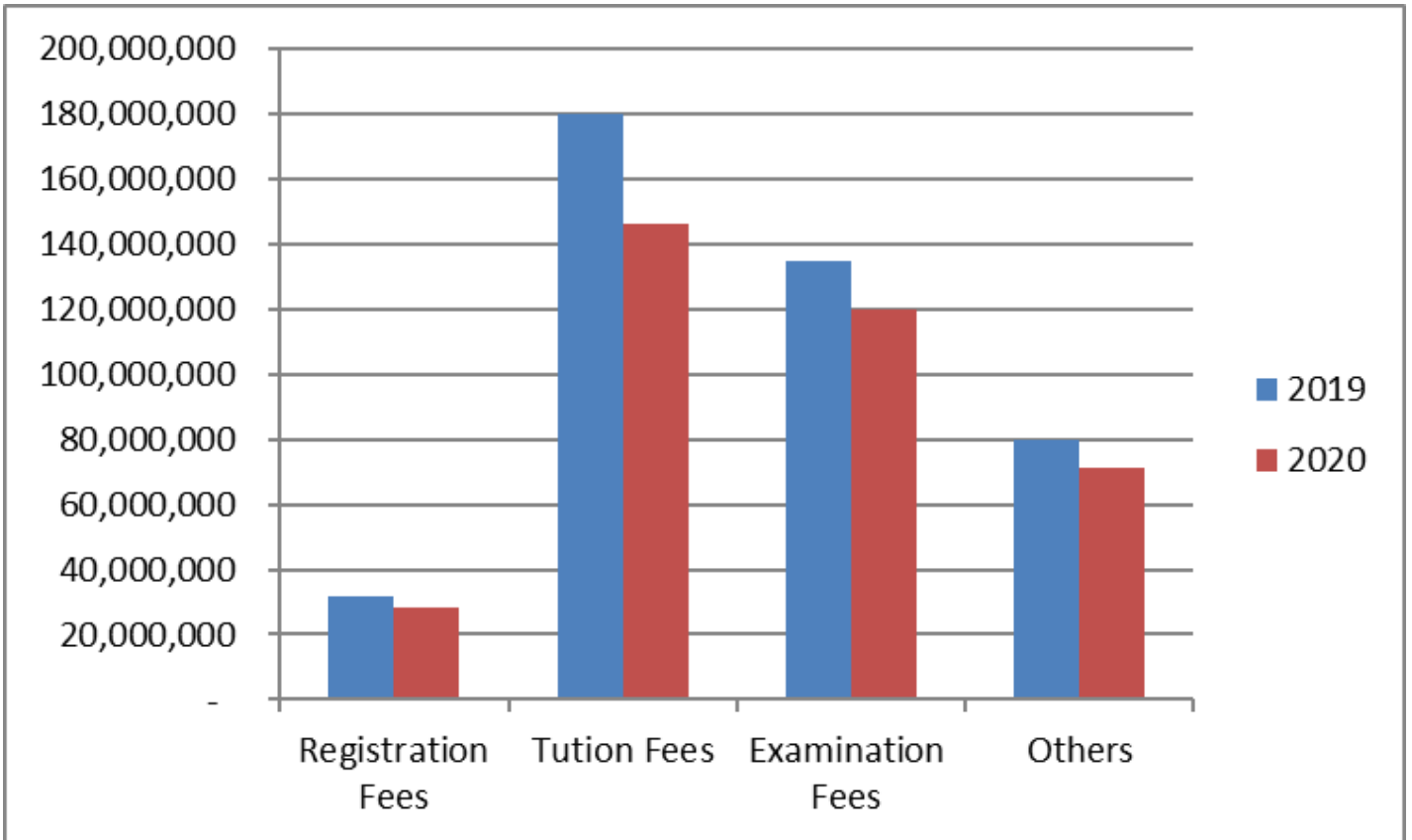

## **15. Report on Future expectations based on Sustainable Development**

The Postgraduate Institute of Medicine endeavors at developing the Specialist Doctor's Service, in order to pave the way for Sri Lanka towards Sustainable Development through the generation of a society that is in good health.

Accordingly, our major objectives are set at improving the Specialist Doctor's Service in a qualitative manner and providing quality Specialist Doctor's services in a convenient and effective manner to every Citizen of the country (Rural and Urban both).

In this, the University Grants Commission, the Ministry of Higher Education, Technology and Innovation and the Ministry of Health work hand in hand with our Institution. There are two landmarks that our Institution regulates in order to reach Sustainable Development Goals.

One landmark is the increase of the number of Specialist Doctors through provision of a quality Medical Education. To achieve this landmark, the PGIM has created certain standards to ensure quality education. In this regard, the PGIM has established different committees to scrutinize postgraduate programmes and curricula to match national and global health demands.

The second landmark is to increase the health and life expectancy of the people of this country by prioritizing the improvement of the specialist Doctor's Service and accordingly introducing new Medical programs that are recognized as necessary, for example, Elderly Medicine programs, Human Nutrition programs, Child health programs. Additionally, the PGIM has revised curricula of different postgraduate programmes to include many health and life expectancy aspects.

The Country would easily reach its goal of Sustainable Development through the provision of facilities for every citizen of the country to obtain the services of specialized Doctors and the provision of a qualitative Post Graduate Medical Education to doctors with the aim of increasing the level of health of all the citizens and upgrading the health facilities of children as well as men and women of all ages in order to increase their healthy lifespan. Postgraduate medical education in which doctors develop competencies under supervision after completion of their basic medical qualification, and it is the final preparation step for certification and/or licensure of doctors.

The Postgraduate Institute of Medicine is the only institution currently responsible for conducting postgraduate Diploma, Masters and MD programs. The subject boards include relevant experts from all the universities. The MD program includes a minimum of one year of foreign training in a recognized centre in the UK, Australia, New Zealand, Singapore or India. The PGIM offers specialization in all major disciplines and most subspecialties. The Ministry of Health is responsible for providing cadre positions in all specialties. The number of specialists in most disciplines is inadequate to fill even the existing vacancies. To fill all the vacancies, the PGIM offers courses to medical doctors and thereby produce specialist doctors in the country.

Necessary steps have been taken to collect data that required to fulfill the need for specialist Doctors of the country through the following methods.

1. Obtain details regarding the number of Doctors who serve as Specialist Doctors in Urban as well as Rural Hospitals.
2. Obtain information from the Medical faculties of all the State Universities.
3. Further, taking steps to identify particular diseases based on the gender and other health related requirements of the general public and train Specialist Doctors accordingly. For example: - Gynecology, Elderly Medicine.
4. Obtaining information through Military Hospitals and Police Hospitals.
5. Obtaining information via Private Hospitals.
6. Gathering information from Ministry of Health and Directors of Hospitals

To achieve the above, the infra structure of all hospitals including rural areas also to be equally enhanced, so that the specialist doctors could provide excellent services to all citizen of the country

Further this institution has been rendering an excellent service under the prime goals of Sustainable Development i.e. health and wellbeing, green concept etc. In this connection the PGIM has established a Health Centre and a day care center for the staff of the PGIM to improve the health and wellbeing of the PGIM community. Additionally, awareness programs have been conducted to inculcate the PGIM community on energy conservation, new technological applications such as Microsoft Teams, environmentally friendly behavioral changes, and healthy eating practices

Moreover, the PGIM has taken green initiatives to make a Green PGIM. These green sustainable initiatives will promote to conserve water and energy and a clean environment. Introduction of the green concept within the institute was established in 2020 in order to make it fully sustainable by formulating the notion in written form. A green committee was also established to execute the plan. The committee has been functioning on different environmental aspects since last year. The PGIM's green concept, comprises a defined purpose, vision, mission, and a set of principles. The PGIM has replaced CFL bulbs of the main campus with LED bulbs and only LED bulbs were installed in the recently built Academic Center at Rodney Street, which could be considered a smart building. Moreover, the PGIM has shifted to inverter A/Cs, master switches, and low-power energy-efficient equipment. Also, the shared usage of office equipment such as copiers and scanners is encouraged. The most progressive step among the green initiatives is becoming a paperless institute. It is compulsory to do all correspondence and submissions via electronic mails except for theses, fulfill all internal transactions through Microsoft Teams, and conduct every board meeting and lecture online. This approach has reduced ~65%-70% of the paper usage. Hand dryers have been installed in the smart building, eliminating paper waste generated due to single-use paper towels. Double-sided printing has been encouraged. Also, since about two years ago, the PGIM community has utilized glass utensils and biodegradable cups. The lunch sheets are not allowed in the cafeteria; instead, everyone should bring a container. Waste segregation is done into separate bins as per the CMC standards.

## **1. Financial Statements**

### **1.1 Qualified Audit Opinion**

The Audit of Financial Statements of the Postgraduate Institute of Medicine affiliated to the University of Colombo for the year ended 31<sup>st</sup> December 2020 comprising the Statement of Financial Position and the Statement of Financial Performance, the Statement of Changes in Equity and the Cash Flow Statement for the year ended on that date and a summary of significant Accounting Policies and other explanatory information was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154(1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka and the provisions of Section 12 of the National Audit Act No 19 of 2018 read together with Section 108(1) of the Universities Act and Section 20 of the Post Graduate Institute of Medicine Ordinance No 01 of 1980 vested under Section 18 and Subsection 107(5) of Universities Act No 16 of 1978. This report will be tabled in the Parliament in due time as per Article 154 (6) of the Constitution.

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matters described in the section " Basis for the Qualified Audit Opinion" of this report, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the Financial Position of the Institution as at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2020 and its Financial Performance and the cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

### **1.2 Basis for the Qualified Audit Opinion**

- (a) As per paragraph 65 of the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards 07, remaining value and the useful life time of an asset should be reviewed at least in the ending day of all annual reporting periods and as per the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards 03, this must be accounted as change in the audit estimate. However, as regards the property, plant and equipment valued at a fully depreciated total of Rs. 306,946,647 has not been accounted in this manner.
- (b) Owing to the fact that accrued expenses which can be conclusively estimated have been shown as Rs. 1,109,188 in excess in contravention to paragraph 18 of the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards 08 and the accrued expenses to the total of Rs. 545,000 for the year under review has not been accounted, in the financial statements the excess of the year under review has been shown as Rs. 564,188 in excess.
- (c) Due to the fact that depreciation of Rs. 820,000 for the year under review for a motor vehicle purchased at Rs. 4,100,000 on the 31<sup>st</sup> of December 2015 has not been accounted, the excess for the year and the net value of the assets as at the end of the year has been over calculated from that amount.

I have conducted the audit following the Sri Lanka Auditing Standards and my responsibility under these Auditing Standards has been further explained under the section the responsibility of the auditor. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

### 1.3 **Other details in the Annual Report 2020 of the institution.**

Here, the other details means the details included in the Annual Report 2020 of the institution I have obtained prior to this audit report and what is not included concerning this in my audit report. The management is responsible for these other details.

My opinions on the financial reports do not cover the other details and I do not express any assurance of any type or an opinion with regard to this.

In respect of my audit on financial statements, my responsibility is to consider whether the details obtained when available or obtained otherwise tallies with the financial statements in quantity according to my knowledge. I have nothing to report in this regard.

### 1.4 **Responsibility of the Management and Administrating Authorities for the Financial Statements**

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these Financial Statements in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards and for such internal control as the management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatements, whether due to fraud or error.

It is the responsibility of the Management to decide upon the ability of the Institute to operate continuously, and the Management is also responsible for accounting on the basis of continuous operation of the Institution and to disclose matters that relate to the continuous operation of the Institute, in every instance other than when the Management decides to liquidate the Institution or to stop operating where no other option is available.

The responsibility over the financial reporting process of the Institution is borne by the operating authorities.

The Institute has to properly maintain ledgers and reports on its own Income, Expenditure, Assets and liabilities in a manner that the annual and timely financial statements can be prepared in accordance with sub section 16 (1) of the National Audit Act No 19 of 2018.

### 1.5 **Auditor's Responsibility over the audit of financial statements**

My objective is to provide a fair confirmation that the financial statements are free from material misstatements arising due to, fraud and error and to issue the auditor's report that includes my opinion. Although reasonable assurance is of high value, it will not be an assurance that it will always disclose material misstatements when conducting an Audit as per the Sri Lanka Auditing Standards. Material misstatements may occur due to the individual and collective effects of fraud and error, and it is expected that it may affect the economic decisions taken by the users based on these financial statements.

The Audit conducted by me was done with a professional judgment and skepticism in accordance with the Sri Lanka auditing standards, and further

- For the identification and assessment of quantitative misstatements possible in financial statements due to fraud or error, appropriate audit procedures have been planned and implemented for the finding of a base for the audit opinion expressed. The effect caused by a fraud is powerful comparable to effect of a misstatement causing from error because fraud is usually committed by collusion, preparation of false documents, intentional avoidance, misstatement or avoidance of internal controls.
- Although an understanding of the internal control of the Institution was procured in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, it was not intended for making an opinion on the effectiveness of the Institute's internal control.
- The fairness of the accounting policies and the accounting estimates used and the appropriateness of related disclosures made by the management were evaluated.
- The relevance of using the basis of continuous operation of the Institute for accounting was decided based upon the audit evidence obtained regarding the existence of a quantitative indecision regarding the continuous operation of the Institution, due to instances or circumstances. If I deduce that there is adequate indecision, the attention of my audit report is to be directed at the related disclosures in the financial statements and if the said disclosures are insufficient my Opinion has to be modified. However, continuous operation might end upon future incidents or situations.
- The presentation, structure and the content of the financial statements that include the disclosures was evaluated and it was agreed that the transactions and instances that provided a base for that were entered in a suitable and a fair manner in the financial statements.

The administrating authorities have been notified regarding the important audit findings, major internal administrative weaknesses and other such information identified during my Audit.

## **2. Report on other legal and regulatory requirements**

2.1 The National Audit Act No 19 of 2018 includes special provisions with regard to the requirements mentioned below.

2.1.1 As per the requirement mentioned in Section 12 (a) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, I have obtained all the information and explanations required for the audit, and the Institute had kept proper financial reports as evidenced by my review.

2.1.2 As per the requirement mentioned in Section 6 (1) (d) (III) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 the financial statements of the Institute are consistent with the preceding year.

2.1.3 As per the requirement mentioned in Section 6 (1) (d) (IV) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 the financial statements produced include the recommendations made by me in the previous year.

2.2 Upon the procedure followed and evidences obtained and upon limitation to quantitative facts, nothing worthy of making the following statements came under my attention.

- 2.2.1 As per the requirement mentioned in Section 12 (d) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, that any member of the Institution has any direct or indirect connection that is outside of a general business condition regarding any contract entered in to by the Institution.
- 2.2.2 As per the requirement mentioned in Section 12 (f) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, that the Institute has acted in non compliance with any relevant written law or to any other general or special provisions issued by the administrative board of the Institute.
- 2.2.3 As per the requirement mentioned in Section 12 (h) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, that the Institute has acted in non - compliance the powers, functions and duties of the Institute.
- 2.2.4 As per the requirement mentioned in Section 12 (i) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, that the Institute has not utilized upon procurement the resources of the institution economically, effectively and productively.

### **3. Other Facts**

- (a) Payable balance of Rs. 30,656,944 with the amounts retained shown under current liabilities as at 31 December 2020 has been observed as old balances from one year to four years. However, the payable balances out of these balances with no liability any longer have not been re-adjusted to the income.
- (b) No action has been taken until the end of the year under review to utilize the balance in the PGIM Research and Publication Fund amounting to Rs. 3,605,803 remaining from the year 2018 with a proper plan for the objectives of the fund.
- (c) No action has been taken to utilize for the respective tasks the amount of Rs. 1,625,666 the total collected in the years 2018 and 2019 for the rehabilitation of fixed assets and for library books and report publications.

**1. Financial Statements**

**1.2 Basis for the Qualified Opinion**

- (a) Action will be taken to obtain the assistance of the Department of Valuation to provide with necessary knowledge required to the officers of the institution whose existing knowledge on this regard is not sufficient to assess the usable life time of technical assets in the institution.
- (b) Payable expenditure for transport allowances, examination charges, lecturer fees are obtained from the examination and study divisions at the end of the year. However, since these divisions did not have the ability to properly calculate the amount for such expenses an estimate has been submitted. This has been indicated as provisions distinguishing from the profit. Action is underway to keep proper accounts after obtaining the accurate amount of liabilities for the year 2021 upon discussion with the said departments.
- (c) Action has been taken to rectify this defect in the year 2021. ( Annexure No. 02 – J/N 00001C )

**3. Other Facts**

- (a) Action has been taken to notify in written form to the respective division to make the payment of the amounts so retained. (Annexure No. 03 ). Further, it has been noted to rectify respective retained amounts for the previous years to be entered as non – current liabilities.
- (b) Since the targeted tasks of the PGIM Research and Publication Fund were not in operation during last two years the funds could not be used.
- (c) Action will be taken to utilize the balance of the funds for respective expenditures in the year 2021.
