MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR GENERAL



I am delighted to share the message for the Annual report of 2020 as the Director General of Sri Lanka Institute of Advanced Technological Education. Of course, 2020 was a challenging year for us due to the pandemic situation of Covid-19. But we were successful in maintaining the quality of the ongoing courses conducted by SLIATE and were able to proceed our new target as well. Especially, actions were taken to upgrade the SLIATE into degree awarding status as per the national policy framework “Vistas for Prosperity Splendor”. For this,

Ministry arranged a lot of meetings with us along with high officials to amend the SLIATE Act in order to achieve the degree awarding status. This is a mile stone in the history of SLIATE. We hope to achieve this degree awarding status in the year 2021.

Due to COVID 19 pandemic situation, all the higher educational institutes were closed from March 2020 and with the government decision all ATIS were closed for the students to avoid spreading COVID 19. During this period the activities were well planned to minimize the effect to the academic activities of the students. Online lectures were conducted by the academic staff & it was a new experience for the SLIATE Academic staff and they conducted the lectures effectively and the participation of the students were also quite satisfactory. SLIATE was able to conduct examinations in classroom mode during 2020 after the reopening of the ATIS in May, 2020.

Though there was a critical threat of Covid-19 in 2020, SLIATE successfully completed the construction works of building complexes for ATI Galle, ATI Kegalle, ATI Kurunagala and ATI Kandy. All these new buildings have been fully furnished. In addition, furniture for the ATIS were immediately purchased to facilitate the teaching & learning environment at these ATIS. SLIATE has been revising the curriculum of all the courses and according to that curriculum revision of HNDTHM & HNDEM programs were completed in 2020 with the guidance of consultants.

There was a huge need for SLIATE to establish MIS unit, Quality Assurance Cell and Carrier Guidance Unit in order to maintain a constant quality of existing programs. For this purpose, initial steps were taken during 2020.

Based on 2020 AHEAD Project, CCTV surveillance system was installed at 12 ATIS and SLIATE for the purpose of monitoring and developing security services. SLIATE always paves a way to

improve the infrastructure facilities among all ATIS. Another new way of conducting meetings with all ATIS Island wide was recognized due to COVID -19 pandemic situation, that is Video conferencing units which were established at 19 ATIS & SLIATE to facilitate to conducting meetings & other activities without physical gathering. Of course, this was very effective and successful while conducting monthly meetings and it was very convenient for the academic staff who are very far away. Proxy server – configure was fixed for each ATI to monitor & filter incoming & outgoing traffic (data).

First time in the SLIATE history a platform was introduced for the new students-2020 to submit the application via online. It was very much successful and we received a number of applications for different programs. Through this process we were able to facilitate the student recruitment with less paper works, less time with high accuracy and the recruitment process was formalized with new procedure.

SLIATE always pays attention for the development of ATIS. In the year 2020 initial works for contract awarding was completed for the multistoried buildings for Nawalapitiya and Mannar ATIS. To enrich the knowledge of academics MSc. Scholarships were awarded to Academics & Academic supportive staff through AHEAD project. Infrastructure facilities of ATIs were improved in 2020 to facilitate teaching-learning environment in an effective way. In order to improve the infrastructure facilities at ATIS SLIATE took the responsibility to fulfil such needs. Up to 90% of the construction works of five -store buildings projects were completed. Among these construction projects the building for ATI Galle was completed.

Though there is a considerable growth in the process of SLIATE, still we have to achieve a target to further enlighten the dream of our students. Degree awarding status is our ultimate goal and we have to travel towards our goal.

I extend my heartfelt gratitude to the dedicated staff of SLIATE, Governing Council, Ministry of Higher Education, Senior Executive staff, the students and those who gave support for the development of SLIATE. Without their support and cooperation nothing would have been achieved. We look forward to welcome the year 2021 with lots of hope for the development of SLIATE further.

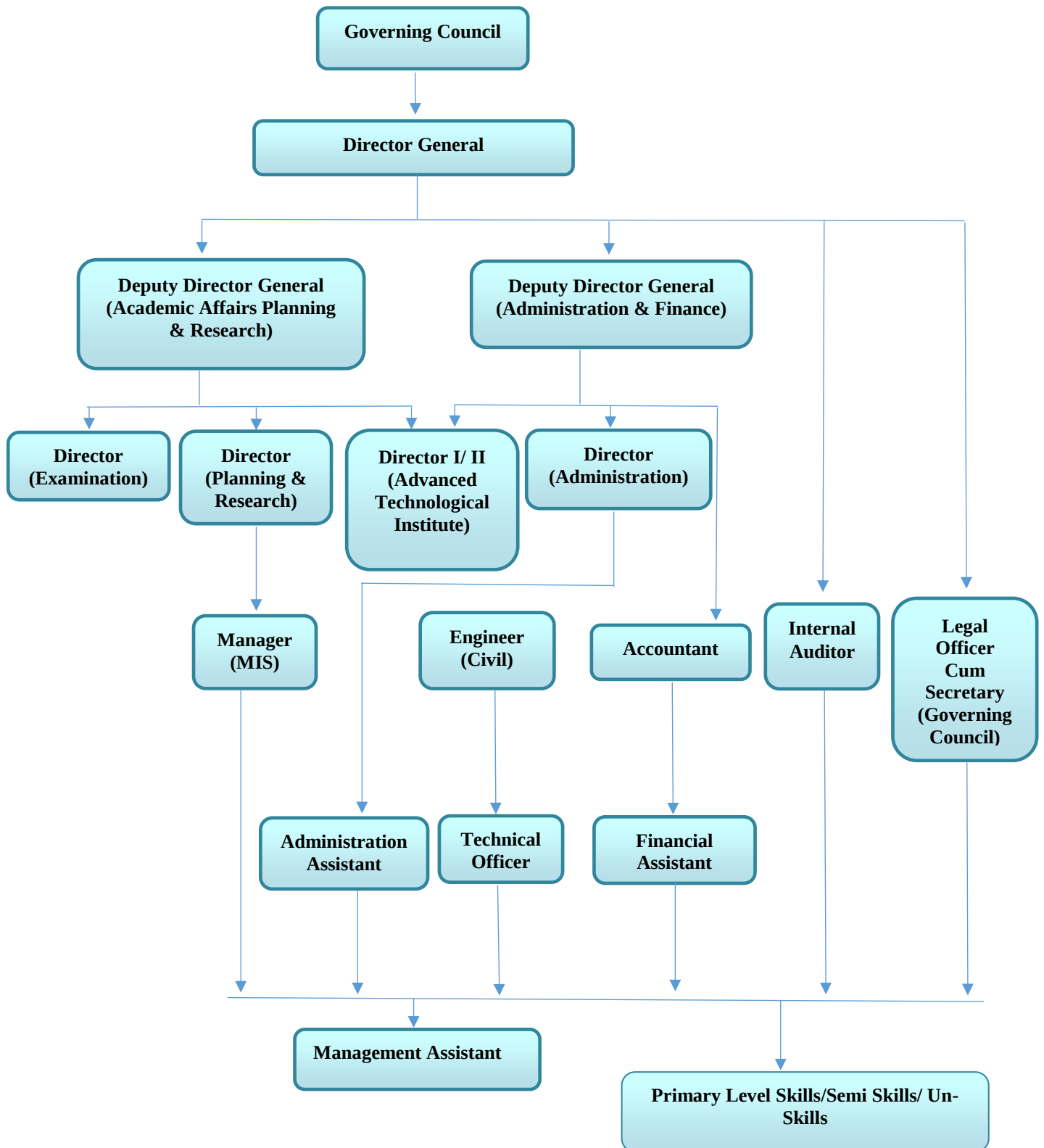

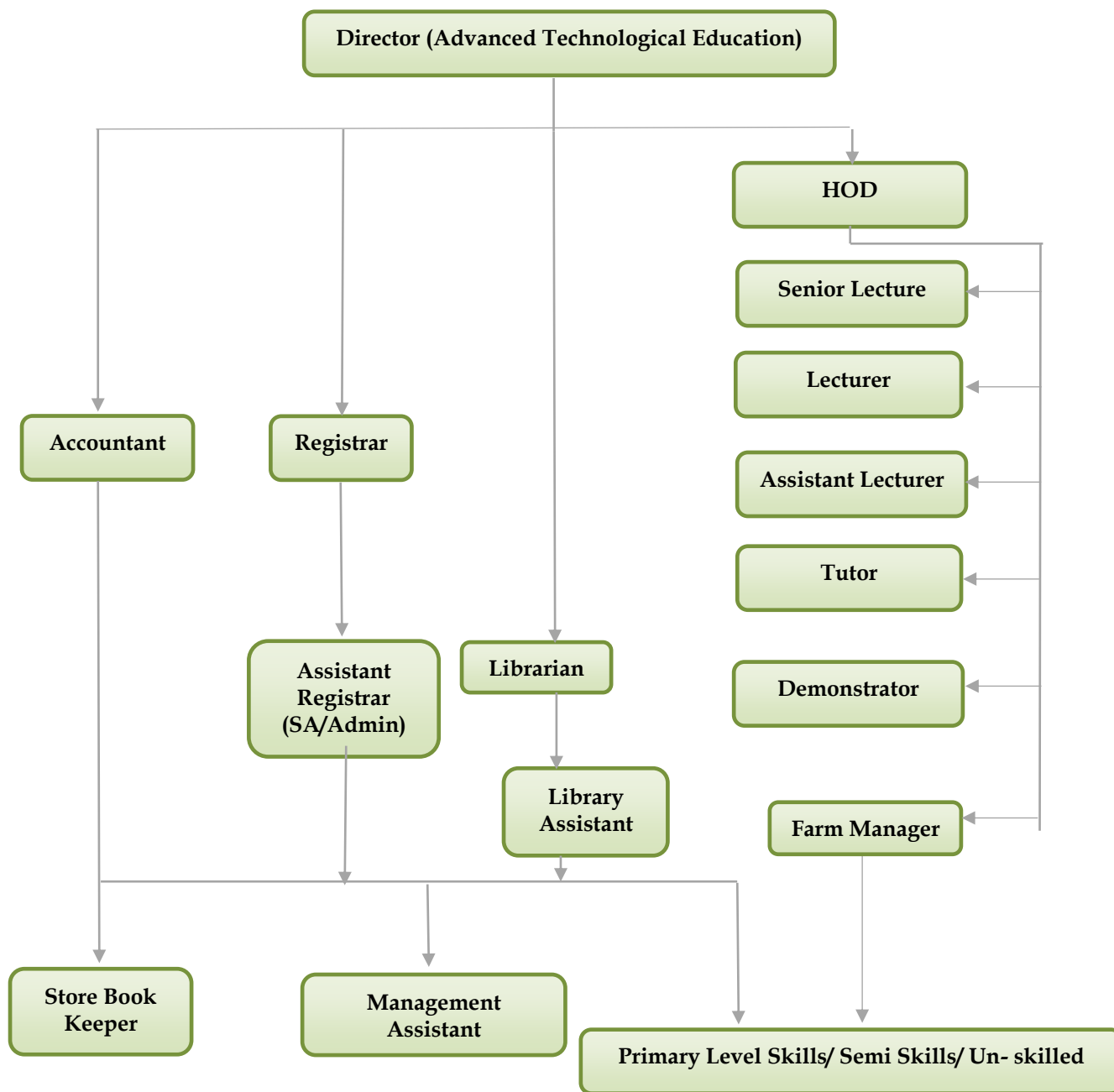

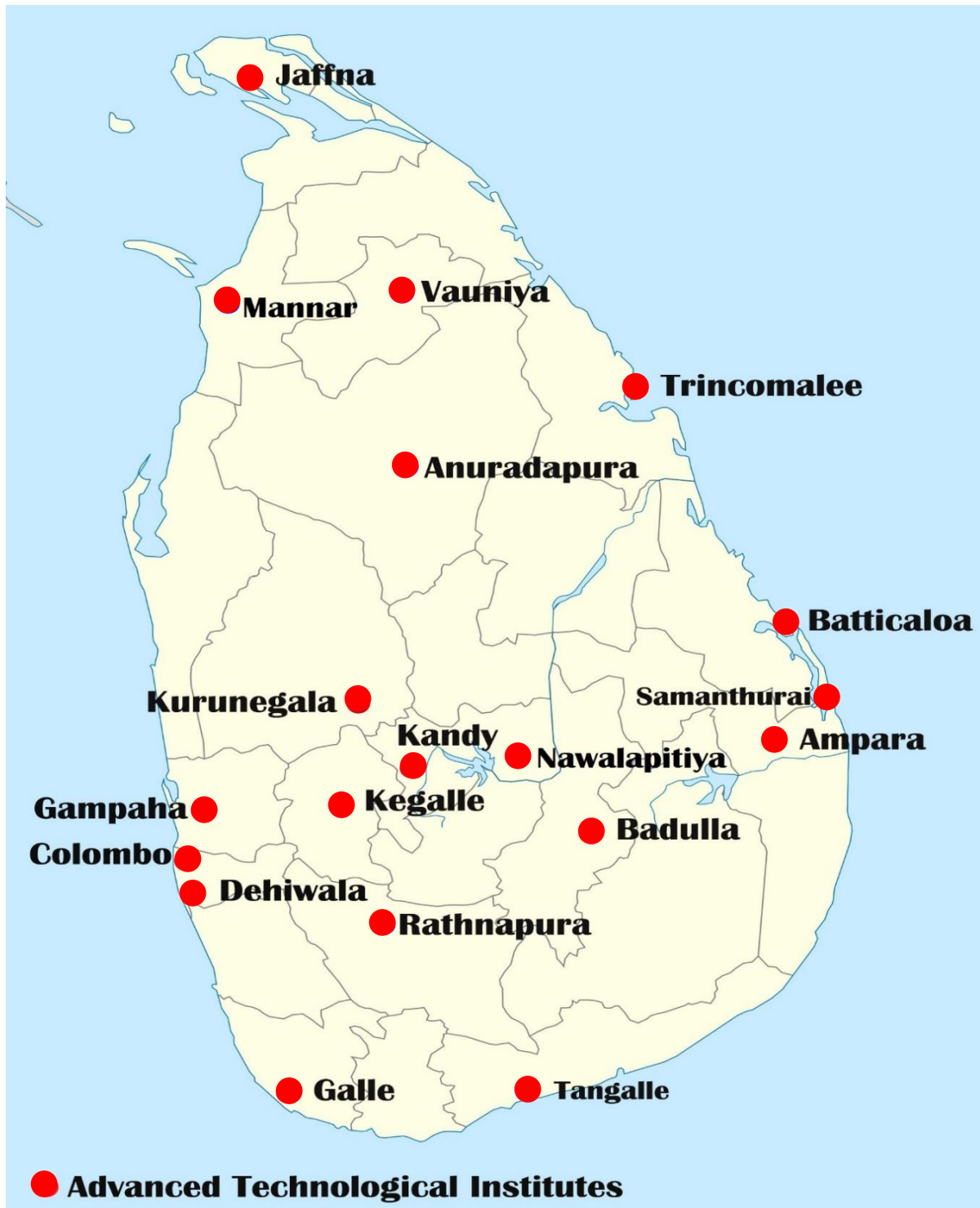
ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE OF SLIATE

PLANNING & RESERACH DIVISION

Planning & Research division is responsible for the preparation of action plan for SLIATE and ATI and coordinate the implementing of action plan. Preparation of Annual Report, preparation of progress of implementing action plan, providing financial aid for staff development program, selection of student to award Mahapola scholarships, granting research allowance for the staff of SLIATE and preparation of academic related policy papers are handled by this division.

Research Allowance

Sri Lanka Institute of Advanced Technological Education provides facilities for its staff members to engage in research works. For this, research allowances are paid in accordance with the Management Services Circular 02/2014 and research facilities are provided covering five (5) main areas. Those disciplines are Management and Accounting, English, Engineering, Information Technology as well as Agriculture and Food Science.

Necessary action will be taken to review the research proposals received in these areas with the recommendation of the Research Management Committee and the approval of the Research Supervision Committee.

This is supported by two groups of internal and external reviewers, with the help of a panel of research experts selected from the Sri Lanka Institute of Advanced Technological Education as an internal reviewers and a team of researchers with extensive knowledge of research in the Sri Lankan university system as external reviewers.

According to the circular currently in force, if the research proposals submitted for review are approved, the payment of the research grant will commence by backdating the date of submission. In addition to the above circular, Sri Lanka Institute of Advanced Technological Policies also apply to research activities.

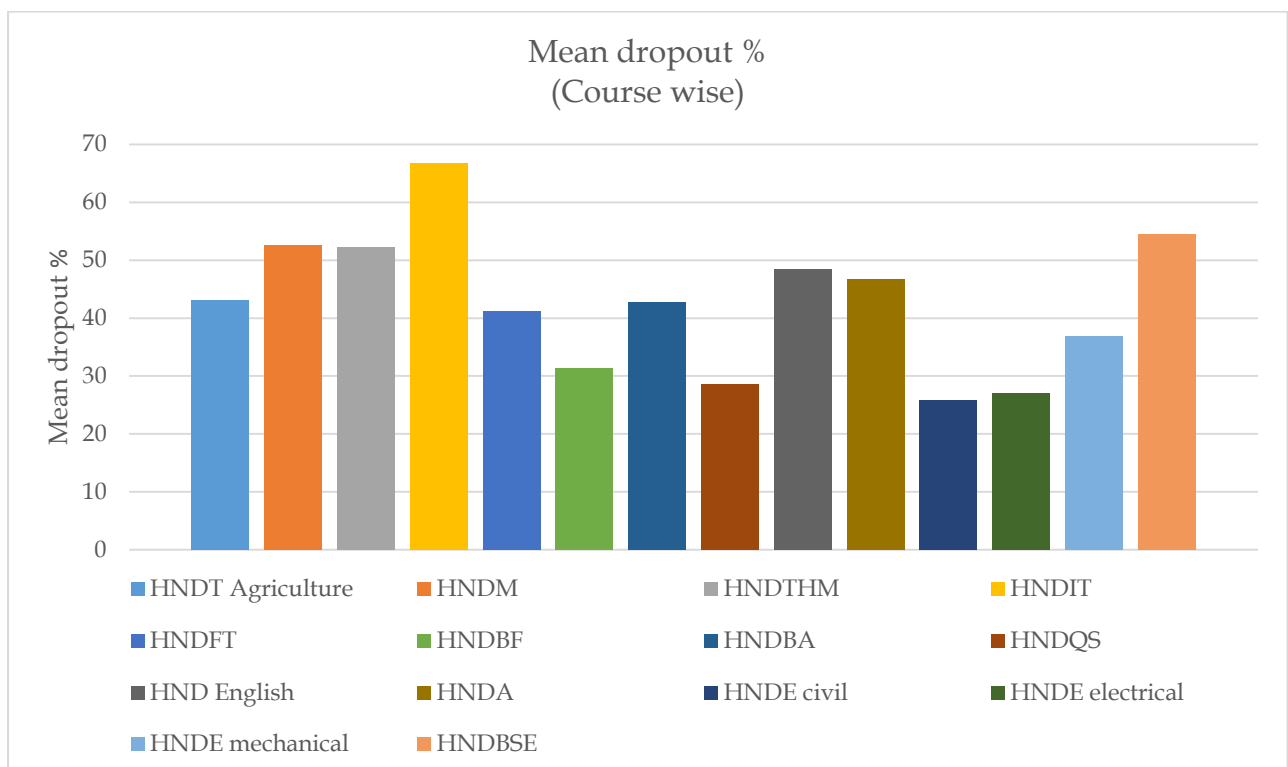

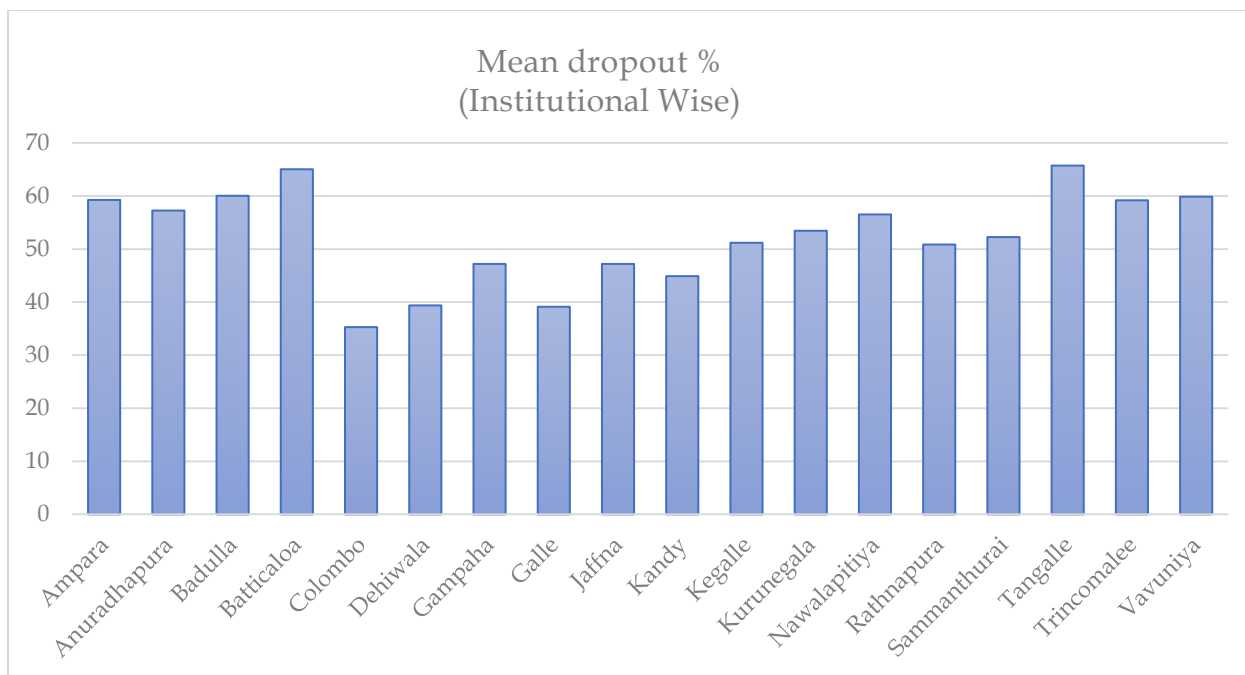

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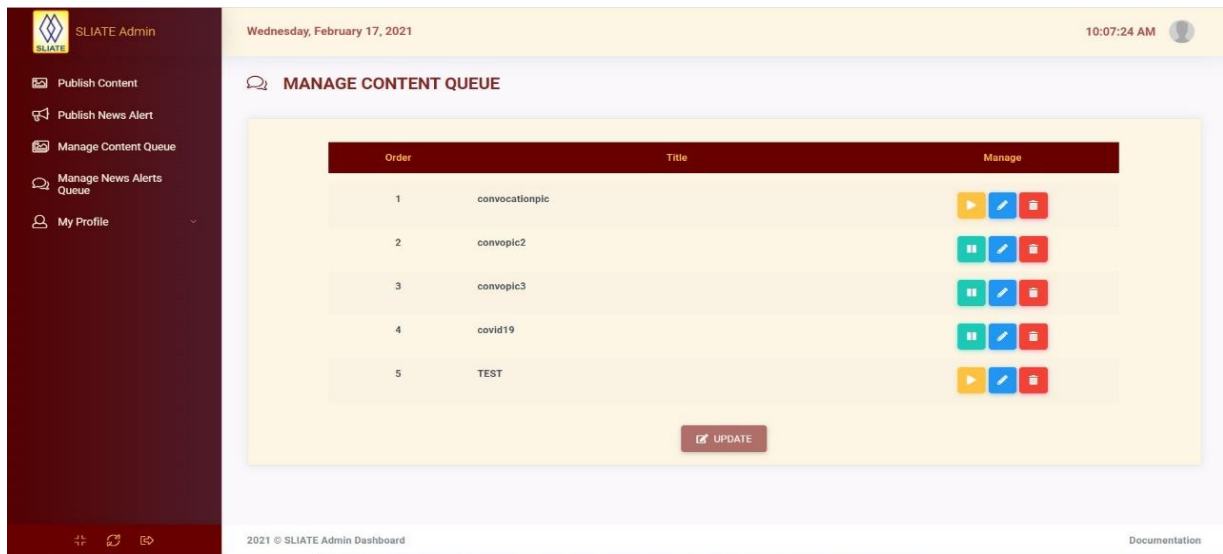
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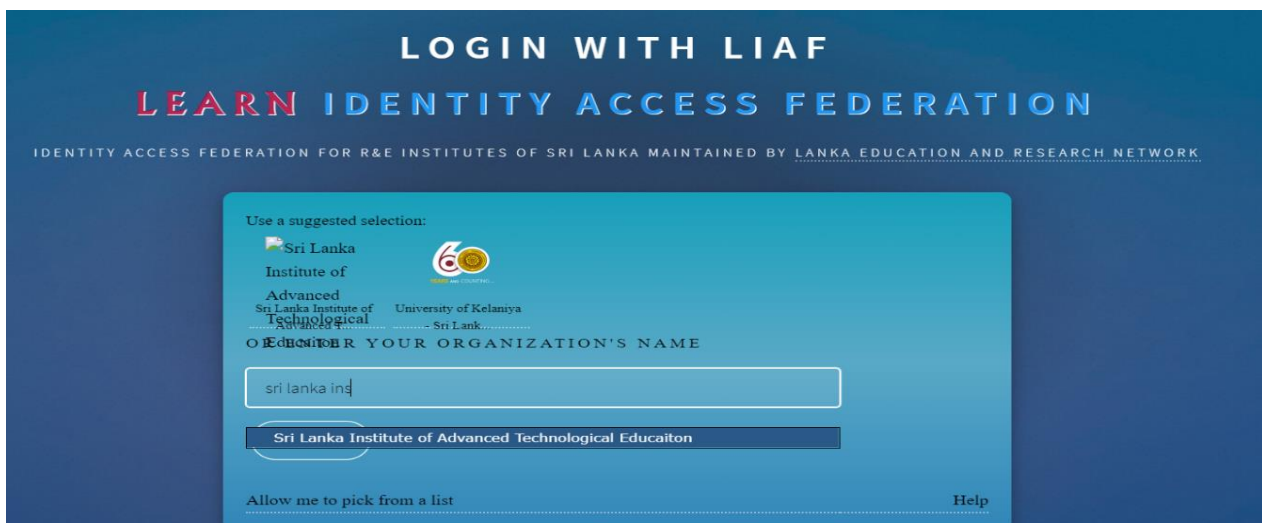
- Island wide coverage of CCTV was established in required ATIS including SLIATE.

There are 19 Advanced Technological Institutes (ATI) with 648 staff and 30000 students as the beneficiaries of SLIATE. 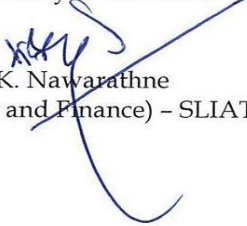

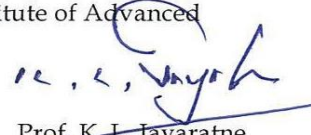

The role of the internal audit is to strengthen existing internal control systems, introduce new control systems, evaluate institutional processes in accordance with circulars, assess and regulate compliance with regulatory policies, identify and weak controls and take appropriate action accordingly.

- Provided relevant details to the 'Comptroller General Office' according to 'Non-compliance for asset management' circular no 04/2019.
- Prepared quarterly report for Audit management meeting at the Ministry of Education
- Provided details for audit evaluation carried out by 'Department of Auditor General'.
- Prepared 'Action Plan' of Internal Audit Department.
- Prepared 'Progress Report' of Internal Audit Department.
- Provided details for preparation of Annual report of SLIATE.
- Prepared answers to 'Audit Report' relevant to the financial report year ending 31st December 2019 in accordance with the 12th section of National Audit Act.

The Audit and management meeting did not hold during the financial year 2020 due to the non-availability of new office bearers. The recent COVID -19 situation in the country was also factored to not holding an Audit and management meeting.

However, the Internal Audit department held meetings with the Director General at different times to strengthen the effectiveness and efficiency of the internal controls. Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements and Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements of the Sri Lanka Institute of Advanced Technological Education for the year ended 31 December 2020 in terms of Section 12 of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

1. Financial Statements

1.1 Opinion

The audit of the financial statements of the Sri Lanka Institute of Advanced Technological Education (Institute) for the year ended 31 December 2020 comprising the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2020 and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in equity and cash flow statement for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies, was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154(1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read in conjunction with provisions of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018. My report to Parliament in pursuance of provisions in Article 154 (6) of the Constitution will be tabled in due course.

In my opinion, the accompanying financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Company as at 31 December 2020 and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

1.2 Basis for Opinion

I conducted my audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards (SLAuSs). My responsibilities, under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of my report. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

1.3 Other information included in the Institute's 2020 Annual Report

The other information comprises the information included in Institute's 2020 Annual Report but does not include the financial statements and my auditor's report thereon, which is expected to be made available to me after the date of this auditor's report. Management is responsible for the other information.

My opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and I do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with my audit of the financial statements, my responsibility is to read the other information identified above when it becomes available and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or my knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

When I read the Institute's 2020 Annual Report, if I conclude that there are material misstatements therein, I am required to communicate that matter to those charged with governance for correction. If further material uncorrected misstatements are existed those will be included in my report to Parliament in pursuance of provisions in Article 154 (6) of the Constitution that will be tabled in due course.

1.4 Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of financial statements that give a true and fair view in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards, and for such internal control as management determine is necessary to enable the preparation

of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing Institute's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Institute or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Institute's financial reporting process.

As per Section 16(1) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, the Institute is required to maintain proper books and records of all its income, expenditure, assets and liabilities, to enable annual and periodic financial statements to be prepared of the Institute.

1.5 Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

My objective is to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for

one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Company's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of the management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Institute's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Institute to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

I communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during my audit.

2. Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

2.1 National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018 include specific provisions for following requirements.

- 2.1.1 I have obtained all the information and explanation that required for the audit and as far as appears from my examination, proper accounting records have been kept by the Institute and section 12 (a) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.
- 2.1.2 The financial statements presented is consistent with the preceding year as per the requirement of section 6 (1) (d) (iii) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.
- 2.1.3 The financial statements presented includes all the recommendations made by me in the previous year as per the requirement of section 6 (1) (d) (iv) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.
- 2.2 Based on the procedures performed and evidence obtained were limited to matters that are material, nothing has come to my attention;
 - 2.2.1 to state that any member of the governing body of the Institute has any direct or indirect interest in any contract entered into by the Institute which are out of the normal cause of business as per the requirement of section 12 (d) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.
 - 2.2.2 to state that the Institute has not complied with any applicable written law, general and special directions issued by the governing body of the Institute as per the requirement of section 12 (f) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.
 - 2.2.3 to state that the Institute has not performed according to its powers, functions and duties as per the requirement of section 12 (g) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.
 - 2.2.4 to state that the resources of the Institute had not been procured and utilized economically, efficiently and effectively within the time frames and in compliance with the applicable laws as per the requirement of section 12 (h) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

2.3 Other Audit Observations

- (a) Although the 5 storied Leadership Quality Development Center building at the Dehiwala Institute of Advanced Technology is yet to be completed under the Higher Education Project for the 21st Century at an estimated cost of Rs. 512 million, only 3 floors were completed at a cost of Rs. 113.8 million and handed over to the company on 21st February 2017. Due to non-completion of work on the remaining two floors, the building remained idle until the audit date of 30 September 2021, and the warranty period for the equipment installed in the building had expired.

- (b) Although Rs. 19,784,000 was paid to the Contractor on 07 June 2019 for the completion of the initial work of installing a solar power system to reduce the electricity cost of the Dehiwala Institute of Advanced Technological Education, the system could not be activated due to failure to obtain bulk electricity connection till 30 September 2021. The institute had incurred an expenditure of Rs. 2,510,435 as electricity expenses for the period from June 2019 to December 2020
- (c) No action had been taken to take over the legal ownership of the lands in 9 districts, on which buildings were constructed and Advanced Technological Institutions were run.
- (d) A sum of Rs.6,987,493 had been paid to a contractor as Value Added Tax for the contracts done for 08 Advanced Technological Institutions during the period from 2014 to 2018, who was an unregistered private contractor to pay VAT to the Inland Revenue Department. The amount so paid had not been recovered by the end of the year under review.
- (e) Although it is planned to carry out a total of 51 procurement activities amounting to Rs. 135.6 million for 17 institutions and divisions including the Head Office of the Institute of Advanced Technology during the year under review, no work had been done until the end of the year.

Also, the warranty period had expired without utilizing the equipment installed inside and outside the building.	The project consists of two main phases. The first phase of the building consists the first three floors, and the fourth and fifth floors include the second phase. Also, the second phase had to start as soon as one phase was completed. Phases one and two had to be done separately from each other as independent projects. The first phase has been successfully completed by the Contractor and handed over to the Institute of Advanced Technological Education, Sri Lanka. But in order for the proposed project to be implemented, the second phase of the project had to be completed. This is because some of the work related to the first three floors had to be done during the construction of the other five floors. Examples include wet exposure of exterior walls, painting of exterior walls, covering of elevator openings and installation of elevators, continuation of internal stairwells and prevention of water flow through the building. All of this construction has been difficult to use until the end, because it will be unsafe for downstairs occupants

		when using downstairs when construction is taking place upstairs and there may be obstacles to carry out construction on the upper floors. After completing the procurement work for the second phase, the Institute of Advanced Technological Education of Sri Lanka has carried out the relevant activities up to the appropriate level to award the project to a contractor to carry out the contract. However, the second phase of the project could not be implemented due to non-approval by the Treasury of the required financial provisions for the second phase. In such a case it is not possible to use the content components of the building. At present, the Secretary to the Ministry of Education has requested that the relevant allocations for the completion of these constructions be re-requested and that the necessary steps be taken to complete the construction of this eight storied building. • The basement floor of the three-storied building, which is included in Phase (1), is designed for parking, and the other two floors are found to be inadequate to accommodate the entire head office premises. Further, in order for the proposed project to be utilized, the second phase of the project had to be completed. This is because some of the work related to the first three floors had to be done
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		during the construction of the other five floors. Examples include wet exposure of exterior walls, painting of exterior walls, covering of elevator openings and installation of elevators, continuation of internal stairwells and from that prevention of water flow through the building. Approximate additional provisions are required.
	(b) Although Rs. 19,784,000 had been paid to the Contractor on 07 June 2019 for the completion of the initial work of installing a solar power system to reduce the electricity cost of the Dehiwala Institute of Advanced Technological Education. However, due to failure to obtain bulk electricity connection for activate the system till the date of audit report, the institute had incurred an idle expense of Rs. 2,510,435 as electricity expenses for the period from June 2019 to December 2020.	Information related to this audit query was examined in the relevant project file maintained by the Engineering Division of the Institute of Advanced Technological Education of Sri Lanka and on the basis of that data, four other similar projects were launched in parallel with the relevant project. These 05 projects were implemented in association with Advanced Technological Institutes in Galle, Kandy, Ampara, Gampaha and Dehiwala. The solar power systems of the Advanced Technological Institutes in Kandy, Ampara and Galle are now successfully operational.
	(c) No action had been taken to take over the legal ownership of the lands on which the buildings of 9 districts were constructed and the institutions of higher technical education were run.	Necessary steps have already been taken to acquire the legal rights in this regard and those activities are in progress.

	(d) A sum of Rs. 6,987,493 had been paid to as value added tax (VAT) to a private contractor who was not registered for value added tax with the Inland Revenue Department, for contracts obtained for 08 Advanced Technological Institutions during the period from 2014 to 2018. PROGRESS OF SD GOAL 4 (SLIATE Goal 1 & 2) IN 2020

- A. Increased access & opportunities in advanced technological education which covers the target 4.3 and target 4.5 of the sustainable development goals.

Director-General of World Health Organization declared the outbreak of COVID-19 a Public Health Emergency of International Concern on January 2020 and on 11 March 2020, COVID-19 was characterized as a pandemic. The first Sri Lankan who was affected with the virus identified in 11th March 2020. With this situation all the education and higher educational institutes of Sri Lanka declared closed and lock down the country as a precaution to avoid spreading of the disease. With this situation student recruitment for the year 2020 was postponed. Actions were taken to call applications for the recruitment through online platform but selection of students for the academic programs were further postponed to year 2021 due to the second wave of the COVID 19 pandemic situation.

- B. Improved quality, employability and entrepreneurship of diploma holders:
Revised the curriculum of HND program to meet the industrial requirement and to enhance the job opportunities for the students.

Targets for 2021

- Increase the student intake for the academic year.
- Upgrade the SLIATE to a degree awarding institute based on the committee report of the appointed committee by Ministry of Education.
- Developing Curriculum for the proposed degree programs.
