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Message from the Director General



I am immensely pleased to have the opportunity to issue this message on the Performance Report for the year 2021, which marks the current progress of the Department of Civil Security. We, being the only auxiliary force established in Sri Lanka that consists of nearly 34,500 Manpower, 24 Forces, 06 training schools, and 03 special projects, contribute to rebuilding the country in the post-era of the brutal war that prevailed for thirty years.

In addition to the main duties assigned; the department carries out large-scale agricultural projects by prioritizing Paddy cultivation through its strong network of forces spread throughout Sri Lanka by embarking on a path of sustainable development through the Green Agriculture industry. Members of the Civil Security Department are also carrying out high-quality cashew cultivation projects where cashews are sold at high prices in the local and foreign markets together with the assistance of Sri Lanka Cashew Corporation. We are happy to say that contributing to earning a significant level of foreign income by export is an achievement fulfilled. To make Gotabaya Rajapaksa's Vistas of Prosperity a real, the Large-scale projects of producing organic fertilizers were started at the forces level last year upon the instructions of the Honorable Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksa and with the guidance of the Defense Secretary General Kamal Gunaratne (Retd.) following the government policy to promote a green agriculture industry. It also resulted in satisfying the fertilizer requirements of the department.

This department was entrusted with the restoration of the Dighavapiya shrine, which had fallen into collapse and ruin, as well as the Kuragala shrine, which was under the grip of other religious extremists. Accordingly, the construction of the said places is executed rapidly in a manner that rebuilds the grandeur and solemnity of the past and enhances the devotion of Buddhist living all over the world. “Sandahiru Saya”, which is a grand monument built to remember the heroic soldiers who made their supreme sacrifice for victory in the war, was built and offered to the Maha Sanga last year enabling people to worship the said dagoba. This department contributed to the construction of the dagoba by producing 67 lakh bricks specially made and supplying considerable labor. Further, the department is currently assisting to protect many archaeological sites with historical value that exist under the influence of various external parties and have the threat of destruction while providing security services to government institutions.

Many special measures have been taken to improve the professional skills of the Civil Defense members rendering a commendable service to the country, and different kinds of programs have been executed to develop attitudes and skills and improve their job satisfaction through particular motivation strategies. Apart from that, the Seva Vanitha Unit also provides new houses to the members of the Civil Security Department who do not possess houses, gives assistance to complete the construction of half-finished and unfinished houses, and provides free educational equipment such as books, laptops, etc., needed for their children for educational purposes. Thus, it has become the prime objective of the Civil Security Department to give a helping hand to the members therein to lead a professional and social life at a higher level and to maintain higher standards of living.

The Department of Civil Security is committed to bringing about the sustainable development of the motherland and continues to provide the maximum possible contribution to build the country in the future as well through to provide the necessary support to maintain law and order.

I sincerely wish the officers, Civil Defense Staff, and the Civil Staff engaging in those tasks in a manner that is efficient and effective the strength and courage they need.

1 Institutional Profile/ Executive Summary

1.1 Introduction

1.1.1 Replacement and evolution

As per Cabinet Decision (අම/06/135/206/052) dated 02.08.2006 the Home Guard Service was established to assist the Sri Lanka Police Service under Section 52 of the Manpower and Supplementary Forces Act No. 40 of 1985. It was established as a new department named the "Department of Civil Security".

Under this department, 23 Force Headquarters and 05 Training Schools were established with a workforce of nearly 36,000 personnel.

As per the Extraordinary Gazette Notification dated Friday 12th June 2015, the posts of District Officers, Warden, Special grade, Warden, Sub Warden, and Civil Security have been declared as pensionable posts. As per the Cabinet decision of 05th March 2015, the role of the department was further expanded to carry out development activities in rural areas, Provincial Councils, and Local Government Institutions, using the vast manpower pool of the department to transform the same into a revenue-generating institution

1.3 Key Functions

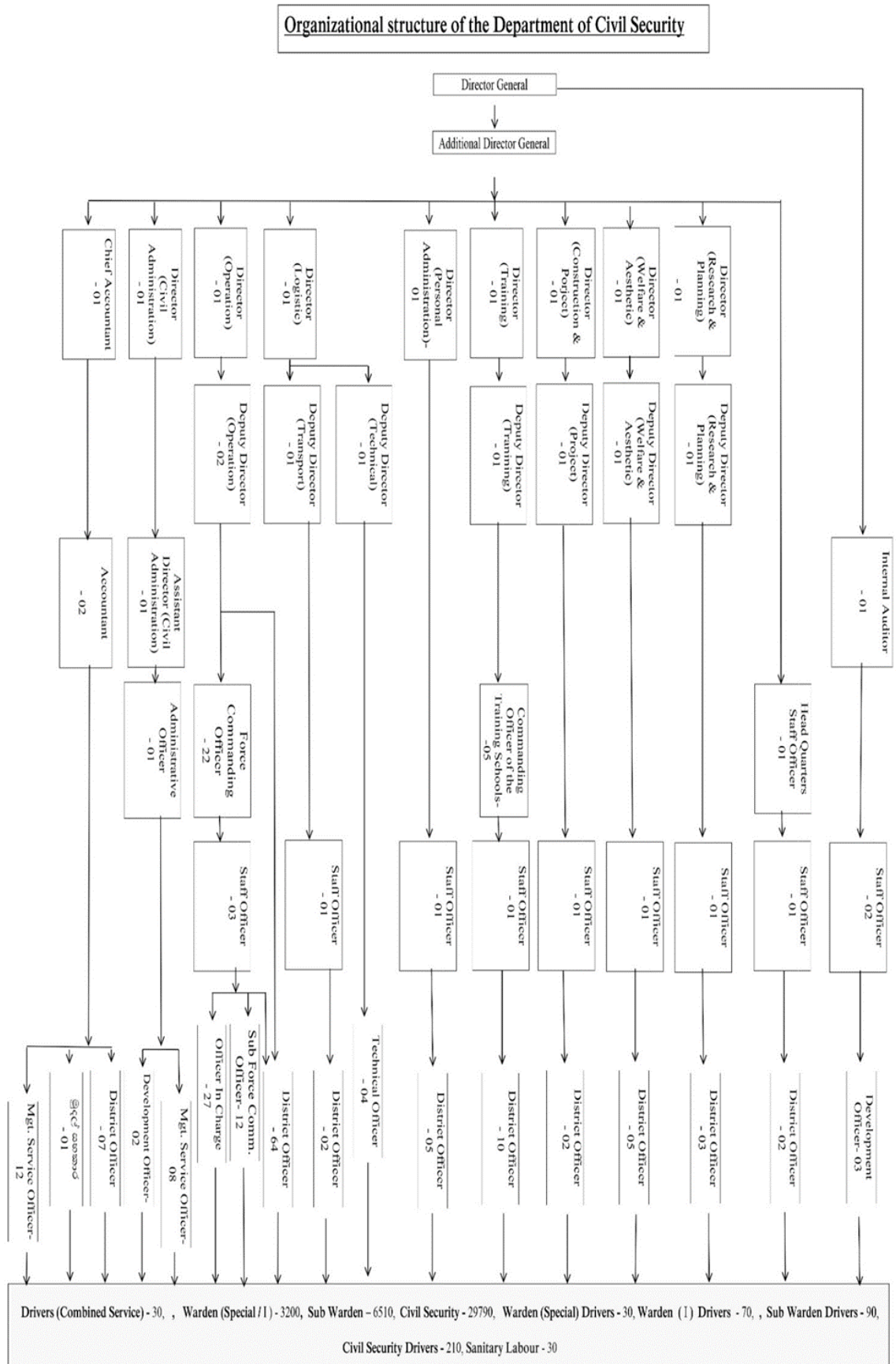
1. To Act as a paramilitary force to assist the Armed Forces and the Police Service, in the event of a security situation arising in the country.
2. Take action to protect the villages and towns that are affected in the event of a terrorist threat.
3. Assist the Armed Forces and the Police in maintaining law and order in the country.
4. Engage in security activities related to festivals and other important occasions of national importance.
5. Assist in disaster management activities in the event of various disasters (floods, landslides, tsunamis etc.) occurring in the country.
6. Provide services of the labor force in carrying out small and medium scale construction work of Provincial Councils and Local Government Institutions, Temples and Religious Places of worship.
7. Provide security services in agreement with the department and procuring security services for government institutions.
8. Provide the services of the department’s cultural groups for the ceremonial occasions in government institutions.
9. Provide the services of the members of the Civil Security Force, to assist the officers of the Department of Wildlife Conservation, in minimizing the damage caused by human-elephant conflicts in relevant areas.
10. Ensure the security of places of archeological value throughout the island and providing security as when required for places of tourist importance.
11. Support social welfare activities.
12. Engage in special functions prescribed by the President, the Minister in charge of the subject or the Government.

1.3.1 Various Special Projects Assigned to the Department of Civil Security

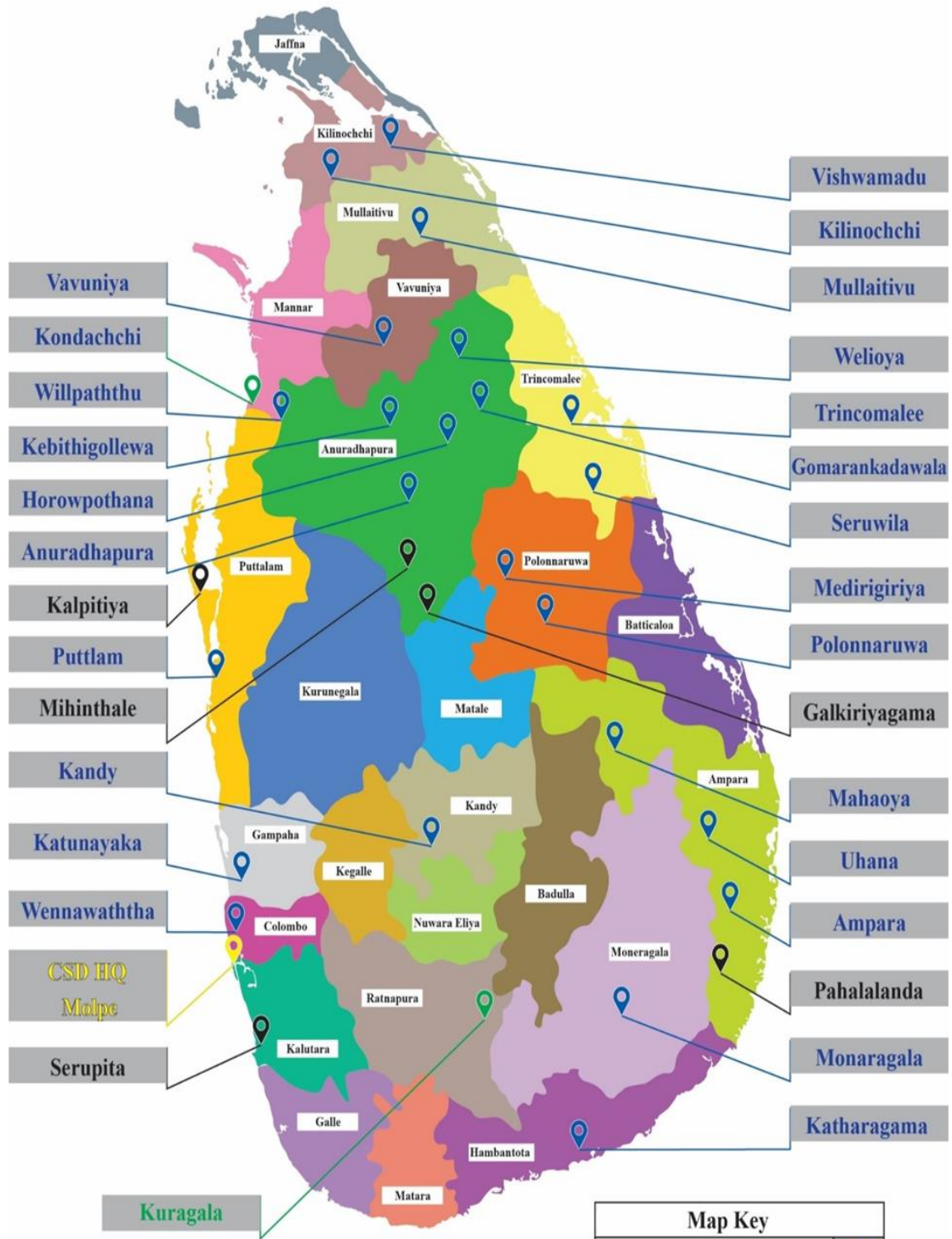

- Installation and maintenance of large-scale water filters covering North and North Central areas.

2 Progress and the Future Outlook

2.1 Progress of the Department

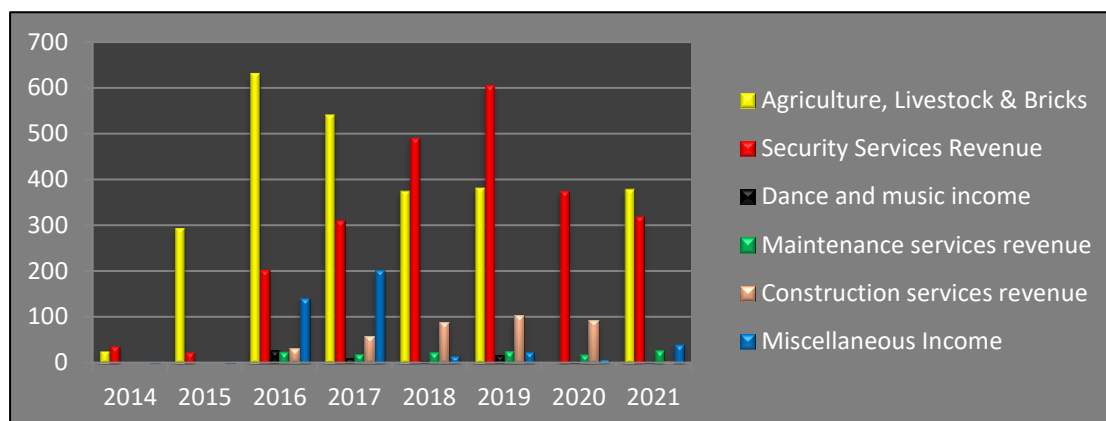
The Department of Civil Security contributed to the government's national development campaigns such as the “Nagenahira Nawodaya”, the “Uthuru Wasanthaya” and the Prosperity Vision after the war victory. Accordingly, large-scale Agri / livestock projects such as paddy, grain, and vegetable cultivation were undertaken to meet the food demand of the country and to promote food security. Projects required for the construction industry, such as bricks and block stones were also started. These projects are currently being implemented as long-term investments that transmit huge sums of money annually to the General Treasury and continue to contribute to the national development of the country.

In addition, the departmental personnel has been able to generate revenue through the provision of security duties for government institutions, construction, and maintenance of various other services.

Accordingly, Rs. 769.5 million has been credited to government revenue in the year 2021 alone.

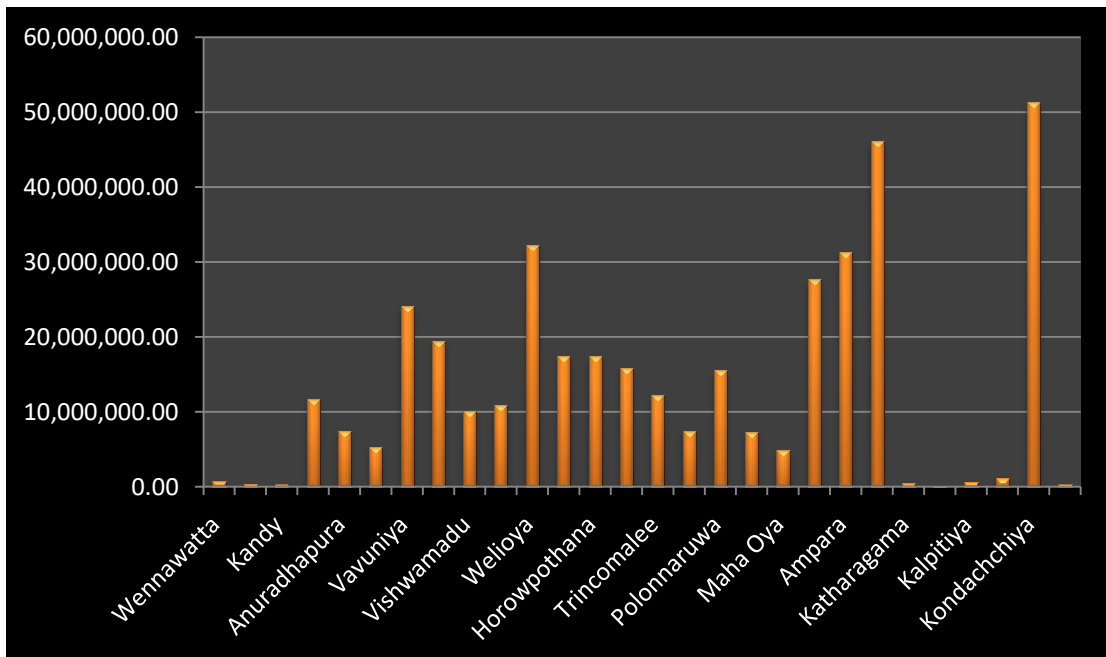

2.1.1 Task Review and Outlook

2.1.1.1 Acting as a Paramilitary Force and Human Resource Management Of The Civil Security Department

After the victory of the war, the main role of the department is to assist the Police service in maintaining law and order in the country. Accordingly, 2206 members of the Civil Security Force have been deployed to 300 Police stations island-wide by the year 2021. These duties will continue to be implemented in the years to come.

2.1.1.3 Reconstruction Project of Digawapi Dagaba

The reconstruction project of Digawapi Dagoba was launched on 22.10.2020 under the concept of His Excellency the President. About 300 Civil Security Force personnel have been deployed for the construction and excavation work.

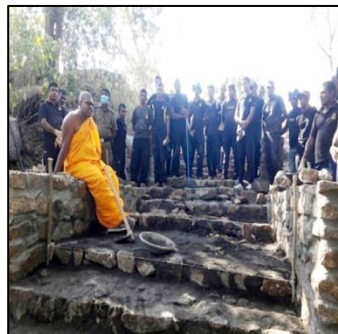
The responsibility for producing 25,000,000 (25 million) engineering bricks for the Dagoba lies with the Civil Defense Force.



2.1.1.4 Resurrection Archaeological Site of Kuragala - Security and Construction Project

On 26.04.2013, the then Secretary of Defense Mr. Gotabhaya Rajapaksa during his visit to Kuragala instructed to Civil Security Department to recruit 54 youths living in the vicinity of the Kuragala Archaeological Site who were caught in the act of paganism. And to deploy them for the conservation of the sacred area. At present 205 troops have been deployed at the Kuragala Project Office.

In addition to the protection and conservation of archeological sites, they are also been deployed in various cultivation projects, government agencies and security duties.



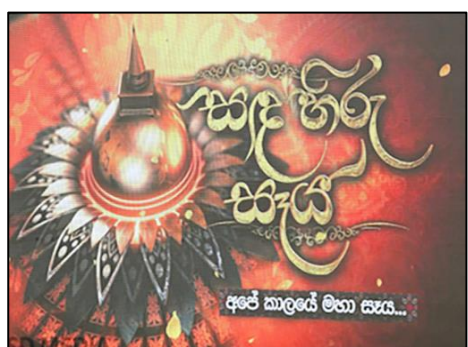
2.1.1.5 Construction and Sacrifice of Sandahiru Seya in Anuradhapura

Sandahiru Seya in Anuradhapura was built to pay homage to the members of the Tri Forces, Police, and the Department of Civil Security who contributed to the end of the Thirty Years' war. It is considered the largest dagoba ever built in the modern era after the Great Anuradhapura era. The opening ceremony was held on November 18, 2021.

The construction works of the Sandahiru Seya were carried out by the members of Tri Forces, the Police, and the Civil Security Department. The Wilpattu Forces' Alayapattu Bricks Project of the Civil Security Department has produced and supplied about 67 lakhs of stupa bricks for the construction of Sandahiru Seya since 2012.

Also, members of the Civil Security Force have been assigned to maintain the stupa and carry out daily duties.

His Excellency the President Gotabhaya Rajapaksa also presented certificates of appreciation to the members of the Civil Security Force who dedicated themselves to the construction of the Sandahiru Seya.



2.1.1.6 Opening the new ward named “Reality of Hope” at Maharagama Apeksha Hospital

Specialist Dr.Vijith Gunasekara, Director, Apeksha Hospital, Maharagama pointed out the requirement of a special corona treatment ward for patients with corona infection.

Accordingly, the project was implemented in collaboration with the Sri Lanka Youth Federation affiliated with the National Youth Services Council under the 'Thousand Beds in Ten Days' program.

It was funded by the Global Wings Charity. State Engineering Corporation and Maga Engineering Institute also imparted technical and engineering assistance.

This "reality of hope" was fully labor-assisted and Constructed by the Civil Security Department.



2.1.1.7 Donation of 10,000 Kumbuk saplings for the National Tree Planting Project

On the instructions of the Director General Major General NR Lamahewa, 10,000 Kumbuk plants from the Maha Oya Force of the Civil Security Department were symbolically handed over to the Hon. Mahinda Amaraweera, Minister of Environment on October 10, 2021 at the Army Headquarters.

The Department of Civil Security provided the Kumbuk plants required for the following programs implemented under the National Project to plant 10,000 Kumbuk saplings jointly by the Sri Lanka Army and the Ministry of Environment.

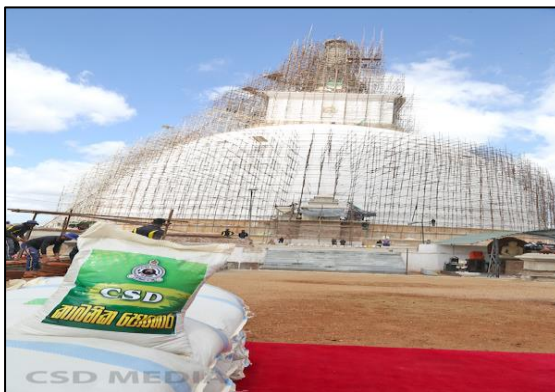

2.1.1.8 Donation of the first stock of organic Fertilizer of the Department of Civil Security for landscaping at Sandahiru Se Sacred Area

The first stock of Organic Fertilizer Produced by the Civil Security Department was handed over by the Director General Major General (Retd.) NR Lamahewa on September 13, 2021, for the landscaping work of the Sandahiru Seya Sacred Area. Department of Civil Security manufactures Organic fertilizers to provide a healthy generation to the country in line with His Excellency the President Gotabhaya Rajapaksa's Vision of Prosperity.

The Organic Fertilizer produced by all the forces of the Civil Security Department island-wide is expected to be provided for agricultural activities during the Maha season according to the national requirement of the country.



In addition, 5,000 kilos of Organic Fertilizer produced by the CSD Ampara Force was handed over to the Ampara Warehouse of the Government Lak Fertilizer Company on December 08, 2021 after laboratory tests and standardization.



2.1.1.9 [Assistance from the Department of Civil Security for beach cleaning](#)

Upon the instructions of His Excellency the President Gotabhaya Rajapaksa, 400 soldiers of the Civil Security Department were deployed to clear the beach from Negombo to Colombo.

Troops from the Civil Security Department have been deployed to safely remove the debris and chemicals that accumulate on the beach daily. These activities are carried out under the guidance and full supervision of the Disaster Management Center and the Marine Environment Protection Authority.



2.1.1.10 [Kondachchiya Cashew Cultivation Project](#)

The Department of Civil Defense is currently cultivating 1,200 acres of cashew plantations in Kondachchiya.

In addition, the Cashew Corporation provided another 500 acres of land to this department for cultivation. All the activities such as clearing and preparing the land, planting trees are done with the labor contribution and technical knowledge of the CSD members. About 13,000 cashew seedlings have been planted by the members of the department and cashew cultivation has commenced on the existing land.



2.1.1.11 Contribution to constructions

The services of trained CSD workers in the fields of masonry, carpentry, electrical, and plumbing are provided to various public sector institutions and places of worship for construction projects.

2.1.1.12 Construction and maintenance of Electrical Fences

In collaboration with the Ministry of Wildlife, the Department of Civil Security has taken measures for elephant management and eviction, constructed elephant fences, and maintained the said projects to save Human and Elephant lives in areas where elephant-human conflicts are common. Under this, 4521 CSD personnel were deployed to maintain 316 electric fences of 4645 km in length.



2.1.1.13 Ensuring the right to Education of School and Pre-School Children -

Attaching teachers to schools in remote areas

The Department of Civil Security has deployed 186 qualified teachers to 138 schools to ensure the right to education for children in schools with a shortage of teachers in remote areas. They had taken steps to ensure that the students who sat for the Grade 05 Scholarship Examination and the GCE Ordinary Level Examination would pass with distinctions. Therefore, those students have been appraised at the provincial level.

providing teachers who wish to work voluntarily with schools in remote areas where there is a shortage of teachers –

Under this, 186 Civil Security officers have been deployed as volunteer teachers to 138 schools in the North, North Central, and Eastern Provinces.



2.1.1.14 Urban beautification project duties

About 250 troops have been deployed throughout the year for city beautification projects at Vihara Maha Devi Park, Crow Island Beach Park, Colombo Floating Market Complex, and Madiwela Walking Lane.



The Department of Civil Defense will continue to carry out special projects assigned by the Government and the Ministry of Defense from time to time following the current needs of the country, including the above functions.

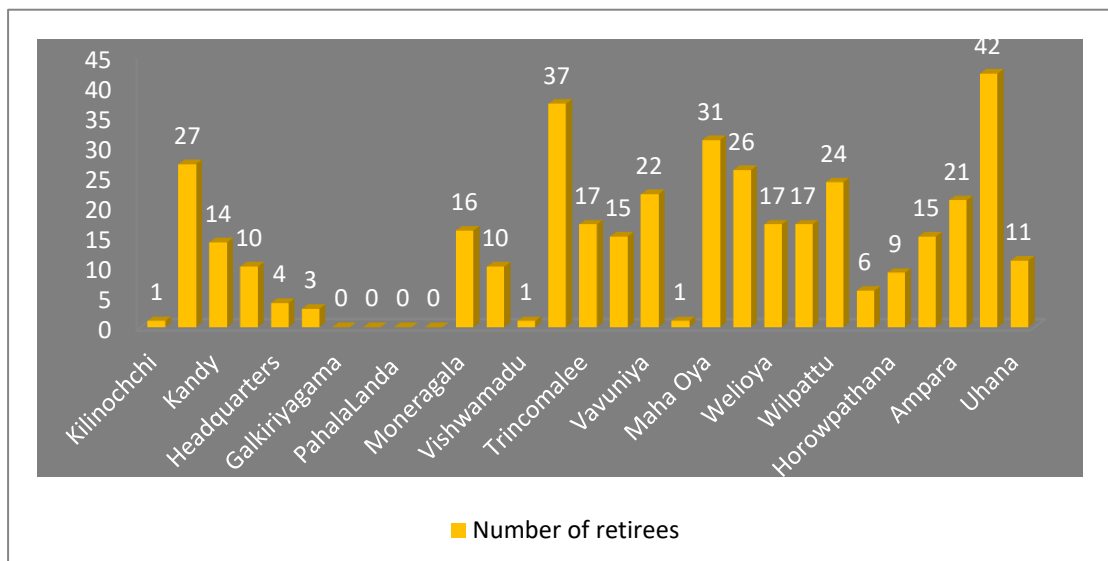

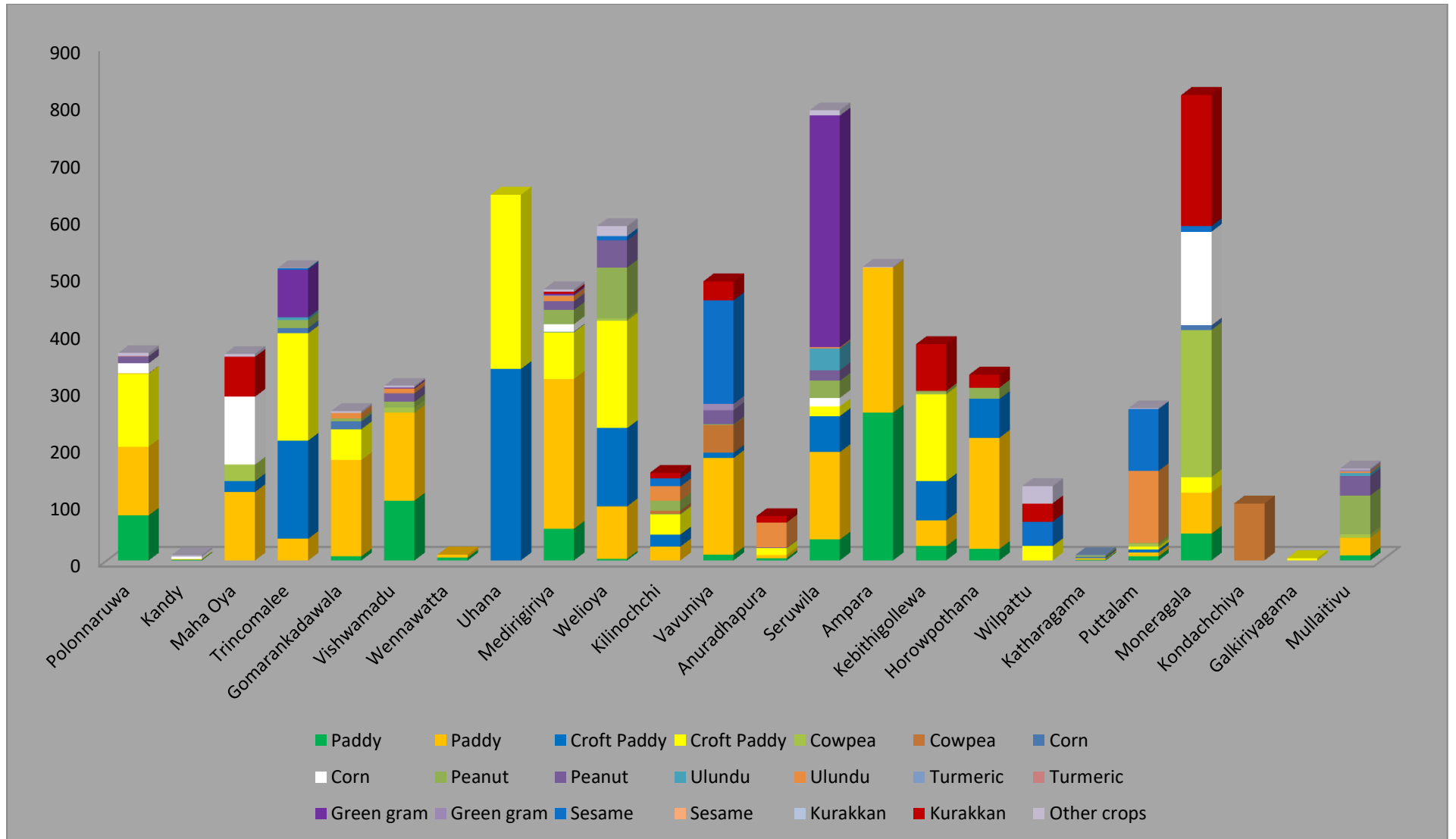

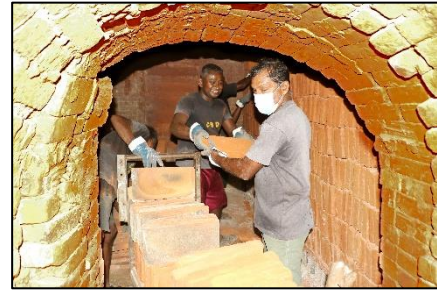

2.3 Progress of Force Headquarters and Training Schools

2.3.1 Force Headquarters - Wennawatta

A. Introduction -

The Western Force H/Q was established on 30 May 2007 and initially consisted of 17 sub-regions. Namely, Colombo, Wennawatta, Nugegoda, Sitawaka, Ratnapura, Panadura, Galle, Mount Lavinia, Kalutara, Elpitiya, Kelaniya, Kuliyaipitiya, Nikaweratiya, Negombo, Kegalle, Gampaha and Kurunegala.

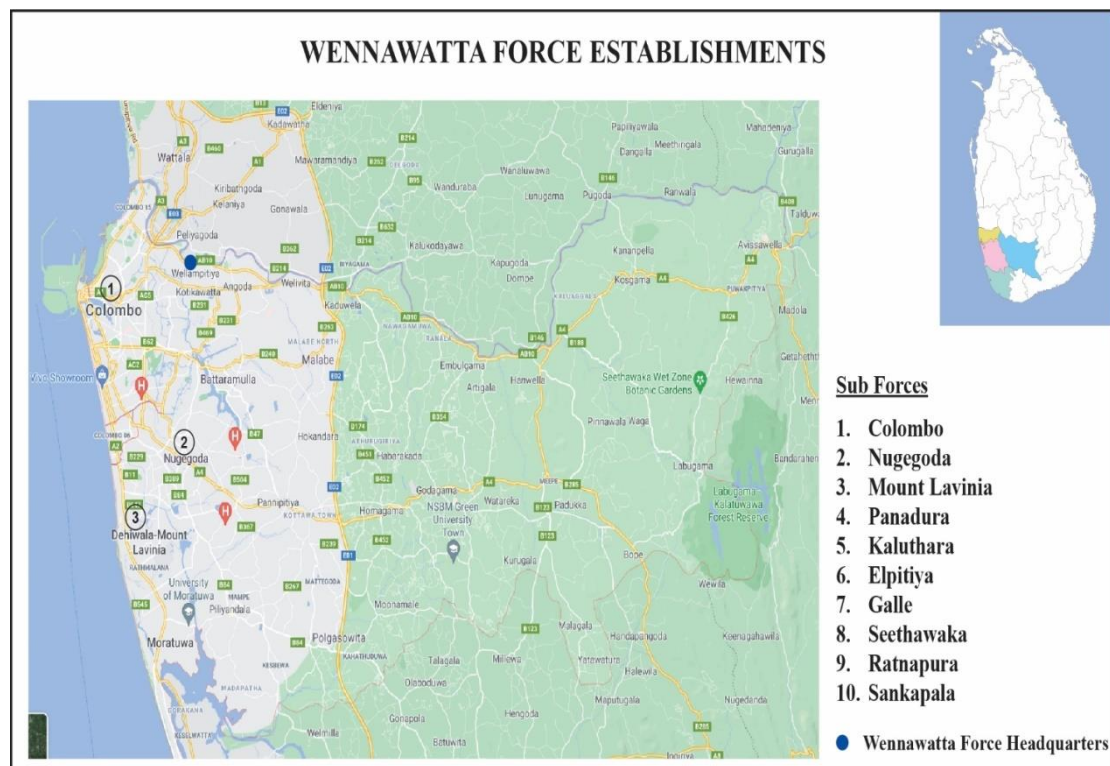
On 1st January 2015, Kelaniya, Kuliyaipitiya, Nikaweratiya, Negombo, Kegalle, Gampaha and Kurunegala sub-divisions are removed from the Western H/Q and established them under the Katunayake Force for easiness of command and control.

B. Role and Task

Providing security and services to government institutions, Police stations, temples, archeological sites and ammunition depots. Further, conducting environmental clean-up and community care programs, carrying out agricultural projects, deploying troops for city beautification duties, assisting in disaster management activities.

Wild elephant threat in Kebithigollewa area is high. Therefore, for the protection of agricultural lands and the safety of the people in the area, watchtowers have been set up at special places where wild elephants are endangered and Civil Security personnel have been deployed on them.

In addition, the following duties have been performed to produce organic Fertilizer by procuring raw materials in this area for the production of non-toxic food.

- As this concept is a recent initiative, there is a lack of Organizational precedents that make this concept successful, enabling it to gain experience, knowledge, and infrastructure.
- The isolation of each of these institutions in the absence of a nationally coordinated program to determine what targets to be set at the institutional level, to tinter-coordinate the said targets, and to review the progress while achieving targets.

6.2 The effect of the shortage or excess in human resources on the performance of the institute

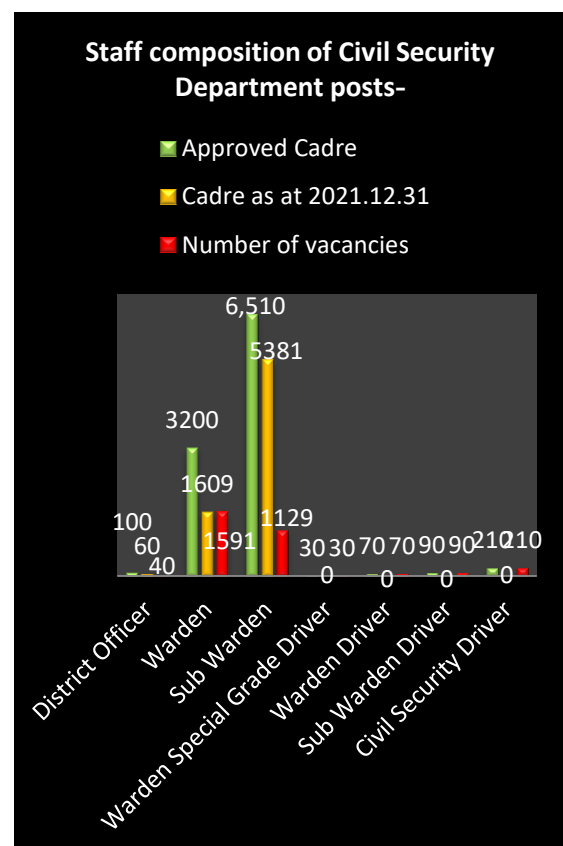
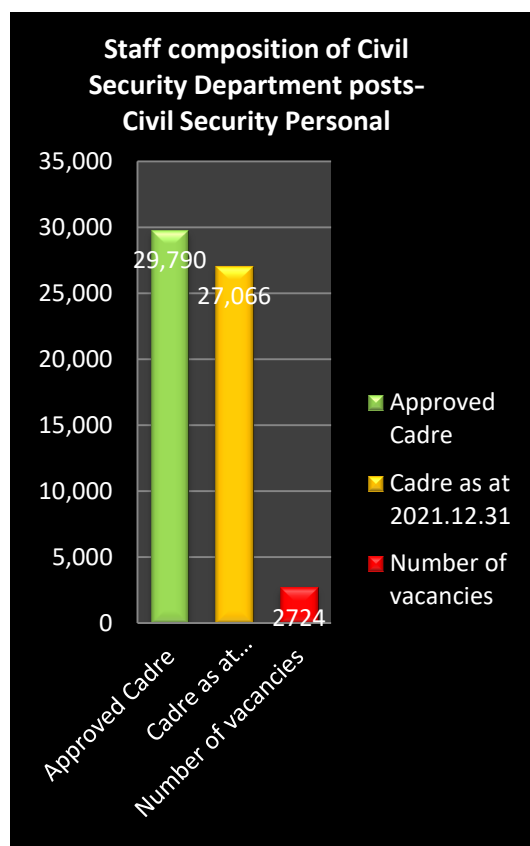
The Department of Management Services has been advised to cease recruitment to this department. Accordingly, for the last 10 years, this department has become an establishment where recruitment is not made in place of staff reductions in retirement, death, resignation, and dismissal.

As such, it is difficult to maintain the reputation and quality of the department which has upheld the Soldier's commitment and intensive training in the fields of technical, aesthetic, sports, computer, and industrial. This is because of retirement, death, or lack of knowledge of skilled officers and the lack of recruits.

Accordingly, the shortage of human resources in every post within the approved staff cadre will lead to a certain percentage decline in the performance of this department.

The performance can be improved up to a satisfactory level if the Management Services Department approves the recruitment of new officers, subject to the restrictions stated above.

We further point out the fact that filling the above vacancies within the approved departmental cadre is a matter of urgency.

Contribution of the training programs to the performance of the institution

- The main objective of establishing this department is to ensure the national security of the country while protecting the war-threatened villages. Accordingly, they have been recruited as per the timely requirement based on the fact that they should be the persons residing in the surrounding villages, but not considered the evaluation of educational, vocational, or other qualifications. Therefore, they were less professional and not technically skilled compared to other armed forces and Police. However, after the war, they were given basic and Leadership Training through the Departmental Training Schools on a set syllabus and timetable. That enabled them to transform into polite, disciplined, and professional forces like other armies. It is expected to develop their capacity like other forces through training in the current requirements of military combat, drill, drumming, aesthetics, and technology.
- As per the Scheme of Recruitment of the department, it is mandatory to have preliminary and leadership trainings to be confirmed in the service and eligible for the promotion..
- The provision of vocational training courses through external vocational training institutes enables the Civil Security members to earn extra income by running a self-owned enterprise utilizing their knowledge and practice, even after retirement.
- In Additionally, it is expected to improve the performance of the department by training them in external institutions such as Universities, Vocational Training Centers, Youth Services Council, and National Apprenticeship Board through the lecturers and qualified resource persons in the department on the Establishment Code, Financial Regulations, procurement guidelines, public accounting, salary preparation, auditing, office procedures, second language, ect.
