

## VICE-CHANCELLOR'S REVIEW – 2020



It is a great pleasure to write a message to the Annual Report 2020 at the occasion, Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka celebrating its Silver Jubilee for being 25 years as a National University of Sri Lanka. The Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka is located at Pambahinna, 162 kilometers away from the capital on the Colombo – Badulla A4 highway near the town of Belihuloya and covers an area of approximately 267 acres.

At present, the University consists of eight (08) Faculties. They are; Faculty of Graduate Studies, Faculty of Agricultural Sciences, Faculty of Applied Sciences, Faculty of Geomatics, Faculty of Management Studies, Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages, Faculty of Technology and Faculty of Medicine. The Faculty of Medicine is located in Kuruwita, Ratnapura.

Construction of the first part of the second phase of the Faculty of Applied Sciences has commenced as well as the construction of the second phase of the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences and the Para Clinical and Administrative Building Complex of the Faculty of Medicine in 2020. Completion of the development work of the Chemistry Laboratory of the Faculty of Applied Sciences, renovation of the internal roads of the University, provision of internet facilities for the academic study building of the Agricultural Sciences at Mungastenna and converting the old auditorium for the use of conducting lectures for the students in the Faculty of Technology and which can be identified among the achievements of the University last year. Also the Ministry of Education already approved the funds required for the construction of the second part of the third phase of the Faculty of Management Studies and the necessary actions to submit the concept paper related to the construction of the administration building which remains in the final stage. Now, all the faculties of the University are connected internally with each other by a special fiber optic backbone and it will be upgraded in the future. Approximately, the number of internal students of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka in the year 2020 was 5995. The number of internal students enrolled in the University this year was 1522 and 96 students were enrolled for postgraduate studies. In addition, 2349 students were registered for the courses offered by the Centre for Open and Distance Learning. Due to the COVID 19 pandemic situation, the General Convocation of the year 2020 could not be held as planned and it is scheduled to be held on 02<sup>nd</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> March 2021.

The University focused on improving the welfare and recreational facilities for the students as well as the staff. Accordingly, the University has provided accommodation facilities for 93.3% of the internal students. Arrangements have also been made to improve the internet facilities for academic activities. Utilizing the existing resources of the University,

accommodation facilities have been provided for the academic, administrative and non – academic staff as much as possible.

The University has also taken steps to facilitate students and academic staff to enhance the research culture of the University. In the year 2020, two international conferences were conducted via online and the Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages and the Faculty of Geomatics conducted research conferences for the students. The University has also received an international patent for researches conducted by the academic staff members and the University which has provided financial support to many of them in presenting their research findings at the foreign research conferences. At the same time, signing of five Memorandum of Understanding (MoUs) to introduce new researches to the market and to enhance researches was among the special activities carried out during that year.

Talented human resources have been a strength of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. The University has consisted with a total academic staff of 281, 36 administrative and executive staff, 19 academic support staff and 399 non – academic staff. The University has also taken steps to provide training sessions to academic and administrative staff with the aim of impartial training sessions under various headings and understanding of different working cultures in 2020 for the staff development skills.

Also, I gratefully remember the University Grants Commission, all the Ministries affiliated to the Ministry of Education and the officials who provided the visionary leadership to carry out all these activities in the face of the COVID epidemic. My heartfelt thanks also go to our University community for their dedicated work.

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## 1. THE UNIVERSITY

### 1.1 HISTORY OF THE UNIVERSITY

The history of Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka (SUSL) can be traced back to 1991 when it was initially established as an Affiliated University College at Belihuloya. In 1995, a committee was appointed by the Minister of Education and Higher Education to study the possibilities of re-structuring the Affiliated University Colleges in the country. In accordance with the recommendations made by the Committee, the government decided to upgrade Sabaragamuwa Affiliated University College to the status of a National University by amalgamating it with two other Affiliated University Colleges located at Rahangala and Buttala. They were renamed as Uva Campus of Sabaragamuwa University. Before the amalgamation, the Affiliated Colleges at Belihuloya and Buttala were affiliated to the University of Sri Jayewardenepura. Rahangala Affiliated University College was amalgamated with the University of Peradeniya. With the three amalgamated affiliated University Colleges, the Sabaragamuwa University was ceremonially declared the opening on February 2, 1996.

Subsequently, the Affiliated University Colleges at Rahangala and Buttala were converted into the Faculties of Agricultural Sciences and Applied Sciences and shifted to Belihuloya main campus in 2001 and 2008 respectively.



Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka (SUSL) offers its graduate qualifications through the Faculty of Graduate Studies (FGS). The University Grants Commission, at its 928th meeting held on November 9, 2015, granted the approval to establish the Faculty of Graduate Studies.

Within this broader spectrum, FGS offers a wide range of postgraduate studies related to the fields such as Agricultural Sciences, Computing & Information Systems, Geomatics, Humanities, Management, Physical & Natural Sciences, Social Sciences, Sports Sciences and Physical Education. The students who follow the graduate degree programmes available in these fields certainly benefit in widening their research based knowledge not only to enhance the career progression, but also to redefine the existing ontologies to reach beyond national spatiotemporal horizons.

At present the FGS offers three taught programmes leading for the graduate qualifications at master level and research higher degree programme leading to MPhil and PhD qualifications. Altogether there are 318 active postgraduate students at present and another 100-120 prospective students have been applied for the enrolment in 2020. Thus, the objective of the FGS is to provide an opportunity as well as to facilitate effective and efficient delivery of study programmes through quality teaching and research training to produce individuals with graduate qualifications in their respective disciplines who are competent in facing the challenges of development both locally and internationally.

The faculty was able to win competitive World Bank grants of Rs. 82.5 million and Rs. 120 million respectively to develop infrastructure and other academic facilities in 2005 & 2018. A comprehensive curriculum revision was undertaken and the degree programme was renamed as Agricultural Sciences and Management.

### 2.2.3 DEGREE PROGRAMMES CONDUCTED BY THE FACULTY

The Faculty is composed of three Departments of study such as Agribusiness Management, Export Agriculture and Livestock Production. The Faculty of Agricultural Sciences offers the following four year honours degree programmes.

- BSc Hons (Agricultural Sciences and Management) (students can specialize in four fields such as Agribusiness Management, Agri-Environmental Resource Management, Crop Improvement & Plant Protection, Crop Production Technology, Animal Bio-resource Technology & Management, Aquatic Bio-resource Technology & Management)
- BSc Hons (Food Business Management)

The Department of Export Agriculture offers three academic modules as Agri-Environmental Resource Management, Crop Improvement & Plant Protection and Crop Production Technology. During the first four semesters (first 2 years), students need to follow core-courses for their general study on Agriculture followed by specialization either in Agribusiness Management, Agri-Environmental Resource Management, Crop Improvement & Plant Protection, Crop Production Technology and Animal Bio-resource Technology & Management, Aquatic Bio-resource Technology & Management for two more semesters (in the 3<sup>rd</sup> year). Students must select their field of specialization at the end of the second year, according to their preferences. Farm Practice, Computer Sciences and English courses are offered in the first three years and students must reach a satisfactory grade for each course in each semester to complete the degree. In addition, elective courses are offered during the third year second semester and final year first semester. Students must select two elective courses in third year and four elective courses at final year according to their preferences. The second semester of the final year BSc Agricultural Sciences and Management student is allocated for industrial training while both semesters to the final year of Food Business Management Degree Programme allocated for industrial training which is a vital and specific component of the degree programs and students must undertake a research in the specialized field. The medium of instruction of the degree program is English.

The Faculty organizes programs as the practical components of the degree programme in collaboration with farmers in the area to ensure that knowledge and skills are exchanged between students and farmers. As a result, the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences has developed close links with the surrounding communities. Furthermore, students are given an opportunity to visit various industries to get exposure to operational aspects of the industry and research organizations.

## 2.3 FACULTY OF APPLIED SCIENCES

### 2.3.1 BRIEF HISTORY

The Faculty of Applied Sciences of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka was initially started as the Buttala Affiliated University College (BAUC) on 21<sup>st</sup> June 1993. The BAUC offered two diploma courses, one in Food Science and Technology and the other in English Language. With the elevation of the Affiliated University Colleges to fully fledged national Universities in early 1996, three Affiliated University Colleges; Sabaragamuwa Affiliated University College, Uva Affiliated University College and Buttala Affiliated University College were amalgamated to form the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka and the BAUC became the Faculty of Applied Sciences of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka.

The faculty has been relocated in the main university premises at Belihuloya with the effect from March 2008.

### 2.3.3 DEGREE PROGRAMS CONDUCTED BY THE FACULTY

The Faculty comprises five departments: Department of Natural Resources, Department of Physical Sciences & Technology, Department of Food Science & Technology, Department of Computing & Information Systems and Department of Sport Science and Physical Education.

The Faculty offers B.Sc. (Special) degree programs in Food Science and Technology, Environmental Sciences and Natural Resource Management, Chemical Technology, Computer Science and Technology, Applied Physics, Computing and Information Systems, Sport Sciences and Management and Physical Education for the students who can gain direct entry to the Faculty on the basis of their performance at the GCE (Advanced Level) examination.

The degree programs are designed to be four-year degree programs with an exit point at three years for the students who graduate with a general degree in B.Sc. in Physical Sciences and Technology and Environmental Sciences and Management. The rest of the degree programs are strictly four-year degree programs.

The selection of the students for the B.Sc. degree programs in Sport Sciences and Management and Physical Education is done on the basis of the G.C.E. (A/L) results as well as the performance at a selection test (Written examination). The students who wish to get enrolled for the degree programs in Sport Sciences and Management and Physical Education are also required to face an examination for physical fitness in addition to the selection test. However, the selection procedure has been changed by the UGC through a circular and there will not be any further aptitude tests for the recruitment of undergraduates for the Faculty.

All degree programs offered through the faculty are designed to cater the current job trends and demands both nationally and internationally. They are conducted exclusively in English. These degree programs are designed as interdisciplinary by incorporating subjects as Computer Science, Economics, Management, etc. that has facilitated our students to perform well once graduating serving a wider field than being specific and narrowed to than specialized field.

Apart from the academic activities, the Faculty also contributes to the development of the community and the nation through extension and knowledge dissemination programs. The staff and the students participate for such activities annually.

### **Department of Computing and Information Systems**

The Department of Computing and Information Systems offers a B.Sc. Honours in Information Systems was established in 01<sup>st</sup> March 2011, though the Degree programme was initiated back in 2008. The curriculum is specifically designed to produce skilled graduates both in Computing and Information Technology. At present the department has three well established laboratories and the student capacity of the department is 312.

The demand for the above degree programme has greatly increased thorough out the years and annual intake has reached the maximum capacity of 80 students per batch. The department has close collaborations with private computer industries to obtain technical support in conducting lectures and practical as well as to provide opportunities for the undergraduates to carry out their mini projects and final year projects. This also has increased the opportunity for the undergraduates to secure job opportunities immediately after graduation. The staff of the Department consists of one professor, five senior lecturers and seven probationary lecturers.

### **Department of Food Science and Technology**

The Department of Food Science and Technology was established in 2005 even though the B.Sc. degree in Food Science and Technology was offered under the Department of Natural Resources since the inception of the Faculty in 1996. The range of the study areas includes Food Science Technology core, Applied Food Technologies, General Sciences, Statistics, Computer Science & Technology, Food Marketing, Industrial Economics and courses in scientific communication and career development. The degree program is designed for the students who wish to pursue professional careers in the field of Food Science and Technology. The knowledge and skills gained from the degree program enable the graduates to cater the growing demand for Food Scientists & Technologists both in government and the private sector, locally and abroad. The degree also paves an excellent path for postgraduate studies in related disciplines of Food Science and Technology. At present, the Department academic staff comprises one professor, seven senior lecturers and two probationary lecturers. There are several eminent senior academics and industrial experts who contribute as visiting Professionals in their specialized fields. The Department has five well-equipped laboratories for conducting undergraduate lab sessions and relevant research, namely; Food Analysis Laboratory, Food Microbiology Laboratory, Food Processing Laboratory, Meat Processing Laboratory and Dairy Processing Laboratory and the current student capacity of the department is 150.

### **Department of Natural Resources**

The Department of Natural Resources was established in 1996 offering a B.Sc. General degree in Natural Resources. The degree program offered by the Department is designed to cater the current job market in the fields of Environmental Protection, Natural Resource Management and Conservation, Biodiversity Conservation and Management, Environmental Advocacy and Ecology both in Sri Lanka and around the world.

In 2006, the Degree Programme which was initially offered as B.Sc. in Natural Resources as a three-year general degree program was upgraded and restructured to offer a Degree programme as Environmental Science and Natural Resources Management which has improved the job opportunities for the graduates. Currently the degree program is oriented in three major streams viz. Environmental Science, Biological Science and Earth Science with awarding two degree programs as B.Sc. (Special) in Environmental Science and Natural Resources Management – 4 years and B.Sc. (General) in Environmental Science and Natural Resources Management – 3 years. The degree also paves an excellent path for postgraduate studies. The Department has the capacity to enroll sixty students per year. At present, the academic staff of the department consists of ten faculty members including two professors, seven senior lecturers and one lecturer.

### **Department of Physical Sciences & Technology**

The Department of Physical Sciences & Technology conducts degree courses in three major disciplines; namely, Chemical Technology, Applied Physics and Computer Science & Technology. Mathematics, Statistics, and Management Studies are conducted as supporting tools for the programme. The Department offers four-degree programs namely: B.Sc. (Applied Sciences) Special Degree in Chemical Technology (Duration: 4 years), B.Sc. (Applied Sciences) Special Degree in Computer Science & Technology (Duration: 4 years) B.Sc. (Applied Sciences) Special Degree in Applied Physics (Duration: 4 years) and B.Sc. (Applied Sciences) Degree in Physical Sciences (Duration: 3 years).

All theoretical course units conducted by the department are heavily supported by a practical component which provides the preliminary experience to perform confidently. And also, the Mini projects conducted throughout the third and the fourth academic years stimulate the students & creative and innovative thinking. The Final year project (research or industrial training) for one entire semester exposes the undergraduates to the working environment and provides hand on experience in industry before the graduation. The environment in the campus and the teaching programs were all designed in a manner to establish this goal and also to produce specialists in their respective fields. Additionally, it is also creditable that the Department offers the only Degree in Applied Physics in the entire University System in the country. The Department has four (04) well-equipped laboratories

namely; Physics Laboratory, Chemistry Laboratory I, Chemistry Laboratory II & Chemistry Research Laboratory and the student capacity of the department is 117. The staff of the department consists of one Chair Professor, one Senior Professor, one professor, eight senior lecturers, seven probationary lecturers, one temporary assistant lecturer, and two temporary lecturers.

### **Department of Sport Sciences and Physical Education**

Two-degree programs namely B.Sc. Special Degree in Sport Sciences & Management and B.Sc. Special Degree in Physical Education have been awarded since 2008 through the Faculty of Applied Sciences. The Department of Sport Sciences and Physical Education was established in 01<sup>st</sup> March 2011. The courses of Sport Sciences & Management degree programme is specially designed to produce graduates with basic scientific sport skills and management skills required for today's teaching sports at primary, secondary and tertiary education levels and at other industries and organizations. The degree programme in Physical Education is specially designed to produce graduates who are competent the scientific basis of physical education activities and practices. The duration of the degree programs are four years and at present there is a great demand for the degree programme which is significantly shown by the increasing number of student intake each year and at present the intake has reached the maximum capacity. The both degree programs are well supported by practical activities and projects that has enabled to produce skilled and competent graduates within four years. The department also has many collaborations with sports organizations facilitating the students to participate in many national and international gaming competitions and coaching programs. The Department has two well-equipped laboratories namely; Exercise biochemistry Laboratory and Research Laboratory and the student capacity of the department is 374. The staff comprises of six senior lecturers, two lecturers, five probationary lecturers, two instructors and three temporary assistant lecturers. The service of eminent sport specialist is also obtained to conduct both practical and theory courses for the students.

## 2.4 FACULTY OF GEOMATICS

### 2.4.1 BRIEF HISTORY

The Faculty of Geomatics is one of the eight faculties of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka and which was established in 2004. It is the successor to the Department of Surveying Sciences, which introduced the B.Sc. (Surveying Sciences) Degree Programme in 1997. This was the first time in the history of the university system in Sri Lanka that such a degree programme was introduced by a university fulfilling a much felt need of the country. The Degree Programme is a four-year course leading to a special degree. The first batch of students admitted to the degree programme in 1997 and graduated in 2002.

## 2.5 FACULTY OF MANAGEMENT STUDIES

### 2.5.1 BRIEF HISTORY

The Faculty of Business Studies commenced its programs by offering a three-year degree under the Department of Accountancy & Finance & the Department of Business Management in September 1996. After the completion of the Foundation Year and two specialization years, a Bachelor of Science degree could be obtained in the fields of Financial Management, Business Management, Marketing Management and Tourism Management. Accordingly, six batches of undergraduate students obtained their B.Sc. Special Degrees in Financial Management, Business Management, Marketing Management and Tourism Management and passed out in the years of 1997, 1998, 1999, 2000, 2001 and 2002.

The Faculty of Business Studies was renamed as the Faculty of Management Studies with the approval of the University Grants Commission (UGC) in the year 2003. The duration of the degree Programmes conducted by the Faculty was also changed from three years to four years with the approval of the UGC, at the same time.

Currently, the Faculty of Management Studies comprises with four departments; i.e. Department of Accountancy & Finance, Department of Business Management, Department of Marketing Management and Department of Tourism Management.

## 2.6 FACULTY OF MEDICINE

### 2.6.1 BRIEF HISTORY

The Faculty of Medicine at Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka is the latest addition to the chain of Medical Faculties in Sri Lanka. It was established in the year 2018 under Gazette Notice No. 2082/32 of August 01, 2018. It becomes the 8<sup>th</sup> Faculty at the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. The medical profession caters to one of the most crucial needs of the society. Therefore, it stands to reason that medical degrees are among the most challenging and competitive qualifications to pursue. This Faculty comprises with 15 Departments which are dedicated to achieve all aspects of its academic mission and objectives. The academic elements in the MBBS Degree Program are based on four main disciplinary pillars; theoretical education, clinical care, community engagement, and research. The Faculty of Medicine is established in Rathnapura where the first year of the degree program will be conducted in the land adjacent to the Provincial General Hospital, Ratnapura at the Batuhena Faculty premises. A new faculty building and the professorial unit are currently being constructed at the land adjacent to the Provincial General Hospital, Ratnapura, which would serve as the teaching hospital for the Faculty of Medicine providing all clinical training facilities for the students. The Faculty would accommodate 75 students per intake and will furnish with all the facilities required to conduct the medical academic programs which are established.

### 2.7.1 BRIEF HISTORY


The Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages had its beginning at the same time, when the University commissioned its study programs in 1996. The Faculty initially possessed two Departments of studies i.e. the Department of Languages and the Department of Social Sciences. The third Department of the Faculty, the Department of English Language Teaching was initiated in 2004 while the fourth, the Department of Economics and Statistics commenced in 2009. The Department of Geography and Environmental Management was established as the fifth Department in 2015. The Faculty began its academic operations in November 1996 with the intake of students from the former affiliated University Collage, who were permitted, with their Diplomas in English, to study for a degree after two years. The Faculty started to register students with Advanced Level qualification only from the year 1998.

In pursuit of its vision and mission, the Faculty offers Honors Degrees through its Departments. Breaking from the initial concept of three year Honors degrees in the Faculty, in 2007, the Faculty introduced four-year Honors Degree Programs in Economics, Statistics, Geography, Political Science, Sociology and Anthropology in addition to its three year Social Sciences Honors Degree Program. Four-year Honors Degree Programs in Sinhala, Tamil, English, German, Japanese, Chinese and Hindi have also been introduced with the effect from 2013. In 2014, the Faculty introduced Bachelor of Arts Honors in Information & Communication Technology and in 2015, Bachelor of Arts Honors in Translation Studies. At present, the Faculty offers four-year Honors Degrees and three-year General Degrees only.

The Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages prepares students for professional careers by providing them with a broad understanding of the humanistic tradition in combination with a sound knowledge of subjects in several disciplines. Our programs emphasize the ability to apply this knowledge to problems and tasks in the contemporary world of work. We strive to develop students' capacity for independent and critical thought, logical analysis, effective communication, and informed participation in teamwork. Therefore, the Bachelor of Arts program integrates classroom work and students' independent reading and writing with hands-on research and project work.

### **3. TEACHING RESOURCES**

#### **3.1 THE LIBRARY**

##### **3.1.1 DESCRIPTION OF THE LIBRARY**

The Main Library provides its services for the Sentire University to achieve the standard of excellence in their academic programs. The Management Faculty Library serves for the needs of the Faculty of Management Studies. The Agricultural Sciences Library serves for the needs of the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences. The Faculty of Medicine owns separate branch Library. The collections and services of the library are designed to match the needs that range from basic support of the curriculum to the advanced research requirements of patrons.

The SUSL Libraries deliver customer focused quality information products, services and programs, creatively adjust to changing information needs and innovatively respond to new challenges at National and International level.

The collection of books of all libraries in the end of 2020 was approximately 134000 (Purchased + Donation 133694) including purchased books, donation books, pamphlets, audio visual materials and e-resources received to the Library.

The SUSL Library is using as KOHA open-source software for Library automation. Collection has been organized as Lending Section, Reference Section, Permanent Reference Section, Periodical Section, Other Collection & Past paper Collections.

##### **3.1.2 IN HOUSE ACTIVITIES**

###### **Library Committee**

The Library Committee, the Sub-committee of the Senate is the principal management body of the Sabaragamuwa University Library. The Library Committee has been scheduled to be held on each and every month regularly. The Librarian plays the role of Secretary of the Committee. The Chairman of the committee is generally the Vice Chancellor of the University.

###### **Objectives of the Libraries**

In fulfilling the main objective of developing the university through self-studies and self-improvement, the university libraries in the country play a major role. The Sabaragamuwa

University has three branch libraries: the library of the Faculty of Management Studies, the library of the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences and the Faculty of Medicine Library, in addition to the Main library. The Main library serves for the needs of five faculties at the moment - the Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages, the Faculty of Applied Sciences, the Faculty of Geomatics, the Faculty of Technology and the Faculty of Graduate Studies. The Faculty libraries for Agricultural Sciences, Management Studies and Medicine serve the needs of their undergraduates. At present SUSL is actively involved in developing e-information provision.

The SUSL network expects to expand its facilities for patrons with development of the new library building for the main library. Enhancing physical resources such as bibliographic material received from donors and purchased by the library will be focused on this direction apart from the human resources that would expect to increase quantitatively as well as qualitatively align with establishing of the new building.

## 3.2 CENTRE FOR COMPUTER STUDIES

### 3.2.1 INTRODUCTION

The Centre for Computer Studies provides many IT related academic and technical services to the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. The centre has been conducting and supervising academic programmes of different faculties, preparing IT curricula and providing training for academic and non academic staff as well as academic supportive staff. The CCS has been providing University web service and email facility for the entire university community. Campus-wide Internet and networking facility, virtual learning environment with other network services, e-learning facility and hardware & software maintenance services are the technical services provided by the Centre for Computer Studies.

### 3.2.2 HISTORY

The history of Sabaragamuwa University Computer Centre goes back to the time of inauguration of Affiliated University College (AUC) of Sabaragamuwa Province in 1991. It started at one of the residential building then own to Samanalawewa Hydro Electrical Power Project and now D1-4 quarters of Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. Initially, it equipped with 10 numbers of **Tatung** 286 computers featured 1Mb RAM, 40MB Hard disks and an **OKI** 9-pin dot-matrix printer and at the time of inauguration of AUC, late Hon. President Ranasinghe Premadasa unveiled the plaque of the centre.

At that time AUC enrolled students for Diploma programmes and conducted three diploma courses called Diploma in Accounting & Finance, Diploma in Tourism Management and Diploma in English. The **Core Course of Computing** offered by the computer centre was compulsory component to obtain the diploma produced by all programmes.

After some times, with the donation of Rs. 15,000/= from the Balangoda District Judge who launched a program to donate funds for social works from the fines collected from the drugs victims, initiated to start the construction of existing computer centre building with the help of the staff, students and villagers by “Shramadana Campaign” and finally completed using the government funds. It was the first building constructed simultaneous with the old auditorium for the AUC in addition to the buildings acquiring from the Samanalawewa Project.

Initially it was recruited one staff member to the computer centre as an Instructor-in-Computer-Technology for conducting the lectures and practical for the core courses. Meanwhile, two other instructors were recruited to the computer centre cadre to extend

the work which carried out and it was the only centre which had an approved cadre in the AUC system.

After upgrading the AUC into full-fledged national university as Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka in 1996, computer centre started to render its services to the different degree programs. Especially for non-IT, faculties by means of designing and preparing course materials for IT related subjects and conducting lectures and practical classes. Further, center contributed technological knowledge for preparing and evaluating tender documents for purchasing of computers and other ICT related equipment for the university and training of clerical staff of the university for effectively use of ICT for their day to day works as well as helping to academic staff for preparing their postgraduate thesis and in preparing teaching materials etc.

With the expansion of the university and its functions, computer centre was renamed as **Centre for Computer Studies** and re-organized under a Director. It stated to offer assistance for conducting ICT related courses for the degree programmes especially for Faculty of Management Studies and Faculty of Social Sciences & Languages. Another building adjacent constructed in the existing centre for broadening its services. At the same time university Local Area Network was planned and commissioned and got connection to the Internet via LEARN and started to provide and to maintain the Internet and network services to the entire university community. Launching Sabaragamuwa University Web Site and providing E-Learning environment are such land marking services offered.

Meanwhile, to strengthen the services provided by the Centre for Computer Studies the cadre provisions have been increased according to the 2012 approved cadre list of UGC.

### 3.2.4 CURRENT STATUS

#### CCS Helpdesk

The CCS Helpdesk is the first point of contact for all of the IT related technology needs and issues at the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. The Helpdesk handles email and in-person requests from students, faculty, academic staff, administrative staff and non-academic staff on IT related matters of their day to day activities.

#### CCS Student Helpdesk

The CCS Student Helpdesk is staffed technical workers employed by CCS to assist users in the residence computer centers under the CCS of each faculty with computer related issues.

#### Services

The service center staff of the CCS handles all the engineering, technical, electronic, electrical, computer repairing, troubleshooting inside the University. This will help to carry out all the University activities such as not only the academic activities but also administrative activities very smoothly and effectively.

**Services**

**University Web Mail**

The CCS provides e-mail facility with unlimited storage capacity for all the academic and administrative staff members and all the students under the xxx.sab.ac.lk university domain.

**SUSL Mail**

The CCS joining with the Microsoft Corporation and provides other e-mail facilities with 1 GB storage capacity for all the academic, administrative, non-academic and all the students under the ms.sab.ac.lk domain.

### **Virtual Learning Environment (VLE)**

The CCS provides necessary infrastructure facilities for the e-learning and Virtual Learning Management for all the academic and students.

#### **Present Status:**

Presently, on the request of the different faculties, the academic services provided by the centre are mainly limited for conducting the IT Degree programme and computer minor programme of the Faculty of Social Sciences & Languages, some IT related subjects and practical components of the different departments of Faculty of Management Studies and to the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences. Other IT services such as Internet and web service are provided for entire university community. Other than that, computer center is providing maintenance-support for services running in the network which are installed by other parties such as library system, IP Phone system, IP Camera system, Wireless networks etc.

At present most of the faculties have built their own complexes and they have their own computer centers within faculty premises for conducting their IT related academic programs. Therefore, no need of using the existing buildings of the Centre for Computer Studies for conducting their programs further, instead they can be utilized for widen the services offered by the Centre such as conducting training programmes for non-academic and administrative staff as well as assisting the academic staff to fulfilling their IT-related needs.

The Centre for Computer Studies supervises all computer related academic activities in these five computer centers and maintains the campus-wide network including all the servers required to provide network services such as web, e-learning, DNS, email, digital library system, student information service and network troubleshooting services.

In year of 2013, infrastructure facilities and academic programs related with IT have further improved due to allocations from the consolidated fund by the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. With this fund, the university managed to increase the Internet bandwidth from 20Mbps to 100Mbps and increase the number of computer facilities to all academic and administrative staff members at their work places.

Due to the high demand of the internet usage of the university, internet providers requested to increased bandwidth up to 225 Mbps in 2018. It is increased up to 700 Mbps with the dialog 100Mbps backup link along with the SLT. Accordingly, the computer center proposed to increase the internal bandwidth of the fiber backbone and currently the university internet connections which are running with the bandwidth of 600Mbps.

Free Wi-Fi areas implemented for the students inside the university to provide a better learning environment to them. According to that, all faculties covered with Wi-Fi facility.

Furthermore, CCS has initiated free Wi-Fi project with the ministry of education to increase Wi-Fi zones for the student's hostels and study areas.

### **Campus-Wide Network**

Our campus-wide Local Area Network is run and maintained by the Centre for Computer Studies. It is administrated by our Assistant Network Managers within the server room. The server room is consisted with CISCO routers, proxy server, DNS server, CISCO switches, web server, e-learning sever, virus guard server (centralized server) etc. Performance of the network functions and the E-learning system are increased by upgrading the three servers namely Proxy, DNS and E-learning during the year 2014. Separating and partitioning of the server room from the existing computer lab, physical security and the easiness of maintenance of the servers are assured. Also by commissioning the alternative power generating system using a 20KVA standby generator and four 2KVA UPS systems, availability of network functions are guaranteed during the 24 hours a day and 7 days a week.

All the eight faculties are now inter-connected with fiber optic backbone and willing to upgrade the backbone in next few years. At present our commodity Internet bandwidth is 600Mbps and physical link is capable of handling signals of 100Mbps bandwidth.

- Provide Wi-Fi facilities for all the student hostels and Staff quarters of SUSL
- Upgrading the University website
- Creating and maintaining university social media pages as official pages (Facebook, YouTube, LinkedIn and Twitter)
- Creating and maintaining university digital repository as a digital library to collect, and preserves digital material of Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka.
- Enhancing the Wi-Fi access points of the Geomatics, Agriculture, and Social Sciences Faculties.
- Upgrade the Wi-Fi access points of the Medical faculty (Phase I and Phase II).
- Upgrade the Wi-Fi access points of the faculty of Graduate Studies.
- Conducting ICT related Workshops for the University staff to improve the productivity.

### Goals Achieved during the year:

- Provided internet connection for the Faculty of Medicine with Wi-Fi network and LAN network.
- Provided internet connection for Faculty of Graduate Studies.
- Enhanced and installed new Wi-Fi facility for the Faculty of Technology.
- New network installed for the computer lab of the Department of Geography and Environmental Management (FSSL).
- New network installed for the Mungasthenna building complex of the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences.
- Provided facilities and services to the outside parties such as CDB bank and provided an opportunity to earn money for the University.
- Upgraded the University web site with a newer version of Drupal Content Management System.
- Initiated and collaborated with Ministry of Education on implementing the campus wide Wi-Fi project
- Created and acquired the university social media pages and maintaining the latest news and updates in every social media page to get more organic reach to the university
- Installed a newer version of Moodle software to facilitate the university virtual teaching and learning activities
- Created and maintaining university digital repository as a digital library to collect, and preserves digital material of Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka.

### ACTIVITIES CONDUCTED IN 2020

#### **New Web Template**

Installed a new updated web template with a customisable content management system to the entire university web interface and configured all the faculty, centre pages. Conducted few instructive sessions for faculty web coordinators.

#### **Digital Repository**

Installed and configured a new web repository to provide digital service that collects, and preserves digital material of Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. The digital repository has E-Books, General Publications, Research Publications and Thesis and Dissertations as archived collections.

#### **Upgraded the University Learning Management System**

University LMS is upgraded with a new version of Moodle and created new user accounts, categories entirely for the university excluding Faculty of Applied Sciences. Conducted and facilitated student and staff workshops on working with new virtual learning environment.

### **Quorum**

Quorum is 50% of the membership.

### **Meetings**

The Committee meets at least once within two months and it considers matters by correspondence.

### **Terms of Office**

Terms of Office for appointed members of this Committee is one year.

## **APPOINTMENT OF CQA DIRECTOR**

### **Position Within the University**

1. The post of Director CQA should ideally be a full time position. Since this may not be achievable in the near future, the Director should obtain a reduction in the academic workload by 50%. As the Director needs the support of all the Deans and other senior academics / administrative staff, it is important to position the Director at an appropriate level. Hence the position of the Director can be specified in the HEI Organogram at the level of the DVC or at last at the level of a Director or a Dean.
2. The Director CQA should be free of other major administrative responsibilities in order to implement QA process effectively. Since academic auditing is a part of internal quality assurance, the person should not be a DVC, Dean or an administrative head of department, in order to maintain the transparency of the quality assurance process.
3. He / she should be a senior academic / professor with significant experience in administration (at last three years), as well as in the QA processes and have knowledge of the external review process, since a Director bears important responsibility in this process. Where the Director CQA is not a Professor, he / she should be an invited member of the Senate.

4. He / she should be appointed for a period of three years, with the concurrence of the UGC. He / she will be eligible reappointment for not one more than of three years.

### **Logistics of the Director**

1. The Director, CQA should receive an honorarium of 25% of the basic salary per month, and a telecommunication allowance approved by the Council of the university as per the commission circular No. 06 / 2015.
2. He / she should be provided with transport whenever necessary for official purposes.
3. The university authorities should provide a suitable permanent office space for the CQA, together with internet and telephone facilities with a dedicated line.
4. The university/HEI should provide a support staff (an incumbent Assistant Registrar, a Management Assistant and a Works Aid) on a permanent basis for the CQA to carry out their duties smoothly, as recommended in the previous UGC, QA Circular letter of 30<sup>th</sup> October 2017 (ref UGC/QAAC/IQAU).

### **RESPONSIBILITIES AND DUTIES**

#### **Director CQA**

1. Develop regulation for the CQA and obtain approval from the university council for the same.
2. Prepare operational guidelines for the CQA in accordance with the general guidelines developed by QAC of the UGC, and customized for the university's governance structure/organogram and specific implementation arrangement.
3. Develop a 3-years strategic Plan for the CQA, obtain approval from the university Senate and council and concurrence of the QAC of the UGC, before implementation.
4. Develop the annual work plan for the CQA and obtain approval from the university senate and council at the commencement of each calendar year.
5. Develop the annual budget estimates submitted to the Treasury, and obtain Finance Committee and council approval.
6. Ensure that the CQA is established in the university website and details are updated regularly.
7. Report regularly on QA activities and progress to the university Senate and council.
8. Circulate notices of QA activities in the university community and other universities.
9. Conduct University and Faculty level awareness programs on QA.
10. Initiate and support preparation of SER for Institutional Reviews.

11. Motivate and support study programs to prepare SERs for Program Reviews.
12. Provide necessary trainings and workshops for self-Assessment Report (SER) preparation.
13. Motivate and support academic staff to showcase best practices in QA.
14. Develop relationship and liaise with international agencies and the university on QA activities.
15. Support academic staff in the process preparing proposals for the conduct of new degree programmes, and ensure that applications submitted to the UGC for approval in this regard are compliant with the Sri Lanka Qualification Framework.
16. Report on University QA activities at the UGC Standing Committee on QA.
17. Submit an annual report of the CQA to the QAC of the UGC.
18. Convene and facilitate for all meetings of CQA and FQACs.
19. Assist manual preparation on QA aspect in Faculties.
20. Make available to all staff and external stakeholders the results of external and internal reviews, including student surveys.

#### **Coordinator of the Faculty Quality Assurance Cell**

1. Promote a quality culture in the Faculty in all QA related activities as a representative.
2. Liaise with the Director, Centre for Quality Assurance (CQA) of the University to coordinate university level Quality Assurance (QA) activities.
3. Organize Faculty level QA meetings on two months basis.
4. Prepare the annual Faculty quality assurance report at the end of each year.
5. Address on specific issues as recommended by the University Senate Standing Committee on Quality Assurance from time to time.
6. Provide guidance in preparation of self-evaluation reports (SER) for programme review.
7. Liaise with professional quality assurance and accreditation bodies on matters pertaining to QA and accreditation, if required.
8. Monitor the collation and analysis of Faculty level QA data such as peer review forms and student feedback forms.
9. Coordinate with other related committees and units within the Faculty on matters related to QA activities.
10. Answer and address issues related to QA raised by the faculty members in general Report the activities of the Faculty QA Cell to the Faculty Board and IQAC regularly.
11. Report the activities of the Faculty QA Cell to the Faculty Board and CQA regularly.

### **INTRODUCTION OF NEW DEGREE PROGRAMMES**

1. Faculties shall be responsible for identifying a new degree programmes based on the demand and need.
2. Proposal of the new programme shall be submitted to the Director / CQA, together with the recommendation of the Faculty Board.
3. The Director / CQA shall forward the proposal to the Senate with its observations on a adherence to the UGC guidelines, for the consideration of the Senate.
4. The Senate shall appoint two external reviewers to review the detailed proposal.
5. Based on the recommendation made by the external reviewers, the relevant Faculty shall revise the detailed proposal and forward the same to the Director / CQA. The Director CQA shall ensure that the recommendation made by the external reviewers are addressed in the revised detailed proposal.
6. The Director CQA shall submit the revised proposal to the Senate to proceed via the Council to the UGC.

### **MODIFICATION TO THE CURRICULUM OF AN EXISTING ACADEMIC PROGRAMME**

1. Modifications identified by department / s or the Faculty shall be reported to the Director / CQA in a specified format, with the recommendation of the Faculty Board. The Director CQA shall forward the modifications with its observations to the Senate to proceed for the UGC approval.
2. The department/s or Faculty shall implement the modified curriculum with the next immediate intake of students.

### **FACILITATING AND MONITORING OF SELF EVALUATION OF ACADEMIC PROGRAMMES AND THE UNIVERSITY**

1. The CQA shall make the necessary arrangements to prepare Self Evaluation Reports and review all academic programmes and the university based on UGC guidelines.
2. Implementation and monitoring of recommendation made by the QAC.
3. Each academic programme and the University shall be responsible for implementing the recommendation made by the external reviewers.
4. The CQA shall monitor the implementation of such recommendations by the relevant academic programmes and the University for Self Evaluation.

## 4.7 UNIVERSITY BUSINESS LINKAGE CELL (UBLC)

### 4.7.1 BRIEF HISTORY

The University Business Linkage Cell of Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka was established on April 2018 with reference to the University Grants Commission Circular No.10/2016. The contract between Accelerating Higher Education Expansion and Development (AHEAD) Operation and Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka for the establishment and development of University Business Linkage Cell, was signed on 27th December 2018. The University Business Linkage Cell has taken the responsibility to link the University research and innovation activities with external business stakeholders. UBLC will strive to bridge the gap among Private and State-owned businesses, the academic community, faculties, and undergraduates.

UBLC has successfully completed the Phase 01, Phase 02 and Phase 03 of its activities and grants were approved as 4 million, 5 million and 4 million respectively. Phase 02 and Phase 03 was completed on 13<sup>th</sup> February and 28<sup>th</sup> October of 2020 respectively. As well as the Action Plans of the Phase 4 are being continued in a certain degree.



### Academic Staff - Student Collaborative and Innovative Projects to be considered for Seed Capital under AHEAD Grant

University Business Linkage Cell has decided to offer seed capital out of AHEAD grants to upgrade the University inventions to a commercially viable product and to liaise them with the potential industrial partners. We have been granted the World Bank approval to allocate a maximum Rs. 50,000 for developing one product. Depending on that activity we have executed six evaluation sessions to select the academic staff - student collaborative research projects to be considered for seed capital and 18 projects raised from Faculty of Agricultural Sciences and Faculty of Applied Sciences have been selected by the evaluation panels. The remaining evaluations have yet to be carried out. The evaluation sessions were

held on 27<sup>th</sup> July, 31<sup>st</sup> July, 09<sup>th</sup> August, 08<sup>th</sup> December and 09<sup>th</sup> December of 2020 respectively.

## 4.8 CENTRE FOR GENDER EQUITY AND EQUALITY


### 4.8.1 BRIEF HISTORY

## 11. HOSTEL DATA – 2020

As the University is in a remote, when considering the difficulties in finding the residential facilities for undergraduates by themselves, all the students whose permanent residencies are more than 20 km away from the University are provided hostel facilities by the University. So, about 89.82% of the undergraduates are received the University provided hostel facilities, in each year.

The University has provided accommodation in its own hostels only for 987 male students and 1446 female students. Other students have been provided with accommodation in rented houses for 498 male students and 1650 female students.


The University spends more than 12 million per annum for rented houses to accommodate the students.




### Progress of Students Received Hostel Facilities by Faculty 2020





The total numbers of bursary recipients are 1923 in 2020. This is 32.08% of the total student population. Installment amount is Rs. 4,000.00.







## Notes to the Financial Statements

### 1. Significant Accounting Policies

#### 1.1 General Policies

##### 1.1.1 Reporting Entity

Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka has been incorporated under the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978 and located at P.O. Box 02, Belihuloya. This is a National University mainly operates on Government funds.

##### 1.1.2 Principal activities and nature of operations

Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka is situated to the left of the way to Samanalawewa reservoir and is approximately 160 kilometers away from the Colombo-Badulla highway. The recently established Faculty of Medicine and Faculty of Technology are being actively functioned now. The first intake for the both faculties had been taken in January 2019. The university comprises of eight (08) Academic Faculties, namely:

- Faculty of Graduate Studies
- Faculty of Agricultural Sciences
- Faculty of Applied Sciences
- Faculty of Geomatics
- Faculty of Management Studies
- Faculty of Medicine
- Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages
- Faculty of Technology

In addition to these eight Faculties, there are 11 study centers. They are as follows:

- Center for Computer Studies
- Agri-Business Research and Development Center (ABRDS)
- Career Guidance Unit
- Center for Open & Distance Learning (CODL)
- Staff Development Centre (SDC)
- Centre for Indigenous Community Studies
- Centre for Research and Knowledge Dissemination
- Internal Quality Assurance Centre
- University Business Linkage Cell
- Center for Biodiversity and Environmental Studies
- University Museum

### 1.1.3 Basis of preparation

#### (a) Statement of Compliance

The Financial Statements comprise the statements of financial position, statement of financial performance, statement of changes in equity, statement of cash flows and notes to the financial statements.

The Financial Statements of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka are prepared in conformity with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards for the accrual basis of accounts. All accounting policies adopted by the University are applied consistently with those of the previous year, where necessary comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to the changes, in presentation of current year figures.

#### (b) Basis of measurement

The Financial Statements of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka are prepared under the Historical Cost convention and do not take into account of changes in money values, except where it is stated.

#### (c) Functional and presentation currency

The Financial Statements are presented in Sri Lankan Rupees, which is the University's functional and presentation currency.

#### (d) Going concern

The Financial Statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

## 1.2 Assets and the basis of valuation

### 1.2.1 Property, Plant & Equipment

Lands, Buildings, Water Treatment plant, Road Network, Laboratory and Teaching Equipment, Fixtures & Fittings, Library Books and Periodicals, Motor Vehicles, Computer & Computer accessories, Cloaks and Other Assets include the items acquired out of government grant, research grants, internally generated funds, and donations.

#### a) Basis of Recognition and Measurement

Property, Plant and Equipment are recognized if it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the entity and the cost of the item can be reliably measured. Properties, plant and equipment are recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation. The cost of property, plant and equipment is the cost of purchase or construction together with any incidental expenses thereon.

**b) Cost**

The cost of property, plant and equipment comprises its purchase or construction cost and any directly attributable cost of bringing the assets working condition for its intended use.

**c) Subsequent expenditure on existing Fixed Assets**

Expenditure incurred on tangible fixed assets is charged to the Statement of Financial Performance in the period it is incurred, unless it meets one of the following criteria, in which case it is capitalized and depreciates on the relevant basis.

- Market value of fixed assets has subsequently increased.
- Asset capacity increase.
- Sustainable improvement in the quality of output or reduction in operating cost.
- Significant extension of the asset life beyond that confirmed by repair and maintenance.

**d) Depreciation**

Depreciation is recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on a Straight – Line Method over the estimated useful life of Property, Plant and Equipment items from the date that they were made available for use. Lands are not depreciated. The estimated useful life periods are as follows.

Depreciation is provided in full in the year of purchase and no depreciation is charged in the year of disposal. This method of depreciation is adopted in using the rates in the UGC circular 649 from the financial year 2006 and hope to continue in future.

Also this method of calculation of depreciation was approved by our Council at its 117<sup>th</sup> meeting held on 20.01.2007.

During the year 2020, following long term construction projects are completed and handed over to the University. These assets are included in Buildings as capital assets and above depreciation policy applies from 2020.

#### **e) Capital Works in Progress**

Capital work-in-progress is stated at cost. These are expenses of a capital nature directly incurred in the construction of property, plant and equipment awaiting capitalization. Capital work-in-progress would be transferred to the relevant asset category in property, plant and equipment, when it is available for use i.e., when it is in the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by the university.

#### **1.2.2 Intangible Assets**

An Intangible asset is recognized only when its cost can be measured reliably and it is probable that the expected future economic benefits attributable that will flow to the University.

Intangible assets acquired are measured on initial recognition at cost. Intangible assets are carried at cost less any accumulated amortization and any accumulated impairment losses. Subsequent expenditure is capitalized only when it increase the future economic benefits embodied in the assets. All other expenditure is expensed as incurred.

All intangible assets are considered to have a finite useful life and amortized using straight line method to write down the cost of intangible asset to their residual values over their estimated useful lives as follows.

- a. Computer software is amortised over a period of 5 years on straight-line basis.
- b. Cost of development of new curriculum is amortised over a period of 5 years on Straight-line basis from the effective date of the new curriculum.
- c. Patent is amortised over a period of 5 years on straight line basis.

Intangible assets represent the software purchased under the HETC grant on their written down value and software purchased by the entity.

### **1.2.3 Curriculum Revision**

The university revises the curriculum for all degree programs in every five years and amendments are not making within that period. Hence, the expenditure incurred on capital funds are amortize over the five years period on the basis that the economic benefits would flow to the university during the effective period of the new syllabus .Since the faculty of Management Studies and Faculty of Geomatics have implemented the revised curriculum w.e.f. 2015, the expenditure incurred on that are amortizes w.e.f. 2015.Also since the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences and the Faculty of Applied Sciences have implemented the revised curriculum w.e.f.2016, the expenditure incurred on that are amortizesw.e.f.2016.

Further the university amortized the expenditure incurred for Faculty of Technology from 2019. In 2019 expenses incurred for the curriculum revision of Faculty of Management Studies, Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages and Center for Open Distance and Learning shows under work in progress. In 2020, due to the COVID 19 pandemic situation curriculum revision has not been implemented. Therefore these expenses will be amortized after implementing the new curriculum revision. However due to the implementation of Curriculum revision of Center for Open Learning, expenses have been amortized from 2020.

### **1.2.4 Knowledge Enhancement**

The expenditure incurred to enhance the knowledge of the employees is treated as capital expenditure and amortize over 5 year period.

**1.2.5 Primary Establishment cost**

Faculty of medicine was established in a building which is received from the Auditors General's Department and Faculty of Technology was established at university premises in the prevailing buildings. Cost incurred for the renovation and converting of these buildings to establishment of these faculties is treated as capital expenditures and amortize over 5 year period from 2019 financial year. Further consultancy service which is received after establishing the Faculty of Medicine is considered as capital expenses and amortized in incurred year.

**1.2.6 Livestock**

Livestock are revalue end of each financial year and revaluation surplus is add to the revaluation surplus account . If there is a deficit , deficit is adjusted to opening balance of the surplus account and different is charged to the statement of financial performance. In current year revaluation surplus is Rs.1,512,155.

**1.2.7 Inventories**

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realizable value. In general, cost is determined on a first in first out basis and includes expenditure incurred in acquiring the inventories and bringing them to their existing condition and location.

Inventories include all materials and supplies related to provision of services to the entity.

**1.2.8 Receivables**

Receivables are stated at the amounts they are estimated to realize.

**1.2.9 University Research Grant**

As per the SLPSAS 20, no intangible asset arising from research phase of an internal project shall be recognized. Expenditure on research phase activities shall be recognized as an expense when it is incurred. An intangible assets arising from development phase of an internal project shall be recognized if an only if the entity can demonstrate the recognition criteria. This Standard is adopted in current financial year with retrospectively and hope to continue in future.

The university has allocated funds to enhance research and development activities under the annual capital budget. The total amount spent for the research phase activities are shown as an expense in statement of financial performance. The aggregate amount of research expenditure recognized as expenditure during the year of 2020 is Rs.2,630,161.

### 1.2.10 Cash & cash equivalents

Cash & cash equivalents comprise cash balances at banks and short term deposits (3 month Fixed Deposits).

## 1.3 Liabilities & Provisions

All known liabilities as at the balance sheet date are included in the financial statements and adequate provisions are made for liabilities which are known to exist but the amount of which cannot be determined accurately.

Obligations payable on demand or within one year of the balance sheet date are treated as current liabilities in the balance sheet. Liabilities payable after one year from the balance sheet date are treated as noncurrent liabilities in the balance sheet.

### 1.3.1 Employee Benefits

#### (a) Defined Benefit Plans

Defined benefit plans estimate the amount of benefit that an employee will receive on retirement.

#### Provision for retiring Gratuity

The university has adopted the benefit plan as required under the payment of Gratuity Act No. 12 of 1983 for all eligible employees.

Defined benefit plans define an amount of benefit that an employee will receive on retirement usually dependent on one or more factors such as age, years of service and compensation. In order to meet this liability, a provision carried forward as at the reporting date, amount calculated based on an internal management assessment. Accordingly liability recognizes for the employees who have completed 5 years of service in the university system as at the reporting date. The resulting difference between brought forward provision as at the beginning of the period net of any payments made, and the carried forward provision at the end of the period is dealt with in the statement of profit and loss.

The gratuity liability are not externally funded nor actuarially valued.

As per the Commission Circular No. 05/2019 issued by the University Grants Commission in 2019, Gratuity payment to be made to the employees with considering Academic Allowance and Monthly Compensations Allowance (MCA) with effect from 2019.

**(b) Defined Contribution Plans**

A defined contribution plan is a post-employment plan under which an entity pays fixed contribution into a separate entity and will have no legal or constructive obligation to pay a further amount. Obligations for contributions to defined contribution plans are recognized as an expense in the statement of comprehensive income as and when they are due.

**University Provident Fund (UPF), Employee Provident Fund and University Pension Fund**

Permanent employees and the University monthly contribute 10% and 15% on the salary (Basic Salary + Cost of Living Allowance + Academic Allowance and Monthly Compensations Allowance) of each permanent employee to the university provident fund in line with the respective statues and legislation in Sri Lanka and University Act. From that 15% the University Contributes 8% to University Pension Fund and 7% to University Provident Fund for the employees who are the members of the University Pension Fund. For other permanent employees total 15% contribute to the University Provident Fund.

From the year 2000 Contribution for the University Pension Fund is compulsory for the all newly appointed employees.

The University and temporary employees monthly contribute 12% and 8% to the Employees' Provident Fund.

**Employees' Trust Fund (ETF)**

The university contributes 3% monthly on the basic salary and the allowances considered to contribute to University Provident Fund of each employee to the Employees' Trust Fund.

**1.3.2 Accounting for Grants**

Grants that compensate the University for Expenses incurred are recognized as revenue in the income statement in the same period in which the expenses are recognized. Grants that compensate the University for the Cost of an asset are recognized in the income statement on a systematic basis over the useful life of the related asset.

As per Sri Lanka Accounting standard 20 the university adopted income approach accounting principal when identifying capital grants and donations w.e.f. 2014.01.01 and hope to continue in future.

The university has received new capital grants of Rs.31 Million from the Ministry of Higher Educations for the Faculty of Medicine in the year 2020.

### **1.3.3 Contingent Liabilities**

Below mentioned all court cases are ongoing and we have to incur legal fees. Some compensation cannot be estimated at the moment. #### 1.4.1.1 The effective interest rate method

Under SLFRS 9, interest income is recorded using the effective interest rate (EIR) method for the all financial instruments in 2020. Financial assets are measured at amortized cost by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees that are an integral part of the EIR.

#### 1.4.2 Expenditure

All expenditure incurred in maintaining the university has been recognized on accrual basis and charged to the revenue in ascertaining the income over expenditure.

### 1.5 Events after the Reporting Period

Design and construction of a New Building Complex for the University Library -Stage I at Sabaragamuwa University Sri Lanka was awarded to CML -MTD Construction Limited on 27<sup>th</sup> December 2017 with the Contract period of 24 Calendar Months. Awarded value was Rs.315,051,433/-+VAT. Due to a financial crisis of the Company the construction of the Library building has become standstill. Sabaragamuwa University has entered tripartite agreement between Romet Construction (Pvt) Ltd, CML-MTD Construction Limited with the approval Ministry of Education on 01<sup>st</sup> February 2021. The University has enchased the performance guarantee on 03<sup>rd</sup> February 2021 due to non-compliance with the obligations of the contract by the Contractor. (Performance Guarantee No.PFG/CGD/18/003-LKR 15,752, 571/65).

Following figures shows in final account with regard to the above contract.

Working Progress Library Building - Rs. 39,314,427.39

Other than the Library Building Construction, there are no material events subsequent to the financial year which requires additional disclosure in the Financial Statements.

### 1.9 Higher Education for the 21<sup>st</sup> Century (HETC) Grant

HETC project has provided funds to increase IT, English and soft skill abilities of under graduate students and also in improvement of research and development of Post Graduate Students.

Out of this, assets purchased under the project valued Rs.77,827,930 and Rs. 20,078,188.81 spent for PhDs for academics are capitalized based on their written down value as at 01.01.2016 of Rs.66,638,815 in the year 2016. These assets are capitalized and the respective grant is amortized based on the university policies.

### 1.10 Grant from Confucius Institute

Confucius Institute Headquarters Fund has provided fund to build up Confucius Classroom at the Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages. Rs.5,257,400 has been received in 2019 and Rs.5,154,789 has been received in 2020. Fund or assets received or purchased from this grant are not belong to the university until handover to the university end of the project period. Hence, after completion

of the project assets which are constructed and purchased under this fund will be taken as the assets of the university at Net Book Value. Up-to the completion of the project Net value shows under restricted funds.

### 1.11 Inter Company Accounts

When preparing the financial statements of the university as at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2020 the amounting to Rs. 17,553,940 and payable to Center for Open and Distance Learning (CODL) are set off. Also the amounting to Rs.1,835,348 receivable from Faculty of Graduate Studies and payable to Faculty of Graduate Studies are set off.

### 1.12 Losses and damages

Due to the explosion off Chemistry Laboratory of Faculty Applied Sciences damages happed to the furniture, Floor area and Glassware items and other equipment in 2019.Total eatimated value is Rs.617,229.52. Out of this value Rs.454,899.32 are capital assets which have been capitalized with the value of the entire faculty building. Due to unavailability of original cost of following items losses are not taken to the account as an expense. All other items are consumable items which have been identified as expenses at the time of purchased.

We also conduct programs for personality and professional development of all the staff to prepare themselves for academic, administrative and academic support staff who will play a keynote in the economy towards achieving sustainable goals – 2030.

**The Report of the Auditor General in terms of section 12 of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 on financial statements and other legal and regulatory requirements of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka for the year ending on 31<sup>st</sup> December 2020.**

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### 1. Financial Statements

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#### 1.1 Opinion

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Financial Statement of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka as at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2020 and Financial Performance Statement, Net Asset Change Statement and Cash Flow Statement for the year ending on that day and notes on Financial Statements, Summary Important Accounting Policies Financial Statements for the Final Year as at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2020 jointly read with the subsection 107 (5) of the Universities Act, No. 16 of 1978 were audited under my direction in terms of the provisions provided in the article 154 (6) of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka and National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018. This report contains my views and observations which I intend to publish with the Annual Report of the University in terms of subsection 108 (1) of the Universities Act. My Report will be tabled in Parliament in due course in accordance with the article 154 (6) of the Constitution.

Apart from the impact of the facts described in the base section for the qualitative opinion in my report, I firmly believe that the financial status of the University as at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2020 and its financial performance and cash flow for the final year ending 31<sup>st</sup> December 2020 is in factual and equitable position in accordance with the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

#### 1.2 The Basis for the Statistical Opinion

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(a) Although fixed assets amounting Rs. 893,887,711 have been completely depreciated due to failure in reviewing the productive lifetime of immobile assets as per the 07 and 65 paragraphs of Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards, assets were being further utilized. Accordingly, measures have not been taken to revise the estimated error as per the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards - 03.

- (b) The mobile liabilities were higher than that value as the audit fees payable for the year 2018 had been over accounted by an amount of Rs. 1,104,000.
- (c) Previous year the cost of the work done amounting to Rs. 1,934,137 for the renovation of Anatomy Laboratories at the Faculty of Medicine has been accounted as work under financial statements without capitalizing it under refurbished buildings of the university.
- (d) The water purification plant attached to the university and two lands of 2 acres and 1 rood had been removed without any formal transference of ownership on behalf of the Pambahinna water supply scheme and its value of Rs. 1,600,000 and Rs. 900,000 respectively had been removed from accounts.
- (e) Measures have not been taken to disclose or allocate within the financial statements by identifying the contingent responsibility as per the court order dated 29th September 2017 to pay the relevant fee in relation to a case filed by the contractor on acquiring the fee for consultation service.
- (f) Cash Receipts and Cash Payments from Accelerating Higher Education Development Project (AHEAD) during the year under review were Rs. 207,169,036 and Rs. 207,105,986 as on 31st December of the year. The cash balance of Rs. 63,050 had not been mentioned in the cash flow statement.
- (g) The total amount received as the postgraduate fee revenue of Rs. 1,873,417 for previous year was taken into account for the year under review as income and the deficit of the year had been mentioned as less than the amount.
- (h) The year's income was accounted as low, and the deferred income was accounted as high due to the total of Rs. 1,667,000 which has been reimbursed to students from the revenue of the English Certificate course fees of the year under review had been erroneously debited and credited to the Income Account and the Deferred Income Account respectively.
- (i) An amount of Rs.1,235,430 as at the last day of the year under review relating to the schedules and various deposit balances, have not been submitted to the Audit Division.
- (j) I have done auditing as per Sri Lanka Audit Standards. My responsibility as per such audit standards is further described in the "Responsibility of the Auditor in relation to the auditing of financial statements". I firmly believe that the auditing evidences I have gathered are adequate and appropriate to provide a base for my statistical opinion.

### **1.3 Other information included in the 2020 Annual Report of Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka**

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“Other information” include the information that are entered in the university annual report 2020 which is to be handed over to me after the date of this audit report, but the information which are not included in the financial statements and in my audit report. The management should hold responsibility for these other information

My opinion on financial statements does not cover these other information and I do not provide any certification or present an opinion on these information

As per my auditing on financial statements, my responsibility is to read the “other information” when received and to check whether there is a quantitative misinterpretation between the other information and the financial statements as per my knowledge

When reading the annual report 2020 of the university, If I conclude that there is a quantitative misinterpretation, such should be communicated to the management. Further, if there are misinterpretations which are not rectified, such will be included in the report that is going to be tabled in the parliament as per the article 154 (6) in the constitution in due course

### **1.4 Responsibilities of the parties in the management and control of financial statements**

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It is the responsibility of the management to prepare and present these financial statements in accordance with the accounting standards of the Sri Lankan public sector and to determine the internal controls required to enable the preparation of financial statements without quantitative misrepresentations due to fraud or errors.

In preparing the financial statements, it is the responsibility of the management to determine the viability of the University and to disclose matters relating to the continued existence of the University unless the management intends to liquidate the University or discontinue operations in the absence of any other option.

Responsibility for the financial reporting process of the University rests with the governing parties.

As mentioned in sub-section 16 (1) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, The University shall maintain proper books and records on its own income, expenditure, assets and liabilities so as to prepare the Annual and Current Financial Statements of the University.

## 1.5 Responsibility of the Auditor in relation to the auditing of financial statements

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Overall, my goal is to provide a fair proof that there is no quantitative misrepresentation of financial statements, fraud and errors, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. While fair certification is a high level of certification, auditing in accordance with Sri Lanka Audit Standards does not always guarantee that it will detect quantitative misrepresentations. Fraud and misconduct, individually or collectively, can lead to quantitative misrepresentations and are expected to affect the economic decisions made by users based on these financial statements.

I conducted the audit in accordance with the Sri Lanka Audit Standards with professional judgment and professional skepticism.

- Furthermore, base of my opinion is to obtain adequate and appropriate audit evidence to avoid risks posed by fraud or error by designing appropriate audit procedures in time to identify and assess the risk of quantitative misrepresentations in financial statements due to fraud or errors. The effects of fraud are far greater than the effects of quantitative misrepresentations, which can lead to fraud, misrepresentation, forgery, intentional evasion, or evasion of internal controls.
- Gained an understanding of the internal governance of the University in order to design appropriate audit procedures from time to time, but does not intend to express an opinion on the effectiveness of internal governance.
- The fairness of the accounting policies and accounting estimates used and the relevance of the relevant disclosures made by management were evaluated.
- The relevance of using the basis of the continuity of the University for accounting was determined on the basis of the audit evidence obtained as to whether there is quantitative uncertainty about the continuity of the university due to events or circumstances. If I conclude that there is sufficient uncertainty, my audit report should focus on the disclosures made in the financial statements, and if those disclosures are not sufficient, my opinion should be distorted. However, continued existence may end on future events or circumstances.
- The presentation, structure and content of financial statements, including disclosures, were evaluated, and the transactions and events on which they were based were evaluated to be appropriately and reasonably included in the financial statements.

The governing parties were briefed on the important audit findings identified during my audit, key internal governance weaknesses and other issues.

## 2. Report on other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

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2.1 The National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 contains special provisions regarding the following requirements.

2.1.1 In accordance with the requirements set forth in Section 12 (a) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, I have obtained all the information and clarification required for the audit, except for the effect of the facts described in the Basis for the Assessed Opinion in my report. The investigation revealed that the University had maintained proper financial records.

2.1.2 The financial statements submitted by the University as per the requirement mentioned in Section 6 (1) (d) (III) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 correspond with the previous year.

2.1.3 The recommendations made by me during the last year as per the requirement mentioned in Section 6 (i) (d) (iv) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 are included in the financial statements submitted.

2.2 In restricting the action taken and the evidence obtained to quantitative facts, none of the following statements came to my notice.

2.2.1 In accordance with the requirement of Section 12 (d) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, any member of the Council of the University may be directly or indirectly involved in any contract other than the normal business situation, except for the following observations.

2.2.2 Not acting in accordance with the requirement of Section 12 € of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 or in accordance with any applicable written law or other general or special directives issued by the Board of Governors of the University.

2.2.3 The powers, tasks and functions of the University have not been complied with as required by Section 12 (g) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018.

2.2.4 As per the requirement mentioned in Section 12 (d) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, the resources of the University have not been procured and utilized in accordance with the relevant rules in a timely manner, efficiently and effectively except for the following observations.

- (a) A contract was made and entered into with the contractor on 30th January to complete the phase I of the new library building within 24 months at a cost of Rs. 315,051,433 (Without VAT) The contractor has been paid an amount of Rs. 83,010,286 as an advance for the commencement of the work and for the work done. However, the value valued by the Work Engineer was Rs. 43,058,226. Due to this reason, the construction activities had been abandoned since February 2020, when the contractor had a surplus value of Rs. 39,951, 460. No action was taken to cash in on or to extend the term of the advance bond (B) A three-member board of inquiry was appointed in February 2018 regarding the purchasing of 130 desktop computers in June 2016 at a cost of Rs. 15,964,000 which were non-compliance with the specified specifications. It was observed that without obtaining the relevant investigation report, Rs. 110,000 had been paid the board in June 2018. Also, without being satisfied that it complies with the specifications of the detention of Rs. 1,596,400 was released to the contractor on June 21, 2018.

Further the detentions amounting to Rs. 1,596,400 was released to the Contractor on 21st of June 2018

### 2.3 Other Audit Observations

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- (a) Although an amount of Rs. 1,370,300 has been paid from 2016 to develop a software and enter data for a fixed asset register, such was not prepared by 31st of December of the year under review

- (b) Although products and equipment of a value of Rs. 2,725,000 have been provided by the “Higher Education Project for 21st Century” to establish an Out Bound Training Centre attached to the faculty of Applied sciences of the university, due to the shortage of required infrastructure and planning, those equipment have been underutilized and most of the equipment were not in a usable condition.
- (c) The university funds amounting to Rs. 1,200,000 have been spent for the participation of the former Registrar in the PIM International on Management which was held from 21st of August to 30th August 2018 in Netherland without the approval of the ministry. Although the council of the university has decided to recover the total cost, without doing such, the officer was released to Kothelawela Defence University in effective from 31st of March 2020 by the Council of the university.
- (d) Since the funds provided by the local and foreign institutes for research and environmental studies projects have not been utilized, by the end of the year under review, an amount of Rs. 4,418,209 had become useless
- (e) As at December 2019, there were 110 vacancies out of 506 approved posts in the academic staff and 132 vacancies out of 530 approved posts in the non - academic staff. Due to those vacancies in the non – academic staff, holiday and overtime allowances amounting to Rs. 19,854,304 has to be paid
