Foreword

The position of President was introduced by the Constitution of Sri Lanka 1972 promulgated and implemented in that year. Article 19 in the Chapter VII of the Constitution stipulates that “There shall be a President of the Republic of Sri Lanka who is the Head of the State”. The unprecedented position of President thus came into existence anew.

In terms of the Article 25 of the Constitution, the President is nominated by the Prime Minister. Thus the President was only a nominal head. The term of office of the President was four years. Under the provisions of this Article, the then Prime Minister Mrs. Sirimavo R. D. Bandaranaike appointed Mr. William Gopallawa as the first nominal President of the country. After the President Mr. William Gopallawa stepped down in the year 1978, Mr. J.R.Jayawardene who was holding the position of Prime Minister swore in as President in terms of the Second Amendment to the 1972 Constitution of Sri Lanka.

The Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka was introduced in the year 1978, by which the Executive Presidential system was brought in for the first time in Sri Lanka. According to Article 30(1). "There shall be a President of the Republic of Sri Lanka, who is the Head of the State, the Head of the Executive and of the Government and the Commander-in-Chief of the Armed Forces". According to Article 30(2) the President of the Republic shall be elected by the people and shall hold office for a term of six years. Under these provisions, the procedure to elect the President was elaborated and the term of office of the President was laid down as six years. Transitional legal provisions were provided in the Article 160 of Chapter XXI of the 1978 Constitution where the person holding the office of President immediately before the commencement of the Constitution to be deemed to have been elected as President of the Republic. Mr. J.R.Jayawardene who was holding the position of President swore in as President on February 04, 1978.

Laws required to elect a President in order to fulfill the needs of the statement that the “President shall be elected by the People” in the Constitution, were enacted by promulgating the Presidential Elections Act No. 15 of 1981.

The first-ever election to elect a President mentioned in the Constitution was conducted on October 20, 1982 according to the provisions in the Presidential Elections Act. Seven elections had been conducted thereafter by the Department of Elections respectively on December 19, 1988, November 09, 1994, December 21, 1999, November 17, 2005, January 10, 2010 and on January 08, 2015 to elect the President.

Seventeenth Amendment to the Constitution of the Republic of Sri Lanka provided for the establishment of an Election Commission and to transfer the role of the Department of Elections to the Commission. However, neither the provisions specified in the Seventeenth Amendment nor the provisions in the Eighteenth Amendment passed thereafter, were implemented.

Nevertheless, the Election Commission was established under the Article 103 of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka according to the Nineteenth Amendment brought in the year 2015. On November 13, 2015, President appointed the Chairman and members as recommended by the Constitutional Council and the Election Commission came into operation on November 17, 2015, after the members assuming duties. The Commission consisted of three members including the Chairman. The term of office of the Commission was five years. In terms of the Article 103(2) of the Constitution the object of the Commission is to conduct free and fair elections and Referenda, With the appointment of the Commission all statutory functions and powers of the Department of Elections were transferred to the Election Commission. With this transfer of powers, the whole staff of the Commission inclusive of the Commissioner General carried out the conduct of elections under the directives, instructions and guidelines of the Election Commission.

This report is on the Presidential Election 2019 conducted by the Election Commission. The report consists of all information, related matters, schedules and results sheets pertaining to the election. Conducting a national level election is a massive task. The objective of the Commission was to shoulder the responsibility of lawfully and impartially conducting a free, fair and credible election in a transparent manner, acceptable to the judiciary and the public.

After conducting an election, it is the duty and responsibility of the Election Commission to study all related matters, information, schedules, election results, other data and statistics and present a report on the election to the public. The intention of the Commission after the conduct of the Presidential Election 2019, was to present a comprehensive report which could be easily used by the public inclusive of the stakeholders of the Election Commission such as the political parties, candidates, electors, citizens and observer organizations. This work is immensely useful to those who are looking for information on elections, for researchers on the electoral processes, to the students engaged in academic exercises and to the scholars. Therefore, action was taken to prepare an extensive report including all statutory matters, electoral processes, regulations, directives, guidelines, Codes of Ethics, election results and also electoral dispute resolution data.

Organizing and conducting all activities related to the election was the duty and function of the Election Commission and the whole staff of the Commission including the Commissioner General, but it is more appropriate to state that it was a result of a collective effort of the whole public service. It is the sum total of the dedication, seamless commitment, sense of duty and responsibility holden by the whole Public Service including the Police and Three Armed Forces connected with the organizing and implementing all the activities related to the conduct of the election. The Commission thanks all those co-operated in the whole process, Mr. Saman Sri Rathnayake, Commissioner General of Elections of the Commission, who supervised it and the staff of all divisions and the staff of District Elections Offices including the District Returning Officers, who assisted throughout and the Secretary of the Election Commission Mr. H.M.T.D.Herath who prepared this report.

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Chapter One

Introduction and Legal Provisions related to the Election of the President

Introduction

The Executive President of Sri Lanka as well as peoples' representatives to the Legislature, Provincial Councils, and the Local Authorities are being elected through elections conducted for the respective representative bodies. Parliament has promulgated separate elections Acts for these representative institutions. On top of all these, there is the principal law of the Country known as the Constitution of Sri Lanka.

Constitution is the basic law of the Country. This basic law had been fashioned before Independence by the British Royalty through Orders-in-Council. The basic law introduced by the Donoughmore Constitution and then by the Soulbury Constitution was operative in Sri Lanka even after Independence. It was only in the year 1972, a home-made Constitution was promulgated, for the first time, in Sri Lanka. This Constitution was named as the "Constitution of Sri Lanka". The government formed according to this Constitution consisted of a nominal President, a cabinet headed by the Prime Minister and a National State Assembly comprising of peoples representatives. With the introduction of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka 1978, the Constitution operative from 1972 to 1978 ceased to exist. The 1978 Constitution made the nominal President, an Executive President. The Legislature with people's representatives became the Parliament.

In addition, another institution of people's representatives called the Provincial Councils was introduced by the Thirteenth Amendment to the 1978 Constitution and new laws were formed to elect representatives to those Provincial Councils.

Basic requirements to conduct elections to elect the President, and representatives to Parliament, Provincial Councils and Local Authorities were provided by the Constitution and the laws required to hold elections to these institutions were promulgated by the Legislature through special Acts of Parliament. The Constitution has also introduced the methodology to conduct Referenda. Following are the Acts.

Parliamentary Elections Act No 1 of 1981
Referendum Act No 2 of 1981
Presidential Elections Act No 15 of 1981
Provincial Councils Elections Act No 2 of 1988
Local Authorities Elections Order-in-Council (Cap 262) (Amendment)

It was the responsibility of the Department of Elections to conduct elections at stipulated time periods. It was the general practice to publish a report after each election. Accordingly, the then Commissioners of Elections had duly published the reports of Presidential Elections, Parliamentary Elections, Provincial Councils Elections, Local Authorities Elections and the report of the only Referendums held in the year 1982. There had been some instances where interim reports were published or reports were included as parts of Annual Reports prepared by the Department when a separate report for any particular election was not prepared.

After establishing the Election Commission in November 2015, the conduct of free and fair elections and Referenda was vested with the Election Commission in terms of the Article 103 (2) of the Constitution.

1.1 Legal Provisions related to the Election of the President

The legal sources related to the conduct of the Presidential Election are the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka and the Presidential Elections Act No 15 of 1981.

1.1.1 Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka

The Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka promulgated in the year 1978 had undergone nineteen Amendments upto the year 2019 and legal provisions related to the Presidential Elections have to be examined subject to the provisions in all those amendments. Article 3 of the Constitution states that sovereignty is in the People and it includes the administrative powers, fundamental rights and the franchise. Article 4 describes how the sovereignty of the People is exercised and

enjoyed. Article 4(b) mentions that the executive power of the people including the defence of Sri Lanka is exercised by the President elected by the People. Article 4(e) says that franchise is exercisable at the election of the President by every citizen who is qualified to be an elector and has his/her name entered in the register of electors.

Articles 30 to 41 in the Chapter VII provide for the election of the President, term of office, vacation of office by President, validity of an election to elect a President and election of the succeeding President.

Articles 88 to 102 in the Chapter XIV, stipulate the right to be an elector, disqualifications for election as President and the election of the President. Chapter XIV describes about the establishment of the Election Commission which has the authority to conduct elections, its powers, duties and functions.

1.1.2 Presidential Elections Act No 15 of 1981

Legal provisions to elect the President introduced by the 1978 Republic Constitution, are described in the Presidential Elections Act No 15 of 1981. The Act is described as "An Act to provide for election of the President of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka by the People and for matters connected therewith or incidental thereto." New provisions were included to this Act by the following Amendments.

- Presidential Elections (Amendment) Act No 16 of 1988
- Elections (Special Provisions) Act No 35 of 1988
- Elections (Special Provisions) Act No 14 of 2004
- Elections (Special Provisions) Act No 28 of 2011
- Presidential Elections Act amended by above Amendments comprises of 7 parts as follows.
 - Part I Preliminary
 - Part II Nominations
 - Part III The Poll
 - Part IV Count
 - Part V Offences, Corrupt Practices, Illegal Practices and Excuse for Corrupt or Illegal Practices

- Part VI Election Petitions
- Part VII General

Relevant forms and requisites in the implementation of the above provisions are given in five schedules.

1.2 Presidential Elections conducted under the Presidential Election Act by the Department of Elections from 1982 to 2015

The first election to elect a President was conducted on October 20, 1982 under the provisions in the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka and the Presidential Elections Act No 15 of 1981. Thereafter the Department of Elections conducted six (6) Presidential Elections respectively on December 19, 1988, November 09, 1994, December 21, 1999, November 17, 2005, January 10, 2010 and on January 08, 2015. The following Presidents were elected by the electors at these elections.

The first Presidential Election was conducted on November 16, 2019 by the Election Commission established on November 13, 2015 consequent to the Nineteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka. The notice under the Article 2 of Presidential Elections Act No 15 of 1981 read with Article 31(3) of the Constitution was published on 18.09.2019. According to this notice. nominations were accepted on 17.10.2019 where 35 nominations were received. Total number of valid votes cast was 13,252,499 at the election held on 16.11.2019 and Hon Gotabhaya Rajapakse polled 6,924,255 votes (52.25%) and was elected President.

Chapter Two

Nominations

02. Nominations

After publishing the notice of any election, receiving nominations for the election is the foremost initial function. Nominations for Presidential Election were handed over to the Commissioner of Elections when the Department of Elections was in existence and after establishing the Election Commission, nominations were handed over to the Commission. The date, time and venue are notified by a gazette notice.

2.1 The Order published under the Section 2 of the Presidential Elections Act No 15 of 1981

The notice under Section 2 of the Presidential Elections Act No 15 of 1981 read with Article 31 (3) of the Constitution, that the poll for the election of the President would be taken not less than one month and not more than two months before the expiration of the term of office of the President in office, was published in the Extraordinary gazette No 2141/25 of 18.09.2019. In the same notice the date, time and venue of receiving nominations was mentioned as 07.10.2019 between 9.00 am to 11.00 am, at the Elections Secretariat, Sarana Mawatha, Rajagiriya and 16.12.2019 as the date on which the poll would be taken. The gazette notification appears as **Annexure 01** of this report. Details were given in the media release issued on 18.09.2019.

2.2 Appointment of Returning Officers to each District

The responsibility of implementing the electoral process in the districts under the instructions, guidance and directions of the Election Commission is vested upon the Returning Officers. The Returning Officers therefore, have to be appointed to each electoral district to act according to the Article 104 F(1), 104 F(2) and Section 07 of the Presidential Elections Act. These appointments are made by name or by the office held. By the Extraordinary gazette No 2141/26 of 18.09.2019 (**Annexure 02**), 22 Returning Officers were appointed for 22 electoral districts. District Secretariats/Government Agents of Administrative Districts, other than Jaffna and Vanni Electoral

districts were appointed as District Returning Officers by the Election Commission. District Secretary/ Government Agent of Jaffna was appointed as District Returning Officer for the Jaffna Electoral District which comprised two administrative districts i.e Jaffna and Killinochci, and Vavuniya District Secretary/ Government Agent was appointed as District Returning Officer for Vanni Electoral District which comprised three administrative districts i.e Vavuniya, Mannar and Mullaitivu. Ampara District Secretary/ Government Agent was appointed as the District Returning Officer for Digamadulla Electoral District.

2.2.1 Appointment of Assistant Returning Officers for Electoral districts

At every election, Assistant Returning Officers are appointed to assist the District Returning Officers and to perform the duties. Deputy Commissioners of Elections and Assistant Commissioners of Elections of each administrative district were appointed by their offices held, as Assistant Returning Officers of those electoral districts under Section 7(1) of the Presidential Elections Act 1981 and published in the gazette No 2141/27 of 18.09.2019 (**Annexure 03**).

2.2.2 Appointment of Assistant Returning Officers for the whole Island

At the inception, the District Deputy/ Assistant Election Commissioners appointed as Assistant Returning Officers for those districts, identify the officers serving various government institutions who are qualified to be appointed as Assistant Returning Officers, for the initial start up activities of the election. Thereafter the Election Commission gazetted the staff officers by name and by office as Assistant Returning Officers who could be engaged in the functions that cover the whole Island. These officers were assigned to the districts as the need arose especially on the day of poll, in the issue of documents connected with the electoral procedure, receipt of documents, supervision of zones, count, complaints, co-ordination functions etc. Out of these Assistant

Returning Officers, those who had long experience in elections were attached to the Elections Secretariat who were engaged in special duties while keeping close contacts with the Election Commission.

2.3 Recognized Political Parties

Political Parties recognized under the Parliamentary Elections Act No 1 of 1981 were recognized as political parties under the Presidential Elections Act, as well. At the time the Order under Section 2 of the Presidential Elections Act was published on 18.09.2019, the number of recognized political parties under Section 7 of the Parliamentary Elections Act, was Seventy (70). The gazette No 2108/41 of 31.01.2019 which published the list of recognized political parties appears in the **Annexure 04**.

2.4 Qualifications to be a Candidate to contest the Presidential Election

Article 92 of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka as amended by the Nineteenth Amendment to the Constitution indicates the qualifications to be elected as the President. Accordingly, every person who is qualified to be an elector is qualified to be elected to the office of President unless he is subject to the following disqualifications;

- (a) he has not attained the age of thirty-five years
- (b) he is not qualified to be elected as a Member of Parliament under sub-paragraph (d), (e), (f) or (g) paragraph (c) of Article 91
- (c) he has been twice elected to the office of President by the people
- (d) he has been removed from the office of President under the provisions of sub-paragraph (e) of paragraph (2) of Article 38
- (e) he is also a citizen of another country

2.5 Deposits

The law regarding the deposits by candidates is given in Section 8 of the Presidential Elections Act. Candidates who intend to submit nominations on 07.10.2019, the nomination day, to contest the election, had to make deposits before 12.00 noon of 06.10.2019. On behalf of a candidate of a recognized political party, Rs. 50,000/- had to be deposited and on behalf other candidates, Rs.

75,000/- had to be deposited. It was informed that the deposits would be received by the Chief Financial Officer of the Commission on behalf of the Election Commission. Except for the candidates nominated by recognized political parties, it is a legal requirement that other candidates should submit a certificate under the hand of Secretary General of Parliament, to prove that he/ she is or had been a member of the Legislature. The notice under Section 8(1)(b)(1) was published in the Extraordinary gazette No 2141/92 of 22.09.2019. It is attached as **Annexure 05** to this report. The media release No 01 of the Election Commission was made on 18.09.2019 in this regard. A total of 41 candidates i.e 19 candidates from recognized political parties, 3 candidates from other political parties and 19 other candidates, made deposits on 06.10.2019 to contest the election scheduled for 16.11.2019. List of those who made deposits is given in the **Annexure 06**.

- A receipt was issued as proof to each deposit as directed in the Act and the following documents were issued to every candidate after receiving the deposit.
- The receipt mentioned in the Section 8 of the Presidential Elections Act No 15 of 1981
- The Presidential Elections Act No 15 of 1981
- Six sets of nomination papers in Sinhala, Tamil and English languages
- Form to declare Assets and liabilities of candidates
- Instructions on entering the nomination center
- Entry permits and vehicle permits to the nomination center
- Declaration that the candidate is not subject to any disqualification

2.6 Receiving of Nominations

Receiving of nominations is the most important event in the electoral process. Nominations for this election were accepted by the Chairman of the Commission, Mr. Mahinda Deshapriya, Member Mr. N.J.Abeyssekara and Member Prof. S.R.H.Hoole. Examining the nominations and other related activities were carried out by the Commissioner General of Elections, Secretary to the Commission, Additional Election Commissioners and other staff appointed for the purpose.

Election Commission took all necessary steps under Sections 12, 13 and 14 of the Act to carry out the nomination procedure methodically. A discussion was conducted to educate the secretaries of political parties and candidates about the nomination procedure. The staff of the Election Commission made all arrangements with the assistance of Sri Lanka Police to ensure the security of candidates and others who are coming to hand over nominations, the transport arrangement, and providing facilities for nomination activities. The candidate, the person who signed the nomination and one other person were allowed to come to the place where nominations were accepted according to the provisions in the Presidential Elections Act. Numerous difficulties had to be encountered in providing facilities to all those who were present in the hall where nominations were accepted, because the number of candidates was very large.

Forty-one (41) persons made deposits for candidature during the stipulated time, but it was significant that not all those who made deposits, submitted nominations. Following six persons made deposits to receive candidature but did not hand over nominations.

Only 35 persons handed over nominations as candidates. Eighteen (18) candidates out of them were from recognized political parties, 2 candidates from other political parties and 15 other candidates. After accepting the nominations the Election Commission had to scrutinize the nominations and declare whether they are accepted or rejected.

2.7 Objections to Nominations

In terms of the Section 14 of the Presidential Elections Act, a time period from 9.00 am to 11.30 am on 07.10.2019 was granted to make objections on the nominations. According to the Section 13 (2) of the Act a photocopy of each nomination paper had to be exhibited to enable making objections. Accordingly, copies of all nomination papers were displayed outside the nomination hall. Section 14(1) of the Act provides for any opponent candidate or the person who signed the nomination of the opponent candidate to raise objections. During the time given two opponent candidates made objections. The objections were as follows.

2.8 Decisions on the Nominations

Forty-one (41) candidates made deposits at this election, but there were only 35 nominations. Six (6) persons who made deposits did not hand over nominations. Section 15 of the Act provides for the Election Commission to reject nominations which had not fulfilled the requirements stipulated in the Act. The Commission was satisfied that all 35 nominations had been duly submitted by qualified persons according to the provisions in the Act and therefore it was decided to accept all of them. The decisions of the Commission with reasons were declared at the auditorium of the Elections Secretariat in front of the candidates who handed over nominations on 07.10.2019.

2.9 Arranging the order of Candidates according to the Nominations

The names of candidates to be printed in the ballot paper are arranged according to the Sinhala alphabetical order. Candidates have the liberty to use the name in the ballot paper as written in the nomination paper or they can opt for any alternative way of appearing the names according to their liking. This was inquired from the candidates. According to the response of the

candidates the Election Commission took steps to arrange the order of names of candidates in the alphabetical order. Thereafter the Commission allotted the symbols for candidates, in terms of the Section 20. Party symbols were allotted to the candidates nominated by recognized political parties and symbols to other candidates were allotted according to the Section 20 (1)(b) of the Act.

Rev. Aparekke Pungnananda and Mr. M.K. Sivajilingam asked for the symbol "Fish" and Mr. Anura Kumara Dissanayake and Mr. Samansiri Herath asked for the symbol "Compass". Symbols for these candidates were allotted after drawing lots. Symbols for the four candidates allotted after the draw were as follows.

The list of names of candidates prepared according to the alphabet was published in the Extraordinary gazette No 2144/06 of 07.10.2019 which appears as **Annexure 07** in this report.

2.10 Appointment of Election Agents

Section 31 of the Presidential Elections Act provides for the appointment of election agents. Accordingly, a candidate can appoint one person as his/ her election agent. It is also possible for the candidate to appoint himself/ herself as his/ her election agent. In such cases the candidate and the election agent is one and the same person. According to the Section 31 (3)(1) of the Presidential Elections Act, information about the election agent has to be given to the Election Commission.

In terms of Section 32 of the Presidential Elections Act, the election agent can appoint an authorized agent to each electoral district. The authorized agent can appoint a divisional agent to each polling division. Information about the authorized agent and divisional agent has to be given by the candidate to the Returning Officer of the electoral district. The list of agents of each candidate is given in **Annexure 08**.

Chapter Three

Preliminary Organization of the Activities of the Election

03. Preliminary Organizational Activities

Presidential Election has to be conducted and concluded according to the provisions in the Presidential Elections Act No 15 of 1981 during a limited period of time, and therefore the Election Commission is charged with a heavy responsibility of organizing the conduct of the election in a speedy manner. The initial step in this regard for the Election Commission was to convene the District Secretaries/ Government Agents as District Returning Officers and Deputy/ Assistant Commissioners of Elections in the District Elections Offices and give instructions on the preliminary arrangements. Two rounds of discussions were held at the Elections Secretariat on 06.08.2019 and 23.08.2019 with the District Returning Officers, and Deputy/ Assistant Commissioners of Elections of district offices. In addition, the preliminary organization and problems encountered were discussed through video conferencing with the Deputy/ Assistant Commissioners of Elections and necessary instructions were given then and there.

The Government Press and the Postal Department are prime among the agencies that provide essential services to the Election Commission from the inception of the conduct of the election immediately after publishing the notice about holding the election. Heads of the institutions i.e Government Printer and Post Master General respectively, were invited soon after the notice of election was published and explained the services expected from them.

The Government Printer had to print a large amount of material including the ballot papers and other statutory documents within a specific time period and hand them over to the Election Commission. Another important function of the Government Printer was to publish gazette notices starting from the poll notice upto the election results and all related information.

Postal Department provides all necessary facilities on priority basis in the exchange of

election related correspondence between the Election Commission and District Returning Officers. It plays a big role in postal voting, one of the most important aspects in an election. Another responsibility of the Postal Department is to deliver official poll cards to the electors. Heads of those institutions were advised to forward the cost estimates at the earliest with regard to these services anticipated from them.

Ceylon Electricity Board, Sri Lanka Telecom and National Water Supplies and Drainage Board play an exceptional role in providing common utilities in the conduct of an election. Services required from them were discussed with the representatives of the Heads of those institutions to ensure a systematic and frugal flow of the services.

Transport facilities required for the election were discussed and decisions were taken with the officers of the Sri Lanka Transport Board and the officials of Private Bus Owners Associations on how their services are obtained. At the district level, members of vehicle rental companies were convened and the support expected from them was discussed.

3.1 The valid Electoral Register

As the revision of the register had not been completed, the electoral register for the year 2019 was not finalized on 18.09.2019, the day the Order under Section 2 of the Presidential Elections Act was published by the Election Commission. Section 5 of the Presidential Elections Act states that the register of electors to be used for the purpose of the Act is the register in operation on the date of the publication of the Order under Section 2. The Section 6 says that the register of electors referred to in Section 5 is conclusive evidence for the purpose of determining whether a person is entitled to vote under this Act. Accordingly, the register in operation on that date was the 2018 Electoral Register and it was used for the purposes of this Presidential Election, and the number of copies of

the 2018 Register required for the election was printed. The number of qualified electors according to the 2018 Register was 15,992,096.

3.2 Registration of Electors (Special Provisions) Act No 27 of 2013

Apart from the provisions in the Presidential Elections Act, action had to be taken to act according to the provisions in the Registration of Electors (Special Provisions) Act No 27 of 2013 as well. The Registration of Electors (Special Provisions) Act No 27 of 2013 provides for the internally displaced persons and qualified persons in their families to cast vote in the electoral district where their resident places existed before displacement. As per the provisions in the Act, those who were registered in the certified supplementary register related to the 2018 electoral register should be granted opportunity to apply to cast vote at a different polling station. At this election this opportunity was availed of, for only two qualified voters.

3.3 Printing of Ballot Papers

Immediately after accepting nominations, a specimen ballot paper with the names arranged in the alphabetical order and allotted symbols, was handed over to the Government Printer. Proofs of the ballot paper were examined by the Election Commission and the printing of ballot papers commenced after the approval of the Commission. Printing of the ballot paper for this election was easier than printing of ballot papers to a Parliamentary Election, as the ballot paper was common to all electoral districts. But the staff of the Government Press had to make a tremendous effort in printing, because it had to be completed within a very short time period. Government Press was advised to print ballot papers required for postal voters first, and then to print the quantities required for the districts. The effort made by the Government Printer and her staff to complete the printing work on time, amidst many difficulties is highly commendable.

Immediately after printing the ballot papers they were delivered to the District Returning Officers under police security, where they were deposited in the vaults and were protected with special police security until they were handed over to the Senior Presiding Officers. Instructions were given

to bundle ballot papers by the prepoll day according to the numbers of ballot papers required by the polling stations and according to the issuing centers and store them again in the vaults under strict police security.

3.4 Electoral Districts

Sri Lanka is divided into 22 electoral districts for the purpose of holding elections. These electoral districts were demarcated by the Delimitation Commission 1978. Recommendations of this Delimitation Commission were published by Proclamation in the gazette No 1233 of January 15, 1981 under Article 97 of the Constitution by President, where Sri Lanka was divided into 22 electoral districts. Vanni Electoral District was formed amalgamating the administrative districts of Mannar, Vavuniya and Mullaitivu and, after instituting Kilinochchi as a separate administrative district, Jaffna Electoral District was formed amalgamating Jaffna and Kilinochchi administrative districts. Nineteen (19) other administrative districts were named as electoral districts after their administrative names while naming the Ampara Administrative District as Diagamadulla Electoral District. These 22 electoral districts were recognized as the electoral districts for the election conducted to elect the President.

3.5 Polling Divisions and Polling Districts

The 22 electoral districts were further divided into polling divisions in terms of the Article 97 of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka 1978 and Section 9 of the Registration of Electors Act No 44 of 1980. The number of polling divisions was 160. Details of polling districts in these polling divisions were published in extraordinary gazette notifications during the period from 03.02.1981 to 13.02.1981. Dividing of polling districts in the polling divisions under the directions issued by the Election Commission is a responsibility of the Registration Officers in the electoral districts. Legal provisions to make necessary changes in the constitution and numbers of electors in polling districts of polling divisions taking the fluctuation of numbers of electors in the polling divisions, physical matters such as access to polling stations, in order to facilitate the electors, are provided in the Registration of Electors Act. Although the

whole island was considered one electoral district at the national level in the election to elect President, the divisions of electoral districts, polling divisions and polling districts were followed in the Presidential Election for the convenience of organizing the election activities, collecting information and the counting of results. The map with 22 electoral districts and polling divisions is in **Annexure 09**.

3.6 Polling Stations (Polling Booths)

Polling station or the polling booth is the place established for the registered electors to cast their vote freely without fear. A permanent building or a temporary building (shed) is used generally for this purpose. These places have to be identified within two weeks after nominations and it was essential that they had to be repaired if necessary, in order to be used for the purpose. In establishing polling stations, the number of electors that could be catered along with social factors has to be taken into consideration while providing mixed polling stations (males and females) or stations exclusively for females. After dividing the polling stations, they are published in the gazette according to the polling divisions of each electoral district. With regard to this election the list of 12,845 polling stations were published in the gazette No 2144/08 of 07.10.2019. The classified list of polling stations at district level is included as **Annexure 10** to this report.

- (i) Specially the suitability of the building and the facilities available were considered before establishing a polling station. Following are the important factors in this regard.
- (ii) The number of electors assigned to the polling station, to cast vote.
- (iii) Minimizing the walking distance for the elector.
- (iv) Locating the polling station at a central place as much as possible.
- (v) Availability of a room with security.
- (vi) Easy access.
- (vii) Basic requirements for the poll staff such as sanitary facilities, water, electricity etc.
- (viii) Easy access for disabled voters.
- (ix) A place with minimum damages from natural disasters.

3.7 Supply of Ballot Boxes

Traditionally the wooden ballot boxes supplied by the Government Factory were used in the polling stations to deposit the marked ballot papers at an election. There had been instances where fibre boxes and aluminium boxes were used along with wooden boxes. Larger ballot boxes were used to deposit postal ballot papers which were bigger than the boxes used at ordinary polling centers. More than one ballot box had to be supplied to polling stations at this election because the ballot paper was unusually long due to the increased number of registered political parties, increase in the number of candidates and the presence of a large number of independent candidates, and therefore the number of ballot papers that could be inserted into one ballot box was reduced. This created a problematic situation in managing the polling centers.

Thirty-five candidates submitted nominations in this Presidential Election and all nominations were accepted and therefore the ballot paper was 24 inches long. Due to this length of the ballot paper, it was a challenging task to supply the necessary number of ballot boxes required at a polling station to deposit the ballot papers. After a study it was observed that only 350-400 ballot papers could be inserted into one wooden ballot box. Election officials informed the Election Commission that more than one ballot box was required for one polling station. Wooden ballot boxes were too heavy and difficult to handle, and it was clear that the Senior Presiding Officers and the poll staff in the polling station would face many difficulties. It was also impossible to get additional wooden ballot boxes immediately and therefore an alternative arrangement was crucial and urgent.

Turning out plastic ballot boxes was discussed with leading plastic manufacturers in the country but it was not possible to setup the grounds to meet the need of the Election Commission immediately. It was not possible to get plastic ballot boxes from foreign suppliers as the cost was prohibitive. In this backdrop it transpired that turning out cardboard ballot boxes was profitable and suitable in view of the urgent need of the day.

After discussing the proposals received in this regard it was decided to use three sizes of boxes turned out of special cardboards. There were proposals to import such cardboard boxes but the Additional Commissioner of Elections in charge of National Elections in the Election Commission and his staff, presented the samples to local suppliers with necessary instructions, encouraged them and got the boxes turned out locally. This enabled the Commission to meet the need for ballot boxes with low-weight and low-cost.

Thus the required number of ballot boxes of 3 sizes i.e. small (14"x14"x24"), medium (18"x15.5"x25") and large (21"x18.5"x27") with low weights i.e. small boxes- 1.55kg, medium boxes - 2.05kg, and large boxes - 2.65kg, according to the approved specifications were produced by local manufactures in a short time period.

The cost of wooden ballot box manufactured by the Government Factory costs more than Rs. 15,000.00. The price of plastic ballot box imported in the year 2014 was around Rs. 10,450.00. The cost of small cardboard ballot box was Rs.800.00, medium box was Rs.950.00 and the large box was Rs.1050.00, without Value Added Tax. The Senior Presiding Officers who used them highly appreciated the product as they were light, easy to transport, easy to handle and at a reduced cost. In addition, the wooden boxes and fibre boxes were also put into use.

3.8 Security Arrangements

In terms of the Article 104C, it is the duty of the Inspector General of Police to provide facilities and a number of police personnel as required by the Election Commission from the date of the publication of the notice on election till the end of a week after declaration of results. Article 104D provides for the Commission to make recommendations to the President regarding the deployment of the Armed Forces for the prevention or control of any actions or incidents which may be prejudicial to the holding of a free and fair election. Several rounds of discussions were held with the Inspector General of Police, senior police officers including the Senior Deputy Inspector General in charge of Elections at the

Elections Secretariat. According to the agreements arrived at, at the discussions, District Returning Officers and Deputy/ Assistant Commissioners of Elections in the districts conducted discussions with senior police officers in the districts and OICs of police stations and made security arrangements at the district level. Officers of the Legal, Investigation and Election Dispute Resolution Unit of the Commission also participated at the discussions held in the districts to review the situation in the districts, security arrangements and the enforcement of the election law. In the implementation of the security arrangements, the support of the Ministry of Defence was also obtained.

Inspector General of Police took steps to provide sufficient police security to the Elections Secretariat, offices of the District Returning Officers and District Election Offices. In order to satisfy the security needs and the enforcement of the law, Sri Lanka Police established elections units in all police stations and in order to enforce the law they maintained direct links with the Election Commission and the District Elections Offices. As the objective of the Election Commission, political parties, candidates, observer organizations and civil organizations was to create a conducive environment to hold a free and fair election, the secretaries of political parties, leaders of independent groups, Inspector General of Police and senior officers of the Police Department were invited to the discussions held in the Election Secretariat.

Sri Lanka Police played a major role in enforcing the election law and assuring same and in maintaining law and order during the election period under the directions of the Election Commission. There were 30 officers attached to the election unit under the Senior Deputy Inspector General (Elections) of the Police Head Quarters as directed by the Inspector General of Police. Under their direct supervision, 15 police officers attached to Elections Operations and Security Coordinating Center of the Election Secretariat, 238 officers in the divisional elections operation rooms of the police, and 281 police officers attached to 25 District Election Complaints Units engaged in supervision, law

enforcement, co-ordination and operations during the period from the date of the Proclamation of the election, upto the declaration of results. In addition, nearly 350 officers of the Police and Special Task Force were engaged in duties at the Elections Secretariat and the surrounding area on the nomination day where a special security arrangement was implemented. In order to cover security requirements, 72,808 officers of the Police and Special Task Force were deployed during the silent period after propaganda work, on the poll day and on the counting day. Details are given below.

These officers were stationed in special venues pre-identified and engaged in mobile patrols. Security in the polling stations, and for protected material such as statutory documents and ballot papers and security of staff and counting centers was vested with the Police and they performed their duties according to instructions given. One major function of the police was to act swiftly when violations and violences were reported and the police provided security to the site inspections carried out in risky places by the officers of the District Elections Complaints Units.

Chapter Four

Staff and Transport

4 Staff Requirements

All Returning Officers and District Deputy/ Assistant Commissioners of Elections were invited to the head office and instructions were given to them on initial organizational work, to manage the Presidential Election, in order to see that the whole process starting with nominations and followed by postal voting, the poll, count, co-ordination, functions of committees and declaration of results is successfully completed. Initial organizational activities in the districts were separately discussed with them and instructions were given.

4.1 Appointment of Poll Staff

A large number of staff was required for the Presidential Election as it had to be conducted island-wide, based on electoral districts. As required by the Election Commission, Secretary to the President therefore, advised all Governors, Secretaries of Ministries, Chief Secretaries, Heads of Departments and Statutory Boards to release officers and vehicles and other requisites in order to organize the election efficiently and effectively. Under the powers vested by Articles 104F (1), (2), 104G and 104H, the Election Commission issued the Circular No EC/ADM/EL/1/ST of 05.08.2019 under the caption "Collection of information on officers of the Public Service for the Presidential Election" to all Secretaries to Ministries, Secretary of the Public Service Commission, Secretaries of all other statutory Commissions, Chief Secretaries of all Provincial Councils, Secretaries of all Provincial Governors, Secretaries of all Provincial Ministries, Secretaries of all Provincial Public Service Commissions, all Heads of Departments, all District Secretaries and Chairmen and General Managers of all Public Corporations and Statutory Boards, requesting them to send information about the officers. Copies of that circular were sent to the Secretary to the President, Secretary to the Prime Minister, Secretary to the Cabinet, Governor of the Central Bank and to the Auditor General.

Instructions were given to the District Elections Offices to get all staff from within the respective districts and to collect data sheets of all State

institutions and statutory boards at the district level. Heads of institutions in the Ministries and Departments located in the Colombo Municipality area and Battaramulla area, Sethsiripaya Stages 1 and 11, Suhurupaya, Sampathpaya, Govijana Mandiraya, Isurupaya, Ranmagapaya, Provincial Councils Complex, except for the schools in the Colombo District, were instructed to send these data sheets of the officers eligible to be appointed as Assistant Returning Officers and Senior Presiding Officers, to the Elections Secretariat and the data sheets of all other officers and employees, to the Colombo City Elections Office.

Information on staff requirements in the districts, information on the available numbers of staff within the district, numbers of staff anticipated from adjoining districts and from the Colombo pool were collected by the Elections Secretariat. It was instructed to make arrangements with the approval of the Commissioner General of Elections, to meet any shortfall of officers from the adjoining districts and from the Colombo staff pool. Staff requirements in the districts are given in **Table 01**.

Election Commission had to get the services of various groups of officers and employees starting from casual employees upto senior executive officers in the Public Service for various functions such as checking of ballot papers, issues and receipts of ballot papers, ballot boxes, and statutory documents, conduct of the poll, count, coordinating offices, tabulation of results, welfare activities, transport, public utilities, operational offices, etc.,. Instructions were given to the Returning Officers and Deputy/ Assistant Commissioners of Elections on the committees that should be set up for initial organizational work, their functions, numbers of officers to be included in the committees, and their administration. About 223,983 permanent and casual employees were engaged to conduct this election. Out of them about 218,623 officers were obtained from State institutions and from schools in respective districts. About 5,360 officers were supplied by the pool of the Elections Secretariat according to the needs of each district. Among them

were especially the Assistant Returning Officers and Senior Presiding Officers. **Table 02** of this report gives details. Taking census of these officers, selecting and training them were carried out by the Elections Secretariat and by district officers at the district level.

4.2 Maintaining of Staff Pools

Senior Presiding Officers were informed to report at the issuing centers in the morning of the pre-poll day to collect material relevant to the poll, the most important business of the whole process. Returning Officers were informed to maintain a sufficient pool of officers in the issuing centers in order to appoint in the places of the Senior Presiding Officers who fail to report due to poor health or due to any other exigency. Action was also taken to maintain pools of officers in the District Secretariats and Divisional Secretariats to immediately replace other staff in the polling stations who fail to report due to any urgent or unavoidable circumstances. An officer in the Divisional Secretary's office, was in charge of this pool and arrangements were made in every Divisional Secretary's office to appoint officers from the pool when such shortfalls were informed by Zone Assistant Returning Officers. Transport facilities were provided for those officers to report at their relevant polling stations. Returning Officers were advised to carry out this arrangement within the resources available and the requirements in the district.

Pools of officers were maintained in all counting premises to assign officers in place of those who fail to report.

4.3 Transport Facilities

A well-organized transport arrangement is quintessential for an election. Therefore, the District Returning Officers were instructed at the inception, to establish a transport committee headed by an Assistant Returning Officer in the district. Most important in this regard were the transport of officers and material to the polling stations on the prepoll day and the transport of ballot boxes and other secured items with officers back to the counting centers, as soon as possible, after the poll. In addition, a vigorous transport arrangement was essential for the District Returning Officers to supervise and co-ordinate all matters pertaining to the poll. Steps were taken to provide transport

facilities to the Police Department to carry out mobile patrols in order to provide security for a poll free of any interruption. As the Presidential Election was a one-day operation island-wide, a massive number of vehicles had to be used.

In view of these vehicle requirements, the Election Commission addressed a letter to all Secretaries of Ministries, Heads of Departments and Statutory Boards on 05.08.2019, requesting them to provide information on vehicles belonging to all agencies under their charge. Details of vehicles in the government offices situated within the Colombo City limits were requested to be sent by heads of institutions to the Elections Secretariat, and details of vehicles in each district had to be sent to the relevant District Returning Officer. Additional Secretaries, heads of departments and other senior officers appointed for election duties were allowed to retain their assigned official vehicles to be used for election duties. In addition to the number of vehicles obtained from within the districts the Election Secretariat provided 1933 vehicles from its pool to fulfill the requirements in the districts. Details given in the **Table 03**.

After calculating the required numbers of vehicles in the district it was found that the available numbers of government vehicles were not sufficient to meet the needs and therefore, buses of the Sri Lanka Transport Board and of private bus operators, and other vehicles were hired at this election. Hire charges were approved by the Election Commission as was done at previous elections. Returning Officers, the Police Department and the Postal Department were allowed to hire vehicles.

As there were no sufficient numbers of government vehicles to perform the duties, Police Department and Postal Department were instructed to hire vehicles under the approved rates.

Permission was granted to the Senior Presiding Officers in charge of polling stations and Zone Assistant Returning Officers supervising several polling stations, to use their private vehicles for poll duties. However, the Returning Officers was informed to authorize Senior Presiding Officers to use only the cars, vans or jeeps which could accommodate the ballot boxes, protected election material, police officer and the assistant in such vehicle.

Election Commission instructed the Ceylon Petroleum Corporation to stock fuel sufficient to provide transport facilities required for the election without any shortage. Returning Officers were advised to discuss with the Regional Managers of Ceylon Petroleum Corporation and instruct them to maintain sufficient stocks to meet the needs of vehicles used at the election. Returning Officers educated the managers of filling stations to reserve fuel required for the purposes related to the election.

4.4 Common Transport Facilities

Returning Officers made arrangements to transport ballot papers and other material under police security on the pre-poll day. Other staff of polling stations had to use public transport facilities or their own modes of conveyance to report at the polling stations before 2.00pm on the pre-poll day. Officers who travel by train were advised to obtain duty railway warrants from their service stations. Returning Officers provided transport facilities for the other staff who were assigned to polling stations where there were

transport difficulties in Kandy, Nuwara-Eliya, Batticaloa and Kegalle districts. The assistance of the Sri Lanka Navy was obtained for the staff transport to the polling stations situated in the islets.

Next important aspect in regard to transport was providing facilities to the electors. Public transport facilities had to be strengthened in view of the provisions in the Section 82 of the Presidential Election Act where there are legal restrictions to use their own vehicles to go to the polling station to cast vote. Officers of the Sri Lanka Ceylon Transport Board and Provincial Passenger Transport Authorities were convened at the Elections Secretariat and discussed with them the vehicle requirement for election purposes, and the importance of providing transport to the electors on the poll day to go to polling stations and return without difficulty. At the district level, the Returning Officers convened the regional officers of relevant institutions and arranged the necessary transport facilities.

Chapter Five

Postal Voting Facility

5. Postal Voting

Electors engaged in election duties and other employees who provide essential services during an election are entitled to cast vote by post in terms of Section 23(1) of the Presidential Elections Act No 15 of 1981. Applications of postal voters should be sent to the Returning Officer to reach him within ten days after the publication of the Proclamation Order of the holding of the election according to the Section 23(3) of the Act. Action was taken to exhibit the electoral registers and provide facilities at the national and district levels to obtain information required to make applications for postal voting, by educating the postal voters through newspaper notices, circulars and media releases.

5.1 Electors entitled to Postal Voting

Electors entitled to postal voting are mentioned in the Section 23(2) of the Presidential Elections Act. This facility could be requested by candidates, members of the Three Services, Officers in the Police Department, Department of Prisons, Sri Lanka Government Railway, Department of Post and Telecommunication, Staff of the Sri Lanka Transport Board, employees in the State Service, Local Government Service and Central Bank, who would be engaged in election duties. In order to send the applications, the applicants need to know information on their registration in the electoral register. In order to facilitate this, the registers valid for the election were displayed in the District Elections Offices, District Secretariats, Divisional Secretariats, and offices of Grama Niladhari. In addition, they were exhibited in the government offices where a bulk of officers is stationed, such as the Ministry of Public Administration, Ministry of Provincial Council and Local Government, Labour Secretariat, Ministry of Education, Registrar General's Department, Postal Headquarters, Ministry of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources, Sethsiripaya Office Complex etc. As the members of the Three Services and the Police are scattered all over the Island, compact discs were made available at the Elections Secretariat for the

certifying officers. In addition, facilities were also provided to obtain information through special telephone numbers in the Elections Secretariat and from the hotline, and from the number of 1919, the State Information Center.

5.2 Postal Voting Applications

It was planned to commence the accepting of postal voting applications on September 18, 2019 and conclude on September 27, 2019. The Returning Officers were informed that the time had to be extended till 12.00 midnight of September 30, 2019 due to the problems of obtaining information in the application process, delays of certifying the applications and postal delays. However, the Returning Officers were instructed to accept all applications received till 12.00 midnight of 04.10.2019 by certifying officers after considering the bad weather prevailed at the time in the country, the reports of Returning Officers and other requests. A broad media publicity was given to this arrangement. Dates for applications for postal voting were revised in this manner to give sufficient time and opportunity to all officers intended to be engaged in election duties.

In view of the fact that the last date for applications had to be extended, the postal voting process had to be made efficient. It was arranged for the district offices to accept the applications addressed to other districts as well and the applications for adjacent districts were exchanged through special messengers on the next day itself. Applications addressed to distant districts were brought down by an officer of the district office, to the Elections Secretariat on 05.10.2019 and they were exchanged between the districts at the Secretariat.

5.3 Rejection of Postal Voter Applications

The decision whether the applications were accepted or rejected by the Returning Officers was informed to the certifying officer with copy to the applicant. Postal Voter applications were rejected on several grounds. Non-receipt of the application at the Returning Officer's office within the time allowed, incorrect information about the applicant

in the application, incomplete applications, applications which were not signed by the certifying officer or by the applicant, or late arrivals etc, were the major reasons for rejection. Numbers of applications received by all Returning Officers are given in **Table 04**.

The number of postal voter applications received was 720,135. Out of them, 61,106 applications were rejected. The number accepted was 659,029.

5.4 Certifying Officers of Postal Voting

Election Commission instructed the District Elections Offices to appoint certifying officers to certify the postal voting applications sent by the postal voters in government institutions and to send to the Commission the information about the certifying officers so appointed. These certifying officers certified the postal voting applications. Postal ballot papers and other related documents were sent to these certifying officers. Responsibilities of certifying officers and instructions regarding their duties were informed to the Returning Officers and to all certifying officers through the heads of institutions. Returning Officers and Deputy/ Assistant Commissioners of Elections in the districts sent written instructions to the certifying officers, and carried out training sessions, in addition. These training classes were conducted in Sinhala and Tamil languages.

Postal voters mark their ballot papers on the specified day before the certifying officer with total secrecy. It is the responsibility of the certifying officer to hand over the insured ballot paper packets to the post office or to hand over in person to the Returning Officer, after the ballot paper is marked by the postal voter. Another responsibility is to safely return the unmarked insured ballot paper packets to the relevant District Returning Officers following the instructions given.

5.5 Preparation of the Record and List of Postal Voters

Information of each elector in the electoral register, name of the certifying officer, his designation and official address were required under the Regulation 4 of the Postal Voters' Regulations 1981, in the Second Schedule of the

Presidential Elections Act, to prepare the Record and List of Postal Voters. The Record and List of Postal Voters was prepared by entering the information given in the applications in the data base, in accordance with the valid Electoral Register, utilizing the software in the Computer Division of the Election Commission. These Lists of Postal Voters were prepared as hard copies and compact discs (CDs). The candidates were issued with only the soft copies (CDs).

5.6 Issue of Postal Ballot Papers

District Returning Officers arranged to issue postal ballot papers at government offices and schools specially selected, in accordance with the Regulation 10(1) of Postal Voters' Regulations of the Presidential Elections Act. Notice of the issue of postal ballot papers was issued on 10.10.2019. The issue of ballot papers and handing them over to the postal authorities was carried out in 987 centers on 18.10.2019. Returning Officers informed the candidates and their authorized agents about the issue and the number of agents that could be appointed to each issuing center. The amount of postal ballot papers required to be issued to the postal voters, was obtained well in advance from the Government Press and safely placed in the vault under police security. Returning Officers checked the ballot papers before issuing them on 18.10.2019 and obtained sufficient police security to the issuing centers. Returning Officers were advised by the Election Commission that the process from the issue of ballot papers to the handing over of insured packets to the postal authorities should be carried out under police security.

5.7 Marking of Postal Ballot Papers

Only a limited number of days was allocated to mark the postal ballots at this election as has been done in the elections held in the recent past. Dates allocated for postal voting were as follows.

Insured postal ballot packets which were not marked by respective postal voters on the dates given above were handed over to the district elections offices through the Assistant Returning Officers who supervised the marking of postal ballot papers or by certifying officers immediately after marking. Those who failed to mark the postal ballot papers on the given dates, were facilitated to mark their votes on 07.11.2019 at the district elections offices. Candidates and their agents were informed to appoint their agents to observe this operation. Postal voters were informed about this arrangement through a special media announcement and through notices. Inspector General of Police was informed to provide sufficient security to the certifying officers of postal voting and to enforce election laws on the dates of marking the postal ballot papers.

5.8 Supervision of Postal Voting

In order to ensure that postal voting was carried out in the offices of certifying officers according to the instructions issued by the Commission and the Returning Officers, an Assistant Returning Officer or an experienced officer of a parallel service was attached to every certifying officer's office. Offices where the number of postal voters was below thirty (30), a mobile supervisor was engaged and a static supervisor was engaged in the offices when the number of voters was above thirty (30). But a static officer was engaged to some identified work places such as the Sri Lanka Transport Board depots, Civil Defense camps, expressway offices, health sector offices, statutory boards, local authorities and police stations even though the number of voters was below thirty (30). Officers who supervised these centers were advised to make entries in the journals given to the postal ballot

marking centers by the district elections offices and hand over the observations to the District Deputy/ Assistant Commissioners of Elections after completing the duty.

As was done at the previous elections, the domestic election observer organizations i.e. Peoples Action for Free and Fair Elections (PAFEREL) and Center for Monitoring Elections Violence (CMEV) were authorized to engage one observer in each postal vote issuing center and marking center to observe the issue of ballot papers and marking of postal ballot papers.

5.9 Other Matters

At this election to elect the President, 659,029 postal ballot papers were issued. Several occasions were provided to mark ballot papers. But it is observed that 5,669 postal voters have not marked their ballot papers, due to various reasons. Non-marking of the postal ballot paper is a waste of public money in view of the time, labour and costs utilized for one postal vote. Necessary steps need to be taken in future elections to totally prevent or to minimize such state of affairs.

Objective of the Election Commission is to conduct inclusive elections and therefore it has contemplated on providing voting facility to the employees of many fields who are denied go to the polling stations assigned to them due to indispensable or essential nature of the duty they are performing. It is necessary to make recommendations for necessary legal provisions to provide an advance voting day for those who are unable to go and cast vote at the polling stations due to the essential nature of the vocations they are engaged in.

Chapter Six

Election Propaganda and Media

6. Election Propaganda

Legal provisions on public meetings, processions, printing of propaganda material and distribution, display of notices, maintaining election offices under certain restrictions during the election period, and on how to act on the poll day for the promotion of candidates are described in Sections from 68 to 74 of the Presidential Elections Act. After making the Order in regard to the holding of the election the Election Commission conducts a discussion with the secretaries of all recognized political parties and distributes copies of the relevant Act and other documents related to the election. After accepting nominations, a discussion was held at the Commission with the candidates, secretaries of political parties and election agents. At this meeting it was explained that the authorized agents and divisional agents should be knowledgeable about the laws and regulations and that they should work according to them.

6.1 Action on Illegal Propaganda

The Police Department was expected to take immediate action upon receiving a complaint or any reportage otherwise about any illegal propaganda activity. Political activists, candidates as well as law enforcing officers have informed the Election Commission, that there are difficulties in practically implementing the rules and regulations enacted on election propaganda. General tendency is to adapt alternative methods of campaigning when saddled with practical difficulties. Violations of election laws were on the increase during the election period when there are alternative campaign methods employed which are not covered by legal provisions. Display of cutouts and banners in public places is prohibited and instances of defying the laws were reported. However, it was satisfactory that there had been a considerable decrease in illegal campaigning at this election when compared with the previous elections.

It is observed that the police which enforce the election law were unable to give priority to the violation of election laws during the campaign because they had to provide security to the people's

representatives, candidates, and meeting places in an election period of about two months, in addition to their normal duties.

The Election Commission discussed with the party secretaries and representatives of parties and arrived at common agreements about the campaign activities and some restrictions were liberalized and more opportunity was provided for campaigning, but it is unfortunate that the supporters of some parties were violating the laws as usual. Illegal propaganda work badly affects the conducting of a free and fair election. Public, including the observer organizations, have pointed out that the campaigns carried out by some candidates who could utilize their own money or in collaboration with others, spend colossal amounts of funds in the campaign to promote their candidates and it is unjustified against other candidates. Impact of extensive use of polythene and plastics in the campaign upon the environment, is immense. Steps need to be taken to arrest this situation. It is the view of the Election Commission that ceilings of campaign expenditure should be imposed, there should be restrictions in displaying notices, cutouts etc in the campaign, providing equal opportunity to all candidates. The State should intervene and specify common places to display campaign material without inconveniencing the public and these kinds of measures would ease the situation at least to a certain extent. The Commission expects to pay attention to these areas in future.

6.2 Allocation of Venues for Election Campaigning

There were many complaints, from candidates and organizers of political parties that they encountered injustice in reserving venues for their campaign activities. This is not conducive to the holding of a free and fair election. It is a practice that the ruling party and candidates to reserve all public places for their campaign prejudicing other candidates. This denies the equal opportunity for all candidates. Authorities of public places were strictly warned by the Commission to give equal opportunity to all candidates in their campaign work.

The Election Commission had to inquire whether local authorities, officers of government institutions and other officers, are reserving meeting halls and playgrounds to all candidates on an equal basis. The assistance extended by secretaries of parties, candidates, election agents and permanent representatives in resolving the increase of campaign work at this election was immense.

6.3 Media Guidelines for Electronic and Print Media

Electronic and print media play a big role in providing information to the public when an election is conducted. Candidates of contesting political parties and independent groups put forward before the public, through media, their policies and plans and projects to develop the country when they come into power. Mass media are expected to report information on campaigns equally and impartially. Grave injustice is caused to other parties by being partial to parties and when personalized towards individuals. Towards a free and fair electoral process, it is essential that State media as well as private media, act impartially in reporting news related to the election. Media institutions and media persons are bound to refrain from making false statements or baseless statements that promote one candidate and prejudice another. All electronic media use frequencies owned by the public. Therefore, the frequencies or waves are a public property. Institutions which use these frequencies do have only a temporary ownership over them. Therefore, the Election Commission directed the heads of media institutions of various frequencies, to introduce suitable methodologies for the institutions that hold a temporary ownership of frequencies, to refrain from misusing this public property. Under the powers vested by the Article 104B (5)(a) of the Constitution, the Election Commission convened a meeting with heads of all media institutions, and prepared media guidelines with their consent. With the assistance of the Human Rights Commission and the Legal Draftsman's Department these guidelines were published in the Extraordinary gazette No 2141/87 of 21.09.2019. This appears as **Annexure 11** to this report. These guidelines are applicable to private electronic and print media as well. According to the Section 83 of the Presidential Elections Act No 15 of 1981, news editors are bound to refrain from publishing false reports or baseless information that

cannot be proved. Penalty for such offence is described in the Act itself. All heads of media institutions were informed, therefore, to follow the directives in the Act. The above mentioned gazette notice was amended several times in order to resolve matters arisen thereafter and they were published in the gazettes No 2146/39 of 27.10.2019 and No 2148/21 of 05.11.2019. These gazettes are given in **Annexures 12 and 13**.

In addition to issuing media guidelines, heads of State and private media institutions, chief coordinating officers and occasionally the news writers and editors were convened at nine occasions and advised on the responsibility of media use for the conduct of a free and fair election. After considering the complaints regarding the violation of media guidelines by electronic media, two rounds of discussions were conducted with heads of all print media institutions at the Ministry of Media and Information with the participation of the Secretary of the Ministry and Director General/ Information and preventive measures were taken to minimize the unsound situation. Intention of the Election Commission in holding the discussions was for the media institutions to build up a base to create a self-censorship within the media institutions themselves which would not violate the media guidelines already published in the gazette. A sound environment was created after discussing the complaints received about violations of media guidelines.

6.4 Media Responsibility and Guidance

Impact of media at an election cannot be underestimated. If media guidelines are violated it is only the State media that can be punished after taking necessary steps by the Election Commission. When media guidelines are violated it is immaterial whether it is State media or private media because the frequencies are a public property. Election Commission is therefore of the view that the law is common to all media. At the first instance of violating the media guidelines the Election Commission informs that particular media institution, to refrain from violating guidelines and warns to follow the guidelines. Election Commission is of the view that laws should provide for the Election Commission to appoint a Competent Authority with powers to warn the State

or private media that, reporting news related to the election and news of political nature and broadcasting of programmes and discussions would be suspended, and if satisfactory response is not received and media guidelines are further violated, to suspend all above mentioned broadcasts till the conclusion of the election. Intervention of the Commission on behalf of the prejudiced candidates is minimal if such laws are not promulgated, and it will be an obstacle towards conducting a free and fair election.

Chairman of the Election Commission, Commissioner General of Election, and other officers of the Commission were invited by media institutions for discussions. At these meetings they educated the public about the media guidelines issued by the Election Commission, how media institutions should follow them, and ensure a free and fair election and about statutory matters and laws and regulations related to the conduct of the election. In response to the invitations made by media institutions to the Commission during the silent period, where campaigning was prohibited, members and officers of the Commission participated in them. Chairman of the Commission participated in several interviews in the social media and explained about the poll and related matters and all those programmes were published in the Face Book of the Election Commission.

6.5 Media Releases and Announcements

Statutory matters and most essential announcements to the general public were published in 15 notices in Lankadeepa, Dinamina, Thinakaran, Daily News, Divaina, The Island, Veerakesari, Daily Mirror and Uthayan newspapers. Election Commission has spent Rs. 3,642,083.25 for these notices.

In addition to the newspaper notices, 90 media releases had been issued regarding the matters related to the election. The list of media releases appear in **Annexure 14**. These releases were made in three languages to all electronic and print media institutions. These media releases enabled the media institutions to take steps to further educate the public. The notices appeared in newspapers were published in the official website of the Election Commission www.elections.gov.lk.

6.6 Television and Broadcasting Facilities for Propaganda

In terms of the Section 117 of the Presidential Elections Act No 15 of 1981 as amended by Presidential Election (Amendment) Act No 16 of 1988, airtime had to be given to the candidates free of charge. In order to get this facility, an application had to be made within the period of a week from the nomination day. Every candidate who had submitted a nomination paper could make use of this facility subject to such conditions as may be determined by the Chairman of Sri Lanka Broadcasting Corporation and Chairman of Sri Lanka Rupavahini Corporation, for the period from the day after the last date fixed for making such applications and ending seventy-two- hours prior to the commencement of the poll.

Sri Lanka Broadcasting Corporation and Chairman of Sri Lanka Rupavahini Corporation provided the facility to 18 candidates contested from recognized political parties, 2 candidates from other political parties and 15 other candidates, under the Section 117 of the Presidential Elections Act, to make their broadcasts. One broadcast was not less than 15 minutes and not more than 30 minutes, and not more than 3 occasions or maximum period of 90 minutes.

Lots had to be drawn according to the provisions of the law among the candidates as there was a large number of candidates at this election. Heads of Sri Lanka Broadcasting Corporation and Sri Lanka Rupavahini Corporation requested the Election Commission to coordinate the drawing of lots. Election Commission coordinated the event and caused to draw lots on 10.10.2019 at 2.30 pm at the Elections Secretariat after inviting all candidates or their agents. In addition to the officers of the Election Commission, officers of the Sri Lanka Broadcasting Corporation and Sri Lanka Rupavahini Corporation also participated at this draw.

Total airtime granted to 35 candidates was 3150 minutes. During the period of time given, 210 programmes were broadcast. Sri Lanka Broadcasting Corporation and Sri Lanka Rupavahini Corporation allowed their studios to record the programmes. It was observed that some candidates handed over to the Sri Lanka

Broadcasting Corporation and Sri Lanka Rupavahini Corporation tapes of speeches recorded elsewhere, to be broadcast. Sri Lanka Rupavahini Corporation informed that there were technical shortcomings in broadcasting of such programmes. All candidates therefore, were informed in writing or verbally to use Beta Cam Cassettes or XD Cam Disk for outdoor recording in order to maintain the quality of programmes.

After discussing with political parties and leaders of groups, a Code of Conduct to be followed at these broadcasts was given in writing to all political parties and leaders of groups. According to this Code of Conduct no political party or group should speak on behalf of any other candidate, make hateful, threatening or deterring speeches, prejudicial to any other party. These guidelines were clearly read out before the representatives at the meeting held on 10.10.2019 to allocate airtime. The airtime granted by Sri Lanka Rupavahini Corporation to each candidate is given in **Annexure 15**. Airtime granted by Sri Lanka Broadcasting Corporation is given in **Annexure 16**.

6.7 Facility provided to Candidates to send Matter Post Free

According to Section 114 of the Presidential Elections Act No 15 of 1981, candidates are allowed to send one message post free, to each elector between the last day of nominations and the day which is the tenth day before the day of the poll to be taken.

How the message should be handed over to the Postal Department and the conditions regarding the material were decided by the Post Master General. According to the letter sent on 02.10.2019 by Post Master General to educate the candidates in this regard, the weight of the material should be below 30 grams, and length and breadth should be 300 mm x 100 mm. The post office where the material should be handed over in each district were given in the Post Master General's letter. This material had to be handed over to the post office 10 days before poll day. Material handed over after that date was not accepted by the post. This message should be delivered five days before the poll day. There were reports of attempts to misuse this postal facility. Post Master General took steps to curb such situations following the guidelines of the Election Commission.

6.8 Notified Election Offices

Provisions regarding the notified offices to promote candidates are given in Section 73 of the Presidential Elections Act. There are four categories of notified election offices. Persons who are allowed to establish the offices, time periods of such offices, the area of authority to establish offices, the number of offices allowed etc, are specified. The table below gives details of notified offices allowed for a candidate.

Election Commission issued the letter No PRE/19/12 of 29.09.2019 with instructions and conditions in establishing notified offices and the instructions and forms were sent to the election agents and authorized agents.

Under the instructions on establishing notified offices a description of areas of authority such as electoral districts, polling divisions and polling districts was also given. This enabled to minimize the shortcomings and misunderstandings on establishing notified offices.

This letter explained how the banners, flags, photographs of the candidate should be displayed in the notified offices. It was expected that complaints on illegal campaign material during the election period would decrease. It was prohibited to establish notified offices in buildings, lands, official quarters or reservations belonging to the State, provincial councils, local authorities, public corporations or statutory boards, in order to prevent using State lands, premises and other common places for propaganda work. There were conditions such as the proscription on using government quarters, houses in government settlements, government housing

complexes, where candidates are lawfully living, as campaign offices and on using lamp posts, roads, pavements, boundary walls adjacent to the notified offices for campaigns activities. According to the instructions mentioned above, it is illegal to use one candidate's office to promote or prejudice another candidate and legal action would be taken against these who violate the law.

The election agents and authorized agents were instructed to advise their local activists to refrain from establishing notified offices near local authority institutions, Divisional Secretariats, post offices and court complexes which are directly linked with elections and where people frequently visit for their needs, and near government schools, to minimize inconvenience to the children and the public.

Inconvenience to the public was minimized by stipulating the distance between the notified offices and institutions directly connected with the conduct of elections. Acting according to these laws and conditions in establishing notified offices, immensely helped to conduct a free and fair election.

Chapter Seven

Implementation of Provisions in the Presidential Elections Act

7. Provisions in the Presidential Elections Act

There is a large amount of legal provisions that have to be followed in an election. Provisions in the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka and relevant Elections Acts are prime amongst them. In the case of the Presidential Election there are several Articles in the Constitution and Sections in the Presidential Elections Act. General matters related to the electoral process also have to be taken into consideration while exercising the provisions in the Presidential Elections Act. Some important areas are dealt with in this chapter. Provisions in other Parliamentary Acts also have to be applied in the conduct of this election and therefore necessary to look at the laws in all relevant Acts.

7.1 Official Poll Cards

According to the Section 24 of the Presidential Elections Act, all qualified electors should be sent with an official poll card to his/her home address with the information such as the name and number of the electoral district, name of the elector as appearing in the electoral register, registration number, polling division, polling district, the polling station assigned to the elector, date of poll and time. In the official poll cards sent to the postal voters and to those who were given alternative places to cast vote, it was mentioned by the Returning Officer that the elector is a postal voter or the voter has been assigned with an alternative polling station. The official poll cards were sent by post to the electors to reach them at least seven days before the poll day. It was announced that if any elector had not received the card during the prescribed time period he/she could collect it from the post office which serves the area, after establishing his/her identity. The official poll cards for this Presidential Elections, were handed over to the relevant post offices on 23.10.2019 in order to be delivered to the electors.

Originally the official poll cards were printed at the Government Press, and the relevant information was written on them. But now the official poll cards could be printed with data easily

and speedily because all data in the electoral register are computerized. The cards were printed by an experienced private sector institution because the facility was not available with the Government Printer. The official poll cards were prepared in all three languages and sent to the electors. Printed official poll cards were sent to the Returning Officers, who arranged to deliver them to the electors. The Returning Officers arranged the undelivered official poll cards to be delivered on some other day or for those electors who had not received them were advised to go to the relevant post office and collect them.

7.2 Establishing the Identity of the Elector

Before issuing a ballot paper to an elector at an election his identity has to be established with an identity document with a photograph. The main document to identify an elector in accordance with the Elections (Special Provisions) Act No 14 of 2004 is the National Identity Card. But the Election Commission followed the decision of the previous Election Commission to accept other identity documents at the elections until such time the public are provided with the facility of obtaining national identity cards without any difficulty. Accordingly, the Senior Presiding Officers were advised to accept the following documents in addition to the National Identity Card as valid documents in identifying electors at the polling stations.

- Valid passport
- Valid driving license
- Pension identity card of retired Public Servants
- Elders' identity card
- Identity card issued by the Department for Registration of persons to the clergy
- The confirmation letter issued by the Department for Registration of Persons to the applicants for National Identity Cards

By the media release No 34 of 14.10.2019 it was announced that any elector who does not possess any of the above identity documents could obtain a temporary identity card issued by the Election

Commission and such identity card is valid to cast vote. The Election Commission issued 195,433 temporary identity cards at this Presidential Election. Deputy/ Assistant Commissioners of Elections in the districts issued these identity cards to the electors.

7.3 Marking the Elector with Indelible Ink or Appropriate Mark

Section 36(3) of the Presidential Elections Act states that electors who come to polling stations with the intention of casting vote should be marked with appropriate mark. This is a step taken to prevent electors casting vote more than once. The practice of marking voters with indelible ink as an appropriate mark, started with the 1965 Parliamentary Election. The upper portion of the small finger in the left hand of the voter is marked with indelible ink.

When this system of marking with indelible ink was introduced there was no need to produce an identity card to prove identity of the elector. Today, of course, it is mandatory that the elector should prove his/her identity through an identity document and it is therefore necessary to re-consider whether it is necessary to mark the voter with indelible ink spending a large amount of funds and engaging a large number of officers. Recently there had been reports where the voters resisted the applying of chemically prepared ink on their bodies. There had been instances where political activists and voters have raised questions when the application of the ink had failed. Marking of someone else's vote deceitfully has been prevented by making the identification of voters compulsory through identity documents. The mandatory requirement of proving the identity of a voter through an identity card has helped in decimating impersonation.

It is time to introduce amendments to the provisions in the Section 36 of the Act in order to review the system of identifying the voter or look for alternative procedures to replace the marking of voters with indelible ink.

7.4 Electors Reported Dead or Electors Reported Abroad

Names of electors reported dead were marked with the letter 'D' and electors reported abroad with 'A'

in the electoral registers supplied to the Senior Presiding Officers in charge of polling stations. Names of those electors who had died upto the date of 15.10.2019 and who were abroad on 15.10.2019 were obtained from Grama Niladharis and action was taken to mention that they were dead or abroad as the case may be on the official poll card addressed to the elector. Attempts of wrong persons to mark the votes of dead electors and of those who were abroad, were thus curbed in this election. Senior Presiding Officers were instructed to examine persons coming to the polling stations to cast vote where those markings appear in front of their names in the voters register and to obtain declarations under Sections 41 and 43 of Act before issuing ballot papers if the Senior Presiding Officer decides to issue ballot papers to such persons. Details of electors reported by Grama Niladharis to the district offices as "dead" or "abroad" are given in the **Annexure 17**.

7.5 Official Mark – Section 35

The issuing of ballot papers is described in the Section 35 of the Presidential Elections Act. Section 35 (c) states that the ballot paper should be marked with the official mark before it is issued to the elector. This can be done by pressing the official mark on the ballot paper and stamping or embossing or perforating on it. The official marks to perforate ballot papers were sent under security by Election Commission to the District Returning Officers on a date close to the poll. Official marks to be used in the poll were handed over with secrecy to the Senior Presiding Officer in a sealed cover, so that even the poll staff were unaware of what the official seals were, till the poll commenced on the poll day. Minutes before the commencement of the poll, Senior Presiding Officer opens the sealed cover of official marks and randomly selects in front of the polling agents, observers and the staff of the polling stations and hands over one official mark to each queue. After the close of the poll the used official marks should be handed over to the Assistant Returning Officer in the receiving center confidentially along with other material. The samples of the official marks should be enclosed in the cover provided for the purpose and should be handed over to the Chief Counting Officer of the counting center through the Assistant Returning Officer in the receiving center. Returning Officers should return all the

official marks to the Election Commission. Intention of this procedure is to maintain independence, credibility and secrecy of the poll.

7.6 Special Transport Facilities for Disabled Electors at the Poll

Under normal circumstances the voter should go by foot to the polling station. But the disabled voters are allowed to go to the polling station in a vehicle under Section 82 (4) (c) of the Act. Public were educated in this regard by the Election Commission through newspaper notices and media releases. Applications for this facility should be sent to the Returning Officer seven days before the date of poll with a recommendation of a medical officer. Disabled voters who have obtained permission from the Returning Officer, can go to the polling station by vehicle. It has been observed that this facility needs to be made more open and simple.

7.7 Leave for Employees to cast Vote – Section 110

Categories that are entitled for postal voting are limited. Postal voting facility is provided to the members of the Security Forces, Police Department, Civil Security Department, and others in essential services such as postal, power and water supplies, to ensure uninterrupted services during the election period. Requests are constantly being made by owners and employees of various semi government and private business establishments which have a great impact over the economy of the country, have been asking for the opportunity of casting their vote before the date of

poll or for the postal voting facility in order to get the services of employees without interruption to the work. Numbers of such employees are extensive. But there is no methodology to provide such facility. The delay in evolving such methodology is due to the lack of necessary legal provisions, large costs involved in the postal voting procedure and issues encountered in organizing the process. Election Commission has made proposals to bring in necessary legal provisions. However, they are lagging behind due to unavoidable circumstances. In the place of postal voting, focus has been made to provide alternative polling stations on the poll-day itself or to provide advance voting facility at least for essential groups of employees, but even that proposal has not seen the light of the day.

However, according to the Section 110 of the Act it is the duty of the employers to grant sufficient leave to enable employees to cast vote at the polling station assigned, without loss of pay. Minimum period for this is 4 hours. Election Commission, Ministry of Labour, Labour Department and the Human Rights Commission discussed this matter with the employers and leave was granted on the basis of the distance the employees had to travel to cast vote. Any person who violates or ignores these provisions is guilty of an offence and on conviction after summary trial, are liable for punishment as given in the law. The notice issued by the Election Commission in regard to the granting of leave to the employees appears as **Annexure 18**.

Chapter Eight

Conduct of the Poll

8. Activities on the Pre-poll Day

The climax of the Presidential Election process which commences from the Order made under Section 2 of the Presidential Elections Act No 15 of 1981, is the date of poll and the declaration of the result. All essential activities before the poll day were completed by the morning of 15.11.2019. One major responsibility of the Returning Officers was to arrange the transport of officers and material to the polling stations on the prepoll day. Letters with written instructions about the poll duty at the polling station and route directions had been sent to the Junior Presiding Officers and poll clerks about a week ahead of the poll day, and by these instructions they were informed to report at the polling station at 2.00pm on the pre-poll day, to compulsorily participate at the rehearsal conducted by the Senior Presiding Officer and to be ready to report for duty on the following day. These officers had to report at the polling station using private or public transport services. Assistance of the Sri Lanka Navy was obtained to transport officers to the polling stations situated in the islands of Jaffna Peninsula. Female officers were assigned to the polling stations outside the polling stations where they were registered as electors. Male officers were assigned to the polling stations within the district or to other districts according to their preferences.

Centers to issue and receive ballot boxes and other election material in each electoral district were established in one premises or in several places according to the facilities available in the district. Minimum two Assistant Returning Officers with one Assistant Returning Officer-in-charge, two Senior Presiding Officers, one Junior Presiding Officer, two poll clerks and two office assistants were appointed to each of these issuing and receiving centers. Instruction classes on the duties of Assistant Returning Officers and on how the district organization works were conducted to the Assistant Returning Officers to be appointed to the issuing and receiving centers. Senior Presiding Officers in charge of polling stations and Zonal Assistant Returning Officers in charge of several polling stations were informed about the places

where they had to report on the pre-poll day. These Senior Presiding Officers and Zonal Assistant Returning Officers had been educated on the poll procedure, election laws, administration of the polling station, enforcement of the election law, and the organization of the election in the whole district by holding formal instruction classes. Returning Officers were instructed to attach most of the Senior Presiding Officers and Zonal Assistant Returning Officers to the district outside their resident or serving districts, and to attach other election staff to areas outside their living and serving areas.

8.1 Issue of Material to the Polling Stations

Under the organizational arrangements the formal letters of appointments to the polling stations and the zones for the Senior Presiding Officers and Zonal Assistant Returning Officers respectively, were handed over only on the prepoll day. This arrangement is made at all elections to allay the misunderstanding among the public that the candidates and local politicians would influence these officers for undue advantages. This misunderstanding is decimated because nobody can influence them as the places of duties of officers are not known to anybody. A special awareness session with prior notice by Returning Officer or Deputy/ Assistant Commissioners of Elections was conducted for Senior Presiding Officers of polling stations after they reported at the Returning Officers' offices or any other designated place on the prepoll day. Instructions given at the training classes held earlier were recalled, the need to conduct a free and fair election was reiterated and the dutiful responsibility cast upon the Senior Presiding Officers was repeated again and again at these meetings. Special directives issued by the Election Commission were explained. Thereafter the identity document of the Senior Presiding Officer, certified by the head of the institution was examined in order to establish his/ her identity and the formal appointment letter was issued. After receiving the appointment letter the Senior Presiding Officer had to report at the issuing center where the ballot papers, ballot boxes and other material are issued by the Assistant Returning Officer in charge of the

issuing center, after checking their appointment letters and identity documents again for clarity. The ballot papers, ballot boxes, statutory documents and other material were issued to the Senior Presiding Officer.

In some districts one Junior Presiding Officer assigned to the polling station was also asked to report to the relevant issuing center and to assist the Senior Presiding Officer to receive the material issued to the polling station and to accompany the Senior Presiding Officer to the polling center.

Under the transport arrangement to go to the polling station, if the Senior Presiding Officer uses his own vehicle or borrowed vehicle, and if he had obtained prior approval to do so, he could register information at the transport unit and proceed to the polling station following the route directions given. Senior Presiding Officers who did not have such transport facility were provided with transport to go to the polling stations by the transport arrangements made by the District Returning Officer.

8.2 Assistants and Security Personnel at the Polling Station

Senior Presiding Officers were informed to accompany an assistant with him/ her to go to the polling station and he was also issued with an appointment letter at the issuing center. When any Senior Presiding Officer could not accompany such person, an assistant from the pool of the issuing center was assigned to him. One of the two police personnel allocated to provide security to the polling station, was directed to go with the Senior Presiding Officer to the polling station providing security to the election material from the point at which they were handed over to the Senior Presiding Officer. These police personnel should be with the Senior Presiding Officer until the election material are returned to the receiving center. As directed by the Inspector General of Police arrangements were made by the officer in charge of the police station in the area where the polling station was situated, to send the other police personnel directly to the polling station assigned.

8.3 Facilities at the Polling Station

By the time the Senior Presiding Officer reaches the polling station with ballot papers and other material, Grama Niladharis of the area or his representative

had made arrangements with necessary facilities. Some Grama Niladharis especially in Colombo district had more than one polling station to cater. When such number of polling stations exceeded three, the Election Commission allowed such Grama Niladharis to employ an assistant to take care of the polling station. This assistant was allowed to coordinate with the poll staff of the polling center. However, the Grama Niladharis were instructed to be on the alert of the preliminary arrangements in the polling station and its welfare facilities. Deputy/ Assistant Commissioners of Elections and the Divisional Secretaries were advised to closely supervise such polling stations. Grama Niladharis were instructed to supply food to the staff of the polling stations under a prescribed fee. It was the responsibility of the Grama Niladharis to provide accommodation to the male officers including the police personnel to stay the night in the polling station. Grama Niladharis were further advised to provide suitable accommodation to keep the belongings safely, to the poll staff of polling stations established in temporary sheds where permanent buildings were not available. The purpose of directing the Senior Presiding Officer to prepare a report in two copies and hand over one to the Grama Niladhari on the accommodation provided, was to ensure a more effective service in view of the previous experiences in providing such accommodation. It was practically a difficult task to provide accommodation to the total satisfaction of the poll staff. But it is commendable that the government servants enjoyed whatever the facility they received, without raising questions or entering into arguments, while undergoing the difficulties with the intention of performing a national duty to uphold the democracy in the country.

8.4 Supervision and Co-ordination of the Poll

Election Commission had an operational mechanism for the poll process from the time of the arrival of ballot papers, ballot boxes and statutory documents at the polling stations, and the counting of votes, upto the conclusion of the election after declaring the results. Up until this election, it was the telephone and fax that were used in the process. Information Technology Division of the Election Commission introduced a short messages system (SMS) an information technology technique, for the operation and supervision of this process at this Presidential Election. The message that should be

sent by the Senior Presiding Officer in charge of the polling station to the District Returning Officer through the Zone Assistant Returning Officer was sent in a pre-planned system to the computer system of the Election Commission by the Sri Lanka Information and Communication Technology Agency through its gate. And the Information Technology Division of the Election Commission prepares an observation report after observing the operations of polling stations and submits it to the Election Commission. Although this technique was introduced in addition to the conventional system of using telephones and faxes, it could not cover all operations hundred percent as mobile telephone signals were not operating or weak in some areas and the Senior Presiding Officers were busy with too many duties to perform, and there were difficulties faced in using information technology methodologies. However, these methods can be improved and the supervision and operation of functions in the polling stations could be better coordinated in the future.

Returning Officers arranged a short discussion with the Zone Assistant Returning Officers at the places where they reported for duty. At this discussion the Returning Officers, Deputy/Assistant Commissioners of Elections explained the duties expected from them to conduct a free and fair election, the instructions given previously, the need to follow the provisions in the law and special instructions that have been given by the Election Commission. Thereafter the letters of formal appointments were handed over to them. Until they received the letters of appointment they were not aware of the zone they were assigned to. After receiving the appointment letter, they had to go to the issuing center relevant to the zone they were assigned to and had to ensure that the Senior Presiding Officers of the zone have left for the polling stations with election material. They had to go to the zone to engage in the supervision, transport for which had been arranged by the Returning Officers corresponding to the transport arrangements made to the Senior Presiding Officers. Zone Assistant Returning Officers were advised to go to the Divisional Secretariat Office in the area of the assigned zone and report to the Coordinating Assistant Returning Officer and go to the zone, and commence supervising the polling stations. The purpose of this arrangement was to ensure a poll free of any oversight.

8.5 Role of the Senior Presiding Officer on the Pre-poll Day

Senior Presiding Officers should report to the assigned polling stations, inspect the station and check whether a free and fair election could be conducted there and whether there is security to safely keep the ballot box, ballot papers and other election material in the station. In case the required facilities are not there, Senior Presiding Officer should immediately inform the Zone Assistant Returning Officer and through him the District Returning Officer.

Other staff were informed to report at the polling stations at 2.00pm on the pre-poll day. Their appointment letters along with the National Identity Cards were checked and they signed the attendance register at the polling station. All staff met together and introduced themselves to each other. The rehearsal should then be conducted. Senior Presiding Officers had been given clear instructions not to open the ballot papers, official marks, indelible ink containers etc, under any circumstance at this rehearsal. It was the responsibility of the Senior Presiding Officers to get acquainted with the skills of the officers at the rehearsal and assign the duties to the staff accordingly. Instructions should be studied and guidance should be given to the staff for easy application. Conduct of this rehearsal ensures the presence of the staff at the station and is an indication that the poll could commence next morning without any difficulty. Sufficient number of officers had been assigned to the polling station, but if any officer has not reported at the rehearsal and if it is found that the minimum number of officers were not there at the rehearsal, the Zone Assistant Returning Officer who is supervising the polling station should be immediately informed. A pool of officers was maintained at the Divisional Secretariat, from which, essential shortfalls were met. Female officers were released after the rehearsal after advising them to be present at the station before 6.00am following day. Male officers had to stay the night in the polling station. Zone Assistant Returning Officers had been advised to visit the polling station and compulsorily verify and ensure personally that election material had been received correctly and sufficiently, to check from outside without opening whether the ballot papers, official mark, indelible ink etc are there, whether the rehearsal had been held and if it not so, to advise the

Senior Presiding Officer to conduct the rehearsal and supervise the holding the same, and if necessary to give further advise and instructions. After supervising the station, the Zone Assistant Returning Officer should send his first message to the District Returning Officer or to his operations room through telephone and fax that the polling station is ready to commence the poll at 7.00am following day.

8.6 Duties on the Poll Day

The most important document to be maintained by Senior Presiding Officer on the poll day is the Senior Presiding Officer's journal. All activities and events in the polling station from the time of commencement of the poll upto the time of conclusion should be recorded in this journal. Information about the Senior Presiding Officers staff, polling agents, candidates or their representatives, officers and others permitted to enter the polling station also should be recorded here. Notes on any unrest or other incidents in the polling stations should be made in the journal. The journal should be handed over as directed, to the receiving center at the time of handing over the ballot boxes after the poll.

Instructions had been given by the Election Commission to the Senior Presiding Officers and other staff to be ready by 6.00am on the poll day for their duties, to display notices and posters with instructions for the voters, to place the voting cubicles, and to keep the ballot boxes ready to be sealed. The Act allows two polling agents appointed by each candidate to be present in the polling station. But as there were 35 candidates, it was a problem to accommodate two agents from each candidate in a polling station. Therefore, permission was given to accommodate one agent to observe the poll in view of the limited space available in the polling station.

Returning Officers informed the polling agents to be present at the polling station at 6.30am on the poll day because their appointment letters along with the identity had to be checked and also because their presence was necessary before sealing the ballot box. This opportunity was provided to the agents as their observations on the examining of electoral registers, ballot boxes, ballot papers, and specially in randomly selecting the official mark to place on

the reverse of the ballot paper were necessary to ensure the credibility of the election that it was held freely and fairly. Ballot boxes were opened and exhibited in front of all those present to prove that there was nothing inside the box and after sealing the box the agents were allowed to affix a mark or a sticker not being a symbol of political party, neither a symbol appearing in the ballot paper. Specimen of such markings should be handed over by the polling agents to the Senior Presiding Officer.

It was essential to carefully and correctly include in the Senior Presiding Officer's file all statutory forms necessary for the poll, without missing any. Officers in charge of stores and all other relevant officers were educated on this. Instructions were given to the Senior Presiding Officers to get these forms filled up and inserted in the relevant covers by Junior Presiding Officers under them.

8.7 The Conduct of the Poll

The poll to elect the President commenced at 7.00am on 16.11.2019. According to the provisions in the law the poll had to be closed at 4.00pm. But the close of the poll was extended upto 5.00pm after discussing with the secretaries of political parties and other stakeholders, on the assumption that the voters would take extra time because of the lengthy size of the ballot paper. Extension of the poll time was published in the gazette No 2147/46 of 29.10.2019 and attached to this report as **Annexure 19**. The poll was taken in 12,845 polling stations during the stipulated time period. Assistance of 223,983 government officers of all levels was obtained for the exercise. There were officers who were directly and others indirectly engaged in the process while there were providers of various support services. Services provided by security establishments for protection and to enforce the law was highly instrumental in conducting the poll peacefully. We are content that the whole process was carried out freely and fairly according to the time schedules, and met the expectations of the majority of people to democratically elect their President.

8.8 Close of the Poll, Handing over of Ballot Boxes, and other Statutory Documents

After commencing the poll, Mega Zone Assistant Returning Officers appointed to assist the District Returning Officers and Deputy/ Assistant

Commissioners of Elections, visited the polling stations from time to time. They were instructed to supervise not only the functioning of polling station but also the situation in the whole area. If any violation of election laws was detected, their duty was to arrest such situation with the support of the police when necessary. Zone Assistant Returning Officers had to visit and supervise the work of all the polling stations assigned, minimum three times compulsorily and the numbers of polling stations to be supervised was determined with this requirement in mind.

Returning Officers advised the Zone Assistant Returning Officers to be in one polling station at the time of the commencement of the poll and in another polling station at the time of the close of the poll in their supervision duty. After the close of the poll at 5.00pm ballot boxes and other statutory envelopes were sealed. Agents had been informed that they could request the Senior Presiding Officer to place their seals or affix their stickers after sealing the ballot box. They had also been informed to hand over the samples of these seals and stickers to the Senior Presiding Officer.

Senior Presiding Officer transported the ballot box to the counting center on the same route according to the transport arrangement made for the previous day. There had been a misconception conceived by candidates and their supporters that irregularities take place at the time of transporting the ballot box to the receiving center. Therefore, instructions were issued to allow one out of all polling agents from parties or groups in the polling station, to monitor the transport of the ballot box from the polling station to the counting center, using his own vehicle.

Zone Assistant Returning Officer should hand over the journal of his supervision of all polling stations to the Returning Officer after sending his final message to the Returning Officer through fax and then by telephone, after reporting at the Divisional Coordinating Center. According to the reports received by Returning Officer from all polling stations the poll had been conducted in a peaceful manner. It is commendable that there were no any reports to suspend or annul the poll of any polling station. By about 8.00pm on the poll day it was reported to the Elections Secretariat that ballot boxes

have reached the respective counting centers without any problem or difficulty after the conclusion of a peaceful poll.

8.9 Management of Election Disputes

With the notice to hold the Presidential Election, the responsibility of creating a fair field to conduct a free and fair election, was rested upon the Election Disputes Resolution Unit, newly created by the Election Commission to enforce the election law. This step was taken by the Election Commission to further strengthen the methodology used to quickly act and manage election complaints made to the Commission during the election period by political parties, candidates, the public, civil organizations and election observer organizations. With the nominations, the National Center for Election Dispute Management was established by the Election Disputes Resolution Unit of the Elections Secretariat and District Elections Dispute Management Units in each district. The National Center and District Units continuously functioned till 18.11.2019 attending to election complaints. The activities of the Elections Dispute management unit with regard to the Presidential Election can be summarized as follows:

- Issuing of circulars and instructions in order to enforce the Sections 66 to 75 on "offences", Sections 76 to 81 on "corrupt practices" and Sections 82 to 87 on "illegal practices".
- Preparation of directive guidelines and Codes of Conduct indicated in the Article 104G of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka and publishing in the Extraordinary gazette notifications.
- Establishing of national, district and divisional election complaints management units, training of officers attached to these units, supervision of the functioning of the complaints units, recording of complaints, preparing daily reports and submission of review reports of the Commission for instructions and orders.
- Identifying the means of preventing the misuse of public property, public officers and other recourses to promote political parties and candidates and instructing the relevant institutions to use public property solely for the benefit of the public without making room for any abuse.

- Creating a conducive environment to hold a free and fair election, constantly studying the ways and means to create a level field for the contestants and making recommendations to the Election Commission on the action that should be taken.
- Taking immediate action on the complaints received by the Election Complaints Management Units and making observations as necessary, carrying out initial inquiries and taking action and convening relevant parties to the Election Commission and investigating the complaints.
- Coming into agreements with the administrators of social media to manage complaints received through social media and co-ordinating with social media activists to minimize violations of election laws.
- Maintaining sound co-ordination with all State agencies and Statutory Boards, Sri Lanka Police, domestic election observer organizations, secretaries of contesting political parties, authorized agents and leaders of independent groups.
- Followup action on legal issues in the enforcement of the elections law and practical difficulties and advising the district elections officials and election disputes resolution units in the districts.

The mechanism adopted by the Election Dispute Resolution Unit to implement the above activities is given in the **Annexure 20** here.

Instruction sessions were conducted in several areas to cover all 25 administrative districts to train selected civil officers for the Elections Complaints Centers established at district and divisional levels as shown in the schedule. Inspector General of Police attached a team of police officers to each of these complaints centers. Training programmes on the election law and the management of elections complaints were conducted for the senior police officers to be engaged in this function and coordinating with police officers all OICs and officers who were in charge of elections. In addition

to the district elections complaints units, some special complaints centers were established taking into consideration the geographical extent of the district, the nature of the terrain, transport difficulties and past experiences.

8.10 Making Election related Complaints

National Center for Election Complaints and the District Centers accepted election complaints made verbally or through traditional modes such as telephone messages, fax messages and letters or through social media such as e-mails, WhatsApp, Viber, FaceBook etc. It was announced that complaints could be made through FaceBook "Tell Commission" and the "Election Commission". Complaints to the district complaints centers could be made through any of the above media, and inquiries also could be made from the centers. The purpose of this arrangement was to facilitate everybody to forward any issue easily and immediately.

Parties directly involved in the management of election disputes were the activists of political parties and agents of candidates. The role of the election observer organizations and media in making complaints is remarkable. Managing election disputes was a challenging task, however, by maintaining direct contacts with them during the election period, the Election Commission made efforts to persuade the relevant parties through meetings, discussions and common agreements to carry out the campaigns and meetings without violating the election law.

8.11 Election Complaints received at the National and District Election Complaints Centers

With the hope of conducting a free and fair election, the Commission made the maximum effort to prevent the violation of election laws. A special mechanism was adopted for the management of election complaints. Complaints related to the election made to the Election Commission through the management centers by the public including the agents of political parties, are given in the following table.

8.13 Categorization of Election Complaints

There are four categories of election complaints i.e. election violence, violation of election laws, inquiries and requests for approval.

8.13.1 Election Violence

Violent activists are sub-categorized according to their nature, as follows

- Verbal threats
- Threatening with weapons/ attempts to murder by shooting
- Assault/ grievous hurt
- Serious injuries/ attempts to murder
- Murder
- Abduction
- Shooting
- Arson
- Rabble rousing
- Damaging property/ looting
- Damaging banners/posters etc of campaign houses

At the national level there were 19 violent events and at the district level, the number was 24. When compared with assaults, murders and threats in the previous elections, violent activities at this election were low in number. When the complaints were examined it has transpired that the incidents had been due to personal disputes and through verbal arguments. It is observed that these violent incidents had not impacted upon the poll or the result. In relation to the election it is a satisfactory situation.

8.13.2 Violations of Election Laws

Violations of election laws are the activities committed against the legal provisions in the election law. Following are the violations of the law.

- Misuse of movable and immovable public property
- Engaging government officers in political activities
- Appointments / promotions / transfers of government officers on political grounds
- Misuse of media
- False propaganda, making of fake news and publicising and hate speech
- Obstructing propaganda activities
- Display of illegal posters, banners, cutouts
- Distribution of goods, donations and treating

- Meetings, rallies, illegal election offices
- Campaign through religious dignitaries, use of religious places and functions for political purposes
- Organizing and conducting illegal functions
- Irregularities in postal voting
- Obstructions to cast vote

8.13.3 Inquiries

In addition to the complaints on violation of election laws, a large amount of inquiries was received at the Election Dispute Resolution Unit. Many of these inquiries were about legal issues, issues of enforcement of election laws, activities of the parties who have fielded candidates, activities of candidates etc. Taking action on all these inquiries was a difficult task. There were also inquiries from the public about the doubtful actions of officers who were engaged in the electoral process. Some inquiries were about the distribution of goods, organizing functions, granting approval for various activities, recruitments and promotions.

8.13.4 Requests for Approval

Approval of the Election Commission was requested for proposed development activities, appointments, promotions, transfers of public officers, and authority to grant permission for foreign travel of government officers during the election period. These requests were examined and approval was granted on reasonable grounds, and others were rejected and advised to postpone them until the poll was concluded. Some requests were referred for further scrutiny and steps were taken to take legal action against those who defied the instructions.

8.14 Prevention of Misuse of Public Property

In terms of the Article 104B(4)(a), the Election Commission is empowered to prevent the misuse of movable or immovable public property for the purpose of promoting or prejudicing candidates. State officers who are in charge of public property are bound to implement the directives issued by the Election Commission in this regard. This directive is applicable to all Ministries, Commissions, Departments, Provincial Councils, Local Authorities, Government Corporations, Statutory Boards, Government Schools, State Universities etc. and to all government institutions and companies taken over by the Government. Having paid much

attention on the use of public property to promote candidates, the Commission published the Extraordinary gazette No 2141/52 of 19.09.2019 under the above provisions, preventing the use of any movable or immovable public property belonging to the State, State Corporations and Statutory Boards to promote or prejudice any political party, group, or candidate or to obstruct the conduct of a free and fair election, and by the Extraordinary gazette No 2143/47 of 03.10.2019, some provisions in the former gazette notification were amended and additional provisions were introduced. These gazette notifications are attached as **Annexures 21 and 22**. Instructions to heads of all government institutions were issued by circular No 1-EC/EDR/PRE/2019 of 18.09.2019. This circular informed Secretaries of all Ministries, Secretaries of all Independent Commissions, including the Public Service Commission, Secretaries of all Provincial Councils, all District Secretaries, all Provincial Governors, Secretaries of Provincial Ministries, Secretaries of Provincial Public Service Commissions, Chairmen, General Managers and executive officers of all State Corporations and Statutory Boards to prevent the misuse of State property under their charge during the election period and that all recruitments, promotions and transfers were restricted.

In addition, the use of officers, vehicles of heads of local authorities for campaign meetings, the use of vehicles and other equipment of local authorities to transport material, staff and posters and to organize meetings to promote parties or candidates were prohibited. The media release No 41 was issued emphasizing the importance of this prohibition and the need to refrain from violating laws relevant to the meetings of political parties/ candidates, campaign posters, walks, distribution of handbills etc. These were the steps taken by the Election Commission to enforce the election laws.

It had been a common practice in the past to organize functions, distribute goods and material recruit employees, give promotions and order transfers after publishing the proclamation to conduct an election. However this practice was controlled to a certain level at this election because the Election Commission was empowered to issue directives related to the above Articles of the Constitution. Relevant stakeholders were educated on the need to act accordingly. The officers who contributed to the misuse were punished and legal action was taken against such misuse. As a result of the precautionary action taken by the Commission, heads of institutions were inclined to take action to obtain the consent of the Election Commission not only in recruiting officers and employees or giving of promotions and transfers, but also in organizing official and religious functions and also in granting permission for foreign travel which was a commendable step taken by the heads of institutions. The Election Commission examined the requests made by heads of institutions and granted approval to such requests only if the Commission was satisfied that they were not prejudicial to any person.

In addition, a Code of Conduct to be followed by the contesting candidates of political parties, was published in the Extraordinary gazette No 2142/47 of 25.09.2019. It is attached as **Annexure 22** of this report. Purpose of this Code was to setup a conducive back ground for a peaceful and free election.

8.15 Legal Action related to the Presidential Election

Two writ applications to debar the election and one human rights petition were filed in the Supreme Court. SC/Writ/Co/2019 was filed to obtain a writ against the holding of the Presidential Election and other applications were regarding media. Details are given below.

8.16 Election Observation

The Election law does not provide for observation of elections by local or foreign observer organizations. However, with the agreement with political parties and other stakeholders, observation of elections is currently allowed as these observer organizations have proved that they have the capacity to carry out observations and they own the intensity in the network and that they are capable to work impartially. Local observer organizations were accredited to conduct the observation of the election employing foreign observers depending on the circumstances. By engaging these observer organizations, the Commission expects that they would express their opinion on whether the election had been conducted freely, impartially, fairly, transparently and credibly. Several local and foreign observer organizations made requests for permission to observe the Presidential Election. Many of the local observer organizations were registered as NGOs. Several of these organizations were allowed to carry out election observation after considering their experience and activities in the past few decades. No payment is made to the organizations by the Election Commission or the government in this regard.

In addition to the domestic observer organizations, foreign observer organizations such as the Commonwealth and European Union were allowed to observe the election.

8.16.1 Domestic Observer Organizations

After discussing with the candidates and obtaining their consent, domestic observer organizations with experience in observing elections, were allowed to observe the Presidential Election as has been done in the previous elections.

Considering the way they observed the previous elections, how they functioned and performed in observation activities and the experience they have gathered in observing elections, two observer organizations were allowed to engage static observers inside the polling stations and also to carry out mobile observation outside the polling stations. Following are the details of the two observer organizations.

Peoples Action for Free and Fair Election (PAFFREL)

Heads of these two organizations i.e Executive Directors, Co-conveners and Co-Coordination Secretaries, National Organizers and the Senior Managers of the two organizations were allowed to enter any polling station in the Island to observe the election and the district organizers of the two organizations were allowed to enter any polling station within the district for observation purposes.

In addition to the two organizations mentioned above, following four organizations were authorized to conduct only the observation outside the polling stations by engaging mobile observers in the districts they asked for permission.

Campaign for Free and Fair Elections (CaFFE)

Heads of observer organizations were advised to engage persons who did not have any connections with the activities of political parties and to give necessary instructions to the observers in carrying out their duties. They were further warned that if they fail to abide by these instructions the organization will be withdrawn from observations. The organizations were advised to hand over the names of observers intended to be engaged in the districts, to the Returning Officers one week before the poll day and that there will be problems in passing them over to the Senior Presiding Officers in charge of polling stations if they fail to do so. The observers were instructed to hand over the report where they enter the notes, to the Senior Presiding Officer soon after the poll was closed.

The Peoples Action for Free and Fair Election (PAFFREL) and Center for Monitoring Election Violence (CMEV) were also allowed to engage observers in the postal voting centers.

Domestic observer organization were accorded with the opportunity of observing the count as well. The purpose of allowing the Peoples Action for Free and Fair Election (PAFFREL) and Center for Monitoring Election Violence (CMEV) to engage static observers inside the counting centers, was to allay the misconception of political parties and other organizations that corruptions and irregularities take place in the counting of votes.

Peoples Action for Free and Fair Election (PAFFREL) and Center for Monitoring Election Violence (CMEV) engaged observers invited from several foreign countries in addition to the local observers in observing the election and expanded their observations for which the Election Commission gave prior approval.

8.16.2 Foreign Observer Organizations

At the meeting held on 09.10.2019 in the Elections Secretariat with the secretaries of contesting recognized political parties after the proclamation of the election, it was announced that the Commission would obtain the assistance of foreign observer organizations to observe the election. Accordingly the Chairman of the Association of Asian Election Authorities (AAEA), the Chairman of the Forum of Election Management Bodies of South Asia (FEMBoSA) and the South African Human Rights Foundation were invited to field observers for the Presidential Election scheduled for 16.11.2019. The Commission also took action to invite the Commonwealth Election Observers and European Union Election Observers. Accepting the invitation, these organizations participated in observing the election. These observers engaged in the observation covering all the districts.

A study programme was conducted in seven districts by a study team comprising of the chiefs of Election Management Bodies of Bhutan, Bangladesh and Maldives.

The election Commission directly co-ordinated the observers of Association of Asian Election Authorities (AAEA) and Election Management

Bodies of South Asia (FEMBoSA). The Commonwealth observer group and the European Union observer group were directly assigned to the relevant districts and information about them was sent to the Returning Officers. Only the information required by the two observer groups were supplied by the Election Commission. They were allowed to observe any polling station or counting center within the district assigned. About 50 observers engaged in the Island from the nomination day upto 16.11.2019.

Coordinating officers from the Elections Secretariat and the districts were appointed to assist foreign observers sent to districts for observations other than those of the Commonwealth and the European Union and the Returning Officers were instructed to provide accommodation to the observers and coordinating officers as they had to stay in the particular districts. Returning Officers were also advised to provide opportunity to the foreign observers to meet the Deputy/ Assistant commissioners and discuss about the arrangements in the district and to meet the authorized agents of political parties, members of the local observer organizations and the police. All costs of the Commonwealth and European Union observers were borne by the respective organizations and the Election Commission provided only the coordination required for observations.

Foreign observers observed the postal voting in the certifying officers' offices on 31.10.2019 and 01.11.2019 and they were provided with the opportunity to observe the process at the polling stations and counting centers and also in the results declaring centers on 16.11.2019.

The common observation of the local and foreign observers was that the Presidential Election 2019 as a whole, was peaceful and fair. When compared with previous elections we can be content that Presidential Election 2019 was an appreciable election although few minor incidents were reported sporadically.

Chapter Nine

Counting of Votes and Tabulating the Result

9. Counting of Votes

Counting of votes of the Presidential Election 2019 commenced at the premises where counting centers were located, after receiving the ballot boxes at the end of the poll. There were 43 counting premises and 1,550 counting centers in all districts. Out of them, 1,179 centers were to count ordinary ballot papers and 771 centers to count postal ballot papers. Counting premises and counting centers in each district are given in the **Tables 05 and 06**. A Chief Counting Officer (CCO) was in charge of the counting in a center, and a sufficient number of Assistant Returning Officers and a counting staff were provided to these centers. Steps of checking, super checking and random checking and supervision in order to ensure accuracy were carried out by each group of officers. The count was proved fair and systematic because it was subject to observation by the counting agents appointed at the request of the candidates.

Counting of votes is described in the Section 47 to 59 of the Presidential Elections Act No 15 of 1981 and the counting of postal votes is explained in the Regulations from 18 to 28 in the Second Schedule thereof. According to the Section 47 of the Act the Returning Officers of each electoral district have to forward the result of the count to the Election Commission as advised, in order to prepare the total result.

9.1 Counting Centers

Returning Officers have to identify places for counting, appoint staff for the count, and inform the candidates about the counting date and time, the number of agents who can be present in a counting center and at the count. Counting centers are arranged where ballot papers of several polling stations in a polling division could be counted in one center. In this election one counting center was designed for 7,500 to 10,000 registered electors. It was instructed that postal vote counting centers should be planned as 1,500 to 2,500 packets for one counting center. After receiving the ballot boxes and other sealed material from all polling stations in polling divisions, the main function of

the Returning Officer was to count the ballot papers in the ballot boxes and postal ballot papers in the postal ballot boxes before the agents of candidates in the counting center and report the numbers of votes polled in the polling division by each candidate to the Election Commission.

When establishing counting centers, the areas of the center and facilities available in the building, had to be taken into consideration following the guidelines issued by the Election Commission keeping the large size of the ballot paper in mind. The major problem encountered by the Returning Officers and Deputy/ Assistant Commissioners of Elections, was the lack of spacious places to use as counting centers when they had to station a counting staff of 30 to 40 members and according to the provisions of the Act, about 70 counting agents had to be accommodated in the center. Returning Officers were advised to engage about 15 officers including the Chief Counting Officer in the postal vote counting center. Due to these practical difficulties it was difficult to establish all counting centers of an electoral district in one premises. Therefore they were forced to count the votes in one electoral district in several places. The results tabulation center is normally located in the counting premises but at this election, the tabulation of results in some districts had to be carried out in a separate place especially selected for the purpose.

9.2 Appointing of Agents to Counting Centers

In terms of the provisions in the Presidential Elections Act two counting agents had to be appointed for each candidate to a postal vote counting center and five agents for each candidate to a normal vote counting center. Returning Officers informed all election agents and authorized agents in writing, the location of the counting centers, the polling stations (with the numbers of electors in each center) assigned to each center, numbers of agents that could be appointed to the centers enabling them to appoint their agents before the poll. The date to hand over the details of the proposed agents to the Returning

Officers, the date and place to collect the appointment letters and entry passes for agents also were mentioned in the same letter. Instructions were given to the formally authorized agents to report at the counting centers in the afternoon of the poll day. There were requests made at the meetings had with the secretaries and permanent representatives of political parties, to accommodate agents more than the numbers allowed by the law, because of the assumption that irregularities may occur in the counting of votes. In response to this request one more agent of each candidate was allowed to enter the counting premises and observe the procedure in all counting centers staying outside the centers. As was done in the previous elections, one agent of each candidates was allowed to report at the receiving center at 3.00pm on the poll day and observe how the Senior Presiding Officers handed over the material. One agent out of all polling agents of candidates in the polling station was allowed upon request, to follow the vehicle that transported the ballot box from the polling station to their receiving center using his own vehicle. An agent was allowed to stay in one place within the premises and observe the transport of ballot box to the counting center. A set of instructions for counting agents was issued by the Election Commission describing their role.

Returning Officers had planned a systematic procedure to receive the ballot boxes and other material brought from the polling stations by Senior Presiding Officers after the poll. Assistant Returning Officers in charge of receipts were instructed to hand over the ballot box with ballot papers and the documents required for the count, out of the material received from the Senior Presiding Officers, to the Chief Counting Officer who had already reported at the counting center, safely place other material separately in the hall, and hand them over to the Returning Officer after the count, for him to deposit in the vault with the ballot papers and other documents relevant to the count. Security of the premises where ballot boxes and other material were received, counting premises and the surroundings were under the supervision of the senior divisional police officers.

9.3 Staff of the Counting Centers

Chief Counting Officer, Assistant Returning Officers, Senior Presiding Officers, clerks and

assisting staff required for the count were mostly appointed from the officers available in the district. Some districts were provided with Chief Counting Officers, and Assistant Returning Officers, from the pool in the Elections Secretariat. All Chief Counting Officers and Assistant Returning Officers assigned from the pool in the Secretariat were trained by the Commissioner General of Elections at the Elections Secretariat. Senior Presiding Officers were briefed about the counting procedure at the training sessions conducted in the districts and Chief Counting Officers were instructed to educate the other counting staff before commencing the count.

A senior officer was appointed in every district as Assistant Returning Officer in charge of welfare activities. Assistant Returning Officers in charge of welfare followed the instructions issued by the Returning Officer and organized the activities.

9.4 Basic Conditions required to commence the Counting of Votes

If all ballot boxes expected at the counting center have been received, the Chief Counting Officer should open the Z reports handed over by the Senior Presiding Officers in charge of the polling stations about any unrest situation in the polling station, should prepare the ZCCO report and send to the Returning Officer and obtain permission to count votes. If the Senior Presiding Officer had reported that there was no conducive environment to conduct a free and fair election the Returning Officers were advised to check the reports of police officers in the polling station, polling agents, observers in the polling station and Zone Assistant Returning Officer and ascertain the facts mentioned in the Senior Presiding Officer's report. If the agents of the candidates were not present in the counting center before the commencement of the count, the counting officers were instructed to check whether they are present in the area around the counting hall. It was also advised to make an announcement through loudspeakers that the count was ready to commence. Following basic conditions had to be in place before the commencement of the count.

- Ballot boxes and other confidential documents have been handed over to the counting center
- The commencing time of the count informed to the candidates has passed

- Returning Officer's order to commence the count, has been received after satisfying that there had not been any obstructions in the polling stations assigned to the counting center and no illegal activities reported.

If it is observed in checking the reports or complaints that there had been any disturbance for the conduct of the poll the Returning Officer should report it to the Commission. The Election Commission will decide whether the votes of the particular polling station should or should not be counted after examining the reports and complaints along with the reports of the Senior Presiding Officer, in charge of the polling station police officers and the Zone Assistant Returning Officer. The Election Commission is empowered to annul the poll of any polling station and order to take a fresh poll if the ballot papers had been snatched, or stuffed the ballot boxes after grabbing and marking ballot papers by force, or failed to commence the poll at the prescribed time, or the poll had to be closed before the scheduled time, or influenced the functions of the agents and the poll staff. No such incident had been reported at this Presidential Election.

9.5 The Count

The count of the Presidential Election comprises of three stages. They are as follows,

Stage one – Ballot papers in the ballot box are counted, number verified and deposited in the receptacle.

Stage two – There are two sub-stages in the stage two. In the first sub-stage the ballot papers are taken out and from the receptacle, and emptied on the table, sorted according to the ballots marked, dropped in the boxes assigned to each candidate and the doubtful ballot papers referred to the Chief Counting Officer.

In the second sub-stage the counting staff work in five groups, i.e sorting, counting, checking, rechecking and random checking. Officers are seated according to their seniority when this count and checking is carried out. Each box of ballot papers sorted out in the stage one according to the candidates, are recounted and checked by the five groups mentioned above.

At the end of the stage two the Chief Counting Officer should report to the Returning Officer, the number of votes polled by each candidate. A copy of this results sheet should be given to each agent who had signed in the results sheet representing each party. This enabled the candidates to note the results through their agents, and the trust on the results among the agents and candidates also could be propagated because they could tally the results with the Returning Officer's results. Two agents on behalf of a candidate with a laptop computer were allowed to be in one counting premises to prepare the results received through their agents obtained from counting centers. These facilities were arranged by the Returning Officers in the counting premises.

Stage three – Preferences are counted at this stage when there is no absolute majority to any candidate. When any candidate has not obtained 50% of the valid votes in the whole island, the two candidates who had received the largest numbers are set aside and the second and third preferences marked in the ballot papers of other candidates in favour of the above two candidates are counted. Counting of preferences at the Presidential Election is not so complicated compared to the counting of preferences in other elections. Preferences are counted directly from the ballot papers without recording them in the forms. The need to count the preferences has not arisen in any of the Presidential Elections held so far in Sri Lanka. However, whether any candidate has obtained more than half of the number of valid votes could be decided only after receiving the results of counting centers in the whole island from all Returning Officers. As this takes fairly a long time the Returning Officers has to retain the officers in the counting centers without releasing where the stage one has been completed, until the Returning Officers receive instructions from the Election Commission to release them.

9.6 Calculating and Declaration of Results in the Districts

In accordance with the Section 55 of the Presidential Elections Act No 15 of 1981, Returning Officers had to determine the numbers of preferences gained by each candidate after receiving the results of counting centers from Chief Counting Officers, prepare a declaration and

forward to the Election Commission. Results of an election to elect President are collected and declared as one result. The result has to be declared by the Election Commission according to Section 64 of the Act. However the results of districts are also declared on district basis because the final result depends upon the district results. It was decided to declare the final result after adding the numbers of normal votes and postal votes together.

9.7 Tabulation of Results

Returning Officers had to prepare the result for the electoral district, certify it and forward to the Election Commission. In order to make it easy and efficient the results were tabulated according to the polling stations in each polling division. The tabulated figure gives the result of the electoral district. Postal voting results are separately tabulated. The final result is prepared after that. The result is rechecked and faxed to the Election Commission and confirmed by telephone.

In the selection of a place to tabulate and declare district results, the Returning Officers were advised to consider several aspects such as easy access, transport facilities, electricity, security, fax and telephone facilities, internet facilities, and the feasibility of constant supervision. Every effort was made to use the auditorium of the District Secretary's office except in the cases where distant places had to be selected for the purpose of tabulating results. Elections Secretariat was selected for final tabulation and declaration of the national result as was done in the previous Presidential Elections.

As there is no provision in the Act to declare the result at the electoral district level it was not necessary for the Returning Officers to inform the candidates about the tabulation and declaration of results. However the District Returning Officers were advised to inform that the authorized agent and another person nominated by him could be present at the tabulation and declaration center, because such restriction would lead to false news and various suspicions. All candidates and election agents were informed that the candidates, election agents and another person selected by the candidate could be present at the results declaration center with date, time and venue, as the responsibility of declaring the result is vested with

the Election Commission in terms of Section 64 of the Act, as mentioned above. As agreed at the meetings, the secretaries of political parties and one permanent representative of each political party were allowed to be present at the Elections Secretariat where the center of declaration of the final result was located.

9.8 Calculation of the Final Result

- (a) Arrangements were made for the agents to closely observe the tabulation of results because the calculation of the final result was carried out in the Elections Secretariat. In order to allay the doubts, misconceptions and suspicions of agents of political parties about the process from the tabulation of results received from the counting centers at the district level upto the tabulation at the Elections Secretariat, the Commission had to conduct a discussion with media persons, agents of political parties and high level politicians, by which it was possible to educate them that it is not possible to make any change in the result intentionally and there was no room for the slightest mistake in the process.
- (b) In addition to the manual preparation of results, Information Technology Division of the Election Commission calculated and tabulated the results through computer with the assistance of the Lanka Software Foundation. The training given to the officers of the Information Technology Division of the Election Commission immensely helped in maintaining the calculating and tabulating procedure in addition to the assistance extended by Lanka Software Foundation. While calculating the results through computer technology, it was the practice from the days of the Department of the Elections, to engage a separate team of officers in the Secretariat to manually calculate the results received from the districts. Results were manually calculated at this election too, and they were matched with the results received by the Information Technology Division of the Election Commission and the results were announced only after ascertaining the clarity of results.

9.9 Preparation and Checking of the Final Result and Verification

The district result is approved only after tallying the results tabulated at the Elections Secretariat with the results transmitted by District Returning

Officers and ascertaining the clarity. In order to further verify the results, the results of each candidate were obtained through fax, by the Commission, and confirmed through telephone and in addition, the results sheets were scanned this time. Accordingly, the results of each counting center received by fax from districts were taken in two copies, one copy of which was sent to the place where the results are prepared manually and the other to the Information Technology Division of the Elections Secretariat to prepare the result through computer technology.

The result prepared at the District Results Preparation Center for polling divisions after faxing, scanning and emailing to the Elections Secretariat, the result received by each candidate from the counting centers was sent to the Election Commission after tallying with the polling division results. Results of polling divisions in electoral districts, numbers of votes polled by each candidate and the postal vote results were sent to the Election Commission.

Results received from Returning Officers and results prepared by all three divisions in the Elections Secretariat were submitted to the group headed by Commissioner General of Elections and consisted with Additional Commissioners of Elections, and other experienced senior officers, established in the Elections Secretariat. When the group was satisfied that the results were correct, it forwarded the results to the Election Commission to be released. The Commission in turn referred the result to another group of senior officers who assisted the Commission and the result was handed over to the Commission only after they did a final check.

9.10 Announcement of the Official Result

After verifying the accuracy of the final results the Election Commission took steps to release the results to the Returning Officers of the districts and media in the order of finalizing the results. The

result certified by the Election Commission was sent firstly to the Director General/ Government Information. Results were issued at polling division level and electoral district level. Postal voting result was declared at the electoral district level. The result was issued to all local and foreign media by Director General/Government Information.

All the candidates were informed of the place and time of releasing the result of the Presidential Election 2019 as has been done traditionally in the past. They were invited to be present at that time.

The Election Commission had to declare the candidate elected as President with the numbers of votes secured by each candidate as reported by the Returning Officers of 22 electoral districts after verifying with the results prepared at the Elections Secretariat. Accordingly Mr. Gotabhaya Rajapaksha, the candidate of the recognized political party named Sri Lanka Podujana Peramuna secured 6,924,255 votes out of 13,254,499 valid votes cast at the election, that is 298,005 votes more than the half i.e 6,626,250 votes of all valid votes. Therefore the need to count preferences did not arise. Mr. Gotabhaya Rajapaksha was elected President according to the Section 56 (2) of the Act. On 17.11.2019 at about 2.00pm in terms of Section 64 (2) of the Presidential Elections Act No 15 of 1981, Chairman of the Election Commission declared on behalf of the Commission at the Elections Secretariat that Mr. Gotabhaya Rajapaksha was elected as the Seventh President of Sri Lanka. Mr. Gotabhaya Rajapaksha and several other candidates were present at this time. The announcement that Mr. Gotabhaya Rajapaksha was elected President had been published in the Extraordinary gazette No 2149/34 of 17.11.2019. This appears as **Annexure 24** in this report. The numbers of votes received by each candidate in the polling division of electoral districts at this election are given in the **Table 07** and the total number of votes polled by candidates and the percentages are given in the **Table 08** of this report.

Chapter Ten

Expenditure on the Election

10. Expenditure on the Presidential Election

The Presidential Election was an election held on one day in the whole island. Facilities had to be provided for 15,992,096 registered electors to cast vote. There are several main areas where funds were spent. Priority had to be given to the emoluments and allowances of the staff, transport, welfare, training, security and general services. Facilities had to be provided to the candidates and their agents. There were problems of controlling expenditure because all these had to be carried out on time.

The total cost of the Presidential Election 2019 was Rs. (Mn.) 4,566.2. According to the electoral register 2018, the cost per election was Rs. 286.53.

10.1 Cost of the Election

Funds to conduct the election are directly allocated by the Department of National Budget. Out of the allocations for the election Rs. (Mn.) 3,066 was for the direct expenses of the Election Commission. Rest of the funds were allocated to government institutions which provided essential services.

10.2 Categorization of the total Expenditure for the Presidential Election

The expenditure of the Election Commission for the Presidential Election 2019 was Rs. 4,566,224,424.69 This total expenditure can be classified according to the nature of the costs.

The largest percentage, 57.62% out of the total cost, had been for the payment of allowances. Out of Rs. 133.7m, the cost of services and other expenses, Rs. 17m has been spent for water. Rs. 12m was for communication facilities.

10.3 Funds allocated to other Institutions

Out of the funds allocated to other institution at the election, Rs. 1,500m was spent by the institutions including the Ministry of Defence, Police Department, Postal Department, Government Printing Department, Special Task Force, Information Department, and Department for Registrations of Persons. The percentage was 32.81% where the total expenditure for the election was Rs. (Mn.) 4,566.2. The total expenditure and percentages of the institutions to which, the funds were provided by the Election Commission are given in the table below.

The cost of the services of the Government Printing Department was Rs. (Mn.) 349.8. Out of this expenditure Rs. (Mn.) 268 (76.6%) was for the printing of ballot papers. The balance was the cost of printing of forms, notices, posters, books and envelopes. Rs. (Mn.) 36.8 was spent for printing the official poll card.

Expenditure of the Police Department was Rs. (Mn.) 659.8. Out of this allocation Rs. (Mn.) 341.5 (51.75%) was spent on the allowances to police officers. With the approval of the Election Commission, additional vehicles were rented with Rs. (Mn.) 130.1 (19.71%). Fuel cost for the vehicles engaged for election work was Rs. (Mn.) 44.8 (6.78%), removal of illegal posters and banners was Rs. (Mn.) 42.2 (6.39%), stationery and office equipment was Rs. (Mn.) 35.5 (5.38%), welfare activities was Rs. (Mn.) 28.9 (4.35%), water, telephone and other services was Rs. (Mn.) 34.1 (5.16%). Printing cost was Rs. (Mn.) 2 (0.3%).

There were several special activities expected from the Postal Department. Election Commission allocated Rs. (Mn.) 378.5 for these purposes. Rs. (Mn.) 365.6 (96.59%) out of these funds was for overtime, for stationery Rs. (Mn.) 8.3 (2.19%), for fuel Rs. (Mn.) 2.7 (0.71%), and Rs. (Mn.) 1.9 (0.5%) was for other expenses.

Election Commission is concerned about the heavy expenditure for the election and it has decided to identify alternative methods to adopt in the future and reduce the expenditure.

Chapter Eleven

Observations and Recommendations

11. Observations and Recommendations on the Presidential Election

The objective of this chapter is to describe the observations made by the Election Commission and the recommendations thereto. Observations and recommendations on the engagement of government officers in election duties, deposits, postal voting facility, and amendments to the law are some of them.

11.1 Engagement of Government Officers in Election Duties

It is only the government officers who are engaged in election duties. Postal voting facility is provided with a heavy cost to safeguard the voting right of the government servant. Allowances paid for election duties are enhanced. But there are instances where some government servants are trying to evade election duties with excuses of personal difficulties and pseudo medical certificates on various illnesses. If this state of affairs continues in the future, it will be difficult to employ the required numbers of staff in elections duties. If the government officers fall back without considering it as their duty and responsibility, election duty may need to be made mandatory to them. Those who try to escape from election duties would need to be dealt with appropriately according to the powers vested with Election Commission by the Constitution.

Some Secretaries of Ministries and some heads of government institutions support political activities, make statements promoting or prejudicing candidates, and express views about the ideologies of political parties and this is a huge obstacle to conduct a free and fair election. This unwholesome situation has arisen because the appointment of persons who are directly linked with politics, as heads of institutions. It is therefore necessary to reiterate that the laws which proscribe the engagement of public officers including executive officers, heads of government institutions and Statutory Boards and Ministry Secretaries in politics, should be reinforced in order to conduct free and fair elections and to prevent activities that

obstruct the sustenance of a democratic society. It is essential that the authorities should refrain from appointing persons who are engaged in or having direct dealings with politics as heads of government institutions and as Secretaries of Ministries.

Problems have been observed when data of public officers were collected for the purpose of engaging them in election duties. Government institutions were instructed to forward information of all officers, but there had been instances where some institutions had not done so. Some officers had not submitted their data sheets. As this is not a healthy trend, it is necessary to make every head of institution responsible to send all information about officers in their establishments without reservation.

11.2 Deposits

Various stakeholders have informed the Election Commission that the deposits made by candidates for the Presidential election, Parliamentary elections, provincial councils and local authorities elections do not commensurate with the expenditures of elections. As the deposits are of lesser values, large numbers of candidates are contesting the elections in support of other candidates. A case in point is that there were 41 persons who made deposits and out of them, 35 persons handed over nominations at this election. Violence escalates when the numbers of candidates go up and inflates the impact on the environment as well. Commission proposes to discuss further with the stakeholders and take steps to increase the monetary value of deposits.

11.3 Postal Voting Facility

There are many who have pointed out to the Commission that they are unable to go to the polling station and exercise their franchise on the poll day due to the essential nature of their vocation. Stakeholders have proposed that arrangements should be made for the employees in the sectors such as health, private security, ports and airports, industrial zones, media, airlines,

express ways, tourism, hotel industry etc to go and cast vote at an alternative polling station closest to their working places or to introduce the advance voting facility for them. It is essential that the laws are amended towards facilitating this requirement. Providing facilities for the migrant electors is on the cards for a long time, but laws are yet to be amended to provide this facility. Legislators should focus on these requirements at the earliest as they are some of the burning issues of the day.

The law allows to provide the postal voting facility for the candidates, but the period open to submit applications for postal voting lapses before the last day for nominations. It is therefore necessary to amend the dead line for postal voting applications as a date after nominations.

11.4 Application of Electronic Technology

The dialogue on the use of electronic machine for voting has been there since the mid years of the first decade of 2000^s. Several rounds of basic discussions had been held with political parties and with the then parliamentarians in this regard. It is necessary to take efficient and effective steps which should minimize the time and labour of the electors and election staff and also the cost. It is also necessary to keep in mind there are various opinions on the constantly changing nature of technologies, the prohibitive cost and the credibility of the poll and results. It is evident that some countries where this system was put into practice, have discarded the system due to the problems in the methods of casting of vote and it would be useful to explore whether the new technology could be used for the count and least.

11.5 Amendments to the Election Law

- The youth whose names do not appear in the electoral register, but have passed the age of 18 years on the date of poll are making queries about any possibility of casting the vote at the election. Election Commission is of the view that this is not a sound situation in view of an all inclusive and free and fair elections and should be eliminated. Registration of Electors Act No 44 of 1980 is proposed to be amended by introducing a supplementary electoral register for all citizens to get registered at any time they are completing the age of 18 years if they are not

subject to any disqualification and treat it as a part of the electoral register and a draft Act for this purpose has been presented in Parliament. The issues would be resolved after the proposed Act is passed by the Legislature.

- We observe that it is necessary for the Legislature to appoint a Parliamentary Select Committee to amend the current election laws to suit the needs of the day and revise the elections Acts and other related laws according to the suggestions and recommendations of such Committee.
- Marking the elector with indelible ink at an election has been introduced in the year 1965 and it is there in the Section 36 of the Presidential Elections Act. The objective of this system was to prevent the voter from casting vote more than once. The need for an identity document to establish the identity of the voter was not there at that time. But today the National Identity Card has been made mandatory for the voter to cast vote and there are also other recognized identity documents for the purpose. Even without any of those identity documents a voter is allowed to cast vote with the temporary identity card issued by the Election Commission. It is therefore a quandary today whether it is necessary to mark the voter with indelible ink although it is a legal requirement. It is recommended to reconsider the marking of voter with indelible ink in view of the cost that has to be borne, the need to engage an extra officer in the polling station, the extra time spent on it, where it is an unnecessary waste of money, labour and time and it is proposed to consider whether this practice is necessary in the present day's context and to bring in amendments to the law.
- Delivery of official poll cards has to be done only through the Postal Department according to the prevailing legal provisions. Today there are problems in this practice and there are alternative methods that could be employed for the purpose. It is timely that the laws are amended empowering the Election Commission to take suitable steps.

11.6 Misuse of Public Property

Complaints received about the misuse of public property to promote or prejudice candidates during the election period were at a low level at this Presidential Election when compared with previous elections and it is a satisfactory situation. Even in regard to the complaints of minor nature, suitable action was taken by the Election Commission. This would enable further decimating the misuse of public property in future elections.

11.7 Management of the Use of Media

One would view that the "regulating the use of media" during an active period of election as an impossible and futile effort in view of the massive developments and new trends in the information sector today. However a majority percentage of our society still trusts newspapers, electronic media such as the radio and television as the sources of information. Candidates therefore, prefer the conventional media such as newspapers, radio and television to reach the elector in promoting their candidature and to present their political ideologies before the public. Media institutions play an important role in this regard. It is therefore necessary that the State and private media follow the guidelines issued by the Election Commission in reporting campaign work of candidates, in broadcasting daily news bulletins and other programmes. There are proposals that private media which support a particular political party or a candidate should be warned to voluntarily declare that they are supporting that party or the candidate and that such media institutions should not be involved in matters related to the election and in announcing results. These proposals are being considered by the Commission.

The Election Commission is in full agreement with the opinion that in order to conduct a free and fair election State media institutions i.e Sri Lanka Rupavahini Corporation and Sri Lanka Broadcasting Corporation, State owned companies i.e Independent Television Network and its affiliated institutions and Associated News Papers Ltd (Lake House) should function as State institutions and not as institutions of the government, not only during the election periods but also during other periods. Conditions in the licenses issued to electronic media institutions should be amended to issue licenses only after

agreeing to follow the directives and media guidelines issued by the Election Commission in order to conduct a fair election. Legal provisions also should be amended enabling the withdrawal of transmission licenses of the private media institutions during the election period which violate the media guidelines or for the representative of the Election Commission or a Competent Authority to supervise the functioning of such media institutions during election periods. Frequencies used by State or private media institutions are a public property and therefore it is necessary to regulate them and prevent misuse during an election period at which the public opinion is freely expressed.

11.8 Social Media Networks

Campaigning through social media networks was relatively high at this election when compared with the previous elections. There were complaints about social media that obstructed the conduct of a free and fair election by promoting some candidates and political parties while prejudicing other candidates by hate speech, fake news, vulgar and distorted photographs, false and partial views defaming their good name. Suggestions put forward to regulate this type of activities of social media or to supervise them during the election period, have to be carefully considered and new laws need to be formulated to prevent hate expressions, false news and broadcastings to make money, because the existing laws are not sufficient to bring about a control or to regulate.

11.9 Use of Religious Places for Campaigning

The Election Commission received complaints about using religious places such as temples, churches, kovils and mosques for campaign activities to promote candidates in the pretext of religious functions. It was a difficult task to investigate or to take legal action against such complaints, because there is a large number of religious places in the Island belonging to all religions, as the recognition and honour towards cultural background and religious freedom are very high among the people in this country. The Election Commission has contemplated about a formal programme to discuss with leaders of all religions and educate the clergy in charge of religious places before future elections and implement the provisions of the Section 78 of the Presidential Elections Act which prohibits the use

of religious places for meetings and functions to promote candidates and thereby take action to prevent illegal activities.

11.10 Control of Campaign Finance

It is observed that the political parties, independent groups, and candidates spend excessive amounts of funds for their campaigns obstructing the freedom of the electors. This is not a fair situation by the opponent candidates who are unable to spend such large amounts for their campaigns and therefore they tend to deviate from the democratic ways of campaigning. It is therefore necessary to introduce a mechanism to control campaign finance in order to create a fair field for all contesting candidates. Civil organizations including election observer organizations have already forwarded proposals in this regard. It is essential to take steps to enact legal provisions to control campaign finances, and a draft Act has already been forwarded to the authorities.

11.11 Airtime to Candidates for Campaigning through Radio and Television

At the time of enforcing the Presidential Elections

Act in the nineteen eighties, the major electronic media in the country were the Sri Lanka Broadcasting Corporation and Sri Lanka Rupavahini Corporation. In terms of the Section 117 of the Presidential Elections Act airtime in these two institutions were given to the candidates free of charge. But today there is a large numbers of State and private media institutions operative in the country. Due to the competition, the political parties and candidates prefer private media and cable television channels operating in foreign countries for their campaigns as they are more popular. It is an additional liability for the government coffers to provide airtime for political broadcasts in the State media during the most lucrative hours of the day, free of charge. The number of candidates of political parties and the number of independent candidates are increasingly growing up and all these candidates have to be given equal opportunity. Therefore the airtime to be allocated to them and the cost to the State is prohibitive. It is therefore proposed to update the relevant sections of the Presidential Elections Act considering all these factors.

Chapter Twelve

Evaluation and Conclusion

12. Evaluation

In many of the previous Presidential elections and in Parliamentary, Provincial Councils and Local Authorities elections violent incidents classified as very serious, took place and in some instances even murders were reported. However it is a victory by the people of this country to note that there were no any serious violent incidents throughout the whole election period from the date the nomination notice was issued i.e September 18, 2019 upto one week after declaration of the result. Local and foreign observer organizations which observed the whole election including the observers of the Commonwealth have vouched that the election was held peacefully and fairly. The Election Commission respectfully thanks the President of the country who held the office during the election period and acted impartially and the Hon Prime Minister, Hon Speaker, Hon Leaders of the opposition, leaders of all political parties, their leading activists and members, all candidates who contested the Presidential Election, their election agents, other agents and supporters and all citizens of Sri Lanka who acted without leaving room for violence.

It is commendable that there were no illegal activities reported in any polling station, counting center, counting premises or centers for the preparation and tabulation of results, and in the process of poll, count, and deceleration of results. The Election Commission is happy that there were no complaints of any obstructions to go to polling stations, or to cast the vote freely and secretly according to the wishes of the electors.

Although there are sufficient laws and all the powers, it is very essential that there is dedication of the leaders of political parties, party activists, electors and civil activists to conduct a free and fair election. Therefore the major portion of the credit of conducting election freely and fairly goes to the politicians who acted lawfully. Turnout at the election was 82 % and it is a very high percentage under any circumstances. Therefore all the electors who exercised their franchise deserve the respect, gratitude and honor of the Commission.

There were complaints of a shooting at Tantirimale at a bus transporting displaced voters from Puttalam to Mannar on the poll day and an attack on the same day to a bus transporting displaced voters from Mannar, at Medawachchiya. Another incident of injuring three youths with a sharp weapon by an unruly youth was reported in Deraniyagala. These incidents had an impact on the peaceful environment which remained till the prepoll day. It is a consolation to the Commission that there were no any fatal or serious injuries to anybody. The Commission conveys its condolences to those who were aggrieved by these incidents. The police have been instructed to investigate the incidents and take suitable legal action, and the police reported that appropriate action has been taken. The Commission is constantly verifying the action taken in that regard. However the support to the Commission to curb such incidents by all citizens including the politician is their inalienable responsibility.

The Commission thanks all candidates, secretaries and activists of political parties they belong to permanent representatives of political parties who assisted in the activities of the committee to investigate the complaints and all those who supported the successful conduct of the poll.

Without the support of the secretaries of Ministries, all government employees from the senior most officer down to the casual employee of the public service and provincial public services, principals, teachers and other public servants, the election wouldn't have concluded so satisfactorily. Thanks are due to all those who extended support to conduct the poll upholding the honour and respect of the public service.

Major portion of the election on behalf of the Commission in the field, was on the shoulders of the District Secretaries who functioned as Returning Officers and their staff. The Commission commends all those who performed their duties to the satisfactions of the Commission.

The Commission also thanks all Divisional Secretaries and their staff who coordinated the activities according to the instructions of the Returning Officers and also on Deputy/ Assistant Commissioners of Elections. The Commission is grateful to all Grama Niladharis who provided all facilities in the polling stations, welfare activities without any shortfall amidst many landships.

Invaluable are the services of Senior Presiding Officers and all public officers who functioned in the polling stations, roughing out, under trying conductions in most difficult polling stations without any grumble, and carrying out all the activities in the polling stations methodically, cheerfully and pleasantly, in order to safeguard the franchise of the elector whose identity was established by an identity document. The service rendered by them is most appreciable.

The climax of the election, the counting of votes, was a tedious task. The Election Commission thanks Chief Counting Officers and all officers and assistants engaged in this task loyally and patiently inside the packed counting halls. The Returning Officers were relieved in this operation, because all those mentioned above performed their duty more efficiently, correctly and rapidly than what has been experienced in other elections. Performance of the officers and others engaged in welfare, transport, hall arrangements, public utilities, postal voting, staff allocations and appointments, tabulation of results in addition to the activities directly linked with the process i.e polling center duties, issues and receipts and counts was highly instrumental in the success of the conduct of the election. Commission is grateful to all of them.

Foreign election observers appreciated the engagement of a large number of female officers as Senior Presiding Officers and Chief Counting Officers and the fact that the majority of the poll staff in the polling stations, issuing and receiving centers and counting centers were female officers. They especially appreciated the willingness of female officers to undertake this type of tiresome activities. The services of female officers was significant in that they willingly undertook to serve in polling stations without any hesitation where only some basic facilities were available, hence, a special thank to those female officers who braved in a difficult task.

There was a series of strikes to win their demands in several services in the public sector after the publishing of the nomination notice. Some strikes were launched even before publishing the nomination notice. Some of these trade unions called off their trade union action after considering the importance of the franchise or after winning their demands or considering the importance of some indispensable services at this point of time. If the election is not conducted by the mechanism with the full participation of the whole public service or conducted without the members of the public service there will be serious obstacles to conduct it freely and fairly. The Commission requested the relevant authorities and trade unions to take suitable steps and arrive at necessary decisions after discussions and refrain from strikes in order to create a satisfactory situation where it is possible to engage all public servants in the election in an uninterrupted working environment, because a free, fair and transparent election could be held only if the maximum support of the public service is extended. Positively responding the request of the Election Commission, they all opted to discontinue all trade union actions. The Commission extends its thanks to the leaders, activists and members of the trade unions of health, railway, education and higher education sectors who consented to come into agreements and create an industrial harmony, a situation which was essential to conduct a free and fair election. The Commission also thanks the Secretaries of Ministries and other authorities who reacted positively towards the demands of the trade unions and the Commission believes that the relevant parties would positively respond to the demands that caused to take trade union action.

In the first few weeks of the period of election there were only the officers of the Election Commission, civil officers of other institutions and the limited numbers of police officers attached to the Returning Officers, to enforce the election law. Immediately after the proclamation of the election these officers took maximum efforts to remove posters, cutouts, and banners and to prevent all illegal activities. Political activists understood that there is no purpose in engaging in such illegal activities and therefore illegal means of campaigning became minimal. This enabled to build up the public trust in a fair election. A special

thank goes to these officers of the Commission, all civil officers, police officers, drivers and assistants who engaged in these deterrent measures. The Commission is happy that an environmentally friendly and peaceful election could be conducted sans posters, banners and cutouts. The candidates and election agents who carried out their campaigns without posters, cutouts and banners also should be appreciated.

Election Commission is grateful to the Inspector General of Police and Senior Deputy Inspector General in charge of Elections, who cooperated unreservedly with the Commission from the inception of the election period. Senior Deputy Inspector Generals, Deputy Inspector Generals and other police officers, Officer In Charge of police stations in the provinces, all ranks of the police, and members of the Special Task Force assisted whenever their assistance was required, and worked with dedication to conduct a peaceful and successful election and their services are highly appreciated. The service rendered by all police officers in the National Center for the Management of Election Complaints and divisional coordination centers functioned on the poll day and before, was of very high standard.

The Commission is indebted to all police personnel and members of the STF who provided security to the polling stations on the prepoll day and poll day under difficult conditions without any hesitation. Our thanks are due to the head of the Civil Defence Department and the staff who assisted the Police Department in curbing illegal activities while providing security where needed and extended assistance to the Returning Officers whenever required. Gratitude to the Commanders of the Three Armed Forces and all officers who were always ready to assist the Police Department whenever the need arose. We are thankful to the commander of the Sri Lanka Navy and the staff assisted him in providing transport through the sea to the polling stations situated in the islets in the Northern Province.

Major part of printing related to the election was entrusted to the Government Press. Ballot papers were printed in the Confidential Branch of the Government Press under special security and a large amount of other required documents also

were printed there. A special thank to the Government Printer and her staff for cordially cooperating with the Commission and printing the material according to the specifications of the Commission, within the time periods available.

Commission is thankful to the Post Master General and his staff in the Postal Department for delivering the official poll cards to the households of electors, assisting in the postal voting and in delivering urgent election mail.

Some electors who had applied for National Identity Cards were unable to cast vote because they had not received the National Identity Cards before the poll day. The Department for Registration of Persons printed a confirmation certificate, on a special paper in a very short time and issued to such electors which could be issued as a recognized identity document to cast vote at the polling station. The Commission is grateful to the Commissioner General of the Department for Registration of Persons and his staff for making this arrangement. All Grama Niladharis and estate superintendents cooperated with District Deputy/ Assistant Commissioners of Elections in issuing a temporary identity card to those electors who did not have any valid identity document to cast vote. Commission extends thanks to the observer organizations who assisted in this process.

Sri Lanka Transport Board, Sri Lanka Railway, Associations of Private Bus Operators and Provincial Road Passenger Transport Authorities considering the election as a national requirement, supported the Commission by providing transport for the electors to go to polling stations to cast vote and return and helped an uninterrupted transport service.

The Commission commends the heads of all those institutions and those who engaged in providing transport services following its institutions and conditions. The Commission also thanks the private vehicle owners who provided vehicles on hire charges on approved rates when vehicles were required in addition to the government vehicles available. Additional power was supplied by the Ceylon Electricity Board to the counting premises. Telephone connections and internet facilities were provided by Sri Lanka Telecom. Additional water

supplies were made by the National Water Supplies and Drainage Board. The Commission thanks all those organizations and their staff for the services rendered.

A special thank is due to the Secretary of the Education Ministry and the officers, Chief Secretaries of Provincial Councils and Secretaries of Provincial Education Ministries for making the government schools available to use as polling stations and as counting centers, and the heads of those schools who agreed to release the facilities in the schools to be used for election purposes. We are thankful to the heads of Technical Colleges and Colleges of Education who made their premises available for the use at the election. Our respectful gratitude is due to the Chief incumbents of Buddhist temples and clergy of other religions who allowed to use the religious places under their custody as polling centers. We are also grateful to the owners of private buildings and lands for allowing them to be used as polling stations.

The weather conditions in the Island from the date of nomination upto the poll day were not conducive to hold the election. As a result of natural hazards such as earthslips, road blocks, minor and major floods, and strikes of lightening were reported in many parts of the Island. Amidst all these calamities various strategies were put into practice by the Secretary of the Ministry of Disaster Management, Director General of the National Center of Disaster Management and its officers, officers and staff of District Disaster Management centers and our thanks are due to the all of them. Secretary of the Ministry of Defence and his officers, Commanders of Sri Lanka Army, Sri Lanka Navy and Sri Lanka Airforce, Inspector General of Police and the staff of those institutions are mentioned gratefully for their assistance in need. Generally the Presidential Election falls on the months of November and December and even before the nominations the Commander of the Sri Lanka Navy pointed out to the Commission that natural disasters could take place in these months and informed of the readiness required to face such calamities. We are grateful to him for enlightening the Commission on this situation.

Secretary to the Ministry of Media and his staff and the Director General and the staff of the Department of Information played an important role in the release of announcements and official result from the date of publication of the nomination notice in enforcing media guidelines and in coordinating media all the time. Media institutions and media persons cooperated with the Commission in providing correct information to the public and educating the electors. The Commission specially thanks the heads of media institutions, Chief Executives, news editors, news directors, and editors of news papers for their co-operation with the Commission by following the media guidelines.

During the election period there were complaints about fake news and hate releases, through social media, specially through the facebook. The administrators of these organizations were informed about the complaints received in that regard. Commission thanks the administrators of social media for removing such material for the internet.

Commission is grateful to all public officers who rechecked at the Elections Secretariat the results prepared by Returning Officers and all the staff of the Information Technology Division of the Election Commission who took action to release results to the heads of media institutions and to the Sri Lanka Telecom who provided necessary information facilities for the purpose.

Some technical problems were experienced at the previous Local Authorities Election in the preparation of results and in the release of results to the media. Three months after the election, the Commission invited computer experts to discuss the problem. Consequently a workshop was held about the future programme and as decided at the workshop, preparation of a new computer programme commenced. The Commission is thankful to the Information and Communication Technology Agency, Ministry of Digital Infrastructure and Information Technology, Teaching staff of the Computer Division of the University of Colombo, Lanka Software Foundation and all those who contributed in the preparation of the information technology

programme including the information technologists who provided their knowhow voluntarily while remaining anonymous.

This election is historic, in that it is the election where the largest number of candidates contested. Because of this increased number, the Commission had to look for strategies to meet the unforeseen challenges. As one significant step, the secured cardboard ballot boxes were introduced to replace the wooden ballot boxes. But in the North and East it was decided to use plastic boxes. Our thanks are due to the Additional Commissioner in charge of the subject of National Elections and his staff, and the suppliers who undertook to turn out these cardboard ballot boxes and the other suppliers for completing the task in a short time while safeguarding the trust of the electors and political activists. We are happy that an alternative box in place of the wooden ballot box could be introduced.

Some civil society organizations supported the Commission by reporting the instances of violations of election laws, by trying to put the candidates and political activists on the right track of following the election laws, by supporting in the supply of temporary identity cards to those who did not have any identity document to go and cast vote, and by educating the public about the importance of exercising franchise. Commission is grateful to those civil society organizations. The Commission is thankful to the civil society organizations which listened to the advise of the Commission that complaints and reports should be forwarded to the Commission only if the facts can be proved true and reported to the Commission only such incidents. Involvement of impartial observer groups is very necessary to conduct free and fair elections and the Commission is earnestly waiting for the assistance of such observer organization in the future.

A team of observers of FEMBoSA was present in the Island at the invitation of the Election Commission to observe the election. These observers engaged is observing the election during prepoll period all over the Island. The Commission is of the view that the presence of the observers in the Island was instrumental is enforcing the election law in the country and in inducing the

candidates and political activists to abide by the law. European Union and the Commonwealth engaged observers with the approval of the Election Commission. In addition, at the invitation of the local observer organizations, Peoples Action for Free and Fair Election (PAFFREL), Center for Monitoring Election Violence (CMEV), and Asian Networks for Free and Fair Elections (ANFREL) also fielded foreign observers. These observers observed the whole process of the election including the prepoll preparation and the declaration of results. The cooperation of the Election Commission was extended to their observation activities. Commission warmly thanks those observer organizations for sending the observers and the observers who actively participated in the observations.

The services of the Commissioner General of Elections, Secretary of the Commission, Additional Commissioners of Elections, Deputy/ Assistant Commissioners of Elections, Directors, Chief Financial Officer and Accountants, other staff officers, and the whole staff of the Elections Secretariat, members of the staff of the District Elections Offices, casual employees recruited during this period, officers of other government offices attached to the Elections Secretariat, reemployed retired officers, drivers and other assistants, who engaged fearlessly and relentlessly according to the instructions issued by the Election Commission, in the activities such as the preliminary organizational work, resolving the issues of allocating places for political meetings, illegal campaigns, involvement of public officers in political activities and misuse of public property, in order to maintain a conducive environment to hold a free and fair election, are highly appreciated and they are accorded with the thankful commendation of the Election Commission. Hadn't the whole staff, specially the staff officers in the Elections Secretariat and District Election Offices attended to all activities related to the election day and night for nearly two months, irrespective of weekends and public holidays, the conducting of the election freely and fairly wouldn't have been a reality.

12.1 Conclusion

We would like to mention that the Commission took firm action in safeguarding the legal provisions of the conduct of the election, not with

the intention of promoting or prejudicing a particular political party or a candidate, neither with any ulterior motive of animosity. The Commission took maximum effort to prevent violating the law, to protect the voting right of the people, because the need of the day is to enforce the law so that the voter is able to exercise the franchise freely and fairly without any influence or persuasion. The Commission will act without any hesitation with the same objective in the future as well. We would also like to note here that the Election Commission and the Police Department will take legal and disciplinary action against all those who have acted in contravention to the election law and to the directives of the Commission.

The Election Commission has received many commendations for conducting a free and fair election. The Commission thanks all those who praised its work. The task of the Commission was only to perform the duties vested upon it or in other words, to create the conducive environment to

express the opinion of the public without fear and count the ballot papers properly where the opinion of the public is written and take action to elect the President according to the accurate result and therefore the commendations received by the Commission are accepted modestly in the same way that we have accepted the criticisms in the past.

Once again we thank all those who assisted us to conduct the Presidential Election on November 16, 2019 freely and fairly and state that the credit of holding such election should go to all of them and the Commission retains the responsibility of whatever oversight or shortcoming or drawback of any magnitude.



**MEDIA GUIDELINES UNDER ARTICLE 104B(5)(A) OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE
DEMOCRATIC SOCIALIST REPUBLIC OF SRI LANKA**

THE Media Guidelines made by the Election Commission under Article 104B(5)(a), (b), (c) (i) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka.

01. Every media institution shall provide accurate, balanced and impartial information in broadcasting or televising or publishing their news bulletins and any other programme relating to political matters. The neutrality and impartiality of media shall be monitored regularly by the Standing Committee of Permanent Representatives on Elections Complaints and the Standing Committee of Permanent Representatives on Media Guidelines.
02. Every telecasting, broadcasting and print media shall be neutral and impartial in their reporting of matters relating to an election and shall not act in a manner which discriminates against any contesting political party, independent group or a candidate or confers a special benefit to any such party, group or candidate, in allocating airtime on radio or television and allotting space in the newspapers for such political party, independent group or a candidate.
03. Editorials published in the newspapers shall not be commented on by electronic media as opinions in such commentaries may be biased. Whenever an editorial opinion is broadcasted, televised or published, the affected party shall be given an opportunity to broadcast, telecast or publish material to counter such opinion.

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04. Every presenter of programmes and announcer of television and radio channels shall refrain from expressing personal views, on programme where newspaper headlines and cartoons are presented, which may promote one party while causing prejudice to another.
05. It shall be the responsibility of the news and current affairs divisions of all electronic and print media institutions not to broadcast, televise or publish any programme or supplement during the period of election, if such programme, supplement or news item is inconsistent with the election laws and media guidelines of the Election Commission.
06. Where any material covering an incident or event is broadcasted, televised or published during the period of an election with comments of one candidate, any other political party or independent group having an interest in such event or likely to be affected by that incident or event should also be given an opportunity to express their views on the same incident or event.
07. The names of the script writer, announcer and the editor of any documentary programme or any other special programme broadcasted or televised during the period of an election which is directly connected with such election shall be disclosed when such programme is broadcasted or telecasted. In the event of any such media institution retaining the right not to disclose such particulars, the person in charge of such programme shall be held responsible for the contents thereof.
08. Any media institution shall not utilize air time during any programme or news bulletin to make allegations against any candidate contesting at an election if the allegations cannot be substantiated. If any political party, independent group or a candidate claims that another political party, independent group or a candidate or a supporter thereof has made any false and prejudicial statement against such political party, independent group or candidate that party, group or candidate shall be given an opportunity to counter the same.
09. Where any news or programme covering any official function or event related to any crime which is likely to promote or demote any political party, independent group or a candidate is published, even if such news or programme is not related to any election, every media institution if publishing such news or programme shall consult the parties involved therein for clarity.
10. Where during the period of an election coverage is given by radio or television to opinions or views expressed by the President or the Prime Minister or any Minister, it shall be treated as coverage given to the political party to which such person belongs. Therefore, any leader of a rival political party contesting such election shall also be given equal coverage in similar programmes. The print media shall similarly provide equal space and prominence to all political parties, independent groups and candidates in publishing special discussions and reporting campaign meetings.
11. No candidate shall be specially and favourably treated in allocation of airtime on radio or television or space in the print media, to promote the election of such candidate or to cause disadvantage to another candidate.
12. No lecture, interview, or such other programme with public officers shall be published or broadcasted or telecasted, during the period of an election, promoting any contesting candidate or causing disadvantage to another candidate.
13. Every electronic media institution shall act in a reasonable manner in selecting participants for panel discussions so that the composition of the panel is balanced. Every media institution shall refrain from conducting programmes which cause disadvantage to any participant by conducting the programme in a language which such participant is not proficient. Interviews with participants shall be conducted in a language that the participant is proficient in. Information obtained through vague and incoherent questions should not be published, or such questions should not be asked. At the outset, a participant in the programme should be warned not to make statements which are unethical or harmful to communal harmony, and if such statements are made while the discussion is in progress, the programme should be discontinued then forthwith.

14. In any phone-in programme, every caller shall be given fair opportunity to pose questions which are not unethical, not harmful to the religious or communal harmony and are consistent with the laws relating to elections. Every person conducting such phone-in programmes shall be answerable for any biased phone-in programme.
15. If the chairperson, member of the board of management, director or any journalist of any electronic or print media institution is actively involved in political activities and where any such involvement may result in a conflict of interest in providing balanced broadcasting, telecasting or publishing, such person shall inform in writing to the management of the institution, the following :-
 - (a) the involvement of such person in political activity ;
 - (b) the position held by such person in the institution ; and
 - (c) the extent of involvement of such person in arranging and conducting programmes.
16. Where any person holding any position in any recognized political party and also holding a dominant office such as the chairman, member of the board of directors, chief executive or chief editor of any media institution and, where such person is also a candidate at an election or the party to which such person belongs is directly or under a recognized alliance contesting at such election, he shall cease to engage in the duties assigned to him in such media institution. Further, if such person is contesting as a candidate or holding office in a contesting party at an election, he shall not be involved in moderating any programme in any television or broadcasting institution which is of political in nature and, in the case of print media such person shall not publish articles on political matters through that media institution.
17. Where any participant of a political party refuses to participate in a discussion or an interview in any media institution without assigning any reason for such non-participation, such media institution shall not display an empty chair or use similar means to emphasize such non-participation. It is recommended that a simple and direct announcement be made about the absence of the participant.
18. Any electronic media which broadcasts or print media that publishes the result of an opinion poll shall broadcast or publish the name of the organization which conducted such poll, the organization or the person which commissioned and funded such poll, the methodology employed, the size of the sample, margin of error and the period of fieldwork. Further, the broadcaster or publisher shall state that such poll reflects the public opinion only at the time of such opinion poll.
19. Where any candidate makes any statement to promote the candidature of another candidate of a party or group, to which such candidate does not belong, no publicity shall be given to such statement by way of broadcasting or telecasting such statement.
20. Every media personnel shall refrain from taking photographs or videoing of the inside of any polling station or postal voting center, without the written consent of the Election Commission. Any photograph or video visual obtained without such permission shall not be published in newspapers, televised or broadcasted through any media. Even the photographs and visuals obtained with the approval of the Election Commission may be published or televised only after the poll.
21. Any advertisement, quiz programme, entertainment programme, any programme relating to development activities or any such activities, film, teledrama, musical show or any other programme of such nature televised, broadcasted or published prior to the date of election, conducted by or featuring any candidate or promoting or demoting any candidate or party or an independent group shall not be telecasted, broadcasted or published during the period of silence which operate just before the date of poll. It is considered vital that a period of silence prevails just before the date of poll to enable the voter to contemplate and, consider the pros and cons of various policies announced and promises made by political parties and candidates during the election campaign.

22. Every media institution shall refrain from broadcasting, telecasting or publishing material that may promote or induce hatred and intolerance among Sri Lankan people on various grounds including the religious beliefs, faith, language, ethnicity, customs and castes.
23. Every media institution shall avoid broadcasting, telecasting or publishing propaganda activities that promote hateful politics among political activists and within society.
24. Every media institution shall refrain from republishing or repeat telecasting of any statement made previously by any candidate or a supporter about another candidate of another political party, without the consent of the declarant and shall honour a request made by a declarant not to repeat such statement made by him previously.
25. A media institution shall not give coverage to anonymous notices or material and to notices or material under the names of fake organizations or persons. The responsibility in this regard shall lie with the respective media institution.
26. A media institution and the person making any statement or reading the news, as the case may be, shall be equally accountable with regard to the publishing, broadcasting or telecasting of incorrect statements or news and shall be subject to legal proceedings that may arise in this regard.
27. It shall be the responsibility of every electronic and print media institution to adhere to and abide by the moral ethics of media.
28. All government and semi government media institutions shall refrain from the use of state property and funds to promote any political party, group or candidate and to cause loss to government revenue and act so as to cause damage to any institution. In the event of the breach of this guideline, in addition to the penalties specified in the Constitution, disciplinary action may be instituted against those responsible.
29. The proprietors of all electronic and print media shall adhere to these guidelines and ensure that the respective institutions owned by them observe such guidelines.
30. It shall also be the responsibility of the administrators of social media sites and owners of Cable Television channels to follow these guidelines as applicable to them, during the period of an election.
31. It is not only the duty, but also the responsibility of the proprietors of media institutions and administrators and users of social media to adhere to these guidelines, as observance of these guidelines is essential to ensure a free and fair election.
32. In these guidelines “period of an election” means the period commencing on the making of a Proclamation or Order for the conduct of Referendum or for the holding of an election, as the case may be, and ending on the date on which the result of poll taken at such Referendum or election, as the case may be, is declared.
33. Failure to comply with these guidelines is a punishable offence under the Constitution.
34. The *Gazette Extraordinary* No. 2008/28 dated 03.03.2017 and *Gazette Extraordinary* No. 2048/1 dated 04.12.2017 is hereby rescinded.

Guidelines issued by the Election Commission in addition to the Media Guidelines published in the Gazette No. 2141/87 of 21.09.2019.

1. Photographs or declarations of public officers who do not have political rights or of members of Armed forces and police officers who have are in active service or photographs taken and declarations made by retired officers while they were in active service and in uniform, should not be published through electronic, print, social or any other media to promote or prejudice a party or a candidate.
2. Photographs should not be taken and videoing inside polling stations should not be done without the written approval of the Election Commission. Photographs or videos taken inside a polling station or a postal voting centre taken without authority should not be published through electronic, print or social media.
3. Unofficial results of the poll should not be published until they are officially declared by the Election Commission.

**GUIDELINES ISSUED BY THE ELECTION COMMISSION IN ADDITION TO THE MEDIA
GUIDELINES PUBLISHED BY THE GAZETTE No. 2147/87 OF 21.09.2019 AND GAZETTE
No. 2146/39 OF 27.10.2019**

“SILENT PERIOD” in regard to Election Propaganda is the period commencing forty-eight hours before the date fixed for the poll and ending with the declaration of the result. Publicity should not be given to promote or prejudice any political party or candidate by way of propaganda or advertisement during this period.

However, reports of public meetings held on the day prior to the silent period to promote political parties or candidates can be broadcast and telecast only once on radio and television channels in their news bulletins on the following day, giving equal time periods for contesting parties or candidates. In print media, such news about the final public meetings should be published only on the day that follows the meeting, without giving any special favour to any party or candidate.

Presidential Election – 2019.11.16
Leave to Employees to enable them to Cast Vote

The provisions of Section 110 of the Presidential Elections Act, No. 15 of 1981 in regard to the granting of leave to employees to enable them to cast vote at the Presidential Election to be held on 16.11.2019 are reproduced below for the information of employers and employees.

110. (1) Any person, being the employer of any other person who is entitled to vote in person at an election, shall, upon application in writing in that behalf made by such other person, grant such other person leave, in writing without loss of pay, for such continuous period (not less than four hours in duration) as that person may deem sufficient to enable such other person to vote in person at that election.

(1 A) Every employer shall prepare a statement setting out-
the names of the persons applying for leave under Sub-section (1); and
the names of the persons granted leave under that Sub-section and the periods for which such person have been granted such leave,
and shall cause such statement to be conspicuously exhibited at the place of employment.

(2) Any person who contravenes or fails to comply with the provisions of Sub-section (1) of Sub-section (1A) shall be guilty of an offence and shall, on conviction after summary trial before a Magistrate, be liable to a fine not exceeding Five Hundred Rupees, or to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding one month, or to both such fine and imprisonment.

02. In terms of the provisions of the above section, leave necessary for the purpose of voting should be afforded to every employee requesting such leave in writing. The period of leave so permitted should be considered as special full pay leave in the case of all employees including casual employees and should be outside the employees' normal leave entitlement.

03. The period of time available to the employees for this purpose has to be determined by the employer on the distance an employee has to travel from his working place to the polling station, and back to his working place.

04. Since there have been several complaints from the employees at previous elections regarding the problems in obtaining leave required by law, all employers both in the public and private sectors are requested to comply with the legal requirement, and grant leave to the employees, to enable them to cast vote at the forthcoming Presidential Election.

05. The poll will take place on Saturday 16th November 2019 from 7.00 am to 4.00 p.m.

06. The co-operation of all employers in this connection will be greatly appreciated.



Directions to prevent the misuse of movable or immovable properties belonging to the State, State Corporations or Statutory Boards during the period of an election for the promotion of or in prejudice to any party, group or candidate or obstructing the conduct of the election

THE Election Commission does hereby issue the following directions under Article 104B(04)(a) of the Constitution for the purpose of preventing the use of any movable or immovable property belonging to the State, any State Corporation or Statutory boards for the purpose of promotion or in prejudice of the election of any candidate of any political party or independent group or using such properties in a manner that would obstruct the conduct of the election.

In terms of Article 104B(04)(a) of the Constitution "The Election Commission or the Commissioner General of Elections shall have the power during the period of the election to prohibit the use of any movable or immovable property belonging to the State or any State Corporation" for the purpose of promoting or preventing the election of any candidate of any political party or independent group contesting the election. Under Sub-Article (b) of that Article it shall be the duty of every person or officer in whose custody or under whose control such property is for the time being, to comply with, and give effect to such directions issued by the Election Commission. All Public Officers including all Secretaries to Ministries, Chief Secretaries of Provinces should comply with these directions. Also the Heads of institutions should ensure that all officers coming under their control do comply with these directions. These directions are applicable to all public institutions such as Ministries, Departments, Commissions, Provincial Councils, Local Authorities, State Corporations, Statutory Boards, State Banks, State Universities and Companies taken over by the government.

02. Officials

- (i) Since the skills and knowledge of public officers and their time are deemed to be State property, no public officer should engage in any activity to promote any party or candidate inside or outside the office premises within the prescribed office hours or after reporting to work or while on duty leave. Officers who are not entitled to political rights should not engage in political activities even after availing leave. Even the officers who are entitled with political rights may engage in political activities during office hours, only on personal leave or special leave approved in advance.
- (ii) No officer or employee is entitled to use State properties *viz.* other public officers, vehicles, communication equipment, printers, telephone facilities, photocopy machines, media equipment, circuit bungalows etc. for political activities and doing so is strictly prohibited.
- (iii) Officers should refrain from making any recruitment, appointments and promotions and transfers of whatever nature in public institutions without the approval of the Election Commission other than those which are formally executed under the powers vested in the commissions appointed by the Constitutional Council.
- (iv) The consent of the Election Commission may be granted for recruitments/ internal promotions initiated before the election is declared considered by the Secretary to a ministry or head of a department to implement without postponement under an all island programme and when the Commission is satisfied that recruitments / promotions common to whole public service or public sector are carried out without any political intervention. In any of these instances, a request should be made to the Commission.
- (v) When Public Service recruitments are made at divisional or provincial levels for the purpose of avoiding interruptions to sanitary, janitorial or maintenance services and of maintaining essential services, such recruitments should be made with the concurrence of the Election Commission and it is the responsibility of relevant authorities to carry out such recruitments in a transparent manner and free of political intervention.
- (vi) General transfers of all public officers including teachers and principals of government schools who would be deployed for election duties in the areas where election is to be held should be suspended for the period starting from the day on which the nominations are received and ending two weeks after the date of poll. Transfers of public officers or officers of State Corporations/ Statutory Boards who would not to be engaged in election duties should not be carried out political grounds during the period of election and it is the responsibility of all relevant authorities to give effect to transfers without leaving room for complaints of political intervention. This is not applicable to transfers done on disciplinary orders and if any transfer is required to be made on exigency of service or under special circumstances, such requirement should be brought to the notice of the Election Commission and approval obtained.

- (vii) It shall be an offence for any public officer who is not entitled to political rights to engage in making any propagation or statement using his/her private social media account or any other account to promote or to prejudice any political party or candidate. Public officers who are entitled to political rights even should not engaged in such propagation using the state resources and making or publishing hate speech shall be an offence.

03. Functions, Mobile Services and Trade Fairs

(i) *Functions:*

Functions such as laying foundations, opening ceremonies and vesting in the public utilizing government funds and State properties should not be organized or conducted during the period of election since the politicians who attend these functions may express opinions and views on the election and conduct of these function ceremonially may lead to the promotion or cause prejudice to any party, group or candidate.

In the case of functions scheduled before the publication of the poll notice and which cannot be cancelled or postponed, the Election Commission should be informed for instructions of the Commission to proceed ahead.

In the event of conducting such function spending government funds and if a promotion of or prejudice to any party/group or candidate has taken place at such function, the officials who organized such function should be held responsible for same. The officers who organize functions/events should bring to the notice of the Returning Officers of respective districts of such events scheduled to be held during the period of election well in advance enabling them to make arrangements to observe such events and keep records. It is strictly prohibited to make any statement or to do any act, display or distribute flags/ banners/posters/leaflets/notices promoting parties/groups or candidates at any function conducted spending State funds during the period of election and the officers or authorities of State institutions who organize or fund such functions should prevent such promotions taking place.

(ii) *Mobile Services and Trade Fairs.*

Since there is a tendency to use the mobile services and trade fairs conducted during the election period utilizing public funds and State property to facilitate the public for the promotion of or causing prejudice to parties/groups or candidates, organizing or conducting of such trade exhibitions or carnivals should be avoided during the period of the election. It should be brought to the notice of the Election Commission of any such trade exhibitions or carnivals which have been scheduled prior to the publication of the Notice of Poll to be held during the period of election and impossible to be cancelled or postponed, for instructions of the Commission. In the event of conducting such trade exhibitions or carnivals using government funds and promotion of or prejudice caused to any party/group or candidate is taken place at such trade exhibitions or carnivals, the officials who organized such events should be held responsible for same. The officers who organize mobile services and trade exhibitions should also take action to bring to the notice of the Returning Officers of respective districts of such events to be held during the period of election well in advance enabling them to make arrangements to observe those and keep records.

It is strictly prohibited to make any statement or do any act, display or distribute flags/ banners / posters /leaflets /notices promoting parties /groups or candidates at mobile services and trade exhibitions conducted spending State funds during the period of election and the official or State institutions that organize or fund such events should prevent such promotions or causing prejudice to any candidate or party or group.

04. Implementation of programmes to provide common amenities and aids and Special Projects

- (i) Long term or medium term special programmes may be implemented for the provision of facilities to the public or for the development of the country or continuous programmes to provide the citizens with common amenities and cannot be suspended due to the election. Action should be taken to ensure that no promotion of or causing of prejudice to any party/group or candidate is taking place through such special projects or continuous programmes after the issue of the Notice of Poll.
- (ii) The Election Commission will monitor whether any promotion of parties/groups or candidates is taking place through the aforesaid special projects or continuous programmes conducted during the period of election.
- (iii) During the period of election the launch of programmes to distribute State lands to conduct land kachcheris to award title deeds for State lands, deeds to transfer ownership of houses and reliefs to residents in election areas, providing subsidies, fertilizer, agro equipment for the plantation industry, and providing sports goods, kitchen and household items, equipment for self employment, bicycles, solar power lamps, building material for house constructions, release of housing loans/ compensations etc. should be suspended. However, if it is apparent that suspension of the programmes will impede the meeting of needs of the general public, the Election Commission should be consulted for necessary instructions. In the event the programmes already initiated or for which approval has already been obtained should be proceeded with, it should be the responsibility of the officers who are charged with such programmes to implement them with the participation of only the relevant officials without leaving any room for the promotion of parties/groups or candidates.

05. Vehicles

- (i) All officers in whose custody the pool of vehicles belonging to the State including motor cars, jeeps, cabs and buses, should take extra care in maintaining vehicle pools and assigning such vehicles during the period of election so as to prevent such vehicles being used for the promotion of election propaganda campaigns of any political party, independent group or candidate. It should be noted that assigned vehicles belonging to the State and vehicles rented to be used for specific duties are included in the said category. During the period of election running charts should be properly maintained particularly in respect of pool vehicles and vehicles other than assigned vehicles and the running charts should be scrutinized by a staff officer on a daily basis to make sure that such vehicles are not used for any political propaganda purpose. Action should be taken to ensure that State vehicles are not used for the promotion of or causing prejudice to any political party on the pretext that they are used for official purposes with fake entries to that effect in the running charts.
- (ii) No vehicle other than those two vehicles assigned for the purpose of providing security to H.E. the President can be operated without the exclusive registration number issued by the Department of Motor Traffic and as such no Minister, Deputy Minister, member of their staff or other person can use State vehicles or vehicles belonging to public institutions without the relevant registration number. Therefore, Secretaries of Ministries / Heads of Departments and officers in whose custody the pool of vehicles belonging to should ensure that no vehicle belonging to State Department or State institution is operated with garage numbers (fake numbers).
- (iii) All Secretaries of Ministries / Heads of Departments should ensure that public funds are not utilized for the use of airplanes or helicopters or other vehicles for political propaganda activities.

06. State offices, buildings, schools, other buildings belonging to the State and Circuit bungalows

- (i) Government offices, buildings, schools, other buildings and circuit bungalows belonging to the State too are a State property. Therefore, such buildings should not be used to conduct political meetings, discussions, etc. It should not be construed that these directions prevent the buildings and halls which can usually be reserved on payment of specified fees by any political party/ group, candidate, from being so reserved during the period of election on payment of relevant fees without causing any discrimination towards any Party/ Group / Candidate. It is strictly prohibited to provide State owned circuit bungalows, rest houses, holiday resorts free of charge to persons engaged in election propaganda activities. It is strictly prohibited to reserve any State owned circuit bungalows, rest houses, holiday resorts free of charge to persons engaged in political propaganda activities. Circuit bungalows, rest houses, and holiday resorts belonging to the State or State institutions and situated in respective areas to any politician, officer or any other persons should not be reserved on a full time basis during the period of election. Also, no person who avails accommodation at the said circuit bungalows should be allowed to engage in promoting any party, group or candidate. Any election propaganda posters, banners, cutouts, bill boards etc. to not to allowed to be displayed on State owned buildings or within their premises.
- (ii) When play grounds or bare lands and halls or such other buildings belonging to the State, Provincial Councils and Local Authorities are reserved for the purpose of holding election propaganda rallies to promote a Political Party/ Independent group or candidate, such reservation should be done in a transparent manner that no special favor, priority or discrimination is meted out to any party, independent group or candidate. Also such venues should not be reserved for the use of any party / group / candidate or for any other purpose for a prolonged period of time so that such venues are not available for the use by other parties.

07. General

- (i) State property, State institutions, vehicles, equipment, buildings, lands and public officers in particular, should not be allowed to be used for the promotion of parties, groups or candidates in relation to the election. No officer should allow any misdeeds such as attaching public officers of State institutions and vehicles belonging to the State or State institutions or rented vehicles stationed outside the electoral area to offices or institutions situated within the electoral area on the pretext that such attachments are done to carry out urgent duties or special development project work in electoral areas but used to promote (or to prejudice) parties, groups or candidates to take place. Officers, Vehicles, equipments, belonging to Media Units of any State institution including Provincial Councils, Local Authorities, State Corporations, Boards, State Banks, other Statutory institutions, and State Universities should not be used for the promotion of any party, group or candidate. If entertainment equipments such as podiums, stages, decorations and vehicles, airplanes and helicopters belonging to State institutions are usually hired under normal circumstances, such hiring during the period of election should be done in a transparent manner offering equal opportunities for all parties / groups to hire such equipments.
- (ii) Promotion of or causing prejudice to any party / group or candidate should not be done by way of broadcasting / telecasting / publishing through television, radio and press advertisement or by displaying billboards at public places spending public funds to give publicity to development programmes of the government or to anniversaries / commemorations.
- (iii) All private cable television channels, private electronic and print media institutions, websites, mobile and fixed telephone service providers should, act in such manner during the period of the election so as to not cause any breach of election laws and in compliance with the media guidelines, directions and instruction circulars issued by the Election Commission and it should be the responsibility of the regulatory bodies of such institutions to ensure the strict compliance thereto by the institutions aforesaid.

- (iv) It shall be the responsibility of the Heads of State institutions and Provincial or Regional Heads of the Local Bodies under whose custody or control such street lamp posts and telephone poles, public roads and pavements etc. fall, to prevent such properties situated within their area of authority being used for display of banners, posters, flags, billboards and other decorations and for advertising by way of painting or otherwise with the intention of promotion or prejudice of parties / groups / candidates.
- (v) The Heads of Ministries, Departments or State Institutions should take action to remove photographs, advertising boards, flags, billboards and decorations which have been erected before the commencement of the election period and are being displayed at public places for the promotion or demotion of parties/ groups / candidates. The Heads of Local Bodies and the Commissioners and Secretaries of such Bodies should take action to remove advertising boards, flags, billboards and decorations erected at public places within their area of authority.
- (vi) The directions preventing the use of State properties for the promotion or in prejudice of election of any candidate at this election should be strictly adhered to without any favour. The Secretaries to Ministries should pursue action to give instructions in this regard to the Heads of Departments, State Corporations and other institutions coming under the purview of the respective Ministry. Also, the Secretaries of Ministries and Heads of institutions should ensure that all officers of their respective institutions comply with these directions and instructions.
- (vii) Public officers should essentially draw their attention to Article 104b (02) of the Constitution which reads as "It shall be the duty of the Commission to secure the enforcement of all laws relating to the holding of the election and it shall be the duty of all authorities of the State charged with the enforcement of such laws, to cooperate with the Commission to secure such enforcement".
- (viii) Please note that the responsibility of bringing the contents of these directions to the notice of respective Ministers, Non Cabinet Ministers, State Ministers, Deputy Ministers and the staff of the Ministers lies with the Secretary to the respective Ministry while the responsibility of bringing such matters to the notice of Governors, Chief Ministers and other Ministers of the Provinces lies with the Chief Secretary and the Secretaries of the respective Provincial Ministries.
- (ix) The Secretaries to Commissions should pursue action to bring these directions to the notice of the Chairpersons and Members of such Commissions, as applicable.
- (x) In addition to the provisions of the Constitution, it is the duty of the Chief Accounting Officer or Accounting Officer of Ministries / Departments / institutions to prevent or to take action to prevent the misuse of State properties.
- (xi) Non-compliance with these directions is a punishable offence under Article 104(GG) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka.

The term "State" wherever it appears in these directions means all State institutions including State Ministries, Departments, Provincial Councils, Local Authorities, State Corporations, Statutory Boards, Commissions, State banks, State universities, Nationalized Companies and institutions of which more than 50% of shares is held by the State or State owned companies.

The term "public officers and employees" wherever it appears in these directions means all persons who engage and are employed in the institutions aforesaid and receive a salary or allowance.

The *Gazette Extraordinary* No. 2048/12 dated 12.04.2017 issued in this regard is hereby rescinded.

ORDERS ISSUED BY THE ELECTION COMMISSION IN ADDITION TO THOSE PREVIOUSLY ISSUED BY THE ELECTION COMMISSION BY GAZETTE EXTRAORDINARY No. 2141/52 DATED 19TH SEPTEMBER 2019

WHEN the Election Commission decides that it is necessary to inquire further into the information or complaints received by it regarding the violation of an order or orders issued by the Election Commission to prevent the misuse of government property in connection with the election and orders to submit relevant print or electronic documents, discussion notes, reports including those relating to the recruitment or appointment, to the Election Commission or of an officer authorized by the Election Commission, public officers in charge of such documents should take action to provide all relevant information. In such instances when the Election Commission or an officer authorized by the Election Commission orders to submit any oral or written statement for further inquiries into an incident where any order or orders issued by the Election Commission have been violated, relevant public officers should be responsible for providing all-inclusive statements. They are bound to do so.

When a public official is summoned by the Election Commission to inquire into election malpractices related to violation of provisions regarding the misuse of government property in relation to elections, the public officer who is summoned should act in such a manner as to come, explain all necessary matters and submit the necessary documents. That officer is bound to do so.

In all the places where the government is referred to in these orders, it refers to all government institutions including ministries, departments, provincial councils, local authorities, state corporations, statutory boards, commissions, state banks, state universities, state-owned companies and institutions more than 50% of whose shares, are owned by government or state-owned corporations.



“Public Officers and Employees” in all places means all persons engaged or employed at the said institutions and are receiving a remuneration or allowance.

Interpretation of “Information” in the Right to Information Act No. 12 of 2016 applies to the “Information” referred to in these orders.

The *Gazette Extraordinary* No. 2048/2 dated 04.12.2017 issued in this regard is hereby rescinded.

CODE OF CONDUCT FOR CONTESTING POLITICAL PARTIES/INDEPENDENT GROUPS AND CANDIDATES OF THE ELECTIONS

THIS Code of Conduct is issued in terms of Section 8(8) of the Parliamentary Elections Act, No. 1 of 1981 as amended by the Parliamentary Elections (Amendment) Act, No. 58 of 2009. The Code is applicable to the period commencing from the date of notice of nomination and to the date of declaration of the result of any election.

Before the enactment of laws for the recognition of Political Parties, there were political parties in Sri Lanka society which date back to 1931. Laws regarding the recognition of political parties have been amended at several times since 1959. Rules and regulations can do little in making the role of political parties more meaningful towards the advancement of the contemporary society, but the political parties have a greater responsibility in creating a conducive environment to conduct free and fair elections.

Having considered this responsibility, the Code of Conduct for political parties and candidates was issued by the then Department of Elections for the first time with the Provincial Councils Elections held in 2012. The secretaries of political parties, party representatives and representatives of observer organizations have agreed with this Code at the Committee for Investigation of Election Complaints at all elections held since 2012.

It should be noted that this revised Code issued by the Election Commission is applicable to those who hold leading position such as leaders and secretaries, candidates, activists and supporters of all political parties contesting at elections, representatives of the Provincial Council and Local Authorities, all activists of the political parties, supporters of the candidates, independent group leaders and their candidates.

Therefore, all those who are engaged in the elections are hereby informed to adhere to this code of conduct.



A. Rule of Law

01. Uphold the citizens' rights and freedoms guaranteed by the Constitution and other laws of Sri Lanka, assist and encourage the voter to exercise the franchise to elect people's representatives at elections and vote at referenda freely and without any obstruction.
02. Safeguard the equal rights that the candidates of all political parties and independent groups are entitled to at all times in the election process.
03. Respect the rights of all political parties and candidates and their right to educate the voter, while safeguarding the right of those with opposing views to hold their views and their right to carry out lawful promotional activities.
04. Refrain from obstructing or interfering in any manner with government, semi-government, private or other institutions established under law from carrying out their legitimate activities and responsibilities.
05. Refrain from obstructing or influencing institutions and personnel vested with the responsibility of maintaining law and order in the country, from carrying out their legitimate duties.
06. Ensure that propaganda activities are carried out without violating existing laws and without interfering with the life of the ordinary citizen.
07. Educate all the candidates and activists on the laws (particularly the sections of the Acts) relating to elections and advise them to refrain from committing offences, corrupt practices and illegal activities.
08. Refrain from touching or removing of material, equipment and documents assigned to be used during the conduct of the poll or the counting of votes, without obtaining approval from the relevant authority.

B. General Conduct

01. Refrain from any activity, expression or behavior which could create or aggravate differences, hatred and tension between Sri Lankans of different religions, languages, races, customs and castes.
02. Limit criticisms of other political parties or independent groups to their policies, programmes and their past activities and refrain from criticizing the private life of candidates or making statements or allegations that are not prove and unsubstantiated against candidates of the same party or other parties.
03. Select candidates who can devote themselves to the future well-being of the citizens of Sri Lanka by fulfilling the objectives of the constitutional bodies to which they are to be elected, and who conduct their campaigns in a disciplined and decent manner.
04. Select candidates based on their past conduct and good behavior, respect for the law, non conviction before courts, dedication to serve the society etc, avoid persons who use their wealth or social status to the detriment of society.
05. Submit the declaration of assets and liabilities of candidates at the time of handing over nominations or before the expiry of 30 days after nomination period.
06. Educate candidates/agents not to smoke or consume liquor or intoxicants inside polling stations or enter polling stations counting centres and result declaration centre after consuming liquor.
07. Adhere to the instruction that only those who are permitted shall enter the nomination centers or polling stations or counting centers or results declaration centers as well as their premises and act in accordance with the directive not to take weapons to such places.

08. Candidates to abstain from engaging in prohibited election related activities and prevent his/her supporters from engaging in such activities.

C. Election Propaganda Activities

01. Hold campaign meetings without causing any disruption to law and order and to the lawful campaign activities of rival candidates, and maintain election offices in accordance with election laws.
02. Follow election laws in printing election material and distributing handbills, among voters,

In Particular :-

- I. Refrain from distributing anonymous handbills without indicating the name of the printer/publisher and from printing illegal notices, etc.
 - II. Refrain from using large crowds in the form of rallies or processions, music or displaying posters when engaged in door to door canvassing or distribution of hand bills and prevent candidates or the close relations of candidates from engaging in door-to-door canvassing, if it is prohibited by the law.
03. Refrain from displaying any election campaign notices, posters, photographs or paintings with the objective of promoting the election of a party or an independent group or a candidate, or preventing the election of a rival party, independent group or candidate in a state owned or private building, residential premises or a vacant land belonging to the government or a private person or in a public place or road to which the public have access, such display being permitted to be exhibited only at notified offices and within the premises in which a meeting is conducted on the day of such meeting.
 04. Refrain from using lands, buildings or any property owned by the State or Semi-State institutions for election promotion, except assembly halls or play grounds that are hired under normal conditions.
 05. Refrain from using places of religious worship or land or premises belonging to any religious organization for election promotion.
 06. Display posters or flags related to the election or the name and number of the candidate only on the vehicle in which the candidate travels and refrain from using unregistered vehicles or vehicles with garage/fake numbers for election promotion.
 07. Restrict any decorations or exhibition of election promotion materials to the venue of an election campaign meeting, ensure that such decorations do not harm the environment and remove all such decorations without delay after the meeting.
 08. Refrain from holding processions, public rallies, motorcades and bicycle rallies as promotional activities during the election period as they are violations of election laws.
 09. Use loudspeakers only at the places permitted, restrict the use of loudspeakers to the time allowed for the meeting and refrain from using loudspeakers in moving vehicles.
 10. Stop all propaganda activities, 48 hours before the day of poll and refrain from holding musical shows, advertisements in print/electronic media, during such silent period to promote party or candidates.
 11. Refrain from using vehicles, or other State property or any powers and privileges available to a Member of Parliament, Provincial Councils or Local Authorities to promote the election of a party, independent group or a candidate.

12. Refrain from using any security personnel, weapons and other security equipment legally provided to a people's representative for his or her protection, for any illegal purpose.
13. Use the services of Sri Lanka Rupavahini Corporation and the Sri Lanka Broadcasting Corporation provided, under election law, to a party or an independent group for election propaganda, according to the guidelines and conditions imposed by the Election Commission and the Heads of the respective corporations. (This is not applicable for Provincial Council and Local Authorities elections.)
14. Use the free postal facility provided under the election law to send a publication, by political parties and independent groups, to every household according to the provisions of the relevant Act and according to the instructions issued by the Post Master General. (This is not applicable to Provincial Council and Local Authorities elections).
15. Refrain from election promotion activities that disturb the conduct of public examinations including the General Certificate of Education (Ordinary and Advanced Level) and Grade 5 Scholarship Examination at the examination centers and at their evaluation centers at schools.
16. Refrain from using previous statements/views of a candidate about another party or of a candidate to promote or demote a party or a candidate, if such person objects.

D. Poll Day

01. Refrain from engaging in any prohibited activity, especially, canvassing for votes etc., mentioned in the election law, within a radius of 500 meters of a polling station on the poll day.
02. Refrain from obstructing voters who come to the polling station and voters casting their vote at the polling station, from influencing the voter and from preventing the voters casting their vote freely and in secret.
03. Refrain from intimidating or causing bodily harm to voters, polling agents, candidates and election observers and their families or causing damage to their houses or properties, from interrupting voters on their arrival at or departure from the polling station, and from chasing away polling agents from the polling station.
04. Ensure that only those permitted (Secretary of contesting political party, candidates and their polling agents) enter the polling station after they prove their identity, while refraining from bringing security personnel or journalists, or photographers into the polling station.
05. Refrain from committing or promoting of any corrupt practice or offences (such as bribery, intimidation stuffing of ballot boxes at the polling station, breaking into polling stations, impersonation or other corrupt practices or offences.)
06. Refrain from illegal transport of voters to polling stations.
07. Ensure that polling agents co-operate with the poll staff at the polling station and that the agents do not create any disturbance at the polling station.
08. Refrain from interfering with election observers approved by the Election Commission in engaging in observations and support their activities.
09. Refrain from prohibited actions such as videoing, using mobile phones, *etc.*, in the premises of the polling stations.

Please note that above codes are applicable for the day of postal voting as well.

E. Count of Votes and Preference (including Postal Votes), and Declaration of Results

01. Make the counting agents aware of the procedure regarding the counting of votes and preferences (including the counting of postal votes) and the procedure for making complaints.
02. Ensure that the Agents at the Centre for Counting Votes and at the Centre for Declaration of Results observe and follow the administrative arrangements at the centre provided by the Election Commission and the Returning Officer.
03. Ensure that Government Ministers, Ministers of Provincial Councils, Members of Provincial Councils and Local Authorities and other politicians are prevented from entering Counting Centers/halls unless they are duly appointed as Counting Agents or are candidates.
04. Prevent politicians appointed as counting agents or declaration centre agents from being accompanied by security personnel of any politician, with or without weapons, into the counting halls of the Centre for Results Declaration and refrain from bringing unauthorized persons to the premises of the counting halls/centre for Results Declaration.

F. Hate Speech or Speech prejudicial to national harmony

01. Abstain from hate speech of any form ; that is speech that threatens, or insults communities or social groups, especially women, persons with special needs or disabled, those of different sexual orientation and other religious or ethnic groups.
02. Ensure that all those engaged in political activities refrain from hate speech at all times, especially during the period commencing from the first day of the nomination period at any election and ending on the day following the date of the poll at such election.
03. Hate speech is indentified as an offence and therefore those who make hate speech should be reported.
04. Abstain from making statements or displaying an image that disturbs the harmony and mutual trust among the ethnic and religious groups.
05. Abstain from making any statement that may harm or prejudice the dignity of ethnic or religious groups and individuals and abstain from using such statements as propaganda.
06. Abstain from making statements or from any action that could be deemed to be prejudicial to or discriminative of any person or group based on religious, ethnic, linguistic, caste, or gender differences.
07. Abstain from making statements or engaging in any action that is contemptuous or abusive of women based on their physical appearance. Though women are specifically referred to here those who are engaged in politics should refrain from such statements or action since they are relevant to every citizen.
08. Abstain from making statements or engaging in any action that is contemptuous or abusive of any deformity or disability of any person.

G. Other important Matters

01. Present to the voters as a candidate of a recognized political party the Statement of Policies (Manifesto) of the party and the manner in which it would be implemented within a specified period and submit copies of same to the Election Commission and through the Commission to the Department of Archives.

02. Abstain from using state property, state officials, official vehicles or offices for election promotion and refrain from promotion activities like canvassing, distribution of handbills, exhibition of display boards or notices in government offices, schools *etc.* or within the premises of such institution.
03. Abstain from engaging in election promotion making use of a person's office.
04. Refrain from using government owned aircraft or any other vehicles without payment.
05. Ensure that public buildings, play grounds, and government circuit bungalows are used after payment of fees and charges and allow others to use them in as fair manner.
06. Refrain from publishing political newsletters, articles or advertising supplements *etc.*, at the expense of the government or government institutions.
07. Refrain from inviting voters or state officers individually or in groups to private or official residences and from entertaining them during the period of the election.
08. Refrain from making premises of financial assistance, laying foundation stones for projects or proposed projects, promising to provide roads, water and electricity services, and making *ad-hoc* appointments to posts outside the approved scheme of recruitments with the aim of attracting votes.
09. Refrain from obstructing investigations carried out by law enforcement authorities, in regard to violation of election laws, obstructions to inquiries, into corrupt practices and election offences.
10. Refrain from making use of the print or electronic media during the period of the election to make false and unsubstantiated allegations about rival parties and their activities and denying the aggrieved parties of the right to reply.
11. Respond to criticism or allegations made about parties and politicians without using propaganda in any form (without using untrustworthy promotional information) by non-aggressive and lawful means and abstain from using force in retaliation.
12. Refrain from utilizing security personnel provided for personal security unofficially for political propaganda work and engaging them to harm rivals, condemn such abusive activities openly.
13. Openly condemn any political party or political organization illegally using armed personnel and inform such instances to relevant authorities.
14. Abstain from participating as a candidate or a leading activist of a political party at state ceremonies held during the period of election and refrain from using such ceremonies for election promotion of a party or a candidate.
15. Refrain from involving directly or indirectly in political motivated recruitments, appointments, promotions and transfers.
16. Ensure that the political parties and candidates do not gain any political advantage from processions, carnivals or exhibitions or sports competitions *etc.* organized by the government or organized with government's patronage.
17. Abstain from using educational seminars conducted for public examinations and scholarship examination to promote parties/ candidates.

Other Matters

1. Abstain from using or otherwise abusing the National Anthem, National Flag, religious symbols, religious flags, paintings or photographs of founders of religions or religious leaders through publication or broadcast to promote or demote the candidature of a candidate or parties/groups.
2. Abstain from exhibiting them at promotional rallies, meetings of parties/groups or candidates or on the notices and display boards. Refrain from using photographs or paintings of public officers, in any manner, to promote parties/candidates.
3. Abstain from using government owned places which are ordinarily given for the promotion activities of political parties/independent groups exclusively for the propaganda activities of one single party or a candidate and give equal opportunity to other parties/groups/candidates to reserve and use such places.
4. To minimize the problems arising with regard to the reservation of playgrounds or halls owned by Local Authorities, all politicians shall follow the instructions of the District Committee headed by the Returning Officer.
5. Abstain from uttering at any religious assembly any words for the purpose of influencing the result of an election or inducing any elector to vote or refrain from voting for a candidate of any recognized political party or independent group at such election.
6. Abstain from distributing and displaying at any religious assembly, any handbill, placard, poster, drawing, notice, photograph of a candidate, symbol, sign, flag or banner ; holding or causing to be held any public meeting at a place of worship for the purpose of promoting the election, or the election campaign of a candidate of any recognized political party or independent group at such election.

It is expected that candidates contesting at the any Elections and Secretaries of respective political parties, agents and supporters or candidates, as applicable, act in accordance with the aforesaid code. It is also expected that the candidates and, as relevant, Secretaries of Political Parties will made suitable arrangements to ensure that their agents, party members, followers and supporters earnestly observe this Code of Conduct.
