## THE EMBLEM OF THE UNIVERSITY



The emblem of the University takes the form of a circle with three concentric circles placed close together on the periphery, all on a background of yellow. In the center of this circle is a smaller concentric circle enclosing a full bloom lotus, *Nelumbo nucifera*, in abstract form, and consisting of two tiers of petals one underneath the other. In the center of the circle, stylized stamens enclosed in two concentric circles surround the receptacle. Between the outer set of concentric circles and the central lotus is a wide circular band carrying the motto of the University on the upper half of the band, while the name of the University appears in the lower half, both written in Sinhala characters. The Motto, taken from an ancient Buddhist text, reads;

***‘Vijja Uppatadam Settha’***

*(‘among all that rise knowledge is greatest’)*

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## THE UNIVERSITY

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The University of Sri Jayewardenepura situated in the heart of Colombo boasts of a long and glorious history. Having been established in the 1959 at Gangodawila, its roots can be traced back to the Vidyodaya Pirivena established in 1873 by Most Venerable Hikkaduwe Sri Sumangala Thero at Maligakanda. Today the University pays homage to 62 years of history while paying tribute to journey of 148 years.

The University of Sri Jayewardenepura, formerly known as Vidyodaya Pirivena was the essence of the revival of Sri Lankan Education. It is the second oldest University in Sri Lanka and the first University established in Independent Ceylon.

Today the University stands strong with nine Faculties, Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences, Faculty of Applied Sciences, Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce, Faculty of Medical Sciences, Faculty of Graduate Studies, Faculty of Technology, Faculty of Engineering, Faculty of Allied Health Sciences and its latest addition Faculty of Dental Sciences. The University is home to over 14,500 Undergraduates and over 2500 postgraduate students. It is considered the largest University in terms of student population in Sri Lanka.

The University is also in the forefront of research and innovation with a research council of over 22 research centres and an Invention, Innovation and Venture Creation Council with over 50 Entrepreneurs and stakeholders with over 15 patents.

The University has also maintained cordial relationship with many international bodies of education and have signed over 60 Memoranda of Understanding (MoUs) with recognized internationally acclaimed universities; and over 60 MoUs with established international and local companies. The university strives to give its students an international experience, offering student exchange programmes and internships.

Throughout the years the University of Sri Jayewardenepura has managed to develop in many areas by expanding its horizons. It will continue this journey of reaching many milestones which will ensure that the University will produce smart, efficient, skillful and professional individuals that will aid in the development of our mother nation.

## VICE-CHANCELLOR'S OVERVIEW OF THE PROGRESS IN 2021

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The year 2021 was indeed a fulfilling year for the University of Sri Jayewardenepura despite the challenges posed by the Covid-19 pandemic. As the country was battling through the 2<sup>nd</sup> wave of the Covid-19 pandemic in January 2021, the University commenced its activities for the New Year on 4<sup>th</sup> January with the annual New Year blessing ceremony held at the University premises. Throughout the year, the University managed to shine in the local as well as the international arena in many aspects such as academic and research and also in terms of expansion of the University.

As at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021, the composition of the University includes nine Faculties of Study namely; Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences (FHSS) (established in 1959), Faculty of Applied Sciences (FAS) (established first as Faculty of Science in 1961), Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce (FMSC) (established in 1972), Faculty of Medical Sciences (FMS) (established in 1993), the Faculty of Graduate Studies (FGS) (established in 1996), Faculty of Technology (FoT) (established in 2016), Faculty of Engineering (FoE) (established in 2016), Faculty of Allied Health Sciences (FAHS) (established in 2019), and Faculty of Dental Sciences (FDS). The newest addition is the Faculty of Dental Sciences which was established by order of Gazette Extraordinary No. 2257/28 dated 8<sup>th</sup> December 2021. This is a great achievement for the University as it is the 2<sup>nd</sup> Dental Sciences Faculty in the country. The establishment of the Faculty of Urban and Aquatic Bioresources (FUAB) as the 10<sup>th</sup> Faculty of the university is also currently underway and the first batch of students of this Faculty will enter the University in March 2022. The University has also taken measures to establish a Faculty of Computing and the first intake of students will be taken in 2023.

Apart from these Faculties, the University also has an affiliated institute named the Postgraduate Institute of Management (PIM) based in Colombo 8. Dr W G S Kelum from the Department of Accounting, FMSC was appointed as the new Director to PIM with effect from 8<sup>th</sup> May 2021.

The External Degrees and Extension Courses Unit (EDECUCU) of the University also achieved two important milestones in the year 2021. The first one being the appointment of the Director of the Unit. Ven. (Prof.) Pinnawala Sangasumana Thero of the Department of Geography of FHSS was appointed as the Director with effect from 3<sup>rd</sup> May 2021. EDECUCU was also moved to the Ellawala Building on Highlevel Road and it was ceremonially declared open for official use on 4<sup>th</sup> January 2021. This building which is rented from a private party fulfills the much needed infrastructure requirement of the EDECUCU.

The 110th Commemoration Ceremony of the Most Venerable Hikkaduwe Sri Sumangala Nayake Thero was held on 29<sup>th</sup> April 2021 at the University premises in order to honour the service rendered by him as the founder of the Vidyodaya Pirivena in the 1873. The Unveiling Ceremony of the statue of the Most Venerable Weliwitiye Sri Soratha Nayaka Thero (founder Vice-Chancellor of the Vidyodaya University) was also held on 25<sup>th</sup> February 2021 at the Faculty of Technology premises at Pitipana.

It is indeed a pleasure to note that during the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter of 2021, the University became the 4<sup>th</sup> best university in Sri Lanka in the Webometrics Ranking (July 2021). This achievement was facilitated by the unwavering commitment of the academic staff and the improved research capacity of the University. The University is also the frontrunner in terms of conducting research on whole genomic sequencing of the SARS-CoV-2 variants in Sri Lanka carried out by the Allergy, Immunology and Cell Biology Unit (AICBU) of the University.

I am happy to note that the University managed to curtail the spread of Covid-19 successfully by adhering to all health guidelines. The University reported only one Covid-19 related fatality throughout the pandemic period. With the accelerated vaccination of the Sri Lankan population against Covid-19, the University organised several vaccination programmes for its staff and students. The administering of the 1<sup>st</sup> dose for staff was held on 20<sup>th</sup> May 2021 followed by the 2<sup>nd</sup> dose administration on 22<sup>nd</sup> June 2021. Additionally, two other vaccination programmes were carried out from 11<sup>th</sup> – 15<sup>th</sup> October 2021 and 12<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup> November 2021 for staff and students.

The year 2021 was a rewarding year for the University in terms of sports as well. The students of the university managed to secure awards and accolades in both national and international arenas in Weightlifting, Athletics, Football, Gymnastics, Karate and Taekwondo.

Furthermore, understanding the importance of protecting the environment, the University embarked on the journey to become the first Carbon Neutral University in South Asia by implementing the Carbon Zero project during the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter of the year. The Centre for Sustainability in the Department of Forestry and Environmental Sciences of FAS have taken the initiative of voluntarily disclosing the greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions of the University starting from 2019 following the ISO standard 14064-1:2019 and had faced a third-party ISO 14064-1 audit on its GHG emissions on 22<sup>nd</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup> of November 2021. The University also initiated a landscaping and beautification project in collaboration with the Road Development Authority to truly bring out the splendour and magnificence of the main University premises.

The most anticipated event of the University, which is the 46<sup>th</sup> Convocation Ceremony was held from 28<sup>th</sup> – 30<sup>th</sup> December 2021 at the Bandaranaike Memorial International Conference Hall (BMICH). Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the 46<sup>th</sup> Convocation, which was originally planned

to be held in 2020 was rescheduled. Following all health guidelines, 3197 undergraduate, postgraduate students and doctoral candidates graduated from this ceremony.

In the year under review, the total undergraduate student number had increased to 14,762 which is an improvement from the 13,758 students entered to the University in 2020. This indicates the University's commitment for expansion of provision of tertiary education to the youth of Sri Lanka. Additionally, there were 2867 postgraduate students enrolled at the University in the year 2021.

Furthermore, the University also witnessed an increase in the number of academic staff members by another 41 in 2021, bringing the total to 1102, from 1061 recorded in 2020. It should also be noted that the University was fortunate to have the services of more than 380 PhD holders in the academic sector of the University. The year 2021 also recorded 1159 non-academic staff members employed at the University. The increased staff numbers greatly contributed to carrying out the activities of the University seamlessly with the increased student numbers.

As the country was steadily recovering from the financial crisis instigated by the Covid-19 pandemic, the University also recorded an increased internal revenue of LKR 649,582,744 as at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021, which is a notable increase from LKR 609,926,178 recorded in 2020.

The University and its community navigated through the year 2021 with much courage and determination despite the challenges posed by the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> waves of the Covid-19 pandemic. The University was able to carry out its activities under new normal condition by swiftly adapting to the circumstances and will continue to prosper while facing all challenges in the future.

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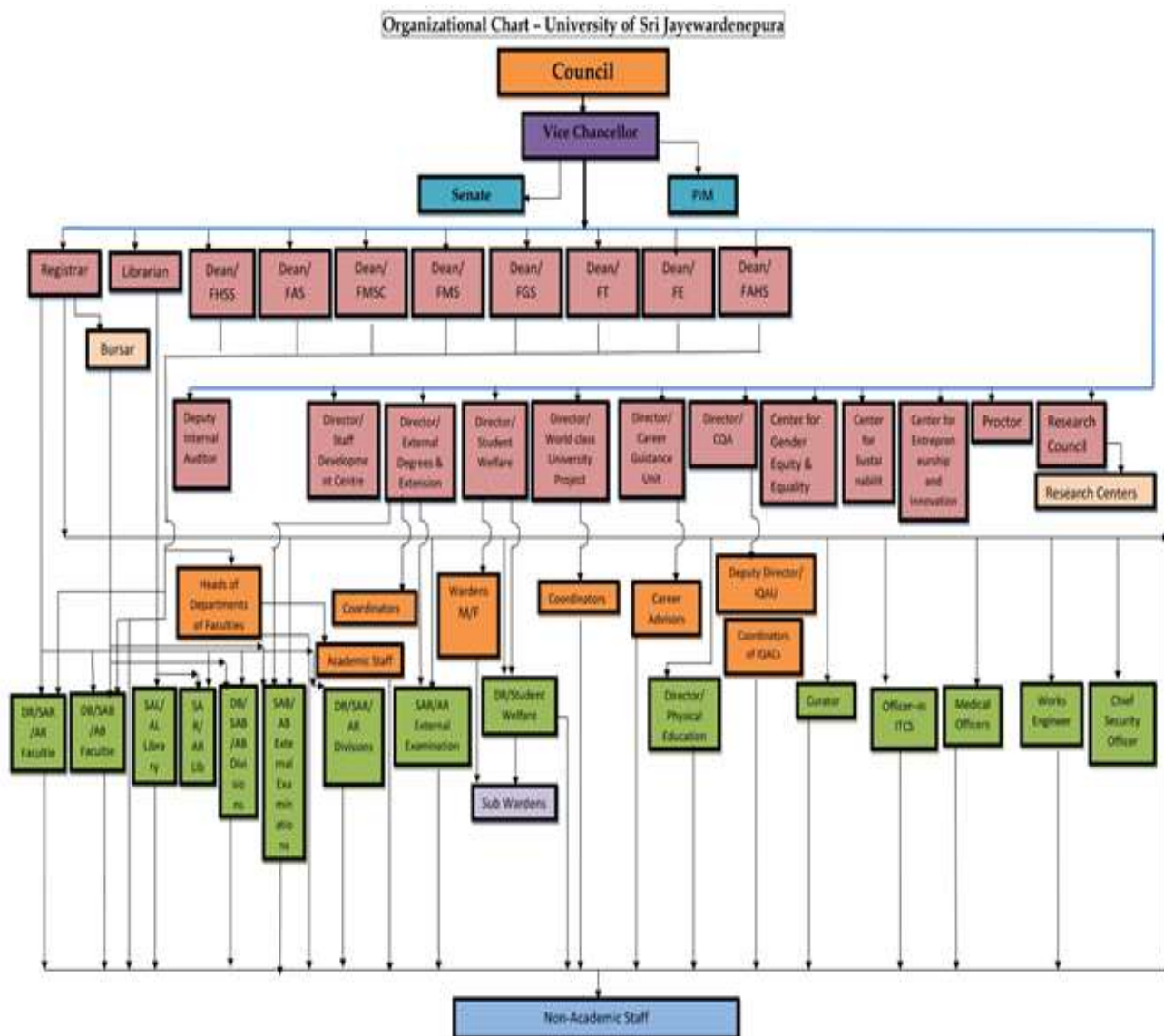

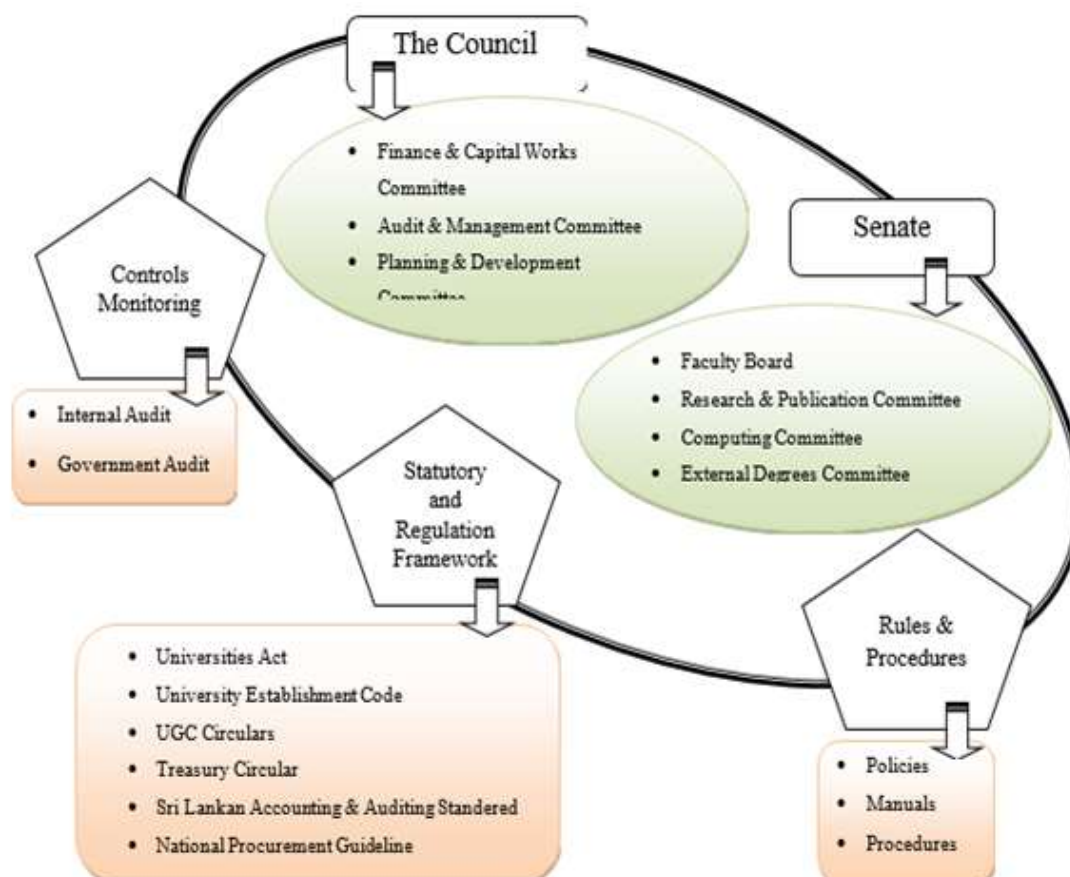

# **CORPORATE GOVERNANCE OF THE UNIVERSITY OF SRI JAYAWARDENEPURA**

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University is committed to having good governance practices in place and applying highest standards of all functions performed during the year of 2018. This enhance the compliance with relevant statutory provisions, improve transparency of transactions, accountability and responsibility for the government funds.

## **1) Compliance with the universities act. No 16 1978**

- Composition of the Council, Senate and the faculty boards has been decided by the act accordingly all appointments to the governing bodies to the university have been made according to the provisions specified in the universities act.
- The council of the university act as the executive and the governing authority of the university. General Administrative, academic and financial policy decisions are taken with recommendation of the Senate, finance committee and other sub committees of the university.
- Senate is appointed and act as the academic authority of the university .Senate shell have the control and general direction of the instructions, education, research and examinations in the university.
- Quorum of the council and senate, minimum no of meetings to be held, duration of the, council, scope of power and functions of the boards, also specified in the act. University has complied in specified requirements.
- General administrations, academic administrations and finance administrations are performed according to the provisions of the act
- Student's intakes for all undergraduate programs were allocated through the university grants commission and curriculums of all degree programs were approved by the university grants commission.
- Budget allocations where given by the university Grants Commission and expenses have been incurred as budget line specified in the annual budget.

## **2) Compliance with Government financial regulations and government procedures.**

As a government institution mainly funded by the treasury of Sri Lanka, All financial transactions of the university are conducted and reported in compliance with the financial regulations, treasury circulars and guild line and circulars issued by the university grants commission.

3) Compliance with Government Procurement Guidelines.

All goods and services, works, constructions and consultancies have been acquired during the year of 2018 in accordance with the procurement guideline of Sri Lanka. Procurement committees are appointed by the ministry secretary with the recommendation of the vice chancellor. Technical evaluation committees are appointed with the recommendation of the procurement committees. Preparation of bidding documents, bid opening, bid documentation, bid evaluation, composition of the procurement committees and the technical evaluation committees, payments to the committees are made as per the provisions of the procurement guidelines.

04) Compliance with establishment code and Scheme of recruitments.

All staff matters including salaries, appointments, promotions, increments, leaves, disciplinary actions have been governed by the provisions in the university establishment code and scheme of recruitments. If any matter is not covered by the university establishment code, it refers to the government establishment code in Sri Lanka. Amount of the salaries and allowances are decided by the circulars issued by the treasury and adopted by the university grants commission.

5) Sri Lanka Accounting Standards (SLPSAS), Lanka accounting Standards (LKAS) international financial reporting standards (IFRS)

Financial Statements of the university are prepared and presented in accordance with public sector accounting standards. Lanka Accounting standards and International financial reporting standards are applied for reporting the transaction where the public sector transactions are not been introduced.

06) Internal policies and procedures have been adopted with approval of the council for the matters which is not covered by other statutory provisions and within the scope specify by the statutory provisions. Eg. Segregation of duties, approval, authorization and certification limits etc.

# **RISK MANAGEMENT AND MITIGATION STRATEGIES OF UNIVERSITY OF SRI JAYEWARDENEPURA**

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Facts and events that affect the smooth operation and sustainability of the university are identified as risk factors of the university. University of Sri Jayewardenepura has been adopting their own cultures and adoptive cultures in the operations of the university. The survival and growth in higher education sector is challenging and planning for uncertainties are essential. The educational sector dynamics are observed vigilantly, evaluated and prudent measures are applied to face the challenges.

## **Approach to risk mitigation**

Risk management is done continuously in order to reduce the risk volatility and improve returns. Higher education sector is exposed to high risk both internally and externally. Being a government university, the University of Sri Jayewardenepura focus on providing sustainable value to our stakeholders by identifying the risk. Probable impact and taking practicable precautions and prompt actions to mitigate them.

Assessment of such risk and related responses are set out below.

### **a. Internal Risk**

#### **Operational Risk and Management**

Operational risk associated with the day to day operation of the university. This affects efficiency and effectiveness of the human resources integrity of the internal control system, process and external factors which affect the day to day operations. It also includes execution risk unfavorable regulatory changes, customer dependency, safety and health, fire and environment risk inherent with core operations of the university.

#### **Impact**

Failure to adopt this risk promptly and prudently will have negative impact on operation and going concern of the university.

#### **Response**

Composition of the council and their capacity is a significant fact in respect of the operational risk. The council of the university is composed well to be helpful to operate with least risk. As internal driven operational risk measure, accounting control are done in more efficient and transparent manner to evaluate and monitor the operation of the university. The university use communication channels to inform and empower department heads and line management to carry

out the operational activities under the budgetary provision while communicating performance and discrepancies with the higher management. Functional matters have been discussed in academic and administrative officers meeting and finance matters are discussed and recommended to the council. Such working culture helps to make the operation free from risk on monitoring or accounting controls.

Recruitment of the university is carried out in more efficient manner selecting the correct candidate with the right qualification and skills without any biases. Therefore the university benefited with stable and competent workforce. Staff training and development has been considered as important tool to enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of the human resource.

Risk of fire and potential damages are mitigated by taking protective measures such as identifying potential fire risks, installation of fire control equipment, employee training and systematic monitoring and control measures. In addition to that risk mitigation actions are supported by risk transfer mechanism such as insurance.

Since operational risk can never be entirely eliminated and the cost of elimination may outweigh the potential benefits, Preventive management approach is taken with continuous monitoring and upgrading.

### **Technological Risk and Management**

Success of institution depend on the existence of modern information technology and information generation through efficient management information system.

#### **Impact**

Any disruption of failures in the system infrastructures and application may have negative impact to the organization. Delays in processing transitions, lack of reliability of transitions. Frauds and errors may occur leading to future financial losses

#### **Response**

Centre for IT Services (CITS) has been established to manage the IT infrastructures. Internet and email facilities server administration maintain e service and applications while providing IT technical support and solution for the University students and staff, sufficient funds have been allocated for technological advancement especially for establishment of e learning facilities for the University students.

## **b. External Risk**

### **Product Risk Management**

University is engaged in providing undergraduate, post graduate education and research to the nation. Risk is associate with the employability and the recognitions for the degrees offered by

the University and international recognition for the University. Further MOUs have been signed for the international collaboration to enhance foreign exposures for graduates. Actions have been taken to obtain accreditation certain faculties.

### **Impact**

Failure to address this risk may affect sustainability of certain degree program due to un-employability of the degree holders.

### **Response**

Curriculum of degree programs update regularly to enhance the employability of the degree holders. Various programs have been introduced to improve research and soft skills of the students. Industry training is compulsory for certain degree program to shape the undergraduate for employments.

### **Financial Risk Management**

The University's activities are exposed to various finance risk such as Credit RISK, Liquidity risk and market risk. Risk management programs to be focus to minimize the potential adverse impact on the financial performance of the University.

### **Credit Risk**

Credit risk is the risk that at a future date the other party to financial transaction may cause financial loss to the entity by failure to discharge an obligation.

Key reasons where the University exposed to credit risk as a part of its operations.

- Sudden budget cuts due to country situation
- Delays in receiving funds from the treasury
- Receivables on post graduate fee levy course

### **Impact**

Credit risk mainly impact on the reliability about the entity for suppliers and constructors, delays in completion of works. Quality of the work may reduce, loss of good customers for future engagements and bad impact on continuation of the certain courses.

### **Response**

Risk associate with treasury fund can't be eliminated. However, through good working capital management, the risk can be reduced E.g. giving priorities for urgent payment, cost cutting on unnecessary things. Temporary utilization of earned funds of the university and postpone certain payments. In addition to that continues monitoring of receivables on fee levy courses also may reduce the credit risk.



## **Liquidity Risk**

Liquidity risk is the funding risk that an entity can encounter in meeting obligation associate with financial liabilities.

### **Impact**

Liquidity risk badly affects in financing day to day operations of the University.

### **Response**

Liquidity can manage through continuous reconciling and monitoring of cash flows from assets and liabilities and maintain mismatches in prudent level. Cash low forecast are prepared and review regularly to identify the liquidity requirements. Further current accounts balances are transferred to overnight bank deposits and earn inters income on temporary excess cash.

## **Market Risk**

The market risk is the risk that fair value of future cash flows of the financial instruments due to changes in the market price. Objective of market risk management is to manage and control the market risk expose within acceptable parameters while optimizing the return on risks. Market risk comprises two risks currency risk and interest rate risk.

### **Currency Risk**

Currency risk is the risk that the value of the financial instruments will fluctuate due to the changes in the foreign exchange rates. As protection against the currency risk the university backs its most commitments in local currency. The university has not invested or borrowed in foreign currencies. The currency risk attached to the financial instrument is minimal as it represents local currency.

### **Interest Rate Risk**

The interest rate risk is the risk to an entity's earnings and economic value of equity (EVE) arising from the adverse movement in interest rates. ## KEY INITIATIVES AND PROJECTS

### - COVID-19 PANDEMIC RESPONSE

The University of Sri Jayewardenepura responded at the very onset of the COVID-19 outbreak and initiated PCR testing by the Allergy Immunology and Cell Biology Unit from 28<sup>th</sup> February 2020, for the identification of SARS-CoV2 as it was of national importance to do so.

We were able to recognize the first local COVID 19 patient on the 10<sup>th</sup> of March 2020 through testing. We have continued this operation continuously during the year.

Our dedicated team of scientists have been working all seven days, late into the night, in order to provide such a service on a 24-hour basis, even though we are not obliged to provide diagnostic services to the MOH. The team was led by Prof Neelika Malavige and Prof Chandima Jeewandara

#### DIAGNOSTIC AND OTHER SERVICES RENDERED TO THE MINISTRY OF HEALTH

**1. PCR – Number of Tests done – 220,764**

We have updated the Ministry of Health and the data is already given with laboratory references. Total operation cost estimated for this operation as per the MOH standard rates was Rs 1,103,820,000.00

**2. SARS CoV2 Sequencing – Number of tests done – 3,032**

**3. Number of Sequence PCR tests done – 24,000 (selected 600 samples into 40 runs)**

**5. Number of Variant PCR tests done on request of Secretary/MOH – 15,000**

The consumables and reagents were purchased by the University of Sri Jayewardenepura for which the expenses were reimbursed by the Ministry of Health accordingly. The above mentioned diagnostics and services were carried out by the Allergy, Immunology, and Cell Biology Unit during the period of 28<sup>th</sup> February 2020 to 30<sup>th</sup> April 2022.

**This service was rendered on an entirely voluntary basis without any benefits to any member in the team.**

## WORKING HOURS AND CONTRIBUTION FROM THE STAFF

The lab was functional 24 hours continuously for PCR testing. The staff was contributing to this national need even during the long curfew period spending their personal money for transport and obtaining curfew passes with utmost difficulty. The work included complete lockdown days of the country when all other staff was adopting to work from home. All the services rendered on a voluntary basis. The laboratory was supervised by Prof Neelika Malavige and Prof Chandima Jeewandara from 8am-4pm normal working hours and alternating two shifts of 4pm to 12 mid-night (8 hours) / 12 mid-night to 8 am (8 hours) which was shared between them for the entire work duration.

## EVALUATION OF TEST KITS

USJ has helped the NMRA in evaluating PCR kits, RNA extraction kits as well as the rapid antibody test kits in response to COVID 19. This service rendered by Prof Chandima Jeewandara and Prof Neelika Malavige on **an honorary basis**.

## TRAINING OF MLTS

USJ laboratory is the most experienced laboratory in terms of PCR testing in Sri Lanka as we have been doing real time PCR since 2013. We have trained several MLTs from hospitals and

Universities and helped several virologists to establish laboratories in their respective institutions including IDH and Sri Jayewardenepura hospital. Apart from training our positive samples were shared with other labs including the IDH, TH Ragama, SJGH and private hospital laboratories to validate PCR testing in the country.

In early October 2021, AICBU and the Dept. of Immunology and Molecular Medicine was requested to provide training to the Medical Laboratory Science Graduate Interns who were attached to the Ministry of Health and posted at the government hospitals. Participants were split into groups and each group underwent 2 weeks of lectures, demonstrations and hands on laboratory training in PCR, swabbing, phlebotomy, sequencing and other molecular diagnostic techniques.

This service rendered by Prof Chandima Jeewandara and Prof Neelika Malavige on **an honorary basis** along with the laboratory research staff.

## SEQUENCING WORK

Since mid-March 2020, Allergy, Immunology, and Cell Biology Unit (AICBU) have conducted around 40 SARS-CoV-2 sequencing runs up to December 2021 generating and uploading more than 3000 genome sequences into the international databases. Even though the majority of the samples were sequenced using Oxford Nanopore (ONT) platform, 23.2% of the sequencing data were generated using Illumina. Delta lineage (AY.28 and AY.104) accounts for the highest cumulative number of genomes sequenced by us followed by Omicron (BA.2) and Alpha (Q.8). Sri Lanka experienced 4 major outbreaks since the identification of patient zero in March 2020. The first large outbreak, which occurred from October 2020 to January 2021 was driven by



B.1.411 which peaked at 800 cases/day until it was completely replaced by B.1.1.7 (alpha) in mid-April. The outbreak due to the alpha variant, which began in April 2021 to June 2021, with the reported number of



daily cases as high as 9,950. During this time period (October 2020 to June 2021), apart from 9 imported B.1.351 (Beta) and B.1.525 (Eta) cases which were identified in overseas visitors in quarantine facilities, Sri Lanka did not experience any outbreaks due to other VOCs.

The largest Sri Lankan SARS-CoV-2 outbreak was due to the delta variant and its sub lineages from July to the end of October 2021. During the peak of this ‘delta wave’, the PCR positivity rates rose above 30% with case fatality rates reaching 6.35%. Apart from the delta parental lineage B.1.617.2, two other delta sub lineages AY.28 and AY.104 were the predominant variants observed during this time period. The AY.28 and AY.104 were assigned as Sri Lanka delta sub-lineages as they were found to originate in Sri Lanka and to be transmitted to all continents in the world. Currently, Sri Lanka is going through the declining phase of its 4th wave driven by Omicron variant which was first identified in the last week of November 2021. ## INNOVATIONS

The Sri Lanka Institute of Nanotechnology along with AICBU has successfully demonstrated the proof of concept and initial validation of a locally assembled LAMP-PCR kit. With this intervention, Sri Lanka is expected to save nearly Rs. 150 million a month on COVID-19 testing.

## FACULTY OF MANAGEMENT STUDIES AND COMMERCE



The Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce is the pioneering management faculty in Sri Lankan university system which is regarded as the Centre of Excellence in Management Education in Sri Lanka. Management education at University of Sri Jayewardenepura also has a history of more than 60 years.

The first programmes of study commenced in 1959/60 with the introduction of two undergraduate degree programmes in Business Administration and Public Administration under the Department of Economics, Business and Public Administration of the Faculty of Arts. In 1968, the Department was reconstituted as the Department of Management Studies under the Faculty of Arts. Under the reorganization of the university system, the Department of Management Studies was elevated to Faculty status and the Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce (FMSC) was established with two departments, namely, the Department of Management Studies and the Department of Commerce in 1972.

Having been strengthened by twelve academic departments at present the faculty offers globally competitive degree programmes in the broad areas of Management and Commerce. Indeed, for the last five decades, the faculty has been the most popular faculty, particularly among the students who have excelled in Advanced Level in the Commerce Stream. Yet, the Faculty's role in Sri Lankan higher education sector is not restricted to undergraduate education. The faculty is also committed to Continuous Professional Developments and Lifelong Learning of the leaders in the World of Work. Therefore, it also offers a range of highly recognized postgraduate programmes, including PhD, MBA, MPA and M.Sc. in Management. Further, by recognizing the need of wider Sri Lankan society for higher education, the faculty conducts a number of external/part-time degree, advanced diploma, diploma and Certificate programmes in the field of management. ## EDUCATION AND DEVELOPMENT

### • Short courses introduced in 2021

As per the MOU signed between Sung Kyun Kwan University, South Korea and USJ, the Department of Immunology and Molecular Medicine got approval for three short



courses in Immunology as hybrid part time courses which will contribute to a national need.

- Certificate Course in cell culture
- Certificate course in Molecular Diagnostics
- Certificate course in sequencing

- **MCQ bank**

MCQ bank was introduced to the Faculty to maintain MCQs as an electronic database. This would enable the departments to maintain the MCQs in a bank, which is secure. MCQs can be categorized according to the subjects and learning outcomes. The results of the item analysis of the questions too can be incorporated in the bank. This would be help to improve the quality of the MCQs of the faculty.

- **Mechanisms to complete assessments due to Covid Pandemic.**

Some assessment formats were changed in clinical appointments, clerkship programmes and decisions were taken to re-schedule the appointments for the students who were unable to attend due to covid conditions.

- **New methods of teaching**

New methods of teaching and learning were introduced, during the pandemic when students had restricted access. Clinical teaching was conducted in a hybrid manner, enabling participation of the entire group (half joining on line). Several new online teaching activities were commenced in phase 3. Interactive clinical case discussions involving participation from staff of phases 1 and 2 was one of them.

- **Curriculum Revision Subcommittee**

A subcommittee headed by Prof Kamani Wanigasuriya, was formed to take forward the curriculum revision process. This was initiated to align the curricular content with the program learning outcomes. However, content revision along with changes in timelines are being addressed currently. This subcommittee is to report to the CDC (Curriculum Development Committee)

- **Student loan system**

People's Bank, Sampath Bank and Hatton National Bank introduced a special loan scheme for the medical undergraduates, with loan facility up to Rs.500,000 for purchasing laptops, computers, equipment, devices and motorbikes during the stay at medical faculty giving a grace period and allowing a concessionary repayment period.

- **A mechanism to identify students who perform poorly at examinations**

Students who do not obtain pass marks for more than half the subjects are picked up at the results board by the examinations unit and are referred to the personal tutor for

evaluation, in order to find out the possible reasons for poor performance. Accordingly, they are referred for supportive actions (language, psychology, financial and other)

## RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT

- **International Conference on Health Sciences 2021**

International Conference on Health Sciences 2021 was held on 15<sup>th</sup> October 2021 from 5.00pm onwards as a virtual conference. The theme was “Exploring challenges to make a difference”. The Faculty of Medical Sciences oration was done by Prof. Kamani Wanigasuriya.

- **MOU between University of Sri Jayewardenepura and Apeksha Hospital.**

An MOU was signed between the Cancer Research Unit of the USJ, with the Apeksha Hospital. This would enable the conduct of research on cancer in Sri Lanka

- **Prof. Neelika Malavige** was ranked among the top 2% of the world’s best scientists in the 2020 list of outstanding researchers prepared by Elsevier BV, Stanford University, USA.

- **Prof. GN. Malavige** winning the Top 50 professional and Career Women Awards 2020.

- The paper titled “Ward-based clinical pharmacists and hospital readmission: a non-randomized controlled trial in Sri Lanka” published in the Bulletin of the World Health Organization in 2018 authored by Professor Nirmala Wijekoon received Presidents Award for Scientific Research at the ceremony organized by National Research Council.

- The paper titled “Fixed Low-Dose Triple Combination Antihypertensive Medication vs Usual Care for Blood Pressure Control in Patients with Mild to Moderate Hypertension in Sri Lanka: a Randomized Clinical Trial” authored by Dr. Sanjeewa Wijekoon received Presidents Award for Scientific Research at the ceremony organized by National Research Council.

- Case report titled “Pediatric death due to influenza B meningitis” Autopsy diagnosis of a rare complication of influenza B Virus” prepared by Dr. S.R. Hulathduwa had been awarded the 2<sup>nd</sup> place for the best case report at the Annual Academic Sessions of the College of Forensic Pathologists of Sri Lanka

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## INFRASTRUCTURE DEVELOPMENT

- **Phase II – building extension**

Laying of foundation stone of Phase II building extension funded by AHEAD project happened on 12<sup>th</sup> March 2022.

- **Ceremonial opening of the new Professorial Paediatric Unit Complex of the Colombo South Teaching Hospital**

Three floors of the eight-storied new millennium building of the Colombo South Teaching Hospital were completed and handed over on 26<sup>th</sup> August 2021. Construction of the project was undertaken by the State Engineering Cooperation. Sri Lanka Army and the Army Seva Vanitha Unit were instrumental in the completion including the provision of furniture and equipment. The Sri Lanka Army Ordnance Corps factory in Dombagoda manufactured the 250 iron beds to match with recommended ward specifications. The ASVU provided mattresses, bed sheets, pillowcases, pillows, bedside cupboards, and other pieces of furniture as well as accessories to the three floors, including the pediatric floor.

- **Facility Management System**

An online reservation system was introduced from 1<sup>st</sup> May 2021 to reserve lecture halls and tutorial rooms via online. Access has been given to the Heads of Departments.

- **Refurbishment of Board room and the entrance:**

Proposal has been submitted to refurbishment of Board room and the entrance at the phase IV Building.

- **Development of student areas**

Few spaces identified in the Phase IV building were designated for the development of a common room, recreation room and a locker room for students. These were completed in 2021 to be formally opened in 2022. The canteen of the Phase IV building was expanded to accommodate 150 students, by increasing the seating capacity around it, outdoors.

## LIFELONG COMMUNITY SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

- **Contribution made by Allergy, Immunology and Cell Biology Unit (AICBU) and Department of Immunology and Molecular Medicine**

The Department of Immunology and Molecular Medicine is the latest addition to the Faculty of Medical Sciences which was established as a part of the Leading University Project for International Cooperation, funded by Ministry of Education, South Korea and is based on a MoU between University of Sri Jayewardenepura and SungKyunKwan University, South Korea. Although the department had only two academic staff and no permanent non-academic staff since its inception, the workload carried out in the year 2021 was quite high, especially owing to the pandemic situation that prevailed worldwide. With the collaboration of the Allergy, Immunology and Cell Biology Unit (AICBU), the department made a substantial contribution to the national need of fighting against the corona virus by performing more than 300,000 PCR diagnostic tests (in 2021) for various government establishments including the Ministry of Health. Furthermore, as the major sequencing facility in Sri Lanka, the department and the unit were also the pioneers in sequencing and viral strain identification during each outbreak of COVID-19 in the country. In addition, many other research projects have been conducted related to areas concerning SARS-CoV-2 virus, its vaccines and antibody responses and dengue viral infections.

In October 2021, the department and the AICBU were selected by the Ministry of Health as one of the training centers to train Medical Laboratory Science (MLS) Graduate Interns in Immuno Diagnostic and Molecular Biology techniques. The batch consisted of more than

170 interns who underwent 2 weeks of hands-on training in groups of 10-20 each time. The department has also obtained necessary approval to start several short courses (Cell Culture, Molecular Diagnostics, and Sequencing) that are open to individuals with different levels of knowledge and skills in the subjects. Moreover, the department is at the final stage of obtaining approval on starting the Master's course in Immunology and also expects to take part in the BSc in Human Biology course by offering a specialization in Immunology for selected students in the program. In addition, the head of the Department and the Director of the AICBU have been participating in a number of conferences, workshops and many public engagement programs in the form of media discussions and public lectures in order to share knowledge among stakeholders related to the industry and create awareness among the general public.

- **Provide assistance to establish new Medical Faculty at the Uva Wellassa University of Sri Lanka**

One senior academic staff member from each Department in Faculty of Medical Sciences was appointed to develop curricula, infrastructure requirements, equipment required for laboratories etc.

- **Conduct Examination to Register to Practise Medicine (ERPM) Examination**

Theory examination was coordinated by the Faculty in December 2020 by Dr.Thushari Dissanayake and Clinical part of the ERPM examination was held from 22<sup>nd</sup> March 2021 and Dr. M A M M Jayawardene (Department of Obstetrics & Gynaecology) coordinated it on behalf of the Faculty.

- **Contribute to National Operations Center for prevention of Covid (NOCPOC)**

NOCPOC has conducted a national operational service via 1904 SMS service to triangle the patients and reduce unnecessary hospital admissions. It is a 24 hour service running all 07 days and medical students were permitted to work on volunteer basis.

## FACULTY OF GRADUATE STUDIES



The Faculty of Graduate Studies (FGS) was established in the University in January 1996 under Section 48A of the Universities Act No 16 of 1978. The FGS is under the oversight of a Dean who guides the academic and administrative functions of the Faculty. An Assistant Registrar heads the operational division while a Senior Assistant Bursar heads the finance division.

The academic programmes of the FGS are conducted through 9 Boards of Study, which are in close collaboration with other faculties and academic departments in the university. These Boards of Study are Humanities, Social Sciences, Life Sciences, Physical Sciences, Management Studies and Commerce, Medical Sciences, Multidisciplinary Studies, Engineering and Industrial Technology. The programmes offered by the Faculty include Certificate Courses, Post Graduate Diplomas, One year Masters Degrees, Masters Degrees by course work and research and Higher Degree Programmes by research only. All the programs are aligned along **with** the Sri Lanka Qualification Framework, which sets the benchmark of higher education in the country.

### International Conference on Multidisciplinary Approaches – 2021

On the 22nd and 23rd of December 2021, the International Conference on Multidisciplinary Approaches (iCMA) was conducted at the University of Sri Jayewardenepura. ## FACULTY OF TECHNOLOGY



In order to cater to the GCE Advanced Level Technology Stream introduced by the Government of Sri Lanka in the Year 2013, University of Sri Jayewardenepura was the first University to come forward in Establishing the Faculty of Technology in the Government University System. The proposed Technology curricula were then recommended to the University Council upon the approval of the University Senate on 23<sup>rd</sup> September, 2015. Followed by the recommendation of the University Council on 08<sup>th</sup> October 2015, University Grants Commission approved the proposed Technology curricula for three degree programs including the 09 subject focus areas on 19<sup>th</sup> November, 2015. Fulfilling the immense efforts, dedication, and the vision of Prof. Sampath Amaratunge, Vice Chancellor, University of Sri Jayewardenepura and his teams, Ministry of Higher Education and Highways of Sri Lanka officially announced the establishment of the Faculty of Technology through the Gazette Extraordinary (No.1948/59 Order under Section 27(1), THE UNIVERSITIES ACT, No. 16 of 1978) that was published on 08<sup>th</sup> of January, 2016.

At the initial stage the Faculty of Technology was established at a temporary premises in Nugegoda and then moved to permanent place in Techno Park, Pitipana. Fully fledged new faculty premises were declared opened by His Excellency Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksha on 8<sup>th</sup> June 2020.

The **Department of Information and Communication Technology** conducts the Bachelor of Information and Communication Technology Honours degree programme. This Degree programme will be accredited by the Computer Society of Sri Lanka (CSSL). The Information and Communication Technology programme will produce skilled graduates in the three focus areas namely Software Technology, Multimedia Technology and Network Technology.

The **Department of Civil and Environmental Technology** was established in 2020 with a view to equip students with the knowledge and skills needed for world-class Civil and Environmental Technology practice. The department offers the Bachelor of Honours Degree Programme of Engineering Technology. The Engineering Technology programme will produce skilled graduates in the three focus areas namely Construction and Building Services Technology, Energy and Environmental Technology and Geotechnology. The curricula are guided by the Institute of Engineers Sri Lanka (IESL) Engineering Technology Degree Programme recognition manual.

The **Department of Materials and Mechanical Technology** was established in 2020. The department offers the Bachelor of Honours Degree Programme of Engineering Technology. The Engineering Technology programme will produce skilled graduates in the three focus areas namely Mechatronics Technology, Automobile Technology and Polymer Processing Technology. The curricula are guided by the Institute of Engineers Sri Lanka (IESL) Engineering Technology Degree Programme recognition manual.

The **Department of Science for Technology** was established in 2020, focusing to conduct all the programmes relevant to first and second semesters of the three degree programs. The first two years of



the study mainly consist of Chemistry, Physics and Mathematics along with basic Computing skills, English and Management subjects. As per the guidelines in accreditation manuals, students have to engage in a mini project during their first year studies. In addition to conduct of Lectures, the Science for technology Department is responsible to conduct mini projects for first year students.

## FACULTY OF DENTAL SCIENCES



Faculty of Dental Sciences (FDS) of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura (USJ) was established as the second Faculty of Dental Sciences in Sri Lanka and the ninth faculty of the USJ by order of the Gazette extraordinary No. 2257/28 dated 08/12/2021. The FDS was declared open by Senior Professor Sampath Amaratunge, Chairman, University Grants Commission and Senior Professor Sudantha Liyanage, Vice-Chancellor of University of Sri Jayewardenepura on 6<sup>th</sup> January 2022 at the 2<sup>nd</sup> Floor of the Library Building. In keeping with the University's vision – "PROSPER LIVES THROUGH EDUCATION", the Faculty hopes to provide a Dental education programme of the highest standard for the next generation in the Dental profession, who will be skillful, technologically advanced, generously motivated to serve the people with compassion, dedication and professionalism.

### DEGREES AWARDED BY THE FACULTY

- Bachelor of Dental Surgery

The Bachelor of Dental Surgery program conducted by the faculty is a five year programme in par with global standards of dental education. Synchronized system based curricular delivery and subject based assessments are designed to facilitate students to excel according to their individual learning styles by providing a platform for learner and student centric experience. The preclinical phase (BDS I) will be taught together with the medical students of the Faculty of Medical Sciences.

Around 30 Dental students as the first Batch going to be enrolled in January, 2022 under the UGC intake 2020/21.

The Faculty has had discussions with the Director General of Health Services (DGHS), Dr. Asela Gunawardane and has obtained approval to send students to the National Dental Hospital of Sri Lanka (NDHSL) and Colombo South Teaching Hospital for their clinical training and these 2 hospitals will be considered as Teaching Hospitals for the FDS.

## PHYSICAL EDUCATION DIVISION

The formulation & implementation of sport activities for University students, training of sportsmen and sports women for 39 sport events and the organization of sport events are the main functions of the Physical education Division. Sri Lanka University Games, giving formal training for tournaments organized by the National Sports Association or international, the administration and maintenance of grounds for different games are the other activities of the Physical Education Department.

The present Director of Physical Education is Mrs. N.Nishanthi Vidanage. Mrs. Ramani Kulathilaka, Mr. M.G.S.S.Keerthirathna, Mr. H.L.Lahiru Dilankara, Mr.B.N.M.Perera and L.A.D.Priyadarshana serve as permanent sports instructors. Mrs. E.D.Priyadarshani, Mrs. N.Karunarathne and N.L. Wickramadara serve as temporary sports instructors.

### OBJECTIVES OF THE PHYSICAL EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

1. To give an understanding on the values of Physical Education to internal students of the University and to give them a physical development through mental development.
2. To provide an opportunity for improvement of sports activities and skills.
3. To encourage sports participation by playing tournaments, with internal and external sports bodies.
4. To develop discipline by encouraging sports activities among students.

### **Sports Facilities**

The Department of Physical Education, the governing body of sports, of the prestigious University of Sri Jayewardenepura possesses unique sporting facilities.

### **Out-door Volleyball Courts**

The University outdoor volleyball courts are located near the swimming pool have two clay based courts. These are available for university students and staff members.

**Basketball Court**

The Outdoor basketball court is situated next to the volleyball courts and is mainly a hard court made of tar. These are available for university students and staff members.

**Tennis Courts**

Tennis courts are clay surfaced and well maintained. These are available for university students, staff members, and for outsiders as well.

**Swimming Pool Complex & New Office Area**

The Swimming pool is a 50m standard size & has 10 lanes. Its shallow end is 1.5 m in depth and at the deep end, the depth is 5.5 m. The swimming pool has an adjacent two storied- building which consists of changing rooms and wash-rooms for swimmers. The pool is available for university students, staff members, and for outsiders as well upon their request.

**Cricket Ground**

The University cricket pitch is mainly a grass surfaced 65m full length area. This well maintained ground has one matting pitch & two clay pitches. The ground has an adjacent one storied- pavilion & changing rooms with attached wash-rooms for players & referees. This ground is located in a very picturesque environment. The pitch hosts Inter University matches, University intra-mural competitions, and as well as other community club tournaments.

## **CAREER GUIDANCE UNIT**

The Career Guidance Unit has successfully conducted the following tasks from 1<sup>st</sup> January to 15<sup>th</sup> December 2021 with the leadership and the guidance given by the Director, Prof. Sudath M. Amarasena, Career Advisers Sameera Jayawardane, and Chathurangani Tennakoon in collaboration with Career Skills Development Society and the Gavel club to develop the employability and the capability of the undergraduates. This will guide the students to the higher educational opportunities which are available for the students who have studied up to O/L examination. Most of the students face many difficulties when they are going to select the ideal subject stream for their A/L examination after completing the O/L examination successfully. ## CENTRE FOR IT SERVICES (CITS)

The Centre for IT Services (CITS) is the core entity of the University that manages the Campus-wide IT Infrastructure, Internet & Email facilities, Server Administration and maintains e-Services & Applications while providing IT Technical Support and Solutions for university students and staff. Apart from these, CITS develops and maintains the university websites and is also fortified with a fully equipped media team.

Mr. Harsha Munasinghe led the CITS as the Information Systems Manager and Mr. Vajira Premadasa & Mr. Nethsiri Jayaweera served as Computer Instructors. Mr. Suresh Nanayakkara was the Assistant Network Manager. Ms. Ashela Nilmini was recruited as the Programmer cum System Analyst. Mr. Ranuka Edirisuriya served as Computer Programmer with newly recruited four new Computer Programmers. Three new ICT Technical Officers replaced the previous three Technical Officers. Ms. H.M.M.S. Nisansala was the Management Assistant and Mr. Bandara Yapa contributed as Lab Attendant. Works Aid Mr. Shantha Kumara and several temporary employees served at the CITS, Media Centre and Web Team to accomplish the tasks throughout the year.

## LIBRARY

Under the direction of the Librarian, Dr. (Mrs.) Nayana Wijayasundara, 01 Deputy Librarian, 03 Senior Assistant Librarians (Gr. I), 03 Senior Assistant Librarians (Gr. II) , 04 Assistant Librarians, 01 Assistant Registrar/Library Services, 01 Assistant Network Manager, 01 Temporary Demonstrator and 53 non-academic staff were engaged in duties in the Library in the year 2021.

During the year, 434 book titles (including 793 copies) were purchased at a cost of Rs. 5.99M from the annual allocation. Further 200 book titles (including 999 copies) were purchased through the STHRD (Science and Technology Human Resource Development) project by the Faculty of Engineering to the Engineering faculty library. Eleven foreign and local periodical titles both in electronic and print format were purchased at a cost of Rs. 0.64M. Two full-text electronic databases; JSTOR (at a cost of Rs. 1.28M) and Research4life (at a cost of Rs. 0.294M) and a citation database Scopus (at a cost of Rs. 3.81M) and MacPro Video.com at a cost of Rs. 28,532.95 were purchased. Additionally, CrossRef DOI registration facility was purchased at a cost of Rs. 78,712.37. Two Palm-leaf manuscripts were purchased at a cost of Rs. 200,000. Two hundred and twenty two (222) book titles (valued at Rs. 1116721.85), 195 foreign and local periodical titles (valued at Rs. 55,295.00) were received as donations. In addition, access to 04 other electronic databases; Emerald, Taylor & Francis, Oxford Journals, Oxford Medicine Online including Medical Handbooks Collection was provided to patrons through the UGC consortium, CONSAL. Also, Document Delivery Service through British Library was provided through CONSAL for the readers. Further, access to EBSCO database was provided by the AHEAD project of the Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce.

During the year 2021, 772 book titles and 2211 copies were processed by the Processing Division and faculty libraries. The amount consisted of 40 copies to Ceylon Room (CR), 122 copies to Permanent Reference (PR), 342 copies to Scheduled Reference (SR) and 1707 copies to Lending (L) books. 61 Palm-leaf manuscripts were accessioned after conservation by the end of 2021.

About 1308 readers were registered including Academic Staff (17), Non-academic staff (12), Undergraduate students (1179) and Diploma and Postgraduate students (50) during the year 2021. With that, the total number of registered users was 18,356.

The rate of fulfillment of inter-library loan requests was 91.7%. Laptop lending service was used by 64 users in 2021. The library had 30 laptop computers allocated for this service. 14 ISBN numbers and 09 ISSN numbers were issued as per the request for university publications.

Total number of entries in the Scholar Bank (Digital Repository) was 8324, and the database of newspaper articles consisted of 3540 selected newspaper articles by the end of 2021. 213 palm leaf manuscripts were entered into the digital repository during the year. Twenty three workshops were conducted by the staff of the library for the academics and students in order to enhance awareness of information resources and information literacy skills.

During the year 2021, 01 Assistant Librarian completed Masters in Library and Information Science and 02 staff members completed Bachelor's Degree. One PhD, two Master's Degrees, one Bachelor's Degrees and six Diplomas were carried out by the library staff.

## **EXTERNAL DEGREE & EXTENSION COURSES UNIT**

External Examinations Division of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura established in 1979 with the commencement of the External Degree Programme in Bachelor of Commerce. Subsequently Bachelor of Arts General External Degree Programme was commenced. In 1997 the General External Degree programmes of B.Sc Business Administration and Public Administration were also introduced. The B.A General External Degree and the B.Sc Business Administration General External Degree Programmes have become very popular among the students.

According to the Commission Circular No 932 dated 15<sup>th</sup> October 2010 issued by the University Grants Commission, the External Examinations unit has been structurally changed as External Degrees & Extension Courses Unit.

## UNIVERSITY MEDICAL CENTRE

The Medical Centre of the University takes care of the medical problems of the University community. These include seeing patients on an outpatient basis, treating and referring for further care. Further, the medical center, organized and carried out vaccination programs against Covid 19 for staff and students. The center staff quickly adopted to the new normal and is involved in taking swabs for RAT.

PHI staff is carrying out Anti Dengue, Anti Rabies campaign, pest control and food quality control in the university.

In December 2021, the center inaugurated the installation of Hospital Health Information Management System which is a product of Information and Communication Technology Sri Lanka (ICTA). Now the center is equipped with fully fledged electronic health record service ranging from patients registration, appointments and drug dispensing. This is the first University Medical center to be digitalized.

## **World Bank funded accelerating higher education expansion and development (ahead) operation**

### **1. Introduction:**

The development of the higher education sector is of central importance to enable Sri Lanka to make the transition from a Lower-Middle Income Country (LMIC) to an Upper Middle-Income Country (UMIC). Recognizing this, the Government of Sri Lanka (GoSL) and the World Bank have agreed to support the higher education sector through a Bank funded Accelerating Higher Education Expansion and Development (AHEAD) operation.

Total grant was 100 million USD sponsored through the two main financing sources: 67 million USD from International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) and 33 million USD from International Development Association (IDA). The total estimated project period was six years.

### **2. Beneficiaries:**

The main and direct beneficiaries of AHEAD operations are students (around 600,000), academics (around 5000), managers, and technical staff members of the higher education sector. They are benefited from AHEAD over its operation life span and also beyond it. There will also be many indirect beneficiaries from AHEAD.

### **3. Implementation:**

The implementing agency of AHEAD is the Ministry of Education (MoHE). The national level coordination is done by the University Grants Commission (UGC) and Sri Lanka Institute of Advanced Technological Education (SLIATE) Advanced Technological Institutes (ATIs). The Operations Monitoring and Support Team (OMST) coordinates and supports all AHEAD activities between the MoHE, UGC, and all fifteen (15) Universities. The university level

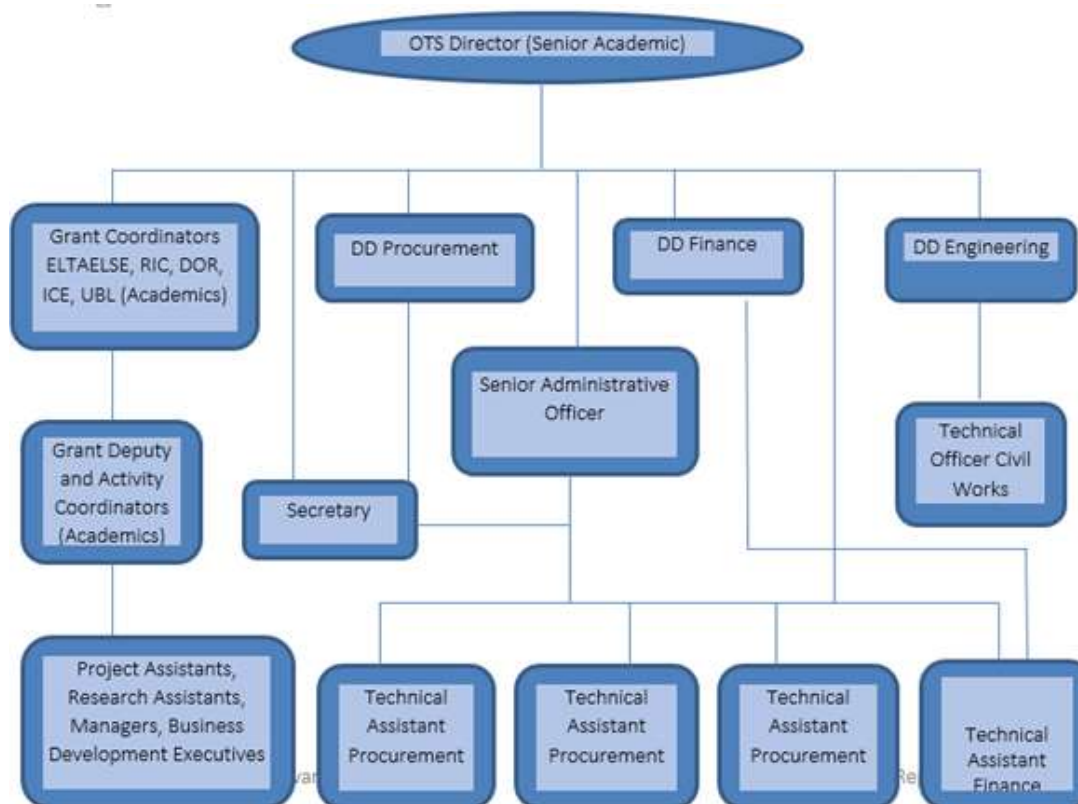
coordinating, monitoring, implementing and facilitating are done by the Operations Technical Secretariat (OTS) of each university.

#### 4. Operations Technical Secretariat (OTS):

The task of the OTS is to organize regular capacity-building activities for the relevant staff of the University, including procurement, financial management, and contract management, throughout the program implementation, with the support of the Operation and Monitoring Support Team (OMST).

The OTS Office of University of Sri Jayewardenepura (USJP) is operated under the Director/OTS, Prof. Harendra Kariyawasam, Head of the Department/Accounting, Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce. Ms. M.N.Suraweera as Deputy Director/Procurement, Ms. K.T.C.Priyangani as Deputy Director/Finance, Mr. O.A.W.Karunaratne as Deputy Director/ Engineering, Ms. R.M. Gunaratna as Senior Administrative Officer, Ms. W.D.S.S.Premathileke as Secretary and Ms. K.A.D.S.T.Kuruppuarachchi, Ms.K.A.D.Nipuni Rangika, Ms. S.D. Ganesha Madhushani and Ms.I.K.M.I.A.K Ilangasinghe as Technical Assistants continues to work at the OTS Office, to support the AHEAD activities. Mr. R.K.R.Chathuranga, Technical Officer (Civil) works under the OTS Office, to supervise the Construction of Pathology Building.

- (c) Promoting a vibrant research and innovation culture that can support economic development, especially the growth of higher value industries and services.

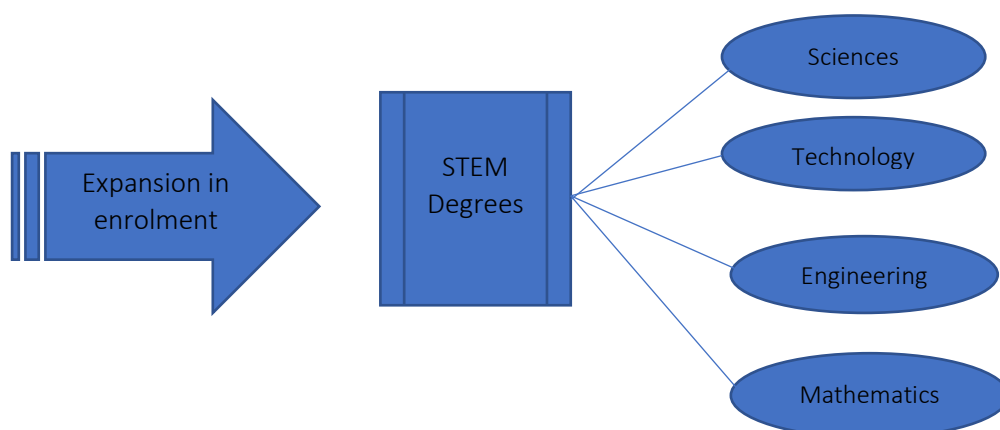
### 6.1 Result Area 1

#### (Increasing Enrolment in Higher Education in Priority Disciplines for Economic Development)

The objective of Results Area 1 is to increase enrolment in higher education programs of strategic importance for economic development. The GoSL will promote the expansion of enrolment in state universities and ATIs, with a focus on Sciences, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) degree programs. It will take place both in existing and new STEM faculties and ATIs. The strategy will promote the use of teaching-learning methods based on open educational resources and learning software to enable large numbers of students, regardless of their location, to set up interactive teaching sessions.

The Program will enable the strategic planning and development of the higher education sector. The strategic plan will be used to monitor progress in implementing the targets, including the targets for the expansion of enrolment in the universities and ATIs, and to fine-tune this over time.

### **Total allocation and utilization by the Faculties in 2021:**

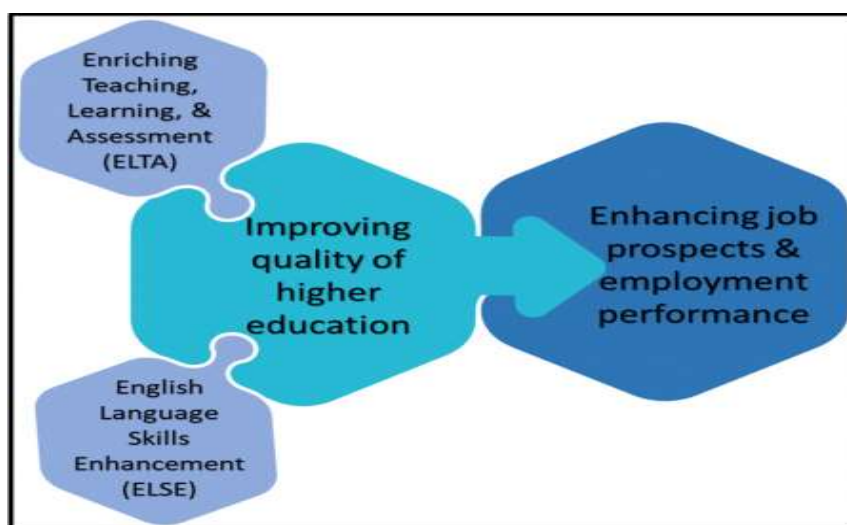

## **6.2 Result Area 2- Introduction: (Improving the Quality of Higher Education)**

The Results Area 2 aims to improve the quality of degree programs specifically focused to develop universities which deliver degree programs that promote a combination of academic excellence with high quality socio-emotional skills, such that students are well prepared for the world of work and for wider civic and social life. This program allocates funds to the faculties and departments on competitive basis for modernizing teaching-learning and quality improvement programs called ELTA- ELSE.

It is also intended to provide funds for a scholarship program for young academics to obtain postgraduate degrees. This is extremely important because there is a scarcity of qualified academic staff in HEIs. Many PhD scholarships are offered to academic staff members of universities Under AHEAD. These PhD scholarships are for overseas programs and split programs.

### Total allocation and utilization by the Faculties in 2021:

Three faculties of USJP, Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences, Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce and Faculty of Applied Sciences were able to win the competitive grant from Result Area 2, and were able to secure Rs. 120 million for each faculty. The total allocation and the expenditure in the year 2021 are given in the Table below.

### 6.3 Result Area 3- Introduction: (Promoting Research, Development, Innovation and Commercialization (RDIC))

The objective of Results Area 3 is to develop a culture of research and development, innovation and commercialization (RDIC) in universities. RDIC activities are an extremely important next step in the development of higher education in the country. A three-pronged strategy is been followed, as given below.

First, a system of competitive, performance-based research programs for Development- Oriented Research (DOR) in universities and non-state HEIs will be developed and implemented for Sciences, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) subjects, Humanities, Education, Management, and Social Sciences (HEMS) subjects, and STEM-HEMS (interdisciplinary) research.

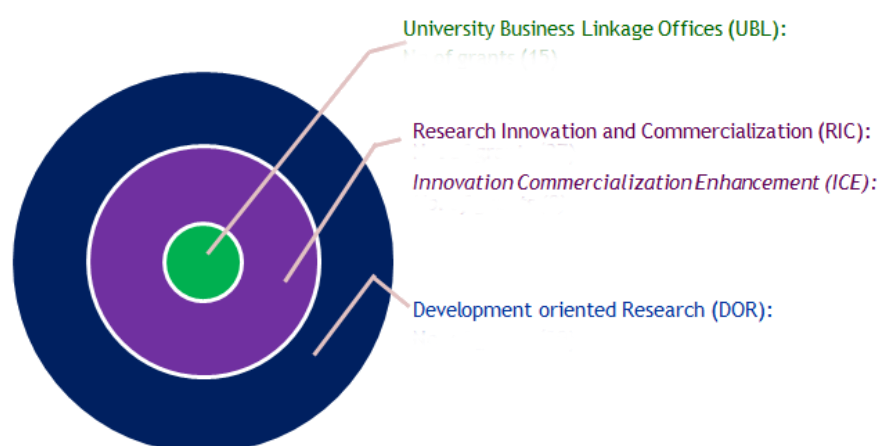
Second, competitive, performance-based Research and Innovation Commercialization (RIC) programs will be developed and implemented for universities undertaking innovation activities of direct relevance for industrial and



service sector development. The RIC programs will be available for STEM and HEMS subjects, as well as for STEM- HEMS combinations. In addition, under the Program, assistance been given for a set of Innovation Commercialization Enhancement (ICE) grants to assist a set of university programs that have demonstrated success in this area in the past (under HETC) to scale up their activities further.

Third, the Program will support the development of University-Business Linkage (UBL) Cells. The UBL Cells will assist university academics in increasing collaboration with professional expertise in technology transfer and business model development, establishing open innovation spaces and business incubators, and enabling academics and students to obtain professional business advice and training.

### **Total allocation and utilization by the Faculties in 2021:**

Objective of the Result Area 3 was to promote Research, Development and innovation culture within the Universities. Under this result area, universities were eligible to receive two types of commutative research grants and non-competitive grant.

#### **(i) RIC Grants:**

Under the competitive category, Faculty of Applied Sciences won Rs.45 million, Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences won Rs.45 million and Faculty of Technology won Rs. 25 million, for Research and Innovation Commercialization (RIC) grant.

#### **(ii) DOR Grants:**

Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce won Rs.10 million and Faculty of Medical Science won Rs. 35 million for Development Oriented Research (DOR) grant.

**(iii) ICE Grant:**

In addition to the DOR and RIC grants, results area 3 promotes, a set of innovation commercialization enhancement (ICE) grants to assist a set of university programs that have demonstrated success in this area in the past under the HETC project to scale up their activities further. Center for Sustainability, Department of Forestry and Environmental Science, Faculty of Applied Sciences of University of Sri Jayewardenepura was able to receive Rs.40 million as ICE Grant.

**(iv) UBL Cell:**

Under Results Area 3 provision has been made to assist universities to develop relevant intellectual property (IP) policies consistent with the definition of IP by the World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO). In this context UBL helps to;

- Enable academics and students to obtain professional knowledge, advice, and training relevant for commercialization of research
- Increase collaboration with professional expertise in technology transfer and commercialization of research
- Enable academics to engage with industry to develop and utilized research and innovation products for commercial potential
- Work with the university IP policies in interaction with private firms and industries. The program also provides a platform for networking among researchers engaged in innovation and commercialization of research and companies interested in transforming research results into marketable goods and services. Further to that, Rs. 13 million was given for the development of University-Business Linkage (UBL) Cells. The total allocation and the expenditure in the year 2021 are given in the Table below.

## Conclusion:

Most of the workshops were conducted using the Zoom Technology.

Although the prevailing health situation in the country as well as in the whole world are not yet improved, staff of AHEAD Operation, OTS Office and all the Grants, work together as a Team, to achieve the targets and complete all the scheduled tasks.

## **CENTER FOR QUALITY ASSURANCE (CQA)**

The University of Sri Jayewardenepura (USJ) being a public institution has to exercise its responsibility to maintain its quality and standards. Quality assurance is the means by which a university can guarantee with confidence and certainty that standards of its awards and quality of its education provision and knowledge generation are being maintained.

In this context, the Centre for Quality Assurance (CQA) of the University is responsible for carrying out the quality assurance activities and coordinating these activities in line with the national quality assurance framework laid down by the Quality Assurance Council (QAC) of the University Grants Commission (UGC). Although, maintaining the expected standards of quality assurance in the University is a massive task, the Director/CQA of the University, Senior Professor Samanthi Senaratne, continued to work on part time basis, to fulfill the academic and administrative tasks involved with the CQA.

The activities conducted by CQA during the year 2021, are stated below.

**Curriculum Review Committee (CRC):**

The establishment of the Curriculum Review Committee (CRC) of University of Sri Jayewardenepura (USJ) as a senate sub-committee was approved at the Senate Meeting held on 27.08.2020 and the formats prepared to submit documents to CRC was approved at the Senate on 27.01.2021. The establishment of this sub-committee is identified as a best practice in quality assurance. Further, the Review Report of the Institutional Review (IR) of USJ held in 2017 has also proposed to establish such a committee in the University.

### **Guidelines to introduce a common course code structure:**

#### **(a) For undergraduate degree Programs of USJ:**

At the request of the Vice Chancellor, Director/CQA conducted an evaluation of the existing course codes in all faculties of the University. A comparison of the course codes in the existing undergraduate degree programs of the University, was presented to the Senate Sub Committee on Quality Assurance on 29.07.2021. Based on the analysis, Director/CQA presented the common and distinguishing features of these course, codes and observations as to the development of a common code structure for the undergraduate degree programs. Thereafter, another discussion was held at the Deans' Committee on 04.08.2021, regarding this. As a result, a set of guidelines was developed by CQA for the introduction of a common course code structure. This guideline was approved at the 396<sup>th</sup> Senate meeting held on 07.10.2021.

#### **(b) For postgraduate study programs:**

A set of guidelines has been developed by the CQA to introduce a common code structure for the postgraduate degree programs of USJ, after the evaluation of the existing course codes of the postgraduate study programs offered by the University. These guidelines were presented at a meeting held on 21.09.2021 with the participation of the Director, Postgraduate Institute of Management (PIM), and the Chairpersons of Study Boards and Coordinators of both FGS and FMSC. It was decided to revise this proposed scheme based on the observations and suggestions made by the participants of the meeting. Subsequently, the final version was



developed by the Faculty of Graduate Studies of the University with the concurrence of the CQA and it is pending the approval of the Senate.

### **Concerns regarding Institutional Review (IR) and Program Review (PR) Manuals:**

According to the discussion on the revision of IR and PR Manuals, at the UGC Standing Committee on Quality Assurance, the QAC of UGC has requested the comments of universities for this revision process and consequently, the CQA has requested the comments of the faculties. Based on these comments received from Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce, Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences and the Faculty of Allied Health Sciences, and the experience in the IR process, the Director/CQA has identified the following limitations as to IR and PR manuals and the review processes.

- Too many standards, in both in the IR Manual and the PR Manual, which create unnecessary burden to the academic staff as they have to spend a considerable time on the preparation of the self-evaluation report (SER), and the collection and the organization of the evidences to substantiate the claims made in the SER.
- Repetition of standards in both manuals under several criteria with subtle differences. This sometimes leads the reviewers to provide different marks for the same aspect under different criteria.
- The lack of clarity in standards as most standards have been presented in an abstract manner. This results in different interpretations to these standards and the evidences could be given based on the interpretation.
- The reviewers consider evidence given as examples for standards in the IR/PR manuals as mandatory requirements and they tend to search for exact evidences in the universities/study programs that they review. Too many standards lead to an increase in evidences to be produced under each criterion and the reviewers are not in a position to review all those evidences within the limited time available during the review period. Further, it is not clear whether the evidence is accepted in electronic form by the reviewers. There is no clear guideline available in this respect in the IR/PR manuals.
- It was observed in some instances that the reviewers expect the universities to follow the standards to the letter of law without considering the substance of the matter.
- The standards relating to areas such as curriculum, teaching, learning and assessments have been largely developed by focusing on disciplines that fall under natural sciences. A limited attention has been placed on social sciences and humanities in the standard setting process.
- The explanation provided to scale of 0 to 3 used in marking criteria for standards needs to be strengthened and the reviewers should be required to provide remarks to justify the marks assigned to each standard by them.
- The selection process of reviewers and the reviewer training process need to be reviewed and revised to ensure that suitable academics are selected as reviewers and the selected persons to understand their role and responsibilities clearly.

### **Development of Policies:**

#### **(a) Policy on Student Engagement in Quality Assurance:**

The Policy on Student Engagement in Quality Assurance of USJ has been developed in alignment with the Quality Assurance Policy and the By-Law of USJ and the

circular issued in this regard by the Quality Assurance Council (QAC) of the University Grants Commission (UGC). The initial draft of this policy document was shared among the faculties of study and requested comments. The detailed comments had been received from FHSS, FMS and FOE in this respect. Thereafter, the final policy document was prepared considering these comments and tabled at the Senate Standing Committee on Quality Assurance (SSQA) held on 28.10.2021. This Policy was approved by the Senate on 25.11.2021 and Council on 13.01.2022. (Refer Annex VI).

Engaging students in quality assurance is an essential aspect of education to improve the students' learning experience in a university. Engaging with students and responding to their opinion allows the academics to improve the learning and teaching activities of a university. Further, the views and opinions of students will provide valuable information for the academic staff and the administrators of a university to take informed decisions that will improve the students' learning experience.

USJ recognizes the importance of student engagement in quality assurance and this policy is devised to provide a basis for the current activities in the USJ in this respect. Accordingly, this policy elaborates the USJ commitment to engage students in quality assurance activities and the mechanisms by which students could participate in quality assurance activities

**(b) Policy on Gender Equity and Equality:**

USJ Policy on Equality has been developed by the Centre for Gender Equity of USJ. It was approved by the Senate and uploaded to the CQA Website under 'Policies'. Refer to the web link <http://cqa.sjp.ac.lk/policies/>. This Policy was approved by the Senate on 25.11.2021 and Council on 13.01.2022. (Refer Annex VII).

**(c) Policy on Academic Ethics and Accountability:**

The final draft of the Policy on Academic Ethics and Accountability prepared the committee headed by Prof. Rasika Perera was presented at the Senate Sub Committee on Quality Assurance (SSQA) meeting of the University held on 06.12.2021. This Policy was approved by the Senate on 24.02.2022 (Refer Annex VIII). This policy covers principles of ethics and accountability for academic staff of USJ. Ethics and accountability are key factors that the society at large expects from any individual and more specifically from an academic in the University system. It is also of importance as students derive the basic tenets of ethical behavior and accountability in their educational experience and in their pursuit of knowledge taking the academic staff members as role models.

This policy document has been prepared as a generic document, which could be applied to any faculty of USJ. Upon reaching consensus of the faculties and the PIM for the main areas identified in this document, specific details would be discussed thereafter and added at the faculty level. Hence, the expectation of the Centre for Quality Assurance (CQA) is to develop a generic document where all could agree upon on the Principles of Academic Accountability. Thereafter, each faculty based on their specific requirements could suggest further improvements to this document. Accordingly, this policy will undergo three stages, as follows:

- Firstly, a common policy will be developed for the whole university
- Then specific details will be prepared by each faculty.
- Finally, a software will be developed for work load computation

This Policy covers the following areas.

- Ethics in the profession
- Ethical principles in university teaching
- Ethical principles in research
- Academic freedom and accountability
- Workload and work norms model

### **Workload and Work Norms Model:**

The Policy presents workload and work norms model in detail, which incorporates Teaching, Research and Contribution to University and National Development. Accordingly, all academic members of the University should be accountable for the workload carried out and the contribution made to research, university and national development and these should be reported annually to the Faculty/University.

# SUSTAINABILITY PROGRESS REPORT 2021

## UNIVERSITY OF SRI JAYEWARDENEPURA, CENTER FOR SUSTAINABILITY

Throughout the year of 2021 we continued to adapt to the new normal of living with the COVID-19 virus. Despite the challenges faced by all of us here in the University, sustainability remained a high priority and efforts continued to progress towards achieving the University goal of Net Zero. While assessing efficacy of projects and reporting on sustainability we always work towards the 17 UN SDGs and in 2021 the CFS was able to successfully report on and achieve accreditation in a wider range of goals than ever previously attempted. The results and progress updates on projects are detailed in the following report.

As in the previous year the report follows the methodology featured in the ‘Future Prospects on Sustainability: 2019’ Vision and Mission Statement, which outlines 6 key strategic sustainability area goals:

### **1. Learning and Education**

### **2. Research & Development: Research, Publications, Public Engagement, Creativity and Innovation**

### **3. People**

### **4. Infrastructure**

### **5. Outstanding Student Experience**

### **6. Lifelong Community, Social Responsibility, National Development & Global/Regional Impact**

All 7 of the strategic goals are aimed at covering one or more of the 17 UN SDGs. This report will provide evidence and examples of achievements within key objectives from each of the 7 strategic goals in addition to providing updates on UI Green Metric University Rankings in addition to other ways in which we, as a university, are on track to meet targets for 2021.

## **1. LEARNING & EDUCATION**

To inspire students to develop as competent global citizens with a pioneering, innovative, and independent personalities.

### Selected key Objectives:

- 1.1 Update our curricular on a regular basis incorporating graduate attributes and employability skills to strengthen our students to be globally competitive.
- 1.2 Ensure quality in all aspects of education and obtain world-class accreditation.
- 1.3 Develop each student's capacity to learn through enquiry and active learning approaches.

How these were achieved:

**1.1 – New Faculty and Course:** The Faculty of Urban and Aquatic Bioresources (FUAB), University of Sri Jayewardenepura is looking forward to welcoming the first batch of students to the faculty, for the academic year 2020/2021. The FUAB at University of Sri Jayewardenepura hopes to cater to the needs that will arise in the bioeconomy by creating graduates who will be capable of facing challenges presented by evolving environmental transformations, through sustainable utilization of urban and aquatic bioresources.

With this Faculty, the University comprises a total of ten Faculties. Snr. Prof. Pradeep Jayaweera, Acting Dean, FUAB, and the faculty staff members extend sincere thanks to everyone who contributed to making this a reality, especially, former Vice Chancellor, USJ, and the present Chairman, University Grants Commission, Snr. Prof. Sampath Amarathunge, Vice Chancellor, USJ, Snr.Prof. Sudantha Liyanage, Emeritus Prof. Gamini Senanayake, Lead Consultant for the FUAB, and other distinguished academics and officials for facilitating the establishment of this Faculty.

**1.2 – Accreditation:** The CFS has continued its efforts regarding sustainability ranking and accreditation. Focusing on 2 major international ranking organisations

- UI Green Metric Ranking
- Times Higher Education (THE) Impact Rankings

### UI Green Metric University World Rankings

The University achieved a world ranking of 538 out of 956 participants from 84 countries. The USJ has increased its overall ranking by 61 places since 2020. The 2021 ranking was based on a score of 5,250 points (4,525 in 2020) which is broken down into 6 categories. The scoring system allows us to analyse performance by category and identify areas for future improvement.



## UI Green Metric Data

2021 is the first year in the past 3 years where USJ rankings had improved, in addition to our national ranking increasing from 6<sup>th</sup> to 5<sup>th</sup> in the country for sustainability. Our position in the rankings continues to increase as a further 44 institutions took part in the rankings in 2021.



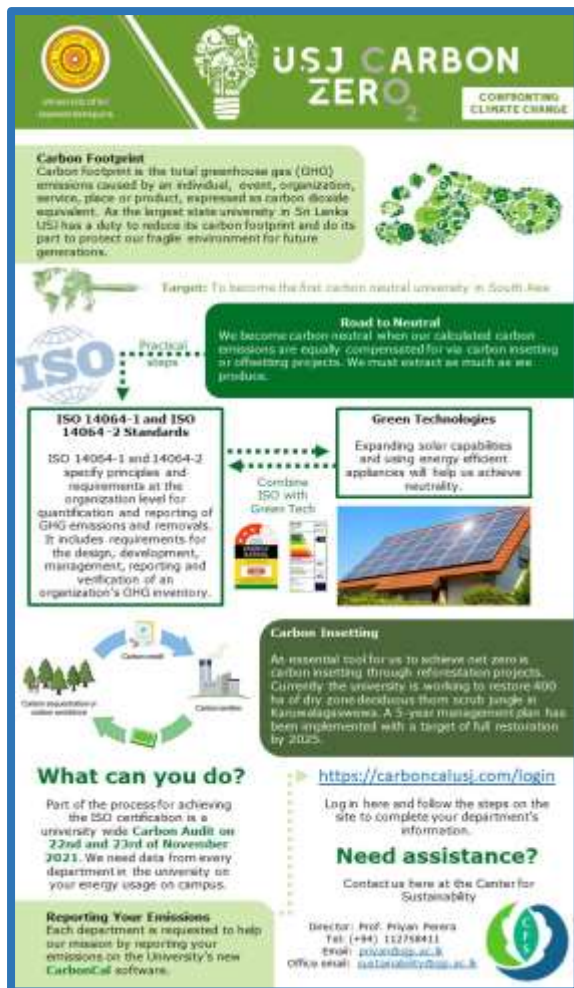
Figure 3.1 World Rankings History Diagram

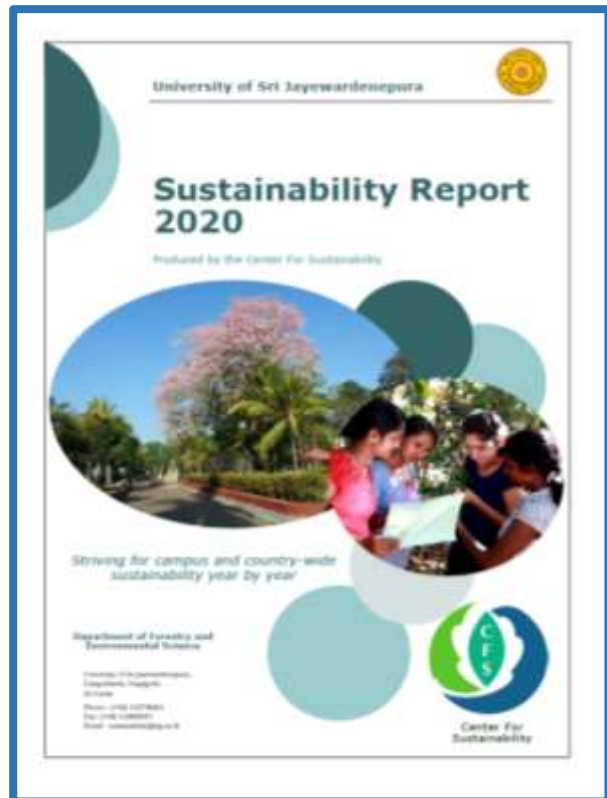

Higher rankings can be attributed to the university's dedication to the Net Zero carbon project which aims to offset the carbon produced on campus. Achievements have been made in this area through the continued reforestation works at the university's 3 main forest projects. Yagirala – Wet zone Tropical Rainforest, Ittapanna – Mangrove Forest and Karugalagaswewa – Mixed Dry Evergreen Forest.

The Center for Sustainability of University of Sri Jayewardenepura has also made significant developments in the process of achieving the ISO 14064 certification, while still ongoing, the initial audit has been completed and the process is well underway.



A further help towards improved rankings was the creation of the Carbon Management Team and the publication of the University's first annual Sustainability Report.



## Times Higher Education Impact Rankings

The Times Higher Education Impact Rankings are the only global performance tables that assess universities against the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Using carefully calibrated indicators to provide comprehensive and balanced comparisons across four broad areas: research, stewardship, outreach and teaching.

In 2020 the USJ participated in 4 goals for the THE Impact Rankings: No Poverty, Zero Hunger, Good Health and Wellbeing and Partnerships for the goals. In 2021 the CFS participated in an additional 4 goals bringing the total to 8. As a university we scored in the same group for overall even though we participated in 4 additional goals, this represents a great achievement.

The additional goals reported on were: Clean Water and Sanitation, Sustainable Cities and Communities, Climate Action, Life Below Water.

USJ is currently ranked 801-1000 out of a total of 1406 participating institutions.





**1.3 - Active approaches to learning:** Among the many examples of active learning on display at the USJ a primary example of this are the numerous workshops that were conducted online during 2021. Workshops were held on a broad range of topics to excite and entertain students and community members with active participation being encouraged. One example of a successful workshop in 2021 was the “How to manage a successful community service project”

How these were achieved:

## 2.1 - MOU between the USJ Faculty of Technology and CodeGen International (Pvt) Limited

The Faculty of Technology at the University of Sri Jayewardenepura and CodeGen International (Pvt) Limited, has signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) to collaborate on joint advanced research projects. These projects will include the development of high-performance construction infrastructure and novel energy harvesting devices. The collaboration is conducted at the Center for Industrial Technology Development Research at the Faculty of Technology. The MOU was signed at the Vice-Chancellor's Office on March 19, 2021, under the patronage of Senior Professor Sudantha Liyanage, Vice-Chancellor, University of Sri Jayewardenepura and Dr. Harsha Subasinghe, CEO, CodeGen International (Pvt) Limited and the founder of Vega Innovations. Professor Renuka Nilmini (Dean, Faculty of Technology), Dr. Asanka Weerasekara (Head, Department of Civil and Environmental Technology), Dr. Vikum Premalal (Department of Civil and Environmental Technology), Dr. Rohan Dassanayake (Department of Biosystems Technology), and Ms. Dinusha Mohanasunderam (Legal officer, CodeGen International (Pvt) Limited) also graced the occasion.

CodeGen is a world-renowned Technology company with the vision of "Transforming Tomorrow's World with cutting-edge Innovations." How these were achieved:

### **3.1 Sudarshana Suspension ayurvedic drug invented by USJ and UoC researchers commercialized by Japura UBL Cell**

The University of Sri Jayewardenepura (USJ) and the University Business Linkage Cell (UBL) made a giant stride towards research commercialization by commercializing its first research-based invention in its history, by transferring the technology through an exclusive license agreement to the industry. The product itself is a revolutionary ayurvedic medicine which will serve to improve the health and wellbeing of citizens across the country. It marks a great step forward in the commercialization of research and is the first of its kind for the USJ.

The pioneering collaboration between USJ and University of Colombo researchers, who worked tirelessly on the invention of “Sudarshana Suspension” for several years, ensuring the medicine met and exceeded all drug safety and efficacy standards. In a landmark partnership with Beam Hela Osu Lanka (Pvt) Ltd, the front running company in the field of ayurvedic and herbal drug manufacturing and distribution in Sri Lanka for more than 35 years, the drug will be brought to market and soon be available for use by the general public. The USJ Tech Transfer office (UBL Cell) facilitated the transition to market represents the first of its kind for both parties.

The transferring of IP through an exclusive licensing agreement between the two parties was held on 9th March 2021 at Vice Chancellor’s Office of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura. Present at the signing were Vice-Chancellor; Snr Prof. Sudantha Liyanage, The UBL Cell Director; Dr. Priyan Perera, Research Team members; Dr. Saroja Weerakoon (University of Colombo), Dr. Kamal Perera (University of Colombo), Prof. Thusharie Sugandhika (USJ), Prof. Dulanie Gunasekera (USJ), and the Executive Directors of Beam Hela Osu Lanka (Pvt) Ltd.

### **3.2 - International Conference on Innovation and Emerging Technologies 2021 (ICIET 2021)**

The Faculty of Technology (FOT) at the University of Sri Jayewardenepura (USJ) held their First International Conference on Innovation and Emerging Technologies 2021 (ICIET 2021) on November 25-26, 2021 under the theme “Technological transformation towards a smart future.” It was the first technology-based conference organized by USJ, providing an excellent

platform for students and researchers from Science, Technology and Engineering fields to showcase their research and innovations in front of a broader scientific community.

The ICIET 2021 featured highly reputed internationally renowned speakers who shared and discussed new developments and technological advancements that will impact the future of their fields of study. The opening keynote speaker for the ICIET 2021 was Dr. Mahesha Ranasoma, the CEO of Global Rubber Industries (GRI), Sri Lanka. The other two keynote speakers of the conference were Professor Keitaro Naruse, Robot Engineering Laboratory, School of Computer Science & Engineering, University of Aizu, Japan and Mr. Thomas Muller, Senior Vice President [Technical], Nestle Lanka PLC.

### 3.3 – Counselling Service

Department of Psychiatry, FMS, USJ provides counselling and mental health support, both at the clinical unit at CSTH and at the Department. Dr Ramani Perera, Clinical Psychologist and Senior Lecturer is available for counselling two days a week and students and staff can get services either by visiting the department on Tuesdays and by appointment. This of particular use during the ongoing restrictions placed upon society by the COVID-19 pandemic, in a time like this the need for mental health awareness is more prominent than ever before.

2021 will mark the third year for publishing water, waste and energy statistics and the sustainability report for 2021 aims to conform with international GRI reporting standards.

New Building Opening Ceremony of External Degrees and Extension Courses Unit at Ellawala Building was held on 04th of January 2021 at 9.45 am. Honorable Maha Sangha, the Vice-Chancellor of USJ; Senior Prof. Sudantha Liyanage, deans of the faculties, heads of departments, registrar of the university, academic and non-academic staff members participated in the ceremony.



The building contains a number of sustainability features which are designed to reduce energy consumption such as large, ventilated areas to keep temperatures naturally cool and Glass panel walls to allow maximum natural light.

## **Department of Forestry to Develop Mangrove Resource Center at Ittapana using Citizens Development Business Finance Funding.**

The Citizens Development Business Finance PLC has come on board to support the establishment of the new Mangrove Resource Center of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura. Accordingly, an MoU was signed on 27-12-2022 between the Citizens Development Business Finance PLC and the Center for Sustainability of the Department of Forestry and Environmental Science, the University of Sri Jayewardenepura to set up this new Mangrove Resource Center at Ittapana, Kalutara District under the financial assistance of CDB Finance PLC. The new Mangrove Resource Center will be established in the 2-acre property donated by Dr. B.M.S. Batagoda.

The funding, which totals LKR 2.5 million, will contribute to a new, state of the art, research center built with green designs and technologies, which will serve the local and international community alike and spread awareness about the fragility and importance of mangrove habitats.

### **5.1 – Faculty of Technology receives a Norwegian grant for the development of research-based education for renewable energy technology in the circular economy**

Norwegian Directorate for Higher Education and Skills allocates approximately NOK 178 million to 26 projects, including NOK 23 million for 67 full degree master scholarships. It is a pleasure to inform that one of the project proposals from Department of Civil and Environmental Technology, Faculty of Technology, has been accepted for NORPART-2021.

NORPART-2021/10175

*Project Title: Instituting of research-based education systems for the development of renewable energy technology in circular economy; A joint project among the Universities in Norway, Nepal, Bangladesh and Sri Lanka.*

The main goal of the project is to strengthen the research-based education system in higher education emphasizing circular economy and renewable energy technology through the Global –North and Global South-South-South Partnership. The partners in project are University of South-Eastern Norway (USN), Kathmandu University (KU), Nepal, University of Sri Jayewardenepura (USJ), Sri Lanka and Shahjalal University of Science and Technology (SUST), Bangladesh.

The expected results from project are 3 research-based elective courses, 1 MSc program, student mobility of 28 master and 6 PhD students from south-north and 8 master and 2 PhD students from north-south (50% females), 20 guest lecturing, 20 staff motilities, 30 joint publications, 24 joint master's thesis supervision, 2 online training courses. 500 students will be benefitted during the project period.

## **5.2 – Alumni association of USJ provide necessities to students in hostels due to Covid travel restrictions**

The necessities of the students in USJ hostels due to Covid travel restrictions are constantly being provided by USJ Alumni members. They continue to help students with dry food and hygiene requirements.

## **5.3 – National and International Sports Achievements by USJ Students in 2021**

Ms. Tharindu Dasun from the Department of Sports Science, Faculty of Applied Science won the silver medal in High Jump (2.08m) at 99<sup>th</sup> National Athletic Championship.

Mr. Jude Supun was selected to represent the National Football team of Sri Lanka who will be participating in the qualifying rounds of the FFFA world cup 2022 and the AFC Asian cup 2023.

### **Gymnastics**

## OVERALL FINANCIAL REVIEW

Bursar –Mrs. K.T.C. Priyangani

The Financial statement of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura for the financial year ending 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021 have been prepared in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards. The systems of financial controls have been maintained as far as practicable to ensure propriety of transactions and efficiency in expenditure.

In 2021, the University of Sri Jayewardenepura had been allocated 949 Mn (2020: 1919 Mn) as the capital grant and Rs.5395 Mn (2020:4975 Mn) as the recurrent grant. We were able to utilize and manage the limited funding allocation to achieve the goal of the university when adhering to the financial management regulations.

### **Opportunity, Risk and Challenges**

In 2021, the COVID-19 pandemic has provided enormous challenges and opportunities to the university in responding and adapting to an environment of online delivery of courses, small numbers of students on university. Since 2020, COVID-19 Outbreak has created disruption for our operation and our key stakeholders such as Students, Suppliers and others. As a result of closure of universities and impose of the curfew we have face various challenges. University admission, examination, graduation ceremony, recruitments were temporally postponed. In that Context University started academic and other administrative activities with the help of technologies and applications and university has moved more into digital work to provide a value-added services to its stakeholders.

Online meetings, becoming paperless and digital management systems, resulted in improved efficiency, transparency, and flexibility. Recognizing the benefits of remote working, adopting healthy practices, promoting innovation to address Covid-19, staff development in digital literacy skills for re-structuring teaching, learning and assessment were executed concurrently.

Looking back, the year 2021 has not been at all what we would have imagined. The COVID-19 pandemic has marked everything. We have lived through unimaginable experiences. However the advance in the digital competencies has increased and thanks to technologies we have been able to fulfil the requirement of our stakeholders through digital transformation.

## **Fixed Assets Register**

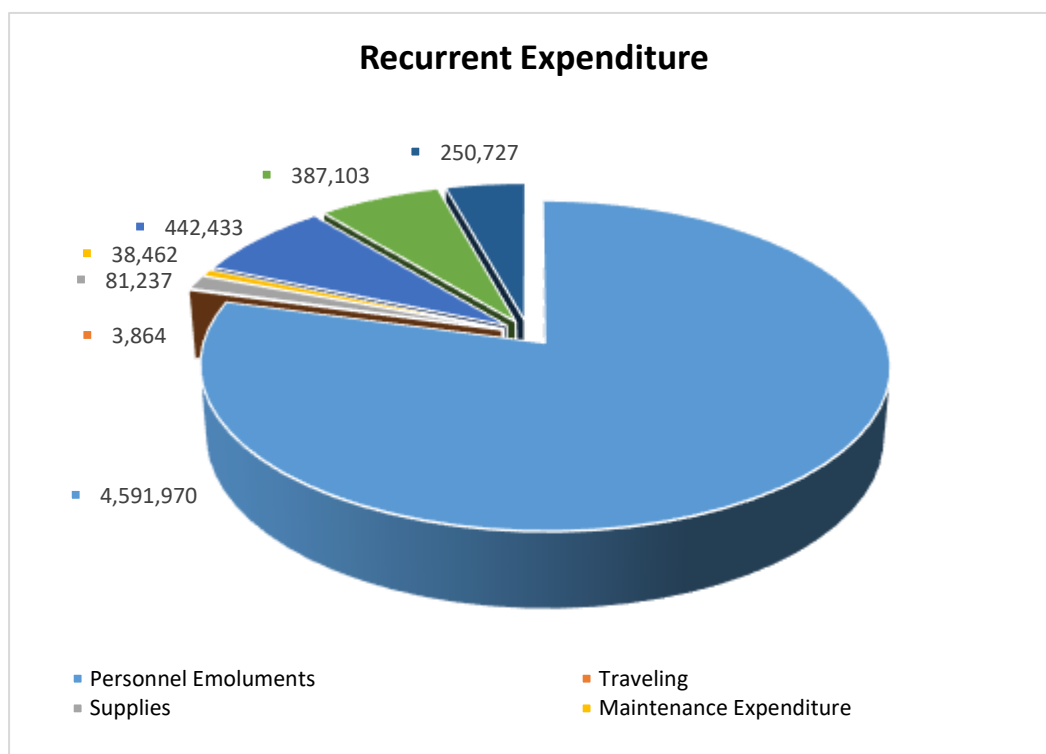

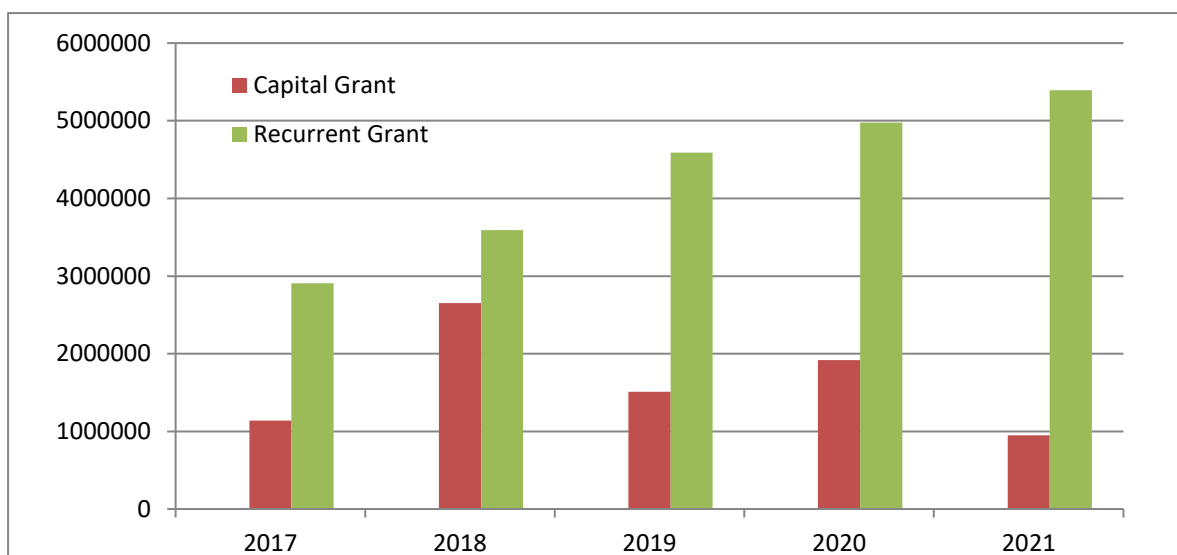

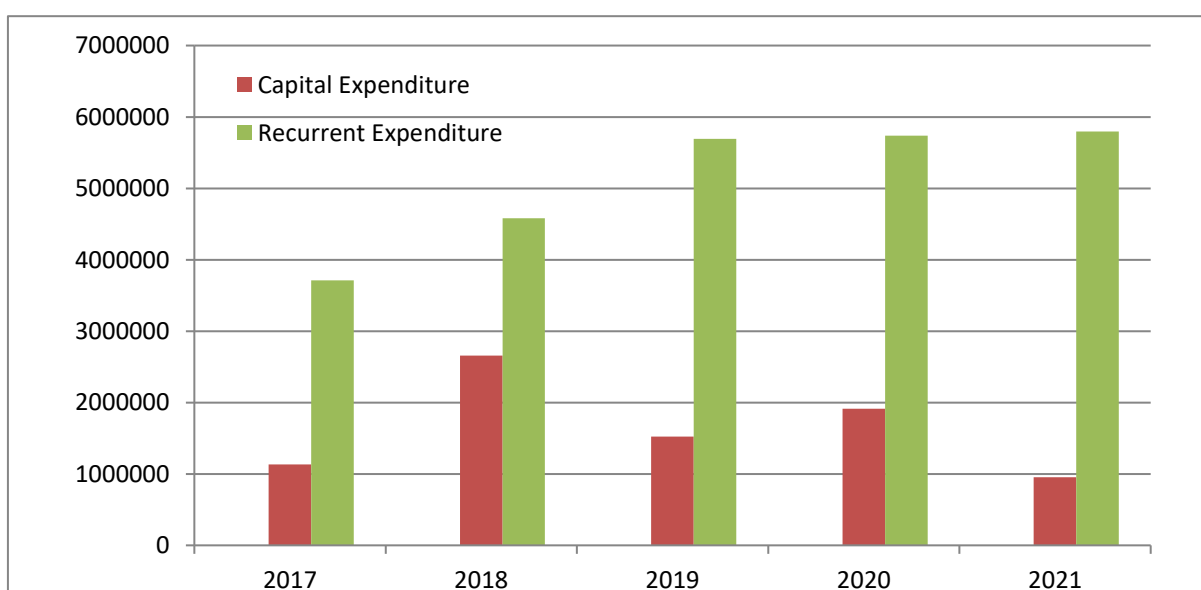

## SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNT POLICIES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS – 2021

### 1. Reporting Entity

University of Sri Jayewardenepura (The University) has been incorporated under the Universities Act No.16 of 1978 and subsequent amendments thereto. The University has eight faculties and External Extension Course unit. The Main Administrative location of the University is at Gangodawila, Nugegoda, Sri Lanka while Faculty of Technology and Faculty of Engineering are located at Mahenwatta, Pitipana, Homagama and No 41, Lumbini Mawatha, Rathmalana, Sri Lanka respectively. The University is under the purview of Ministry of Education and University Grants Commission of Sri Lanka. Financial operation are decentralized within the faculties while Financial Statements are preparing amalgamating all faculties' financial information.

#### 1.1. Date of authorization for issue

The Financial Statements of the University were authorized for issue by the Council dated on 24.02.2022.

#### 1.2. Reporting period

The financial period of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura (University) represent from 01<sup>st</sup> January 2021 to 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021.

### 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

#### 2.1 Statement of compliance

The Financial Statements of the University have been prepared and presented in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards (SLPSAS's). However Sri Lanka Accounting Standards also have been used in the areas where no Public Sector Accounting Standards are available. These Financial Statements comprise the statement of Financial Position, Statement of Financial Performance, Statement of Cash flows, Changes in equity and Notes to the Financial Statements.

#### 2.2 Basis of measurement

The Financial Statements of the University have been prepared on the accrual basis and apply consistently. No adjustments have been made for inflation factors. The financial transaction are recorded on historical cost convention except subsequent g recognition of the Assets on revaluation basis , reported in 2.12 and retirement benefit obligation reported in 2.19 of Summary of significant accounting policies to the financial statements.

### **2.3 Comparative information**

All accounting policies adopted by the University are applied consistently with those of the previous year, where necessary comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to the changes, in presentation of current year figures.

### **2.4 Materiality and aggregation**

Each material class of similar items have presented separately in the financial statements. Items of dissimilar nature or function have presented separately unless they are immaterial.

### **2.5 Offsetting**

Assets and liabilities, revenue and expenses have not been offset unless required or permitted by SLPSAS.

### **2.6 Going concern**

The University has assessed the ability to continue as a going concern. The council of University has a reasonable expectation that the University has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. University does not foresee a need for liquidation or cessation of operations, taking into account all available information about future. Accordingly the University continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

### **2.7 Events after the reporting period**

Event After the reporting date are those events, both favorable and unfavorable, that occur between the reporting date and the date when the Financial Statement are authorized for issue. Two types of events can be identified.

- a. Those events provide evidence of conditions that existed at the reporting (adjusting events after reporting date)
- b. Those are indicative of the condition that arose after the reporting date (non adjusting events after reporting date)

All material events after reporting date have been considered and where appropriate adjustments or disclosures have been made in the Financial Statements.

### **2.8 Functional & presentation currency**

Items included in the financial statements of the University are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the University operates (the functional currency). These financial statements are prepared and presented in 'Sri Lankan Rupees' (Rs.), which is the University's functional and presentation currency.

### **2.9 Transaction of foreign currencies and balances**

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions or valuation where item are re measured. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at year end exchange



rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognized in the income statement.

## **2.10 Rounding**

The amounts in financial statements have been rounded-off to the nearest rupee, except otherwise indicated as permitted by the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

## **2.11 Budgetary Controls**

The program budget of the University has been prepared in line with the financial regulations and guideline issued by the Treasury and University Grants Commission (UGC). University strictly restricted to the block allocation given by the treasury instead of the actual requirement according to the corporate plan of the University. University has not been given actual requirement of the funds for a particular year. Therefore, additional budgetary allocation may arise during the year or commitments for the expenditure may arise for the end of the financial year.

Budgets covers the fiscal period of 1<sup>st</sup> of January 2021 to 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021 prepare accordance with the guidelines issued by the UGC. Statement of compression of budgets and actual amounts has been attached in the schedule.

## **2.12 Property, Plant & Equipment (PPE)**

The University's Property Plant & Equipment (PPE) includes Land, Buildings, Laboratory and Teaching Equipment, Office Equipment, Furniture & Fittings, Library Books and Periodicals, Motor Vehicles, Cloaks, Sport Goods and Other Assets.

### **a. Basis of recognition**

Property, Plant and Equipment are recognized if it is probable that future economic benefits associate with the item will flow to the entity and the cost of the item can be reliably measured.

#### **i) Initial recognition**

Property, Plant & Equipment are initially recognized at cost including the cost of purchase with any incidental expenses incurred in bringing the assets to its working conditions, for its intend use, Subsequent to initial Recognition and PPE are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses.

#### **ii) Subsequent expenditure on existing Property, Plant & Equipment**

Expenditure incurred on tangible PPE is charged to the Statement of Financial Performance in the period it is incurred, unless it meets one of the following

criteria, in which case it is capitalized and depreciated over the relevant useful life time.

- Increase in the capacity of the asset.
- Substantial improvement in the quality of output or reduction in operating cost.
- Significant extension of the life of the asset beyond that confirmed by repair and maintenance.
- Market value of PPE has subsequently increased.
- Expenditure incurred on repairs or maintenance of property, plant and equipment in order to restore or maintain the future economic benefits expected from originally assessed standard of performance, is recognized as an expense when incurred.

iii) **Measurement after recognition**

**Cost model**

After recognition all the PPE except the classes of Land, Buildings, Motor Vehicles, Laboratory and Teaching Equipment, Sports Goods, Other Equipment and Furniture & Fittings are carried at its cost less accumulated Depreciation.

**Revaluation model**

After initial recognition below classes of PPE whose fair value can be measured reliably has been carried at revalued amounts, which is fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses. The University policy is to revalue the below assets through department of Valuation of Sri Lanka, Valuation Department of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura or by independent committees appointed by the University.

Carrying value of PPE and intangible assets are reviewed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment if any such indications exist, then the assets recoverable amount is estimated. An impairment loss is recognized if the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount. Impairment losses are recognized in the statement of financial performances.

iv) **Library Books & Cloaks**

Cost of Library books and Cloaks are depreciated on the straight line basis over a period of 5 years.

v) **Intangible assets**

Computer software and online journals and E- books have been recognized as intangible assets when it is probable that future economic benefits that are



attributable to the assets will flow the enterprise and the cost of the asset can be measured reliably. Intangible assets acquired are stated at cost less accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses. These costs are amortized over their estimated useful lives. Useful lives and residual values are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted if appropriate.

vi) **Buildings rented out for outside parties.**

The University has rented out part of the some of the buildings to outside parties to operate student cafeteria and other. These properties are not classified as investment properties since these properties are not held either to earn rentals or capital appreciation. Accordingly, these properties are also classified as PPE in the statements of financial position.

**b. Depreciation**

Depreciation is recognized in the statement of Financial Performance on the straight line basis on each component of an item of PPE other than freehold land.

Depreciation of an asset begins when it is available for use and ceases at the earlier of the date that the asset is classified as held for sale and the date that the asset is de-recognized.

The assets residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period, assets carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount and gain / (Loss) is recognized in the statements of comprehensive income.

### **c. Derecognition**

The carrying amount of PPE is derecognized at the disposal or when no future economic benefits or service potential is expected from its use or disposal. The gain or loss arising from the derecognition shall be included in surplus or deficit when the item is derecognized.

## **2.13 Financial Assets**

### **Investment**

Investments represent investment in fixed deposits and savings accounts. These investments have been accounted in compliance with SLFRS 09. The investments in fixed deposits and savings accounts have been classified at amortized cost as per SLFRS 09. They are initially measured at fair value and subsequently measured at fair value less amortized cost by using effective interest rate as required by SLFRS 09.

### **Staff Loan**

The staff loan includes distress loan, computer loan, publication loan, vehicle loan and other staff loans. The staff loans have been classified as financial assets at amortized cost as per SLFRS 09. Impairment losses in any staff loan have been recognized on expected lost method as stipulated in SLFRS 09. Loans given from the University provident fund to the employees are directly administered by the University Grants commission. Therefore, it is not included in the University account.

## **2.14 Capital work-in-progress**

Capital expenses incurred on PPE which are not completed as at the reporting date are shown as Capital Work-in-Progress and cost incurred on Capital Work-in-progress is transferred to PPE when it is available for use. Mobilization advances paid for the Construction of these buildings are shown as advances till the set off from progressive bills.

## **2.15 Current assets**

Current Assets classified in Statement of Financial Position are those which are expected to be realized in, or consumption in, in the University's normal operating cycle, expected to be realized within twelve months after the reporting date or cash or a cash equivalent.

## **2.16 Inventories**

Inventories which are for consumption and not for resale are stated at cost and determined on First in First out (FIFO) basis.

## **2.17 Advances to staff and receivables**

Advances to staff and receivable comprise, festival advance and book allowances.

## **2.18 Cash & cash equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents are defined as cash in hand, demand deposits and short term highly liquid investments readily convertible to known amounts of cash and subject to insignificant risk of change in value. For the purpose of cash flow statement, cash & cash equivalent includes cash in hand and deposits in banks. Investments with short term maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition are also treated as cash equivalents. The cash flow statement is prepared based on the indirect method.

## **2.19 Revenue Recognition – Treasury and Other Grants**

The Government grant for recurrent expenditure, income of research grant and projects, other academic assignments have been recognized as revenue when they are received and other revenue are recognized on accrual basis.

### **2.19.1 Accounting for government grants**

Grant Received from the treasury and the other agencies have been recorded and accounted in accordance with Lanka accounting standard (LKAS) 20 accounting for government grants.

### **2.19.2 Recurrent grant**

Recurrent grants are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on cash basis. In addition to that grants received and spent for rehabilitation of PPE, research and human capital development also recognize as recurrent grant in the statement of financial performance.

### **2.19.3 Contribution to capital outlay from outside grants**

The value of PPE purchased out of generated funds & various project funds have been shown as “Contribution to Capital Outlay from outside Grants”. Balance of the capital outlay account is amortized over the useful life of the assets purchased.

### **2.19.4 Capital grants and Donations**

Grants and Donations received by the way of treasury and other lending agencies to purchase Property Plant and Equipment have presented in the Financial Statements in accordance with the Lanka (LKAS) 20 Government Grants. Accordingly it has been recognized as deferred income in the statement of financial position and amortized over the useful life of the asset. Capital grants for construction and new works are recognized either as work in progress or Capital Assets where necessary. Capital grants received to purchase assets for research purpose also recognize as deferred income.

### **2.19.5 Internally restricted funds**

Internally restricted funds include funds committed for specific purpose. Faculty Development Funds represent the cumulative position of Faculties/Departments Funds with net unspent balances at the year end.

### **2.19.6 Endowment fund**

Endowment funds include restricted donations received by the University. Investment returns generated from endowment funds are used in accordance with the various purpose established by the donors.

### **2.19.7 Outside Research Grants**

Various Grants received for research activities are recorded and considered. As a separate project. Funds are utilized as per the agreement with donor agency and the governing board of the University. Research projects have been disclosed under liability in the financial statements. When the research is completed remaining funds will be remitted to donor or in the case of not acceptance the balance, the amount will be consider as University income after three years of completion.

## **2.20 Employee benefits**

### **Defined contribution plans**

Employees are eligible for University Provident Fund (UPF) Contributions, Employees' Trust Fund (ETF) and University Pension Fund. Contributions is in line with the respective statutes and regulations. The University pays fixed contributions on basic emoluments plus Cost of Living allowances, academic allowances and monthly compensation allowances of employees to the University Provident Fund and Employees' Trust Fund, University Pension Fund and will have no legal or constructive obligation to pay further amounts. This obligation falls within the scope of the defined contribution plan SLPSA 19 on employment benefit. Obligation for contribution to define contribution plan are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performances as the related service is provided.

### **Defined benefit plans**

Defined benefit plans are post-employment plans other than defined contribution plans. The University is liable to pay gratuity in terms of the Payment of Gratuity Act No. 12 of 1983.

## **2.21 Liabilities and provisions**

### **Current liabilities**

Current Liabilities are stated at their book value.

### **Provisions**

Provisions are recognized when the University has present obligations (legal and constructive) as a result of a past event, where it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

### **2.21.1 Define benefit obligations**

In accordance with the Gratuity Act No. 12 of 1983, a liability arises for a defined benefit obligation to employees. Such defined benefit obligation is a post-employment benefit obligation falling within the scope of Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting SLPSAS 19 Employee Benefit. The liability recognized in the Statement of Financial Position is the present value of the defined benefit obligation at the reporting date. The calculation is performed annually by a qualified actuary using the projected unit credit method (PUC). Remeasurement of the defined benefit liability, which comprises actuarial

gains and losses are recognized immediately in the statement of financial performances. The University recognizes the increase in defined benefit liability attribute to the services provided by employees during the year (current service cost) in profit or loss together with interest expenses. The discount rate has been derived considering the yield of government bonds.

#### **Accounting Estimate**

The actuarial valuation involves making assumptions about discount rates, expected rates of return on assets, future salary increase and mortality rates, due to the long term nature of the obligation, such estimates are subject to significant uncertainty.

### **2.21.2 Contingent liabilities and contingent assets**

Contingent assets and liabilities have been accounted in accordance with SLPSAS8. Accordingly a contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events whose existence will be continued by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the program or a present obligation that is not recognized because it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation.

A contingent liability also arises in extremely rare cases where there is a liability that cannot be measured reliably. The uncertainty does not recognize a contingent liability but disclose its existence in the financial statement.

A contingent asset is a possible asset that arises from past events whose existence will be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the University. The University does not recognize contingent asset but discloses its existence where inflow of economic benefits are probable but not virtually certain.

## **2.22 Revenue recognition**

### **2.22.1 Income from fee levying courses**

Income from fee levying courses and other activities are recognized on accrual basis over the period of the course and degree programmes.

### **2.22.2 Finance income**

Interest income is recognized on accrual basis using effective interest rate method according to SLFRS 09 due to the absence of SLPSAS for accounting of interest income.

### **2.22.3 Recoveries from Violation of Bonds**

Amounts received from bond violators and amount recovered from their UPF and Gratuity are recognized as income on cash basis and create respective fund of bond violation. The fund will be utilized for research activities and innovation, staff development as per the direction of the University Grants Commission

#### **2.22.4 Expenditure recognition**

Expenses incurred in carrying out all activities of the University are recognized on an accrual basis and charged to the statement of Financial Performance

### **2.23 Taxes**

#### **Income Tax**

University is not liable to pay income tax on its income of the ordinary course of the business as University is considered as an exempt organization as per the Inland Revenue at no.24 of 2017 and amendments there to.

#### **Advance Personal Income Tax (APIT)/Advance Income Tax**

The University deduct Advance Personal Income Tax (APIT) as per the consent of the employee on primary income and secondary income and remit the deducted amount to the Department of Inland Revenue. Further Advance Income Tax (AIT) is deducted from rent payment or any other services on the request of the rent owners or suppliers and remit deducted amount to the Department of Inland Revenue

#### **Stamp Duty**

Stamp Duty is deducted on payments as per the Stamp Duty act and remit the deducted values to the Department of Inland Revenue.

The University add here to the changes in tax laws in the country and tax is charged accordingly.

### **2.24 Statement of cash flows**

The cash flow statement has been prepared by using The Indirect Method in accordance with the SLPSAS 2 whereby gross cash receipts and gross cash payments of operating activities, finance activities and investing activities have been recognized. Cash and cash equivalents comprise short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

#### **2.24.1 Accelerating Higher education Expansion Development Operation (AHEAD) and Science and Technology Human Resource Development Project (STHRD)**

AHEAD project is operated by the University for which funds are allocated by the Ministry of Higher Education under the World Bank funding and STHRD project is operated by the University for which funds are allocated by the Ministry of Higher Education under the Asian Development Bank. Funds allocated for the projects are not included in the annual budget of the University and directly disburse through the ministry. Therefore financial transactions of this project are not included in the financial statements of the University other than the disclosed in notes to the financial statements.

### Capital Commitment

1. Urban Development Authority handed over the procession of the land Mahahenwatta Pitipana, Homagama, 20 acres to the University of Sri Jayewardenepura, to construct a building for the Faculty of Technology. Value of the land is Rs. 960 million and payment will be made by the Ministry of Higher Education. The land will be recorded as an asset to the Financial Statement of the University after the transfer of ownership of the land.
2. Divisional secretariat of Homagama, handed over the procession of the land called Kakunagahawatta of No. 587, Matthegoda, Homagama, 10 acres to the University of Sri Jayewardenepura, to construct a building for Faculty of Engineering. Value of the land is Rs.975 million and paid by the Ministry of Land in year 2020. The land will be recorded as an asset to the Financial Statement of the University after the transfer of ownership of the land.
3. The University has deposited Rs.13 million in Kesbewa divisional Secretariat to acquire the land at 4<sup>th</sup> Lane, Egodawatta Road, Borrelesgamuwa. Value of the land is estimated to Rs.52 million. Process of acquisition is being carried out by the University.
4. Maharagama Divisional Secretariat has handed over the possession of the land of Hemavimana, Sorath Mawatha, Gangodawila on 20.03.2014 and The Government Valuer has valued the land as Rs.0.5 million per perch. Extent of the land is 167 perches and estimate value is Rs.83.5 Million. However payment has not been settled due to the pending matter in compensation review committee (land acquisition) under the Ministry of Land with the land owner due to the disagreement of land value, valued by The Government Valuer.
5. The University has paid of Rs.74 million to the Western Province Council to relocate the Methsewana home at Rattanapitiya to Sunflower Village at Mulleriyawa. Out of the land extend of 10 Acres of Methsewana Land, 3.5 acres handed over the procession to the University and Faculty of Medical Science has been established. The University has taken step to acquire the remaining land and the land will be recorded as an asset to the Financial Statement of the University after the transfer of ownership of the land.



6. Project of proposed extension to anatomy building for the department of Pathology Faculty of Medical Sciences commenced in year 2021 and contract awarded value is Rs.151 million to the GDP Engineering (Pvt) Ltd. Out of the total contract value, Rs.38 million as mobilization advance and Rs.21 million as progressive bills were paid in year 2021. The project is funded by the AHEAD project operated under the Ministry of Higher Education.
7. Project of Installation of Computer Network System for the Faculty of Technology was awarded in year 2021 to the Luminex (Pvt) Ltd. Total project value is Rs.60 million and Rs.13 million was paid as mobilization advance in year 2021.
8. Project of renovation of Sumangala Reading Hall was awarded in year 2021 to the Mode Engineering (Pvt) Ltd. Rs.16 million was paid during the year 2021 out of total award contract value of Rs.40 million. The project is funded by the AHEAD Grant and earnings of University of Sri Jayewardenepura.
9. Other major rehabilitation projects worth Rs.181 million awarded in year 2021 and capital commitment is Rs.122 million as at 31.12.2021. Detail information are attached in sub schedules no.27

1. Vice Chancellor, Deans of the faculties and two Senate members are members of the Council of the University. Remuneration and other income paid to these members during the year of 2021 was Rs.78,787,563.72.
2. Post Graduate Institute of Management (PIM) located No 28, Lesly Ranagala Mawatha, Colombo 08 is a Post graduate institution incorporated under the separate incorporated act and affiliated to the University of Sri Jayewardenepura. The Director of the Post Graduate Institute is a member to the Senate of the University and authorization of the academic activities are carried out by the Senate of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura. Financial operation of the institute are governed by the Board of management of the Institute. Accordingly financial transactions of the Post Graduate Institute of Management are not recoded to the University of Sri Jayewardenepura.

3. Mr.Sujeewa Rajapakse a member of council, Finance Committee, and Chairman to the Audit and Management Committee of the University is the Chairman of the Peoples Bank which the University has invested Rs 2,888,645,654/- on fixed deposits, Rs.9,372,096/- on saving deposits and 19 no of current accounts are maintained.
4. University transactions are mainly funded by the General Treasury of Sri Lanka and the amount of fund received and expenditure incurred are shown in the Financial Statements.  
Transaction dealt with other government organization were arm's length transitions and there were no direct or indirect interest with the university.

The remaining balance of the grant was received for the different projects and those projects are continuing and will be capitalized after the completion of the projects.

5. Rs.347 Million worth of Land and Building situated in Kalubowila which belongs to the University of Sri Jayewardenepura is currently used by University of Visual Art and Performing. Action has been taken by the University to get back the said property from the University of Visual and Performance.
6. Approval of the Cabinet of Ministry was granted on 13<sup>th</sup> February 2014 to carryout project worth Rs.618 million under the Urban Department Project for the construction of an International level Conference Hall, Gymnasium and Sports Complex with a Swimming Pool. Rs.5,794,676 payment has been paid in year 2016 to Central Engineering Consultancy Bureau (CECB) for consultancy fee and preparation of plans. Budgetary allocation has not been received and project could not be able to start. The University has made continuous follow up for getting budgetary allocation to implement this project.
7. Revaluation of class of Lab and Teaching Equipment, Office Equipment, Computer Accessories, Furniture Fittings and Other Equipment are carried out by the Department of Valuation of University of Sri Jayewardenepura to the balance sheet date of 31.12.2021. The revaluated assets will be capitalized in year 2022.
8. Impairment loss on intangible asset due to unusable software which was included in the intangible assets.
9. Chemicals and Glassware stock verification is carried out by the University to the balance sheet date of 31.12.2021 and stock value will be adjusted to the Financial Statements in year 2022.

# AUDIT COMMITTEE REPORT

## Audit Committee Report

### Introduction

The Audit Committee appointed for the year 2021 comprises of three non-Executive, Independent Governing Council Members of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura (University) under the provisions made on paragraph 7.4.1 of Public Enterprises Guideline for Good Governance.

In the year 2021, four (04) Audit Committee meetings were held with the participation of the Registrar, Bursar and the relevant Administrative Staff at the invitation. The Superintendent of Audit of the University' who is the representative of the Auditor General of Sri Lanka was also in attendance. In addition, the Internal Auditor of the University Grants Commission also participated all the meetings. The Audit Committee performs its duties according to the scope specified in the Public Enterprises Guidelines for Good Governance and makes recommendations to strengthen the Internal Control Systems on the Financial Management and improve the Administration procedures in the University.

### Progress

During the Year under review, the Audit Committee has made several recommendations, directions and proposals which have paved the way towards strengthening the internal controls and processes of the University including the following,

- a) ensure financial statement's integrity,
- b) ensure that the University has an adequate system of internal controls to safeguard its assets,
- c) ensure that the University maintains a system to monitor compliance with laws and regulations including relevant accounting and financial reporting standards,
- d) overall supervision of the internal audit functions and approve the Internal Audit plan for the year,

Important matters carried out during the year under review are summarized as follows.

- Reviewed, evaluated and made recommendations based on Internal Audit Reports during the year under review including the reports of the seven faculties, which were issued by the Internal Audit Division of the University,
- Liaised with the Auditor General's representative and directed the officers and Internal Auditors of the University to take follow-up actions on weaknesses and lapses highlighted on audit queries and reports of the Auditor General,
- Continuously monitored the responses submitted in relation to audit queries and its follow up actions,
- Continuously monitored the recovery process of violation of bonds and agreements,

- Reviewed, evaluated and made recommendations to improve the systems and internal controls on human resource development, employee attendance, inventory and stock verification, hostel charges and dues, capital contract administration, research grants, procurements, payroll management, financial management, assets management, contractual services recruitments promotions payment of retiring benefits, violation of bonds and agreements environmental management etc.,
- The Internal Audit Division has completed its Annual Audit Plans in addition to completing its compulsory routine pre-audit activities as summarized below, for the year 2021,

# AUDITOR GENERAL'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31.12.2021

## University of Sri Jayewardenepura - 2021

### 1. Opinion

#### 1.1 Qualified Opinion

The audit of the financial statements of the University of Sri Jayawardenepura for the year ended 31 December 2021 comprising the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2021 and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in equity and cash flow statement for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies, was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154 (1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read in conjunction with the provisions in Subsection 107 (5) of the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978 and National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018. My comments and observations which I consider should be reported to Parliament appear in this report.

In my opinion, except the effects of the matters described in paragraph 1.5 of this report the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the University as at 31 December 2021 and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

#### 1.2 Basis for Opinion

My opinion is qualified based on the matters described in paragraph 1.5 of this report.

I conducted my audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards (SLAuSs). My responsibilities, under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of my report. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

#### 1.3 Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of financial statements that give a true and fair view in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards, and for such internal control as management determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the University's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intend to liquidate the University or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the University's financial reporting process.

As per Section 16(1) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, the University is required to maintain proper books and records of all its income, expenditure, assets and liabilities, to enable annual and periodic financial statements to be prepared of the University.

#### **1.4 Auditors Responsibility for the Audit of the Financial Statements**

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My objective is to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the University's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of the management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the University's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the University to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.



The scope of the audit also extended to examine as far as possible, and as far as necessary the following;

- Whether the organization, systems, procedures, books, records and other documents have been properly and adequately designed from the point of view of the presentation of information to enable a continuous evaluation of the activities of the University and whether such systems, procedures, books, records and other documents are in effective operation;
- Whether the University has complied with applicable written law, or other general or special directions issued by the governing body of the University;
- Whether the University has performed according to its powers, functions and duties; and
- Whether the resources of the University had been procured and utilized economically, efficiently and effectively within the time frames and in compliance with the applicable laws.

## **1.5 Audit Observation on Preparation of Financial Statements**

### **1.5.1 Internal Control over the preparation of financial statements**

Entities are required to "devise and maintain" a system of internal accounting controls sufficient to provide reasonable assurance that , transactions are executed in accordance with management's general or specific authorization, transactions are recorded as necessary to permit preparation of financial statements in conformity with the applicable reporting standards , and to maintain accountability for assets, access to assets is permitted only in accordance with management's general or specific authorization, and the recorded accountability for assets is compared with the existing assets at reasonable intervals and appropriate action is taken with respect to any differences.

## 2 Financial Review

### 2.1 Financial Result

The operations for the year under review had been a surplus of Rs. 234,117,456 as compared with the corresponding a deficit of Rs. 146,550,951 for the preceding year, thus indicating an improvement of Rs.380,668,407 in the financial result. Increase in government grant had been the main reason for the said improvement.

- (h) The Research and Publication Committee had given approval for 459 different researches of 453 lecturers in the University at estimated cost of Rs. 868 million during the period of 06 years till the end of the year under review. Out of that, 34 researches were suspended due to withdrawals and non-taking of funds and 193 researches worth of Rs.454.3 million were not completed by the end of the year under review. Due to the corona epidemic situation, there were obstacles in carrying out the research works and the progress of the research was monitored by the University Research Committee and recommendations are made accordingly. Thus reminders have been sent to the researches which are not progressing and have not been completed and the release of new research grants has been stopped on them. Action should be taken to complete researches within the relevant time frame.
