## Vice Chancellor's Message



It is with great pleasure I present the Annual Report of the University of Colombo for the year 2021.

The University was ranked 1<sup>st</sup> among the Sri Lankan universities during February and July 2021 in the Webometrics Rankings. The Times Higher Education World University Rankings placed the University of Colombo within the top 801 – 1000<sup>th</sup> universities among 1600 universities in 99 countries. Additionally, the university was ranked within 401 – 500<sup>th</sup> universities in clinical, pre-clinical and health, 1001+ in Physical Sciences and 601+ in Social Sciences subject categories.

On 21<sup>st</sup> January 2021, the University of Colombo inaugurated the centenary celebrations of its Faculties of Arts, Science and the Library. The formal ceremony marked the inauguration of the centenary celebrations of the University of Colombo which was followed by a series of events organized by the Departments, Units, the Institutes, the Faculties of Arts & Science and the University Library throughout the year.

During the year, Sri Lanka faced the COVID19 pandemic and the UOC was catalyzed into digital transformation for continual service providing by online meetings, becoming paperless and digital management systems, resulted in improved efficiency, transparency and flexibility. Recognizing benefits of remote working, adopting healthy practices, promoting innovation to address Covid-19, staff development in digital literacy skills for re-structuring teaching, learning and assessment were executed concurrently. Challenges with uploading material in the vernacular were recognized. The significance of online literacy and its role in pedagogy were appreciated.

Several International Conferences were also organized by the Faculties/ Institutes during the year 2021 in order to disseminate research findings of the university.

Our student community has shown themselves to be resilient in digitization, virtual learning and remained as true “made in UOC” products we all envision. I am truly proud of the students’ achievements in studies, sports, the performing arts and in community service alike, achieved with discipline and dignity.

We have been able to elevate the status of the University by promoting research, improving research profile and involving community outreach and industry collaboration. For this achievement everyone in the university including the academics and the students actively involved and contributed.

Hence, I take this opportunity to express my gratitude to the Council, the Senate, the Registrar, the Bursar and all the other staff of the university for making 2021 a very productive year.

- The University was ranked 1st among Sri Lankan universities during February and July 2021 in the Webometrics Rankings and the Times Higher Education World University Rankings placed the University of Colombo within the 801 – 1000th universities among 1600 universities in 99 countries.
- The University of Colombo improved its rank from 443 in 2020 to 297 in 2021, out of the 956 universities which applied for this year's UI Green Metric Award. The University has also been ranked 03rd among the Sri Lankan Universities.
- On 21 January 2021, the University of Colombo celebrated the centenary of its Faculties of Arts and Science and the Library. The inauguration ceremony was held on the 21st of January 2021 at the Senate Hall, College House.
- The Information and Learning Centre (ILC) at the Faculty of Science was declared open on the 21st of January 2021.
- University of Colombo celebrated International Women's Day 2021 under the theme "Women in leadership: Achieving an equal future in a COVID-19 world" on March 08, 2021, at the Auditorium, Faculty of Graduate Studies.
- The Annual Research Symposium organised by the Department of Sociology was held on 26th of March 2021 under the theme 'Social Sciences and Humanities in the Digital Age and in Pandemic Times'.
- The New Building of the Department of Statistics, Faculty of Science was ceremonially opened on 23rd of April 2021.
- ACES 2021 International Virtual Symposium organised by the Department of Chemistry was successfully held on June 17th with the participation of 3 Nobel Laureates.
- The International Conference in Data Science 2021 was held from 29<sup>th</sup> - 30<sup>th</sup> of June.
- The International Conference on Lightning Protection (ICLP- SIPDA) 2021 was held from 20<sup>th</sup> - 26<sup>th</sup> September 2021.
- CMA 2021 was organised from 25<sup>th</sup> to 27<sup>th</sup> November 2021 as a hybrid event. The theme of this year's Congress was "NCDs and COVID-19: Tackling Two Pandemics Through Collaborative Research.
- A special commemorative cover was issued to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the Faculty of Medicine on 25<sup>th</sup> November 2021. The cover was issued at a ceremony held at the Faculty of Medicine.
- The International Conference on Multidisciplinary Approaches in Science (ICMAS 2021) organised by the Faculty of Science, University of Colombo was successfully held on 24<sup>th</sup>-26<sup>th</sup> November 2021.
- A centenary stamp and first day cover to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Faculty of Science was issued on 24<sup>th</sup> November in parallel to the ICMAS 2021 inauguration.
- A tree planting challenge was organised by the Department of Plant Sciences. The Vice Chancellor, Professor Chandrika Wijeyaratne initiated the challenge by ceremonially planting a "Murutha tree" on the faculty premises on 21<sup>st</sup> January 2021.
- The 16th International Research Conference on Management & Finance (IRCMF - 2021) was held virtually on 22<sup>nd</sup> October 2021 under the theme "Strategic Resilience, Reinvention and Digital Disruption in Business Management."
- The inauguration ceremony of the launch of a Faculty of Engineering at the University of Colombo was held on 12<sup>th</sup> November 2021 at the Senate Hall, College House.

- The University of Colombo hosted a session titled “The Impact of Covid 19 Health Crisis on Service Sector Development in Sri Lanka: Challenges and Opportunities” at the AUA Lecture Series 2021 for young Asian economists on 9th September 2021.
- The 10th Sinhala Studies Symposium 2021 organised by the Department of Sinhala was held on 16th September 2021 via zoom platform.
- His Excellency Mr. Tareq Md Ariful Islam, the High Commissioner and Mr. Md. Reyad Hossain, Deputy High Commissioner of Bangladesh to Sri Lanka met the Vice Chancellor, Professor Chandrika N Wijeyaratne, and a group of representatives from the University of Colombo on 13 October 2021.
- The Students of the Tourism Study Programmes of the Department of Economics and the Alumni Association of Tourism Economics and Hospitality Management (AATHEM), Department of Economics organised the 7th International Tourism Research Conference (ITRC) on 22nd October 2021.
- The first volume of the South Asian Environmental Law Report (SAELR) 2021 which is a collaborative effort of the Centre for Environmental Justice (CEJ) and the Centre for Environmental Law and Policy (CELP) of the Faculty of Law was launched on the 30th of October 2021.
- The Lithuanian Ambassador His Excellency Julius Pranevičius, the Third Secretary of the mission Ms. Kamile Nemeiksytes and the delegation of fintech experts arrived in Sri Lanka on 9th December 2021 for a four-day official visit to formally discuss establishing collaborations with relevant parties in Sri Lanka.

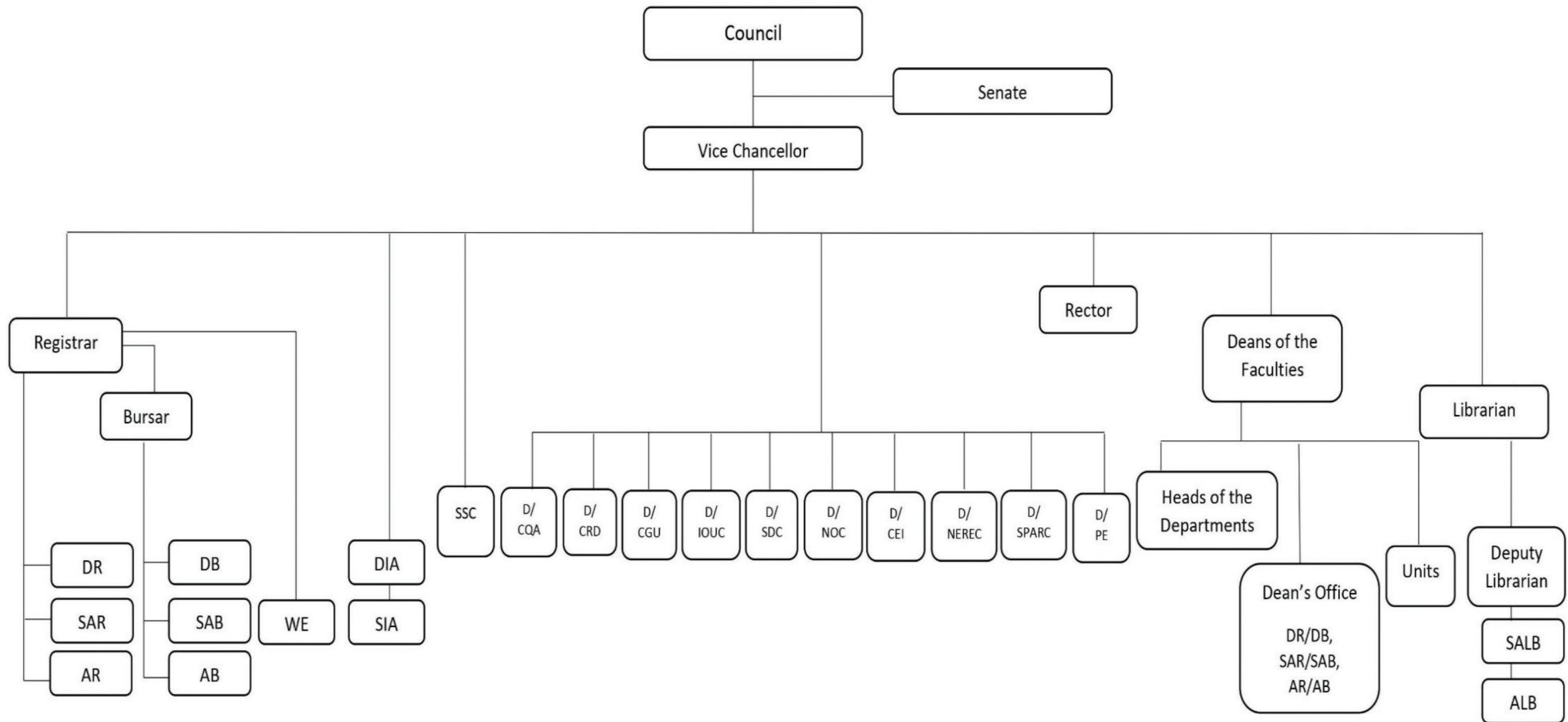

The University of Colombo has nine (9) faculties and a campus, Those are as follows :

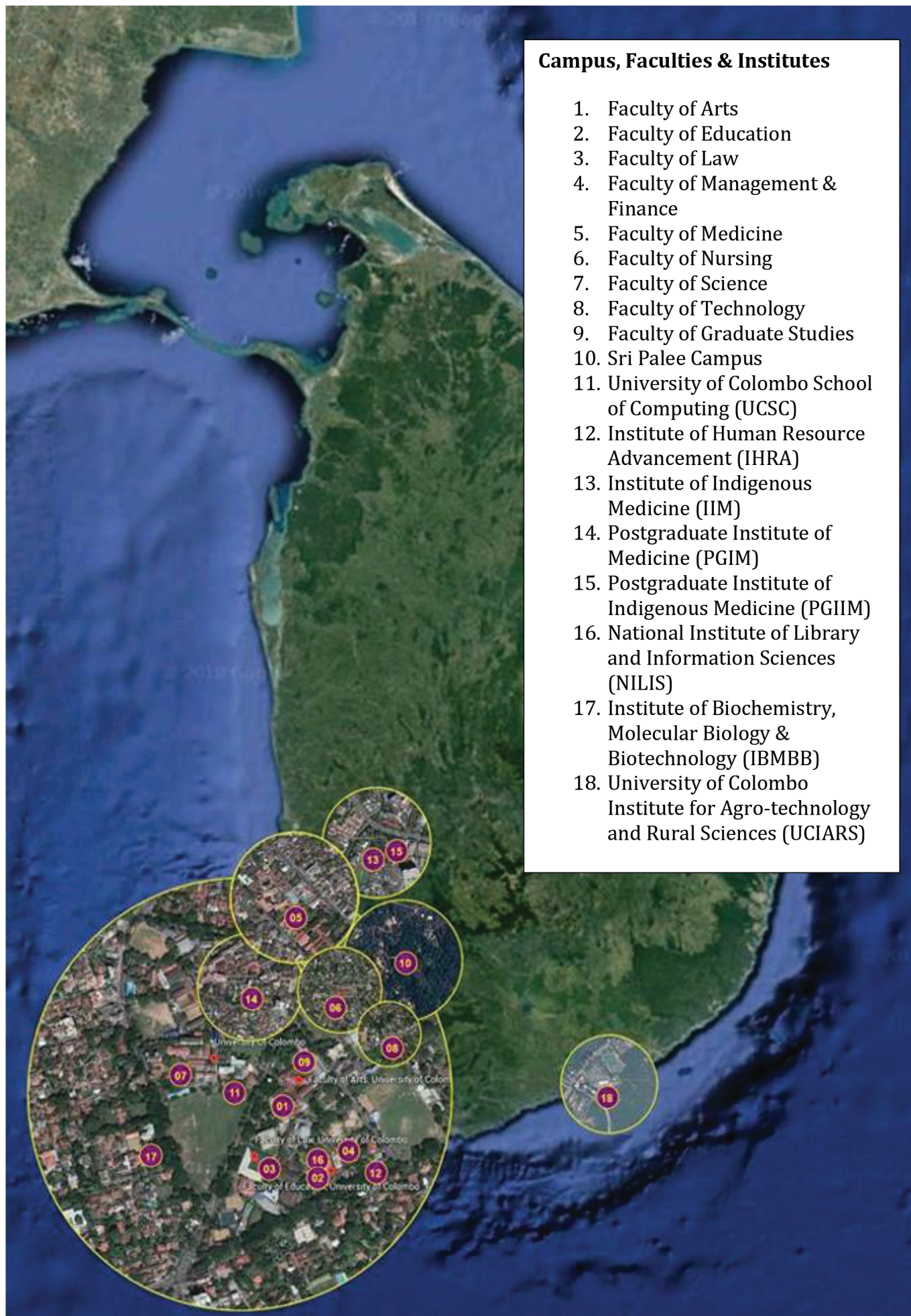

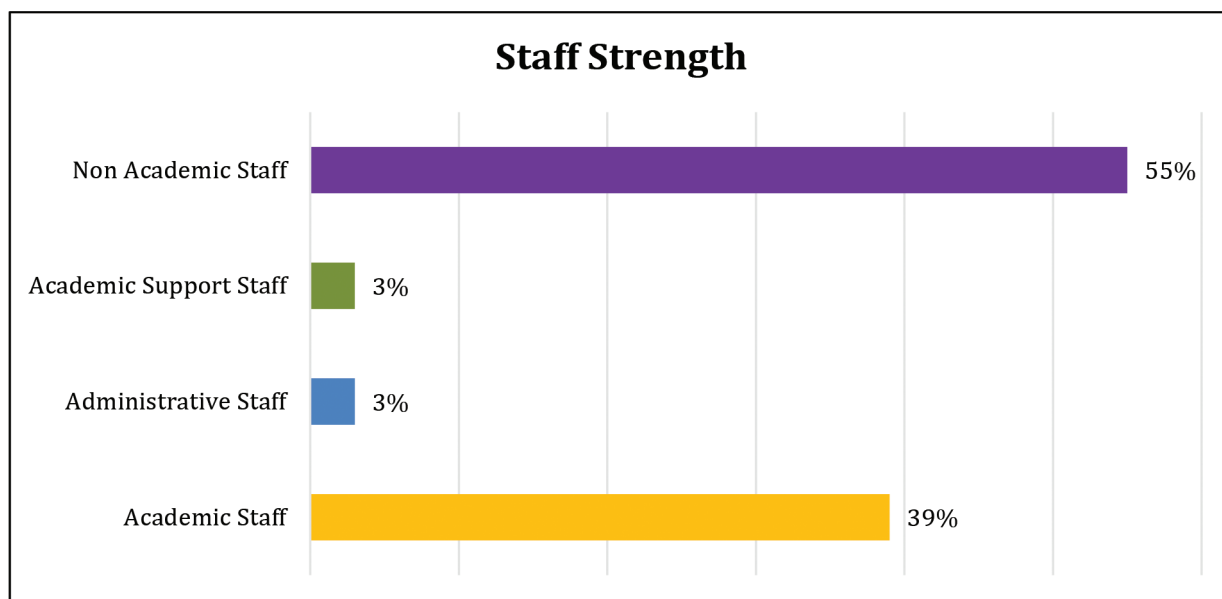

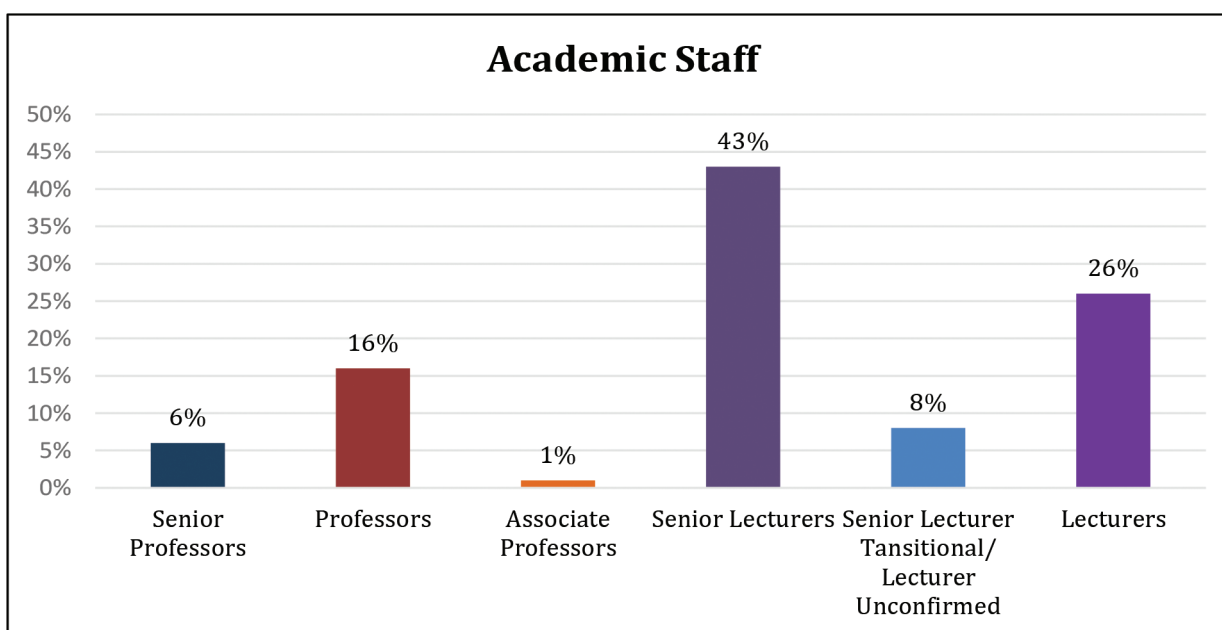

## 2.9 FACULTY OF NURSING

The Faculty of Nursing in the University of Colombo is the first and only Faculty that is dedicated for producing graduate nurses. It was established in 2017 by the order published in *Gazette Extraordinary* No. 2002/32 of January 18, 2017, to address a long felt need in Sri Lanka to strengthen and upgrade the nursing education. The Faculty of Nursing offers a four-year bachelor's degree in Nursing (BScN) to those who enroll in the faculty (Sri Lanka Qualification Framework Level 6). There are two entry pathways to the faculty, where 70% of the students are selected from GCE A/L Biological Science stream and the 30% are through the lateral entry pathway for nurses with a diploma level education. Overall aim of the Faculty is to enhance Sri Lanka's capacity to produce graduate nurses with the capability of catering for both national and international health care needs with advanced knowledge and skills based on a sound theoretical and practical foundation.

## 2.12. “CYBER CAMPUS” - CENTRE FOR OPEN AND DISTANCE LEARNING

The “Cyber Campus” – Centre for Open and Distance Learning is the administrative entity of the University of Colombo to handle the matters related to its External Degree Programs (EDPs) and extension courses offered by the Faculties/Departments. It was first established as Virtual Campus of University of Colombo Coordinating Centre in October 2011 as a self-financing Centre with the mission of ‘to be a facilitator for expanded higher education through extension, distance and blended courses using advanced technology, thereby contributing to national development’. The Virtual Campus of University of Colombo - Coordinating Centre was renamed as Virtual Centre of University of Colombo in June 2016. Again, in January 2019, it was renamed as “Cyber Campus” - Centre for Open and Distance Learning of University of Colombo with a view to attract more local and foreign students for higher studies through blended learning.

In keeping with the Vision of the University, the Cyber Campus “strive to be a self-sustaining Centre for providing enhanced opportunities for higher education through open and distance learning environments”.

### 2.14 CENTRE FOR CONTEMPORARY INDIAN STUDIES (CCIS)

The Centre for Contemporary Indian Studies (CCIS) is a multidisciplinary research centre established for promoting activities connected with developing knowledge in Sri Lanka on contemporary studies in India and strengthening Indo-Lanka relationship through an institutionalized network between the two countries. It is the only research institution in Sri Lanka dedicated to the study of contemporary India. The CCIS was established in 2012 under a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the High Commission of India in Sri Lanka and the University of Colombo. The Centre functions under the Faculty of Graduate Studies (FGS) for academic and administrative matters. It is also linked with other faculties through its Advisory Board and Management Board.

India and Sri Lanka are connected through social, religious, linguistic, cultural, economic and strategic ties that date back to several centuries. However, it is realized that significantly less importance has been placed on the study of contemporary developments and changes in India. By realizing that such research and study undertaken at a Sri Lanka's seat of higher learning will play an important role in guiding and strengthening the social and economic development of the country and the existing bonds of friendship between the two countries. The Centre will serve to deepen the understanding of contemporary Indian Studies in Sri Lanka. The main function of the Centre is to provide an intellectual forum for academic staff and postgraduates working in the field of contemporary Indian studies and provide a base for research for its members in collaboration with other institutions. The Centre aims to focus on lectures, seminars and other research events in the field, including collaborative research projects. The Centre welcomes links with other scholars, nationally and internationally.

## **2.15 Centre for the Study of Human Rights (CSHR)**

The experience of three decades in the field gives CSHR the understanding and the capability to gauge the pulse of the society to craft new pathways to make its initiatives felt. CSHR came into existence in 1991 with the vision of creating a nation with a right consciousness in which the dignity and The rights of all people are respected; at a time when the human rights situation in the country was at stake as a result of the ethnic conflict and the war, as well as the southern insurrection. Human rights violations and abuses were unprecedented, widespread and atrocious. Extra-judicial killings, mass graves, disappearances, heinous incidents of torture, discriminatory use of executive power, etc. were the order of the day. It is difficult to recall any other time in the history of Sri Lanka such as this, where the Rule of Law was threatened so badly, that the country's human rights reputation was severely tarnished. Under this circumstance human rights advertise were indeed unthinkable and formidable not only for individuals, but also for organizations.

The CSHR's activities are conducted according to the following five key areas.:These are Education, Research, Capacity Building, Knowledge Services and Institutional Development.

In terms of Education, CSHR conducts programmes from postgraduate to certificate level. The current programmes are as follows;

In the area of Research, the CSHR carries out practically applicable research. Research conducted has been in relation to remand prisoners, legal aid in prisons, rehabilitation programmes in prisons, IDP's, children in remand homes, command responsibility, status of rights in the Eastern province and education level of Veddas, exploring the concept of violence within post war Sri Lankan society, language rights and gender, among others.

With regard to Capacity Building, the CSHR continued to strengthen its partners in the area of rights and responsibilities with the objective of protecting the rights of others as well as theirs. The groups involved in capacity building are secondary and tertiary school students, preservice and in-service teachers, academics and non-academics, media personnel, differently-abled persons, armed forces, police and prison officers, inmates, quazis, rural and plantation communities and the general public among others towards their empowerment.

In the area of Knowledge Services, the CSHR continued to provide services and information through its Resource Centre to students, academics, researchers and the general public. The Centre also provided information through the electronic media in the form of the Human Rights Radio Programme conducted throughout the year.

In terms of Institutional Development, the CSHR focuses on delivering programmes of high quality to those with whom the CSHR works. Towards this end, the CSHR made every effort to provide opportunities to its Staff to improve their knowledge and skills, which will contribute to enhanced programmes and to the creation of a culture of human rights in the country.

With the main focus on human rights education and research, the CSHR is on its way towards becoming the key institute and the focal point of human rights education and research.

The Staff Development Centre of the University of Colombo was launched in 1997 as the first SDC in the national university system in Sri Lanka, due to a need to commence and establish planned staff development in Sri Lankan universities.

The Mission of the SDC is "to enhance the quality of academic work undertaken by staff and students within the system of higher education in Sri Lanka, in general, and within the University of Colombo, in particular". In order to achieve this objective, the SDC facilitates to make university teaching/learning more effective, more relevant, student oriented and of internationally high standard. It also facilitates to develop skills and competencies necessary for more effective and efficient performance among all members of the staff of the University including academic and non-academic staff. The SDC carries out related training programmes and workshops that assist in career development of university staff, within the available financial and human resource limitations.



## Objectives and Expected Activities of SDC<sup>1</sup>

1. To provide support and assistance to academic staff in developing and enhancing the various skills needed to fulfil academic tasks like preparation and reform of curriculum, teaching and research.
2. To provide support and assistance to non-academic staff in developing and enhancing the skills needed to fulfil various academic support services and activities.
3. To provide support and assistance to academic staff already in academic administrative positions (Heads of Departments, Deans of Faculties, Directors of Institutes and School, Rector etc.) or aspiring to take up such positions to acquire the skills and competencies required in the performance of academic administration.
4. To provide support to individuals and groups in the evaluation and review of teaching departments and other academic units, courses and programmes, and faculties.
5. To collaborate with individuals and groups throughout the University on projects which aim to enhance the quality of teaching and learning in the University.
6. To provide to teacher's objective student feedback services on request.
7. To contribute to the policies and general procedures within the University which relate to teaching and learning.
8. To contribute to the wider field of research and scholarship related to higher education.
9. To undertake publications in the areas of university staff development in general, and teaching and learning in particular, to be used within the University of Colombo and other institutions of higher learning.
10. To develop linkages among domestic and foreign university staff development organizations with similar objectives.
11. To raise funds through domestic and foreign sources, with the approval of the University Council, to carry out its activities, if resources placed at its disposal by the University are found inadequate.
12. To build up a resource and information centre in subjects related to university course structures, curriculum changes, methodology of university teaching and learning and research.

Currently, the SDC is successfully continuing its contribution to develop university education in an array of well-focused and diversified training programmes targeting all academic, non-academic and other supportive staff members of the university.

The main regular course aimed at the academic staff is CTHE (Certificate of Teaching in Higher Education) which is accredited by Staff and Educational Development Association (UK) as well as by the University Grant Commission of Sri Lanka.

In addition, the SDC conducted a workshop for Academics in collaboration with the Centre for Gender Equality.

The SDC of University of Colombo is making its significant contribution to enhance and to improve the capacity of academic and non-academic staff of not only University of Colombo but also other universities/institutes in Sri Lanka. During the year 2021, the SDC could successfully train over 140 university staff members in different staff categories and from several universities in Sri Lanka, including applicants from private universities who also mixed readily with state university staff.

The SDC operates from its office complex in the University of Colombo.

### **Staff Development Programmes**

#### **Certificate in Teaching in Higher Education (CTHE) Course**

The twenty fourth iteration of the Certificate in Teaching in Higher Education (CTHE) course is successfully conducted by the SDC for University Staff, and followed by 77 academics from different universities in Sri Lanka (University of Colombo, Sri Palee Campus , University of Moratuwa (including ITUM), University of Ruhuna, Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka, University of Vocational Technology, Asia Pacific Institute of Information Technology and CINEC Campus)

#### **Management Information Data Base of the SDC - use in the UGC Review of Faculties**

The SDC maintains a data-base of its training activities and on details of the trained staff. This data-base has been found to be invaluable to meet the Quality Standards that the UGC calls upon faculties, departments and universities to meet through the required regular Programme Reviews of the UGC. Accordingly, the SDC provided information (from 2012 to 2020, in this instance) to enable faculties and departments of the University of Colombo to prepare for their Programme Reviews. This data forms an essential component to meet Criterion 7.9 of the Programme Review which is to supply evidence to support that "The Faculty/Institute ensures that staff involved in assessing the students are competent to undertake their roles and responsibilities and have no conflict of interest".

## 2.19 SOCIAL POLICY ANALYSIS AND RESEARCH CENTRE (SPARC)

The Social Policy Analysis and Research Centre (SPARC) of the Faculty of Arts, University of Colombo, provides a focal point within the Sri Lankan university system for integrating research, training, policy analysis and advocacy on critical areas of social development in Sri Lanka. The Centre facilitates collaboration between university academics from different disciplinary backgrounds within the university as well as institutions outside the university system, including governmental and non-governmental agencies.

The establishment of the Centre was approved at the 273rd meeting of the Senate of University of Colombo, followed by a formal inauguration held on the 10th of June 2005 at the Sri Lanka Foundation Institute (SLFI), Colombo.

### Objectives

- To facilitate independent research within Sri Lankan Universities on social development related issues.
- To facilitate interdisciplinary exchange between scholars from different backgrounds.
- To provide training and improve the quality of social science education.
- To strengthen local expertise within universities in poverty reduction and social policy formulation.
- To identify opportunities for social policy reforms in Sri Lanka.

The Centre conducts its research in a selected number of focal areas where it can draw on sufficient expertise and knowledge from within the university. These focal areas are reviewed from time to time, keeping with new experience gained within the university and emerging critical issues that require expert attention.

### **2.23 CENTRE FOR QUALITY ASSURANCE UNIT (CQA)**

The Center for Quality Assurance (CQA) of the University of Colombo, formerly known as the Internal Quality Assurance Unit (IQAU), is responsible for monitoring and coordination of the Quality Assurance (QA) activities of the university and coordinate the progress of IQACs (Internal Quality Assurance Cells). The CQA is placed directly under the Vice Chancellor and managed by a Director who is a senior academic staff member of the university (Currently Prof. Nirmalie. Pallewatta of the Faculty of Science). The administrative and financial functions of the CQA are overseen by the 'CQA Standing Committee of the Senate', comprising of deans, directors, and academic coordinators of Internal Quality Assurance Cells from all faculties/institutes and the Campuses of the university as well as some senior administrative officers. The CQA Standing Committee meets monthly on a fixed university calendar date and is chaired by the Vice Chancellor. Its progress and activities are reported monthly at the Senate of the University of Colombo. The director CQA is also a member of the UGC Standing Committee on Quality Assurance and represents the University of Colombo. The Director reports on CQA progress to the UGC Standing Committee and also carries out coordination and implementation of all QA related activities through the Internal Quality Assurance coordinators who represent faculties, institutes and campuses of the University of Colombo.

To be the benchmark setter for ensuring and improving the quality of university teaching, learning, assessment, research, and academic governance with transparency, accountability, and reflexivity for transformative education.

**Activities done by the Centre/ Unit during 2021**

- Initiation of Sustainable Development Goals Platform and its related activities including a dedicated website with the International Office of the University of Colombo. Several discussions were held with overseas universities on taking forward the SDG platform with their collaboration. A series of awareness raising webinars were held for the campuses, faculties and institutes of the university by both director CQA and director of the International Office.
- Organized a series of meetings with administrative and financial officers of the university in preparation for the upcoming Institutional Review of the university. A plan of action for selection and upload of documents as evidence for the IR was initiated.
- As part of the regular CQA activities, contribution to development of the Strategic Plan of the UoC, the work norms document of the UoC, the Blended Learning Committee of the UoC, contributions to development of quality assurance tools of blended learning, contributions to development of multidisciplinary approaches to research and development, collecting undergraduate student feedback summary reports from IQACs, conducting awareness and training sessions on QA to the newly recruited academic staff of the University of Colombo, at the Academic Mentoring programmes of the Faculty of Medicine, to academic, administrative and academic support staff of the faculties of Technology, Nursing, Institute of Indigenous Medicine, and The University of Colombo Institute of Agriculture and Rural Sciences, Weligatta were conducted.
- The Director CQA initiated a programme of work with the British Council Sri Lanka on improving the quality of industry placements/internships of degrees. This is ongoing.
- The Director CQA participated in a series of webinars organized by the British Council on student engagement in quality assurance. This topic is being integrated into the Strategic Plan revision as well as at faculties, institutes and campuses.
- The Director CQA organized a webinar for all academic and administrative staff on the Sri Lanka Qualification Framework (SLQF) with time for questions and answers by the participants.
- The CQA facilitated the approval process of new degree programmes and also the programme reviews of the Science Faculty and that of the University of Colombo School of Computing due in 2021.

## **2.24 PHYSICAL EDUCATION DEPARTMENT**

The overall objective of Department of Physical Education is to promote and develop the activities related physical education activities as well as to promote competitive and recreational sports within the University.

Mr. Sanjeewa Jayasinghe who is an instructor in physical education is the current Acting Director of the Department of Physical Education. We have seven Instructors in Physical Education, two Management Assistants, one Gymnasium Supervisor, two Grounds Man, three Gym Attendants, and twelve Work Aids.

Currently the University is actively conducting 26 different sports and a club consisting of the Captains and the Vice-Captains of these sports have been established as the Amalgamated Club (Sports Council).

During the Sri Lanka University Games (SLUG) 2016 and 2019, the University was able to secure the overall runners-up position while clinching the women's championships. In 2018, the University of Colombo was the overall champion in the Inter-University Championship.

Student life is enhanced by a plethora of extra-curricular activities offered by the University. Playground, an indoor gymnasium, tennis courts, basketball court and the fully equipped modern Strength Hall offer sportsmen and women the opportunity to explore and develop their abilities to the fullest.

### **Activities done by Department of Physical Education in 2021**

1. University of Colombo Chess (Men/ Women) teams participated in Inter University Online Chess Championship organized by Sri Lanka Universities Sports Association. Our women's Chess team won the Championship while the Men's team won the fourth place of the event.
2. The University of Colombo Taekwondo (Men/ Women) teams participated in Inter University Online Taekwondo Championship organized by Sri Lanka Universities Sports Association. Our Men's team won the second place of event and the Women's team won the fifth place of the event.
3. The University of Colombo Karate (Men/ Women) teams participated in Inter University Online Karate Championship organized by Sri Lanka Universities Sports Association. Our Women's Karate team won the 6<sup>th</sup> Place and the Men's team won the 7<sup>th</sup> place of the event.
4. The Department conducted an Online General Fitness programme for Female undergraduates of university.
5. The Department conducted an online sport specific training programme for university undergraduates in 22 sports.
6. The Department conducted an online Yoga programme for university staff and students.
7. The Department conducted three sessions of sports Education seminars on trending topics to improve the knowledge of university sportsmen and women.
8. **FIDE online Chess Olympiad**  
FIDE Online Chess Olympiad 2021 was conducted by the International Chess Federation (FIDE), between 14<sup>th</sup> August and 15<sup>th</sup> September 2021. This is the most prestigious Chess event in the world,



with more than 160 countries has participation this year. Minul Sanjula Doluweera, undergraduate of the Faculty of Medicine represented Sri Lanka.

#### 9. 2021 Asian University Chess Championship

The Asian University Chess Championship 2021 was organized by the Asian University Sports Federation (AUSF) in collaboration with the Indonesia University Sports Council (IUSC), from 02<sup>nd</sup> September 2021 to 12<sup>th</sup> September 2021 via online platform. Minul Sanjula Doluweera, an undergraduate of the Faculty of Medicine and Yasasmi Umarusiru Gamage an undergraduate of Faculty of Arts represented the Sri Lanka National University Chess Team.

#### 10. University Karate team shines at National Karate Championship – 2021

The National Karate Championship – 2021 was organized by the Sri Lanka Karate Do Federation, on 22<sup>nd</sup> of December 2021 at Bandaragama Indoor Stadium. The Event was held with the participation of nearly 500 athletes representing the clubs all over the country.

The committee comprises of ten members, and have gender parity, reflect the diversity of the university community and have three external members with a proven track record of working on issues of gender equality and equity. The committee will also have the authority to appoint mediators in consultation with the Vice-Chancellor and the parties concerned, towards an informal resolution process where necessary.
- Sexual harassment policy was included in the student handbook issued by the Student Counselors Unit.
- Many faculties and institutions have included the sexual harassment policy in their student handbook and the Website.
- Various resources related to gender equality and equity were shared on the university Website.

## **2.29 CENTRE FOR COMBATING TOBACCO (CCT)**

Centre for Combating Tobacco (CCT) is the Sri Lankan tobacco observatory established at the Faculty of Medicine University of Colombo under the Article 5.3 of the Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (FCTC). The aim of the CCT is to monitor the tobacco industry activities related to implementation of Article 5.3 in Sri Lanka and the region. Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (FCTC) is a treaty, an agreement under international law, adopted in May 2003 by the 56th World Health Assembly, of the World Health Organization (WHO). FCTC entered into force from February 2005, legally binding 181 ratifying countries as of 2019. FCTC Article 5.3 requires Parties to protect their public health policies from commercial and other vested interests of the tobacco industry.

The CCT functions as a centre of the Faculty of Medicine, University of Colombo (UCFM)

### **Activities done by the Centre/ Unit during 2021**

- Investigative research conducted on Tobacco Industry interference and activities during COVID-19 globally and dissemination.
- Investigations on the tobacco tax issues to be published as an advocacy campaign targeting the 2022 government budget speech.
- Development and completion of two cycles of the SARC – CCT fellowship programme.
- Advocacy for the implementation of FCTC Article 5.3 in the South Asian region via the Regional Colloquium and launch of the Regional Report on Article 5.3 in June 2021.
- Development of the Regional Archive on Tobacco Industry Interference.

- Advocacy sessions for the Minister of Health and Chairperson of National Authority on Tobacco and Alcohol on the need to strengthen the implementation of the FCTC Article 5.3 in Sri Lanka and the need to have a code-of-conduct for the government officials.
- Completion of development of the HelpQuit online course that empowers medical professionals in Sri Lanka to help smoking cessation with the invitation and support of the WHO Country Office for Sri Lanka. Even though this is not a project objective, we at CCT believe that it would contribute immensely to control tobacco related morbidity and mortality in Sri Lanka.
- National level stakeholder meeting to discuss tobacco control and implementation of FCTC Article 5.3 and advocacy campaign on TII targeting the candidates of the General Election of Sri Lanka.
- A Scientific investigation of Tobacco and Alcohol Portrayal in Sri Lankan Media and its Public Health Implications Publication on 30<sup>th</sup> March 2021.

## **2.30 THE JOURNALISM UNIT**

The Journalism Unit was established in February 1991 under the Dean of the Faculty of Arts. In 2006, the academic scope of the Unit was broadened in order to meet the current requirements, and the entire curriculum was fully revised to provide a wider spectrum of the discipline. In 2015, under the Faculty Study Stream programme, the Journalism Unit introduced a new study stream programme titled, 'Communication and Creative Arts'. At present, the Unit offers 19 course modules under the study stream of Communication and Creative Arts. In addition, the Journalism Unit offers a Diploma in Communication and Media Studies in the Sinhala, Tamil and English languages for external students.

All the existing course units of the Journalism Unit have been prepared according to the Sri Lanka Qualification Framework (SLQF) guidelines. The academic engagement and the administrative work of the Journalism Unit was commended in the faculty review conducted by the University Grants Commission in 2017. The review report highlighted the excellent coordination and functioning of the Journalism Unit.

According to the statistics, 785 students got registered for the course units offered by the Journalism Unit for the academic year 2020/21. At present, Journalism Unit caters to the third largest student population in the faculty. It would also be the second largest student population when taking into consideration the fact that students of the Journalism Unit are confined only to, first, second- and third-year batches.

The demand of the students to study Communication has significantly increased for the last six years. In the 2014-2015 academic year, 302 the students were registered for the Communication and Media Studies course units, and it has increased to 785 within six years. A record number of 360 first year students were registered in 2021 to follow the courses offered by the Unit.

The Journalism is in the process of introducing a new honours degree in Communication and Creative Arts and also upgrading it to the Department of Communication and Creative Arts. Both the new honours degree curriculum and the department proposal have been submitted to the University Grants Commission after obtaining the approval from the Council, the Senate and the Faculty of Arts.

The Journalism Unit provides ample opportunities for the students to display their skills and talents. The Unit has organized many cultural events where students could get the opportunity to experience the creative work of veteran artistes in Sri Lanka.

At present, the Journalism Unit is headed by Senior Professor Samantha Herath and the academic staff consisting of three lecturers and two temporary assistant lecturers.

### **Activities done by the centre/ unit during 2021**

The Journalism continued online teaching throughout the year 2021 while providing relevant academic support for the student through virtual platforms. All the relevant reading materials and recordings were provided through the LMS to make sure the continuous and uninterrupted learning for the students.

#### **Academic Activities:**

- The Journalism Unit prepared the curriculum for the new honours degree in Communication and Creative Arts according to the SLQF guidelines and the quality assurance requirements of the University of Colombo. The proposal has been approved by the Council, the Senate and the Faculty of Arts and submitted to the University Grants Commission for the final approval.
- The trilingual diploma offered by the Journalism Unit was revised according to the SLQF guidelines with a curriculum review. The revised programme titled 'Diploma in Communication and Media Studies' has been offered from 2021.

## 2.32 THE CENTER FOR DATA SCIENCE (CDS)

The Center for Data Science (CDS) was established in 2016, under the Department of Statistics, Faculty of Science, University of Colombo to enhance collaboration between academics, students and industry in the field of Data Science.

The **vision** of the CDS is to be the center of excellence in research and development in Data Science in Sri Lanka and the **mission** of the center is to facilitate research and development in Data Science in Sri Lanka through collaborations with local and international expertise both from academia and industry.

The center strives to achieve the following objectives:

- To conduct research in the field of Data Science in collaboration with local and international academics and industry experts to facilitate and promote postgraduate and undergraduate level research activities.
- To disseminate knowledge in Data Science through workshops, seminars and conferences and by conducting training programs on global certifications and career development.
- To facilitate and promote partnerships with local and international industry through consultancy projects by providing them with technical expertise while enhancing skills of students and academics in the application of Data Science techniques in the real world.

### Activities done by the Unit during 2021

- **International Conference in Data Science (ICDS 2021)** was successfully held on 29<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup> of June virtually with more than 200 participants. ICDS 2021 was hosted by the Department of Statistics in collaboration with the Center for Data Science.
- A workshop on **Importance of Statistics in Research and How to get help** was conducted in collaboration with the Research Committee of the Faculty of Science, University of Colombo on 18<sup>th</sup> of May 2021 for the early career researchers of the faculty.
- **R programming for Research** – an online workshop was conducted for undergraduate and postgraduate researchers in Sri Lanka in collaboration with the Research Committee of the Faculty of Science, University of Colombo on 24<sup>th</sup> and 31<sup>st</sup> of July 2021.
- The preconference workshop, **R for Data Science – A Crash Course** (virtual), was conducted for the International Conference on Multidisciplinary Approaches in Science (ICMAS 2021) on 23<sup>rd</sup> of November 2021.

## 2.33 Colombo Science and Technology Cell

**“Colombo Science and Technology Cell”**, known as “Cell” is a limited by guarantee company under the Faculty of Science, University of Colombo in which all members are academics of the Faculty. The company articles were approved by the University Council and the UGC Commission the company was registered on September 26, 2013 at the Registrar General of Companies.

### Objectives:

- to promote and serve manufacturing and service industries as well as agriculture in Sri Lanka through research, development, innovation, scientific services and knowledge and technology transfer,
- to foster entrepreneurship among the members of the University community,
- to enhance opportunities for the initiation of research projects and consultancies aimed at economic growth, and
- to facilitate obtaining and protection of rights to intellectual property developed through the company.

A university can play a major role in community development activities through the modernization of indigenous technologies used by them, and transfer of modern technologies and thus enhancing the ability of the community to acquire and make use of such knowledge and skills.

### Activities done by the Centre/ Unit during 2021

- The Cell organised one (01) collaborative research project, three (03) consultancies and one (01) Training program in 2021.
- A consultancy project carried out by the Department of Statistics was commercialized.
- A workshop on “Tips and tricks on how to patent your research work” was conducted at ICMAS for academics and Teachers.
- Three (03) patents (drafted by the Cell) were granted by the National Intellectual Property Office (NIPO) and four (04) new patent applications were submitted to NIPO.
- The HR at the Cell was enrolled in WIPO Distance Learning Courses and the CEO/Cell has successfully completed the WIPO Summer School. Furthermore, the Cell is taking part in the WIPO EIE Project Remote Mentorship Program.

The Centre draws together accumulated knowledge and expertise of the academic staff of the University of Colombo and other partners to be an active partner in national disability policy and strategy formulation to create a culture of inclusion. In addition, at present the centre provides support services for differently abled student from the Faculty of Arts and the Faculty of Education to complete their undergraduate degree programmes successfully. These services are open to any differently abled students at the University of Colombo.

#### Vision

To be a focal point in providing academic leadership in the pursuit, demonstration and dissemination of studies and practices in disability for the enrichment of the lives of persons with disabilities within a culture of inclusion.

#### Mission

To promote an inclusive university experience for differently abled students and staff in a vibrant academic environment by promoting disability studies at both undergraduate and post graduate levels and support

through research and evaluation to develop and implement national evidence-based practice in disability work carried out by Government, the corporate sector, civil society and communities including differently abled persons themselves with the aim of promoting a culture of inclusion.

Government and foreign funding were available for academics through the processes of competitive application. The University allocated Rs. 2.5 million for research and research promotional activities of the University from the Government funds. These funds were used for awarding 03 Travel Grants, 01 Foreign PhD grant, 10 Publication Fee reimbursements and improving University and Faculty research promotional activities such as international & local conferences.

### Annual Research Symposium 2021

The Annual Research Symposium (ARS) of the University of Colombo, which unifies all symposia held by the respective Faculties, Institutes, Campus, the School and the library of the University, is one of the main events in the University calendar. This year, it was held on the 23rd of November 2021 and signified the conclusion of the centenary celebrations of the University of Colombo, which was established in 1921 as the Ceylon University College. The theme of this year's research symposium "Impactful research through an interdisciplinary approach" aptly suited the current international trends in the conduct of research. The chief guest of the ARS 2021 was the Acting High Commissioner of India, His Excellency Vinod K Jacob, strengthening the links and engagement of the University of Colombo with the High Commission of India. The Keynote Speaker was Professor Mohan Munasinghe, the 2021 Blue Planet laureate, Chairman, Presidential Expert Commission on Sustainable Sri Lanka 2030 Vision, and former Vice-Chair of the UN Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change that shared the Nobel Peace Prize in 2007.

We were also honoured by the presence of Professor GL Pieris, former Vice Chancellor of the University of Colombo, and the current Foreign Minister, who participated as a special guest.

The ARS 2021 was chaired by Professor Chandrika N. Wijeyaratne, Vice-Chancellor, University of Colombo. The organising committee was chaired by Professor Priyadarshani Galappatthy and the committee consisted of members representing all the faculties, institutes campus, school, and the library. The symposium was held as a hybrid event with a limited number gathering onsite at the New Arts Theatre of the University and most of the audience joining online, in keeping with the current health and safety guidelines. Each faculty, institute, campus, school and the library of the University also had their own research symposia of 2021 simultaneously. Each of these had an elaborate programme showcasing their research landscape covering the current topics of interest.

One of the unique features of this year's symposium was honouring the distinguished alumni and academics of the University, to mark the centenary celebrations of the University of Colombo. A Total of 43 distinguished alumni and academics nominated by each of the faculties, Institutes and the library of the University were introduced to the audience in a video highlighting their contribution at university, national and international level. Some of the distinguished alumni felicitated participated in person while others joined virtually. Commemorative centenary plaques and certificates of appreciation were given away by the Vice Chancellor. The inauguration subcommittee chaired by Dr. Nirmali Wijegunewardena attended to the details of this important activity.

Loan facility with free Interest (Rs. 75,000/-) to purchase laptop for the University students granted by the Ministry is processed during the year 2021 for all faculties.

## CANTEENS

There are of 14 Canteens and 3 Milk Bars in the University at present. Out of these 03 Milk Bars, 01 Milk Bars as Highland is running by Milco (pvt.) Ltd. The University has already taken action to charge a monthly rental for electricity consumed from the Milco (pvt.) Ltd and also for the space provided to them with effect from 01.09.2016.

The University Charges Rs. 1000/- as a rental and Rs. 5000/- for electricity consumed per month from each canteen.

### **PHOTOCOPY SERVICE**

There are 08 Photocopy Service Centers available at faculties including the Main Library. The University charges a monthly rental of Rs.8000/-, Rs.5000/- for the electricity consumed and Rs.1500/- as an additional charge for photocopy machine from each contract.

### **ISSUING TABLETS COMPUTERS**

Due to the Covid 19 pandemic situation in the country, the University in collaboration with the University of Colombo Alumni Association launched a program to provide the Tablet Computers to the students with financial difficulty in attending the online lectures.

### **SEASON TICKETS**

The University provides railway and bus season tickets for the undergraduates at a concession any rate. (The University allows the students to buy railway season tickets subject to the condition that they have not receive hostel accommodation)

## **7. CAPITAL WORKS & PLANNING**

The main function of the Capital Works and Planning branch is planning, procurement, and monitoring of Capital building projects of the University of Colombo according to the user department requirements. These functions include carrying out the relevant pre- and post-procurement activities, monitoring the construction works, maintaining of projects' documentation and contract communication, certifying & issuing of interim payment certificates, settling of bills, handling disputes and coordinating of testing, commissioning & taking over on successful completion of the project.

The major capital projects, the Capital Works & Planning branch was involved in the year under review could be categorized as follows.

- I. Ongoing construction projects commenced in 2017 are in progress.
- II. Ongoing construction projects commenced in 2018 are in progress.
- III. Ongoing construction projects commenced in 2019 are in progress.
- IV. Ongoing construction projects commenced in 2020 are in progress.
- V. New construction projects are pending cabinet approval.
- VI. Rehabilitation and improvements projects

Seven ongoing construction and new construction projects which were in progress in the year are under review. Almost all the projects experienced delay in the progress of the project and mile-stone targets, due to the COVID-19 pandemic related isolation, lockdown and curfew from March 11 to May 2020.

**I. The Ongoing construction projects commenced in 2020 are in progress.**

**1. Construction of extension to the Library Building at Sri Palee Campus, University of Colombo**

- Total cost estimate is LKR 60 million
- Contract awarded amount LKR 50.76 million (Excluding VAT).
- Contractor of the project is Malalathunga Constructions (Pvt.) Ltd.
- Funding source is GOSL.

**Current Status of the project**

The project commenced in May 2020 was expected to be completed in February 2021. However, it experienced delays due to COVID-19 pandemic related isolation, lockdown and curfew from March 11 to May 2020. The physical progress by the end of November 2021 was 40% and the cumulative expenditures up to the end of November 2021 was LKR 20 million (With VAT).

**2. Proposed Seven Storied Building (Proposed New Arts Wing -Phase I), Faculty of Arts**

- The total cost estimate is Rs.581 million.
- Funding source was LKR 464 million from GOSL funds and LKR 117 million from the University of Colombo Generated Funds.

**Current Status of the project**

The SCAPC recommend to recall the tenders for this project and the revised bid document sent to the SCAPC is approval.

**II. New construction projects which pending cabinet approval.**

**• Proposed Eight Storied Housing Building Complex, University of Colombo**

The Project Proposal of “Proposed Eight Storied Housing Building Complex, University of Colombo” submitted to the Department of National Planning through the University Grant Commission in March 2017. The University is awaiting the approval from the Cabinet of Ministers. The total cost estimated for the investment in the project would be LKR 530 million.

**• Establishment of Faculty of Technology, University of Colombo Stage II – Phase I**

The renewal project proposal of “Establishment of Faculty of Technology, University of Colombo Stage II – Phase I” to be submitted to the Department of National Planning through the University Grant Commission. The total cost estimated for the investment in the project would be LKR 864 million.

- **The Proposed Establishment of the Faculty of Engineering**

The revised project proposal of “Establishment of Faculty of Engineering, University of Colombo” to be submitted to the Department of National Planning through the University Grant Commission. The total cost estimated for the investment in the project would be LKR 7,000 million.

The University of Colombo has taken several initiatives towards becoming a green university by 'Going for paperless Office using online tools', 'Poluthene-free environment', 'Establishing Green Buildings', 'Solar Energy Harvesting', 'Rainwater Harvesting', and 'Sustainable Energy Dialogue'. The University of Colombo established the Center for Environmental initiatives (CEI) of University of Colombo with the target of achieving environmental protection and sustainable green development. The goals of the Center for Environmental Initiatives are as follows:
  - Adoption of green initiatives and becoming a green university.
  - Establishment of a proper solid waste management system for the university.
  - Protecting the campus environment and making the campus premises more environmentally friendly.
  - Creating environmental awareness among university community and outside the university (Schools) and supporting others in green activities.
- II. Further, the University academics have done various research in relation to sustainable development & environment and disaster impact assessment analysis the outcomes of these research will be presented at the Annual Research Symposium Sessions.
- III. To promote environmental sustainability is one of the objectives of the University of Colombo Strategic Plan 2021-2025 and under the objective, the University will work to introduce and practice sustainable environmental initiatives. The University is also planning to take necessary action to promote green sustainable initiatives and to conserve water and energy.
- IV. The Center for Environmental Initiatives has introduced a set of environmental and sustainability guidelines to strengthen the journey of the University of Colombo (UoC) to become a greener institution, as per the instructions given by the Vice-Chancellor. The guidelines consist of general environmentally friendly practices and newly incorporated instructions applicable to different circumstances in a comprehensible format.
- V. The staff and the students are expected to follow the relevant guidelines/instructions depending on which group you belong to. The University expects you to understand your role and responsibility towards the University environment and contribute towards achieving the University's green goals.
- VI. The Faculty of Law launched the Centre for Environmental Law and Policy (CELP), University of Colombo, Sri Lanka, under the theme "Beyond Human Environment: Defending Rights of Nature in the Anthropocene". The Centre is the pioneer institution in the Sri Lankan University system that specializes in Environmental Law related research, policymaking, and advocacy.
- VII. The University of Colombo developed a roadmap in collaboration with the UNDP Office in Sri Lanka via the SDG Platform of the University, in an attempt to improve the contributions made by the UoC towards the SDG





14. We have properly recorded or disclosed in the financial statements the capital stock repurchase options and agreements, and capital stock reserved for options, warrants conversations and other requirements.







# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

## General Information

### 1.1 Legal and Domicile form

University of Colombo has been incorporated under Universities Act No.16 of 1978. The main Administration building is located at the College House, No.94, Cumaratunga MunidasaMawatha, Colombo 03.

The Statements of Financial Performance, Financial Position, Statement of Cash Flows, Statements of Changes in Equity, as at and for the year ended 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021 were authorized and issued by the Council held on 14.03.2022

The Colombo Science & Technology Cell established as a limited Liability Company in line with the first schedule to the Companies Act No.7 of 2007.

### 1.2 Principal Activities and Nature of Operations

- a) to admit students and to provide instructions in any approved branch of learning;
- b) to hold examinations for the purpose of ascertaining the persons who have acquired proficiency in different branches of learning;
- c) to cooperate, by way of exchange of teachers, students and scholars or otherwise, with other Universities or institutions in Sri Lanka or abroad, having objects similar or substantially similar to those of the University;
- d) to provide Postgraduate courses, and for this purpose, to cooperate with other universities or authorities in Sri Lanka or abroad, in such manner and for such purposes as the University may determine;
- e) to grant confer degrees, diplomas and other academic distinctions to and on persons who have pursued approved courses of study in the university or in any recognized institution and who have passed the examinations of the University prescribed by By-laws;
- f) Research and disseminates knowledge as a co- activity

### 1.3 Going Concern

The University has made an assessment of the University and its ability to continue as a going concern and is satisfied that it has the resources to continue its entity for the foreseeable future. Furthermore, the Council is not aware of any material uncertainties that may cast significant doubt upon the University's ability to continue as a going concern. Based on this the Financial Statements have been prepared on the going concern basis.

### 1.4 Financial Period

The Financial period of the University is from 01<sup>st</sup> January to 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021.

All accounting policies adopted by the University are consistent with those of the previous year, where necessary comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to the changes, in presentation of current year figures.

### 1.5 Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements

#### 1.5.1 Statement of Compliance

The Financial Statements of the University of Colombo have been prepared under the historical cost convention in conformity with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Sri Lanka.

These Financial Statements comprise the Statement of Financial Performance, Statement of Financial Position, Statement of Cash Flows, Statement of Changes in Equity and Notes to the Financial Statements.

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of the Financial Statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all periods presented in the Financial Statements unless otherwise stated.

The Financial Statements were not incorporated with the financial status of the University students' societies and Colombo Science & Technology Cell.



### **1.5.2 Basis of Measurement**

The Financial Statements have been prepared on accrual basis and under the historical cost basis, except where appropriate disclosures are made with regard to fair value under relevant notes.

### **1.5.3 Comparative Information**

Comparative information including quantitative, narrative and descriptive information is disclosed in respect of the previous period for all amounts reported in the Financial Statements, in order to enhance the understanding of the Financial Statements of the current period and to improve comparability.

### **1.5.4 Materiality and Aggregation**

Each material class of similar items have been presented separately in the Financial Statements. Items of dissimilar nature or function have been presented separately unless they are immaterial.

### **1.5.5 Offsetting**

Assets and liabilities, and revenue and expenses have not been offset unless required or permitted by the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

### **1.5.6 Events after the date of the Statement of Financial Position**

All material events after the reporting date have been considered and where appropriate adjustments or disclosure wherever necessary have been made in the Financial Statements.

### **1.5.7 Functional & Presentation Currency**

Items included in the Financial Statements of the University are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the University operated (the functional currency). These Financial Statements are prepared and presented in 'Sri Lankan Rupees' (Rs.), which is the functional and presentation currency of the University.

### **1.5.8 Transactions of Foreign Currency**

All foreign exchange transactions are converted to Sri Lankan Rupees, which is the reporting currency, at the rates of exchange prevailing at the time the transactions were effected.

### **1.5.9 Rounding**

The amounts in financial statements have been rounded-off to the nearest rupee, unless otherwise indicated as permitted by the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

### **1.5.10 Significant Accounting Estimates and Judgments**

The preparation and presentation of Financial Statements, in conformity with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards, require management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenditure. Actual results may differ from these estimates and judgments used.

Information about significant areas of estimates, uncertainty and critical judgments in applying accounting policies that have the most significant effects on the amounts recognized in the Financial Statements are as follows:

#### **(a) Defined Retirement Benefit Plan**

The cost of the retirement benefit plan of employees is determined using Projected Unit Credit (PUC) method. Such method involves use of assumptions concerning the rate of interest, rate of salary increase and retirement age. Due to the long-term nature of the plan, such estimates are subject to significant uncertainty.

#### **(b) Changes in Accounting Estimates and Judgments**

Any changes in accounting estimates and critical judgments are disclosed in the relevant notes to the Financial Statements.

### **(c) Health and Safety Measures**

In response to the COVID-19 Outbreak, the University's priority is to ensure the health and safety of our stakeholders that include employees and students. The University has to curtail Examinations, Seminars and Workshops and other Short Courses due to the restrictions imposed by the Government adhering to the health regulations. In that context the University has moved more into digital work to provide a value-added service to its stakeholders.

#### **1.5.11 Commitments and Contingencies**

All risks are accounted for in determining the amounts of all known liabilities. Contingent liabilities are possible obligations whose existence will be confirmed only by uncertain future events or present obligations where the transfer of economic benefit is not probable or cannot be reliably measured. Contingent liabilities are not recognized in the Statement of Financial Position but are disclosed unless they are remote.

#### **1.5.12 Contingent Liabilities**

No provision has been made in the accounts with regard to liabilities arising out of litigation. The total estimated amount of liabilities as at 31st December 2021 is Rs. 508 Million for three Court cases.

#### **1.5.13 Events after the Reporting Period**

The materiality of events occurring after the reporting period has been considered and appropriate adjustments, wherever necessary, have been made in the Financial Statements.

#### **1.5.14 Accelerating Higher Education Expansion and Development (AHEAD) Project**

The Government of Sri Lanka (GoSL) and the World Bank have agreed to support the higher education sector

through a World Bank Funded Accelerating Higher Education Expansion and Development (AHEAD) operation.

The implementing agency of AHEAD project is the Ministry of Education (MOE). The University Grants Commission (UGC) will coordinate the activities of the Universities. There will be an

Operations Monitoring and Support Team (OMST) which will coordinate and support all AHEAD activities between the MOE, UGC, and the Universities. The project related activities at the University level are coordinated by the Operations Technical Secretariat (OTS) office attached to each University.

## **2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies**

### **2.1 Statement of Financial Performance**

#### **2.1.1 Revenue Recognition**

Revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the University and the revenue can be reliably measured, regardless of when the payments are made. The following specific recognition criteria also be met before revenue is recognized.

##### **(a) Income from courses**

Income from fee levying courses are recognized as income based on periodic basis.

##### **(b) Income from Seminars/Workshops**

Seminars, Workshops, activities are recognized upon conducting the event.

##### **(c) Non-endowment Donations**

Non-endowment donations are recognized in the financial year they are received.

##### **(d) Interest Income**

Interest income is recognized on accrued basis

##### **(e) Gains /losses from sale of property, plant and equipment**

Net gains and losses on the disposal of property, plant and equipment are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance after deducting from the proceeds on disposal, the carrying value of the item disposed of any related selling expenses. In the case of any revalued asset, any balance remaining in the revaluation reserve account is transferred to the Statement of Financial Performance.

##### **(f) Other Income**

Any other income not specified under above categories is recognized on accrual basis.

##### **(g) Income from Restricted Grants**

Restricted grants are provided based on agreements, contracts or other understanding, where the conditions for receipt of the funds are linked to a performance of a service or other process. The University earns the contribution through compliance with the conditions that have been laid down and meeting the envisaged obligations. Income is not recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance, until there is reasonable assurance that the grants will be received and the conditions stipulated for its receipt have been complied with and the relevant expenses that it is expected to compensate has

been incurred and charged to the Statement of Financial Performance. Receipt of the funds does not by itself provide conclusive evidence that the conditions attached to the contribution have been or will be fulfilled. Until the conditions have been fulfilled, the contribution is regarded as part of restricted funds.

On receiving any restricted grants, the grant is recognized in the Statement of Financial Position. Thereafter, on a systematic basis, an amount equivalent to that which has been spent on agreed "restricted" activities during the period, is taken to income. Unutilized funds are carried forward as such in the Statement of Financial Position.

#### **2.1.2 Recognition of Expenses**

(a) Expenses in carrying all activities of the University are recognized on accrued basis and charged to the Statement of Financial Performance during the period in which they are incurred.

(b) All expenses incurred in respect of undergraduate education have been charged to the government recurrent grant.

(c) All expenditure incurred in the acquisition, or improvement of assets of a permanent nature in order to carry on or increase the learning capacity of the students has been treated as capital expenditure.

(d) Expenses are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on the basis of direct association between cost incurred in the running of the University and in maintaining the capital assets in a state of efficiency have been charged to revenue in arriving at the surplus/deficit for the year.

##### **2.1.2.1 Project Expenses**

Expenses in carrying out the projects and other activities of the University are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance during the period in which they are incurred and the basis for identifying project expenses are mainly on locations of the project, staff allocated to the project and projected activities of the project according to the project proposal.



## STATEMENT OF FINANCIAL PERFOI

Expenses are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on the basis of direct association between the cost incurred and the earning of specific items of income.

### 2.1.2.2 Operational Expenses

All expenditure incurred in the running of the University and in maintaining the capital assets in a state of efficiency has been charged against income in arriving at the surplus for the year.

Expenditure on examinations, seminars and courses are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on the accruals basis.

### 2.1.2.3 Mahapola, Bursary and Scholarships

Mahapola Higher Education Scholarship Trust Fund has transferred students Mahapola Scholarship installment directly to students' bank accounts from April 2019. Mahapola Trust Fund and UGC spent Rs131.2 M and Rs.125.2 Million during the year as Mahapola Scholarship respectively. Further, University paid Rs.25.476 Million as Bursary to the undergraduate students.

### 2.1.2.4 Finance Expense

Finance expense is recognized on accrual basis when it is paid or creates liabilities.

### 2.1.2.5 Correction of errors

During the year 2021, discovered that online Journal Subscription, expenditure on two security hut, over calculation of Depreciation & Amortization and non-recording of Revaluation loss at Sri Palee Campus had been erroneously charged to the Statement of Financial Performance. The errors have been corrected by restating each of the affected **Financial Statement**, line items for prior periods. The following summarize the impacts on the University financial statement.

## 2.2 Statement of Finance Position

### 2.2.1 Current Assets

Current Assets classified in the Statement of Financial Position are those which will berecovered within one year after the Statement of Financial Position date.



### **(a) Cash and Cash Equivalents**

Cash & Cash Equivalents comprise cash in hand and the bank balances.

### **(b) Receivables**

A sum of Rs.74.394 Million is due from employees who breach of bonds and agreements as at 31.12.2021. Legal Action has been taken against them.

### **(c) Inventories & Stocks**

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realizable value. In general, cost is determined on a first-in-first-out basis and includes expenditure incurred in acquiring the inventories and bringing them to their existing condition and location.

The Inventory of the University includes stationery, chemicals, consumables, pharmaceutical items and maintenance items.

## **2.2.2 Non- current Assets**

### **(a) Property, Plant & Equipment**

Lands, Buildings, Laboratory and Teaching Equipment, Fixtures & Fittings, Library Books and Periodicals, Motor Vehicles, Cloaks and Other Assets include the items acquired out of government grants, research grants, internally generated funds, World Bank projects and donations.

In order to receive the ownership of the land at Homagama, Pitipana, Mahanawatta provided by the Government to construct the Faculty of Technology, the University is requested to pay Rs.731 Million to the UDA and the Ministry of Education agreed to pay this amount.

### **(i) Basis of Recognition and Measurement**

Property, Plant and Equipment are recognized if it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the entity and the cost of the item can be reliably measured.

All property, plant and equipment are stated initially at cost and subsequently measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses. Repair and maintenance costs are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance as incurred. The carrying value of

property, plant and equipment are reviewed for impairment when events or changes in circumstances indicate that carrying value may not be recoverable.

### **(ii) Initial Recognition**

Equipment costing less than Rs. 2,500 per individual item is typically written-off in the year of purchase. All other Equipment is capitalized on the basis of nature. Equipment is capitalized if it is tangible, has a life of more than one year. The life of an asset is dependent on its category within 8 categories, ranging from 4 to 20 years.

### **(iii) Subsequent Expenditure on Existing Property, Plant and Equipment**

Expenditure incurred on tangible fixed assets is charged to the Statement of Financial Performance in the period it is incurred, unless it meets one of the following criteria, in which it is capitalized and is depreciated on the relevant basis.

- (a) Market value of fixed assets has subsequently increased.
- (b) Asset capacity increase.
- (c) Sustainable improvement in the quality of output or reduction in operating cost.
- (d) Significant extension of the asset life beyond that has already been confirmed by repair and maintenance.

### **(iv) Cost Revaluation Model**

After initial recognition, University chooses the cost model measure all items of property, plant and equipment in accordance with SLPSAS 7's requirement for that model i.e. at cost less any accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment basis.

### **(v) Buildings belongs to other Institutions**

Buildings of the Institute of Biochemistry Molecular Biology and Biotechnology, School of Computing, National Institute of Library & Information Sciences located in the University land.

### **(vi) Depreciation**

Depreciation is recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on a Straight-Line Method over the estimated useful life of Property, Plant and Equipment items from the date that they

were made available for use. Lands are not depreciated. The estimated useful life periods are as follows.

Depreciation is provided from the date of purchase and up to the date of disposal, based on the period used.

#### **(vii) Lease – Finance Lease**

Leases in terms of which the University assumes substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership are classified as finance leases. On initial recognition, the leased asset under property, plant and equipment, is measured at an amount equal to the lower of its fair value and the present value of minimum lease payments. Subsequent to initial recognition, the asset is accounted for in accordance with the accounting policy applicable to that asset.

Minimum lease payments under finance leases are apportioned between the finance expense and the reduction of the outstanding liability. The finance expense is allocated to each period during the lease term so as to produce a constant periodic rate interest on the remaining balance of the liability.

During the year University paid Rs. 2,611,812 as lease rental.

#### **(viii) Maintenance of Premises**

The University has a maintenance plan which is reviewed periodically and forms the basis of the on-going maintenance of the assets. The cost of maintenance is charged to the Statement of Performance.

#### **(ix) Write off Assets**

##### **(a) Muttiah Hostel Premises**

Muttiah hostel acquired by UDA during the year and UDA handed over Kalinga Mawatha 12 storied housing complex to the University for

hostel and transferring legal ownership process to the University was not completed as at 31.12.2021

##### **(b) Faculty of Science**

Value of Rs. 2,330,000 relating to the building at Faculty of Science Garage and Plant Science Lab building demolished during the year.

##### **(b) Work in Progress**

Work-in-progress is stated at cost, less any impairment losses. These are expenses of a capital nature, directly incurred in the construction of property, plant and equipment awaiting capitalization. Capital work-in-progress would be transferred to the relevant asset category in property, plant and equipment, when it is available for use i.e. when it is in the location and conditions necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by the University. Financial costs are not capitalized at part of additions to the fixed assets.

##### **(i) Construction of the Seventeen Storied Building for the Faculty of Medicine**

As per Cabinet paper No. 18/2071/824/026. The Bank of Ceylon has approved a term loan facility of Rs. 4,541,698,546 to the Contractor, Sanken Constructions (Pvt) Ltd. against a security of a stand by letter of credit issued by the People's Bank and the Letter of Comfort issued by the General Treasury to the Bank of Ceylon with following terms and conditions.

- (a) **Interest rate** : AWPLR + 2% p.a. (Interest rate) will be reset Bi-annually based on prevailing AWPLR.
- (b) **Period** : Fifteen years inclusive of a grace period of 3 years starting from 26-08-2019.
- (c) **Repayment** : Interest to be serviced Bi-annually inclusive of the grace period and Capital Bi-annually after the grace period.

The Ministry of Education should ensure to receive the Budgetary allocation from the Ministry of Finance for the purpose of repaying the interest and capital Bi-annually on due date.

- (d) **Disbursement of Term Loan** : On issuance of Interim Payment Certificate with related invoices

by the Contractor (Sanken Constructions (Pvt) Ltd.) certified by the Consultant (State Engineering Corporation) to the Vice Chancellor of the University of Colombo.

Rs. 1,211.07 Million was paid to the MS. Sanken Constructions (Pvt) Ltd. during the year 2021 as per Interim Payment Certificates issued by the Consultant. Bank of Ceylon charged Rs. 229.48 Million as interest to the utilized loan amounted to Rs. 3,304.02 Million as at 31-12-2021 and funds allocated from the Ministry of Education budget for this payment.

### **(c) Intangible Assets**

#### **Computer Software**

Acquired computer software licenses are capitalized on the basis of the costs incurred to acquire and bring to use. These costs are amortized over their estimated useful life of five (5) years.

Costs associated with maintaining computer software programmes are recognized as an expense as incurred. Costs that are directly associated with the production of identifiable and unique software products controlled by the University are recognized as intangible assets when the following criteria are met:

- (i) technical feasibility to complete the software product so that it will be available for use and the Management to complete the software product for use.
- (ii) ability to use the software product;
- (iii) ability to demonstrate how the software product will generate probable future economic benefits;
- (iv) adequate technical, financial and other resources to complete the development and to use the software product are available; and
- (v) the expenditure attributable to the software product during its development can be reliably measured.

Directly attributable costs that are capitalized as part of the software product include the software development employee costs and an appropriate portion of relevant overheads.

Cost recognized as intangible assets are amortized over their estimated useful lives, which do not exceed five (5) years. Costs relating to development of software are carried in capital work-in-progress until the software is ready for use.

### **2.2.3 Current Liabilities**

Liabilities classified as Current Liabilities in the Statement of Financial Position are those that fall due for payment within one year from the date of the Statement of Financial Position. All known liabilities have been accounted for in preparing the Financial Statements.

#### **(a) Creditors and Accrued Expenses**

Creditors and Accrued expenses are measured at fair value and are subsequently measured at amortized cost using effective interest rate.

#### **(b) Deferred Income**

Deferred income results when invoices relating to Self Financing Activities (Study programmes) are raised at the commencement of the study programme where the study programme delivery takes place over a period of several years. Deferred income is recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance to the extent of study programme delivery taken place and the balance attributable to the remaining course period is recognized as a liability on the Statement of Financial Position until income is recognized.

### **2.2.4 Non-Current Liabilities**

#### **(a) Employee Benefits - Retirement Benefits Obligations**

##### **Employee Defined Benefit Plan – Gratuity**

Defined benefit plan is a post-employment benefit plan, other than a defined contribution plan. The defined benefit is calculated by an independent actuary using Projected Unit Credit (PUC) method. The present value of the defined benefit obligation is determined by discounting the estimated future cash outflows, using interest rates that are denominated in the currency in which the benefits will be paid and that have terms to maturity approximating to the terms of the related liability. The present value of the defined benefit obligations depends on a number



of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a number of assumptions about discount rate, future salary increments and mortality rates. Due to the long-term nature of these plans, such estimates are subject to significant uncertainty.

All assumptions are reviewed at each reporting date. Accordingly, the employee benefit liability is based on the actuarial valuation as of 31<sup>st</sup>December 2021. The University accounting policy for gratuity is to recognize actuarial gains and losses in the period in which they occur in full in the statement of other Financial Performance.

### Retirement Benefit Obligation

Actuarial and Management Consultant (Pvt) Ltd, qualified actuaries has done actuarial valuation on the defined benefit plan – Gratuity as at 31-12-2021. The assumptions used in determining the cost of retirement benefits are as follows.

### (b) Defined Contribution Plans – Employees' Provident Fund and Employees' Trust Fund

Employees are eligible for Employees' Provident Fund Contributions and Employees' Trust Fund Contributions in line with respective statutes and regulations. These are recognized as an expense in the Statement of Financial Performance as incurred. The University contributes 7%, 8% and 3% of gross emoluments of the employees' salaries to University Provident Fund, University Pension Fund and Employees' Trust Fund respectively. Employees also contribute 10% to the University Provident Fund.

### 2.2.5 Reserved and Restricted Funds

#### (a) Accounting for the Receipt and Utilization of Funds, Grants and Reserves.

The University received various grants for specific development activities, student activities, endowment etc. Funds, grants and reserves have been classified as unrestricted funds, restricted funds and endowment funds.

#### (i) Unrestricted Funds

Unrestricted funds are those that are available for use by the University at the discretion of the Council and funds that are designated for a specific purpose by the Council in furtherance of the general objectives of the University. Allocations made by the University for the credit of the designated funds are charged to the Statement of Financial Performance. Surplus funds are transferred from restricted funds to unrestricted funds in terms of the relevant donor agreements or with the subsequent approval of the donor.

Contributions and donations received from the general public are recognized in the Statement of

Financial Performance at the time of receipt, where there are no terms of references.

The total value of Unrestricted Fund as at 31.12.2021 is Rs. 1,443,872,471.

#### **(ii) Restricted Funds**

Where grants/donations are received for use in an identified project or activity, such funds are held in a restricted fund account and transferred to the Statement of Financial Performance to match with expenses incurred in respect of that identified project. Unutilized funds are held in their respective fund accounts and included under accumulated fund and reserves in the Statement of Financial Position until such time as they are required.

Where approved grant expenditure exceeds the income received and there is certainty that the balance will be received, such amounts are recognized through receivables in the Statement of Financial Position.

The total value of Restricted Fund as at 31.12.2021 is Rs. 300,643,058.

#### **(b) Endowment Funds**

Where assets are received as an endowment, which are not exhausted, only the income earned from such assets may be recognized and used as income.

Investments income and other gains realized from funds available under each of the above categories.

The total value of Endowment Fund as at 31.12.2021 is Rs. 190,951,824.

### **2.2.6 Equity**

#### **(a) Capital Grant**

Government Grant is recognized at their fair value where there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received, and all affecting conditions will be complied with.

Donated tangible fixed assets, except for non-depreciable fixed assets donated for use by the

University are valued and taken to Donation Account.

#### **(b) Recurrent Grant**

Recurrent grants are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on cash basis. Cost of rehabilitation of Fixed Assets and Capital Grants for construction and new work recognized either as work in progress or Capital Assets where necessary..

#### **(c) Designated Specific Funds**

Surplus on income over expenditure of the activities are generally accounted under Designated General funds in the University, Statement of Financial Position. Designated General Funds include funds set aside for specific or committed purpose such as planned operational activities of faculties, departments and self-financing activities of the University.

The total value of Designated Specific Fund as at 31.12.2021 is Rs. 1,744,515,529.

### **2.3 Statement of Cash Flows**

The cash flow statement has been prepared by using the Indirect Method in accordance with the SLPSAS where by gross cash receipts and gross cash payments of operating activities, finance activities and investing activities have been recognized. Cash and cash equivalents comprise short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

**Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements and other legal and monitoring requirements of the University of Colombo for the year ended 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021 in terms of section 12 of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.**

**1. Financial Statements**

**1.1 Qualified Opinion**

The audit of Financial Statements of the University of Colombo for the year ended 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021 comprising the Statement of Financial Position as at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021 the Statement of Financial Performance, Statement of Changes in Equity Cash Flow Statement for the year ended and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes were carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions laid down by section 20 of the Ordinance of University of Colombo No. 1 of 1980 vested upon by subsection 107 (5), section 18 and section 108 (1) of the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978 which should be read in conjugation with Article 154 (1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka and section 12 of the of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018. My report will be tabled in the parliament in due course in terms of Article 154 (6) of the Constitution.

In my opinion, except for the matters described in the paragraph on “Basis for Qualified Opinion” of this report the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position as at 31 December 2021 and its financial performance and cash flows for the year ended 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021 in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

**1.2 Basis for Qualified Opinion**

- a) As per the provisions of the paragraph 47 of the no.03 of Sri Lanka Public Accounting Standards, an entity shall correct material prior period errors retrospectively in the first set of financial statements authorized for issue after their discovery by restating the comparative amounts for prior period presented in which the error occurred. Instead of adhering to the above procedure, adjustments aggregating to Rs. 52,289,239 and Rs. 154,222,233 had been made within the year under review to the cost of Property, Plant and Equipment and Accumulative depreciation has been adjusted respectively in order to correct prior period errors at the reporting date.
- b) Property, Plant and Equipment in which the total cost was Rs.372,651,424 were still in use in spite of having been fully depreciated as the residual value and the useful life of an asset had not been annually reviewed as per the provisions of the paragraph 65 of no.07 in Sri Lanka Public Accounting Standards. Action had not been taken to revise the Accounting estimation error occurred as per no.03 in Sri Lanka Public Accounting Standards. Moreover, action had not been taken to disclose such assets as per chapter 92 of the standard.
- c) Capital grants of Rs. 891,715,586, gifts and donations of Rs.25,307,476 received during the year under review had not been identified and measured in the financial statements in accordance with no.11 of the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

- d) Course income totalling Rs. 58,551,241 related to 39 courses which were started from the year 2016 to 2020 and completed by 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021 had not been properly recognized as income in the relevant years. As a result, the income of above each year had been understated and the deferred income as at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021 had been overstated by Rs. 58,551,241.

I conducted my audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards. My responsibilities, under those standards, are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of my report. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate enough to provide a basis for my qualified opinion.

### **1.3. Other Information in the 2021 Annual Report of the university**

Other information refers to the information included in the Annual report which does not include in Financial Statements and my audit report there on. The management is responsible for the other information.

My opinion on the Financial Statements does not cover the other information and I will not express any form of assurance or conclusion there on.

My responsibility is to read the other information identified above when it becomes available and in doing so, Consider whether other information is materially inconsistent with the Financial Statements or my knowledge obtain during the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If I conclude that other information is materially misstatement therein based on other information obtained by me and work performed by me prior to the date of the auditor's report, I am required to report that fact. I have nothing to report in this regard.

### **1.4 Responsibility of Management and Controlling Parties for the Financial Statements**

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards and for such internal controls as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of Financial Statements that are free from material misstatements whether due to fraud or error.

It is the responsibility of the management to assess the ability to continue as going concern of the University in the preparation of Financial Statements, disclosing, as applicable matters, related to the going concern of the University and using the going concern basis of accounting except in case the management intends to liquidate the University or its intended to cease operation or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

The controlling parties of the University are responsible for the financial reporting system.

According to subsection 16 (1) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018, University shall maintain proper books and records of all its income, expenditure, assets and liabilities, to enable annual and periodic financial statements to be prepared in respect of the University.

### **1.5. Auditor's Responsibility for the Audit of Financial Statements**

My objective is to provide a reasonable assurance on the Financial Statements as a whole are free from material misstatements whether due to fraud or error and to issue an Auditor's Report that concludes my opinion. Although reasonable assurance is a high-level assurance, it does not guarantee that it would always detect material misstatements when the audit is conducted in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards will always detect material misstatements when

it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error, If individually or aggregative it may reasonably be expected to have an influence on the decisions taken by the users based on these financial statements.

As part of the audit in accordance with Sri Lanka auditing standards, I exercised professional judgement and professional scepticism throughout the audit. Also,

- Identify and assess the risk of material misstatements of the financial statements due to fraud and error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks and Obtain sufficient and appropriate audit evidence to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from Fraud will have higher than for one resulting from the error. Fraud may involve collusion, preparation of forgery documents, intentional omission and override of internal controls.
- The auditor considered internal controls relevant to the University in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the University's internal controls.
- Evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and the related disclosures made by the management.
- The relevance of using the going concern basis for accounting purpose was determined based on the audit evidence obtained on whether there is a sufficient doubt that University's ability to continue as a going concern due to events or conditions. In case I conclude that there is material uncertainty exists, required to draw attention in my audit report on the related disclosures in the Financial Statements if such disclosures are inadequate and my opinion must be modified. However, going concern may end due to future events or conditions.
- Evaluation of the overall Presentation structure and content of the Financial Statements with disclosures were assessed and underlying transactions and events f whether they were included in the Financial Statements in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

The controlling parties are made aware of the important audit findings, major internal control weaknesses and other facts recognized during the audit.

## **2 Report on other Legal and Monitoring Requirements**

- 2.1. Special provisions are included regarding the following requirements in the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.
  - 2.1.1 I have obtained all the information and explanations required for the audit according to section 12 (a) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018, except for the impact of matters described in the paragraph "Basis for Qualified Opinion" of this report. As far as appears from my investigation, proper accounting records have been kept by the University.
  - 2.1.2 According to the requirements of section 6 (I) (d) (iii) of National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018, the Financial Statements presented by the university are inconsistent with the preceding year.
  - 2.1.3. According to the requirements of section 6 (I) (d) (iv) of National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018, the recommendations made by me in the previous year have been included in the presented Financial Statements.
- 2.2. According to of the procedures followed, evidence obtained and within the restriction of the quantitative matters, nothing caught my attention that was sufficient to make the following statements.

- 2.2.1 According to the requirements of section 12 (d) of National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018, any member of the council of the University has any direct or indirect interest in any contract entered into by the University that is outside the normal business arrangement.
- 2.2.2 According to the requirements of section 12 (f) of National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018 ,the auditee entity has not complied with any applicable written law or other general or special directions issued by the governing body of the auditee entity.
- 2.2.3

(a) Section 26 of the Universities Act of 1978	Although a campus had been established affiliated to the University of Colombo , namely Sri Palee Campus, no action had been taken to prepare protocols and to table it at the parliament as per the aforesaid section.
(b) Gazette no. 928/16 dated 20 <sup>th</sup> June 1996	Two academic departments had been established without establishing two academic faculties for the campus. Candidates had been recruited for language and computer courses. Those courses had been conducted and certificates had been issued as well.
(c) Public Administration Circular 2018/03 dated 20 <sup>th</sup> February 2018	Five retired officers had been reinstated within the time range of September, 2015 to November, 2021 contrary to the provisions of the circular. Allowances totalling to Rs. 8,605, 909 had been paid to them, only for the years 2020 and 2021.
(d) Public Accounting Circular 30/94 dated 20 <sup>th</sup> April 1994 and the letter no. SC&PMU/Grant/ 19 of the Director General of the Department of External Resources dated 25 <sup>th</sup> July 2019	Even though the foreign grants received from foreign countries should be obtained through the Department of External Resources upon the approval and acceding of such department and should be utilized adhering to the guidelines 610- 626 of the Financial Regulations, the proper procedure had not been adhered to in utilizing a direct foreign grant received by the university from the Japanese government amounting to Rs, 15,458,330.

- 2.2.4 According to the requirements of section 12 (g) of National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018, the university has not performed according to its powers, functions and duties.
- 2.2.4 According to the requirements of section 12 (h) of National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018, the resources of the auditee entity had not been procured and utilized economically, efficiently and effectively within the time frames and in compliance with the applicable laws.

### **2.3. Other Observations**

1. Ten (10) officers had been recruited on contract basis and assignment basis within a time range of six (06) months to six years (06) for eight (08) posts that had not been approved by the Department of Management Services and an amount of Rs. 21,869,071 had been paid as salaries from the funds of the University from January, 2020 to November, 2021.
2. Three (03) external institutions run on the University premises from September, 2019 to October, 2021 had been undercharged . Consequently, the amount charged has been rent Rs.2,407,512 than the proper amount that should have been charged. Also from the year 2006, space and facilities had been provided to establish a branch of a state bank and two (02) ATM machines of two (02) state banks in the university premises without signing an agreement and charging rent.
3. The University had failed to collect Rs.85,640,251 due from Twenty four (24) members of the academic staff who had been overseas for academic purposes due to violation of bonds & agreements as at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021
4. The University had failed to collect Rs. 7,640,438 due from two institutions affiliated with it for over 3 years even by December 31, 2021.
5. An applicant who did not meet the required qualifications mentioned in the recruitment procedure had been recruited for the post of Works Engineer (Civil - Grade III) of Sri Palee Campus in the year 2019.
6. No action had been taken to settle the creditor balances, time lapse over 1 to 3 years aggregating to Rs. 26,537,970 as at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021.

**Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements of the University of Colombo for the year ended 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021 and other legal and monitoring requirements in terms of section 12 of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018.**

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**1. Financial Statements**

**1.1 Qualified Opinion**

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The audit of Financial Statements of the University of Colombo for the year ended 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021 comprising the Statement of Financial Position as at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021, the Statement of Financial Performance, Statement of Changes in Equity, Cash Flow Statement for the year ended and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes were carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions laid down by section 20 of the Ordinance of University of Colombo No. 1 of 1980 vested upon by subsection 107 (5) and section 18 of the Universities Act No 16 of 1978, section 108 (1) of the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978 which should be read in conjugation with Article 154 (1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka and section 12 of the of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018. My report will be tabled in the parliament in due course in terms of Article 154 (6) of the Constitution.

In my opinion, except for the matters described in the paragraph on “Basis for Qualified Opinion” of this report the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position as at 31 December 2021 and its financial performance and cash flows for the year ended 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021 in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

1.2	Basis for Qualified Opinion -----	Current Status -----
(a)	As per the provisions of the paragraph 47 of the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard No. 3, when a prior period error is identified, an entity must restate the comparative amounts of the prior period in which the error occurred in the first set of financial statements authorized for release after discovering material prior period errors. Instead of adhering to the above procedure, adjustments aggregating to Rs. 52,289,239 and Rs. 154,222,233 had been made within the year under review to the cost of Property, Plant and Equipment and Accumulative depreciation respectively.	This had been indicated as adjustments made to the prior periods in accounting note no. 12 and the restated value for the year 2021 is also clearly stated under note 2.1.2.5 of the financial statements.
(b)	Property, Plant and Equipment aggregating to Rs. 372,651,424 were still in use in spite of having been fully depreciated as the residual value and the useful life of the asset had not been annually reviewed as per the provisions of the paragraph 65 of Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard no.7. Action had not been taken to revise the estimation error as per Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard no.3. The association makes a request to reconsider increasing the monthly rent of the bookshop considering the services rendered to the undergraduates by running the bookshop by such association, regarding the activities related to the swimming pool complex proposed to be built at this place by the Alumni Association, as well as the fact that building such swimming pool complex would result in shifting the bookshop to another place in the near future.</p> <p>Accordingly, the 539th Council meeting of the University held on 12.07.2018, granted approval to sign a new lease agreement at a monthly rent of Rs.25,420.00. adding a rent increment of 25% to the previous monthly rent of Rs.20,333.33 from April 01, 2018 to March 30, 2020, considering the services provided by the Alumni Association to the University and the proposed development activities to be carried out by them in the University.</p>
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		<p>Accordingly, although the Alumni Association was informed several times with a draft of the new lease agreement prepared for the period from 01 April 2018 to 31 March 2020 to sign this lease agreement during the relevant period, they did not sign it. Accordingly, the University of Colombo has also obtained a new valuation report regarding the University Bookshop, which has been valued at Rs.42,750.00. It has been informed that the above monthly rental value should be included in the lease agreement for a period of two years from 01.04.2020 onwards.</p> <p>Therefore, the 576th Council held on 13.01.2021 approved the selection of a suitable buyer by inviting open bids for this university bookshop. Action was taken to select a suitable buyer by inviting open bids, where no buyer had submitted tenders for the University Bookshop.</p> <p>Therefore, according to the instructions of the Registrar of the University of Colombo, the information was submitted to the Council of the University of Colombo for recommendations regarding the University Bookshop. Accordingly, at the 595<sup>th</sup> Council meeting held on 24.05.2022 the approval was granted to select a suitable buyer by inviting open bids for this university bookshop, finalizing the contract and negotiating with the Alumni Association to collect all dues. At present, arrangements are being made to sign the lease agreement for the university bookshop after discussing with the Colombo University Alumni Association. The Alumni Association has been informed to pay all outstanding amounts related to the University Bookshop before signing the lease agreement. The future steps regarding the university bookshop are being taken in accordance with the decision of the council of the University of Colombo mentioned above. Therefore, the Alumni Association has been informed to sign the draft lease agreement for the period which it was not signed and also it was informed pay all arrears relating to this. Further, the related tender procedure has been initiated for inviting open quotations to select a new buyer.</p> <p>In addition, the above activities have been delayed due to the disruptions and other unavoidable reasons in carrying out the above activities in view of the global epidemic situation of COVID-19 in the country.</p>
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		<p>Furthermore, since it has been decided to move the university bookshop to the newly constructed "Help Zone" building, a new lease agreement is also to be signed accordingly.</p> <p><b>The Bank Premises</b></p> <p>I would like to inform that although a plot of land has been allocated in the university for the provision of services of the People's Bank and for the provision of the ATM machine facility of the National Savings Bank, it has been difficult to find any information about a signed lease agreement or rent payment in connection with it. However, the availability of files with such information will be investigated further in the future. Also, we are planning to complete the work on the "Help Zone" building that is currently being constructed in the university, and the contractor of the "Help Zone" project has requested for an extension of time until the end of October 2022 to complete this project. Once the construction is completed, this People's Bank and National Savings Bank ATM will be moved to the new building.</p> <p>Further, requests have already been made to obtain new assessment reports from the Government Valuation Department for these banks and other workplaces. you are kindly informed that once the new assessment reports are received, new tax agreements will be prepared and properly maintained for these banks. The People's Bank and the National Savings Bank have been informed in this regard as well.</p> <p><u>The Milk bar (Art faculty premises)</u></p> <p>The University was temporarily closed on 16.03.2021 due to the curfew and movement restrictions in the country caused by the prevailing Covid-19 epidemic situation. Therefore, the Milk bar at the Art faculty premises was also temporarily closed.</p> <p>But since the milk bar at the Faculty of Arts was opened from time to time in the years 2020 and 2021, the Milko Company has sent us a request by letter dated 25.10.2021 to collect rent and electricity charges only for such period. (Annexure 2.3 (b) 1). However, the University has informed Milko</p>
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		<p>Company to pay the full due amount by the letter dated 11-11-2021. (Annexure 2.3 (b) 2). Also by letters dated 08.12.2021 and 23.06.2022, reminder letters have been sent by email and registered mail.
