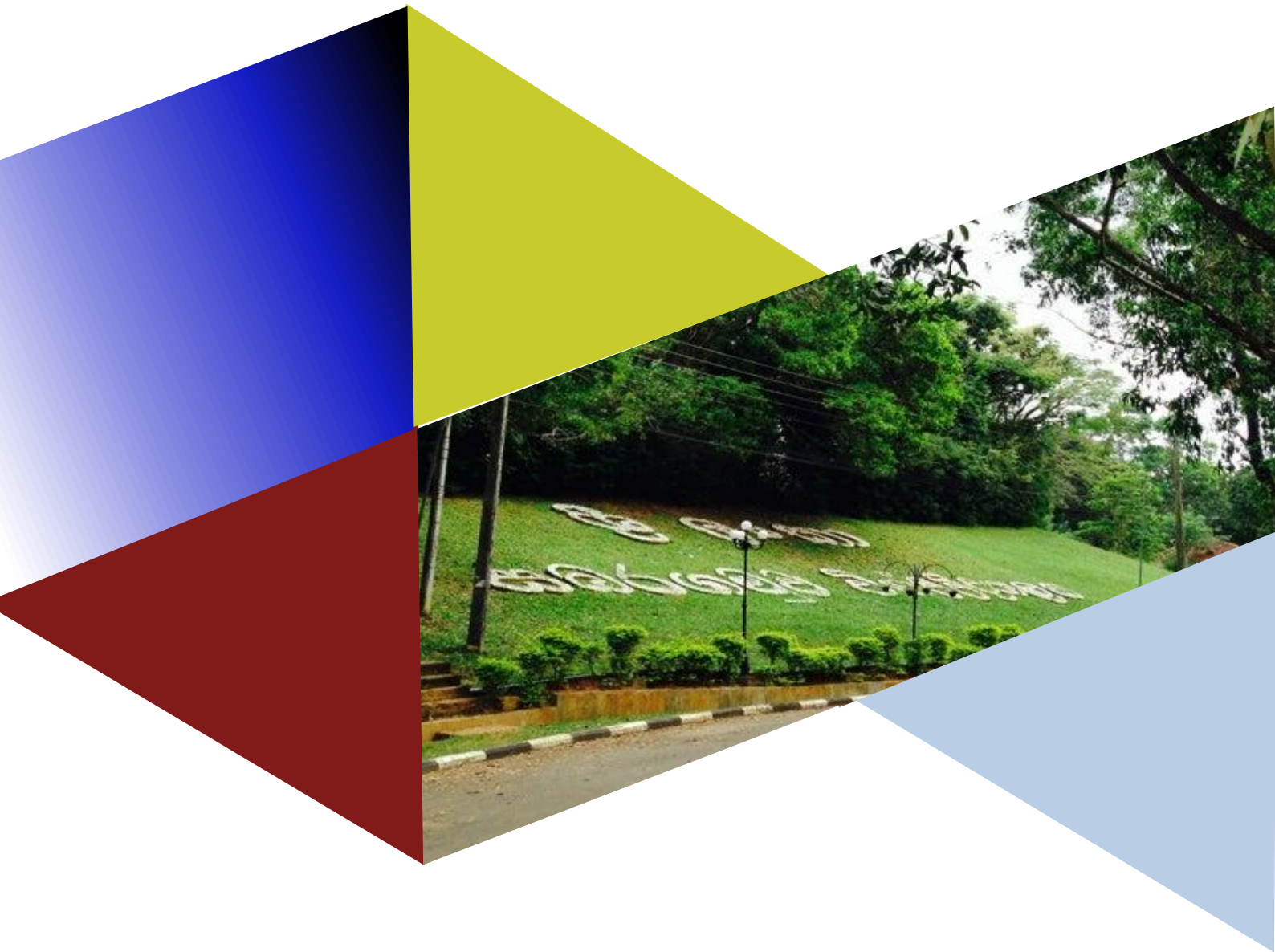

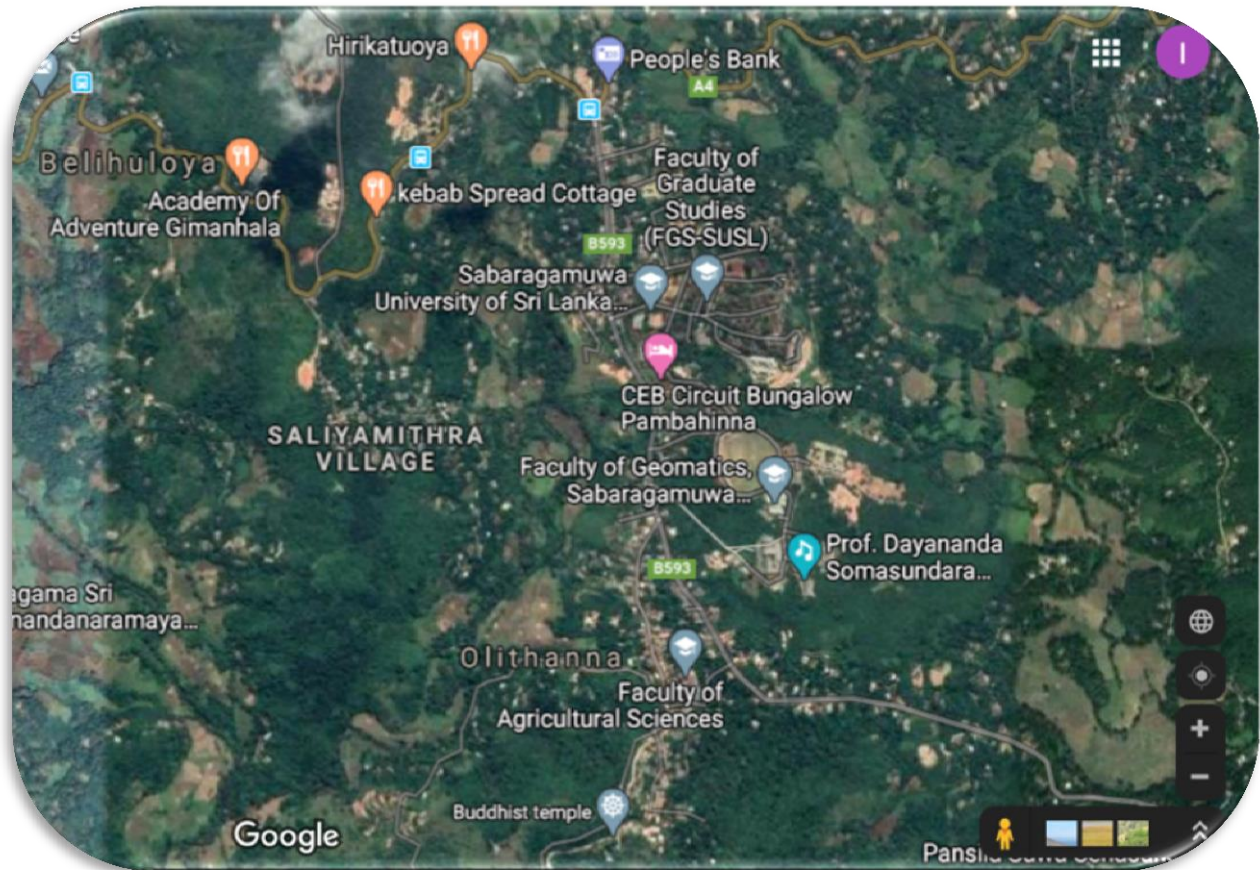

## VICE - CHANCELLOR'S REVIEW – 2021



It is a great pleasure to issue a message to the Annual Report 2021 of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka at this memorable occasion of the fulfilment of its very successful 25 years of being a National University in Sri Lanka. The Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka is located at Pambahinna, 162 kilometres away from the capital from the Colombo – Badulla A4 highway near the town of Belihuloya and covers an area of approximately 253 acres.

At present, the University consists of eight (08) Faculties. They are; Faculty of Graduate Studies, Faculty of Agricultural Sciences, Faculty of Applied Sciences, Faculty of Geomatics, Faculty of Management Studies, Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages, Faculty of Technology and Faculty of Medicine. The Faculty of Medicine is located in Kuruwita, Ratnapura. The total number of internal students of the university in the year 2021 was 6880. The number of internal students enrolled for undergraduate programmes during the year was 2219 and 649 students were enrolled for postgraduate studies. In addition, 3454 students were registered for the courses offered by the Centre for Open and Distance Learning. The University has a total academic staff of 317, 34 administrative and executive staff, 23 academic support staff and 395 non – academic staff.

Due to COVID 19 pandemic situation, the year 2021 was a challenging period of time for teaching and learning for all institutes of the education sector in the country. However, despite this trying condition, through the commendable dedicated service of the innovative and capable academic, administrative and non-academic staff of the university and excellent support of the students, academic programs of the university including, lectures, practical as well as examinations were accomplished using different alternative methods. Further, the General Convocation of the university was also held on time despite all the restrictions and difficulties in the wake of the pandemic situation.

The Physical development activities of the university were conducted throughout the year without any discontinuation. Those includes, construction of building complexes for the Faculty of Applied Sciences (Rs. 453Mn), Faculty of Agriculture (Rs.798Mn.), Faculty of Medicine (Rs. 1014Mn.), Faculty of Technology (Rs. 2050Mn.), University Library (Rs.315Mn), construction of buildings under AHEAD project at Faculty of Applied Sciences (Rs. 31Mn.), Faculty of Social Science and Languages (34 Mn), Faculty of Management Studies (Rs. 3Mn.), construction of Helabojun Hala, renovation and development of internal road network of the university, number of development activities at the Agriculture farm, Green Park at Kumbalgama, staff accommodation renovations, and boundary wall constructions etc. Also, necessary actions were taken to submit the concept papers related to the Design and



construction of the Resource Management Building, Waste Water and Sewerage Treatment Plant and proposals for three new faculties, Faculty of Information Technology, Faculty of Sports and Faculty of Veterinary Animal Sciences.

The University has also taken steps to facilitate students and academic staff to enhance the research culture of the University. In the year 2021, four international conferences and three other research conferences were held. Further, the staffs of the university were able to secure nearly Rs.500Mn research funds for 16 outside funded research projects. 15 patent applications were submitted during the year and 9 agreements were signed with industrial partners for the commercialization of the outcomes of researches. Further, two new research journals were also launched in the year 2021.

Under the SMART university concept, development of systems for students' information management, staff information management as well as for the management of physical resources were started. Actions were taken to make administration of the university more effective and efficient by establishment of different administrative bodies such as Senior Management Committee, Students Support Services and Welfare System etc. Fifteen (15) policies were developed to make sure the fare governance at the university. To provide the community with a better service, the capabilities of the staff were improved by providing required training by conducting 66 workshops and training programs during the year.

Despite the COVID 19 pandemic situation, Sabaragamuwa University was able to be saucerful in the year 2021 as a result of the remarkable service and commitment of the staff and students of the university. Also, I gratefully acknowledge the University Grants Commission and the Ministry of Education who provided a visionary leadership and support throughout the year. My heartfelt thanks also go all of them for their dedicated work.

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## 1. THE UNIVERSITY

### 1.1 HISTORY OF THE UNIVERSITY



The history of Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka (SUSL) can be traced back to 1991 when it was initially established as an Affiliated University College at Belihuloya. In 1995, a committee was appointed by the Minister of Education and Higher Education to study the possibilities of re-structuring the Affiliated University Colleges in the country. In accordance with the recommendations made by the Committee, the government decided to upgrade Sabaragamuwa Affiliated University College to the status of a National University by amalgamating it with two other Affiliated University Colleges located at Rahangala and Buttala. They were renamed as Uva Campus of Sabaragamuwa University. Before the amalgamation, the Affiliated Colleges at Belihuloya and Buttala were affiliated to the University of Sri Jayewardenepura. Rahangala Affiliated University College was amalgamated with the University of Peradeniya. With the three amalgamated affiliated University Colleges, the Sabaragamuwa University was ceremonially declared the opening on February 2, 1996.

Subsequently, the Affiliated University Colleges at Rahangala and Buttala were converted into the Faculties of Agricultural Sciences and Applied Sciences and shifted to Belihuloya main campus in 2001 and 2008 respectively.

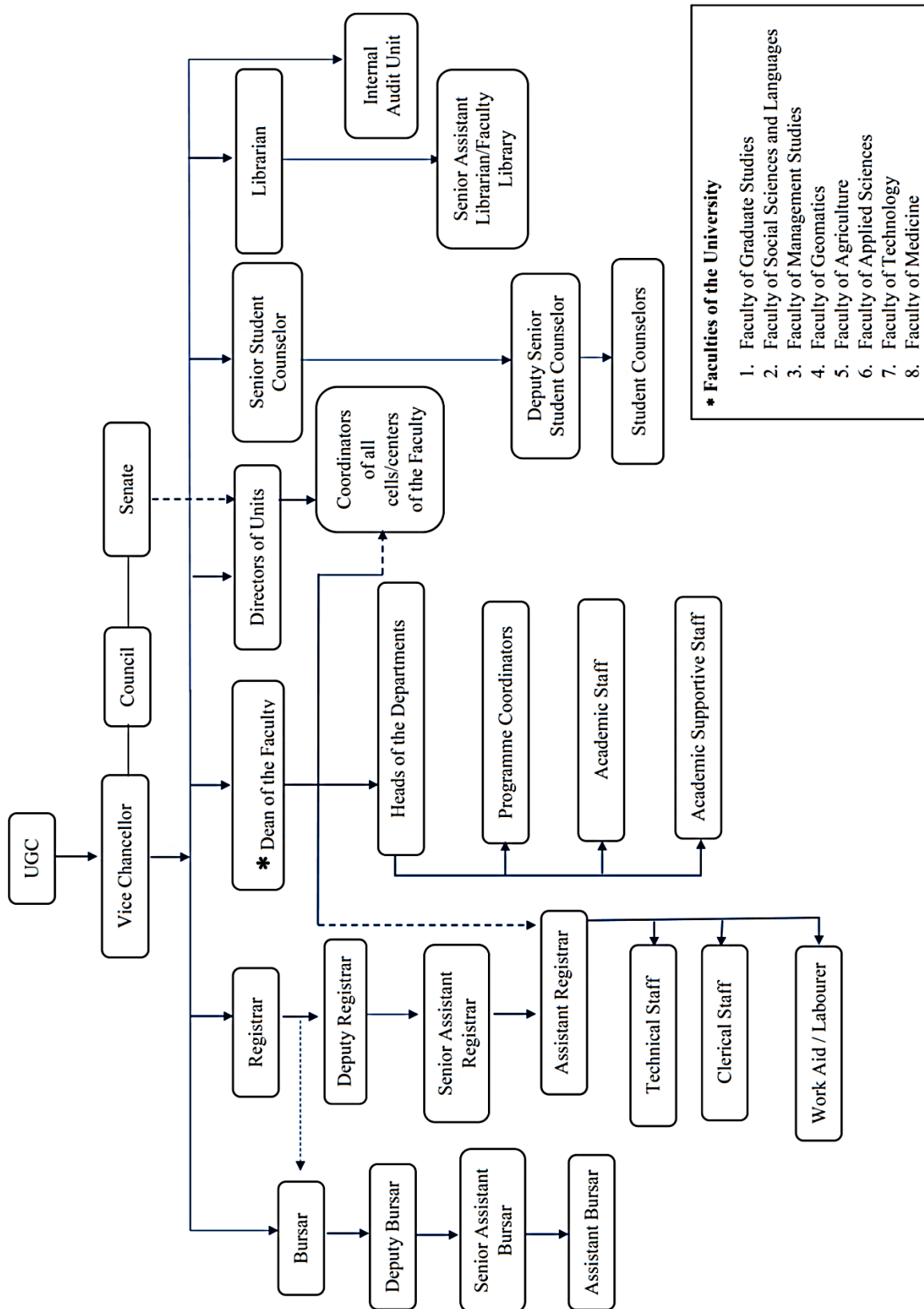

## 2. FACULTIES

### 2.1 FACULTY OF GRADUATE STUDIES

#### 2.1.1 BRIEF HISTORY

Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka (SUSL) offers its graduate qualifications through the Faculty of Graduate Studies (FGS). The University Grants Commission at its 928th meeting held on November 9, 2015, granted the approval to establish the Faculty of Graduate Studies.

Within this broader spectrum, FGS offers a wide range of postgraduate studies related to the fields such as Agricultural Sciences, Computing & Information Systems, Geomatics, Humanities, Management, Physical & Natural Sciences, Social Sciences, Sports Sciences and Physical Education, Medicine, Technology, Indigenous Knowledge and Community Studies. The students who follow the graduate degree programmes available in these fields certainly benefit in widening their research based knowledge not only to enhance the career progression but also to redefine the existing ontologies to reach beyond national spatiotemporal horizons.

At present (2021) the FGS conducts Twelve (12) Postgraduate programs. Among the programs offered there are Eight (8) taught programs leading to graduate qualifications at master level, two (2) Postgraduate Diplomas including Post Graduate Diploma in Business Administration, Master of Business Administration (MBA), MBA in Finance, MBA in Marketing, MBA in Tourism, MSc Ayurvedic Hospital Management, MSc Surveying Sciences, Master of Information Technology, MA English & Education and research higher degree programs leading to MPhil and Ph.D. qualifications. Further, the Faculty of Graduate Studies plans to offer Master of Business Economics and MSc in Business Economics in near future. All these programs are aligned with the Sri Lanka Qualification Framework (SLQF) and the subject benchmarks of the University Grant Commission in Sri Lanka.

Altogether there are 649 active postgraduate students in the Faculty of Graduate Studies and the objective of the FGS is to provide an opportunity as well as to facilitate effective and efficient delivery of study programmes through quality teaching and research training to produce individuals with graduate qualifications in their respective disciplines who are competent in facing the challenges of development both locally and internationally.

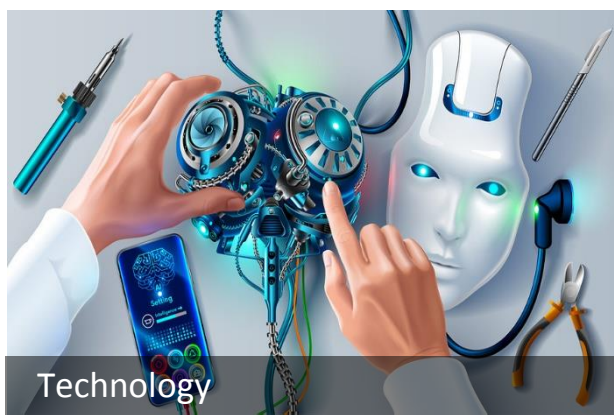

## 2.2 FACULTY OF AGRICULTURAL SCIENCES

### 2.2.1 BRIEF HISTORY

The Faculty of Agricultural Sciences of Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka was initially established at Rahangala in 1995 and was shifted to the main premises at Belihuloya in 2001. From 2001, academic programs were conducted with limited facilities at Belihuloya. In 2005 and 2018 the faculty was able to win competitive World Bank grants of Rs.82.5 million and Rs.120 million respectively to develop infrastructure and other academic facilities. A comprehensive curriculum revision was undertaken and the degree programme was renamed as Agricultural Sciences and Management.

### **2.2.3 DEGREE PROGRAMMES CONDUCTED BY THE FACULTY**

The Faculty is composed of three Departments of study such as Agribusiness Management, Export Agriculture and Livestock Production. The Faculty of Agricultural Sciences offers the following four year honours degree programmes.

- BSc Hons (Agricultural Sciences and Management) students can specialize in four fields such as Agribusiness Management, Agri-Environmental Resource Management, Crop Improvement & Plant Protection, Crop Production Technology, Animal Bio-resource Technology & Management, and Aquatic Bio-resource Technology & Management.
- BSc Hons (Food Business Management)

The Department of Export Agriculture offers three academic modules in Agri-Environmental Resource Management, Crop Improvement & Plant Protection, and Crop Production Technology. During the first four semesters (first 2 years), students need to follow core-courses for their general study on Agriculture followed by specialization either in Agribusiness Management, Agri-Environmental Resource Management, Crop Improvement & Plant Protection, Crop Production Technology and Animal Bio-resource Technology & Management, Aquatic Bio-resource Technology & Management for two more semesters (in the 3<sup>rd</sup> year). Students must select their field of specialization at the end of the second year, according their preferences. Farm Practice, Computer Sciences and English courses are offered in the first three years and students must reach a satisfactory grade for each course in each semester to complete the degree. In addition, elective courses are offered during the third year second semester and final year first semester. Students must select two elective courses in third year and four elective courses at final year according to their preferences. The second semester of the final year BSc Agricultural Sciences and Management student is allocated for industrial training while both semesters to the final year of Food Business Management Degree Programme allocated for industrial training which is a vital and specific



component of the degree programs and students must undertake a research in the specialized field. The medium of instruction of the degree program is English.

The Faculty organizes programs as the practical components of the degree programme in collaboration with farmers in the area to ensure that knowledge and skills are exchanged between students and farmers. As a result, the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences has developed close links with the surrounding communities. Furthermore, students are given an opportunity to visit various industries to get exposure to operational aspects of the industry and research organizations.

## 2.3 FACULTY OF APPLIED SCIENCES

### 2.3.1 BRIEF HISTORY

The Faculty of Applied Sciences of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka was initially started as the Buttala Affiliated University College (BAUC) on 21<sup>st</sup> June 1993. The BAUC offered two diploma courses, one in Food Science and Technology and the other in English Language. With the elevation of the Affiliated University Colleges to fully fledged national Universities in early 1996, three Affiliated University Colleges; Sabaragamuwa Affiliated University College, Uva Affiliated University College and Buttala Affiliated University College were amalgamated to form the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka and the BAUC became the Faculty of Applied Sciences of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka.

With effect from March 2008, the faculty has been relocated in the main university premises at Belihuloya.

### **2.3.3 DEGREE PROGRAMS CONDUCTED BY THE FACULTY**

The Faculty comprises five departments: The Department of Natural Resources, The Department of Physical Sciences & Technology, Department of Food Science & Technology, The Department of Computing & Information Systems and The Department of Sport Science and Physical Education.

The Faculty offers B.Sc. (Hons) degree programs in Food Science and Technology, Environmental Sciences and Natural Resource Management, Chemical Technology, Computer Science and Technology, Applied Physics, Computing and Information Systems, Sport Sciences and Management, Physical Education and Software Engineering for the students who gain direct entry to the Faculty on the basis of their performance at the GCE (Advanced Level) examination.

The degree programs are designed to be four-year degree programs with an exit point at three years for the students who graduate with a general degree in B.Sc. in Physical Sciences and Technology and Environmental Sciences and Management. The rest of the degree programs are strictly four-year degree programs.

The selection of the students for the B.Sc. degree programs in Sport Sciences and Management and Physical Education is done on the basis of the G.C.E. (A/L) results as well as the performance at a selection test (Written examination). The students who wish to get enrolled for the degree programs in Sport Sciences and Management and Physical Education are also required to face an examination for physical fitness in addition to the selection test. However, the selection procedure has been changed by the UGC through a circular and there will not be any further aptitude tests for the recruitment of undergraduates for the Faculty.

All degree programs offered through the faculty are designed to cater to the current job trends and demands both nationally and internationally. They are conducted exclusively in



English. These degree programs are designed as interdisciplinary by incorporating subjects as Computer Science, Economics, Management, etc. that has facilitated our students to perform well once graduating serving a wider field than being specific and narrowed to than specialized field.

Apart from the academic activities the Faculty also contributes to the development of the community and the nation through extension and knowledge Dissemination programs. The staff and the students participate in such activities annually.

### **Department of Computing and Information Systems**

The Department of Computing and Information Systems which offers a BSc Honours in Information Systems was established in 01<sup>st</sup> March 2011, though the Degree programme was initiated back in 2008. The curriculum is specifically designed to produce skilled graduates both in Computing and Information Systems. At present the department has three well established laboratories and the student capacity of the department is 312. The demand for the above degree programme has greatly increased thorough out the years and annual intake has reached the maximum capacity of 180 students per batch since 2021.

The Department of Computing and Information Systems also offers BSc Honours in Software Engineering since 2021 for the 2019/2020 academic year with an annual intake of 60 students.

The department has close collaborations with private computer industries to obtain technical support in conducting lectures and practical as well as to provide opportunities for the undergraduates to carry out their mini projects and final year projects. This also has increased the opportunity for the undergraduates to secure job opportunities immediately



after graduation. The staff of the Department consists of two professors, four senior lecturers and eight probationary lecturers.

### **Department of Food Science and Technology**

The Department of Food Science and Technology was established in 2005 even though the B.Sc. degree in Food Science and Technology was offered under the Department of Natural Resources since the inception of the Faculty in 1996. The range of the study areas includes Food Science Technology core, Applied Food Technologies, General Sciences, Statistics, Computer Science & Technology, Food Marketing, Industrial Economics and courses in scientific communication and career development. The degree program is designed for the students who wish to pursue professional careers in the field of Food Science and Technology. The knowledge and skills gained from the degree program enable the graduates to cater to the growing demand for Food Scientists & Technologists both in government and the private sector, locally and abroad. The degree also paves an excellent path for postgraduate studies in related disciplines of Food Science and Technology. At present, the Department academic staff comprises one professor, seven senior lecturers and two probationary lecturers. There are several eminent senior academics and industrial experts who contribute as visiting Professionals in their specialized fields. The Department has five well-equipped laboratories for conducting undergraduate lab sessions and relevant research, namely, Food Analysis Laboratory, Food Microbiology Laboratory, Food Processing Laboratory, Meat Processing Laboratory and Dairy Processing Laboratory and the current student capacity of the department is 88 per year.

### **Department of Natural Resources**

The Department of Natural Resources was established in 1996 offering a B.Sc. General degree in Natural Resources. The degree program offered by the Department is designed to cater to the current job market in the fields of Environmental Protection, Natural Resource Management and Conservation, Biodiversity Conservation and Management, Environmental Advocacy and Ecology both in Sri Lanka and around the world.

In 2006, the Degree Programme which was initially offered as B.Sc. in Natural Resources as a three-year general degree program was upgraded and restructured to offer a Degree programme as Environmental Science and Natural Resources Management which has improved the job opportunities for the graduates. Currently the degree program is oriented in three major streams viz. Environmental Science, Biological Science and Earth Science with awarding two degree programs as B.Sc. (Hons) in Environmental Science and Natural Resources Management – 4 years and B.Sc. (General) in Environmental Science and Natural Resources Management – 3 years. The degree also paves an excellent path for postgraduate studies. The Department has the capacity to enroll 100 students per year. At present, the



academic staff of the department consists of ten faculty members including two professors, seven senior lecturers and one lecturer.

### **Department of Physical Sciences & Technology**

The Department of Physical Sciences & Technology conducts degree courses in three major disciplines; namely, Chemical Technology, Applied Physics and Computer Science & Technology. Mathematics, Statistics, and Management Studies are conducted as supporting tools for the programme. The Department offers four-degree programs namely: B.Sc. (Applied Sciences) Special Degree in Chemical Technology (Duration: 4 years), B.Sc. (Applied Sciences) Special Degree in Computer Science & Technology (Duration: 4 years) B.Sc. (Applied Sciences) Special Degree in Applied Physics (Duration: 4 years) and B.Sc. (Applied Sciences) Degree in Physical Sciences (Duration: 3 years).

All theoretical course units conducted by the department are heavily supported by a practical component which provides the preliminary experience to perform confidently. And also, the Mini projects conducted throughout the third and the fourth academic years stimulate the students' creative and innovative thinking. The Final year project (research or industrial training) for one entire semester exposes the undergraduates to the working environment and provides hand on experience in industry before the graduation. The environment in the campus and the teaching programs were all designed in a manner to establish this goal and also to produce specialists in their respective fields. Additionally, it is also creditable that the Department offers the only Degree in Applied Physics in the entire University System in the country. The Department has 4 well-equipped laboratories namely; Physics Laboratory, Chemistry Laboratory I, Chemistry Laboratory II, Chemistry Research Laboratory and the student capacity of the department is 100 per year. The staff of the department consists of one Senior Professor, one Chair Professor, two professors, eight senior lecturers, one lecturer, and eight probationary lecturers.

### **Department of Sport Sciences and Physical Education**

Two-degree programs namely B.Sc. Special Degree in Sport Sciences & Management and B.Sc. Special Degree in Physical Education have been awarded since 2008 through the Faculty of Applied Sciences. The Department of Sport Sciences and Physical Education was established in 01<sup>st</sup> March 2011. The courses of Sport Sciences & Management degree programme is specially designed to produce graduates with basic scientific sport skills and management skills required for today's teaching sports at primary, secondary and tertiary education levels and at other industries and organizations. The degree programme in Physical Education is specially designed to produce graduates who are competent the scientific basis of physical education activities and practices. The duration of the degree programs are four years and at present there is a great demand for the degree programme



which is significantly shown by the increasing number of student intake each year and at present the intake has reached the maximum capacity. The both degree programs are well supported by practical activities and projects that has enabled to produce skilled and competent graduates within four years. The department also has many collaborations with sports organizations facilitating the students to participate in many national and international gaming competitions and coaching programs. The Department has two well-equipped laboratories namely; Exercise biochemistry Laboratory and Research Laboratory and the student capacity of the department is 183 per year. The staff comprises of six senior lecturers, two lecturers, seven probationary lecturers, two instructors and two temporary assistant lecturers. The service of eminent sport specialist is also obtained to conduct both practical and theory courses for the students.



## 2.4 FACULTY OF GEOMATICS

### 2.4.1 BRIEF HISTORY

The Faculty of Geomatics is one of the eight faculties of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka and was established in 2004. It is the successor to the Department of Surveying Sciences, which introduced the B.Sc. (Surveying Sciences) Degree Programme in 1997. This was the first time in the history of the university system in Sri Lanka that such a degree programme was introduced by a university fulfilling a much felt need of the country. The Degree Programme is a four-year course leading to a special degree. The first batch of students admitted to the degree programme in 1997 and graduated in 2002.

## 2.5 FACULTY OF MANAGEMENT STUDIES

The Faculty of Management Studies with two departments, i.e. Department of Accountancy and Finance and Department of Business Management commenced in September 1996 as the Faculty of Business Studies, offering a three-year degree. After the completion of the foundation year and two specialization years, a degree in Bachelor of Science could be obtained in Financial Management, Business Management, Marketing Management, and Tourism Management. Accordingly, six batches obtained their B.Sc. Special Degrees and passed out in the years of 1997, 1998, 1999, 2000, 2001 and 2002. The Faculty was renamed in 2003 as the Faculty of Management Studies and the duration of the degree Programmes conducted by the Faculty also was changed from three years to four years with the approval of the UGC.

Presently the Faculty of Management Studies comprises four departments; Department of Accountancy and Finance, Department of Business Management, Department of Marketing Management and Department of Tourism Management. ## 2.6 FACULTY OF MEDICINE

### 2.6.1 BRIEF HISTORY

The Faculty of Medicine at Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka is the latest addition to the chain of Medical Faculties in Sri Lanka. It was established in the year 2018 under Gazette Notice No. 2082/32 of August 01, 2018. It becomes the 8<sup>th</sup> Faculty at the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. The medical profession caters to one of the most crucial needs of the society, therefore, it stands to reason that medical degrees are among the most challenging and competitive qualifications to pursue. This Faculty comprises of 15 Departments which are dedicated to achieving all aspects of its academic mission and objectives. The academic elements in the MBBS Degree Program are based on four main disciplinary pillars; theoretical education, clinical care, community engagement, and research. The Faculty of Medicine is established in Kuruwita temporarily where the preclinical studies of the degree program is conducted. Further, a new faculty building is constructed in a land in New Town, Ratnapura and the professorial unit is constructed adjacent to the Teaching Hospital, Ratnapura. Further the faculty would be equipped with both human resources and physical resources with the state\_of\_the\_art\_ technologies to provide the best academic and learning environment for the students. The Teaching Hospital, Ratnapura provides all clinical training facilities for the students. The Faculty accommodate 100 students per intake and at present with 04 batches of students enrolled for the MBBS degree program totaling up to 354 students.

## **2.7 FACULTY OF SOCIAL SCIENCES AND LANGUAGES**

### **2.7.1 BRIEF HISTORY**

The Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages had its beginning at the same time, when the University commissioned her study programs in 1996. The Faculty initially possessed two Departments of studies i.e. the Department of Languages and the Department of Social Sciences. The third Department of the Faculty, The Department of English Languages Teaching was initiated in 2004 while the fourth, The Department of Economics and Statistics commenced in 2009. The Department of Geography and Environmental Management was established as the fifth Department in 2015. The Faculty began its academic operations in November 1996 with the intake of students from the former affiliated University Collage, who were permitted, with their Diplomas in English, to study for a degree after two years. The Faculty started register students with Advanced Level qualification only from the year 1998.

In pursuit of its vision and mission, the Faculty offers Honors Degrees through its Departments. Breaking from the initial concept of three year Honors degrees in the Faculty, in 2007, the Faculty introduced four-year Honors Degree Programs in Economics, Statistics, Geography, Political Science, Sociology and Anthropology in addition to its three year Social Sciences Honors Degree Program. Four-year Honors Degree Programs in Sinhala, Tamil, English, German, Japanese, Chinese and Hindi have also been introduced with effect from 2013. In 2014, the Faculty introduced Bachelor of Arts Honors in Information and Communication Technology and in 2015, Bachelor of Arts Honors in Translation Studies. At present, the Faculty offers four-year Honors Degrees and three-year General Degrees only.

The Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages prepares students for professional careers, by providing them with a broad understanding of the humanistic tradition in combination with a sound knowledge of subjects in several disciplines. Our programs emphasize the ability to apply this knowledge to problems and tasks in the contemporary world of work. We strive to develop students' capacity for independent and critical thought, logical analysis, effective communication, and informed participation in teamwork. Therefore, the Bachelor of Arts program integrates classroom work and students' independent reading and writing with hands-on research and project work.

### **3. TEACHING RESOURCES**

#### **3.1 THE LIBRARY**

##### **3.1.1 DESCRIPTION OF THE LIBRARY**

The Main Library provides its' services for the entire University to achieve the standard of excellence in their academic programs. The Management Faculty Library serves the needs of the Faculty of Management Studies. The Agricultural Sciences Library serves the needs of the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences. The Faculty of Medicine owns separate branch Library. The collections and services of the library are designed to match the needs that range from basic support of the curriculum to the advanced research requirements of patrons.

The SUSL Libraries deliver customer focused quality information products, services and programs, creatively adjust to changing information needs and innovatively respond to new challenges at National and International level.

The collection of books of all libraries in the end of 2021 was approximately 134000 including purchased books, donation books, pamphlets, audio visual materials and e-resources received to the Library.

The SUSL Library is using KOHA open-source software for Library automation. Collection has been organized as Lending Section, Reference Section, Permanent Reference Section, Periodical Section, Other Collection & Past paper Collections.

##### **3.1.2 IN HOUSE ACTIVITIES**

###### **Library Committee**

The Library Committee, the Sub-committee of the Senate is the principal management body of the Sabaragamuwa University Library. The Library Committee has been scheduled to be held on each and every month regularly. The Librarian plays the role of Secretary of the Committee. The Chairman of the committee is generally the Vice Chancellor of the University.

###### **Objectives of the Libraries**

In fulfilling the main objective of developing the university through self-studies and self-improvement, the university libraries in the country play a major role. The Sabaragamuwa University has three branch libraries: the library of the Faculty of Management Studies, the



library of the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences and the Faculty of Medicine Library, in addition to the Main library. The Main library serves the needs of five faculties at the moment - the Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages, the Faculty of Applied Sciences, the Faculty of Geomatics, the Faculty of Technology and the faculty of Graduate Studies. The Faculty libraries for Agricultural Sciences, Management Studies and Medicine serve the needs of their undergraduates. At present SUSL is actively involved in developing e-information provision.

The SUSL network expects to expand its facilities for patrons with development of the new library building for the main library. Enhancing physical resources such as bibliographic material received from donors and purchased by the library will be focused on this direction apart from the human resources that would expect to increase quantitatively as well as qualitatively align with establishing of the new building.

## 3.2 CENTRE FOR COMPUTER STUDIES

### 3.2.1 INTRODUCTION

The Centre for Computer Studies provides many IT related academic and technical services to the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. The centre has been conducting and supervising academic programmes of different faculties, preparing IT curricula and providing training for academic and non-academic staff as well as academic supportive staff. The CCS has been providing University web service and email facility for the entire university community. Campus-wide Internet and networking facility, virtual learning environment with other network services, e-learning facility and hardware software maintenance services are the technical services provided by the Centre for Computer Studies.

### 3.2.2 HISTORY

The history of Sabaragamuwa University Computer Centre goes back to the time of inauguration of Affiliated University College (AUC) of Sabaragamuwa Province in 1991. It started at one of the residential building then own to Samanalawewa Hydro Electrical Power Project and now D1-4 quarters of Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. Initially, it equipped with 10 numbers of **Tatung** 286 computers featured 1Mb RAM, 40MB Hard disks and an **OKI** 9-pin dot-matrix printer and at the time of inauguration of AUC, late Hon. President Ranasinghe Premadasa unveiled the plaque of the centre.

At that time AUC enrolled students for Diploma programmes and conducted three diploma courses called Diploma in Accounting & Finance, Diploma in Tourism Management and Diploma in English. The **Core Course of Computing** offered by the computer centre was compulsory component to obtain the diploma produced by all programmes.

After some times, with the donation of Rs. 15,000/= from the Balangoda District Judge who launched a program to donate funds for social works from the fines collected from the drugs victims, initiated to start the construction of existing computer centre building with the help of the staff, students and villagers by “Shramadana Campaign” and finally completed using the government funds. It was the first building constructed simultaneous with the old auditorium for the AUC in addition to the buildings acquiring from the Samanalawewa Project.

Initially it was recruited one staff member to computer centre as an Instructor-in-Computer-Technology for conducting the lectures and practical for the core courses. Meanwhile, two other instructors were recruited to the computer centre cadre to extend the work it carried out and it was the only centre which had an approved cadre in the AUC system.



After upgrading the AUC into full-fledged national university as Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka in 1996, computer centre started to render its services to the different degree programs. Especially for non-IT, faculties by means of designing and preparing course materials for IT related subjects and conducting lectures and practical classes. Further, center contributed technological knowledge for preparing and evaluating tender documents for purchasing of computers and other ICT related equipment for the university and training of clerical staff of the university for effectively use of ICT for their day to day works as well as helping to academic staff for preparing their postgraduate thesis and in preparing teaching materials etc.

When expansion of the university and its functions, computer centre was renamed as **Centre for Computer Studies** and re-organized under a Director and started offering assistance for conducting ICT related courses for the degree programmes especially for Faculty of Management Studies and Faculty of Social Sciences & Languages and constructed another building adjacent to the existing centre for broadening its services. At the same time university Local Area Network was planned and commissioned and got connected to the Internet via LEARN and started providing and maintaining the Internet and network services to the entire university community. Launching Sabaragamuwa University Web Site and providing E-Learning environment are such land marking services offered.

Meanwhile, to strengthen the services provided by the Centre for Computer Studies the cadre provisions has been increased according to the 2012 approved cadre list of UGC.

Computer Applications Assistant and the Technical Officer are assigned for the solving of software and hardware problems of computers and accessories in each faculties, faculty computer centers in addition to the other places such as centers and offices of the entire university. Mr. Sanjeewa Premalal and Mr. Janaka Senarath are currently involving to do such work as well as to report about the faultier of equipment's to the respective authorities to get decisions to repair them.

**3.2.4 CURRENT STATUS**

On request of the different faculties, the academic services provided by the centre are mainly lined to Faculty of Social Sciences & Languages, Faculty of Management Studies and to the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences.

Other IT services such as Internet and web service are provided for entire university community. Other than that computer center is providing maintenance-support for services running in the network which are installed by other parties such as library system, IP Phone system, IP Camera system, Wireless networks etc.

At present most of the faculties have built their own complexes and they have their own computer centers within faculty premises for conducting their IT related academic programs. Therefore, no need of using the existing buildings of the CCS for conducting their programs further, instead they can be utilized for widen the services offered by the Centre such as



conducting training programmes for non-academic and administrative staff as well as assisting the academic staff to fulfilling their IT-related needs.

The CCS supervises all computer related academic activities in these five computer centers and maintains the campus-wide network including all the servers required to provide network services such as web, e-learning, DNS, email, digital library system, student information service and network troubleshooting services.

In year of 2013, infrastructure facilities and academic programs related with IT have further improved due to allocations from the consolidated fund by the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. With this fund, the university managed to increase the Internet bandwidth from 20Mbps to 100Mbps and increase the number of computer facilities to all academic and administrative staff members at their work places.

Due to the high demand of the internet usage of the university, internet providers requested to increased bandwidth up to 225 Mbps in 2018. It is increased up to 700 Mbps with the dialog 100Mbps backup link along with the SLT. Accordingly, the computer center proposed to increase the internal bandwidth of the fiber backbone and currently the university internet connections are running with the bandwidth of 600Mbps.

Free Wi-Fi areas implemented for the students inside the university to provide a better learning environment to them. According to that all faculties covered with Wi-Fi facility. Furthermore, CCS has initiated free Wi-Fi project with the ministry of education to increase Wi-Fi zones for the student's hostels and study areas.

Since the covid-19 pandemic situation, university system had to conduct all the academic activities, students' evaluation process and all other university activities thorough online. Therefore, as a Center for Computer Studies, we had to facilitate those activities with maximum capacity.

In addition to VLE (Virtual Learning Environment), separate server has been bought and installed as separate VLE for exam purposes of each faculty including Faculty of Graduate Studies and Centre for Open and Distance Learning.

Zoom (Zoom's secure, reliable video platform powers all of your communication needs, including meetings, chat, phone, webinars, and online events.) accounts have been created for each academic staff and other selected staff of the university to process the activities of the university in online manner.

Turnitin (Turnitin is an Internet-based plagiarism detection service run by the American company Turnitin) accounts have been created for the academic staff of the university as per their requested.



University digital repository has been implementing and there are more than 1500 articles in there for digital usage.

**CCS Helpdesk**

The CCS Helpdesk is the first point of contact for all of the IT related technology needs and issues at the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. The Helpdesk handles email, and in-person requests from students, faculty, academic staff, administrative staff and non-academic staff on IT related matters of their day to day activities.

**CCS Student Helpdesk**

The CCS Student Helpdesk is staffed technical workers employed by CCS to assist users in the residence computer centers under the CCS of each faculty with computer related issues.

**Services**

The service center staff of the CCS handles all the engineering, technical, electronic, electrical, and computer repairing, troubleshooting inside the University. This will help to carry out all the University activities such as not only the academic activities but also administrative activities very smoothly and effectively.

**Main services rendered by the Centre for Computer Studies are:**

In addition to academic services and academic support services, centre for computer studies is rendered following services to university.

- Technical Support and Preventive Maintenances of Computer Systems
- Network Installation, Configuration and Troubleshooting
- Electronic, Electrical, Telephone System Maintenance
- Technical Support for Lectures, Special Events, Event Handling at the Auditoriums and Computing Service Centre Training Programs.

### **Virtual Learning Environment (VLE)**

The CCS provides necessary infrastructure facilities for e-learning and Virtual Learning Management for all the academic and students.

### **Examination Virtual Learning Environment (EVLE)**

The CCS has bought separate server for EVLE and installed EVLE separately for each faculties to facilitate for online examinations.

### **Zoom Accounts**

Zoom accounts have been created for all the academic staff and other selected staff of the university.

### **Turnitin Accounts**

Turnitin accounts are created for academic staff of the university as they request.



## **Campus-Wide Network**

Our campus-wide Local Area Network is run and maintained by the Centre for Computer Studies. It is administrated by our Assistant Network Managers within the server room. The server room consists of CISCO routers, proxy server, DNS server, CISCO switches, web server, e-learning sever, virus guard server (centralized server) etc. Performance of the network functions and the E-learning system are increased by upgrading the three servers namely Proxy, DNS and E-learning during the year 2014. Separating and partitioning of the server room from the existing computer lab, physical security and the easiness of maintenance of the servers are assured. Also by commissioning the alternative power generating system using a 20KVA standby generator and four 2KVA UPS systems, availability of network functions are guaranteed during the 24 hours a day and 7 days a week.

All the eight faculties are now inter-connected with fiber optic backbone and willing to upgrade the backbone in next few years. At present our commodity Internet bandwidth is 600Mbps and physical link is capable of handling signals of 100Mbps bandwidth.

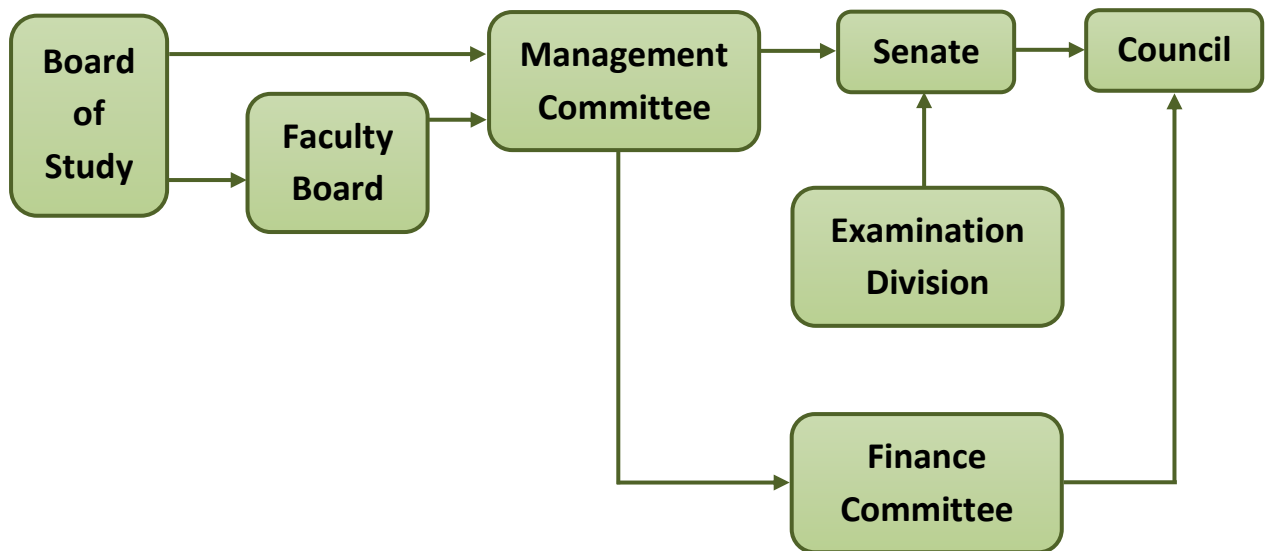

CQA ensures that the Sabaragamuwa University operates in conformity with the Sri Lankan Qualification Framework (SLQF) and academic standards and accreditation set forth by Quality Assurance and Accreditation Council of Sri Lanka (<http://www.eugc.ac.lk/qaa/>). The University's internal QA processes are complying within the Internal Quality Assurance Policy Framework.

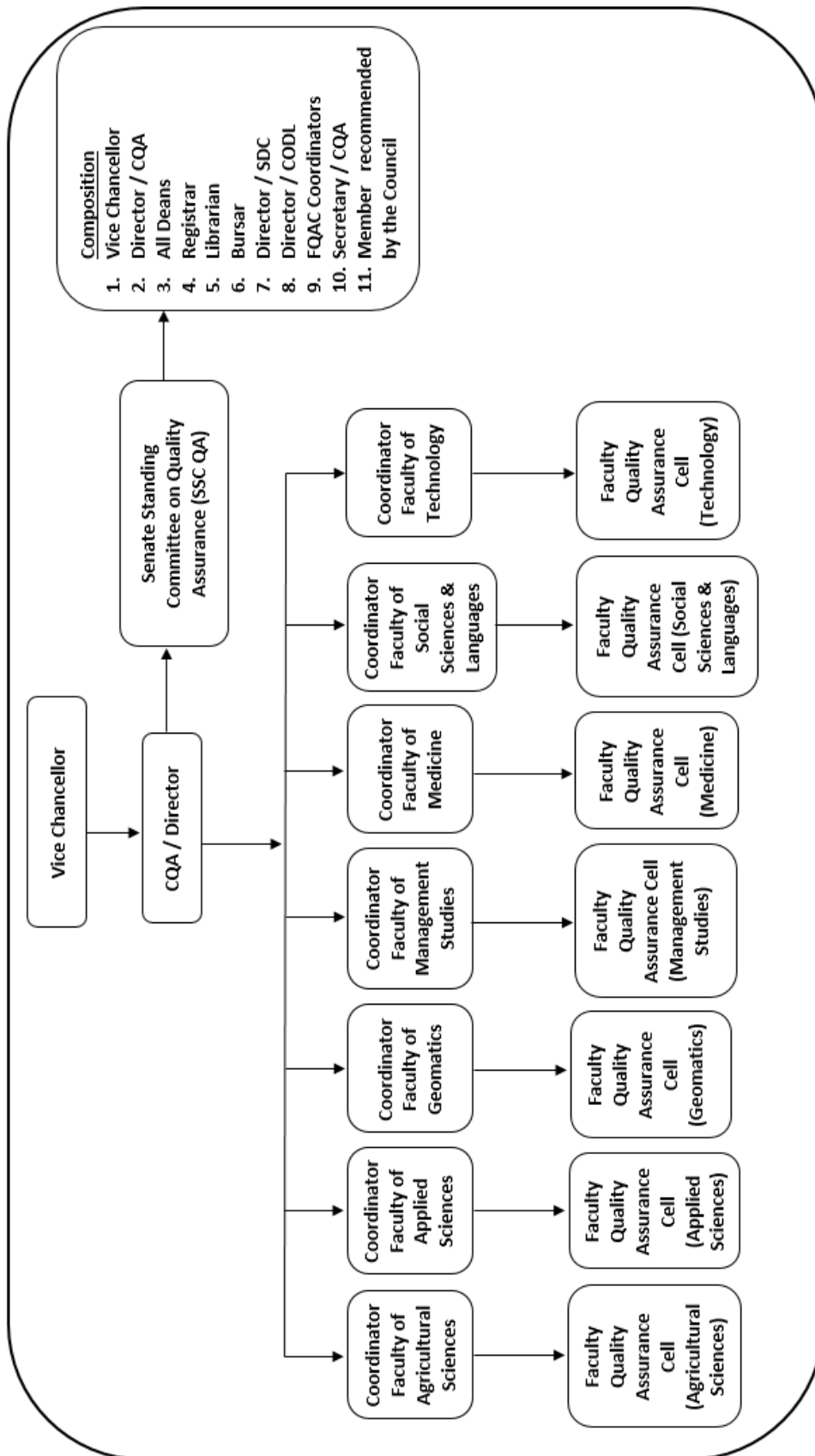

1. University Business Linkage Cell of Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka has entered into a MoU with Loops Digital Pvt. Ltd on 07<sup>th</sup> January 2021 at Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. The main intention of this collaboration is to establish a mutual cooperation in research and development activities related to the invention titled “A Meat Substitute Food Product” invented by the Faculty of Applied Sciences, Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. Accordingly the Loops Digital Pvt. Ltd partners with SUSL to exploit this invention in the potential market places once the project is completed. The agreement was signed by the Vice-Chancellor, Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka, Prof. Udaya Rathnayake and Managing Director, LOOPS Digital (Pvt). Ltd., Mr. Shehan Selvanayagam.
2. University Business Linkage Cell, Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka has entered into a Memorandum of Understanding with Hayleys Agro Farms Pvt. Ltd on 24<sup>th</sup> February 2021 at the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka to establish mutually beneficial links through the research project with the aim of studying and identifying the opportunities of value addition of Potatoes grown in Sri Lanka. The objective of this project is to identify suitable potato varieties that fulfills required physico-chemical and morphological characteristics for the production of value-added potatoes such as potato chips, French fries, potato wedges etc. The project was continued under the guidance and supervision of Faculty of Agricultural Sciences and Faculty of Applied sciences and Hayleys will support in the financial aspect in order to get a fruitful result from this research project.
3. University Business Linkage Cell, Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka has entered into a MoU with SUBASH GEMS on 03<sup>rd</sup> March 2021 to establish a business relationship through the research project titled “Value addition and commercialization of low gem-quality corundum in Sri Lanka using innovative heat treatment technology”. The objective of this MoU is to commercialize the treated gems developed through an optimized heat treatment conditions which is introduced as a value addition technique for the local Geuda varieties and for getting support from SUBASH GEMS to sell those treated gems. The project has being funded by the Research Innovation and Commercialization (RIC) grant of the Accelerating Higher Education Expansion and Development (AHEAD) program.
4. Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka through University Business Linkage Cell has entered into a Memorandum of Understanding with the State Ministry of Gem & Jewellery Related Industries on 11<sup>th</sup> November 2021 to establish a mutual collaboration in enhancing the teaching and research activities with the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka and the gem community including in Sri Lanka. The agreement was signed by

the Vice-Chancellor of Sabaragamuwa University; Prof. Udaya Rathnayaka and the Secretary of the Ministry Mr. S.M. Piyatissa. The agreement was witnessed by the Director, UBL Cell; Prof. D.A.I. Dayaratne and Dean, Faculty of Applied Sciences, Dr. Rasangi Sabaragamuwa on behalf of the university and Director (Planning) of the Ministry Mr. Wipula Jayasekera and Chairman, National Gem and Jewellery Authority of Sri Lanka, Mr. Thilak Weerasinghe. During the same event, an open discussion was held with all the participants in initiating mutually beneficial links through sharing the expertise knowledge with FDRE Ministry of Mines and Petroleum (MOMP), Ethiopia via skill transfer from skilled Sri Lankan gemologists and gem industry experts which is to be continued under the guidance of University Business Linkage Cell and the Faculty of Applied Sciences.

## International Collaborations

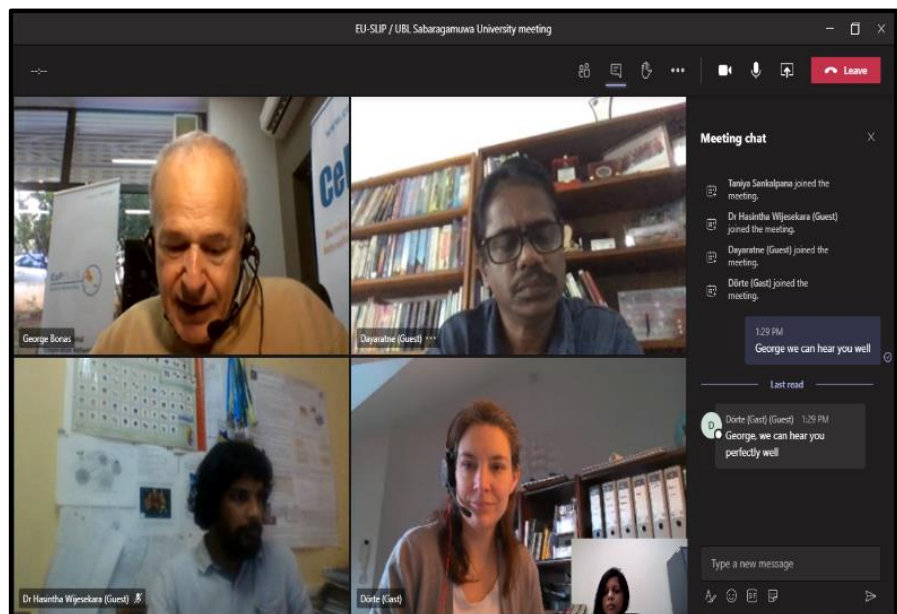
1. University Business Linkage Cell partners with the EU-Sri Lanka Innovation Partnership Project to share the information about the Sabaragamuwa

- b. Sponsoring to follow the IP courses
- c. Attracting the potential industry partners at International level

2. A meeting was held with YEKA Environmental Solution, Australia on 16<sup>th</sup> February 2021 to develop a relationship to transfer the knowledge and other value additions in gem industry between Sri Lanka and Ethiopia. The purpose of the meeting is to establish





mutually beneficial links through sharing the expertise knowledge with Ministry of Mines and Petroleum staff and interested stakeholders in Ethiopia via skill transfer from skilled Sri Lankan gemologists and gem industry experts. The collaboration will be continued under the support and assistance of the University Business Linkage Cell and the gemologists of the Faculty of Applied Sciences. The 2<sup>nd</sup> meeting was held with YEKA Environmental Solution, Australia on 16<sup>th</sup> March 2021 to resume the discussion and the participants have agreed to enter into an International MoU between the Sri Lanka and Ethiopia.

### Our Services Offered during the Year 2021

University Business Linkage Cell has decided to offer seed capital out of AHEAD grants to upgrade the University inventions to a commercially viable product and to liaise them with the potential industrial partners. We have been granted the World Bank approval to allocate a maximum Rs. 50,000 for developing one product. Depending on that activity we have executed six evaluation sessions to select the academic staff - student collaborative research projects to be considered for seed capital and 22 projects raised from Faculty of Agricultural Sciences and Faculty of Applied Sciences have been selected by the evaluation panels. The remaining evaluations have yet to be carried out

### FUTURE PLANS

Apart from the above activities, the following tasks are waiting in our pipeline.

1. Establish an "Innovation Outlet" to expose the university innovations having market viability to society and prototype products will be displayed to capture the industrial partners.
2. Organizing an Industry Forum to create an opportunity to commercialize innovative products invented by the university researchers through SMEs while facilitating mutual benefits to both parties.



3. Develop a Web-Site for displaying the UBL Cell role and activities with the hope of supporting the University community and the external parties those who seeking our support.
4. Establish a Start-Up based on the Value Addition and Product Development of Potato Varieties Grown in Sri Lanka.
5. Preparing a Start-up Policy for the University to foster entrepreneurial ecosystem which encourages co-creation by involving students, faculty and professionals from multiple disciplines and providing the entrepreneurs with the necessary guidance, mentorship and infrastructure support in order to nurture their ideas and help translate them into successful Startups.
6. Creating a newsletter quarterly to share valuable information regarding the UBL Cell news and events, university innovations, research projects, paper articles etc.
7. Establishing an “Innovation Club” to create a platform to present the ideas and innovative thoughts of the university inventors.
8. Conducting in-class Intellectual Property Training Sessions to harness the variety of skills of the university community that are relevant for different players in the IP system to contribute to innovation.

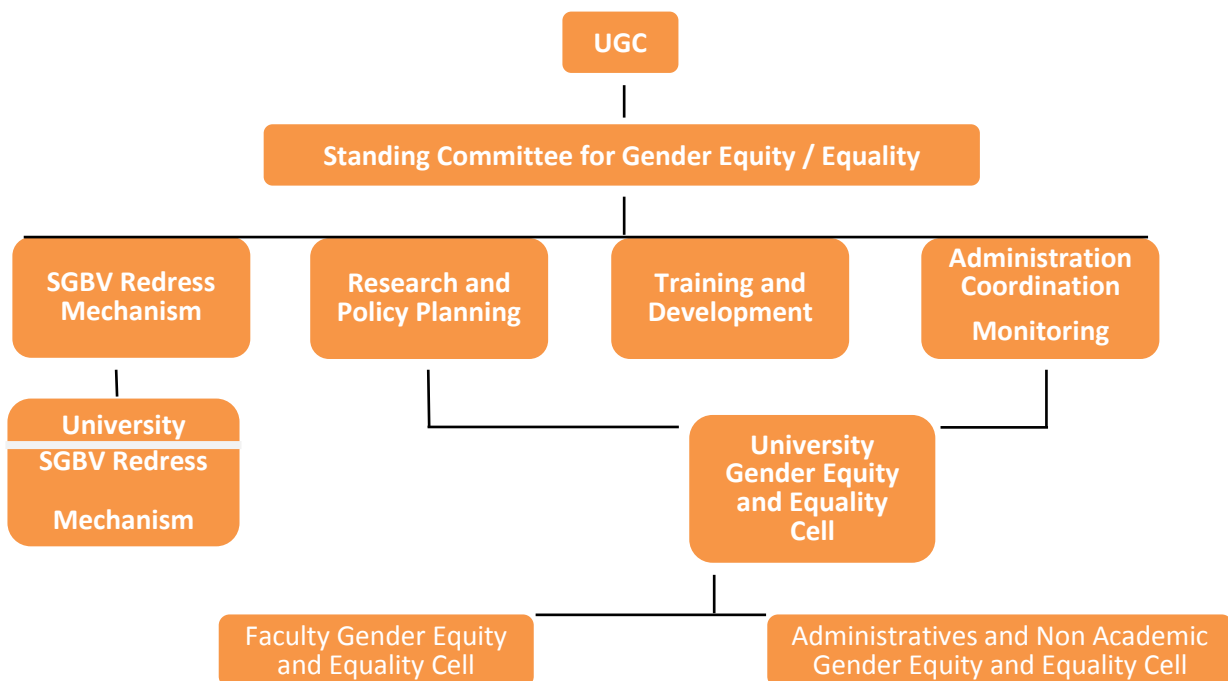
## 4.8 CENTRE FOR GENDER EQUITY AND EQUALITY

## 11. HOSTEL DATA – 2021

As the University is in a remote, when considering the difficulties in finding the residential facilities for undergraduates by themselves, all the students whose permanent residencies are more than 20 km away from the University are provided hostel facilities by the University. So, about 6.3% of the undergraduates are received the University provided hostel facilities, in each year.

The University has provided accommodation in its own hostels only for 64 male students and 263 female students. Other students have been provided with accommodation in rented houses for 95 male students and 28 female students.

The University spends more than 12 million per annum for rented houses to accommodate the students.

### Accommodation Facilities

Students were called to university based on 25% of capacity and hence Agricultural Sciences, Applied Sciences, Geomatics and Medicine faculties have called a selected number of students as at 30.12.2021.





## Notes to the Financial Statements

### 1. Significant Accounting Policies

#### 1.1 General Policies

##### 1.1.1 Reporting Entity

Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka has been incorporated under the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978 and is located at P.O. Box 02, Belihuloya. This is a National University that mainly operates on Government funds.

##### 1.1.2 Principal activities and nature of operations

Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka is situated to the left of the way to Samanalawewa reservoir and is approximately 160 kilometers away from the Colombo-Badulla highway. The recently established Faculty of Medicine and Faculty of Technology are now actively being functioned. The first intake for both faculties had been taken in January 2019. The University comprises of eight (08) Academic Faculties, namely:

- Faculty of Graduate Studies
- Faculty of Agricultural Sciences
- Faculty of Applied Sciences
- Faculty of Geomatics
- Faculty of Management Studies
- Faculty of Medicine
- Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages
- Faculty of Technology

In addition to these eight Faculties, there are 13 study centers and units. They are as follows:

- Center for Computer Studies
- Agri-Business Research and Development Center (ABRDC)
- Career Guidance Unit (CGU)
- Center for Open & Distance Learning (CODL)
- Staff Development Centre (SDC)
- Centre for Indigenous Knowledge and Community Studies (CIKCS)
- Centre for Research and Knowledge Dissemination
- Centre for Quality Assurance (CQA)
- University Business Linkage Cell (UBLC)
- Center for Biodiversity and Environmental Studies (CSBES)
- Centre for Research and Knowledge Dissemination (CRKD)
- Centre for Gender Equity and Equality (CGEE)
- Department of Physical Education



### **1.1.3 Basis of preparation**

#### **(a) Statement of Compliance**

The Financial Statements comprise the statements of financial position, statement of financial performance, statement of changes in equity, statement of cash flows and notes to the financial statements.

The Financial Statements of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka are prepared in conformity with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards on the accrual basis of accounts. All accounting policies adopted by the University are applied consistently with those of the previous year, where necessary comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to the changes, in the presentation of current year figures.

#### **(b) Basis of measurement**

The Financial Statements of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka are prepared under the Historical Cost convention and do not take into account of changes in money values, except where it is stated.

#### **(c) Functional and presentation currency**

The Financial Statements are presented in Sri Lankan Rupees, which is the University's functional and presentation currency.

#### **(d) Going concern**

The Financial Statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

## **1.2 Assets and the basis of valuation**

### **1.2.1 Property, Plant & Equipment**

Lands, Buildings, Water Plant Unit, Road Network, Laboratory and Teaching Equipment, Fixtures & Fittings, Library Books and Periodicals, Motor Vehicles, Computer & Computer accessories, Cloaks and Other Assets include the items acquired out of government grant, research grants, internally generated funds, and donations.

#### **a) Basis of Recognition and Measurement**

Property, Plant and Equipment are recognized if it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the entity and the cost of the item can be reliably measured. Properties, plant and equipment are recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation. The cost of property, plant and equipment is the cost of purchase or construction together with any incidental expenses thereon.

**b) Cost**

The cost of property, plant and equipment comprises its purchase or construction cost and any directly attributable cost of bringing the assets working condition for its intended use.

**c) Subsequent expenditure on existing Fixed Assets**

Expenditure incurred on tangible fixed assets is charged to the Statement of Financial Performance in the period it is incurred unless it meets one of the following criteria, in which case it is capitalized and depreciates on the relevant basis.

- Market value of fixed assets has subsequently increased.
- Asset capacity increase.
- Sustainable improvement in the quality of output or reduction in operating cost.
- Significant extension of the asset life beyond that confirmed by repair and maintenance.

**d) Depreciation**

Depreciation is recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on a Straight-Line Method over the estimated useful life of Property, Plant and Equipment items from the date that they were made available for use. Lands are not depreciated. The estimated useful life periods are as follows.

Depreciation is provided in full in the year of purchase and no depreciation is charged in the year of disposal. This method of depreciation is adopted in using the rates in the UGC circular 649 from the financial year 2006 and hope to continue in future. Also, this method of calculation of depreciation was approved by our Council at its 117<sup>th</sup> meeting held on 20.01.2007.

**e) Capital Works in Progress**

Capital work-in-progress is stated at cost. These are expenses of a capital nature directly incurred in the construction of property, plant and equipment awaiting



capitalization. Capital work-in-progress would be transferred to the relevant asset category in property, plant and equipment, when it is available for use i.e., when it is in the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by the university.

\* There are no any completed buildings.

### 1.2.2 Intangible Assets

An Intangible asset is recognized only when its cost can be measured reliably and it is probable that the expected future economic benefits attributable that will flow to the University.

Intangible assets acquired are measured on initial recognition at cost. Intangible assets are carried at cost less any accumulated amortization and any accumulated impairment losses. Subsequent expenditure is capitalized only when it increases the future economic benefits embodied in the assets. All other expenditure is expensed as incurred.

All intangible assets are considered to have a finite useful life and amortized using straight-line method to write down the cost of the intangible asset to their residual values over their estimated useful lives as follows.

- a. Computer software is amortised over a period of 5 years on straight-line basis.
- b. Cost of development of new curriculum is amortised over a period of 5 years on Straight-line basis from the effective date of the new curriculum.
- c. Patent is amortised over a period of 5years on straight line basis.

Intangible assets represent the software purchased under the HETC grant on their written down value and software purchased by the entity.

### 1.2.3 Curriculum Revision

The university revises the curriculum for all degree programs every five years and amendments are not made within that period. Hence, the expenditure incurred on capital funds are amortized over the five years period on the basis that the economic benefits would flow to the university during the effective period of the new syllabus. Since the faculty of Management Studies and Faculty of Applied Sciences and Faculty of Graduate Studies have implemented the revised curriculum w.e.f. 2021, the expenditure incurred on that are amortizes w.e.f. 2021. Also since the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences has implemented the revised curriculum w.e.f.2016, the expenditure incurred on that are amortized w.e.f.2016.

Further, the University amortized the expenditure incurred for the Faculty of Technology from 2019. In 2020 and 2021 expenses incurred for the curriculum revision of the Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages and Faculty of Geomatics shows under work in progress and these expenses will be amortized after implementing the new curriculum revision. Due to the implementation of Curriculum revision of Center for Open and Distance Learning, expenses have been amortized from 2020.



#### **1.2.4 Knowledge Enhancement**

The expenditure incurred to enhance the knowledge of the employees is treated as capital expenditure and amortize over 5 year period.

#### **1.2.5 Primary Establishment cost**

Faculty of Medicine was established in a building which is received from the Auditors General's Department and Faculty of Technology was established at university premises in the prevailing buildings. The cost incurred for the renovation and converting of these buildings to establish these faculties is treated as capital expenditures and amortised over 5 year period from 2019 financial year. Further consultancy service which is received after establishing the Faculty of Medicine is considered as capital expenses and amortized in the incurred year.

#### **1.2.6 Livestock**

Livestock is revalued at end of each financial year and revaluation surplus is added to the revaluation surplus account. If there is a deficit, the deficit is adjusted to the opening balance of the surplus account and the difference is charged to the statement of financial performance. In the current year revaluation deficit is Rs.851, 170/-.

#### **1.2.7 Inventories**

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realizable value. In general, the cost is determined on a first in first out basis and includes expenditure incurred in acquiring the inventories and bringing them to their existing condition and location.

Inventories include all materials and supplies related to the provision of services to the entity.

\* There is no any slow moving or old stocks and all stocks are less than one year.

#### **1.2.8 Receivables**

Receivables are stated at the amounts they are estimated to realize.

#### **1.2.9 University Research Grant**

As per the SLPSAS 20, no intangible asset arising from research phase of an internal project shall be recognized. Expenditure on research phase activities shall be recognized as an expense when it is incurred. An intangible asset arising from development phase of an internal project shall be recognized if an only if the entity can demonstrate the recognition criteria. This Standard is adopted in current financial year with retrospectively and hopes to continue in future.

The university has allocated funds to enhance research and development activities under the annual capital budget. The total amount spent for the



research phase activities are shown as an expense in statement of financial performance. The aggregate amount of research expenditure recognized as expenditure during the year of 2021 is Rs. 4,965,180.19.

### **1.2.10 Cash & cash equivalents**

Cash & cash equivalents comprise cash balances at banks and short term deposits (3-month Fixed Deposits).

\* Under the cash and cash equivalents, Rs. 66.8 mn is included as 3-month Fixed Deposits. When considering the current accounts, they include funds received for different projects and have used in 2022.

## **1.3 Liabilities & Provisions**

All known liabilities as at the balance sheet date are included in the financial statements and adequate provisions are made for liabilities that are known to exist but the amount of which cannot be determined accurately.

Obligations payable on demand or within one year of the balance sheet date are treated as current liabilities in the balance sheet. Liabilities payable after one year from the balance sheet date are treated as noncurrent liabilities in the balance sheet.

### **1.3.1 Employee Benefits**

#### **(a) Defined Benefit Plans**

Defined benefit plans estimate the amount of benefit that an employee will receive on retirement.

#### **Provision for retiring Gratuity**

The university has adopted the benefit plan as required under the payment of Gratuity Act No. 12 of 1983 for all eligible employees.

Defined benefit plans define an amount of benefit that an employee will receive on retirement usually dependent on one or more factors such as age, years of service and compensation. In order to meet this liability, a provision carried forward as at the reporting date, amount calculated based on an internal management assessment. Accordingly, liability recognizes for the employees who have completed 5 years of service in the university system as at the reporting date. The resulting difference between brought forward provision as at the beginning of the period net of any payments made, and the carried forward provision at the end of the period is dealt with in the statement of profit and loss.

The gratuity liability is not externally funded nor actuarially valued.

As per the Commission Circular No. 05/2019 issued by the University Grants Commission in 2019, Gratuity payment is to be made to the employees with considering Academic Allowance and Monthly Compensations Allowance (MCA) with effect from 2019.



### **(b) Defined Contribution Plans**

A defined-contribution plan is a post-employment plan under which an entity pays a fixed contribution into a separate entity and will have no legal or constructive obligation to pay a further amount. Obligations for contributions to defined contribution plans are recognized as an expense in the statement of comprehensive income as and when they are due.

### **University Provident Fund (UPF), Employee Provident Fund and University Pension Fund**

Permanent employees and the University monthly contribute 10% and 15% on the salary (Basic Salary + Cost of Living Allowance + Academic Allowance and Monthly Compensations Allowance) of each permanent employee to the university provident fund in line with the respective statues and legislation in Sri Lanka and University Act. From that 15% the University Contributes 8% to University Pension Fund and 7% to University Provident Fund for the employees who are the members of the University Pension Fund. For other permanent employees total 15% contribute to the University Provident Fund. From the year 2000 Contribution to the University Pension Fund is compulsory for all newly appointed employees.

The University and temporary employees monthly contribute 12% and 8% to the Employees' Provident Fund.

### **Employees' Trust Fund (ETF)**

The university contributes 3% monthly on the basic salary and the allowances considered to contribute to the University Provident Fund of each employee to the Employees' Trust Fund.

## **1.3.2 Accounting for Grants**

Grants that compensate the University for Expenses incurred are recognized as revenue in the income statement in the same period in which the expenses are recognized. Grants that compensate the University for the Cost of an asset are recognized in the income statement on a systematic basis over the useful life of the related asset.

As per Sri Lanka Accounting standard 20 the university adopted income approach accounting principal when identifying capital grants and donations w.e.f. 2014.01.01 and hope to continue in future.

The university has received new capital grants of Rs.31 Million from the Ministry of Higher Educations for the Faculty of Medicine in the year 2020.

The University has received new capital grants of Rs.262 million from the Ministry of Higher Education for the Para Clinical Department of Faculty of Medicine in the year 2021.

#### 1.4.1.1 The effective interest rate method

Under SLFRS 9, interest income is recorded using the effective interest rate (EIR) method for all financial instruments in 2021. Financial assets are measured at amortized cost by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees that are an integral part of the EIR.

#### 1.4.2 Expenditure

All expenditure incurred in maintaining the university has been recognized on accrual basis and charged to the revenue in ascertaining the income over expenditure.

#### 1.4.3 Surplus

Total revenue has increased by Rs.388.4 million compared to previous the year 2020 while the operating expenses increased only by Rs.216.4 million. This has resulted to report a net surplus of Rs.72.7 million during the year 2021. Initially, Treasury allocation for the other recurrent of 2021 was Rs. 340 million. and in the latter part of the year Rs. 80 million was approved and released as an additional allocation to the University with the purpose of settling the long outstanding bills which was accumulated over the past years due to insufficient allocation and increased of the expenses due to volume increased. Net surplus has been reported during the year 2021 due to the additional treasury allocation and the increase of other income, especially encashment of performance bond.

### 1.8 Higher Education for the 21<sup>st</sup> Century (HETC) Grant

HETC project has provided funds to increase IT, English and soft skill abilities of undergraduate students and also in improvement of research and development of Post Graduate Students.

Out of this, assets purchased under the project valued Rs.77,827,930 and Rs. 20,078,188.81 spent for PhDs for academics are capitalized based on their written down value as at 01.01.2016 of Rs.66,638,815 in the year 2016. These assets are capitalized and the respective grant is amortized based on the university policies.

### 1.9 Grant from Confucius Institute

Confucius Institute Headquarters Fund has provided funds to build up Confucius Classroom at the Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages. Rs.5,257,400 has been received in 2019 and Rs.5,154,789 has been received in 2020. Fund or assets received or purchased from this grant are not belong to the university until handover



to the university end of the project period. Hence, after completion of the project assets which are constructed and purchased under this fund will be taken as the assets of the university at Net Book Value. Up-to-the completion of the project Net value shows under restricted funds.

### 1.10 Inter-Company Accounts

When preparing the financial statements of the university as at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021 amounting to Rs. 17,558,476 and payable to Center for Open and Distance Learning (CODL) are set off. Also the amounting to Rs.1,580,395 receivable from Faculty of Graduate Studies and payable to Faculty of Graduate Studies are set off.

In the year 2021, an operating surplus of the Center for Open and Distance Learning (CODL) and

Faculty of Graduate Studies (FGS) has been divided among the development votes according to the by-laws.

### 1.11 Losses and damages

Due to the explosion of the Chemistry Laboratory of Faculty Applied Sciences damages happened to the furniture, Floor area and Glassware items and other equipment in 2019. The total estimated value is Rs.617,229.52. Out of this value, Rs.454,899.32 are capital assets that have been capitalized with the value of the entire faculty building. Due to the unavailability of the original cost of the following items losses are not taken to account as an expense. All other items are consumable items which have been identified as expenses at the time of purchased.

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**1. Financial Statements**

**1.1 Opinion**

Financial Statement of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka as at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021 and Financial Performance Statement, Net Asset Change Statement and Cash Flow Statement for the year ending on that day and notes on Financial Statements, Summary Important Accounting Policies Financial Statements for the Final Year as at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021 jointly read with the subsection 107 (5) of the Universities Act, No. 16 of 1978 were audited under my direction in terms of the provisions provided in the article 154 (6) of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka and National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018. This report contains my views and observations which I intend to publish with the Annual Report of the University in terms of subsection 108 (1) of the Universities Act. My Report will be tabled in Parliament in due course in accordance with the article 154 (6) of the Constitution.

Apart from the impact of the facts described in the base section for the qualitative opinion in my report, I firmly believe that the financial status of the University as at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021 and its financial performance and cash flow for the final year ending 31<sup>st</sup> December 2020 is in factual and equitable position in accordance with the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

**1.2 The Basis for the Statistical Opinion**

(a) Although fixed assets amounting Rs. 1,253,598,110 have been completely depreciated due to failure in reviewing the productive lifetime of immobile assets as per the Paragraph 65 of Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards 7, assets were being further utilized.



Accordingly, measures have not been taken to revise the estimated error as per the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards 03.

(b) Measures have not been taken to recognize and measure the capital grants amounting to Rs. 426,000,000 which have been obtained as per the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards 11.

(c) According to Paragraph 103 of Sri Lanka Public Accounting Standards 20, since the finite useful life of intangible assets has not been reviewed, intangible assets amounting to Rs. 13,327,143 which were fully expended were being used. Accordingly, actions were not taken to revise the estimated error as per Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards 11.

(d) According to the financial statement prepared by 31st of December 2021, although the gratuity provisions have amounted to Rs. 514,666,493, as per the individual balance sheet prepared in calculating the gratuity, the amount was identified as Rs. 601,158,480. By 31st December 2021, actions have not been taken to rectify the under-allocation amounting to Rs. 86,491,987 which has happened when calculating the academic allowance paid for the academic staff and the monthly compensation allowance paid to the non – academic staff in the payment of gratuity.

(e) Although a sum amounting to Rs. 73,414,154 generated by self-financing activities should have been identified as the revenue of the year under review, only Rs. 36,425,658 of such amount has been identified as the revenue in the year under review and has been directly credited to the Development Fund account. Accordingly, the annual surplus of the year under review was indicated Rs. 36,988,496 less than the actual amount.

(f) According to the information provided to the Capital Works and Planning division for auditing, although a sum amounting to Rs 20,860,844 should have been paid to Central Engineering Consultancy Bureau (CECB) for the construction activities of the lecture room complex of the faculty of Social Sciences and Languages by 31st December 2021, no provisions were provided in the Financial Statement in this regard.

(g) According to the Financial Statement prepared by 31st December 2021, although an amount of Rs. 40,289,882 should have been paid to CECB for the construction activities of 03 faculty buildings, as per the information provided to the Capital Works and Planning division for auditing, no such payment should be made to the relevant institution for the project. No reason was submitted for such difference.



(h) Although a sum amounting to Rs. 47,851,166 has been removed from the “Building” account and debited to the Credit account, since relevant journal entry has not been prepared, such transaction could not be identified and investigated.

(i) According to the financial statement prepared by 31 December 2021, the value of non-finite works in the construction activities of the main library building amounted to Rs. 48,882,099, as per the information submitted to the Capital Works and Planning division for auditing, the value of non –finite works have amounted to Rs. 75,503,800. The difference was identified as Rs. 26,621,701 and no reasons were provided for such difference.

(j) Although the amount of Rs. 9,953,442 paid for construction activities of Management and Social Sciences faculties should have been debited to the Account of Non-Finite Works, such has been debited to the “Building” account. Due to this reason, the “Building” account has over accounted by an equal amount and for 2019, 2020 and 2021 years, the expenditure of the buildings has been over- accounted by Rs. 1,493,016.

(k) In terms of Paragraph 5.5 of the circular No. 4/2016 issued on the 01<sup>st</sup> of March 2016 by the University Grants Commission, the project accounts prepared for self- financing activities of the university have not been disclosed as a note of the Financial Performance. Further as per the Paragraph 5.5.2 of the above circular, although the contributions to the funds should have been transferred from Financial Performance Statement to Financial Statement at the year-end through the equity statement which was not done accordingly.

(l) Although a payment amounting to Rs. 1,647,000 was documented and brought forward to be paid to a private company, as per the information provided by the Supply Division, no existence of such payment was disclosed.

(m) As per the Financial Statement prepared by 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021, the difference of the balance to be paid to the CECB for the construction of the ground, the boy’s hostel and Faculty of Geomatics and the balance payment to be paid as per the information provided for auditing to the Capital Works and Planning division was Rs. 6,452,677 and no reasons were provided for such difference.

I have done auditing as per Sri Lanka Audit Standards. My responsibility as per such audit standards is further described in the “Responsibility of the Auditor in relation to the auditing of financial statements”. I firmly believe that the auditing evidences I have gathered are adequate and appropriate to provide a base for my statistical opinion.



### **1.3 Other information included in the 2021 Annual Report of Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka**

“Other information” include the information that are entered in the university annual report 2021 which is to be handed over to me after the date of this audit report, but the information which are not included in the financial statements and in my audit report. The management should hold responsibility for these “other information”.

My opinion on financial statements does not cover these “other information” and I do not provide any certification or present an opinion on these information.

As per my auditing on financial statements, my responsibility is to read the “other information” when received and to check whether there is a quantitative misinterpretation between the other information and the financial statements as per my knowledge.

If I conclude that there is a quantitative misinterpretation based on “other information” and the actions I have taken before the date of this audit report, such should be communicated to the management. I have no facts to communicate in this regard.

### **1.4 Responsibilities of the parties in the management and control of financial statements**

It is the responsibility of the management to prepare and present these financial statements in accordance with the Accounting Standards of the Sri Lankan Public Sector and to determine the internal controls required to enable the preparation of financial statements without quantitative misrepresentations due to fraud or errors.

In preparing the financial statements, it is the responsibility of the management to determine the viability of the University and to disclose matters relating to the continued existence of the University unless the management intends to liquidate the University or discontinue operations in the absence of any other option.

Responsibility for the financial reporting process of the University rests with the governing parties.

In terms of sub-section 16 (1) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, the university shall maintain proper books and records on its own income, expenditure, assets and liabilities so as to prepare the Annual and Current Financial Statements of the University.



### **1.5 Responsibility of the Auditor in relation to the auditing of financial statements**

Overall, my goal is to provide fair proof that there is no quantitative misrepresentation of financial statements, fraud, and errors, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. While fair certification is a high level of certification, auditing in accordance with Sri Lanka Audit Standards does not always guarantee that it will detect quantitative misrepresentations. Fraud and misconduct, individually or collectively, can lead to quantitative misrepresentations and are expected to affect the economic decisions made by users based on these financial statements.

As part of the audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards, I exercised professional judgment and professional scepticism during the audit. Further,

- A well-planned auditing criterion to identify and estimate the risk in occurring false quantitative statements due to fallacy and fraud when supplying a base for the published audit opinion was executed. The impact created by fraud is massive than the material misstatement as a result of misstatements is due to collusive acts, drafting false documents, ignoring payments, misstatements and ignoring internal administration.
- Although it was not with the idea of stating an opinion regards to the effectiveness of the internal controls, an understanding was obtained on internal control system to plan suitable audit criterion.
- The applicability of the used accounting policies, the equity of accounting estimations and attached disclosure of the management were evaluated.
- The applicability of using the basis on incessant conduct of university for accounting was determined based on the audit evidence obtained as to whether there is material uncertainty about the incessant conduct of the University due to events or circumstances. If I conclude that there is sufficient uncertainty, attention should be made in my audit report on the related disclosures in the financial statements and to modify my opinion if those disclosures are not sufficient. However, the continuance may terminate upon future events or circumstances.
- The overall presentation of the financial statements, including disclosures and appropriateness of the transactions and events underlying the structure and content of the financial statements were evaluated.



I hereby inform authoritative parties of my significant audit findings, key internal control weaknesses and other matters identified during my audits.

## **2. Report on other legal and regulatory requirements**

2.1 The National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 includes special provisions regarding the requirements mentioned below.

2.1.1 I have obtained all the information and explanations necessary for the audit in accordance with the requirements of Section 12 (a) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, except for the effect of the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Audit Opinion in my report ,all explanations and clarifications were obtained by me and as per my observation and examinations it revealed that , proper financial records had been maintained by the university.

2.1.2. According to the requirement mentioned in Section 6 (1) (d) (iii) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, the financial statements of the University are consistent with the preceding year.

2.1.3 The recommendations made in the previous year by me are included in the financial statements presented as per the requirement mentioned in section 6 (1) (a) (iv) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018.

2.2 Nothing came to my attention to the extent of making the following statements on the basis of the proceedings followed and the evidence obtained and within the limitations of the quantitative facts.

2.2.1 According to the requirements mentioned in Section 12 (d) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, a member of the governing body of the University has a relationship, directly or otherwise, out of the ordinary course of business in relation to any contract with which the University is involved.

2.2.2 According to the requirement mentioned in Section 12 (f) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, except for the following observations, has not acted in accordance with any relevant written law or other general or special directives issued by the Governing Body of the University.

**Observations**

- (a) Section 11 of the Finance Act No. 38 of 1971 and paragraph 8.2.2 of the Director General of Public Enterprises' Circular No. PED/ 12 dated 02 June 2003
- Although the surplus money of the institution can be invested Subject to the approval of the Minister of Finance, Rs. 116,660,274 had been invested in 08 fixed deposits. without such approval, during the year under review,
- (b) Code of Financial Regulations of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka
- (i) Financial Regulation 371(5)
- Although the current interim imprest issued should be settled immediately after the completion of the related work, the projects, recurrent, capital and research advances issued to 23 officials and 6 institutions in 32 cases from the year 2016 to the year 2021 amounted to Rs. 6,743,084 were also unsettled as on 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021.
- (ii) Financial Regulation 571
- Retention money amounted to Rs. 16,686,382 applicable for the period from 2016 to 2019 were not credited to the government's revenue after following up with the relevant parties.
- (c) Paragraph 7 of Chapter V of the Establishments code for Higher Education Institutions and University Grants Commission
- During the period from the year 2000 to the year 2017, Rs. 50,516,467 due to be recovered on breach of bond agreements from 11 officers who had gone abroad on study leave had failed to be recovered by March 31, 2022,



2.2.3 According to the requirements mentioned in section 12 (g) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, the university authorities have not acted in accordance with the powers, functions and duties.

2.2.4. According to the requirement mentioned in Section 12 (h) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, except for the following observations, that the University had not been procured and utilized necessary resources economically, efficiently and effectively within the time frames and in compliance with the applicable laws.

- (a) The project to build a housing complex for the staff of the university on the basis of design and built was awarded to a construction company on 30 October 2017 for a value added tax-free contract value of Rs. 355,715,000. The University had incurred a loss of approximately Rs 20,116,000 due to the fact that the bid documents had overestimated the need for the internal road system and security fence and the technical evaluation committee had revised the plans disregarding to those items and revision of plans without consideration of cost after award of procurement and signing of contract.
- (b) Phase-I construction of new library building, with a value-added tax-free contract value of Rs.315,051, 433 was awarded to a contractor on January 30, 2018 in terms of completion of work within 24 months. As advance for commencement of work Rs. 63,010, 286 had been paid and the relevant bond had expired on February 07, 2020. But no arrangements were made to extend its period. Meanwhile, the contractor had abandoned the construction and the value of the last certified work done by the engineer was Rs. 43,058,226. As Rs. 83,010, 286 had been paid to the contractor as the advance and the value of the completed construction work, the amount to be recovered from the contractor was Rs. 39,952,060. During the year under review a performance bond of Rs. 15, 752, 572 was encashed and spent on recurrent expenditure of the University. At the request of the contractor and without the approval of the procurement committee, a trilateral agreement had been entered with a sub-contractor and according to that agreement the work was to be completed before 24 February 2022. In a situation where the subcontractor had ignored the advance bond of Rs. 53,442,615 which should be submitted within 7 days from the date of signing the agreement and the submitting the performance bond of Rs.15,752,572



has been delayed till 24<sup>th</sup> March, 2022, but it has been recommended to extend the contract period till 23<sup>rd</sup> January 2023 without further attending in this regard.

- (c) In February 2018, a tribunal investigation board was appointed to inspect the non-compliance with the prescribed specifications of purchasing 130 desktop computers at a cost of Rs. 15,964,000 in June 2016. According to the investigation board report dated 19<sup>th</sup> May 2018, it was recommended that disciplinary actions should be taken against the officials who had acted irresponsibly in the entire procurement process, but disciplinary actions had not been initiated by 30<sup>th</sup> April 2022, and the retention money valued Rs. 1,596,400 has been also released to the contractor on 21<sup>st</sup> June 2018.
- (d) Due to exceeding of the authority limit of the Departmental Procurement Committee, the procurement was divided into four parts and on the recommendation of the Departmental Procurement Committee, laboratory equipment was purchased for the Faculty of Medicine at a cost of Rs. 34,123,169. Furthermore, 172 desktop computers were divided into 5 sets, and 76 laptop computers were divided into 3 sets, and those computers were purchased at a cost of Rs. 44,983,730 on the recommendation of the departmental procurement committee.

### **2.3 Other Details**

- (a) 05 officers who took paid study leave to complete their post-graduate qualifications and went abroad between 2012 and 2017 reported back to work without completing their studies, and they had not completed their post-graduate qualifications even by February 2022. According to Article 19 of the agreement reached with the university when those officers took study leave and went abroad, all the expenses incurred for the studies should be charged due to abandoning the studies or not completing them within the stipulated time, but due to not doing so, the bond values of Rs. 42,853,450 had been failed to recover even by 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021.
- (b) On the request of an officer who had received a 36-month foreign study leave from 15<sup>th</sup> March, 2014 to 14<sup>th</sup> March 2017 to pursue a post-graduate degree at the University of Malaya, Malaysia, no-pay leave to serve as the chairman of Lanka Electricity Company (Private) Limited for 03 years from 19<sup>th</sup> November 2015 had been approved. Although the studies were not completed within the stipulated time, the bond value of Rs.10,313,221 was not collected by the university. Instead, the officer was granted paid study leave from



20<sup>th</sup> February 2019 to 13<sup>th</sup> June 2020 to pursue a doctorate degree in the Faculty of Postgraduate of the university, and given the opportunity to enroll in a new postgraduate course bond including the pre-bonded value. But the particular doctorate degree was not completed even by May 30, 2022.

- (c) During the period from January 2020 to October 2021, a total of Rs.6,081,025 was paid as research allowances to 13 officers belonging to the non-academic staff of the university, but none of the officers who received the allowances had submitted research reports at the end of the research period. The research committee had arranged to approve grants for the next year for a new research proposal regardless of the progress of the previous research.
- (d) In the year 2020, a system for collecting and refining rainwater, a carwash yard, and a small building for garbage storage were built in the housing complex at a cost of Rs. 21,000,000, but they remained unused and idle, and also the small shopping complex built spending Rs. 15,000,000 remained idle for 02 years without being used for its intended purpose.
- (e) According to a Memorandum of Understanding signed with the University of Gothenburg, Sweden, a grant amounting Rs. 5,434,801 was received in the period from 2013 to 2015, and out of that amount Rs.1,676,970 remained underutilized for 03 years.
- (f) 12 disaster loans, computer loans, vehicle loans, employee loans, and festival advance loans balances of Rs.439,429 belonging to 07 employees from a period of 04 to 21 years had not been recovered even by 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021.
- (g) An amount of Rs. 2,201,150 payable to the Mahapola Trust Fund from the year 2019 was not settled even during the year under review.
- (h) Although the Public Business Committee had ordered on 09<sup>th</sup> August 2017 that the deficiencies in the university's playground and the stadium (which was built at a cost of Rs.123,052,693 in 2014) should be completed, the retention money of Rs. 5,156,160 was not used to repair the playground even by 30<sup>th</sup> May 2022.
- (i) A total of Rs.1,370,300 including Rs. 400,000 for setting up a software for the fixed assets register and Rs. 968,300 for setting up the asset register by entering data into the software, was paid on 08 occasions from the year 2016 to the year 2019. But the fixed assets register



including property and equipment costing Rs. 6,614,202,769 as of 31<sup>st</sup> December 2021 had not been prepared by 30<sup>th</sup> May 2022.

- (j) While it was planned to buy library books worth Rs. 1,000,000 during the year under review as per the procurement plan prepared for the year 2021, the budget of the year 2021 allocated a provision of Rs. 7,000,000 for the same purpose. It was observed that the procurement plan and annual budget were not used as an effective financial controller to purchase library books at a cost of Rs.8,305,296 in the year 2021.
- (k) As on 15<sup>th</sup> May 2022, 113 posts out of 461 approved posts in academic staff and 149 posts out of 541 approved posts in non-academic staff were vacant. Vacancies in non-academic staff also led to the payment of Rs.17,947,941 as holiday wages and overtime allowances during the year under review.
- (l) In the reviewed year, Rs. 14,226,561 had been spent in excess of the budget allocations related to 02 expenditure subjects, which ranged between 33 percent and 47 percent of the allocation.
