Message of the Vice-Chancellor



During the year 2021, amidst the Covid-19 pandemic situation, the University of Ruhuna was able to perform successfully by addressing the challenges with well-organized strategies. The year 2021 was the third of our five year cooperate plan is from, 01.01.2019 to 31.12.2023.

The virtual learning platform that was inaugurated in 2020 developed further and undergraduates were able to continue their education by minimizing the risks contracting Covid-19. All the Faculties were able to graduate the students due to complete the programmes successfully. The University maintained a zero ragging environment for the third consecutive year.

We were able to host six international symposia/conferences. Convocation was held successfully over one day with 2174 graduands. By conducting the convocation during one day, we were able to use the budgeted allocation efficiently. During the year academic sessions, QA sessions, Vice-Chancellor's awards session were conducted successfully. It received a clean audit report from the National Audit Commission, a best annual report award for this year.

It is my pleasure to mention the achievements in 2021. During the Institutional Review – 2020, Completed in December 2021 UGC Quality Assurance Council placed “The University of Ruhuna in category A (Very Good)”. The University of Ruhuna was able to secure the fourth position nationally in the international

Webometrics Ranking. Both academics and staff members at the University of Ruhuna earned many achievements in creative areas and sports fields. Our students won the “Gold medal” in the all-island “Health Innovation Award – 2021” University Category, Won the University president’s award, University of Ryukyus, Okinawa, and President’s award for scientific research-2021. By participating in online sports competitions, many undergraduate students have won medals from chess, karate, and Taekwondo tournaments.

This year also marked another milestone in the history of the University of Ruhuna with the opening of the Southern Technology Incubation Centre at the Department of Physics, to encourage inventors in the entire Southern province by providing necessary facilities.

Our endeavor is to create a conducive environment for learning, research and creativity for both academics and staff members. To succeed in that effort we were able to conduct many workshops including motivational workshops, student counselor workshops and meditation and moderation workshops. Seven language courses for undergraduates of the university were introduced by the CMLC. These include Advanced Certificate Course in Japanese, German, Chinese, Tamil, Korean, French, and Hindi Languages. To improve the quality of the staff members we were able to conduct training programs, capacity development programs for both academic and non-academic staff members.

To build up a strong international collaboration we were able to sign a memorandum of understanding with Okayama University, Japan and to Sign a MoU between Vellore Institute of Technology, India.

Analyzing the past to prepare for the future is important. To sum up, the year 2021 was full of successes of the University of Ruhuna. We are on our way to achieving the goals set out in our corporate plan. By the year 2021, the University of Ruhuna is standing with a reputation that exists for 43 years. The University will increase the intakes of students further, develop more

degree programmes in the next year. Still, all academics and staff members need to provide outstanding contributions for the university to enhance the quality of education and international reputation more and more in the year 2022.

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Introduction to University of Ruhuna

Ruhuna University College, the precursor of the University of Ruhuna (UOR), was declared open by then the Prime Minister Mr. J.R. Jayawardene on 27th of August in 1978. The pioneering faculties, namely, Faculty of Agriculture, Faculty of Science, Faculty of Medicine and Faculty of Humanities of Social Sciences were affiliated to the University of Peradeniya in the beginning. The Ruhuna University College had been functioning at the premises of the Technical College, Meddawatta, Matara for over six years. Having elevated to a fully-fledged university status with effect from 1st February 1984, UOR was formally established in a master-piece architectural complex on a picturesque hillock facing the Indian Ocean at Wellamadama, Matara, Sri Lanka.



Subsequently, six more faculties were established. The Faculty of Engineering was established in 1999 in Galle and the Faculty of Management and Finance was established in 2003 at the main campus in Wellamadama. Further, Faculty of Fisheries and Marine Sciences & Technology was established in 2005 also at the main campus being the first of its kind in the entire University system in the country. The Faculty of Graduate Studies was incepted in 2011. The recent additions to the UOR include the Faculty of Technology in Kamburupitiya (2016) and the Faculty of Allied Health Sciences in Karapitiya (2017).

With 11,226 internal undergraduates, over 18000 external undergraduates, 1,121 postgraduates and 640 academic staff, University of Ruhuna is regarded one of the leading higher education institute in Sri Lanka. . With ten Faculties, UOR is the most diversified Sri Lankan University while being the second largest in terms of student numbers. Webometric Ranking of 2021 placed UOR at 3th among Sri Lankan Universities and 1733rd among world Universities.





Faculty of Agriculture

Dean's Statement

Year 2021 was managed well with the COVID – 19 pandemic situation through the learnt lessons in 2020. Even though, the country was in lockdown situations in two occasions, the academic program and other regular activities of the Faculty functioned reasonably well due to well adapted practices and commitment of the staff.

Lectures and examinations were conducted in online mode. Comprehensive guidelines on conducting online examinations were formulated and approved by the Senate. LMS software system of the Faculty was upgraded to latest version with enhanced features and capacity. In supporting online teaching and learning activities and examinations, Computer Unit is equipped with 3 high end servers. The expansion of the Wi-Fi network is also in the process.

The completion of the curriculum development process is a main achievement of the Faculty in this year and it is implemented with the 2019/ 2020 academic year (A/L 2019 intake).

Faculty is currently in the process of 5 few degree programs namely BSc in Agro-Industry Innovation and Technology Management, BSc in Food Technology and Nutritional Science, BSc in Crop Production and Forest Technology, BSc in Biodiversity Conservation and Agro-Ecosystem Management and BSc in Applied Plant Molecular Biology. Faculty is working towards commencing 2 new degree programs by 2023.

Establishment of the Smart Agro-ecosystem Based Resilience Center (fully-equipped modern resource center with a state-of-the-art ICT facility) by the BRITAE funded by EU grant is progressing well.

From my perspective, Faculty of Agriculture performed well during the year 2021 and I am delighted to work with a committed group of staff members and students.

Faculty of Engineering

Dean's Statement

Due to the Covid 19 pandemic situation and Government rules and regulations during the year 2021 the faculty could not function most of its academic activities and other activities physically. The faculty has functioned under the leadership of Dr. H.P. Sooriyaarachchi, Dean/ Senior Lecturer attached to the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering who has been serving as the Dean since 1st January 2019.

The 22nd batch with 532 students was admitted to the Faculty of Engineering on 24th March 2021. Considering last year, the 235 additional numbers of students were admitted to the faculty from the 2019 A/L batch for the Marine Engineering and Naval Architecture (10 students) and the Computer Engineering programme (200 students) as well as the additional Students for the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering (25 students).

UGC has released LKR 101.4mn as furniture and refurbishment costs for lecture venues to facilitate the 2019 A/L student intake. Faculty had utilized 130 million received for the first-year seating arrangements and part of the first-year equipment supplied. This comprises 100M for special intake and 30M for unpaid capitals. Among other priority items, this funding was used for the development of a computer center to cater to the additional intake of 235 students. Faculty has received 100M for MENA program for equipment this year and 200M for increased intake of students.

Due to the increased intake of students, there are 24 development projects

identified and the proposal has already been submitted to UGC approval. The faculty has completed the acquisition of the land for the proposed building of the Department of Electrical and Information Engineering. The faculty has organized tree-planting campaigns and expected planting 1000 trees with the involvement of the 22nd batch of student

The surveying work camp for the 19th batch of undergraduates specializing in the field of Civil and Environmental Engineering was conducted from 26th January 2021 to 7th February 2021 at the premises of the Faculty of Agriculture, University of Ruhuna, Mapalana and Kaburupitiya. The Engineering Education Center of the Faculty arranged three-month industrial training for 4th and 6th year Engineering undergraduates at various industries in Sri Lanka with the support of National Apprentice and Industrial Training. The 8th semester students Industrial Training period was completed from 14th June 2021 to 5th September 2022. The prevailing pandemic situation of the Country has also invaded the faculty activities. Many staff members and students got infected with the Covid-19 virus. Yet the staff members and students put their best efforts to continue academic activities. Lectures were conducted online and online examinations were successfully held.

ACEPS – 2021 Symposium was organized and hosted by the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering, the University of Ruhuna in collaboration with Saitama University, Japan. ACEPS-2021 was held successfully on the virtual platform on 07th October 2021.

Faculty of Fisheries and Marine Sciences & Technology

Dean's Statement

Year 2021 is the 16th year of the Faculty of Fisheries and Marine Sciences & Technology, established in year 2005. So far, the Faculty has produced eleven batches of graduates specialized in the fields of Fisheries, Aquaculture, Limnology, Oceanography and Marine Geology, Limnology and Water Technology. Most importantly, the first batch of the students who pursued the Bachelor of Science Honours in Marine and Freshwater Sciences Degree programme graduated in 2021, and the 5th batch of the students of the BScHons in Marine and Freshwater Sciences degree programme was enrolled in 2021. This increased the annual student intake to 200 in 2021. Moreover, Faculty has initiated a new degree programme of BScHons in Marine Services and Resource Management, which will be conducted jointly by Faculty of Fisheries and Marine Sciences & Technology and Faculty of Management and Finance from 2023 onwards. Three short courses named customary law, national and international legislations applicable to fisheries, Ornamental fish breeding and culture, and Fish Post-harvest Techniques have been developed and handed over to DCEU for implementation.

The academic programme was delayed nearly for two months due to COVID-19 pandemic. However, the Faculty has effectively conducted online teaching via zoom platform and thereafter; practical classes and examinations were conducted physically following the safety guidelines.

The Faculty has continuously conducted outreach activities and provided the service to the society such as through the Service laboratory at the Department of Limnology and Water Technology for testing water and wastewater of industries in southern province as a registered laboratory in Central Environmental Authority of Sri Lanka. Students, staff and Alumni of the Faculty conducted several webinars for knowledge and experience sharing with the society. The National services rendered by the Academic staff includes Prof. K.H.M.A. Deepananda as a member of the steering committee for evaluating research proposals submitted to NSF and Prof TPD Gamage as the Director of Quality Assurance Council, UGC in 2021.

The Faculty members have published 30 articles in international indexed journals and 30 abstracts at different forums in 2021. In addition, the number of citations received during the year 2021 was nearly 500 for the research publications of the staff.

Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences

Dean's Statement

The Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences of the University of Ruhuna is composed of nine academic departments - Economics, English and Linguistics, English Language Teaching, Geography, History and Archaeology, Pali and Buddhist Studies, Public Policy, Sinhala, and Sociology; a unit Information Technology; and two centers - Modern Languages and Civilization and Natural Disaster Information Center.

A brief review of the faculty in the year 2021 has been given below under the 07 goals of the university.

Expanding access to education, research and services - The faculty continued its old syllabus and the newly introduced syllabus during the year 2021. Under the old syllabus, the Bachelor of Arts (General) and Bachelor of Arts (Special) degree programmes were offered for the students who registered before the year 2020. The new syllabus was offered to the students registered since the year 2020. 12 Bachelor of Arts Honors degree programme are offered under the new syllabus. Although, the faculty's capacity is for 350 students per annum, the faculty enrolled 755 students during the year 2021 providing opportunities for a large number of students to follow bachelor's degree programmes. The faculty continued its publications and 03 issues of the Journal on Social Sciences and Humanities Review and one issue of Faculty Journal on Humanities and Social Sciences published during the year 2021. In addition, two department journals converted to online mode and published two issues. A Research and Publication Centre on Humanities and Social Sciences was established and several workshops were conducted to improve research

capacity of the students and academics of the faculty.

Enhancing quality of education research and services - The faculty fully operated the Learning Management System (LMS) and Management Information System (MIS) for the teaching – learning process. Despite the Covid-19 pandemic situation, the faculty continuously operated its academic activities both physically, whenever possible, and virtually. Around 90% of the faculty's academics have post graduate qualifications. Although, percentage of PhD holders are still at 43%, 06 academics completed PhDs during the year 2021 while 05 more registered for PhDs.

Enhancing relevance of education and research - The faculty has revised its degree programmes considering the needs of the society. Essential skills such as English language, ICT, management skills and several course units related to vision of the life and mindset paradigm has been incorporated and offered during the year 2021. The faculty in partnerships with the University Career Guidance Unit, conducted several courses to improve knowledge and skills of the students to cater to the demands. The Annual Students Sessions (RASAS-2021) conducted in the year 2021, provided opportunities for a large number of students to present and share their research findings and also learn more on the research activities. The Faculty's Annual International Conference (RUICHSS-2021) was also held providing opportunities to the academics and researchers to present, discuss and share research outcomes. The faculty, its first time conducted the 1st International Conference on Buddhist Studies. Further, the newly enrolled students of the faculty

were provided an English Language and ICT intensive course in the year 2021 as well.

Ensuring justice and equity with respect to gender, ethnicity, religion and differently-abled Persons - The faculty offers degree programmes both in Sinhala and English medium. Courses on Tamil Language Skills and Sinhala Language Skills have been incorporated in the syllabus of all the 12 degree programmes as compulsory subjects. The Erasmus+ funded project on Developing Inclusive Education for Students with Disabilities (IncEdu) were continued in the year 2021. Under this project, several guest lectures were conducted targeting students with

disabilities. The Centre for Modern Languages and Civilization of the faculty, conducted certificate courses on Tamil, Chinese, French, Hindi, German and Japan languages. Department of Public Policy in partnerships with National Peace Council, conducted a series of workshops to improve students' knowledge on pluralism and peace and harmony.

Enhancing good governance through effective and efficient management of the resources - Around 90% of the permanent and 100% temporary vacancies of the faculty were filled and the remaining vacancies have been advertised. The students counselling and students mentoring programmes were continued successfully.

Faculty of Management and Finance

Dean's Statement

The Faculty of Management and Finance came into existence on 29th April 2003 at the main premises of the University of Ruhuna. The Bachelor of Business Administration honours degree programs at the Faculty of Management and Finance aimed at producing graduates of high caliber, who can cater to the emerging needs in the business management profession both locally and internationally. The faculty has six Departments of studies: namely, the Department of Accounting and Finance, the Department of Human Resource Management, the Department of Management and Entrepreneurship, the Department of Marketing, the Department of Finance and Department of Business Management. In addition to these departments, the faculty also has a Computer Unit. BBA Degree in International Business and BBA Degree in Business Law are the proposed degree programs to be introduced soon.

All the degree programs at the faculty are four-year honours degree program placed at SLQF level 6. By following these programs, the students will learn major concepts, theories, and techniques relevant to four specialization areas (i.e., Accountancy; Business Management; Entrepreneurship; Finance; Human Resource Management and Marketing), together with other important skills such as communication skills, analytical skills, and problem-solving skills required to understand and manage the factors shaping

the modern business administration sphere. Further, the compulsory independent research project promotes life-long learning skills and competencies in building defensible arguments, while the internship training exposes students to the industry, giving an experience of how knowledge, skills, and attitudes they have acquired are applied in a corporate environment.

At present, the faculty conducts courses in a range of disciplines leading to Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) degrees. Under the educational reforms at the university, course-unit based undergraduate programs were introduced with effect from September 2001. With these reforms, the faculty now offers BBA Degree Programs in English medium only.

Other than the undergraduate programs, the faculty coordinates Master of Philosophy (M.Phil.) degree program based on independent research. Postgraduate Diploma in Business Administration (PDBA), Master of Business Administration (MBA) and Master of Business Management (MBM) programs are special degree programs offered by the faculty, which are mainly based on coursework and a research component.

The faculty reviews its strategic plan on a regular basis and endeavor is made to achieve the Goals specified at the University Corporate Plan -2023. Following Tables provide the details of the achievements of the year 2020.

Faculty of Medicine

Dean's Statement

During the year 2021 as a Faculty it was possible to achieve the main goals despite the unpredictable situation in the country due to COVID 19.

We were able to accommodate 263 students in the new batch of students 2019 A/L intake increasing the student intake by about 30% supporting the state policy to increase the higher education opportunities to students and became the medical faculty with the largest intake.

Despite all the adverse circumstances the academic activities were smoothly functioning both on-line and physically. The clinical training continued through out the year only with few disruption and was able to make final year students to pass out on time and all the other main examinations were conducted without a significant delay.

There were few small out breaks of COVID in the hostels and outside the hostels and were successfully managed and was able to continue academic program uninterrupted.

All the main academic events of the Faculty were conducted. Faculty of Medicine Academic Sessions (FMAS) were successfully conducted as a hybrid event in December 2021 in addition to having 2020 FMAS which was postponed due to COVID in March 2021.

The Dana and Pirith ceremony was successfully conducted with limited participation under the COVID guidelines in March 2021.

The Cultural Centre of the Faculty of Medicine was able to conduct lot of cultural events related to literature, poetry, cinema, music, handicraft and eventually to have Christmas carols and a special performance of Ediriweera Sarachchandra's Maname live towards the end of the year.

Student Achievements

Students were able to participate in many events like paediatrics quiz and radiology quiz and physiology quiz organized by respective colleges and associations and in inter university chess competition in which the university team which included 4 medical students became runners up. The Faculty of Medicine was represented by Nethmi Yasara Vithanage (Captain) and Malsha Danudri of the 39th batch, Sonali Kimarasinghe of the 40th batch and Thushara Ediriweera of the 41st batch at the Inter University Chess Championship 2021.

Mr. Mevan Induruwa who is a student of 41st batch of Faculty of Medicine, University of Ruhuna was selected to represent Sri Lanka at the University Sports Federation (FISU), Volunteer Leaders Academy.

Ms. Sinali Kumarasinghe of the 40th batch represented the country in the chess tournament hosted by the Indonesia University Sports Federation (IUSF). She scored 4 points and the Sri Lanka team was placed 7th in the overall event.

Infrastructure Development

Despite the situation in the there were infrastructure development in the Faculty.

The examination branch was expanded and updated and the dean’s office was extended. The Finance Branch was moved from the main office complex to a spacious place which was renovated newly.

Three Lecture theaters were improved with air-conditioning and curtaining to make a better learning area for the increased intake of students.

Program Review

The process of conducting in-course assessments were streamlined as its being done in the main examination according to the guidelines given in the examination manual.

Documentation of exam marks including the marks sheets were updated to maintain

uniformity across the exams and in the disciplines.

For the first time in the history of the medical faculty surgery marks of the final MBBS examination was revisited as it was found to have unfair discrepancies in the marks among different examiners and were corrected and 9 students passed final examination as a result and taken appropriate steps for them to do the internship with the rest of the batch.

More than 50% of the recommendations given in the Program Review 2019 are completed and the rest is progressing well and the Faculty Quality Assurance Cell is moved to a more spacious new office in renovated building.

Two of the major breakthroughs are establishing a Students grievance committee and developing a system to

manage complaints of sexual harassments and gender based violence.

Student Support Service was reallocated in its original space with a 24hour online service for students to approach student's counsellors at any time of the day through a hot-line.

Faculty maintained a COVID call Centre linked to National COVID Centre with full participation of the medical students and the staff which was active for 24 hours a day for few months and discontinued with the decline of the COVID outbreak.

Curricular Revision

The Faculty has been involved in a major curriculum change over the last few years and is being completed and in the process of submitting the application to the UGC.

Faculty of Science

Dean's Statement

The Faculty consists of six departments in the subject areas of Botany, Chemistry, Computer Science, Mathematics, Physics and Zoology. Faculty of Science had been offering general and special degree programmes in Physical Science, Biological Science and Computer Science.

The first group of students for the new Bachelor of Science (Honours) Degree program in Financial Mathematics and Industrial Statistics was enrolled and

commenced academic activities in 2021 from among the students who faced the GCE (A/L) examination in 2019.

The Faculty enrolled the increased the student intake for both Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Computer Science. The following table illustrates the summary of the increased number of students enrolled from the batch of students who faced GCE (A/L) examinations in 2019.

Faculty received only 15 number of additional academic cadre positions out of the requested 38 academic cadre positions for the increased intake of students. No non-academic cadre positions of temporary demonstrator/temporary instructor positions were received relevant to increased intake. Faculty of Science was allocated Rs. 133 million for purchasing the equipment and furniture for catering additional intake of students and the procurement process has been started.

Faculty had been progressing well with the implementation of the activities relevant to the seven various grants received under the AHEAD project as the faculty as well as individual departments that submitted

applications jointly with academic staff of the within and outside the faculty.

The faculty is presently in the process of finalizing the proposals the proposal for the BSc Honours degree programme and the revised proposals will be submitted to Quality Assurance and Accreditation Council of the University Grants Commission. The faculty re-considered the proposals for introducing new honours degree programmes and identified the need of several changes in the proposed programmes, in particular, the need of having 45 credits for each subject in double major honours degree programmes.

Faculty successfully held the 8th Ruhuna International Science and Technology

Conference. Members of the faculty published their research findings in local and international research conferences and journals.

Many of the academic staff members of the faculty received a number of grants from various entities and grant schemes.

In addition to that faculty members worked in special committees for different types of

purposes within and outside of the university.

Dean's Statement

The following examinations were conducted during the year 2021 physically.

- Level 4 semester II Examination-2021 August (DET only)
- Level 2 semester II Examination- 2021 October/November
- Level 1 semester I Examination- 2021 December

We could successfully complete all the above examinations and we could be able to manage conducting of level 2 semester II examination in year 2021 even with the covid 19 outbreak at the faculty in October 2021. We made special arrangements to conduct the examination under that situation and could successfully conduct the examination physically no sooner those

students cured with the immeasurable support of staff and students. We could be able to graduate first batch of students on 11th September 2021.

Faculty infrastructure developments are progressing. Construction of three storied lecture hall building complex was planned to be completed by mid of August 2021. However, with the current pandemic situation contractor has requested extension and will be completed by beginning of 2023. Canteen building construction was started in year 2021 and will be completed by April 2023.

Students in Faculty of Technology could be able to win six medals at the “ Sahasak Nimavum 2021” competition organized by Sri Lanka Inventors' Commission and won two medals in the 6th Korea International Youth Olympiad 4i 2021(KIYO4i 2021). Apart from that students and staff of faculty could be able to repair several vehicles at the workshop of the faculty including condensed tractor received from Irrigation Department.

The intake of the fifth batch was increased to 340 and orientation programme was conducted under virtual platform successfully. This batch of students will be physically called no sooner the academic year of 2019/2020 is over.

Students are encouraged and given opportunities engage in recreational and cultural activities inside the faculty. Online programs and activities are conducted in three different areas: Music, Dancing and Drama.

Faculty has move forwarded in every aspect even with the crisis situation within the country.

Library

Librarian's statement

The Library of University of Ruhuna is one of the resourceful academic libraries situated in the southern region of Sri Lanka. To date, the library collection exceeded 2.4 million books. Library of the University is a service-oriented organization. However, in the year 2021, the library had to face challenges driven by the covid-19 pandemic. Hence, user services were redesigned according to the need. Majority of the library services were provided to library user community using online portals keeping the same quality in a physical set up. For example, Library of University of Ruhuna commenced the document delivery service with the support of University Grants Commission and University of Colombo in collaboration with the British Library. This service is an entirely free of charge and it cater for the thirst for the information by the academic, student and research community of the University of Ruhuna.

In year 2021, the library contributed to the University of Ruhuna in different ways by providing different services. For instance, Identity Card Producing Unit offered one of the necessary services of the University of Ruhuna. Moreover, the Media unit of the University of Ruhuna operates under the guidance of the Librarian of the University of Ruhuna.

6. Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year ended 31st December,2021

1. General Information

1.1 Legal and Domicile Form

University of Ruhuna is a Government University which was established under the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978 and domiciled in Sri Lanka. At present university has 10 Faculties. The Faculties of Humanities and Social Sciences, Sciences, Management & Finance, Fisheries and Marine Sciences & Technologies and Graduate Studies are situated at main premises at Wellamadama, Matara. The Faculties of Medicine, Engineering and Allied Health Sciences are situated at Karapitiya, Hapugala, Uluvitike in Galle district respectively. The Faculties of Agriculture and Technology are located in Kamburupitya, Matara.

1.2 Principal Activities & Nature of operation

The university primarily caters to local students to promote and develop Higher Education and Research in the fields of Agriculture, Humanities & Social Sciences, Medicine, Science, Allied Health Sciences, Management & Finance, Engineering, Fisheries and Marine Sciences and Technology.

1.3 Financial Period

The Financial period of the University of Ruhuna represent twelve months period from 01stJanuary 2021 to 31st December 2021.

1.4 Date of Authorization for Issue

The Financial statement for the year ended 31st, December 2021 of the university of Ruhuna was approved and authorized to issue by the 420th meeting of the University Council held on 24th February 2021.

1.5 Basis of Preparation Financial Statements

1.5.1 Statement of Compliance

The financial statements of the University of Ruhuna have been prepared in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards (SLPSASs) issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Sri Lanka.

The financial statements comprise the Statement of Financial Position, Statement of Financial Performance, Statement of Changes in Funds & Reserves, Cash Flow Statement and Notes to the Financial Statements. All accounting policies adopted by the University are applied consistently with those of the previous year, where necessary comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to the changes, in presentation of current year figures. The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below.

1.5.2 Basis of Measurement

The Financial Statements have been prepared on historical cost basis except where appropriate disclosures are made with regard to the fair value clarified by relevant notes.

1.5.3 Comparative Information

Comparative information including quantitative, narrative and descriptive information is disclosed in respect of the previous period for all amounts reported in the financial statements in order to enhance the understanding of the financial statements of the current period and to improve comparability. When necessary, comparative figures have been rearranged to conform to the current year presentation.

1.5.4 Functional and Presentation Currency

The financial statements are presented in Sri Lankan Rupees, which is the functional and presentation currency of the University. All financial information presented in Sri Lankan Rupees has been rounded to the nearest rupee.

1.5.5 Significant Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The preparation and presentation of financial statements in conformity with SLPSASs, requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates and judgments used.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an on-going basis. Revisions to

accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods. Any changes in accounting estimates and critical judgments are disclosed in the relevant notes to the financial statements.

1.5.6 Going Concern

Financial statements have been prepared on the assumption that the University is a going concern basis.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

2.1. Assets and the Basis of their valuation

2.1.1 Property, Plant and Equipment.

(a) Recognition and Measurement

Property, Plant and Equipment are recognized when, it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the asset will flow to the University and the cost of the asset can be measured reliably.

All items of Property, Plant and Equipment are initially recognized at cost. After initial recognition subsequent measurement of Property, Plant & Equipment are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation except classes of Land, Motor Vehicle & buildings.

Land, Motor Vehicle & buildings are subsequently measured at revaluation modal and carried at a revalued amount, being its fair value at the date of the revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Assets acquired through the non exchange transactions recognized at its fair value as at the date of acquisition. Property, Plant and Equipment include the assets acquired through the government grants, Projects, research grants, internally generated funds and donations. The value of property plant & equipment received as gift and, donations were recognized as revenue from Non exchange transaction in accordance with the SLPSAS 11 . Repair and maintenance cost are recognized in the statement of financial performance as incurred.

During the year 2020 , Rs.4.5 Mn has been paid to the Divisional Secretary , Bope Poddala as an 25% advance payment for the acquisition of land called “Piyon Arachchige Watta” adjacent to the Department of Electrical & Information Engineering , Faculty of Engineering to construct a building to admin the new student intake. The possession of the said land was not transferred to the University on 08th April 2021 . As the final purchase consideration value which is due on the land is not determined yet , this land has not been recognized in the financial statements .The said land has been valued to Rs.18 Mn by Department of Government Valuation on 30th July 2020.

Three acre land called “Keselgashena Watta” has been transferred for the consideration of 13.28 Mn from the Land Reform Commission for the Faculty of Medicine playground. Land Reform Commission has given their concurrence for the payment of consideration

in 60 equal installment. Payable balance as at 31.12.2021 was Rs.7.74 Mn, which is included in the Statement of Financial Position. The purchase consideration and other initial expenditures incurred for this land have been capitalized and included under the Statement of Financial Position.

Construction project of The State of the Art Auditorium named “ Rabindranath Thagore Memorial Auditorium “ with 1,500 seating capacity for the University of Ruhuna has been completed and handed over to the university on 13th February 2019. The project was funded by the High Commission of India on behalf of Government of India .Tax and consultancy payment related to the project was funded by the Ministry of Education . Accordingly total cost incurred for the above project was recognized as the fair value of the assets and capitalized as follows,

Major Renovation works in the Existing Building at Main Premises , Guest House Building and Defect Rectification works in building complex of the Faculty of Management & finance have been completed in the current financial year . Total cost of the contracts were capitalized and recognized in the statement of Financial position. Further Major Renovation works in the Existing

Building at Main Premises , Bachelor quarters and Second Stage of Building Complex for Faculty of Management and Finance contracts have been physically completed during the year , however as final bills have not been settled yet , cost of the building couldn't be measured reliable and not recognized in the financial statement under Property plant & equipment .

(b) Subsequent Expenditure

Subsequent expenditure incurred for the purpose of acquiring, extending or improving assets of a permanent nature in order to carry on or increase the earning capacity of the assets has been treated as capital expenditure. Expenditure incurred to replace a component of an item of Property, Plant and Equipment that is accounted for separately, including major inspection and overhaul expenditure, is capitalized. Other subsequent expenditure is capitalized only if it is probable that the future economic benefits embodied within the part will flow to the University and its cost can be measured reliably.

(c) Revaluation of Property Plant & Equipment

Land and Buildings have been revalued by a professionally qualified person in year 2006. Lands which were not accounted at the time of revaluation have been valued and accounted using at rates prevailed at the time of acquisition of lands.

The class of motor vehicle has been revalued during the year 2020 and 2021 by the member of profession in government valuation department. Revaluation surplus arising from

the revalued vehicles has been transferred to revaluation reserve and included in the accumulated fund and reserves in the statement of financial performance.

(d) Depreciation

Depreciation is recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on a Straight –Line basis over the estimated useful life of Property, Plant and Equipment items from the date that they were made available for use . Lands are not depreciated.

Depreciation of an assets begin from the month when it is available for use and ceases at the month that the asset is de-recognized or fully depreciated. Depreciation on Property, Plant and Equipment purchased through project , research grant and restricted funds are charged to the Statement of Financial Performance.

The cost of fully depreciated assets which are recognized based on the cost modal as per the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards (SLPSAS) 07 , as of 31st December 2021 amounted Rs.1,322 Mn

(e) De recognition

An item of Property, Plant and Equipment is derecognized upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on de recognition of the asset except motor vehicle is calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount and included in the Statement of Financial Performance in the year, the asset is derecognized.

2.1.2 Finance Lease

Leases are classified as finance leases whenever the terms of the lease transfer substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership to the lessee. During the year 2020, Financial lease obligations for the Lease of Ashok Leyland bus (NC-4780) & Toyota Camry car (CAP-7905) fully settled and ownership of the leased assets were transferred to the University . At the yearend date there were no any Capital obligations arising from lease arrangements.

2.1.3 Work- in- Progress & Rehabilitation

Capital work-in-progress & rehabilitation is stated at cost. These are expenses of a capital nature directly incurred in the construction & improvement of Property, Plant and Equipment which are awaiting for the capitalization. Capital work-in-progress &

rehabilitation expenditure are transferred to the relevant asset category in Property Plant and Equipment, when the full cost is reliably measured and when the asset is available for use. Capital expenses incurred during the year which are not satisfied the recognition criteria as at the date of the Statement of Financial Position are shown as Capital Work-in-Progress and Rehabilitation.

2.1.4 Intangible Assets

Intangible assets are recognized when it is probable that future economic benefits or service potential that are attributable to the asset will flow to the university and the cost of the intangible asset can be measured reliably.

All intangible assets acquired separately are initially measured at cost. Subsequently it will be carried at its cost less any accumulated amortization under cost model in accordance with the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 20 (SLPSAS). The cost of intangible assets acquired in a non-exchange transaction is their fair value at the date of the exchange.

All intangible assets with finite useful lives are amortized on straight line basis over its estimated useful life and charged to the statement of Financial performance as follows

,

(a) Computer software

Acquired computer software licenses are capitalized on the basis of the costs incurred to acquire and bring to use. These costs are amortized over their estimated useful life of five (5) years on straight line basis .

(b) Human Capital development & Quality Assurance expenses

As University has insufficient control over the expected future economic benefits arising from human capital development and quality assurance cost for these items to meet the definition of an intangible asset. All the capital nature expenditure incurred for the human capital development and quality assurance is recognized as an expense when incurred and charged to Statement of Financial Performance.

(c) Internally Generated intangible assets Research Expenses

As per the SLPSA 20 , No intangible assets arising from research phase shall be recognized and Expenditure on research shall be recognized as an expenses when it is incurred . Accordingly all the expenditure incurred for the research expenses recognized as an expenses and charged to the statement of financial performance.

(d) Development Expenses

All internally developed intangible assets are recognized only if the recondition criteria are met in accordance with the SLPSAS 20 section 55 .

2.1.5 Investments

Investment in Fixed deposits & Saving relating are stated at cost and interest accrued on short term investment is accounted as a receivable in the financial statement and Interest income relating to the restricted funds such as endowment funds , designated funds

and projects are recognized on the realization and credited to the relevant restricted fund account and included in statement of financial position .

2.2 Inventories

2.2.1 Inventories (Stocks)

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realizable value after making due adjustment for obsolete items and the cost was determined based on First In First Out (FIFO) method. The cost includes expenditure incurred in acquiring the inventories and bringing them to their existing location and condition. The inventories of the university include stationery items , consumables , maintenance stocks and medical stocks .

2.2.2 Live Stock

Live Stock consists living animals held for the agricultural activity managed by the Farm of Faculty of Agriculture. Live stock are measured on initial recognition and each reporting date at its fair value less cost to sell. The fair value of the livestock was determined based on the published rates of National Livestock Development board (NLBD) and prevailing market prices of the similar assets. A gain or loss arising on recognition of Live stock at its fair value and changes in fair value are included in surplus or deficit for the period in which it arises as per the provision of SLPSAS 18.

2.2.3 Yield Stock

Yield stock consist harvested product of the Agriculture farm . Valuation of Yield stock

was based on the market price at the date of verification.

2.3 Cash and Cash Equivalentents

Cash and cash equivalentents comprise cash in hand , cash in current account ,call deposits and bank borrowings that are payable on demand . However, restricted cash deposits such as scholarship and gold medal deposits are not recognized as a part of cash and cash equivalentents for the purpose preparation of cash flow statement.

2.4 Liabilities & Provisions

2.4.1 Liabilities

All known liabilities as at the date of statement of financial position are included in the financial statements and obligations payable on demand or within one year of the date of statement of financial position are treated as current liabilities in the statement of financial position. Liabilities payable after one year from the date of statement of financial position are treated as non-current liabilities in the statement of financial position.

2.4.2 Provisions

A provision is recognized in the Statement of Financial Position, when the University has an obligation as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of assets will be required to settle the obligation and the obligation can be measured reliably.

2.4.3 Capital Commitments and Contingencies

Contingencies are possible assets or obligation that arise from past event and would be confirmed only on the occurrence or non-occurrence of uncertain future events, which are beyond the Universities control. University does not recognize contingent liabilities and capital commitments, but discloses details of any contingencies in the notes to the financial statements, unless the possibility of an outflow or inflow of resources embodying economic benefits or service potential is remote.

2.4.4 Defined Benefit Plan - Retiring Gratuity

Defined benefit plan is a post-employment benefit plan, other than a defined contribution plan. Accordingly, Provision for gratuity was made in accordance with Gratuity Act No.12 of 1983. The gratuity liability is not externally funded and not actuarially valued. As per the University Grant Commission circular No.05/0219 dated on 04th June 2019, Academic allowance and MCA (Monthly compensatory allowance) paid for the staff are considered for the Gratuity calculation in terms of the Gratuity act no.12 of 1983 with effect from 01st June 2019.

2.4.5 Defined Contribution Plan – University Provident Fund, Employees’ Trust Fund and Pension scheme.

A defined contribution plan is a post-employment plan under which an entity pays fixed contribution into a separate entity and will have no legal or constructive obligation to pay a further amount. Obligations for contributions to defined contribution plans are recognized as an expense in the statement of financial performance as and when they are due.

Employees are eligible for ‘University provident Fund Contributions, Employees Trust Fund Contributions and University Pension Fund in line with respective statutes and regulations. These are recognized as an expense in the Statement of Financial Performance as incurred. The university contributes 8% , 3% and 7% of gross emoluments of the employees to University ‘Provident Fund and Employees’ Trust Fund and University pension fund respectively.

2.5 Restricted funds and Grants

Where the grants/donations are received for use in an identified project or activity, such funds are held in a restricted fund account and, unutilized funds are held in their respective fund accounts and included under

accumulated fund and reserves in the statement of financial position until such time as they are required. Where expenditure of such approved grant exceeds the income received and if there is certainty that the balance will be received, such amounts are recognized as receivables in the statement of financial position.

2.6 Designated Funds

Any fund designated by the University for a specific purpose with the approval of Council are identified as a Designated Funds. Unutilized funds are held in their respective fund accounts and included under accumulated fund and reserves in the statement of financial position until such time as they are required.

2.8 Accelerating Higher Education Expansion And Development (AHEAD) Grant

Accelerating Higher Education Expansion and Development (AHEAD) is a World Bank funded project for Sri Lankan government to support the higher education sector with the objectives of expanding enrolment in priority disciplines, improve the quality of degree programs, and promote research and innovation in the higher education sector. Ministry of Education is the implementing agency of this project. University Grant Commission and Operations Monitoring and Support Team (OMST) are coordinate and support for the project activities of the universities.

Since the above project is operated separately through Operational Technical Secretariat office (OTS) of the University of Ruhuna, Grant receipt and expenses of the AHEAD operations have not been included in the financial statement. However capital assets acquired through this grant including Property Plant & Equipment, completed construction works and human capital development expenditure are recognized as revenue from non-exchange transaction in accordance with SLPSAS 11 in the statement of Financial performance and accumulated under capital surplus/ (deficit) in the statement of financial position.

During the period of 2018 to 2021, University of Ruhuna has been awarded several grants under AHEAD Project, and Summary of the financial performance of the each sub programmes for the year ended is given below,

2.7 Endowment funds

Where assets are received as an endowment, only the income earned from such assets may be recognized and used as income. Investment income and other gains realized from such endowment investments are allocated to the appropriate funds, unless the relevant agreement or minute provides otherwise.

Endowment funds such as gold medal and scholarships held under the deposits were reclassified and presented under the Endowment funds in the Statement of Financial Position under accumulated funds and reserves.

2.9 Revenue Recognition

Revenue comprises gross inflows of economic benefits or service potential received and receivable by University during the year and

represents an increase in net assets/equity.

University recognizes revenue following the established criteria of SLPSAS 10 (Revenue

from Exchange Transactions) and SPSAS 11 (Revenue from Non Exchange Transactions).

2.9.1 Revenue from Exchange transaction

(a) Undergraduate & other internal income

All the income derived from the undergraduate degree programmes and other internal income are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on the cash basis.

(b) Income generated from self-financing activities

Self-financing activities ranging from consultancy, postgraduate taught courses, external degree programmes, Testing are conducted on cost recovery and non – profit basis. The income, expenditure and contribution for development votes of self financing activities have been disclosed under note 26 of the statement of financial performance.

Income of the Self financing activities recognized to the extent of the expenditure incurred for the period and future expenditures and contribution to the development votes are shown under the deferred income in the statement of financial position.

(c) Interest Income

Interest income received for the period is recorded as exchange revenue in the statement of financial performance except for the investment income earned from the externally restricted funds , designated funds and endowments funds . When the

investment income earned from those funds are in excess over the expenditure, the excess is recorded as a direct increase in relevant fund and included in the statement of financial position under accumulated reserves and grants.

Interest on investment of gold medal and scholarship funds are accounted on cash basis if not matured during the accounting period.

(d) Rent Income

Rental income arising from renting out university assets is accounted for on a straight-line basis over the rental terms and included in revenue.

(e) Income from Agriculture Farm

Income and expenditure related to the Mapalana agriculture farm is separately recognized in the financial statement under note 27 .

2.9.2 Revenue from Non Exchange transactions.

Non-exchange transactions are those where the university receives value from another entity (e.g. cash or other assets) without giving approximately equal value in exchange.

Inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions, other than services in-kind, that meet the definition of an asset are recognized as an asset only when:

- It is probable that the University will receive an inflow of economic benefits or service potential; and
- The fair value of can be measured reliably.

Inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions that are recognized as assets are recognized as non-exchange revenue, to the extent that a liability is not recognized in respect to the same inflow.

The following are the specific recognition criteria in relation to the University non-exchange transactions.

(a) Government Grant / Transfers

Assets and revenue arising from government grants are recognized in the period in which the transfer arrangement becomes binding at the fair value. Where a transfer is subject to conditions and when there is a resulting present obligation as a result of the non-exchange transaction, University recognizes a liability until the conditions is fulfilled.

Assets and revenue arising from government grants are measured at the fair value as at the date of recognition. Monetary assets are measured at their nominal value.

(b) Recurrent Grant

Government grants received for the recurrent nature expenditures are recognized in the statement of financial performance under Non exchange transactions.

The government grants of Rs. 4,308 Mn was received as recurrent grant for the year 2021.

(c) Capital Block Grant and other Transfers

Government Grants and other capital transfers received for the capital expenditure are recognized in the statement of financial performance in accordance with the requirement of SLPSAS 11, Revenue from Non exchange transactions with effect from the financial year 2020. Capital surplus / (deficit) arising from the capital transactions are accumulated under the Accumulated Fund – Capital in the statement of financial statement.

2.9.3 Reclassification to Accumulated - fund Capital

University adopt and applied SLPSAS 11 – Revenue from Non Exchange transaction standard with effect from the year 2020 prospectively.

To harmonize the presentation of financial statements, comparative figures in relation to spent capital grant, Capital grant unspent, gift and donations were reclassified in to “Accumulated surplus capital” in the statement of financial position accordance with the SLPSAS 11 and guidance issued by the APFASL.

2.9.4 Gifts, Donations and Goods in

Kind received

Gifts, donations are voluntary transfers of assets including cash or other monetary assets and goods in-kind that the University receives which are free from stipulations.

Gifts and donations and goods in kind received are recognized as non-exchange revenue at its fair value when it is probable that the future economic benefits or service potential will flow to the University, and the fair value of the assets can be measured reliably.

During the year 2021 , Sri Lanka Invention commission has donated 19.20 Mn worth of assets for the implementation of Southern Technology Incubation Center for the University of Ruhuna and fair value recognized under Revenue from Non exchange transaction in the Statement of Financial Performance. In addition to that following gift and donations were received during the year.

2.10 Expenditure recognition

The expenditure has been analyzed by Program/project/object wise and analysis was classified under different expenditure headings based on UGC guidelines to comply with the Common Reporting Format during the period of which they are incurred. All expenses incurred in respect of undergraduate education have been recognized on accrual basis and charged to the Statement of Financial Performance.

2.11 Statement of Cash Flows

The Statement of Cash Flows has been prepared in accordance with SLPSAS 02 Cash Flow Statement under the indirect method.

2.12 Events after the reporting period

The materiality of events occurring after the reporting period has been considered and appropriate adjustments, wherever necessary, have been made in the accounts

2.13 Foreign Currency Transaction

Transaction currencies other than Sri Lankan rupees are converted in to Sri Lankan rupees at rates which approximate the actual rates at the transaction date.

2.14 Inter division's transaction

Financial statement has been prepared by eliminating the Interdivision transactions and outstanding balances. Following interdivision balances are eliminated, Rs.40 Mn Payable balance to the Distance & Continuing Education Unit (DCEU) and receivable amounts were eliminated in the statement of Financial Performance.

2.15 Related Party Transaction

The key management personal of the University are the members of the University Council & the members of the senior management personal. The University Council is the executive body and governing authority of the University which consist of the Vice-Chancellor, Deputy Vice-Chancellor, the Deans of the faculties, two members elected by the Senate and the external members appointed by the University Grant Commission.

There is no any contracts entered between the university and any member of the key management personal who is having direct or indirect interest and there is no any Related-party transactions, including sales, purchases, loans, transfers, leasing arrangements , guarantees , amount receivable from or payable to related parties other than the employee remuneration and allowances for services provided during the period.

2.16 Comparison of Budget and Actual Amounts

Budget and accounting basis is differ. Budgets to the university is approved cash basis annually. Although University financial statement covers all the financial activities of the university, budgets are approved only for the government grant. The Statement of Comparison of Budget and Actual amounts compares the final budget to actual amounts calculated on the same basis as the corresponding budgetary amounts.

The report of the Auditor General in terms of section 12 of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 on the financial statements of the University of Ruhuna for the year ended 31 December 2021 and for other legal and regulatory requirements.

1. Financial Statements

1.1 Qualified Opinion

The audit of financial statements of the University of Ruhuna for the year ended 31 December 2021 comprising the statement of Financial Position as at 31 December 2021 and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended and the summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154(1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read in conjunction with the provisions of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 and the Finance Act No.38 of 1971. My report will be tabled in the Parliament in due course, in terms of sub section 154 (6) of the Constitution.

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matters described in the section on qualified opinion in my report, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the University of Ruhuna as at 31 December 2021 and its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

1.2 Basis for the Qualified Opinion

- (a) Although all the income should be included into the surplus or deficit, according to paragraph 99 of Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 1, salary surcharges, bonds recovery values and fixed deposit interest income total amounting to Rs.17,202,390 were not recognized as income during the year under review and out of that, a sum of Rs. 15,869,102 had been credited to the bond and breach of contract fund account and a sum of Rs.1,333,288 had been credited to the Agrahara insurance fund account. As such, surplus of the year under review and accumulated fund and reserves as on 31 December 2021 were understated and overstated by Rs.17,202,390 respectively.
- (b) Since useful life time of the non-current assets had not been reviewed annually in terms of Paragraph 65 of the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 07, eight vehicles costing Rs. 6,880,250 were further in use despite being fully depreciated. As such, action had not been taken to revise the said estimated error in the financial statements in terms of Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 03.
- (c) Deferred income shown under current liabilities as at 31 December 2021 was Rs.244,076,700 and due to the non-amortization of income to be recognized for each year, an amount of Rs.20,544,858 of that amount remained unchanged for many years.

- (d) The agreements entered into with the relevant communication companies were not made available to the audit to verify the accuracy of the receivable rent of Rs. 3m930,000 for the communication towers installed in Hapugala Engineering Faculty, in Wellamadama premises of the university and in the Mapalana Agriculture Faculty.

I carried out the audit in compliance with the Sri Lanka Auditing Standards (SLAS). My responsibility under these standards has been further described in the section entitled 'Auditor's responsibility in auditing the financial statements. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified opinion.

1.3 Responsibility of the Management for Financial Statements and governing partners

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards and for such internal control as the management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatements, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing financial statements, it is the responsibility of the management to decide the sustainability of the University as a going concern and it is also the responsibility of the management to keep accounts on the basis of going concern and disclose matters relevant to the University as a going concern unless the management intends to liquidate the university or takes action to suspend its operations in the absence of any other alternative.

The responsibility concerning the financial reporting process of the University is borne by the governing parties.

In terms of Sub Section 16(1) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, the University shall maintain proper books and records of all its income, expenditure, assets and liabilities, to enable annual and periodic financial statements to be prepared in respect of the University.

1.4 Auditor's responsibility regarding financial statements

My objective is to give reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement whether due to fraud or error and to issue auditor's report that includes my opinion. The reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted with in accordance with the Sri Lanka Accounting Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

I have conducted the audit in accordance with the Sri Lanka Accounting Standards maintaining professional judgment and professional scepticism. The auditor also –

- Identifies and assesses risks of material misstatements of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, designs and performs audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtains audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for the auditor's opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

- Obtains an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the University's internal control.
- Evaluates the appropriateness of the accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the management.
- Concludes on the appropriateness of the use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the University's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my audit report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. However, future events or conditions may cause the entity to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluates the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

I have communicated with those charged with governance regarding, the significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I have identified during the audit.

2. Report on other legal and regulatory requirements

- 2.1 Special provisions are included in respect of the following requirements in the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018.
- 2.1.1 In terms of the requirements of section 12 (a) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, other than the effects of the matters described in the section on qualified opinion, I obtained all information and explanations required for the audit and as far as it appears from my inspection, the University had maintained proper financial reports.
- 2.1.2 In terms of the requirement indicated in Section 6(1)(d) (iii) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2008, the financial statements presented by the university are consistent with the preceding year.
- 2.1.3 In terms of the requirement of Section 6(1)(d) (iv) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2008, the recommendations made by me in the previous year have been included in the financial statements.
- 2.2 On the basis of the procedures followed and evidence obtained and being restricted within the material matters, nothing that warrants the making of the following statements did not come to my attention.
- 2.2.1 In terms of the requirement of section 12 (d) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, whether any member of the governing body of the Ruhuna University has any interest, direct or otherwise, outside normal business status in any contract entered into by the University.
- 2.2.2 In terms of the requirement of Section 12(f) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, whether the Ruhuna University has or has not complied with any applicable written law or other general or special directions issued by the governing council of the University, except for the following observations.

- (a) 2.2.4 In terms of the requirement indicated in Section 12(g) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, that the resources of the University had not been procured and utilized economically, efficiently and effectively within the time frames and in compliance with the applicable laws
- (b) Although the rental percentages had been increased with effect from January 2020 as per the decision taken at the 413th Governing Council meeting dated 17 June 2021, the rental arrears amounted to Rs.3,498,300 for the 22 months from January 2020 to October 2021 to be collected from the rented residencies in the Wellamadama premises had not been recovered even by 31 December 2021.
- (c) The estimated cost of the improvement of the playground and the construction of the sport pavilion in the Wellamadama premises was Rs.341.60 million and, although the construction works had not been started even 21 December 2021, a total amount of Rs. 529,326 had been incurred as a sum of Rs.200,750 for soil testing in the construction area, a sum of Rs.85,000 as procurement committee allowances, and a sum of Rs.243,576 as bid preparation allowances in the years 2017 and 2018.
- (d) Although an amount of Rs.1,898,164 had been spent as consultancy services and technical evaluation committee allowances in the year 2020 for the major renovation work of the administrative building of the Wellamadama premises of which the estimated cost was Rs.400.42 million, the renovation work had not been started even by 21 December 2021.
- (e) Due to the purchase of stocks exceeding the requirement, 161 liters of expired paint costing Rs.99,092 were kept in the Wellamadama maintenance stores as at 23 June 2022.
- (f) A surcharge of Rs. 53,137 had been paid due to nonpayment of electricity bills of the Wellamadama premises and its hostels within the stipulated time for the year under review. Arrangement had not been made to identify the responsible parties and to take necessary action in this regard.
- (g) A delay charge of Rs.10,000,000 collected from the suppliers in previous years had been used for bolstering the Agrahara insurance fund account established for the university staff.
