# Ranaviru Seva Authority



The Ranaviru Seva Authority was established by Parliament Act No. 54 of 1999 to promote the welfare of disabled war heroes, their next of kin, and the next of kin of war heroes declared missing in action and who sacrificed their lives and limbs for the motherland during the humanitarian operation.

Being the only statutory body established for the welfare of war heroes, the Ranaviru Seva Authority has fulfilled its mission for over two decades as the apex body which musters the war hero community spread across the country and mediates their welfare matters.

The Authority monitors the requirements of the war hero community through the network of war hero forums and provides them with the necessary advice, financial assistance, and credit facilities.

During the last two decades, the Ranaviru Seva Authority was entrusted with the national task of empowering the war hero community, which had faced various mental stress conditions in post-war catastrophes as victims of the brutal war that lasted for over three decades. By transforming the said responsibility into a noble service, the Ranaviru Seva Authority was able to carry out many welfare activities in a successful manner by the end of 2022.

Amidst the crises in the country, the Ranaviru Seva Authority was able to give due respect to the war heroes providing quality service to the war hero community in the past 21 years and expects to make every endeavor to accomplish its mission in the future. Further, the Ranaviru Seva Authority has thus far stamped its mark in the hearts of war heroes as an exceptional state institution that seeks out and provides quick solutions to the needs of the war hero community.

- D. Provision of access to education and higher education through scholarships and other forms of assistance to
  - i. Personnel of the Armed Forces and Police Force who have become disabled in action; and
  - ii. Dependents of personnel of the Armed Forces and Police Force who have been killed or declared missing in action.
  
- E. Provision of assistance to secure gainful employment to
  - i. Personnel of the Armed Forces and Police Force who have become disabled in action; and
  - ii. Dependents of personnel of the Armed Forces and Police Force who have been killed or declared missing in action.
  
- F. Establishment of industrial, agricultural or commercial ventures with a view to providing employment to personnel of the Armed Forces and Police Force who have become disabled in action; and
  
- G. Doing such other acts and things as may be necessary or conducive to the discharge of the functions of the Authority.

## Message from the Chairman of the Ranaviru Seva Authority



The Ranaviru Seva Authority was established by Parliament Act No. 54 of 1999 to promote the welfare of war heroes sent on retirement due to medical grounds, their next of kin, and the next of kin of war heroes who sacrificed their lives and limbs for the sovereignty and dignity of the country.

Amidst many obstacles encountered in 2022, the Ranaviru Seva Authority, the statutory body established for the welfare of war heroes, made an enormous effort to provide a quality and efficient service to the war hero community.

Due to the prevailing situation in the country at that time, the General Treasury has not made provision to the Ranaviru Seva Authority for the year 2022. However, the year 2022 can be identified as a year when the reserves belonging to the Ranaviru Seva Authority and income received by sales of lotteries have been utilized to provide aftercare and other facilities to the war hero community. Due to this reason, the authority had to suspend some of the projects implemented by then and was able to resume some of the projects suspended using the contribution made by local and foreign donors.

With a view to raising funds for the implementation of welfare programmes in respect of the war hero community, a programme for selling Ranaviru flags was conducted in a due and successful manner with the active collaboration of both public and private sectors.

The authority carried out procurement activities in 2021 through the provisions allocated but did not receive the procured items due to the prevailing situation in the country. This year, the authority could obtain the supportive equipment to be received, and the war heroes were handed over such devices at their residences.

Under the inadequate budgetary provisions, the Ranaviru Seva Authority has taken measures to continue the 'Mapiya Surakum' Programme, 'Virusahana' Housing Loan Project, Self-Employment Loan Project, etc. By way of enhancing the practical knowledge of agriculture and organic production, we made the war hero community aware of the possibilities of becoming a successful entrepreneur in this field in the year 2022.

The Ranaviru Seva Authority was able to provide welfare facilities to the war hero community continuously amidst the various challenges encountered during the year 2022. On behalf of the Board of Management of the Ranaviru Seva Authority, I avail myself of this opportunity to convey my sincere gratitude to the Secretary to the Ministry of Defence and its staff and the staff of the Ranaviru Seva Authority for all unstinted assistance extended towards the successful accomplishment of our mission.

## DISABLED WAR HERO REHABILITATION AND AFTERCARE

### 1.1. Introduction

The primary role of the Ranaviru Seva Authority is the execution of initiatives for the rehabilitation and aftercare of war heroes rendered disabled in service to the nation and retired on medical grounds. Pertinent projects are administered to empower the disabled war heroes physically, mentally and socially, and motivate and socialize them to maintain a high standard of living.

### 1.2. Programme on Provision of Assistive Devices to Disabled War Heroes

Assistive devices are used in daily activities to enhance the remaining functional capacity of war heroes who became disabled in operations. The technologically high quality of the equipment that is currently used to overcome the disabled condition of the war heroes helps to maintain the health of the war hero at a satisfactory level.

Under this project, the disabled war heroes are provided with prosthetic limbs, prosthetic arms, wheelchairs, forearm crutches, elbow crutches, spectacles, clinical shoes, hearing aids, white canes, walking canes, commodes, roho cushion covers, air mattresses, gel socks, gel liners, electric tricycles and other assistive devices with a view to enhancing their functional capacity.

The disabled war heroes have been housed at their residences under the community rehabilitation system and these devices are provided with them as assistance to overcome the difficulties that arise in their daily routines. The assistive devices can be considered not only technical devices but also parts of the war hero's body. Accordingly, the aim of the project is to prevent disabled war heroes from potential side effects caused by interruptions in the continuous receipt of required assistive devices and the use of damaged and low-quality assistive devices by way of providing assistive devices.

This project will directly empower the war hero physically and mentally and this will indirectly have a positive effect on the family members of the war heroes. Through this, it is aimed to develop relations between the war heroes and the community.

As the financial provision was not allocated for the purchase of assistive devices for the war heroes for the year 2022, the assistive devices purchased in the year 2021 were distributed to the war heroes in the year 2022.

The pandemic situation in the country negatively affected the production of these assistive devices. Shortage of raw materials required for manufacturing devices, transportation problems due to the fuel crisis, a fall in imports due to rapid increase in the prices of transportation charges and tariff charges for importing assistive devices, and the increase in the prices of devices are the challenges encountered in the execution of the project.

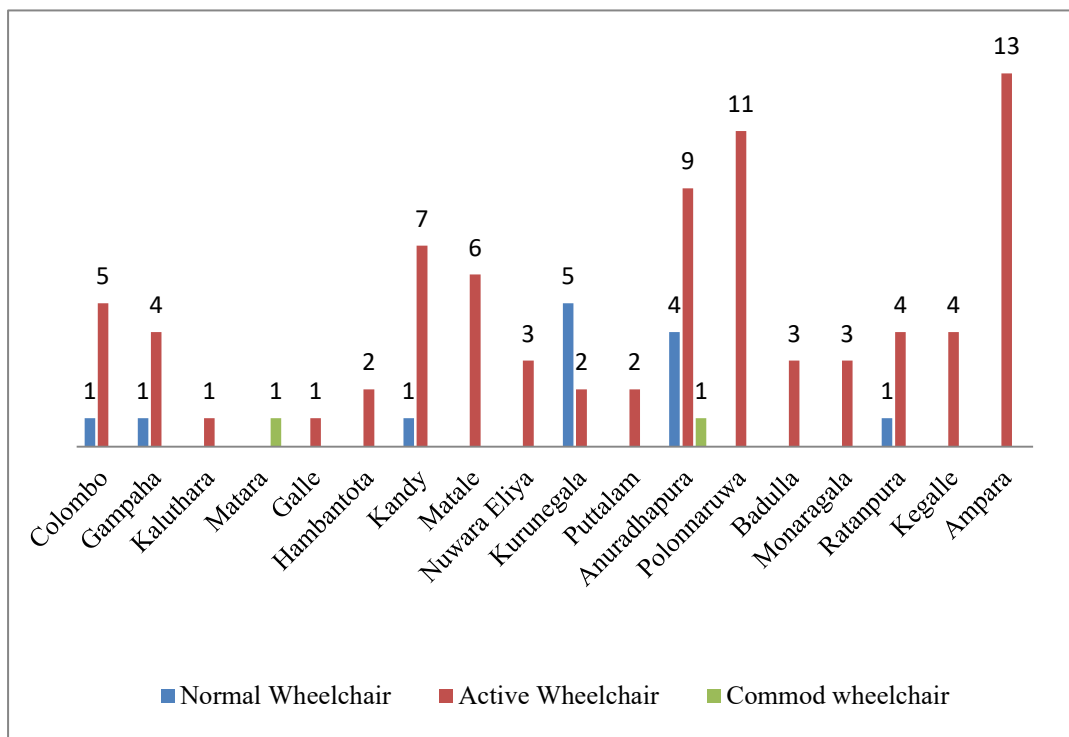
The devices purchased from the financial provision allocated by the Treasury to the Ranaviru Seva Authority in 2021, were distributed to the war heroes in 2022.

### 1.2.1. Provision of Wheelchairs

Out of the wheelchairs purchased in 2021 no. of 329 normal wheelchairs and no. of 23 commode wheelchairs were given to war heroes based on the criteria for providing assistive devices for the disabled.

No. of 13 ordinary wheelchairs, no. of 2 commode wheelchairs and no. of 80 motivation wheelchairs, purchased in 2021, were distributed to the war heroes considering the condition of the wheelchairs (dilapidated, worn-out, damage, corroded) currently used and as well as medical urgencies (surgeries, accidents and physical impairment)

#### Distribution of Wheelchair District Wise



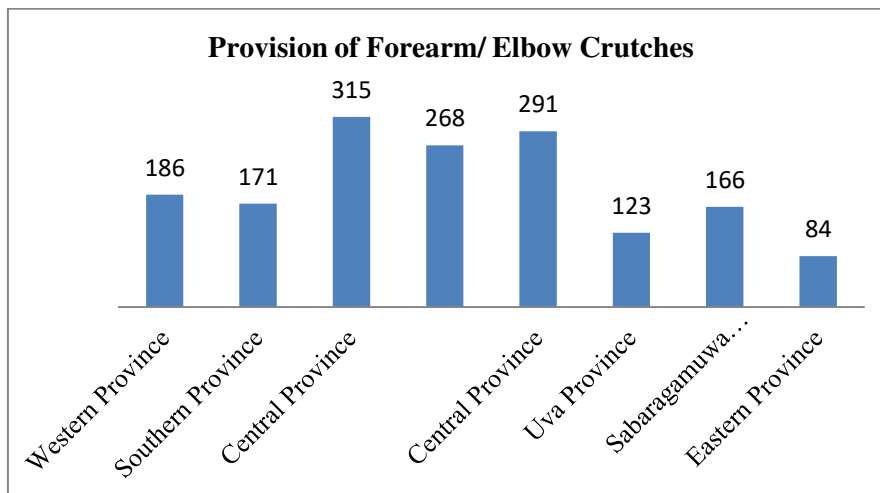


Inspecting the quality of active wheelchairs and developing distribution plans

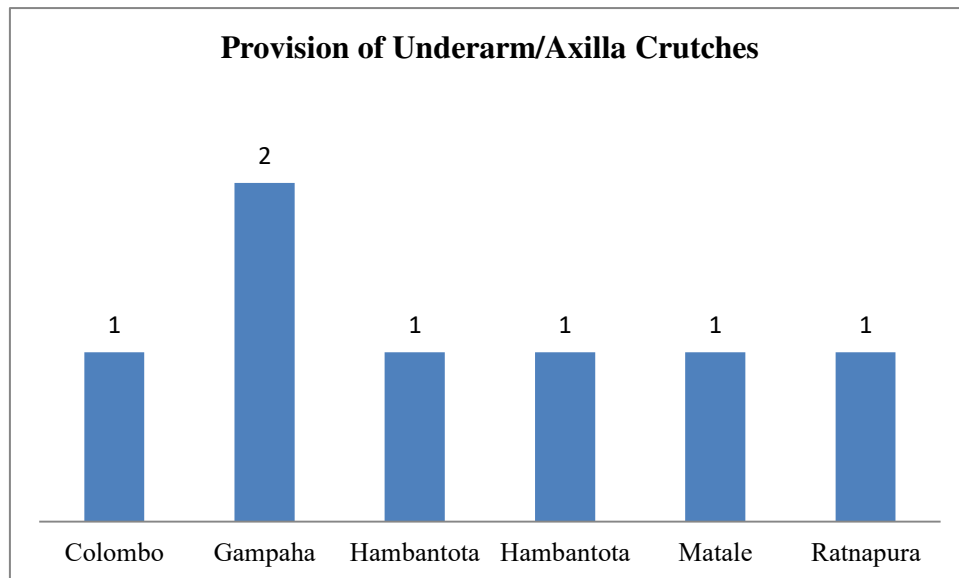

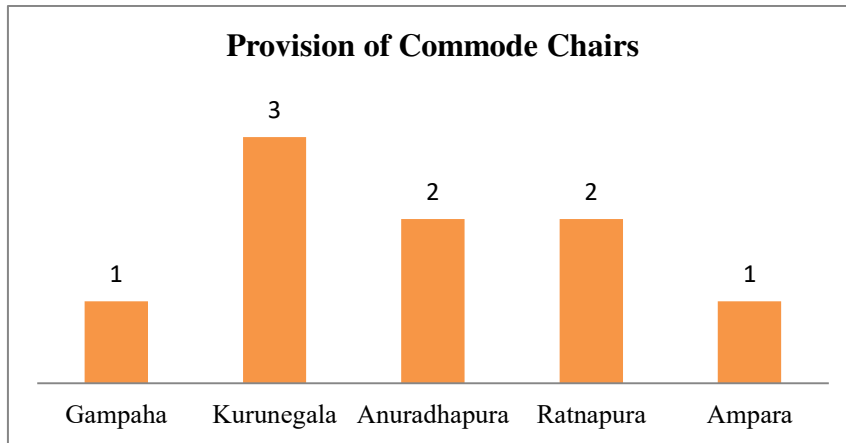

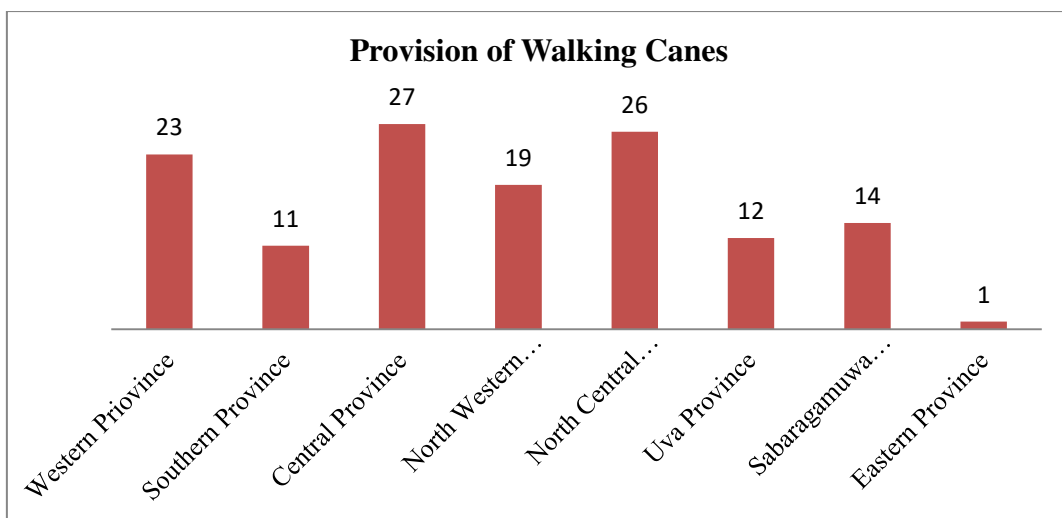

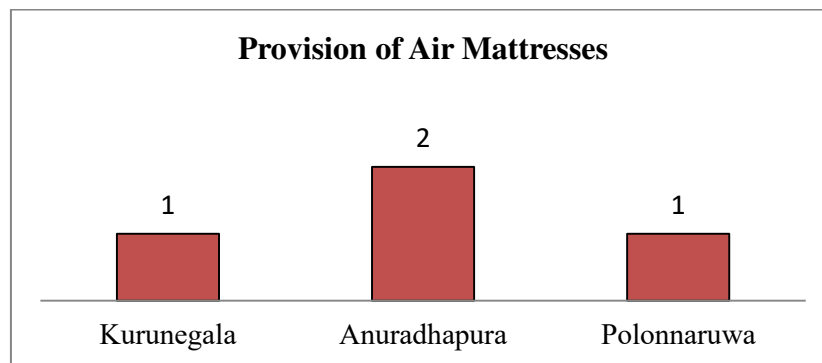

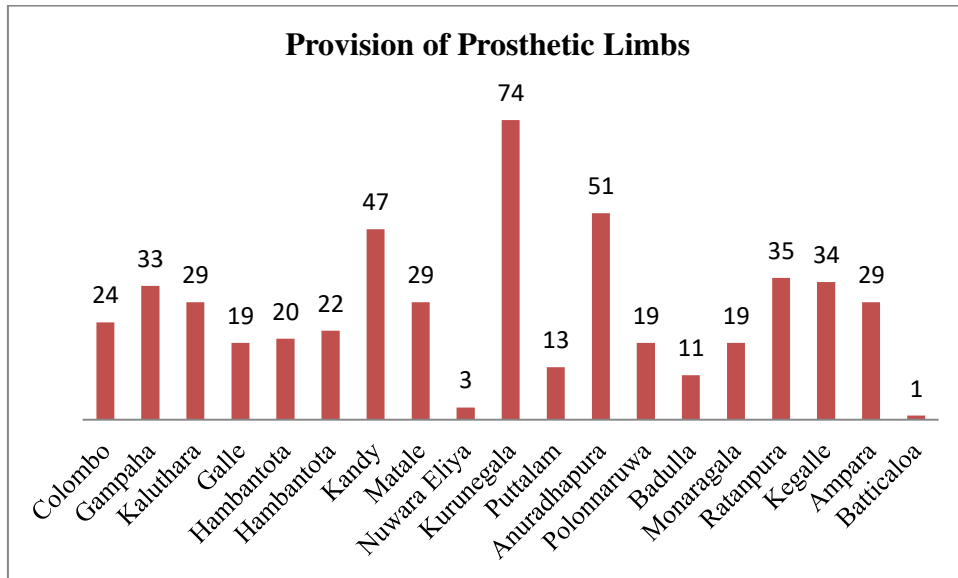

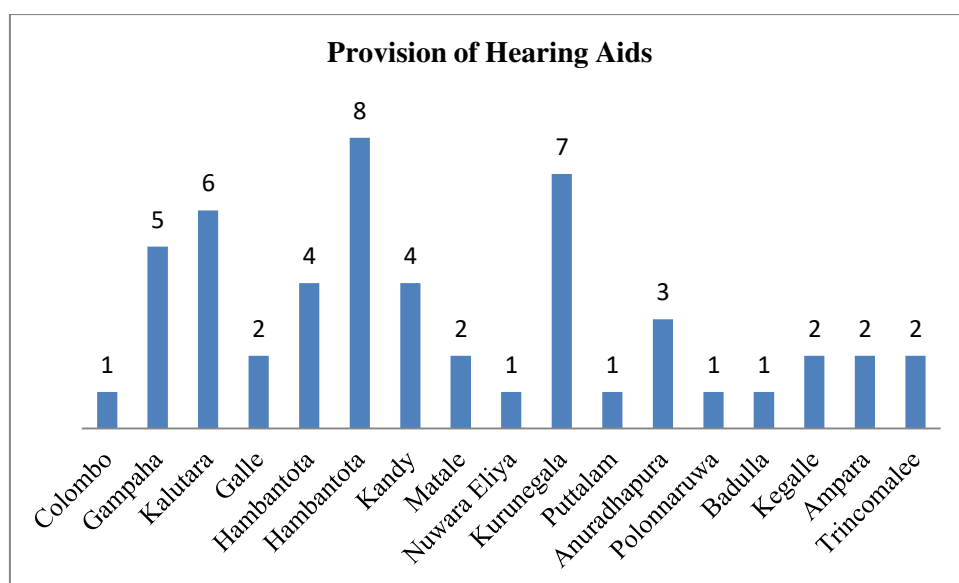

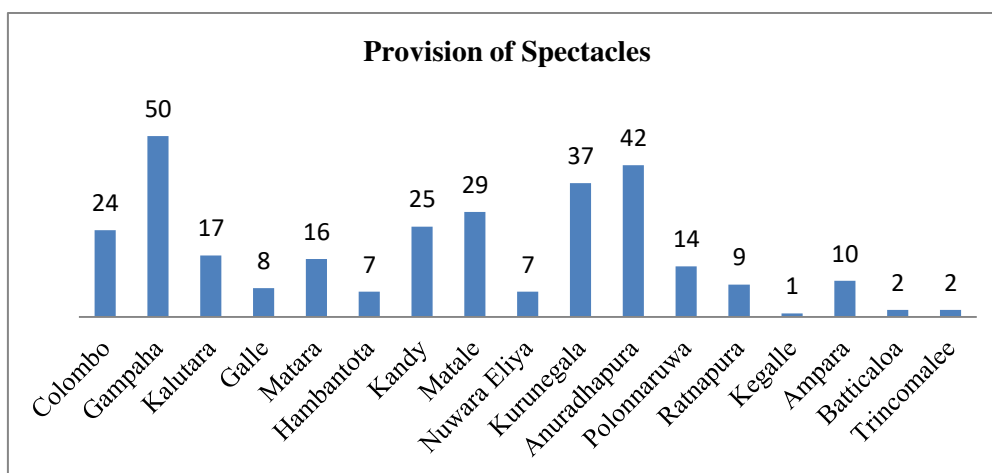

No. of 300 war heroes were provided with spectacles incurring Rs. 1.37 million rupees from financial provision allocated for the year 2021.

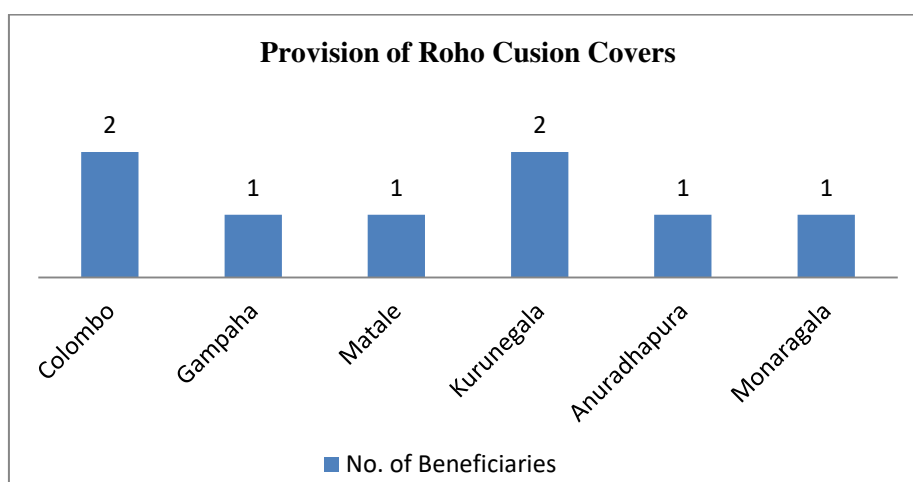

### 1.3. Provision of Electric Tricycles Utilizing Donations Received

The Chairman has focused attention on exploring the possibilities of using new rehabilitation techniques beyond the traditional rehabilitation systems in view to creating mobility opportunities for disabled war heroes to participate in various activities and also overcome impediments in social participation. No. of 5 disabled war heroes have been provided with electric tricycles in 2021 under Phase 1 as per the Chairman’s concept for providing such a facility.

As an extension of that project, Mr. Prasad Polwatta, the author of the book "32 Immortal Soldiers" who is a veteran writer and banker, gave a financial sponsorship for the provision of a modern electric motorcycle to a war hero under his welfare activities.

Accordingly, an electric motorcycle was donated to the war hero, GAS Chaturanga of Higurakgoda Ranaviru Forum in Polonnaruwa district under the patronage of Mr. Prasad Polwatta and his family members.



## 1.4. Provision of Prosthetic Limbs and Arms under Indo-Sri Lanka Friendship

In line with the 74th Independence Day of Sri Lanka, the Bhagwan Mahaveer Sahayat Samiti in Jaipur conducted a 37-Day Artificial Limbs and Arms Manufacturing Field Workshop in the intervention of the High Commission of India under the patronage of the Indian Government with the participation of the State Minister to the Ministry of Defence, Mr. Chamal Rajapakse, and the Indian High Commissioner to Sri Lanka, Mr. Gopal Bagley on 02nd February 2022 at Ranaviru Sevana in Ragama for the betterment of the disabled war heroes in the Tri-Forces and Sri Lanka Police and their next of kin.

With the coordination of the Ranaviru Seva Authority, this workshop was conducted at the Ranaviru Sewana, the Rehabilitation Center of Sri Lanka Army, Ragama for 37 days with the assistance of the Tri-Forces, Police and Civil Security Department under the instructions and guidance of the Ministry of Defence. No. of 499 prosthetic limbs and no. of 10 prosthetic hands were fabricated for 494 war heroes of the Tri-Forces and police and their next of kin through these field workshops.

# PROGRAMME ON DEVELOPMENT OF RESIDENCE SANITARY FACILITIES OF PERMANENTLY DISABLED WAR HEROES

### 2.1. Introduction

Providing necessary facilities for the physical and mental empowerment of war heroes who sacrificed their body parts in operations is one of the key functions which lie with the Ranaviru Seva Authority.

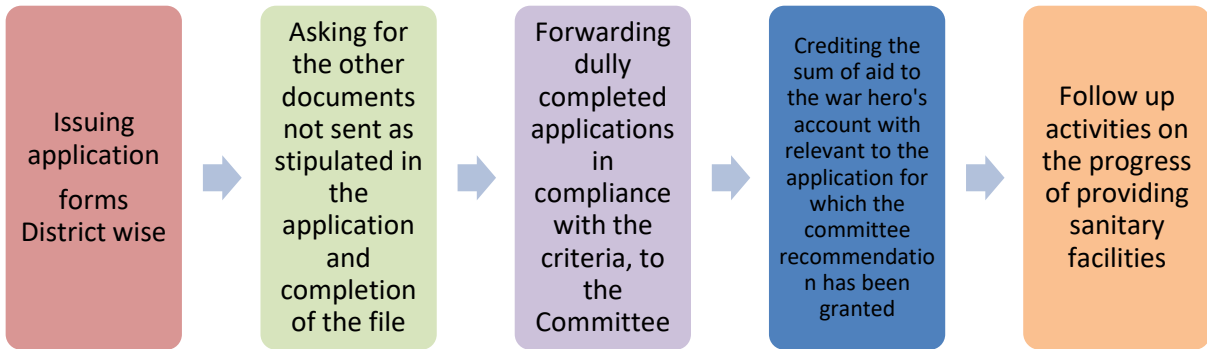
Bathrooms at residences of permanently disabled war heroes are seldom remodeled to 'accessible' standards. This lag in refurbishment was mainly identified during field visits. Daily use of inaccessible/ordinary bathrooms creates a negative impact on the physical condition of the disabled war hero. Accordingly, the main objective of this project is to quickly identify the existing needs of disabled war heroes and build a wheelchair-accessible bathroom with a handrail to include required facilities in a manner that satisfy their requirements.

Financial assistance is thus provided under this project for constructing accessible bathrooms with required features for the improvement of sanitary facilities for disabled war heroes.

Herein, a sum of Rs. 100,000.00 is granted as financial aid to each war hero who has become disabled in operations for the construction of a bathroom with a commode and other components to upgrade their existing sanitary facilities, and Rs. 50,000/= for alterations of the existing facility to each war hero who has completed 10 years after having obtained the respective financial aid previously from the Ranaviru Seva Authority.

Financial provisions have not been allocated in the year 2022 for the provision of sanitary aid. No. of 195 disabled war heroes requested sanitary aid in the year 2022. It is observed that the functional capacity of the disabled war heroes has been reduced to some extent due to reasons such as aging, suffering from various non-communicable diseases and suffering accidents, etc., when comparing the same with the capacity they had at the time of retirement. These war heroes should be identified and these facilities should be provided immediately. Due to the non-availability of financial provision for the provision of financial assistance, this project work was disrupted in the year 2022.

Anil Prasanna Jayalath, a member of the Sports Pool of the Ranaviru Seva Authority, who participated in the National Para Athletics Championships of 2022 held on 08.06.2022 at Colombo Sugathadasa Indoor Stadium, won the championship in the TF42 category by securing the first place in the 100m event.



### 3.3.3. A victory recorded by the Ranaviru Seva Authority at the Table Tennis Tournament

Corporal Abeysinghe S/483074 who participated in the qualifying match for the Asian Para Table Tennis Championships held at the Vijayabahu Infantry Regiment Indoor Stadium on 12.03.2022 won the first place in the DTT A6/8 category.



### 3.4. Other tasks carried out by the Sports Section

#### 3.4.1. Providing energy supplement and other necessities to the sportsperson, Anil Prasanna

Ranaviru Anil Prasanna Jayalath, who competed in the T42/F42 100m category representing the sports pool of the Ranaviru Seva Authority, was provided energy supplements and sports clothes at the Ranaviru Seva Authority. In line with this event, a brief discussion was also held with Mr. Anil Prasanna on his further requirements.

Major General Nandana Senadeera (Retd), Chairman of the Ranaviru Seva Authority, Major General Kithsiri Ekanayake (Retd), Director of the Ranaviru Seva Authority, Major Hinidumage Chandana, Head of the Sports Section, and the sportsperson, Mr. Anil Prasanna attended this event.

# HOUSING, INFRASTRUCTURE, WELFARE, ENTERPRISE DEVELOPMENT AND PARENT CARE CREDIT SECTION

### 4.1. ‘Virusumithuru’ Housing Project

‘Virusumithuru’ Housing Project, jointly implemented by the National Housing Development Authority under the Ministry of Housing and Construction, and the Ranaviru Seva Authority under the State Ministry of Defence, is scheduled to be implemented from 2017 to 2022. This project is being executed to fulfill the housing needs of the war heroes rendered disabled in action and retired on medical grounds, and the next of kin of war heroes who have sacrificed their lives in service to the nation.

The ‘Virusumithuru’ Housing Project has been initiated to achieve the objectives of providing a sustainable national solution through government intervention in fulfilling the housing requirements of retired war heroes disabled in action and the next of kin of war heroes of the Sri Lanka Army, Navy, Air Force, Police, and Civil Defence Force to have sacrificed their life in service to the nation as well as recognizing the services rendered by the war heroes to the nation and fulfilling the obligations of the government and the nation in return towards war hero families by way of mediating total construction of houses and completing of semi-constructed houses.

Plans are underway to complete the total construction of 450 houses and 4000 semi-constructed houses within the period of 6 years from 2017 to 2022 and the total cost of the project amounts to Rs. 3192 Million. The grant comprises a financial contribution of Rs. 1,200,000.00 and labor assistance for total construction of a house and Rs. 500,000.00 for completion of a semi-constructed house. Funds will be received from the Treasury and granted to beneficiaries via the Housing Development Authority.

#### 4.1.1. Role of the Ranaviru Seva Authority in the ‘Virusumithuru’ Housing Project

‘Virusumithuru’ Housing Project is a course of action administered jointly by the Housing Development Authority and the Ranaviru Seva Authority. The main responsibility of the Ranaviru Seva Authority herein, is to select suitable beneficiaries and refer them to the Housing Development Authority.

Applications for the ‘Virusumithuru’ Housing assistance are required to be submitted to the Project along with recommendations of the respective War Hero Forum, Grama Niladari, the Divisional Secretary, and District and Provincial Officers.

Duly completed applications received are submitted to the committee appointed by the Director and, upon the receipt of the recommendation of the committee they are sent to the Sri Lanka Police and the Tri-forces to obtain clearance certificates. The list of selected

applicants so approved by the Chairman of the Ranaviru Seva Authority is submitted subsequently to the National Housing Development Authority for onward granting of financial subsidies.

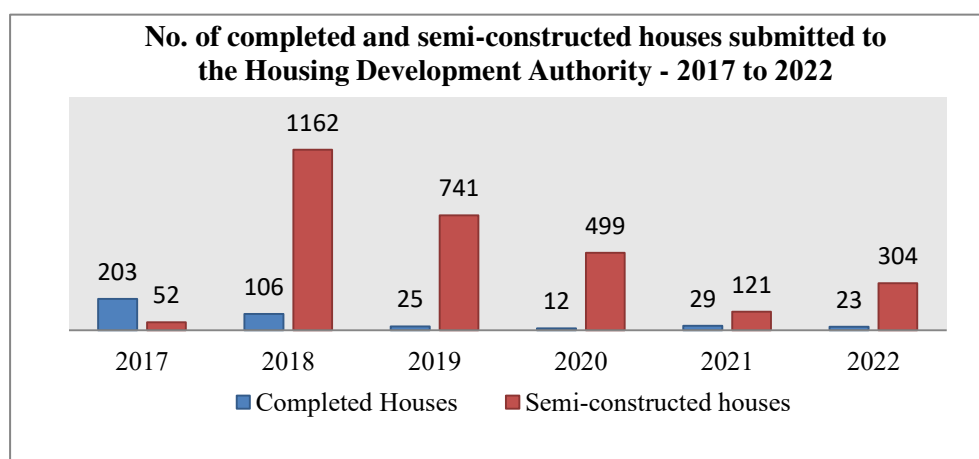
Payments will be made to the beneficiaries in 4 installments by the Housing Development Authority. In the context of the total construction of a house, manpower is provided by the tri-forces by the intervention of the Ranaviru Seva Authority, and further, permission for required changes to house plans is granted subject to conformity to criteria.

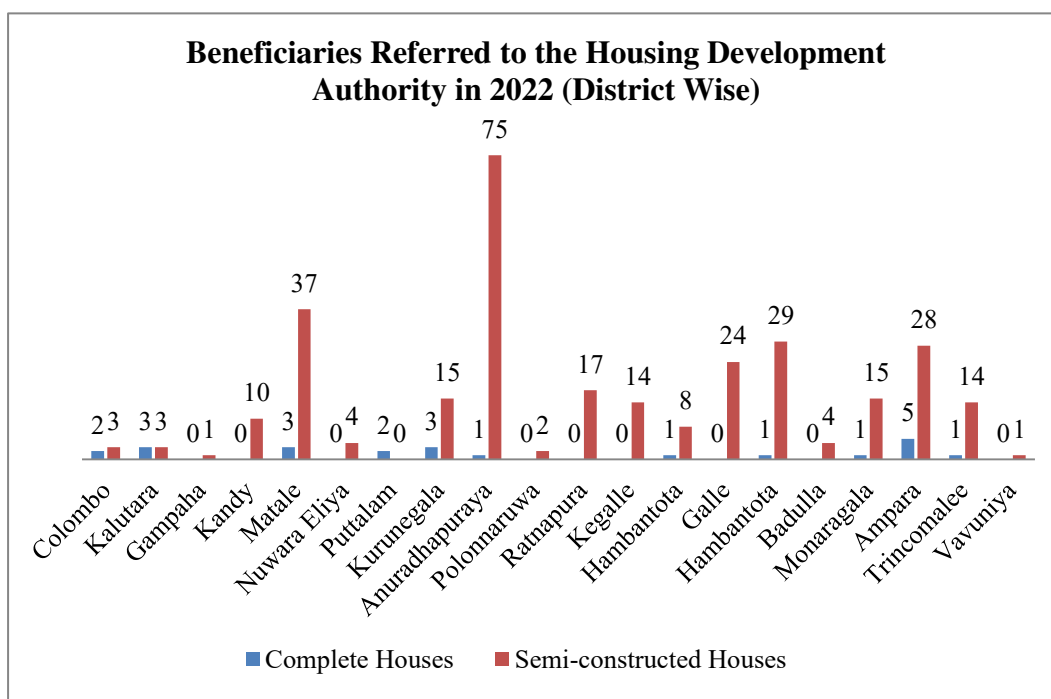

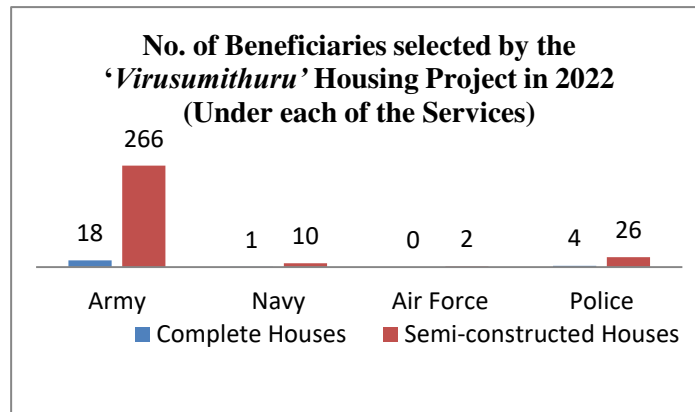

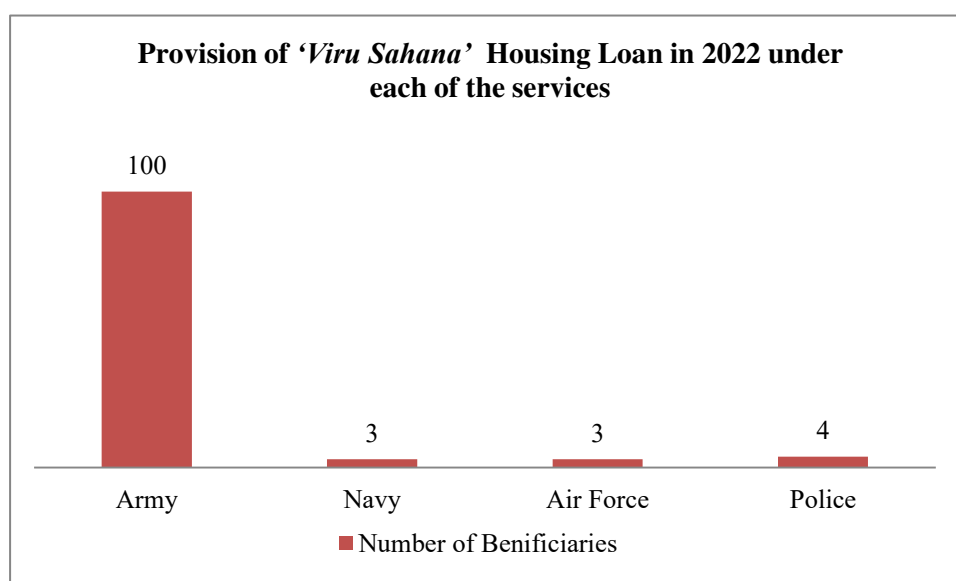
## 4.2. ‘Viru Sahana’ Housing Loan Programme

The ‘Viru Sahana’ Housing Loan Project has been launched by the Ranaviru Seva Authority to assist members of the war hero families belonging to war hero forums in realizing their dream of building a house, with a levy of only a service charge on a concessionary basis. Loans up to a maximum of Rs 10,000,000.00 are granted under the ‘Viru Sahana’ Housing Loan Project for the construction of a new house, refurbishment of a house, and renovation of a house, as per the requirement of the beneficiary. Due to a lack of financial provisions allocated in 2022, the maximum amount of the loan has been reduced to Rs. 500,000.00

The programme had met steady progress in providing loans to a total of 110 beneficiaries; 77 retired disabled war heroes and 33 next of kin of war heroes, during the year 2022.

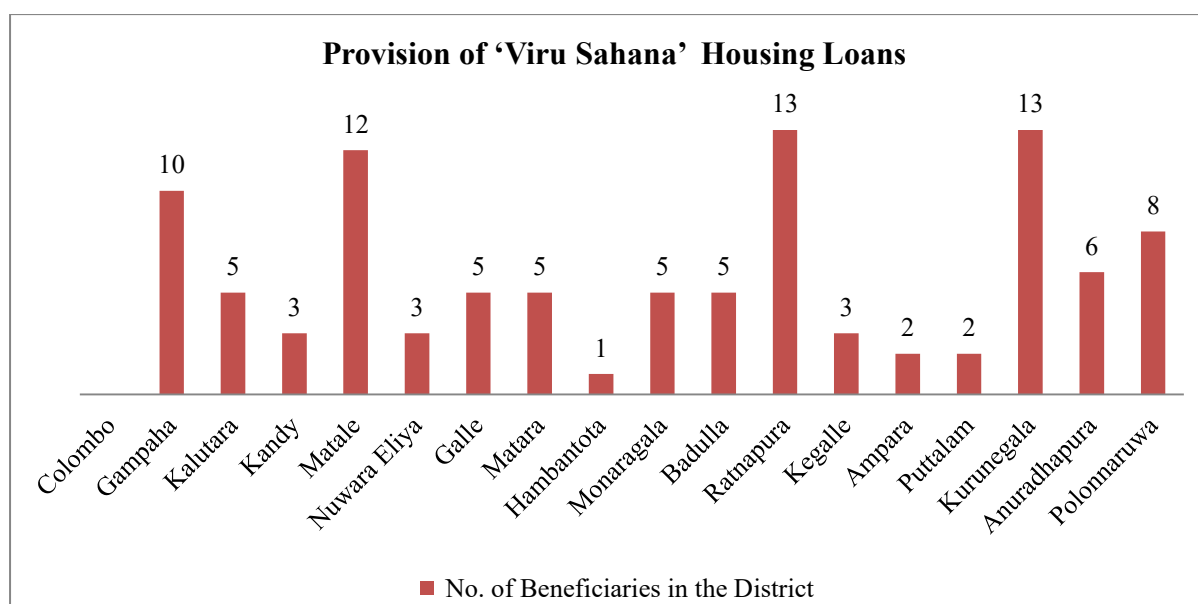

### 4.3. 'Ranaviru Diriya' Self-employment Loan Project

#### 4.3.1. Objective

The main objective of this project is converting the disabled war heroes and their next of kin into talented entrepreneurs via a change of attitudes, in meeting the economic policy of moving towards a people-centered economic approach to strengthen the local entrepreneur integrated with saving the country's resources.

This project is executed to encourage members of the war hero families for self-employment by identifying training needs based on their innate talents, enhancing their prudence inducing them into agro-imported crop agriculture and dairy farming, and enabling them to actively contribute to the country's economy by cultivating their saving habits.

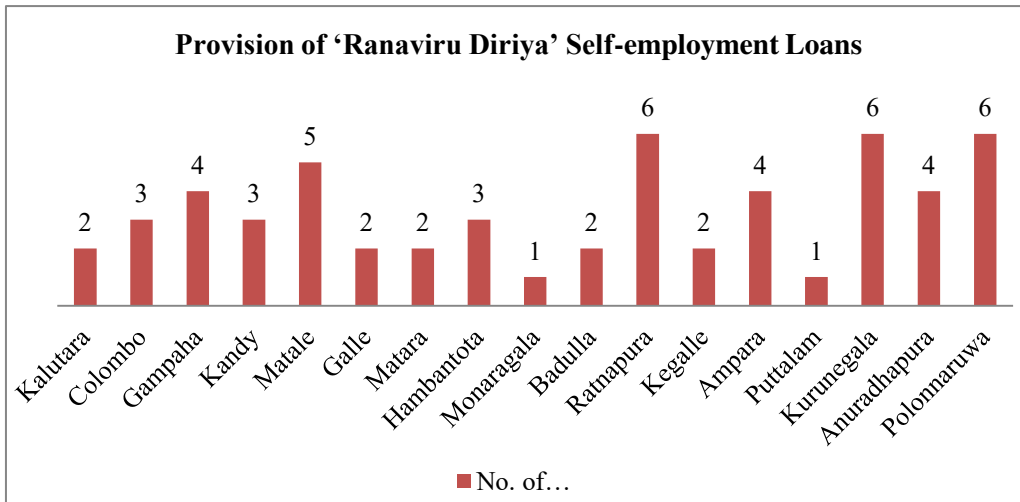
Services such as Providing knowledge about new methods of obtaining higher yield or income with higher quality using advanced technical methods even in a small area, introducing government institutions and individuals for training purposes, introducing related government institutions and private institutions producing products to the local market, and promotion of exporting products to the foreign market are rendered under this 'Ranaviru Diriya' Loan Project.

#### 4.3.2. The Process to be followed

- Selection of beneficiaries from the forums islandwide through the district and provincial Officers-in-Charge officials
- Beneficiaries selected to be provided with self-employment loans should have at least 03 years of service to be completed before reaching the age of 55 years.
- A maximum of loan amount up to 10 lakhs per person is given and an annual concessional interest rate of 5 % will be charged. The maximum period of loan recovery is 4 years. (Only a maximum loan amount of 5 lakh per person was given in the year 2022 due to lack of provision.)
- As a policy, the loan amount is released in two installments and before releasing the second installment the progress is assessed. The second installment is released after the recovery of the first installment through the Directorate of Pay and Records

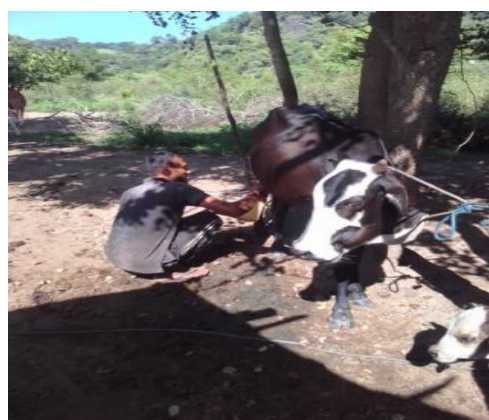

#### 4.4. 'Ranaviru Mapiya Surakum' Programme

Parents of married war heroes who paid the supreme sacrifice or were declared missing in action are allocated 25% of the respective war hero's monthly pay with effect from 21 November 2007. However, parents of married war heroes listed in the respective category before the said date are not eligible for such payment and as a mark of gratitude, parents of war heroes who do not receive a government pension are granted financial assistance under the 'Ranaviru Mapiya Surakum' programme.

Postal accounts under the National Savings Bank are opened by the Ranaviru Seva Authority for all parents who are eligible for benefits under this scheme. A sum of Rs 1,500.00 per parent totaling Rs 3,000.00 is granted to both living parents, whereas Rs 2,250.00 is granted in the case of 1 living parent and the respective finances could be withdrawn at National Savings Bank branches or Post Offices.

Funds are deposited in accounts at the end of each month and beneficiaries have been informed to withdraw the total sum in full, less leaving parts of the same. In the event of the death of a beneficiary, the respective death certificate and bank account book are to be surrendered to the Ranaviru Seva Authority and the remaining funds will thus, be transferred to the Authority Vote. Only the beneficiary holds the right to withdraw money from the account and in the event of a death of one of the two beneficiary parents, such is to be informed to the Authority, whereupon payment to the remaining living parent shall be increased to Rs 2,250.00.

## 4.5. Land Section

### 4.5.1. Introduction to the Project

In carrying out welfare activities for members of war hero families as well as considering assistance solicited by them, it is identified that they are faced with certain difficulties in securing permanent occupancy. Even though various projects are implemented to provide loans and assistance for house construction, they are faced with dire consequences due to a lack of own land for the purpose. Difficulties have arisen in this context, due to facts related to a majority of them living in temporary shelters erected on shared plots, squatting on unauthorized plots, and acquiring land without clear deeds or permits.

Providing for land ownership and construction of residences in resolution is mediated under the Land Project of the Ranaviru Seva Authority. The Lands Section coordinates matters in pertinence to the acquisition of land and assists them to obtain legal title to the plots of land they are currently residing with the respective establishments.

#### **4.5.2. Method for Distribution of Benefits under the Project**

##### **I. Provision of plots of land**

- I. Identifying the war heroes and their families who have no lands through the requests received through the forums, calling for applications, and entering the details of the duly completed applications received so into the data system district wise
- II. Checking whether the war heroes have entitled to other lands referring to the Grama Sevaka Officers and Divisional Secretaries
- III. Forwarding the list of qualified applicants to the Land Kachcheri in the respective areas for the selection of granting plots of land from the lands vacant
- IV. Recommending the list of selected applicants and forwarding them to the relevant Divisional Secretariat, Land Commissioner's Office, Land Reform Commission, Mahaweli Authority, etc.
- V. Informing the applicants and related services in that regard and coordinating the relevant parties engaging in the provision of land

##### **II. Granting Recommendation for Provision of Deeds/Permits**

Submitting pertinent recommendations for the provision of deeds/permits for the lands occupied by war heroes under 'The Ranaviru Sahana Foundation' as per the Land Commissioner General's Circular No. 2021/01.

##### **III. Coordinating the Relevant Institutions**

Coordinating with the relevant institutions to solve the problems arising due to the fact that the land purchased by the war heroes for residence is state-owned lands.

#### **4.5.3. Performance in the Year 2022**

##### **4.5.3.1. Awarding Deeds of Transfer to War Heroes in Balangoda**

A programme for granting no. of 9 plots of land in extent of 10 perches subdividing the land in extent of 2 roods and 38 perches, which was donated by L.K. Kusumawathi residing at Mount Lavinia to the Ranaviru Seva Authority through a deed of gift for making merits in the name of her deceased husband with view to donating lands to the war heroes, was conducted on 23.02.2022 in the Balangoda war hero village under the patronage of Major General Nandana Senadeera (Retd), Chairman of the Ranaviru Seva Authority. There, no. of 8 disabled war heroes and a mother of a deceased war hero were provided with the plots of lands.

The plot of land called Abeysinghe Hena alias Wilegoda Kella (02 roods and 38 perches) situated at No. 254, Pahala Massanna in Balangoda Grama Seva Division of Medakorale Hela Uda Pattu in Balangoda area in Ratnapura District, Sabaragamuwa Province was granted to no. of 09 war hero families issuing permits for the temporary occupation. Deeds of Transfer were handed over to the beneficiaries on this occasion.

In order to transfer the legal title to these plots of land for 09 war hero families, a deed signing ceremony was held with the intervention of the Land Division of the Ranaviru Seva Authority and assistance of the Directorate of Legal Services of the Sri Lanka Army. i. Asamanalage Nimal Wijeratne

#### 4.5.3.2. Provision of a Plot of Land in Mirigama to a War Hero Family

An initial program of signing deeds in respect of two plots of land in Malambe and Mirigama to be granted to two landless war hero families was held on 1st August 2022 at the Ranaviru Seva Authority.

The plot of land in extent of 10 perches donated by Mrs. Vinitha Wickremarachchi residing in Mirigama area through a deed of gift to the Ranaviru Seva Authority. with a view to donating land for war heroes, was granted to Mr. H.W. Kumarasiri, a disabled war hero of the Sri Lanka Army, residing in the Mirigama area of the Gampaha district.



#### 4.5.3.3. Awarding a Deed of Transfer to War Hero's Wife in

##### Wathumulla

A deed signing ceremony for providing a plot of land situated in Gampaha for a war hero family without land for occupation was held on 09.11.2022 in the Ranaviru Seva Authority under the patronage of Major General Nandana Senadeera (Retd), Chairman of the Ranaviru Seva Authority.

The plot of land in extent of 10.20 perches donated by Ms. Danasili Kumarasinghe and Ms. Piyasili Kumarasinghe residing in the Wathupitiwala area through a deed of gift to the Ranaviru Seva Authority with a view to donating land for a landless war hero, was granted to Mrs. D.D. Samanthi Kumari Fernando residing at Minuwangoda in Gampaha, the spouse of war hero, Mahesh Padmakumar of the Sri Lanka Army

In order to transfer the legal title to the plot of land called Delgahawatta Idama in extent of 10.20 perches situated in the Wathumulla village in the division of Minuwangoda Divisional Secretariat, in Dasiya Pattu of Aluthkuru Korale in Gampaha District, Western Province, a signing ceremony was held with the intervention of the Ranaviru Seva Authority and assistance of the Directorate of Legal Services of the Sri Lanka Army. After signing of deeds, D.D. Samanthi Kumari was issued a temporary permit under the patronage of the Chairman of the Ranaviru Seva Authority.



#### 4.5.3.4. Providing a Plot of Land in Malambe to a Disabled War Hero under a Temporary Permit

The plot of land in extent of 6.70 perches donated by the Kaduwela Pradeshiya Sabha to the Ranaviru Seva Authority was granted to the war hero, DMS Kumarasiri, of the Sri Lanka Army on 09.11.2022 issuing a temporary permit.

The act of transferring the legal right to the plot of land was performed with the assistance of the Directorate of Legal Services of the Sri Lanka Army under the patronage of Major General Nandana Senadeera (Retd), the Chairman of the Ranaviru Seva Authority.



## 05

### PROVISION OF MEDICAL ASSISTANCE AND LOANS

#### 5.1. Provision of Medical Assistance

Retired war heroes who were rendered disabled in action, parents of married war heroes in the tri-services and Police who sacrificed their lives in service to the nation, who do not receive the full payment, and spouses and unemployed children below 26 years of age receiving only the pension/dependents' allowance through the tri-services and Police, are provided with medical assistance under this project.

Assistance is given for performing emergency surgeries, medical examinations, and purchasing medical equipment needed to overcome health conditions, and in assisting ailing disabled war heroes and the next of kin of war heroes confronted with financial difficulties, in receiving medical treatment.

They must be provided with adequate financial assistance for obtaining medical treatment and undergoing medical examinations or surgeries from a hospital with the required facilities. Therefore, financial assistance is provided under this project for expeditious reference and securing of required medical services from a medical institute with required facilities. A maximum of Rs.500,000.00 to a war hero and a maximum of Rs.75,000.00 to the next of kin of a war hero is provided under this scheme.

#### 5.2. Provision of Medical Loans

A number of individuals representing the war hero community apply for medical loans annually based on various health problems confronted. A vast majority of requests are for emergency surgery and treatment, whilst most of the applicants are the ones who receive salaries or allowances. War heroes who retired due to medical reasons continue to fall ill due to the direct and indirect effects of the factors on their disability. Percentages of war heroes and the next of kin of war heroes contracting non-communicable diseases due to malnutrition remain high, whilst health problems caused by accidents too are inevitable. Further, the consequences of several complex health states associated with aging result in significant declines in health capacities.

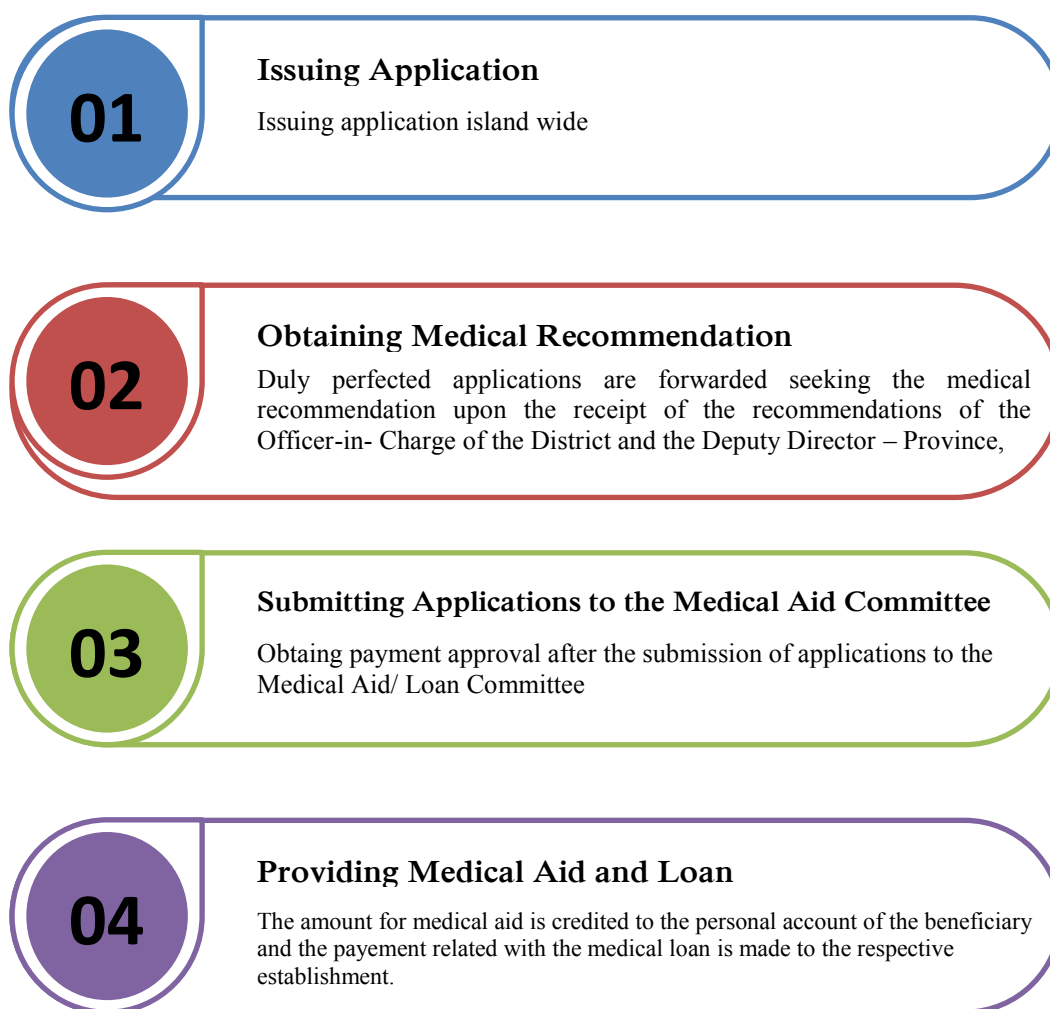
The war hero community is prone to exacerbation of health conditions and other side effects that could lead to even untimely death due to long-term wait under registration of patients at government hospitals, in dire need of urgent treatment for the aforesaid health states.

Likewise, the inability to receive timely medical treatment for health conditions due to lack of financial means to meet incurred costs in obtaining the same from the private sector outside the treatment procedure in government hospitals can lead to exacerbation of health conditions.

The main objective of this programme is to provide interest-free loans to the war hero community in need of urgent financial assistance for recommended medical treatment, in such instances. Herein, financial assistance is extended to expedite obtaining of medical services through being referred to a medical institution with the required facilities for the same.

A maximum of Rs. 500,000.00 can be obtained as a medical loan. The loan will be recovered in a maximum of 36 installments. Service charges will not be levied for this loan.

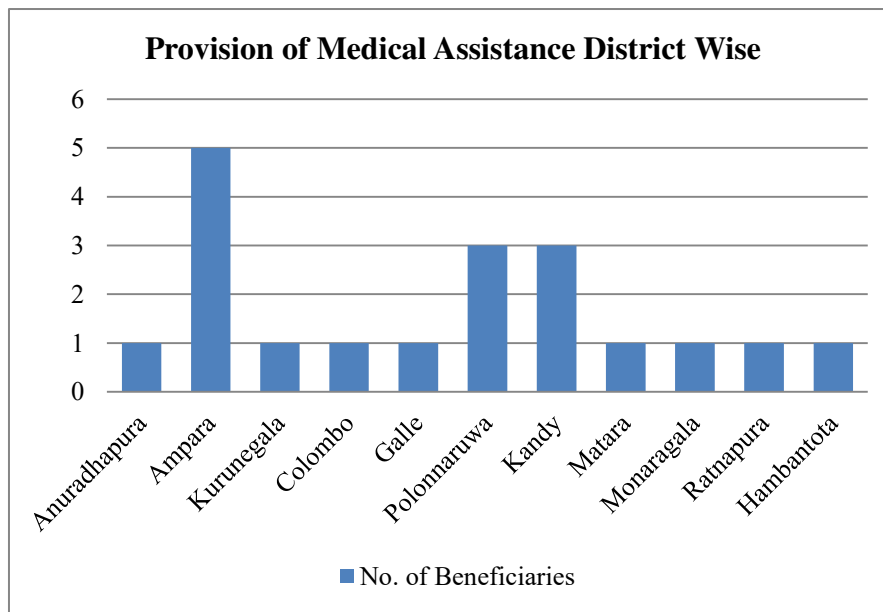

#### 6.1.1. Grade 6 to 11 Scholarship Programmes

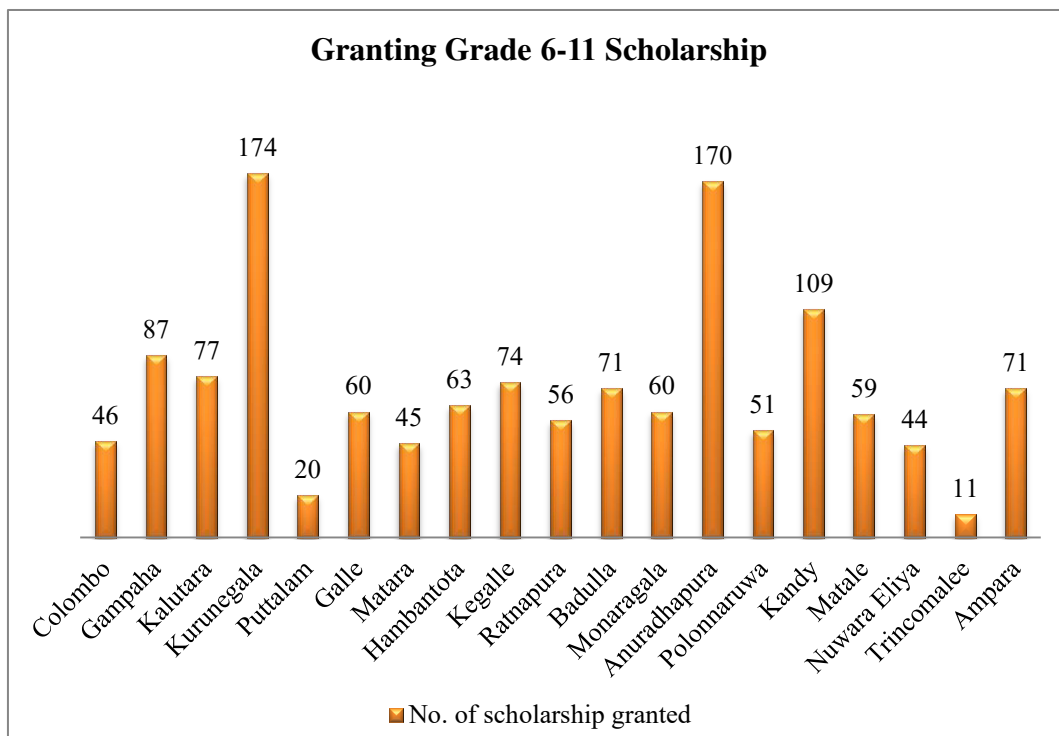

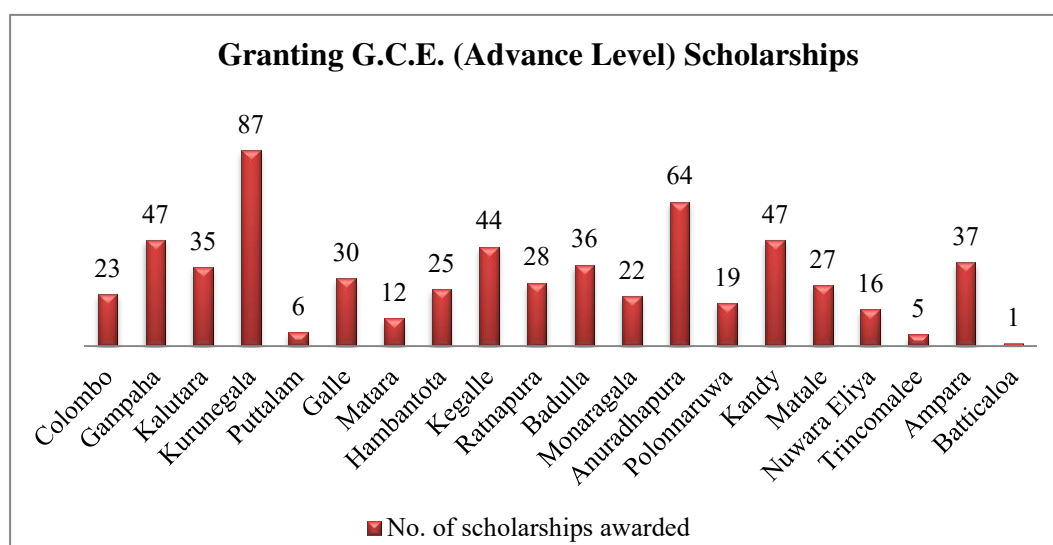


### 6.1.2 G.C.E. (Advance Level) Scholarship Programme

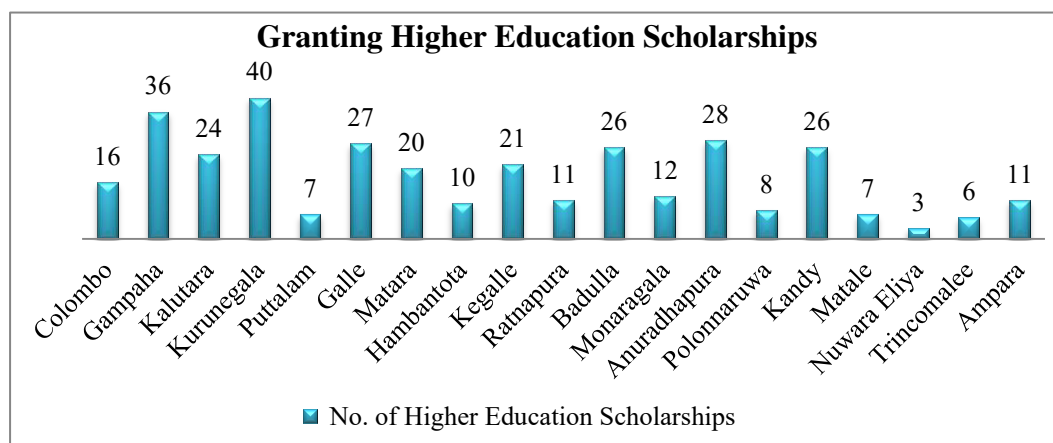

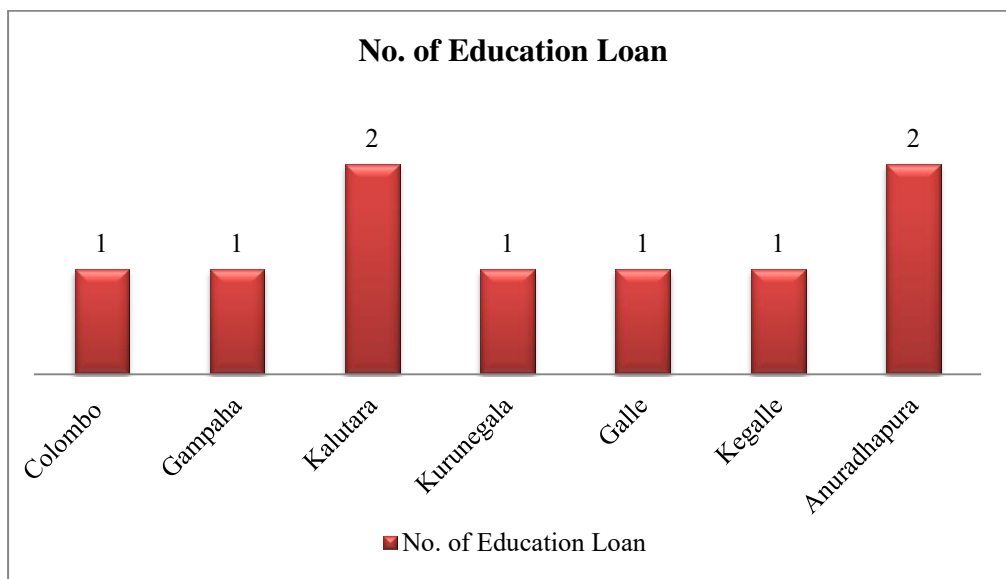
#### 6.1.4. Tertiary and Vocational Education Funding Programme

This programme launched towards encouraging all children of war heroes, with or without GCE (Ordinary Level), GCE (Advance Level) qualification to pursue courses of higher studies, provides for a maximum grant of Rs 50,000.00 inclusive of course fees for tertiary or vocational education courses. Due to the lack of provisions allocated for the year 2022, the provision of grants is temporarily suspended in respect of said courses.

#### 6.1.5. Provision of Skill Development Loans

Education loans for financial assistance are provided under this programme launched towards encouraging children of war heroes, who have deviated from education after GCE (Ordinary Level), GCE (Advance Level) and higher studies, to pursue further studies for planned futuristic goals. A loan amounting to a maximum of RS. 500,000.00 will be provided under this programme.

#### **6.1.7. Special Programmes Conducted in 2022**

##### **6.1.7.1. A Helping Hand to a War Hero's Daughter from the Royalty Payment of the "32 Immortal Soldiers"**

Utilizing the royalty payment of the book "32 Immortal Soldiers" written by Mr. Prasad Polwatta, a veteran banker and professional accountant, a laptop computer was donated to a war hero's daughter on Monday, February 14, 2022, as an educational aid.

While the Chairman of the Ranaviru Seva Authority was participating in a program at Keragala War Heroes Village in Dompe, the laptop worth Rs. 120,000.00 was donated as an immediate response to a request made by one of the disabled war hero and his daughter upon him.

Utilizing the amount donated from the royalty payment of the book "32 Immortal Soldiers" written by Mr. Prasad Polwatta, the Scholarship Programme Division of the Ranaviru Seva Authority has taken measures to provide a laptop computer with the said war hero's daughter to satisfy her educational requirement.

Mr. Prasad Polwatta presented this computer to the daughter in front of her parents at the invitation made by Major General Nandana Senadeera (Retd), the Chairman of the Ranaviru Seva Authority. The Director of Ranaviru Seva Authority, Major General Kithsiri Ekanayake (Retd), Deputy Director – of Western Province, Mrs. Dhammika Shelton, Head of the Scholarship Programme Division, Miss Surekha Fernando, and members of the war hero family attended this event.

##### **6.7.7.2. A Helping Hand to Three Children of War Heroes from the Royalty Payment of the "32 Immortal Soldiers"**

A program for donating three laptop computers needed for higher education to three children of war heroes disabled and killed in operations, who were from the Sri Lanka Army and Police, was held on 03.03.2022 at the Ranaviru Seva Authority.

Utilizing the royalty payment of the book "32 Immortal Soldiers" written by Mr. Prasad Polwatta, a veteran banker and professional accountant, three laptop computers were donated to three children and one laptop was donated to a war hero's daughter at a earlier stage.

Mr. Prasad Polwatta and his wife, Mrs. Harshi Polwatta presented these computers to these war hero children at the invitation made by Major General Nandana Senadeera (Retd), the Chairman of the Ranaviru Seva Authority.



The Director of Ranaviru Seva Authority, Major General h Ekanayake (Retd), Secretary Brigadier Roshan Thirimanna and the Head of Scholarship Programme Division, Miss Surekha Fernando and members of the war hero family attended this event.

Mr. Prasad Polwatta and his wife Mrs. Harshi Polwatta presented computers to these children of war heroes at the invitation of the Chairman of the Ranaviru Seva Authority, Major General Nandana Senadeera (Retd), the Director of the Ranaviru Seva Authority, Major General Kithsiri Ekanayake (Retired), the Secretary to the Chairman, Brigadier Roshan Thirimanna, Head of Scholarship Section, Miss Surekha Fernando and members of Ranaviru families attended the event.

#### **6.1.7.3. Donation of Two Laptops to two War Hero Children through the Personal Patronage of the Chairman**

In response to a special request made by the war hero children who are receiving higher education and whose fathers were disabled and killed in operations, Two laptop computers were donated under the private sponsorship of the Chairman of Ranaviru Seva Authority, Major General Nandana Senadheera (Retd). on 27.08.2022 at the premises of the Ranaviru Seva Authority.

The said laptop was donated to the daughter of A.H. Susantha residing at Gampaha, who was attached to the 3rd Batallion of Sri Lanka Light Infantry and became disabled permanently due to a terrorist attack while engaging in operational duties in Chavakachcheri. She passed the Advance Level Examination in the Maths stream in 2020 and expects to do her higher studies in the discipline of Financial Mathematics and Industrial Statistics at the University of Ruhuna.

The son of K.M. Gunarathne, a Sub Inspector who was attached to the Sri Lanka Police Department and became disabled due to a terrorist attack in Batticaloa has passed the Advance Level Examination in the Information Technology stream in 2020, he was ranked first in Kegalle district, and expects to do his higher studies in the discipline of Information Technology at the University of Ruhuna. He has also donated a laptop computer.

#### 6.1.7.4. A Donation of School Equipment from the Muthuhara to the War Hero Children of the Western Province

As the first phase of the distribution of school equipment donated by Sri Lankan children residing in Doha Qatar, London in England, Adelaide and Sydney in Australia who affiliated with the Sri Lanka Rupavahini International Muthuhara Children's Clubs, a program for war hero children in Colombo, Kalutara and Gampaha Districts of the Western Province was conducted on Tuesday, 30th August 2022 under patronage of Major General Nandana Senadeera (Retd), the Chairman of the Ranaviru Seva Authority.

No. of 70 selected children of war heroes who died and became disabled while serving in the Tri-Forces and the Police were distributed school equipment under the guidance of the Chairman of the Ranaviru Seva Authority in this programme which was attended by Mr. Udantha Kamal Gunathilaka, the Program Director of the Muthuhara Children's Program of Jathika Rupavahini.

Mrs. Sonia Kottegoda, the Deputy Chairperson of the Ranaviru Seva Authority and the Chief Directing Officer of the Senehasa Special Education Center, the Director of the Ranaviru Seva Authority, Major General Kithsiri Ekanayake (Retd), the Secretary to the Chairman, Brigadier Roshan Thirimanna, Provincial Deputy Directors of the Ranaviru Seva Authority, the Heads of Departments, Program officers, staff members, officers of the Tri-Forces and Police, parents and children of war heroes participated in this programme.



#### 6.1.8. FOSTER PARENT SCHOLARSHIP PROJECT

##### 6.1.8.1 Aim of the Project

School-going children of war heroes representing Tri-services and Police personnel disabled or deceased due to non-combat reasons whilst on active service, are granted scholarships under this project with a view to encouraging them to do their studies in the proper manner.

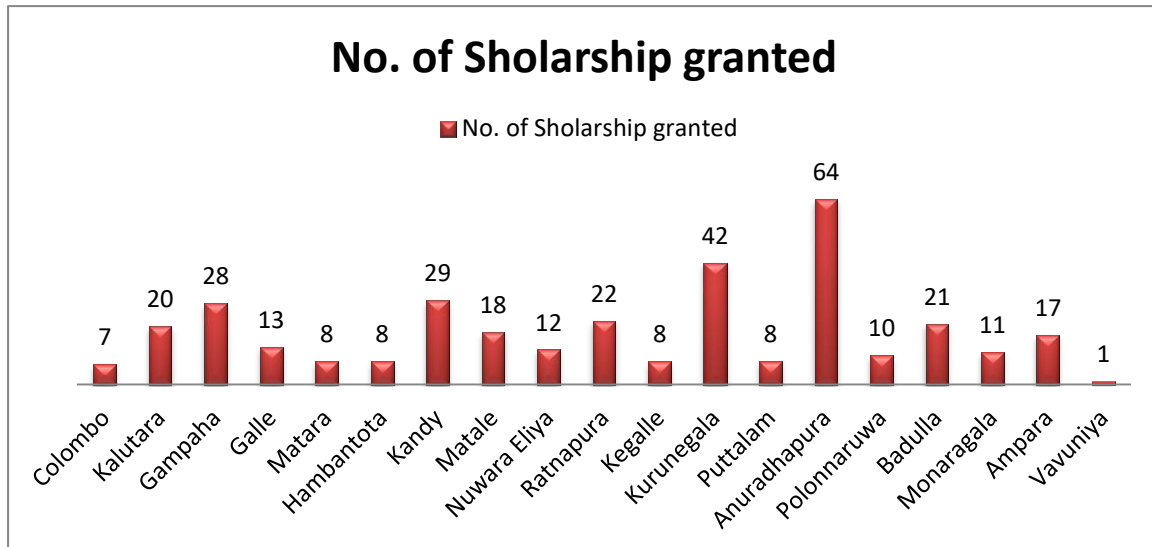
### 6.1.8.2. Method of Distribution of Benefits of the Project

This project provides scholarships to the children of war heroes who died and were disabled due to non-operational causes and who do not belong to the beneficiary category of the Ranaviru Seva Authority established by Parliament Act No. 54 of 1999. Provisions are not made for the project and scholarships are awarded through the contributions made by local and foreign sponsors. The foremost task performed by this project is to provide the grants offered by local and foreign sponsors to children of war heroes who are unable to complete their education due to economic difficulties they receive a monthly payment.

After verifications of applications received through District Officers or sent directly by the war hero families, the applications are forwarded to the Scholarship Selection Committee. The details of the children are forwarded to the donors. The amounts of the money the donors provide for the selected children are credited to the respective bank accounts in favour of the beneficiaries.

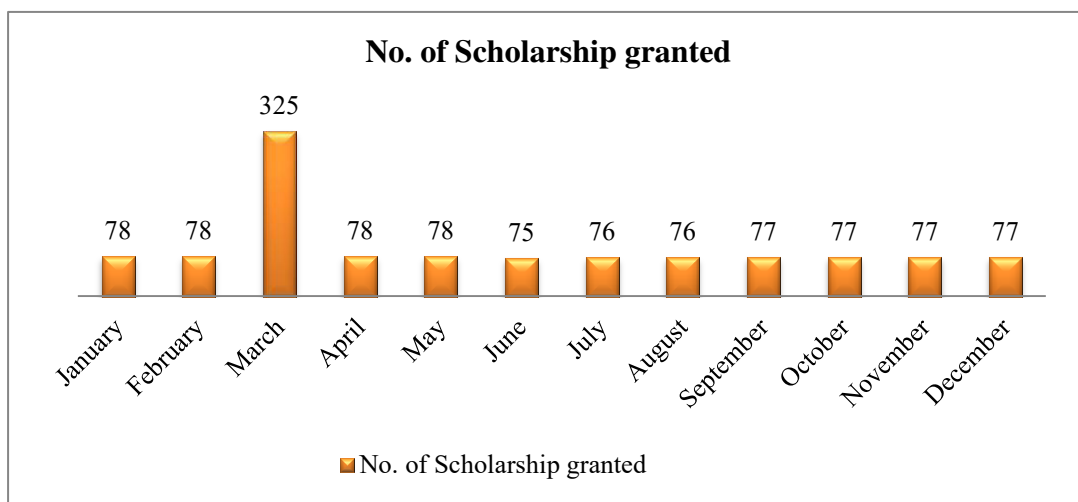

**6.1.8.7. Other Missions Executed under the Foster Parent Scholarship Project in 2022**

- i. Construction and completion of houses belonging to 04 war hero families through the contributions made by donors



- ii. **Coordinating the relevant parties to obtain Nippon Scholarships for 165 children who did not receive scholarship aid**

Upon a special request made by Major General Nandana Senadeera (Retd), the Chairman of Ranaviru Seva Authority, the Secretary General of Sri Lanka Nippon Educational and Cultural Center Sri Jayawardenepura Chief Sanghanayake, Ven. Meegahtenne Chandasiri Thero has agreed to grant educational scholarships to the children of war heroes.

With the intervention of Mrs. Prabodhani Marasinghe, who works as a special benefactor of this temple and is interested in social service activities, children of war heroes were able to obtain these educational scholarships.

Under this program, children of the war heroes in the Tri-Forces and Police who died and were injured due to non-operational reasons will be entitled to educational scholarships for ten years, including all school equipment, uniforms, and financial donations for school education. It is expected that this educational assistance will be offered annually.



- iii.** Sergeant Major Anil Prasanna Jayalath (Retd), who represents the sports pool of the Ranaviru Seva Authority, donated a pair of sports shoes under the coordination of Mrs. Thulani Devamitta, Head of the Foster Parent Care Division. The Managing Director of the DSI Group, Mr. Thusitha Rajapaksa provided the necessary sponsorship for the donation.
- iv.** Under the patronage of donors, a triplet family was provided with milk powder to fulfill their needs.
- v.** The war hero, A.K. Upul representing Ambilipitiya War Heroes Forum in Ratnapura District, who is permanently disabled, was donated to a clinical mattress that was a dire need of him under the patronage of a donor.
- vi.** An amount of Rs.100,000/- was donated to a war hero's child for head surgery to be performed through the aid of donors.
- vii.** A bathroom was constructed in a house that the war hero's mother occupies and kitchen utensils and medicines needed for her illness were provided through the aid received from donors.

## 07

**PROVINCIAL AND SPECIAL PROJECTS SECTION****7.1. Introduction**

Many programmes are conducted by the Provincial and Special Projects Section to provide a wider range of services to the war heroes through the countrywide war heroes' forum networks systematically maintained by the Ranaviru Seva Authority.

The Provincial Section is responsible for identifying the requirements of the war hero community and managing the provisioning of the same. A broad range of tasks such as considering and responding promptly to requests received from war heroes, providing disaster relief in emergencies, maintaining war hero villages, etc, is executed by this Section.

**7.2. Emergency Relief Programme**

Emergency Relief Programme is executed to provide the next of kin of war heroes who sacrificed their lives in operation and disable war heroes who are retired or deployed in the service with assistance when damage has occurred due to emergencies such as floods, cyclones, landslides, fire, etc. and considering the death of the disabled war hero to give hand.

**7.2.1. Method for Distribution of Benefits**

Payments are made as per the recommendation of the District Program Officer and Provincial Deputy Director.

Financial aid up to a maximum of Rs. 100,000.00 as required is provided to the next of kin of war heroes who sacrificed their lives in operation and disabled war heroes who are retired or deployed in the service in an emergency such as flood, cyclone, landslide, fire, etc. and Rs. 10,000.00 is provided at the sudden death of war heroes subject to the recommendation of the District Programme Office in the respective district and Provincial Deputy Director.

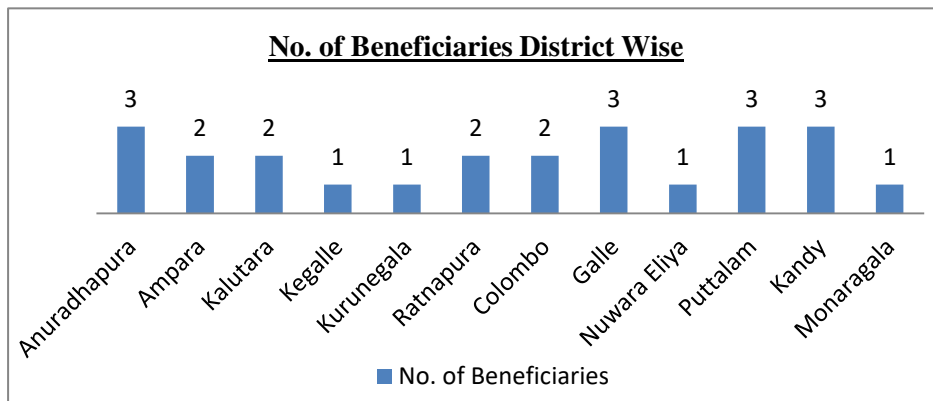

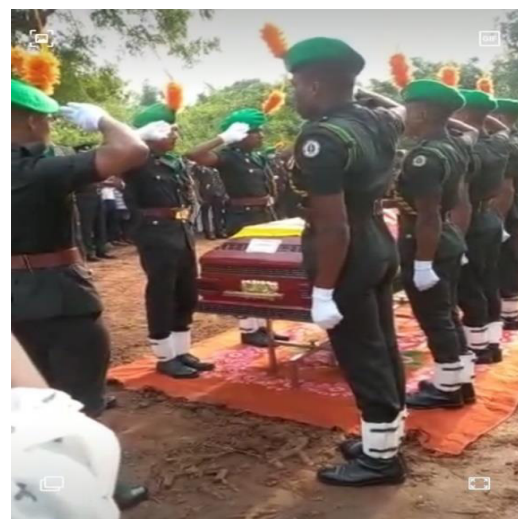

### 7.3. Infrastructure Development Programme in War Hero Villages

The Provincial and Special Projects Section mediates the making of arrangements in this regard with the central government and the responsible institutions functioning within its purview. Moreover, the development of essential infrastructure facilities of war hero villages including the construction of community halls, establishment of cultural centers, libraries, environmental centers, community water projects, and maintenance of internal roads and constructions, is implemented herein at the Provincial level on priority basis, whereby developing team spirit in view of improving their quality of life.

#### 7.4. “Helaviru Suwa Dharani” Suwa Sayana Programme

The "Helaviru Suwa Dharani" Suwa Sayana programme is executed with a view to fostering the physical and mental well-being of both war heroes who became disabled and the next of kin of the war heroes who sacrificed their lives and limbs.

##### 7.4.1. Method for Distribution of Benefits

The tasks such as;

- Conducting lectures on nutrition and health,
- Provision of medicinal beverages under the patronage of the Ministry of Indigenous Medicine, and
- visiting identified patients at their residences quarterly and giving them treatment, etc.

are carried out on behalf of the members of Ranaviru villages and forums spread across the island through these ayurvedic clinics.

It is expected to identify patients, provide counseling and medical treatment for them and visit the homes of the disabled war to treat them until they recover under this programme.

#### 7.4.1.1. “Helaviru Suwa Dharani” Suwa Sayana Programme - Gampaha

The inaugural ceremony of the series of the "Helaviru Suwa Dharani" Suwa Sayana programme, which is jointly implemented by the Department of Ayurveda and Ranaviru Seva Authority throughout the island, was held on November 10th under the patronage of the State Minister of the Ministry of Indigenous Medicine, Hon. Sisira Jayakodi.

The Additional Secretary of the Ministry of Health Mrs. Kumari Weerasekera addressed the audience and explained the importance of this programme and the Chief Guest, State Minister of the Ministry of Indigenous Medicine, Hon. Sisira Jayakodi also addressed the audience. More than two hundred members from Keragala Ranaviru Village and Dompe war hero Forum participated in this programme.



#### 7.4.1.2. “Helaviru Suwa Dharani” Suwa Sayana Programme - Badulla

The Badulla district program was successfully conducted on November 16th at the Hali Ela Siri Bimbarama Temple as the second programme of the series of the "Helaviru Suwa Dharani" Suwa Sayana programme, which is jointly implemented by the Department of Ayurveda and Ranaviru Seva Authority throughout the island. The Indigenous Medical Officer of Health conducted an awareness lecture on leading a healthy life as the first agenda item. This program was conducted with the help of resource persons, the Ayurveda Commissioner, Uva Province, Dr. Dilma Premathilaka, and the medical staff and other officials.



#### 7.4.1.3. “Helaviru Suwa Dharani” Suwa Sayana Programme - Nuwara Eliya

The Nuwara Eliya district program of the "Helaviru Suwa Dharani" Suwa Sayana programme jointly organized by the Ranaviru Seva Authority and the Ministry of Indigenous Medicine was held on 17.11.2022 at the Hunguranketha Divisional Secretariat.

The Indigenous Medical Officer of Health conducted a lecture to make aware the war hero community about the prevention of non-communicable diseases and assistive devices such as prosthetic legs, crutches, clinical shoes, and walking sticks were also distributed to the disabled war heroes.

The Assistant Divisional Secretary, Assistant Director, and Ranaviru Subject Officer of the Hanguranketha Divisional Secretariat, along with the Medical Practitioner of the Indigenous Ayurveda Center including the staff, Nuwara Eliya District Officer of the Ranaviru Seva Authority, Ms. Ajanta Herath and Ranaviru Forum members participated in this program.

#### 7.4.1.4. “Helaviru Suwa Dharani” Suwa Sayana Programme - Anuradhapura

In line with this program, the distribution of prosthetic legs for disabled war heroes was carried out under the patronage of Mr. Thushara Jayasinghe, the Deputy Director of the North Central Province of the Ranaviru Seva Authority. For this program, the Ministry distributed drugs worth Rs. 1.8 million to the North Central Province.

#### 7.4.1.5. “Helaviru Suwa Dharani” Suwa Sayana Programme - Udupila Village in Gampaha

The second programme of the “Helaviru Suwa Dharani” Suwa Sayana programme, which was conducted in Anuradhapura, was successfully conducted on December 04th at the temple of the Udupila Ranaviru Village.

The second programme of the “Helaviru Suwa Dharani” Suwa Sayana programme was successfully held on 11.12.2022 at Keragala Ranaviru Village in Gampaha district. The program was successfully conducted by the doctors of Gampaha Wickramarachchi Ayurveda Hospital.



#### 7.4.1.6. “Helaviru Suwa Dharani” Suwa Sayana Programme – Mapalagama in Galle

The first program of the “Helaviru Suwa Dharani” Suwa Sayana programme, which was conducted in Galle, was held on 08.12.2022 at Mapalagama Ranawiru village.

#### 7.4.1.8. “Helaviru Suwa Dharani” Suwa Sayana Programme - Ampara

## 08

**WAR HERO COMMEMORATION PROGRAMME****8.1. Introduction**

This project is executed with a view to safeguarding honour, dignity and respect of war heroes by way of doing such other acts and things as may be necessary or conducive to the discharge of the functions of the Authority as stipulated in the Parliamentary Act No. 54 of 1999. The programmes for commemorating brave patriotic war heroes of the Army, Navy, Air Force, Police and Civil Security Department who sacrificed their lives and limbs for the country while extending the gratitude of the nation towards them, safeguarding the honour and respect of the war heroes and full filling their welfare needs, are conducted through the implementation of this project.

**8.2. Declaring the National War Heroes Commemoration Month**

Declaring the National War Heroes Commemoration Month, the National War Heroes Flag was pinned on His Excellency the President Gotabaya Rajapaksa, the Seventh Executive President of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka and the Commander-in-Chief of the Armed Forces on 06.05.2022 at the Presidential Palace. The first flag was pinned on His Excellency President by Major General Nandana Senadeera (Retd), the Chairman of the Ranaviru Seva Authority marking the beginning of War Heroes Commemoration Month.

The War Heroes' Month commemorates the brave war heroes who sacrificed their lives for a free and independent country by putting an end to the terrorism that ravaged the country for more than three decades. This project aims to present the War Heroes Commemoration Flag to the Sri Lankan citizens, commemorating the true owners of freedom in the territory of Sri Lanka. The main objective is to honor the brave war heroes of the country by commemorating their supreme sacrifice made for the territorial integrity and unity of the motherland.



The Tri-Forces, Police, and Civil Security Department contributed to the War Heroes Flag Day-2022. All Government institutions under the Governors of the Provinces, members of the war hero forums attached to the Ranaviru Seva Authority, People's Bank, Bank of Ceylon, National Savings Bank and Sanasa Development Bank provided their financial sponsorship to make this event a success.

The Board of Directors, staff members and employees of the factories situated in Horana, Avissawella, Seethawaka, Malwatta Thihariya, Nittambuwa, Wathupitiwala and Koggala export processing zones which are coming under the purview of the Board of Investment of Sri Lanka, also provided financial sponsorships for the war hero commemoration day.



### 8.3 .National War Heroes’ Day Commemoration Ceremony

The 13th War Heroes Commemoration was held on the 19th of May in 2022 at the War Hero Memorial near the Parliament Complex under the patronage of His Excellency the President Gotabaya Rajapaksa, the Seventh Executive President of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka and the Commander-in-Chief of the Armed Forces on 06.05.2022.

May 19, 2022, marks the 13th anniversary of the war victory over the LTTE terrorism that lasted for three decades. A total of twenty-eight thousand (28000) war heroes from the Army, Navy, Air Force, and Civil Security Department sacrificed their lives for the freedom of the motherland. More than twenty-seven thousand (27000) soldiers became disabled in the battle. With the participation of the war heroes in Tri-Forces, Police and the Civil Security Department, this commemoration ceremony was to pay national tribute to war heroes in the motherland.

Major General Nandana Senadeera (Retd.), the Chairman of Ranaviru Seva Authority ushered His Excellency the President to the place where the ceremony took place. Secretary to the Ministry of Defence, General Kamal Gunaratne (retired), Secretary to the Ministry of Law and Order, Major General Jagath Alwis (Retd), The Chief of Defence Staff and Sri Lanka Army General Shavendra Silva, Commander of the Navy Vice Admiral Nishantha Ulugethenna, Commander of the Air Force Air Marshal Sudarshana Pathirana, Inspector General of Police CD Wickramaratne, and Director General of the Civil Security Department, Major General Ranjan Lamahewa (Retd) laid floral tribute at the War Memorial and paid respect to the war heroes during the ceremony.





## 8.4. Development and Maintenance of the Mailapitiya War Heroes' Memorial Park

Milapitiya National Remembrance Park is the first such War Heroes' Memorial to be established in Sri Lanka to commemorate war heroes who have made the supreme sacrifice to liberate the motherland from ruthless terrorism. The memorial raised on a tranquil landscape holds a remembrance park of serene beauty containing a monument dedicated to fallen war heroes and cenotaphs engraved with the names of all fallen war heroes. The commemoration ceremony of the National War Heroes' Day 2003 was held at this location.

Pertinent costs for water and electricity of this National Remembrance Park are borne by the Ranaviru Seva Authority whilst security and maintenance requirements of the same are executed by the Sri Lanka Army.

**RETIRED WAR HERO WELFARE SECTION****9.1. Introduction**

This section conducts workshops and training sessions and provides counseling services for retired war hero who have dedicated their youth to the country, to transform them into entrepreneurs in the agricultural and industrial fields with a view to directing them to grab employment opportunities utilizing the skills they have developed so far. The main objective is to provide guidance and required knowledge for members of war hero forums established at the district level to empower them as entrepreneurs. For this purpose, the Ministry of Defense, the Tri-Forces, the Ministry of Plantations, the Department of Agriculture, and the Mahaweli Authority of Sri Lanka have joined hands with the Ranaviru Seva Authority.

### 9.3. Programmes conducted in Year 2022

#### 9.3.1. Training Programme on Beekeeping - Matale

This awareness programme for the war heroes and the next of kin who are engaging in agriculture using simple techniques which are capable of getting in a large harvest in organic

paddy cultivation was organized on the instructions of Major General Nandana Senadeera, the Chairman of the Ranaviru Seva Authority.

This project will be implemented as an exemplary project that promotes organic farming with no toxicity. This will be organized in a manner that encourages other farmers in organic cultivation by way of following the war hero community who have become disabled and injured all over the county.

The Mahaweli Development Authority provided the necessary resources for this programme. This programme is conducted by Corporal Sumit Kumar, Special Training Officer of the Enterprise Development Division of the Ranaviru Seva Authority with the support of provincial and district officials and the members of the war hero forums.

### MAPIYA RAKAWARANA PROJECT

#### 10.1. Introduction

Mapiya Rakawarana' Allowance (Rs 750.00) is granted once a month to living parents of war heroes disabled in action and retired on medical grounds, declared missing in action, or sacrificed their lives in service to the nation (as recognized under the Ranaviru Seva Act), by the 'Mapiya Rakawarana' Section of the Ranaviru Seva Authority. This allowance is credited only to 'Mapiya Rakawarana' accounts opened under state banks such as the Bank of Ceylon, People's Bank, National Savings Bank, and Regional Development Bank.

Irrespective of the number of war heroes in a family, the allowance granted is limited to the sum of Rs. 750.00 per living parent, per month. The allowance will be granted only for the lifetime of the mother and father and is not transferable to any other person. Immediately after the demise of a parent, the relevant passbook ought to be handed over to the bank concerned and a copy of the death certificate of the deceased is to be provided to the 'Mapiya Rakawarana' Section of the Ranaviru Seva Authority.

A Life Certificate for the beneficiary certified by the Grama Niladari is required to be submitted bi-annually, before 15 June and 15 December each year respectively, to the 'Mapiya Rakawarana' Section of the Ranaviru Seva Authority.

#### 10.2. Eligibility Requirements for Allowance

- I. This allowance is granted to parents of war heroes in the Tri-Forces and Police, killed by a terrorist attack and declared missing, and parents of war heroes in the Tri-Forces and Police who became disabled due to a terrorist attack and were sent on retirement on medical grounds.
- II. Even though there are several war hero children, the living mother and father will receive Rs. 750.00 per month separately.
- III. For a family with a deceased war hero and a living war hero child, the allowance is paid in respect of the deceased war hero.

The beneficiary shall send a life certificate certified by the Grama Seva Nildhari once six months before June 15 and December 15 of each year to the Parent Care Section of the Ranaviru Seva Authority.

The mother or father is entitled to this allowance until he/she is alive. This allowance cannot be transferred to anyone. After the death of the mother and father, the passbook should be

returned to the concerned bank immediately and a copy of the death certificate of the deceased should be given to the Parent Care Section of the Ranaviru Seva Authority.

#### **10.2.1. Documents Required for receipt of the ‘Mapiya Rakawarana’ Allowance**

- I. Duly completed ‘Mapiya Rekawarana’ application
- II. In the case of a deceased war hero, a true copy of the death certificate of the deceased
- III. In case of a war hero sent on retirement on medical grounds and disabled due to a terrorist attack, the Disability Percentage Report of the war hero or letter received from the service station or a copy of a letter submitted to the UAG 21 or board
- IV. A true copy of the war hero’s birth certificate
- V. Copies of the National Identity Cards of mother and father
- VI. Copies of the ‘Mapiya Rekawarana’ Accounts certified by the respective bank

‘Mapiya Rekawarana’ Allowance is paid to parents who fulfill the above requirements in the following order.

The applications submitted every month by parents of the war heroes are verified by the clerk and the documents as required by the Ranaviru Seva Authority Act along with the completed application are forwarded for computerization.

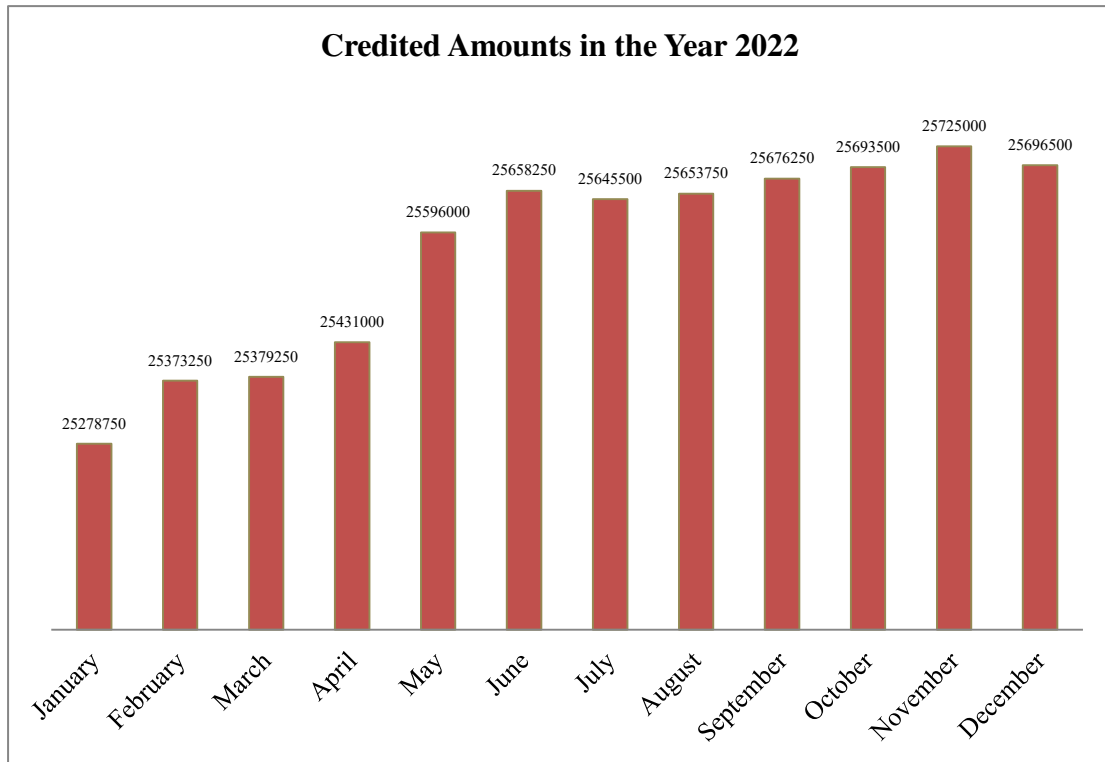
The application with all other required documents is computerized by the computer operator.

- I. Rechecking the computerized application
- II. Verifying and certifying the application and relevant documents entered into the data system by the Head of the division
- III. Upon the approval received from the Chairman for the computerized data forwarded by the Head of Division, confirmation for an active active account is granted.

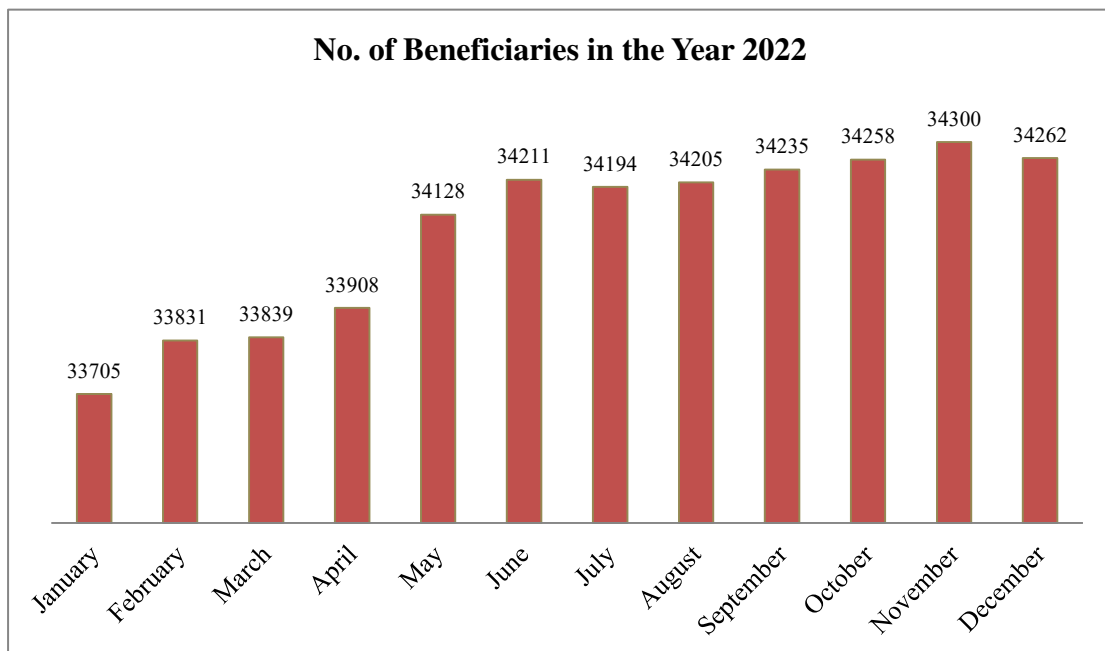
#### **10.2.2. Approval Process**

- I. After the process of computerization of applications sent by war hero’s parents as mentioned above, approval is obtained through the bank voucher for granting monthly credits under the ‘Mapiya Rekawarana’ project as follows.
- II. The Head of the Division submits the payment summary to the Chairman or Director.
- III. Approval is granted by the Chairman or Director
- IV. After confirming the payment, the Assistant Director (Finance) will proceed to bank the monthly ‘Mapiya Rekawaran’ allowance

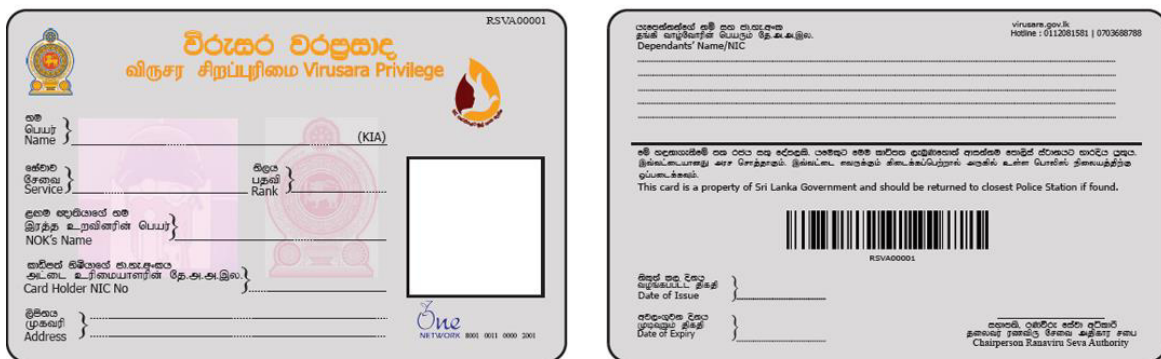

## ‘VIRUSARA’ PRIVILEGE CARD SECTION

### 11.1. Aim of the ‘Virusara’ Privilege Card Project

‘Virusara’ Privilege Card is granted by the Ranaviru Seva Authority under the direct supervision of the Ministry of Defence following the Government policy on the uplifting extension of welfare measures to war heroes and their families enabling them to obtain services and privileges with due honour and respect, in gratitude to the selfless contribution of war heroes of the Tri-services, Police and Civil Security Department, who sacrificed their lives and limbs on active duty to protect the sovereignty and territorial integrity of our motherland.



### 11.2. Phases of Granting the ‘Virusara’ Privilege Card

**Phase I** - This phase is executed with the purpose of uplifting the welfare of the disabled war heroes and next of kin of war heroes of the Tri-services, Police, and the Civil Defence Force, who sacrificed their life and limbs or were declared missing in action during the period of war. The card can be obtained by submitting the relevant document to the Ranaviru Seva Authority through the Officer-in-Charge of the District via War Hero Forums or by visiting the Ranaviru Seva Authority.

**Phase II** - Under this phase, ‘Virusara’ Privilege Cards are granted to retired personnel of the Tri-services, Police and Civil Security Department, who had served with good conduct during the period of war ranging from 1983 to 2009, all serving personnel of the Tri-services, Police and Civil Security Department, who were enlisted during the said period, serving or retired officers and civil staff to have completed 20 years of service, Other Ranks to have completed 22 years of service, Lady Officers/Woman Soldiers to have completed 15 years of service during the respective period and next of kin of personnel of the Tri-services, Police and Civil Security Department, who had laid down their life or declared missing in action during the said period.

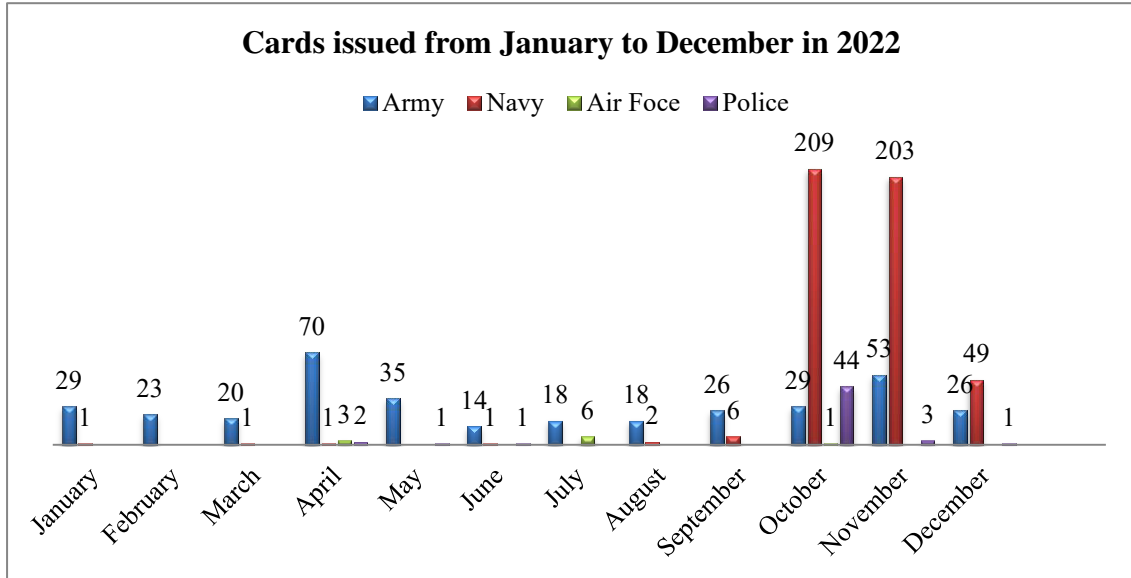

Report of the Auditor General as per Section 12 of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 on the Financial Statements of the Ranaviru Seva Authority for the year ended on 31<sup>st</sup> December 2022 and other legal and regulatory requirements

## 1. Financial Statement

### 1.1 Qualified Opinion

The audit of the financial statements of the Ranaviru Seva Authority for the year ended 31 December 2022 comprising the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2022, the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income, the statement of changes in equity, and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies, was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 and Finance Act No. 38 of 1971 to be read with the Article 154(1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka.

My report will be tabled at the Parliament in due course in line with Article 154 (6) of the Constitution.

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matters described in paragraph 1.2 of this report, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Ranaviru Seva Authority as at 31 December 2012 and its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Accounting Standards.

### 1.2 Basis for the qualified opinion

- i. No. of 1800 Accounts to which '*Mapiya Rekawarana*' allowance is credited have been maintained by the end of the current year, which have been identified out of 3917 accounts approved in the year 2019 and followed a payment. No disclosure has been made as per Section 129 (d) (I) of Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard No. 1.
- ii. As per paragraph no. 13 of Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard No. 07, the grouping of assets of a similar nature and function is required, but land and building, property and plants have not been shown as a single item for the purpose of disclosure.

- iii. No disclosure as per the Appendix (B) of Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard No. 8 in respect of the case filed by the Attorney General's Department to claim an amount of Rs. 530,380 from a Computer Assistant Officer who has resigned from the Ranaviru Seva Authority in 2011.
- iv. The interest income on Treasury Bills has been identified as Rs. 5,372,849 in the Financial Statements. However, the value of the actual interest was Rs. 3,770,210 after calculating the same based on the interest rate mentioned on the treasury bills. Accordingly, the income from the investment on treasury bills and investment assets has been overstated by Rs.1,602,639.
- v. The accuracy of the journal entries of which the total is amounting to Rs. 56,255,315 was not certified by the Accountant and journal vouchers have not been prepared. Also journal entries for deduction of the sums amounting to Rs. 300,000 and Rs. 155,342 from the Vehicle Account and Accumulated Depreciation Account respectively have not been made in respect of the Cab bearing GG-1298.
- vi. The Authority has opened a fixed deposited bearing 2596001000636707 on 29 June 2022 in the People's bank and maintained it so far. When calculating the interest income on the said fixed deposit, it was observed that a sum of Rs.396,364 has been understated in the accounts and accordingly, the interest receivable, the current asset has been understated by Rs.396,364.
- vii. I conducted my audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards (SLAuSs). My responsibilities under these auditing standards are further described under Auditor's Responsibility for the Audit of Financial Statements of this report. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified audit opinion.

### **1.3 Other Information stated in the Authority's 2022 Annual Report**

Other information means the information included in the Authority's 2022 Annual Report, but not included in the financial statements and my audit report thereon and expected to be provided to me after the date of this audit report. Management is responsible for this other information.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we will not express any form of assurance or conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially

inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If, on reading the Authority's 2022 Annual Report, I conclude that there are material misstatements, the same shall be communicated to those charged with governance for correction. If there are any further uncorrected misstatements, they will be included in the report tabled by me in Parliament in due course in terms of Article 154 (6) of the Constitution.

#### **1.4 The responsibility of the Management and those charged with governance over Financial Statements**

It is the responsibility of the Management for preparing and fair presentation of these Financial Statements in accordance with the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards and to determine the internal control required for preparing the Financial Statements free of material misstatements which might occur due to fraud and defaults.

When preparing the Financial Statements, it is the responsibility of the Management to make an assessment of the authority's ability to continue as a going concern. It is also the responsibility of the Management to prepare financial statements on a going concern basis unless there is an intention to liquidate the authority or to cease operating, or if there is no realistic alternative but to do so, and disclose the matters pertaining to going concern of the authority.

Those charged with governance are vested with the responsibility of examining the Reporting process of the Authority. As per the terms of subsection 16(1) of the National Audit Act, No.19 of 2018, the books and reports on income, expenditure, assets, and liabilities must be duly maintained enabling to preparation the annual and periodical Financial Statements of the Authority.

#### **1.5 Auditor's Responsibility for the Audit of Financial Statements**

My objective is to provide reasonable assurance that the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error and to issue an audit report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud and error and are considered material, if individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with SLAuSs, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks when providing a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material

misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the authority's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of authority's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the authority's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in the auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. However, future events or conditions may cause the authority to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

## **2. The Report on other legal and regulatory requirements**

2.1 Special provisions have been incorporated in the National Audit Act, No.19 of 2018 on the following requirements:

2.1.1 In terms of the requirements provided in section 12(a) the National Audit Act, No.19 of 2018, all information and explanations required for the audit, except the impact caused by the matters described in the part basis for the quantified opinion in my Report, were obtained by me, and in view of my investigation, the Institute had maintained proper financial records.

2.1.2 In accordance with the requirement provided in section 6(i) (d) (iii) of the National Audit Act, No.19 of 2018, the Financial Statements of the authority are consistent with the preceding year.

- 2.1.3 In accordance with the requirement provided in section 6(i) (d) (iv) of the National Audit Act, No.19 of 2018, the Financial Statements have enclosed my recommendations given in the preceding year.
- 2.2 No matter was encountered to declare the following, based on the action taken and evidence obtained, and within the limitations of quantitative matters.
- 2.2.1 As per the requirement in section 12 (d) of the National Audit Act, No.19 of 2018, any member of the governing body of the Institute has any direct or indirect interest in any contract pertaining to the authority outside general business circumstances;
- 2.2.2 As per the requirement in section 12 (e) of the National Audit Act, No.19 of 2018, except for the following observations, action has been taken not in compliance with any applicable written laws or other general or special orders issued by the governing body of the Institute;

- 2.2.3 As per the requirement in section 12 (g) of the National Audit Act, No.19 of 2018, that action has been taken not in compliance with the powers, functions and duties of the Authority; and
- 2.2.4 As per the requirement in section 12 (h) of the National Audit Act, No.19 of 2018, the resources of the authority have not been procured and utilized economically, efficiently and effectively within the time frames and in compliance with the applicable laws

**2.3 Other Audit Observations**

- I. The advance of Rs. 1,830,450 received by two officers in the year 2014 was not settled till the end of the year under review. Due to the fact that a disciplinary inquiry held against the said officers exonerated both of them, the persons responsible for these payments were not identified.
- II. A plot of land called Kiralamadakumbura, in the extent of 1 acre 1 rood 09 perches, donated to the authority in 2001 for the construction of houses, which had been assessed to Rs.1,500,000, had not been utilized and remained vacant until the end of the year under review.

- III. When examining individual loan account balances for home loans, self-employment loans, medical loans and skill development loans, there were outstanding loan installments worth Rs.2,527,509 between 5 and 26 loan installments.
- IV. The Authority was established with the aim of promoting the welfare of persons disabled, killed or missing in action of the armed forces and police and their dependents. The authority had failed to maintain a formal and reliable data system on the disabled, missing and deceased war heroes or their dependents at the end of the year under review.
- V. Out of the amount of Rs.25,366,500 received in the year 2016 from the security forces, Sri Lanka Telecom and other private institutions for the 'Virusara' privilege cards project executed by the authority, an amount of Rs.3,607,941 had not been utilized and remained in the account since December 31, 2018.
- VI. An amount of Rs.224,063 retained from the TCI Company (T.C.I ENTERPRISES PVT LTD) for the installation of cladding in the main office of the Authority had not been released until the end of the current year an investigation had not been conducted into irregularities that occurred due to the said transaction amounting to Rs. 4,481,269 in 2014.
- VII. Although the approved cadre of the Authority (without the Chairman and Vice-Chairman) shall be 89 employees, the actual cadre was 120 consisting of 64 civil officers and 56 members of the security forces as at 31 December 2022 and there was surplus of 31 employees.
- VIII. According to the decision taken in the 194<sup>th</sup> Board Meeting, approval must be obtained from the Board of Directors before investing the money, but the relevant approval was not obtained by 15 March 2023 for the fixed deposit worth Rs. 7,250,000 which was opened at the People's Bank on 22 December in 2022.
- IX. A 10% of the lottery revenue by the National Lotteries Board through selling 'Supiri Vasana Sampatha' and 'Handahana' Lotteries was granted to the authority every month through the Department of Treasury Operations. Although the lottery income to the Authority was Rs.129,826,112 for the year 2022, the Authority had received only Rs.10,193,960 as at 31 December 2022. Accordingly, Rs. 119,632,152 was receivable from the Department of Treasury Operations.
- X. According to the journals and entries maintained by the authority, 18 persons who are disabled and the next of kin of the war heroes, were paid an amount totaling to Rs.1,870,770 as medical aid for various surgeries during the year. This aid was given directly to the concerned persons without a due mechanism for making the payments to the institutions which provide medical facilities. Since there was no follow-up on that, the audit did not certify that money so granted had used for the relevant purposes.

- XI. An amount of Rs. 3192 mn. had been allocated for the construction of 1950 houses and the completion of 1700 semi-constructed houses under the 'Virusumithuru' Housing Project which was initiated in 2017 and implemented jointly by the Authority and the National Housing Development Authority. Although this project was supposed to be completed in 2019, the project term was extended to 2022. Accordingly, there was a remaining balance of Rs. 2156.9 mn. from the total project amount by 31 December 2022. The total number of houses to which even one installment from the project was paid was 1496. Accordingly, 40% of the target for providing houses had been achieved as a number of 550 beneficiaries who were partly and fully donated, and it was 15% of the entire project. Further, an amount of Rs.865,000 given to 6 beneficiaries at the beginning of the project in 2019 was to be recovered due to various controversial situations, but the said amount had not been recovered by 31 December 2022.
- XII. The single cab bearing number PR-0612 received under the Indian Loan Scheme in 2011, was registered in the name of the Secretary of the Ministry of Defense and given to the authority. But, the authority had not taken over ownership of this vehicle by 31 December 2022.
- XIII. An estimate of expenditure for various sub-projects included in the project expenditure, which is observed as the main expenditure item of the authority, was not prepared. That situation hindered cost management.

**Financial Statements and Accounting Policies for the Year 2022**

**1) Incorporation**

**1.1) Reporting Entity and Basis**

The Ranaviru Seva Authority is a government body established by the Ranaviru Seva Authority Act No. 54 of 1999, enacted by the Parliament of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka by the Gazette Notification dated 23 December 1999. The Sub-section 3 of the Ranaviru Seva Authority Act No. 54 of 1999 was later amended by the Ranaviru Seva Authority (Amendment) Act No. 7 of 2009 and Act No. 20 of 2012 respectively.

**1.2) The Prime Objective, Function and the Role**

The prime objective is to promote the welfare of the target group identified by the Ranaviru Seva Authority Act. In order to accomplish this objective, the promotion of welfare is being done under the following six functions as stipulated in the Ranaviru Seva Authority Act.

- I. To provide, and to assist in the provision of, housing
- II. To provide for the after care and rehabilitation of members of the Armed Forces and the Police Force who have become disabled in action
- III. To provide, or assist in the provision of, medical care
- IV. To enable the target group to have access to education and higher education
- V. To secure gainful employment
- VI. To set up industrial, agricultural or commercial ventures with a view to providing employment to the members who have become disabled in action

**1.3) Target Group**

Members of the Armed Forces and the Police Force who have become disabled in action and the dependents of members of the Armed Forces and the Police Force who have been killed, or are missing in action

**1.4) Address of the Head Office**

Head office is located at No. 443, Galle Road, Colombo 03.

**1.5) Cadre Details**

As per Letter No. DMS/C2/2/44 dated 16.10.2012 of the Department of Management Services, the approved cadre shall be 89 (not including the Chairman and Vice

Chairman). The total number of employees deployed in service is 64 as of 31.12.2022.

#### Accounting Year

The accounting year of the Authority is a calendar year. These financial statements are for the accounting year from 01.01.2022 to 31.12.2022.

### 1.6) Financial Statement Approved Date

Should be approved within 60 calendar days from the end of the accounting year. The Board of Management approved these financial statements on 23 February 2023.

## 2) Basis of Preparation and Conformity

### 2.1) Basis of Preparation

Financial Statements of the Authority have been prepared on the historical cost basis conforming to the accounting policies generally accepted, except for the following items of the balance sheet.

### Conformity

These financial statements are comprised of the Statement of Financial Position, Statement of Financial Performance, Statement of Cash Flow and Total Net Assets/ Change of Equity Statement.

These financial statements have been prepared in conformity to Sri Lanka Accounting Standards introduced in the year 2009 and 2012; Procurement Guidelines - 2006 (Goods and Work) and Inland Revenue Act No 24 of 2017. Actions are taken in line with the “Sri Lanka Statement of recommended practice for the not-for-profit Organization” introduced by the Institute of Chartered Accountants at an instance where a certain transaction is not covered by Sri Lanka Accounting Standards, International Accounting Policies for Public Institutions are used and in case it too doesn't apply.

### 2.3) Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The Board of Management of the Ranaviru Seva Authority is responsible for the preparation of these financial statements that give a true and fair view in accordance with Paragraph 19 of Sri Lanka Accounting Standards No. 01.

## 2.4) Functional and Presenting Currency

Currency of the Authority is Sri Lanka Rupees and it has been used in the preparation of the Financial Statements.

## 3) Significant Accounting Policies

The additional information which is considered by the Board of Management as important in the understanding of the users is highlighted in this section.

The Accounting Policies set out below have been applied consistently to all period presented in the financial statements unless otherwise indicated. Accounting standards which were changed and the special standards which have an impact on the financial position of the Authority are briefly presented in this section.

### 3.1) Accounting for Government Grants

#### Recurrent Grants

Recurring grants received from the Government are adjusted to the Income and Expenditure Account.

#### Capital Grants

Capital grants received for the work of authority are accounted for in the government contribution (capital) account and capital grants received to transfer to other institutions are accounted for in the relevant accounts.

### 3.2) Assets and the Basis of Valuation of Assets

If the value of the assets purchased from the year 2022 is less than Rs. 10,000 and the life span is less than one year, they are included as consumer goods and indicated as an expense in this year. If the cost of the asset is more than Rs. 10,000 and the useful life is more than one year it is treated and accounted as a fixed asset.

In order to find the cost of the fixed assets received as donations, market values have been used.

#### 3.2.1) Tangible Asset and Deprecation

Depreciation has been calculated according to the straight-line method at Cost Value as per the following percentages per annum.

### 3.3) Inventories

Merchandise Inventory, Stationary and Consumable stock is valued at the cost. The cost is calculated on the First in First Out (FIFO) method.

### 3.4) Debtors and Other Receivable Values

Debtors and Other Receivables are stated at the estimated value of realization.

### 3.5) Liability and Provision

#### 3.5.1) Current Liability

Current Liabilities are payables which need to be paid on the due dates or within one year from the Statement of Financial Position.

The operational cost of Virusara Cards which was introduced by Ministry of Defense is borne by the sponsored funds received from the Three Forces and the Police. The relevant sponsored funds which is left after bearing of relevant expenses is shown under Current Liabilities which will be given back to the Three Forces and the Police according to the proportionate rates that they have sponsored. Current liabilities are amounts payable on due dates and payable within one year from the date of the statement of financial position.

Since it is the responsibility of the Authority to construct houses for the relevant beneficiaries from the funds donated by various parties for the Virusara Housing Scheme executed to construct houses for the war heroes, the amounts received have been taken into account under current liabilities.

#### 3.5.2) Provision

In accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting standard No. 19, the provision for gratuity has been calculated based on below mentioned variables and assumptions.

#### Variables

- Average salary for last three months
- Past service period
- Future service period ( up to retirement)
- Annual Salary Increment Rate (Base on the salary scale as stipulated in the Scheme of Recruitment)
- Discount Rate (Treasury Bill Interest Rate)

### 3.5.3) Contingency Liabilities

#### 3.6.1) Lottery Income

A percentage of the turnover received from the 'Supiri Vasana Sampatha' Lottery is credited to Government Consolidated Funds on behalf of the Ranaviru Seva Authority by the National Lotteries Board, and the said amount is accounted for as Lottery Income. The grants which are not released by National Lottery Board to the Authority are accounted for as Lottery Income Receivable.

The authority has made 100% allocations for the capital expenses incurred in respect of the project programs and written off through 'Income and Expenditure Accounts' and maintained them.

### **3.6.2) Donation**

Local donors donate money to Ranaviru Seva Authority, and the money is given for the educational purposes of the war heroes' children. In addition, this money is also given for the special tasks proposed by them.

### **3.6.3) Investments**

The Ranaviru Seva Authority maintains fixed deposits in the National Savings Bank, People's Bank and Bank of Ceylon and the interest income is used to provide scholarships to the children of the war heroes and bear the administrative expenses of the authority.

Interest income generated from the Fixed Deposits of the Ranaviru Seva Authority at National Savings Bank and Bank of Ceylon is given for the education of the children of war heroes.

Cash belonging to the current accounts of the Authority is invested in short-term deposits of 06 and 03 months and 07 days at the Bank of Ceylon.

Amounts allocated to gratuity payments are invested in the treasury bills of Bank of Ceylon.

Insurance claims are shown under the Other Income in the Statement of Financial Position and accounted for under the Relevant Repair Expenses.

**Note 73**

The total net assets of the authority have increased by Rs. 99,028,324.68 in the year 2022 compared to the year 2021. This has been shown in the Statement of Assets/Equity Changes on page No 04. With the decrease in income in the year 2022 compared to the year 2021, it was able to reduce general administrative recurrent expenditure and certain project expenditures through management, and therefore, an increase in net assets could be seen by reducing the deficiency in the current year compared to the previous year.

**Note 74**

The income of The Ranaviru Seva Authority depended on the income sources which can be controlled by the Board of Management and the sources outside the control of the Board of Management. Out of these two sources, the sources outside the control of the Board of Management make a considerable contribution. Sources outside the control of the Board of Management of the Ranaviru Seva Authority are Government Contributions and the income received from Supiri Vasana Sampatha Lottery. Even though the amounts utilized for the welfare promotion tasks of the target groups were increased for a considerable period, the income has been reducing since the income from the lotteries and the government contributions are not increasing.
