THE EMBLEM OF THE UNIVERSITY



The emblem of the University takes the form of a circle with three concentric circles placed close together on the periphery, all on a background of yellow. In the center of this circle is a smaller concentric circle enclosing a full bloom lotus, *Nelumbo nucifera*, in abstract form, and consisting of two tiers of petals one underneath the other. In the center of the circle, stylized stamens enclosed in two concentric circles surround the receptacle. Between the outer set of concentric circles and the central lotus is a wide circular band carrying the motto of the University on the upper half of the band, while the name of the University appears in the lower half, both written in Sinhala characters. The Motto, taken from an ancient Buddhist text, reads;

‘Vijja Uppatitam Settha’

(‘among all that rise knowledge is greatest’)

THE UNIVERSITY



The University of Sri Jayewardenepura situated in the heart of Colombo boasts of a long and glorious history. Having been established in the 1959 at Gangodawila, its roots can be traced back to the Vidyodaya Pirivena established in 1873 by Most Venerable Hikkaduwe Sri Sumangala Thero at Maligakanda. Today the University pays homage to 63 years of history while paying tribute to journey of 149 years.

The University of Sri Jayewardenepura, formerly known as Vidyodaya Pirivena was the essence of the revival of Sri Lankan Education. It is the second oldest University in Sri Lanka and the first University established in Independent Ceylon.

Today the University stands strong with eleven Faculties, Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences, Faculty of Applied Sciences, Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce, Faculty of Medical Sciences, Faculty of Graduate Studies, Faculty of Technology, Faculty of Engineering, Faculty of Allied Health Sciences, Faculty of Dental Sciences, Faculty of Urban and Aquatic Bioresources and its latest addition Faculty of Computing. The University is home to over 15,000 Undergraduates and over 3000 postgraduate students. It is considered the largest University in terms of student population in Sri Lanka.

The University is also in the forefront of research and innovation with a research council of over 22 research centres and an Invention, Innovation and Venture Creation Council with over 50 Entrepreneurs and stakeholders with over 15 patents.

The University has also maintained cordial relationship with many international bodies of education and have signed over 60 Memoranda of Understanding (MoUs) with recognized internationally acclaimed universities; and over 60 MoUs with established international and local companies. The university strives to give its students an international experience, offering student exchange programmes and internships.

Throughout the years the University of Sri Jayewardenepura has managed to develop in many areas by expanding its horizons. It will continue this journey of reaching many milestones which will ensure that the University will produce smart, efficient, skillful and professional individuals that will aid in the development of our mother nation.

VICE-CHANCELLOR'S OVERVIEW OF THE PROGRESS IN 2022

The year 2022 is yet another fulfilling year for the University of Sri Jayewardenepura (USJ) despite the socio economic challenges the country had to endure during the year. The University commenced its activities for the New Year with the blessings of the noble triple gem in the ceremony held on the 2nd of January 2022.

The composition of the University as at 31st December 2022 included 11 faculties of study namely; Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences (FHSS) (established in 1959), Faculty of Applied Sciences (FAS) (established first as Faculty of Science in 1961), Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce (FMSC) (established in 1972), Faculty of Medical Sciences (FMS) (established in 1993), Faculty of Graduate Studies (FGS) (established in 1996), Faculty of Technology (FoT) (established in 2016), Faculty of Engineering (FoE) (established in 2016), Faculty of Allied Health Sciences (FAHS) (established in 2019), Faculty of Dental Sciences (FDS) (established in 2021), Faculty of Urban and Aquatic Bioresources (FUAB) (established in 2022) and Faculty of Computing (FoC) (established in 2022).

During 2022, USJ established two new faculties. Faculty of Urban and Aquatic Bioresources was established as the 10th faculty of USJ by order of Gazette Extraordinary No. 2267/35 dated 17th February 2022 and Faculty of Computing was established as the 11th faculty of USJ by order of Gazette Extraordinary No 2285/09 dated 22nd June 2022. The opening of the Faculty of Dental Sciences, which was established in December 2021, was on 6th January 2022 with the ceremony being graced by Senior Prof. Sampath Amaratunge, Chairman, University Grants Commission (also a former Vice-Chancellor of USJ). The expansion of study fields through the establishment of new faculties signifies the University's endeavour to provide the youth of our nation with the necessary knowledge and skills for keeping up with the newest trends in the global arena.

In addition to the above 11 faculties, USJ also has an affiliated institute, the Postgraduate Institute of Management (PIM), which provides much needed postgraduate management education for professionals looking to enhance their knowledge and climb up the ladder in their respective careers. They have also expanded their operations to the Middle East signifying their excellence as a pioneer in management education.

The year 2022 also marked the appointment of Deans to five faculties of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura. Senior Prof. Pathmalal M. Manage was reappointed for a 2nd term as the Dean of FGS on 14th March 2022 and Prof. Shirantha Heenkenda was also reappointed as the Dean of FHSS for a 2nd term on 1st July 2022. Prof. Upul Subasinghe was appointed as the Dean of FAS on 16th March 2022 following the end of term of Prof. Laleen Karunanayake while Dr. Thilaksiri Bandara was appointed as the Dean of FoE on 15th July 2022 following the end of term of Prof. Chaminda Konthesingha. Senior Prof. Pradeep Jayaweera was appointed as the first Dean of the newly established FUAB on 28th July 2022. With these new additions to the leadership team, USJ has managed to successfully overcome the challenges posed by the prevailing economic crisis of Sri Lanka.

Senior Prof. Sudantha Liyanage, former Vice-Chancellor, University of Sri Jayewardenepura was appointed as a Council Member to the Council of the Association of Commonwealth Universities representing Constituency II (Bangladesh, India, Pakistan, Sri Lanka) for a period of three years from 1st August 2022. He participated in his first Council meeting held on 23rd and 24th November 2022 in London, United Kingdom. A Sri Lankan senior academic and administrator being appointed to such a prestigious position in a world renowned higher education related institution will definitely bring in more opportunities for Sri Lanka and the South Asian region.

USJ stood out as a pioneering higher education institution in Sri Lanka in terms of research by first becoming the 3rd best university in Sri Lanka in the Webometrics Ranking of January 2022 and then proceeding to become the 2nd best in Sri Lanka in the same ranking by July 2022. Furthermore, in acknowledgement and appreciation of the commitment and hard work invested in research by the academic staff of USJ, the Research Awards Ceremony was held on 18th March 2022 where more than 200 academic staff members were bestowed with awards and accolades.

As an endeavour to improve the infrastructure facilities of USJ, the construction of two multipurpose buildings for FHSS and FMSC is underway. Marking the completion of the new multipurpose building of FHSS, it was named as the “Sri Wimaladharma Mansion” and was ceremonially declared open on 16th December 2022. Furthermore, the auditorium of the Sumangala Mansion (Sri Sumangala Auditorium a.k.a. *Sri Sumangala Sabha Sadaya*) in the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences was refurbished and was ceremonially declared open on 17th February 2022. The development of such infrastructure facilities contributes to providing the students with a quality education experience.

Apart from achieving excellence in academia, USJ continues to be a pioneer in the local and international sports arena as well. In acknowledgement and appreciation of the hard work and dedication of the young sportsmen and sportswomen of USJ, the 45th Colours Awarding Ceremony was held on 16th March 2022 where 517 USJ students were awarded with colours.

The Convocation Ceremony is one of the most anticipated events of a university and is also the highlight of any university student’s life. The 47th Convocation Ceremony which was scheduled to be held in the year 2021 was pushed back to 2022 due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Therefore, the 47th Convocation was held from 26 – 28 February 2022 and the 48th Convocation Ceremony was held from 21 – 23 October 2022 at the Bandaranaike Memorial International Conference Hall where over 6,000 graduates in both ceremonies were conferred with Bachelors, Masters and PhD degrees.

The year 2022 also marked an important milestone in USJ’s endeavour to be more environmentally friendly. USJ became the first university in South Asia to report its Carbon Footprint according to the ISO 14064-1: 2018 standard and obtain the ISO certification. USJ achieved this milestone as a part of “USJ Road to Carbon Neutral” program with the hard work and execution of the action plan by the Centre for Sustainability.

The year drew to a close with the stepping down of Senior Prof. Sudantha Liyanage from the post of the Vice-Chancellor with effect from 22nd December 2022. Prof. Upub Subasinghe, Dean of FAS was appointed as the Acting Vice-Chancellor of USJ with effect from 23rd December 2022 until such time that a new Vice-Chancellor is appointed to the University. USJ is immensely grateful for

the service rendered by Senior Prof. Sudantha Liyanage towards the development of the University and the higher education system in Sri Lanka.

The year 2022 recorded an increased number of undergraduates enrolled in the university from 14,762 in 2021 to 15,129. Despite the difficulties in accommodating the increased student intake, the University managed to successfully provide a quality higher education experience to the youth of our nation during the year 2022.

As at 31st December 2022, USJ recorded a slight increase in academic staff from 1,102 in 2021 to 1,128 in 2022. The number of non-academic staff decreased from 1,169 in 2021 to 1,128 in 2022. The marginal increase in academic staff numbers and the decrease in non-academic staff numbers is owing to the recruitment ban imposed by the Government of Sri Lanka due to the economic crisis.

Despite the prevailing financial crisis in Sri Lanka, USJ recorded a dramatic increase in internal revenue as at 31st December 2022 of Rs. 1,312 million from the Rs. 649 million recorded in 2021.

In the year under review, the University of Sri Jayewardenepura faced many challenges due to the prevailing economic crisis in Sri Lanka. However, despite the challenges, USJ achieved excellence through sheer perseverance and dedication of its staff, students and the community and will continue to be one of the top universities in Sri Lanka in the years to come.

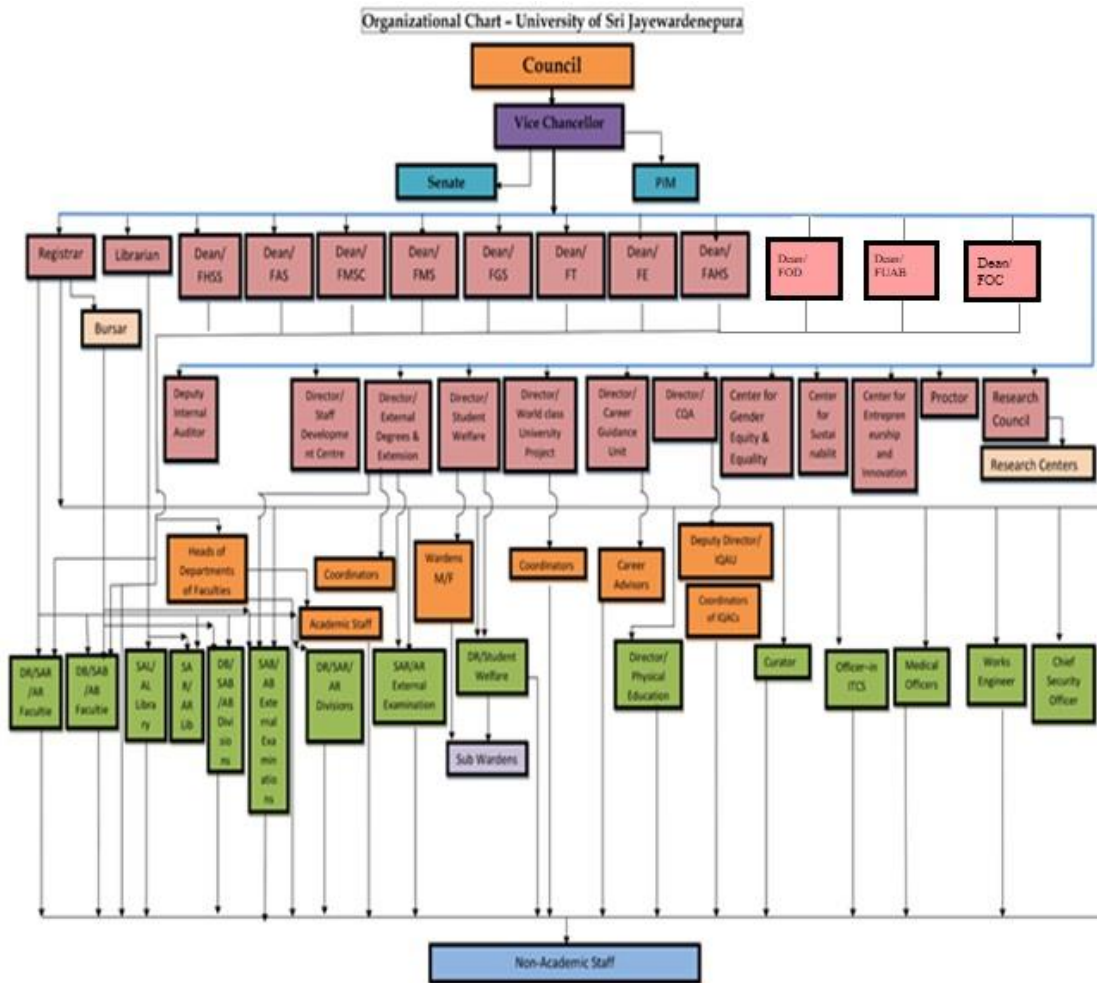

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE OF THE UNIVERSITY OF SRI JAYAWARDENEPURA

University is committed to having good governance practices in place and applying highest standards of all functions performed during the year of 2018. This enhances the compliance with relevant statutory provisions, improves transparency of transactions, accountability and responsibility for the government funds.

- 1) Compliance with the universities act. No 16 1978

- Composition of the Council, Senate and the faculty boards has been decided by the act accordingly all appointments to the governing bodies to the university have been made according to the provisions specified in the universities act.
- The council of the university act as the executive and the governing authority of the university. General Administrative, academic and financial policy decisions are taken with recommendation of the Senate, finance committee and other sub committees of the university.
- Senate is appointed and act as the academic authority of the university .Senate shell have the control and general direction of the instructions, education, research and examinations in the university.
- Quorum of the council and senate, minimum no of meetings to be held, duration of the, council, scope of power and functions of the boards, also specified in the act. University has complied in specified requirements.
- General administrations, academic administrations and finance administrations are performed according to the provisions of the act
- Student's intakes for all undergraduate programs were allocated through the university grants commission and curriculums of all degree programs were approved by the university grants commission.
- Budget allocations where given by the university Grants Commission and expenses have been incurred as budget line specified in the annual budget.

2) Compliance with Government financial regulations and government procedures.

As a government institution mainly funded by the treasury of Sri Lanka, All financial transactions of the university are conducted and reported in compliance with the financial regulations, treasury circulars and guild line and circulars issued by the university grants commission.

3) Compliance with Government Procurement Guidelines.

All goods and services, works, constructions and consultancies have been acquired during the year of 2018 in accordance with the procurement guideline of Sri Lanka. Procurement committees are appointed by the ministry secretary with the recommendation of the vice chancellor. Technical evaluation committees are appointed with the recommendation of the procurement committees. Preparation of bidding documents, bid opening, bid documentation, bid evaluation, composition of the procurement committees and the technical evaluation committees, payments to the committees are made as per the provisions of the procurement guidelines.

04) Compliance with establishment code and Scheme of recruitments.

All staff matters including salaries, appointments, promotions, increments, leaves, disciplinary actions have been governed by the provisions in the university establishment code and scheme of recruitments. If any matter is not covered by the university establishment code, it refers to the government establishment code in Sri Lanka. Amount of the salaries and allowances are decided by the circulars issued by the treasury and adopted by the university grants commission.

5) Sri Lanka Accounting Standards (SLPSAS), Lanka accounting Standards (LKAS) international financial reporting standards (IFRS)

Financial Statements of the university are prepared and presented in accordance with public sector accounting standards. Lanka Accounting standards and International financial reporting standards are applied for reporting the transaction where the public sector transactions are not been introduced.

06) Internal policies and procedures have been adopted with approval of the council for the matters which is not covered by other statutory provisions and within the scope specify by the statutory provisions. Eg. Segregation of duties, approval, authorization and certification limits etc.

AUDIT COMMITTEE REPORT

Audit Committee Report

Introduction

The Audit Committee appointed for the year 2022 comprises of three non-Executive, Independent Governing Council Members of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura (University) under the provisions on paragraph 7.4.1 of Public Enterprises Guideline for Good Governance.

In the year 2022, four (04) Audit Committee meetings were held with the participation of the Registrar, Bursar and the relevant Administrative Staff at the invitation. The Superintendent of Audit of the University' who is the representative of the Auditor General of Sri Lanka was also in attendance. In addition, the Internal Auditor of the University Grants Commission also participated the meetings. The Audit Committee performs its duties according to the scope specified in the Public Enterprises Guidelines for Good Governance and makes recommendations to strengthen the Internal Control Systems on the Financial Management and improve the Administration procedures in the University.

Progress

During the Year under review, the Audit Committee has made several recommendations, directions and proposals which have paved the way towards strengthening the internal controls and processes of the University including the following,

- a) ensure financial statement's integrity,
- b) ensure that the University has an adequate system of internal controls to safeguard its assets,
- c) ensure that the University maintains a system to monitor compliance with laws, rules and regulations including relevant accounting and financial reporting standards,
- d) overall supervision of the internal audit functions and approve the Internal Audit plan for the year,

Important matters carried out during the year under review are summarized as follows.

- Reviewed, evaluated and made recommendations based on Internal Audit Reports during the year under review including the reports of the seven faculties, which were issued by the Internal Audit Division of the University,
- Liaised with the Auditor General's representative and directed the officers and Internal Auditor of the University to take follow-up actions on weaknesses and lapses highlighted on audit queries and reports of the Auditor General,
- Continuously monitored the responses submitted in relation to audit queries and its follow up actions,
- Continuously monitored the recovery process of violation of bonds and agreements,

- Reviewed, evaluated and made recommendations to improve the systems and internal controls on human resource development, employee attendance, inventory and stock verification, hostel charges and dues, capital contract administration, research grants, procurements, payroll management, financial management, assets management, contractual services recruitments promotions payment of retiring benefits, violation of bonds and agreements environmental management etc.,

Throughout 2022, the university continued to adjust to our new way of life in the face of the COVID-19 virus and a significant economic crisis. Despite the challenges faced at the University, sustainability remained a top priority, and progress was made towards the goal of the University becoming carbon neutral. While evaluating the efficacy of projects and reporting on their sustainability, we always consider the 17 UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). In 2022, the CFS was able to successfully report on and achieve accreditation for a broader range of goals than ever before.

In the following report, results and progress updates on projects are detailed.

Faculty of Computing (FoC) is the newest and the very first faculty dedicated solely to the emerging computing and related disciplines among public sectors universities in Sri Lanka. In adhere with national export strategy and in response to the ever-increasing demand from IT and BPO service sector for a continued supply of workforce with information age skills, the University of Sri Jayewardenepura took up the challenge for establishment of FoC. With this Faculty, the University comprises a total of eleven Faculties.

- Times Higher Education (THE) Impact Rankings

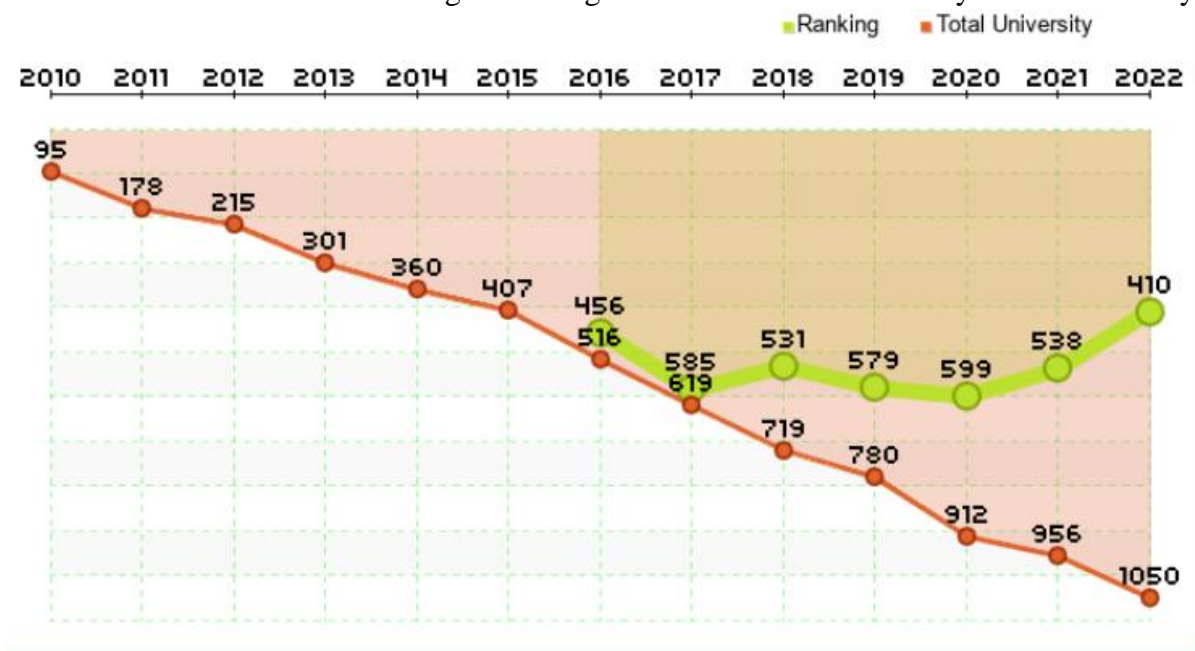
UI Green Metric University World Rankings

The University achieved a world ranking of 410 out of 1050 of participants from 85 countries. The USJ has increased its overall ranking by 128 places since 2021. The 2022 ranking was based on a score of 6,465 points (5,250 in 2020) which is broken down into 6 categories. The scoring system allows us to analyse performance by category and identify areas for future improvement.

Higher rankings can be attributed to the university's dedication to the Carbon Zero project which aims to offset the carbon produced on campus. Achievements have been made in this area through the continued reforestation works at the university's 3 main forest projects. Yagirala – Wet zone Tropical Rainforest, Ittapanna – Mangrove Forest and Karugalagaswewa – Mixed Dry Evergreen Forest.

The Center for Sustainability of University of Sri Jayewardenepura has also made significant developments in the process of achieving the ISO 14064 certification, while still ongoing, the initial audit has been completed and the process is well underway.

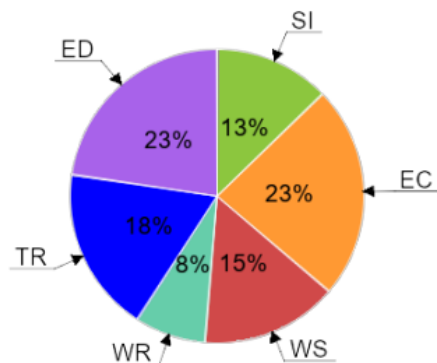


Figure 1.1 Overall Score Diagram

2.1 Agreement Signed Between USJ and CIIE for Academic Cooperation

Under this agreement, a special intake of Chinese students will be enrolled in the Master of Business Economics (MBEc) program offered by the Department of Business Economics.

Nimal (*Dean – Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce*), Prof. Saman Yapa (*Chairman – Board of Study in Business Studies*), Dr. Janaka Fernando (*Head – Department of Business Economics; Coordinator – Master of Business Economics (MBEc) Programme*), Dr. Sandamali Galdolage (*Director – International Affairs, Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce*), Dr. P. P. Lalanie (*Senior Lecturer – Department of Business Economics*) and Mr. Thisara Samarasinghe (*Head of Operations – CIIE*). Mr. Weilin Chen (*Managing Director – CIIE*), virtually joined the event from China.

2.2- Innovative Research: USJ Researchers published 38 Scopus Indexed papers in October 2022.

Researchers from Science, Medical, Technology, Engineering, and Graduate Studies Faculties published 38 research papers in Journals indexed by Elsevier Scopus during October 2022. Around 88 researchers from USJ contributed to this achievement.

4.1 Waste, Energy Consumption and Other On-Campus Sustainability Efforts:

USJ became the 1st University in South Asia to report its Carbon Footprint according to ISO standards



University of Sri Jayewardenepura

became the first university in South Asia to report its Carbon Footprint according to the ISO 14064-1: 2018 standard. USJ achieved this milestone as a part of “USJ Road to Carbon Neutral” program with the hard work and execution of the action plan by The Center for Sustainability.

The Center for Sustainability of University of Sri Jayewardenepura accomplished this certification by completing the disclosure of the Carbon Footprint of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura for the academic year 2019- from 1st of January 2019 to 31st of December 2019, according to ISO 14064-1: 2018 Standard. This statement included operational activities with all applicable emission sources. Under this program Center of Sustainability of USJ was able to report 518.40 tonnes of Carbon Dioxide Equivalents (CO₂e), 2,406.91 tonnes of CO₂e and 913.25 tonnes of CO₂e sums up to 3,838.56 tonnes of CO₂e in total emission emit by USJ within 2019. This reporting has been verified in accordance with ISO 14064-3:2019 as meeting requirements of ISO 14064-1: 2018

The Center for Sustainability received this Certificate Award on Thursday, 20th of October and the award ceremony held from at 2.30 pm – 4.00 pm at the New Senate Boardroom. The Center for Sustainability is a body for environmental extension, research and community outreach unit, linked to the Department of Forestry and Environmental Science (DFES), University of Sri Jayewardenepura. The Center for Sustainability promotes environmental protection and sustainable development in the country through industry support and productive University-Industry partnerships.

4.2 New Buildings:

Diyasaru Park AKA Thalawathugoda Biodiversity Study Park is a wetland artificially built near the new Parliament Complex in Sri Jayawardanapura in a marshland. Park covers approximately 60 acres with artificial ponds and canals where you could see over 50 varieties of migratory birds, over 15 fish varieties including three endemics to Sri Lanka, and over 25 butterfly species. Diyasaru park is managed by the Wetland Management Division of Sri Lanka Land Reclamation and Development Corporation

Regardless of the location and process, citizen science brings everyone into the important work of learning more about and protecting the planet earth. GEF, The GEF Small Grants Program, UNDP has funded and collaborated with the Center for Sustainability for making the Citizens Science Corner into a reality.

Dr. Suren Batagoda Center for Mangrove Conservation and Climate Resilience USJ at Ittapana, Kalutara now open for the public

Dr. Suren Batagoda Center for Mangrove Conservation and Climate Resilience at Ittapana, Kalutara-The newest field research center of the Department of Forestry and Environmental Science- was opened for the public on 9th December 2022 by Senior Professor Sudantha Liyanage, the Vice Chancellor, USJ. 5.1 Japura University: Towards New Dimensions in Education

The Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences of the University marks another milestone in its outstanding contribution to higher learning in the country, by commencing its new academic year with the advent of the New Year, 2022. 5.3– National and International Sports Achievements by USJ Students in 2022

University of Sri Jayewardenepura has won the Inter University Championship 2022 by scoring 365.5 points by the end of the games and retain the overall championship for the 4th time. Inter University Championship 2022 games started with the Men’s and Women’s badminton championship on November 11, 2022, and carried over till January 8, 2022 with the participation of over Sportsmen and Women representing 16 state universities for 22 sports disciplines. The Games, conducted by the Sri Lanka University Sports Association (SLUSA) with the financial backing of the University Grant Commission (UGC). USJ has won the Inter University Championship in year 2015, 2016, 2017, 2019 (SLUG) earlier. The Inter University Championship 2022 held after 2 years break due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Winners from this Inter University Championship will be set up into the pool to represent Sri Lanka in the World University Games scheduled to be held from July 28 to Aug 8, 2023 in China.

S. A. T. Dasun, a second-year undergrad of the Faculty of Applied Sciences of Sri Jayewardenepura University has been making a name for himself in the world of athletics for some time now. He has set a new tournament record in the 2022 inter-university championship games in the high jump event held on November 27th, 2022 at the Sugathadasa Stadium. Competing in the high jump event of the athletics section, Dasun set a new tournament record with a jump of 2.14 meters, breaking the previous record of 2.06 meters.

Lahiru Keshan Pathirana set a new record in men’s shot put with 13.27 meters distance record which broke the previous inter university games record of 13.23 meters and set a new record in Men’s Discus Throw with the distance of 42.90 meters. He is a second-year student of the Faculty of Applied Sciences of the University. Lahiru was also able to set a new record in the 47th Inter Provincial Games held on December 2022 representing Sabaragamuwa Province. These activities aim to strengthen the capacities of higher education institutions in waste management, providing advisory services to municipalities and companies, improving the international profile of institutions and developing high quality teaching and research.

The project team is made up of specialists in the area of Management and Engineering in order to achieve a more comprehensive approach to the issue of waste management. Prof Kennedy Gunawardana, Dr. Dayananda Ambalangodage, Dr Anil Fernando, Dr Kingsly Karunarathne and Mr Ranil Peiris from Faculty of Management and Commerce involve this project.

2. Common course code structure for Postgraduate Programs of the USJ:

A set of guidelines has been developed by the CQA to introduce a common code structure for the postgraduate degree programs of USJ, after the evaluation of the existing course codes of the postgraduate study programs offered by the University. These guidelines were presented at a meeting held on 21.09.2021 with the participation of the Director, Postgraduate Institute of Management (PIM)

and the Chairpersons of Study Boards and Coordinators of both FGS and FMSC. It was decided to revise this proposed scheme based on the observations and suggestions made by the participants of the meeting. Subsequently, the final version was developed by the Faculty of Graduate Studies of the University with the concurrence of the CQA and it has been submitted for the approval of the Senate.

3. Revised Quality Assurance Policy Manual:

The existing quality assurance (QA) policy manual was revised by the to reflect the changes taken place in the QA policy framework of the University Grants Commission (UGC) for Sri Lankan Universities. This policy manual covers the aims of internal quality assurance; the details of the Senate Standing Committee on Quality Assurance (SSCQA); the composition, the responsibilities and the functions of the CQA of the University; the role of Internal Quality Assurance Cells (IQACs) of institutes/faculties/units of USJ, and the role of Administrative, Finance and Academic Support Divisions of USJ. The terms of reference of officers of the CQA were also revised and incorporated into this manual.

The revised manual was presented at the SSCQA Meeting of USJ held on 27.01.2022 and thereafter, shared with the IQAC Coordinators of institutes/faculties/units to obtain their comments. The first QA Policy Manual of the University was prepared in 2013 and it was subsequently revised in 2017. The CQA of USJ has the right to periodically revise this policy manual to suit the changes in the national level QA policies and procedures developed by the Quality Assurance Council (QAC) of UGC. Thereafter, the approval of the Senate and the Council of the USJ is obtained for this policy manual.

4. Revised Operating Guidance for Internal Quality Assurance Cells (IQACs) of institutes/faculties/units of USJ:

The existing Operating Guidance for IQACs of institutes/faculties/units of USJ was also revised to reflect the changes taken place in the QA policy framework of the UGC for Sri Lankan universities. The revised operating guidance was presented at the SSCQA Meeting of USJ held on 27.01.2022 and thereafter, it was shared with the IQAC Coordinators of institutes/faculties/units to obtain their comments. The first Operating Guidance for IQACs of institutes/faculties/units of USJ was prepared in 2014 and it was subsequently revised in 2017. The CQA of USJ has the right to periodically revise this operating guidance to suit the changes in the national level QA policies and procedures developed by the QAC of UGC. Thereafter, the approval of the Senate and the Council of the USJ is obtained for the document.

5. Policy on Academic Ethics and Accountability:

The Policy on Academic Ethics and Accountability of University of Sri Jayewardenepura (USJ) has been prepared as a generic document, which could be applied to any institute/ faculty/unit of USJ. This policy covers the principles of ethics and accountability for academic staff of USJ and proposes a model to compute the work load and work norms of the academic staff. This policy document provides the basis to introduce an ‘Academic Performance Model’ in USJ in the future.

The final draft of the ‘Policy on Academic Ethics and Accountability’ was presented at the Senate Sub Committee on Quality Assurance (SSQA) meeting of the University held on 06.12.2021. Thereafter, it was sent again for the comments of the Deans and the QA Cell Coordinators of the faculties of study. The comments received at this stage was also incorporated into the final version of the policy document and the approval of the Senate and the Council of the USJ is obtained for the document.

6. Policy on Occupational Health and Safety:

The occupational health and safety policy of University of Sri Jayewardenepura (USJ) specifies the principles and activities that promote the health and safety in the workplace of all categories of staff and in the educational process of all student groups. In this policy, all categories of staff refer to the academic, administrative, non-academic and academic support staff, and all student groups refer to postgraduate, undergraduate and extension program students of USJ. In the policy, the workplace of the academic staff will cover the activities conducted within as well as outside the university premises in relation to the teaching, learning and assessment of study programs offered by the University, and their research and community engagement activities. Similarly, the education process of the students refers to the teaching, learning and assessment, research and community engagement activities in relation to the study programs that they are enrolled in. This too includes the activities that they do both inside and outside the university premises. Hence, this policy broadly applies to all categories of staff and students of USJ, and describes the responsibilities as to their occupational health and safety, and measures taken in this regard at USJ.

7. Concept Paper on Conduct of Internal Quality Assurance Reviews at the University of Sri Jayewardenepura:

A concept paper developed to conduct Internal Quality Assurance Reviews (IQAR) in the University of Sri Jayewardenepura (USJ) to assess the progress of its QA activities. This will enable the University to assess the current level of its QA activities at both university level and study program level, and take necessary remedial actions. Further, this will also provide the basis for continuous QA at USJ, and sharing best practices among the Institutes/Faculties/Units of USJ responsible for academic programs. The

university level assessment will be done by the CQA periodically based on the criteria and standards of the Institutional Review (IR) Manual, while the program level assessment will be done by the IQAC of the respective Institute/Faculty/Unit of USJ based on the criteria and standards of the Program Review (PR) Manual.

8. Programme Reviews:

(i) Faculty of Allied Health Sciences:

The Site Visit of the Programme Review of the Faculty of Allied Health Sciences was held on 27-28.10.2022. The following degree programmes were evaluated as one (1) Cluster. The Panel of Reviewers is given in the Table below.

FACULTY OF GRADUATE STUDIES



The Faculty of Graduate Studies (FGS) was established in the University in January 1996 under Section 48A of the Universities Act No 16 of 1978. According to the Act, the Faculty is the main administrative centre for promoting research and providing courses of study leading to higher degrees and other academic distinctions. The Faculty's vision is "to firmly establish itself as a centre of excellence for advanced learning, research and scholarship both within and outside the domain of the country".

The FGS is under the oversight of a Dean who guides the academic and administrative functions of the Faculty. An Assistant Registrar heads the operational division while a Senior Assistant Bursar heads the finance division.

The academic Programmes of the FGS are conducted through 9 Boards of Study, which are in close collaboration with other faculties and academic departments in the university. These Boards of Study are Humanities, Social Sciences, Life Sciences, Physical Sciences, Management Studies and Commerce, Medical Sciences, Multidisciplinary Studies, Engineering and Industrial Technology. The programmes offered by the Faculty include Certificate Courses, Post Graduate Diplomas, One year Masters Degrees, Masters Degrees by course work and research and Higher Degree Programmes by research only. All the programs are aligned along with the Sri Lanka Qualification Framework, which sets the benchmark of higher education in the country.

Ethics Review Committee (ERC) of the Faculty of Graduate Studies

For the year 2022, the ERC-AS received six applications (five certificates were issued and one resubmission) and the REC-HSS received seven applications (six certificates were issued and one application was rejected).

Certificate Course on Research Methodology & Scientific Writing

In 2022, two batches of the Certificate Course in Research Methodology and Scientific Writing were completed.

The first batch of students was commenced on 13th of January 2022 and a total of 309 students enrolled in the course.

The course for the second batch was commenced on 18th of July 2022 and a total of 122 students enrolled in the course.

International Conference on Multidisciplinary Approaches – 2022

On the 16th and 17th of December 2022, the International Conference on Multidisciplinary Approaches (iCMA) was conducted at the University of Sri Jayewardenepura. "Multidisciplinary Approaches Leading to Disruptive Innovation for Development" was the conference's theme. The inaugural ceremony took place at the Senate Board Room.

The chief guest was Senior Professor Sampath Amaratunge (Chairman of University Grants Commission) and guest of honour was Senior Professor Sudantha Liyanage (Vice-Chancellor of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura). The 9th International Conference on Multidisciplinary Approaches 2022 was chaired by Senior Professor M. M. Pathmalal, Dean of the Faculty of Graduate Studies (iCMA).

FACULTY OF TECHNOLOGY



In order to cater to the GCE Advanced Level Technology Stream introduced by the Government of Sri Lanka in the Year 2013, University of Sri Jayewardenepura was the first University to come forward in Establishing the Faculty of Technology in the Government University System. The proposed Technology curricula were then recommended to the University Council upon the approval of the University Senate on 23rd September, 2015. Followed by the recommendation of the University Council on 08th October 2015, University Grants Commission approved the proposed Technology curricula for three-degree programs including the 09 Subject Focus areas on 19th November 2015. Fulfilling the immense efforts, dedication, and vision of Prof. Sampath Amaratunge, Vice Chancellor, University of Sri Jayewardenepura, and his teams, the Ministry of Higher Education and Highways of Sri Lanka officially announced the establishment of the Faculty of Technology through the Gazette Extraordinary (No.1948/59 Order under Section 27(1), THE UNIVERSITIES ACT, No. 16 of 1978) that was published on 08th of January, 2016.

At the initial stage, the Faculty of Technology was established at temporary premises in Nugegoda and then moved to a permanent place in Techno Park, Pitipana. Fully fledged new Faculty premises were declared opened by His Excellency Prime Minister Mahinda Rajapaksha on 8th June 2020.

EDUCATION AND DEVELOPMENT

The faculty has introduced two new Diploma programs namely the **Diploma in Polymer Processing Technology and Process Analysis** from the Department of Materials and Mechanical Technology and the **Diploma in Cosmetic Technology** from the Department of Biosystems Technology.

Diploma in Polymer Processing Technology and Process Analysis

The Diploma in Polymer Processing Technology and Process Analysis (SLQF 03/Part Time/1 Year) offered by the Department of Materials and Mechanical Technology, is

designed to introduce basics in polymer processing technologies and related high-tech polymer instrumental analysis. This is conducted in both theory and laboratory practical sessions. Theory modules are focused on providing fundamental knowledge in basic areas of polymer technology while laboratory sessions are primarily focused on providing a detailed understanding in polymer processing and property analysis using high-tech instrumentation.

Diploma in Cosmetic Technology

The Diploma in Cosmetic Technology study program (SLQF 03) is enriched with a strong foundation of theoretical knowledge of nearly 390 hours of course work (26 theory credits), 90 hours of practical classes, tutorials, industrial visits, mini-research projects and individual and group presentations. The objectives of this course are to provide basic principles in cosmetic science and Technology, to provide hands-on experience in developing a range of cosmetics and their quality control analysis, and to provide leadership and managerial skills to the startup and management of a small cosmetic Industry. This is the only diploma course on Cosmetic Technology offered by a Sri Lankan state university.

RESEARCH AND CONFERENCES

The second **International Conference on Innovation and Emerging Technologies 2022 (ICIET 2022)** organized by the Faculty of Technology, University of Sri Jayewardenepura was held virtually on November 25th -26th, 2022, under the theme **Technological Advancements for a resilient future**.

RESEARCH AND CONFERENCES

International Research Conference in Health Sciences 2022 – IRCHS 2022

Annual Research Conference of Faculty of Allied Health Sciences IRCHS 2022 was held as a hybrid event on 31st March 2022 at the University of Sri Jayewardenepura. The conference is an annual event of the calendar and was organized as an international conference on the theme, ‘Research and innovations for the advancement of health sciences’. The ‘Faculty of Allied Health Sciences Oration’ was introduced for the first time this year and it was delivered by Prof. S.S.P Warnakulasuriya, Dean, Faculty of Nursing, University of Colombo on the topic, ‘Work, Health and Wellbeing’. The scientific programme commenced with the keynote speech on ‘Ethnomedicine Inspired Drug Development – Opportunities and Challenges’ by Prof. M.D.J Wijayabandara, Head, Department of Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Sciences, FAHS, USJ.

The scientific programme comprised of three parallel symposia, each in pharmacy, nursing, and medical laboratory sciences, and was resourced by eight international speakers. The Nethersole School of Nursing, Chinese University of Hong Kong, and the International Pharmaceutical Federation (FIP) supported IRCHS 2022 by facilitating resource persons for the symposia from respective fields of sciences. IRCHS 2022 received 96 abstracts of which 31 oral presentations and 42 poster presentations were selected. In conjunction to IRCHS 2022, the ‘Young Innovators Award in Health Sciences 2022’ was also held for the second consecutive time.

The Bachelor of Dental Surgery program conducted by the faculty is a five year programme in par with global standards of dental education. The preclinical phase (BDS I) will be taught together with the medical students of the Faculty of Medical Sciences. 32 Dental students as the first Batch enrolled in January, 2022 under the UGC intake 2020/21.

FACULTY OF URBAN AQUATIC & BIO RESOURCES



The Faculty of Urban and Aquatic Bioresources (FUAB) is one of the latest additions to the University of Sri Jayewardenepura, focused at producing professionally qualified graduate and postgraduate work force to face the challenges that lie ahead a much-needed bioeconomy with a special emphasis on the blue-green concept.

The Faculty was declared opened in the year 2022 by Senior Prof. Sampath Amaratunge, the Chairman, University Grants Commission and the then Vice-Chancellor of the University, Senior Prof. Sudantha Liyanage, and commenced its academic programmes, under the leadership and guidance of Senior Prof. Pradeep Jayaweera, Dean, Faculty of Urban and Aquatic Bioresources.

Comprising of three academic departments of study, the Faculty offers four full-time Bachelor of Science (BSc) degree programmes. Considering the largely untapped marine resources and the inland aquatic resources that are yet to be fully explored the degree programmes in Aquatic Bioresources are focusing on mariculture including seaweed processing, Aquatic Animal Health, Smart Aquaculture, Biotechnology in Aquatic Bioresources, Ornamental Fish Culture and Breeding, Fish Feed Technology and etc. In meeting the challenges of an ever-increasing food demand and proper management of bioresources in an urban environment the degree programmes in Urban Bioresources are focusing on Smart Farming, Bioenergy, Engineering aspects of Urban Agriculture, Green Buildings and Sustainable Urban Development, Urban composting, Soil and Fertilizer Management, Biotechnology in Urban Bioresources and etc. Furthermore, the undergraduates of all degree programmes are provided knowledge and training on the essential fundamentals such as Analytical Instruments, Entrepreneurship and Business Development and Information Technology, to become successful in their fields of study.

RESEARCH AND OUTREACH ACTIVITIES

In keeping with its mission the Faculty is also engaged in a diverse array of collaborative and outreach programmes with both local and overseas institutions. The Department of Aquatic Bioresources initiated an academic and research collaboration programme with the University of Sydney, Australia and in line with this Prof. Joy Becker, Associate Professor in Aquatic Animal Health and Production, the University of Sydney, visited the University in October 2022. During her visit, Prof. Becker delivered a talk addressing the biosecurity aspects of Australian ornamental fish trade and what they expect from Sri Lankan ornamental fish exporters. The event was actively attended by officials from the Animal Quarantine Division, Colombo and key figures of the ornamental fish export sector of Sri Lanka.

COMMUNITY /SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY AND NATIONAL CONTRIBUTIONS

- Providing smart solutions in agriculture, the Department of Urban Bioresources collaborated with OREL Corporation Pvt Ltd. on a project on IoT-based smart farming technology. The key highlight of this project is an IoT-based fertigation system which provides nutrients based on real-time plant requirements giving a better yield compared to the traditional methods adapted in greenhouse farming. With the success of the pilot trial, Orel Corporation is exploring commercial applications of this technology.
- Providing insights to smart farming in both agriculture and aquaculture, the Department of Multidisciplinary Studies organized a guest lecture titled, ‘ICT for Smart Farmers- Current Practices and Future Perspectives’ in November 2022. The talk was delivered by Mr. Prasad Piyasena, Additional Director General of Sri Lanka Institute of Development Administration (SLIDA), an expert in smart solutions in agriculture/aquaculture. The event was attended by around 100 participants.

SPORTS FACILITIES

The Department of Physical Education, the governing body of sports, of the prestigious University of Sri Jayewardenepura possesses unique sporting facilities.

Out-door Volleyball Courts

The University outdoor volleyball courts are located near the swimming pool have two clay based courts. These are available for university students and staff members.

Basketball Court

The Outdoor basketball court is situated next to the volleyball courts and is mainly a hard court made of tar. These are available for university students and staff members.

Tennis Courts

Tennis courts are clay surfaced and well maintained. These are available for university students, staff members, and for outsiders as well.

Swimming Pool Complex & New Office Area

The Swimming pool is a 50m standard size & has 10 lanes. Its shallow end is 1.5 m in depth and at the deep end, the depth is 5.5 m. The swimming pool has an adjacent two storied- building which consists of changing rooms and wash-rooms for swimmers. The pool is available for university students, staff members, and for outsiders as well upon their request.

Cricket Ground

The University cricket pitch is mainly a grass surfaced 65m full length area. This well maintained ground has one matting pitch & two clay pitches. The ground has an adjacent one storied- pavilion & changing rooms with attached wash-rooms for players & referees. This ground is located in a very picturesque environment. The pitch hosts Inter University matches, University intra-mural competitions, and as well as other community club tournaments.

CENTRE FOR IT SERVICES (CITS)

The Centre for IT Services (CITS) is the University's core entity, managing the Campus-wide IT Infrastructure, Internet & Email facilities, Server Administration, and maintaining e-Services & Applications, as well as providing IT Technical Support and Solutions to university students and staff. CITS also develops and maintains several web-based systems, including USJNet Sphere, University Payroll System, Student Enrollment System, Student Information Management System (SIMS), Payment System, Human Resource Management System (USJHRMS), and the Management Information System which was implemented at FGS.

In February 2022, Prof. R.G.N. Meegama was appointed as the Director of CITS. Mr. Harsha Munasinghe is the Information Systems Manager, and Mr. Vajira Premadasa and Mr. Nethsiri Jayaweera were the Computer Instructors. The Assistant Network Manager was Mr. Suresh Nanayakkara. Ms. Ashela Nilmini works as the Programmer cum System Analyst. Computer programmers included Mr. Ranuka Edirisuriya, Mr. Tharindu Chathuranga, Mr. Shanaka Edirisinghe, Mr. Nipun Sachinda, and Mr. V. Sabethan. Mr. Sunera Kandambi joined the team as a Technical Officer (Audio Visual), while Mr. Madushan Deshanga, Mr. Sadun Adikari, and Mr. Chamara Dayarathne serve as ICT Technical Officers. Mr. Bandara Yapa worked as the Lab Attendant, and Mr. Shantha Kumara was the Works Aide.

LIBRARY

Under the direction of the Librarian, Dr. (Mrs.) Nayana Wijayasundara, 01 Deputy Librarian, 04 Senior Assistant Librarians (Grade I), 02 Senior Assistant Librarians (Grade II), 05 Assistant Librarians, 01 Assistant Registrar/Library Services, 01 Assistant Network Manager, and 50 non-academic staff were engaged in duties in the Library in the year 2022.

During the year, 490 book titles (1291 copies) were purchased at a cost of Rs. 5.89M from the annual allocation. Further 01 book title (04 copies) was purchased through the STHRD (Science and Technology Human Resource Development) project by the Faculty of Engineering to their library. Seven foreign and local periodical titles both in electronic and print format were purchased at a cost of Rs. 0.14M. Two full-text electronic databases; JSTOR (at a cost of Rs. 2.5M) and a citation database Scopus (at a cost of Rs. 5.77M) were purchased. Additionally, CrossRef DOI registration facility was purchased at a cost of Rs. 289,859.15. Further, Turnitin Feedback studio Growth License (LMS Integrated version), was purchased at a cost of Rs. 4.7 M. Thousand three hundred and thirty two (1332) book titles (valued at Rs. 2,92,9518.87), 126 foreign and local periodical titles (valued at Rs. 80,835.00) were received as donations. In addition, access to 03 other electronic databases; Emerald, Taylor & Francis, Oxford University Press Journals was provided to patrons through the UGC consortium, CONSAL. Also, Document Delivery Service from the British Library was provided through CONSAL for the readers. Access to EBSCO database was provided by the AHEAD project of the Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce.

During the year 2022, 1292 book titles and 2176 copies acquired by the library were processed by the Processing Division and faculty libraries. The amount consisted of 170 copies to Ceylon Room (CR), 165 copies to Permanent Reference (PR), 320 copies to Scheduled Reference (SR), and 1473 copies to Lending (L) books. 48 CDs were added to the Interactive Study Area. 46 Palm-leaf manuscripts were accessioned after conservation by the end of 2022.

About 4401 readers were registered including Academic Staff (68), Non-academic staff (63), Undergraduate students (3982) and Diploma and Postgraduate students (288) during the year 2022. With that, the total number of registered users was 16,265.

The rate of fulfillment of inter-library loan requests was 92%. Laptop lending service was used by 66 users in 2022. The library allocated 30 laptop computers allocated for this service. Forty (40) ISBN numbers and 09 ISSN numbers were obtained for university publications.

Total number of entries in the Scholar Bank (Digital Repository) was 10846, and the database of newspaper articles consisted of 4910 selected newspaper articles by the end of 2022. Fifty six (56) palm leaf manuscripts were entered into the digital repository during the year. Nineteen workshops were conducted by the staff of the library for the academics and students in order to enhance awareness of information resources and information literacy skills. Furthermore, academic staff members of the Library published 01 indexed journal article, 04 refereed journal articles, 03 conference abstracts, 02 book chapters, and 03 text books during the year 2022.

During the year 2022, 04 Assistant Librarians completed Masters in Library and Information Science, and 01 Library Information Assistant completed the Diploma in Library & Information Science. PhD, Master's Degree, and Diploma were carried out by one each of the library staff. Two Library staff members were attended for a workshop organized by the Staff Development Centre during the year 2022.

EXTERNAL DEGREE & EXTENSION COURSES UNIT

External Examinations Division of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura established in 1979 with the commencement of the External Degree Programme in Bachelor of Commerce. Subsequently Bachelor of Arts General External Degree Programme was commenced. In 1997 the General External Degree programmes of B.Sc Business Administration and Public Administration were also introduced. The B.A General External Degree and the B.Sc Business Administration General External Degree Programmes have become very popular among the students.

According to the Commission Circular No 932 dated 15th October 2010 issued by the University Grants Commission, the External Examinations unit has been structurally changed as External Degrees & Extension Courses Unit.

World Bank funded accelerating higher education expansion and development (ahead) operation

01. Introduction:

The development of the higher education sector is of central importance to enable Sri Lanka to make the transition from a Lower-Middle Income Country (LMIC) to an Upper Middle-Income Country (UMIC). Recognizing this, the Government of Sri Lanka (GoSL) and the World Bank have agreed to support the higher education sector through a Bank funded Accelerating Higher Education Expansion and Development (AHEAD) operation.

Total grant was 100 million USD sponsored through the two main financing sources: 67 million USD from International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD) and 33 million USD from International Development Association (IDA). The total estimated project period was six years.

2. Beneficiaries:

The main and direct beneficiaries of AHEAD operations are students (around 600,000), academics (around 5000), managers, and technical staff members of the higher education sector. They are benefited from AHEAD over its operation life span and also beyond it. There will also be many indirect beneficiaries from AHEAD.

3. Implementation:

The implementing agency of AHEAD is the Ministry of Education (MoHE). The national level coordination is done by the University Grants Commission (UGC) and Sri Lanka Institute of Advanced Technological Education (SLIATE) Advanced Technological Institutes (ATIs). The Operations Monitoring and Support Team (OMST) coordinates and supports all AHEAD activities between the MoHE, UGC, and all fifteen (15) Universities. The university level coordinating, monitoring, implementing and facilitating are done by the Operations Technical Secretariat (OTS) of each university.

4. Operations Technical Secretariat (OTS):

The task of the OTS is to organize regular capacity-building activities for the relevant staff of the University, including procurement, financial management, and contract management, throughout the program implementation, with the support of the Operation and Monitoring Support Team (OMST).

The OTS Office of University of Sri Jayewardenepura (USJP) is operated under the Director/OTS, Prof. Harendra Kariyawasam, Professor, Department of Accounting, Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce. Ms. A.A.K.N.Ranasinghe as Deputy Director/Procurement, Ms. K.T.C.Priyangani as Deputy Director/Finance, Mr. O.A.W.Karunaratne as Deputy Director/ Engineering, Ms. R.M. Gunaratna as Senior Administrative

Officer, Ms. W.D.S.S.Premathileke as Secretary and Ms.K.A.D.Nipuni Rangika, Ms.I.K.M.I.A.K Ilangasinghe, Ms. M.P.Chandani Priyanguka and Ms. K.A.Chathurangi Priyangika as Technical Assistants continue to work at the OTS Office, to support the AHEAD activities.

6. Three Result Areas:

The three Results Areas the AHEAD Operation will focus on the following.

- (a) Increasing enrollment in higher education with special emphasis on study programs required for an aspiring upper middle-income economy
- (b) Broadening and deepening modern teaching and learning approaches that combine academic excellence with high quality socio emotional skills
- (c) Promoting a vibrant research and innovation culture that can support economic development, especially the growth of higher value industries and services.

6.1 Result Area 1- Introduction:

(Increasing Enrolment in Higher Education in Priority Disciplines for Economic Development)

The objective of Results Area 1 is to increase enrolment in higher education programs of strategic importance for economic development. The GoSL will promote the expansion of enrolment in state universities and ATIs, with a focus on Sciences, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) degree programs. It will take place both in existing and new STEM faculties and ATIs. The strategy will promote the use of teaching-learning methods based on open educational resources and learning software to enable large numbers of students, regardless of their location, to set up interactive teaching sessions.

The Program will enable the strategic planning and development of the higher education sector. The strategic plan will be used to monitor the progress in implementing the targets for the expansion of enrolment in the universities and ATIs, and to fine-tune this over time.

6.1.1 Status of USJP – Total allocation and utilization by the Faculties at the end of 2022:

With the main focus on expansion of enrollment in universities, the World Bank allocated funds, under STEM. USJP received three non-competitive grants to Faculty of Medical Sciences, Faculty of Technology and Faculty of Applied Sciences. Total allocation and the percentage completed at the end of 2022 are given in the Table below.

6.2 Result Area 2- Introduction:**(Improving the Quality of Higher Education)**

The Results Area 2 aims to improve the quality of degree programs specifically focused to develop universities which deliver degree programs that promote a combination of academic excellence with high quality socio-emotional skills, such that students are well prepared for the world of work and for wider civic and social life. This program allocates funds to the faculties and departments on competitive basis for modernizing teaching-learning and quality improvement programs called ELTA- ELSE.

It is also intended to provide funds for a scholarship program for young academics to obtain postgraduate degrees. This is extremely important because there is a scarcity of qualified academic staff in HEIs. Many PhD scholarships are offered to academic staff members of universities under AHEAD. These PhD scholarships are for overseas programs and split programs.

6.2.1 Status of USJP - Total allocation and utilization by the Faculties at the end of 2022:

Three faculties of USJP, Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences, Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce and Faculty of Applied Sciences were able to win the competitive grant from Result Area 2, and were able to secure Rs. 120 million for each faculty. Total allocation and the percentage completed at the end of 2022 are given in the Table below.

6.2.3 HRD Grant - Ph.D. Scholarship Awardees:

6.3 Result Area 3- Introduction:

(Promoting Research, Development, Innovation and Commercialization

(RDIC)

The objective of Results Area 3 is to develop a culture of research and development, innovation and commercialization (RDIC) in universities. RDIC activities are an extremely important next step in the development of higher education in the country. A three-pronged strategy is being followed, as given below.

First, a system of competitive, performance-based research programs for Development- Oriented Research (DOR) in universities and non-state HEIs will be developed and implemented for Sciences, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) subjects, Humanities, Education, Management, and Social Sciences (HEMS) subjects, and STEM-HEMS (interdisciplinary) research.

Second, competitive, performance-based Research and Innovation Commercialization (RIC) programs will be developed and implemented for universities undertaking innovation activities of direct relevance for industrial and service sector development. The RIC programs will be available for STEM and HEMS subjects, as well as for STEM- HEMS combinations. In addition, under the Program, assistance has been given for a set of Innovation Commercialization Enhancement (ICE) grants to assist a set of university programs that have demonstrated success in this area in the past (under HETC) to scale up their activities further.

Third, the Program will support the development of University-Business Linkage (UBL) Cells. The UBL Cells will assist university academics in increasing collaboration with professional expertise in technology transfer and business model development, establishing open innovation spaces and business incubators, and enabling academics and students to obtain professional business advice and training.

6.3.1 Status of USJP - Total allocation and utilization by the Faculties at the end of 2022:

Objective of the Result Area 3 was to promote Research, Development and innovation culture within the Universities. Under this result area, universities were eligible to receive two types of commutative research grants and non-competitive grant.

(i) RIC Grants:

Under the competitive category, Faculty of Applied Sciences won Rs.45 million, Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences won Rs.45 million and Faculty of Technology won Rs. 25 million, for Research and Innovation Commercialization (RIC) grant.

(ii) DOR Grants:

Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce won Rs.10 million and Faculty of Medical Science won Rs. 35 million for Development Oriented Research (DOR) grant.

(iii) ICE Grant:

In addition to the DOR and RIC grants, results area 3 promotes, a set of innovation commercialization enhancement (ICE) grants to assist a set of university programs that have demonstrated success in this area in the past under the HETC project to scale up their activities further. Center for Sustainability, Department of Forestry and Environmental Science, Faculty of Applied Sciences of University of Sri Jayewardenepura was able to receive Rs.40 million as ICE Grant.

(iv) UBL Cell:

Under Results Area 3 provision has been made to assist universities to develop relevant intellectual property (IP) policies consistent with the definition of IP by the World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO). In this context UBL helps to;

- Enable academics and students to obtain professional knowledge, advice, and training relevant for commercialization of research
- Increase collaboration with professional expertise in technology transfer and commercialization of research
- Enable academics to engage with industry to develop and utilized research and innovation products for commercial potential
- Work with the university IP policies in interaction with private firms and industries. The program also provides a platform for networking among researchers engaged in innovation and commercialization of research and companies interested in transforming research results into marketable goods and services. Further to that, Rs. 13 million was given for the development of University-Business Linkage (UBL) Cells. The total allocation and the expenditure at the end of 2022 are given in the Table below.

7. Conclusion:

Procurements got delayed due to the Government restrictions on import of office equipment, laboratory equipment, chemicals, consumables and imported furniture. Even the goods available ex-stock, could not be delivered due to the unavailability/scarcity of diesel and petrol. With the depreciation of Sri Lankan Rupees against the US dollar, prices of all the office equipment, laboratory equipment, chemicals, consumables, furniture, building materials etc. became doubled and tripled. The allocated quantity of goods could not be purchased due to the unaffordable increase in the price of each item. All these have hindered the completion of procurements on time.

Further to that, payments for procurement of Goods and Construction Work could not be made during the months of August, September, and till mid-October, 2022, as the Government Treasury did not release funds. Hence, the expenditure of all grants would have been very much higher than the actual expenditure incurred, if the requested funds have been released by the Treasury.

Even though, having to face all these difficulties, staff of the OTS Office and all the other Grants under the AHEAD Operation worked together as a Team, to achieve the targets and complete all the scheduled tasks.

OVERALL FINANCIAL REVIEW

Macro-Economic Backdrops and Managing Crisis

Sri Lanka is currently facing its worst economic crisis yet- an acute foreign currency shortage, looming debt repayments, high inflation and food fuel and medicine shortages. These current economic and social crisis in Sri Lanka has caused many challenges in the national higher education system. Despite much effort and investment, all aspects of higher education in the country, including teaching and learning, funding, facilities, and access, have been severely affected, creating significant uncertainty for the future.

Even though the University is affected by various macro-economic factors arising out of the changing operating environment globally and locally, we continuously monitor these developments in order to ensure the right strategies are in place to counter the risks while making use of the opportunities.

How we Manage Crisis

Since the requirement of providing an efficient and productive service for the public while using the public finance in most responsible manner, we have followed several method of controlling expenditure when incurring the expenditure and implementing projects using domestic fund.

1. Focus to generate income through foreign students' intake for self-finance courses.
2. Temporary suspension of the implementation of projects, procurement of works or goods of which either procurement process has been started or has to be started.
3. Minimizing the cost of stationary usage and printing
4. Use electronic method as far as possible.
5. Maximizing the efficiency of employee by limiting the Overtime Expenses.
6. Suspension of unnecessary and less priority expenses.
7. Limiting vehicle usage.
8. Review all recurrent and capital expenditure
9. Strategy direction for energy savings

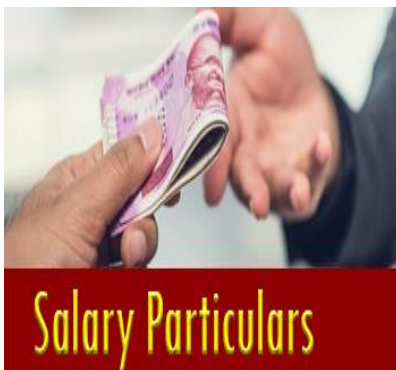
Our Achievements through Crisis

The primary activities of this have been commenced. The Department of Public Finance of the Ministry of Finance and Mass Media carried out the training to all officers and relevant staff members

through online. This will be most important to university since the procurement activities can be done transparency, accountability and value-for-money.

Fixed Assets Register

In order to present the fair value of the assets the revaluation of assets was done by the Department of Valuation of the University. Accordingly the class of assets of Computer accessories, furniture and fittings, Laboratory and teaching equipment, office equipment, cloaks and sports goods were revalued.

The long-felt needed for preparing the Fixed Assets register of the University has been completed using an ERP (SAGE) System. Further updating and maintaining the fixed assets register of the university is done by a separate unit established under division of finance named as “Fixed assets Unit” headed by a Senior Assistant Bursar.

Financial Managing Through Crisis

The university allocation was received as Rs.5975 million for the recurrent expenditure and Rs.750 million was for capital expenditure. Out of the allocation Rs.5715 million was received as recurrent expenditure and Rs. 450 million was received as capital expenditure.

The university was opened for the academic activities for students physically after COVID 19 pandemic situation and expense has been increased compared to year 2021. Further two new faculties were commenced their academic activities in the year 2022 in addition to the already existed eight faculties and it was a challenge to meet the objectives of the university with limited financial allocation during the year 2022. Eventhough annual allocated funds were not received fully for the year 2022 we were able to manage the limited fund in order to achieve the objective of the university.

Continuation of Research Activities.

With the financial crisis, the University has improved its country rank from 6th place in 2018 to 2nd place in 2022, as well as its world rank by 1107 places from 3071 to 1964 in the last 5 years. (According to the Webometrics Ranking of World Universities) .It was able to manage the fund in order to improve the ranking with in the financial crisis.

Corporate with Regulatory Bodies

It was able to corporate with regulatory bodies and introduce more convenience operating system to attach foreign students to courses and it was help to increase the internal income of the university at this financial crisis.

Financial Statements 2022 Overview

The Financial statement of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura for the financial year ending 31st December 2022 have been prepared in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards. The university applied certain accounting standards and accounting policies which are effective for the financial period on and after 31st December 2022. The University has not early adopted SLPSAS 10 (Revenue from Exchange Transactions) and SLPSAS 11 (Revenue from non-Exchange Transactions).

The systems of financial controls have been maintained as far as practicable to ensure propriety of transactions and efficiency in expenditure.

- **Financial Performance**

In 2022, the University of Sri Jayewardenepura had been received 450 Mn (2021: 725 Mn) as the capital grant and Rs.5715 Mn (2021:5395 Mn) as the recurrent grant. We were able to utilize and manage the limited funding allocation to achieve the goal of the university when adhering to the financial management regulations.

- **Financial Position**

Total Assets of the university has been Increased by Rs. 4 Billion or 19 % to 29 Billion.

Key Movements

Over half of the University's assets comprise property, plant and equipment which enable sustainable operations. In 2022 the property, plant and equipment valued increased by 1.2 Billion due to a revaluation of the class of assets of Computer accessories, furniture and fittings, Laboratory and teaching equipment, office equipment, cloaks and sports goods.

- Investment (financial Assets) increased by 639 Million due to market performance (mainly due to increase in interest rate in the market) and endowment income (which is added to investment portfolio).

Future Plan

- Improvement of facilities to the payment system of the self-finance courses in order to create convenience payment system to external students of the university. It will be develop to establish the do the payment through QR coding system.
- Infrastructure new payment gateway for the students
- Improvement of easy payment system in order to come up with financial crisis

Risk Management and Mitigation Strategies of University of Sri Jayewardenepura

Facts and events that affect the smooth operation and sustainability of the university are identified as risk factors of the university. University of Sri Jayewardenepura has been adopting their own cultures and adoptive cultures in the operations of the university. The survival and growth in higher education sector is challenging and planning for uncertainties are essential. The educational sector dynamics are observed vigilantly, evaluated and prudent measures are applied to face the challenges

Approach to risk mitigation

Risk management is done continuously in order to reduce the risk volatility and improve returns. Higher education sector is exposed to high risk both internally and externally. Being a government university, the University of Sri Jayewardenepura focus on providing sustainable value to our stakeholders by identifying the risk. Probable impact and taking practicable precautions and prompt actions to mitigate them.

Assessment of such risk and related responses are set out below.

a. Internal Risk

Operational Risk and Management

Operational risk associated with the day to day operation of the university. This affects efficiency and effectiveness of the human resources integrity of the internal control system, process and external factors which affect the day to day operations. It also includes execution risk unfavorable regulatory changes, customer dependency, safety and health, fire and environment risk inherent with core operations of the university.

Impact

Failure to adopt this risk promptly and prudently will have negative impact on operation and going concern of the university.

Response

Composition of the council and their capacity is a significant fact in respect of the operational risk. The council of the university is composed well to be helpful to operate with least risk. As internal driven operational risk measure, accounting control are done in more efficient and transparent manner to evaluate and monitor the operation of the university. The university use communication channels to inform and empower department heads and line management to carry out the operational activities under the budgetary provision while communicating performance and discrepancies with the higher management. Functional matters have been discussed in academic and administrative officers meeting and finance matters are discussed and recommended to the council. Such working culture helps to make the operation free from risk on monitoring or accounting controls.

Recruitment of the university is carried out in more efficient manner selecting the correct candidate with the right qualification and skills without any biases. Therefore the university benefited with stable and competent workforce. Staff training and development has been considered as important tool to enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of the human resource.

Risk of fire and potential damages are mitigated by taking protective measures such as identifying potential fire risks, installation of fire control equipment, employee training and systematic monitoring and control measures. In addition to that risk mitigation actions are supported by risk transfer mechanism such as insurance.

Since operational risk can never be entirely eliminated and the cost of elimination may overweigh the potential benefits, Preventive management approach is taken with continuous monitoring and upgrading.

Technological Risk and Management

Success of institution depend on the existence of modern information technology and information generation through efficient management information system.

Impact

Any disruption of failures in the system infrastructures and application may have negative impact to the organization. Delays in processing transitions, lack of reliability of transitions. Frauds and errors may occur leading to future financial losses

Response

Centre for IT Services (CITS) has been established to manage the IT infrastructures. Internet and email facilities server administration maintain e service and applications while providing IT technical support and solution for the University students and staff, sufficient funds have been allocated for technological advancement especially for establishment of e learning facilities for the University students.

b. External Risk

Product Risk Management

University is engaged in providing undergraduate, post graduate education and research to the nation. Risk is associate with the employability and the recognitions for the degrees offered by the University and international recognition for the University. Further MOUs have been signed for the international collaboration to enhance foreign exposures for graduates. Actions have been taken to obtain accreditation certain faculties.

Impact

Failure to address this risk may affect sustainability of certain degree program due to un-employability of the degree holders.

Response

Curriculum of degree programs update regularly to enhance the employability of the degree holders. Various programs have been introduced to improve research and soft skills of the students. Industry training is compulsory for certain degree program to shape the undergraduate for employments.

Financial Risk Management

The University's activities are exposed to various finance risk such as Credit RISK, Liquidity risk and market risk. Risk management programs to be focus to minimize the potential adverse impact on the financial performance of the University.

Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk that at a future date the other party to financial transaction may cause financial loss to the entity by failure to discharge an obligation.

Key reasons where the University exposed to credit risk as a part of its operations.

- Sudden budget cuts due to country situation
- Delays in receiving funds from the treasury
- Receivables on post graduate fee levy course

Impact

Credit risk mainly impact on the reliability about the entity for suppliers and constructors, delays in completion of works. Quality of the work may reduce, loss of good customers for future engagements and bad impact on continuation of the certain courses.

Response

Risk associate with treasury fund can't be eliminated. However, through good working capital management, the risk can be reduced E.g. giving priorities for urgent payment, cost cutting on unnecessary things. Temporary utilization of earned funds of the university and postpone certain payments. In addition to that continues monitoring of receivables on fee levy courses also may reduce the credit risk.

Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the funding risk that an entity can encounter in meeting obligation associate with financial liabilities.

Impact

Liquidity risk badly affects in financing day to day operations of the University.

Response

Liquidity can manage through continuous reconciling and monitoring of cash flows from assets and liabilities and maintain mismatches in prudent level. Cash low forecast are prepared and review regularly to identify the liquidity requirements. Further current accounts balances are transferred to overnight bank deposits and earn inters income on temporary excess cash.

Market Risk

The market risk is the risk that fair value of future cash flows of the financial instruments due to changes in the market price. Objective of market risk management is to manage and control the market risk expose within acceptable parameters while optimizing the return on risks. Market risk comprises two risks currency risk and interest rate risk.

Currency Risk

Currency risk is the risk that the value of the financial instruments will fluctuate due to the changes in the foreign exchange rates. As protection against the currency risk the university backs its most commitments in local currency. The university has not invested or borrowed in foreign currencies. The currency risk attached to the financial instrument is minimal as it represents local currency.

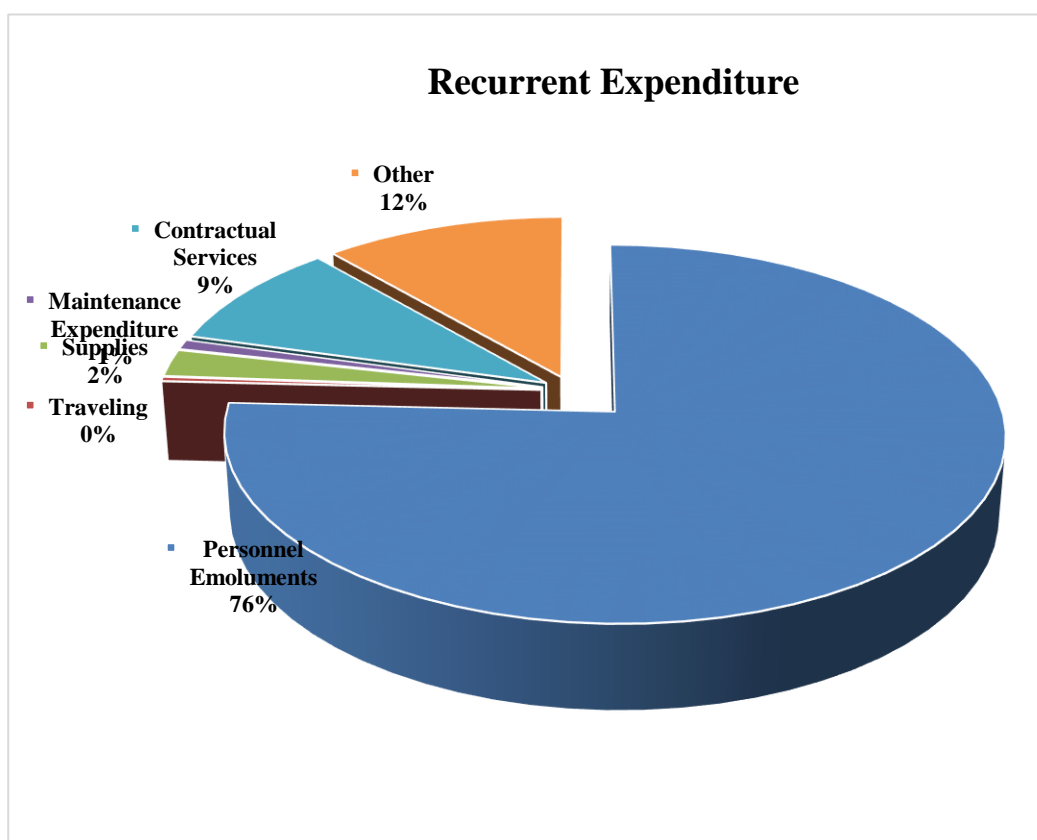
Interest Rate Risk

The interest rate risk is the risk to an entity's earnings and economic value of equity (EVE) arising from the adverse movement in interest rates. University's short term deposits are at fixed interest rate. Rates are called from government banks and reinvested in a bank offered highest interest rate.

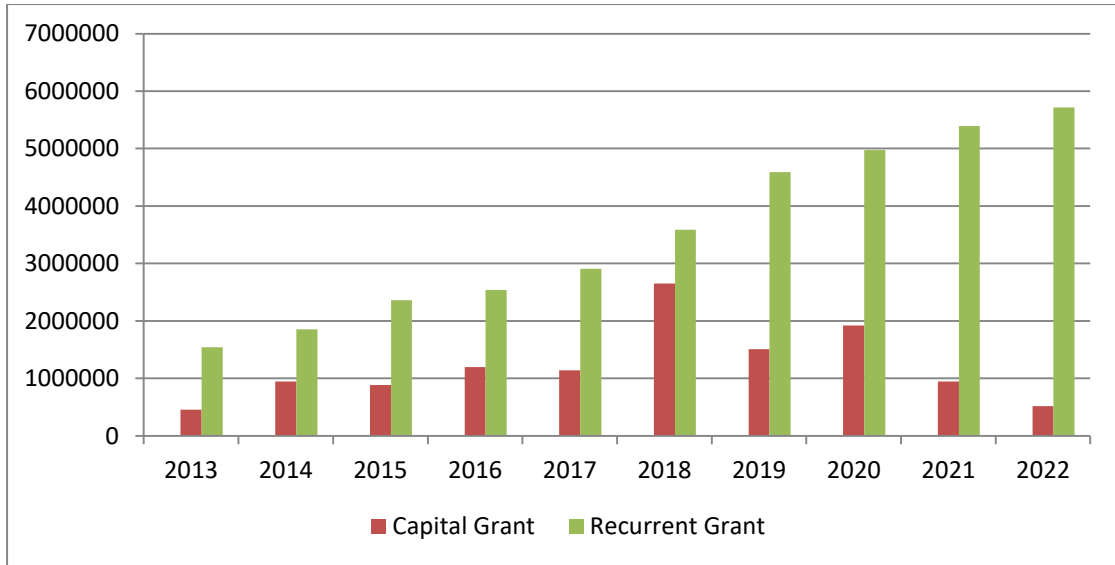

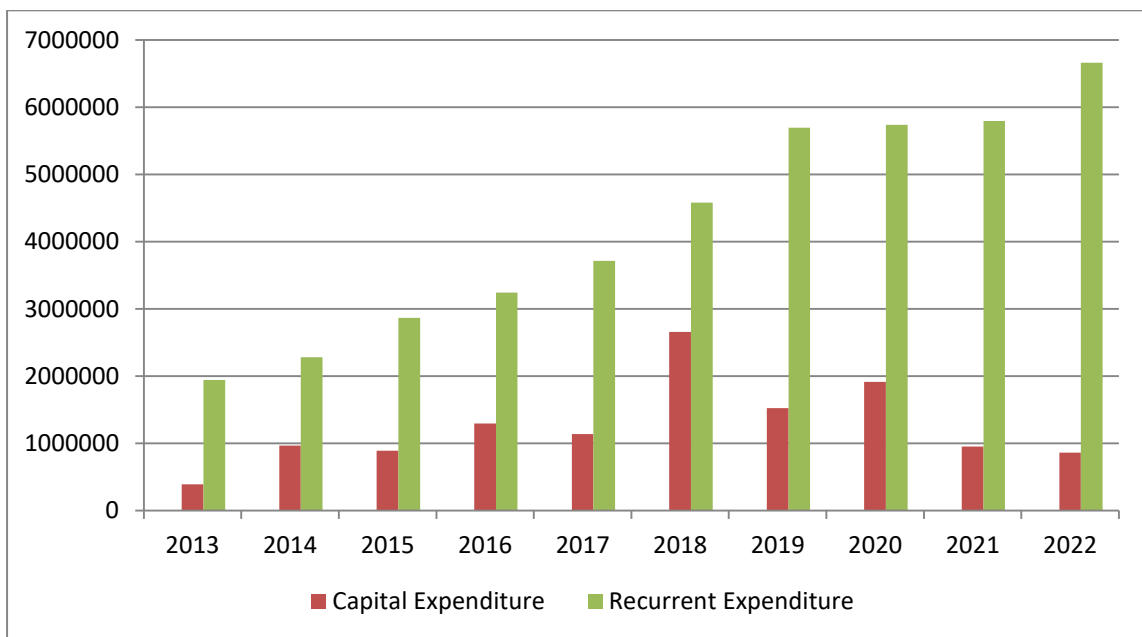

SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENT

1. CORPORATE INFORMATION

1.1 Legal & Domicile form

University of Sri Jayewardenepura (The University) has been incorporated under the Universities Act No.16 of 1978 and subsequent amendments thereto. The University has eleven Faculties and External Extension Course unit. The Main Administrative location of the University is at Gangodawila, Nugegoda, Sri Lanka while Faculty of Technology and Faculty of Engineering are located at Mahenwatta, Pitipana, Homagama and No 41, Lumbini Mawatha, Rathmalana, Sri Lanka respectively. The University is under the purview of Ministry of Education and University Grants Commission of Sri Lanka. Financial operation are decentralized within the faculties while Financial Statements are preparing amalgamating all faculties' financial information.

1.2 Principle activities & nature of operation

The University primarily caters to local students to promote and develop Higher Education and research in the field of Humanities & Social Sciences, Medicine, Science, Allied Health Sciences, Management and Finance, Engineering, Technology, Urban and Aquatic and Computer Science.

1.3 Date of authorization for issue

The Financial Statements of the University were authorized for issue by the Council dated on 23.02.2022.

1.4 Reporting period

The financial period of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura (The University) represent from 01st January 2022 to 31st December 2022.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

2.1 Statement of compliance

The Financial Statements of the University have been prepared and presented in compliance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards (SLPSAS) issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Sri Lanka. However Sri Lanka Accounting Standards (LKAS) also have been used in the areas where no Public Sector Accounting Standards are available. These Financial Statements comprise the statement of Financial Position, Statement of Financial Performance, Statement of Cash flows, Changes in Equity and Notes to the Financial Statements.

2.2 Basis of measurement

The Financial Statements of the University have been prepared on the accrual basis and apply consistently. No adjustments have been made for inflationary factors. The financial transactions are recorded on historical cost convention except subsequent recognition of the Assets on revaluation basis, reported in 3.1.1 and retirement benefit obligation reported in 3.2.4 of Summary of significant accounting policies to the financial statements.

2.3 Comparative information

All accounting policies adopted by the University are applied consistently with those of the previous year, where necessary comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to the changes, in presentation of current year figures.

In response to the COVID 19 outbreak the University has moved more into digital platform in the year 2021 instead of physical presence to the academic activities. However in the year 2022, the University has started all academic and other activities in physical and digital manner. It has been affected to the income and expenditure for the year 2022 compared to the year 2021.

2.4 Materiality and aggregation

Each material class of similar items have presented separately in the financial statements. Items of dissimilar nature or function have presented separately unless they are immaterial.

2.5 Offsetting

Assets and liabilities, revenue and expenses have not been offset unless required or permitted by SLPSAS.

2.6 Going concern

The University has assessed the ability to continue as a going concern. The Council of the University has a reasonable expectation that the University has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. The University does not foresee a need for liquidation or cessation of operations, taking into account all available information about future. Accordingly the University continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

2.7 Events after the reporting period

Event after the reporting date are those events, both favorable and unfavorable, that occur between the reporting date and the date when the Financial Statement are authorized for issue. Two types of events can be identified.

- a. Those events provide evidence of conditions that existed at the reporting (adjusting events after reporting date)
- b. Those are indicative of the condition that arose after the reporting date (non-adjusting events after reporting date)

All material events after reporting date have been considered and where appropriate adjustments or disclosures have been made in the Financial Statements.

2.8 Functional & presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements of the University are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the University operates (the functional currency). These financial statements are prepared and presented in 'Sri Lankan Rupees' (Rs.), which is the University's functional and presentation currency.

2.9 Transaction of foreign currencies and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions or valuation where item are re measured. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at year end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognized in the income statement.

2.10 Rounding

The amounts in financial statements have been rounded-off to the nearest rupee, except otherwise indicated as permitted by the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

2.11 Budgetary controls

The program budget of the University has been prepared in line with the financial regulations and guideline issued by the Treasury and University Grants Commission (UGC). University strictly restricted to the block allocation given by the treasury instead of the actual requirement according to the corporate plan of the University. University has not been given actual requirement of the funds for a particular year. Therefore, additional budgetary allocation may arise during the year or commitments for the expenditure may arise for the end of the financial year.

Budgets covers the fiscal period of 1st of January 2022 to 31st December 2022 prepare accordance with the guidelines issued by the UGC. Statement of compression of budgets and actual amounts has been attached.

2.12 Taxes

Income Tax.

The University is not liable to pay income tax on its surplus of the ordinary course of the business as the University is considered as an exempt organization as per the Inland Revenue at no.24 of 2017 and amendments there to.

Advance Personal Income Tax (APIT)/Advance Income Tax

The University deduct Advance Personal Income Tax (APIT) as per the consent of the employee on primary income and secondary income and remit the deducted amount to the Department of Inland Revenue. Further Advance Income Tax (AIT) is deducted from rent payment or any other services at the request of the rent owners or suppliers and remit the deducted amount to the Department of Inland Revenue

Stamp Duty

Stamp Duty is deducted on payments as per the Stamp Duty act and remit the deducted values to the Department of Inland Revenue.

The University comply with the changes in tax laws in the country and tax is charged accordingly.

2.13 Statement of cash flows

The cash flow statement has been prepared by using the indirect method in accordance with the SLPSAS 2 whereby gross cash receipts and gross cash payments of operating activities, finance activities and investing activities have been recognized. Cash and cash equivalents comprise short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

2.14 Changes in Accounting Policies/estimates and Disclosures

a) SLPSAS 10 (Revenue from Exchange Transactions) and SLPSAS 11 (Revenue from Non Exchange Transactions).

The University applied certain accounting standards and accounting policies which are effective for the financial period on and after 31st December 2022. The University has not early adapted SLPSAS 10 (Revenue from Exchange Transactions) and SLPSAS 11 (Revenue from Non Exchange Transactions).

The University recognizes revenue following the established criteria of SLPSAS 10 (Revenue from Exchange Transactions) and SLPSAS 11 (Revenue from Non Exchange Transactions) from the financial year 2022.

b) Recognition of Inventories of Chemicals & Glassware and Provision for non-moving maintenance inventories.

The inventories of chemical and glassware has been verified by the University and adjusted to the relevant accounts in the year 2022.

The provision was made for the non-moving items of maintenance inventory in the year 2022.

c) Depreciation of assets received as donation

The assets received through donations recorded after receiving the right to use of those assets. The University values the donated asset at 30th June and 31st December every year and capitalized the donated assets.

3. SUMMERY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

3.1 Assets and Basis of their Valuation

3.1.1 Property, Plant & Equipment (PPE)

The University's Property Plant & Equipment (PPE) includes Land, Buildings, Laboratory and Teaching Equipment, Office Equipment, Furniture & Fittings, Library Books and Periodicals, Motor Vehicles, Cloaks, Sport Goods and Other Assets.

a. Basis of recognition

Property, Plant and Equipment are recognized if it is probable that future economic benefits associate with the item will flow to the entity and the cost of the item can be reliably measured.

b. Basis of measurement

Property, Plant & Equipment are initially recognized at cost including the cost of purchase with any incidental expenses incurred in bringing the assets to its working conditions, for its intend use, Subsequent to initial Recognition and PPE are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses.

Assets acquired through the non-exchange transactions recognized at its fair value as at the date of acquisition. Property, plant & Equipment include the assets through the government grants, projects, research grants, internally generated funds and donations. The funds receipts for acquisition of Property, Plant & Equipment or gift and donations were recognized as revenue from non-exchange transactions in financial performance statement in accordance with SLPSAS 11.

c. Subsequent expenditure on existing Property, Plant & Equipment (PPE)

Expenditure incurred on tangible PPE is charged to the Statement of Financial Performance in the period it is incurred, unless it meets one of the following criteria, in which case it is capitalized and depreciated over the relevant useful life time.

- Increase in the capacity of the asset.
- Substantial improvement in the quality of output or reduction in operating cost.
- Significant extension of the useful life of the asset beyond that confirmed by repair and maintenance.
- Market value of PPE has subsequently increased.
- Expenditure incurred on repairs or maintenance of PPE in order to restore or maintain the future economic benefits expected from originally assessed standard of performance, is recognized as an expense when incurred.

d. Measurement after recognition

- Cost model

After recognition all the PPE except the classes of Land, Buildings, Motor Vehicles, Laboratory and Teaching Equipment, Sports Goods, Other Equipment and Furniture & Fittings are carried at its cost less accumulated Depreciation.

- Revaluation model
-

After initial recognition below classes of PPE whose fair value can be measured reliably has been carried at revalued amounts, which is fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses. The University revalued the below assets through Department of Valuation of University of Sri Jayewardenepura.

The revaluation amount Rs.3, 635,891,000/- arising from the revalued assets has been identified as assets and surplus was transferred to revaluation reserves and included in accumulated fund and reserve in the statement of financial position.

Carrying value of PPE and intangible assets are reviewed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment if any such indications exist, then the assets recoverable amount is estimated. An impairment loss is recognized if the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount. Impairment losses are recognized in the statement of financial performances.

e. Depreciation

Depreciation is recognized in the statement of Financial Performance on the straight line basis on each component of an item of PPE other than freehold land when it is available for use and ceases at the earlier of the date that the asset is classified as held for sale and the date that the asset is de-recognized.

The assets residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period, assets carrying amount is adjusted immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater or lesser than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount and gain / (Loss) is recognized in the Income Statements.

f. De recognition

The carrying amount of PPE is derecognized at the disposal or when no future economic benefits or service potential is expected from its use or disposal. The gain or loss arising from the de recognition shall be included in surplus or deficit when the item is derecognized.

g. Library books & cloaks

Cost of Library books and Cloaks are depreciated on the straight line basis over a period of 5 years.

h. Buildings rented out for outside parties.

The University has rented out part of the some of the buildings to outside parties to operate student cafeteria and other. These properties are not classified as investment properties since these properties are not held either to earn rentals or capital appreciation. Accordingly, these properties are also classified as PPE in the statements of financial position.

3.1.2 Capital work-in-progress (WIP)

Capital expenses incurred on PPE which are not completed as at the reporting date are shown as Capital Work-in-Progress and cost incurred on Capital Work-in-progress is transferred to PPE when it is available for use. Mobilization advances paid for the Construction of these buildings are shown as advances until the proportionate amount is set off from progressive bills.

3.1.3 Intangible assets

Computer software and online journals and E- books have been recognized as intangible assets when it is probable that future economic benefits that are attributable to the assets will flow the enterprise and the cost of the asset can be measured reliably. Intangible assets acquired are stated at cost less accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses. These costs are amortized over their estimated useful lives. Useful lives and residual values are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted if appropriate.

a) Computer Software

Computer software licenses are capitalized on the basis of the costs incurred to acquire and bring to use. These costs are amortized over their estimated useful life of five (5) years on straight line basis or life time available to use.

3.1.4 Inventories

Inventories which are for consumption and not for resale are stated at cost and determined on First in First out (FIFO) basis. The Inventory of the University includes stationery, chemicals, consumables, pharmaceutical items and maintenance items. Inventories are valued at lower of the cost and net realizable value, after making due allowances for obsolete and slow moving items.

Inventories of the University including chemical & glassware have been physically verified and valued at cost on FIFO basis as at 31st December 2022.

The cost of chemicals & glassware purchase are fully charged to financial performance or if purchased from research grants are fully charged to the respective research grants as expenses at the time of purchasing. Inventory balance remaining at the end of the year was physically verified and adjusted to the respective accounts.

3.1.5 Financial Assets

Investment

Investments represent investment in fixed deposits and savings accounts. These investments have been accounted in compliance with SLFRS 09. The investments in fixed deposits and savings accounts have been classified at amortized cost as per SLFRS 09. They are initially measured at fair value and subsequently measured at fair value less amortized cost by using effective interest rate as required by SLFRS 09.

Staff Loan

The staff loan includes distress loan, computer loan, publication loan, vehicle loan and other staff loans. The staff loans have been classified as financial assets at amortized cost as per SLFRS 09. Impairment losses in any staff loan have been recognized on expected loss method as stipulated in SLFRS 09. Loans given from the University provident fund to the employees are directly administered by the University Grants commission. Therefore, it is not included in the University account.

3.1.6 Sundry debtors and receivables

Sundry debtors and receivable due to be received within 12 months after the reporting date and stated as per SLPSAS 01. No provision have been made for bad and doubtful receivables.

3.1.7 Current assets

Current Assets classified in the Statement of Financial Position are those which are expected to be realized in, or consumption in, in the University's normal operating cycle, expected to be realized within twelve months after the reporting date on cash or a cash equivalent.

3.1.8 Cash & cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are defined as cash in hand, demand deposits and short term highly liquid investments readily convertible to known amounts of cash and subject to insignificant risk of change in value. For the purpose of cash flow statement, cash & cash equivalent includes cash in hand and deposits in banks. Investments with short term maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition are also treated as cash equivalents. The cash flow statement is prepared based on the indirect method.

3.2 Equity and Liability

3.2.1 Internally restricted funds

Internally restricted funds include funds committed for specific purpose. Faculty Development Funds represent the cumulative position of Faculties/Departments Funds with net unspent balances at the year end.

3.2.2 Endowment fund

Endowment funds include restricted donations received by the University. Investment returns generated from endowment funds are used in accordance with the various purpose established by the donors.

3.2.3 Outside Research Grants

Various Grants received for research activities are recorded and considered. As a separate project. Funds are utilized as per the agreement with donor agency and the governing board of the University. Research projects have been disclosed under liability in the financial statements. When the research is completed remaining funds if any, will be remitted to donor or in the case of not acceptance the balance, the amount will be considered as University income after three years of completion.

3.2.4 Employee benefits

a) Defined contribution plans

Employees are eligible for University Provident Fund (UPF) Contributions, Employees' Trust Fund (ETF) and University Pension Fund. Contributions is in line with the respective statutes and regulations. The University pays fixed contributions on basic emoluments plus Cost of Living allowances, academic allowances and monthly compensation allowances of employees to the

University Provident Fund and Employees' Trust Fund, University Pension Fund will have no legal or constructive obligation to pay further amounts. This obligation falls within the scope of the defined contribution plan SLPSA 19 on employment benefit. Obligation for contribution to define contribution plan are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performances as the related service is provided.

b) Defined benefit plans

Defined benefit plans are post-employment plans other than defined contribution plans. The University is liable to pay gratuity in terms of the Payment of Gratuity Act No. 12 of 1983.

c) Define benefit obligations

In accordance with the Gratuity Act No. 12 of 1983, a liability arises for a defined benefit obligation to employees. Such defined benefit obligation is a post-employment benefit obligation falling within the scope of Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting SLPSAS 19 Employee Benefit.

d) Measurement of defined benefit obligation

The liability recognized in the Statement of Financial Position is the present value of the defined benefit obligation at the reporting date. The calculation is performed annually by a qualified actuary using the projected unit credit method (PUC). Measurement of the defined benefit liability, which comprises actuarial gains and losses are recognized immediately in the statement of financial performances. The University recognizes the increase in defined benefit liability attribute to the services provided by employees during the year (current service cost) in profit or loss together with interest expenses. The discount rate has been derived considering the yield of government bonds.

e) Accounting Estimate

The actuarial valuation involves making assumptions about discount rates, expected rates of return on assets, future salary increase and mortality rates, due to the long term nature of the obligation, such estimates are subject to significant uncertainty.

f) Principal Actuarial Assumptions

An actuarial valuation was carried out as at 31st December 2022 by Actuarial and Management Consultant (pvt) Ltd. A firm of professional actuaries. The summary report of the actuarial valuation is as follows. The assumptions used in determining the cost of retirement benefits are as follow

3.2.5 Provision & Liabilities

a) Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the University has present obligations (legal and constructive) as a result of a past event, where it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

b) Contingent liabilities and contingent assets

Contingent assets and liabilities have been accounted in accordance with SLPSAS8. Accordingly a contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events whose existence will be continued by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the program or a present obligation that is not recognized because it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation.

A contingent liability also arises in extremely rare cases where there is a liability that cannot be measured reliably. The uncertainty does not recognize a contingent liability but disclose its existence in the financial statement.

A contingent asset is a possible asset that arises from past events whose existence will be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the University. The University does not recognize contingent asset but discloses its existence where inflow of economic benefits are probable but not virtually certain.

3.2.6 Accelerating Higher education Expansion Development Operation (AHEAD) and Science and Technology Human Resource Development Project (STHRD)

AHEAD project is operated by the University for which funds are allocated by the Ministry of Higher Education under the World Bank funding and STHRD project is operated by the University for which funds are allocated by the Ministry of Higher Education

under the Asian Development Bank. Funds allocated for the projects are not included in the annual budget of the University and directly disburse through the ministry. Therefore financial transactions of this project are not included in the financial statements of the University other than the disclosed in notes to the financial statements. However capital assets acquired through this grant including Property Plant & Equipment , completed construction works & human capital development expenditure are recognized as revenue from non-exchange transaction in accordance with SLPSAS 11 in the statement of financial performance and accumulated under capital surplus/(deficit) in the statement of financial position.

3.3 Revenue Recognition

Revenue comprises gross inflows of economic benefits or service potential received and receivable by University during the year and represents an increase in net assets/equity. University recognizes revenue following the established criteria of SLPSAS 10 (Revenue from Exchange Transactions) and SPSAS 11 (Revenue from Non Exchange Transactions).

3.3.1 Revenue from exchange transaction

Revenue from Exchange Transactions are transaction in which one entity receives assets or services or has liabilities extinguished and directly gives approximately equal value to another entity in exchange. The revenue from exchange transitions of the university has been disclosed under the note no 01.

(a) Undergraduate & other internal income

All the income derived from the undergraduate degree programmes and other internal income are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on cash basis.

(b) Income generated from self-financing activities

Income of the Self-financing activities recognized to the extent of the expenditure incurred for the period and future expenditures and contribution to the development votes are shown under the deferred income in the statement of financial position. . The income, expenditure and contribution for development votes of self-financing activities have been disclosed in the statement of financial performance.

(c) Interest Income

Interest income received for the period is recorded as exchange revenue in the statement of financial performance except for the investment income earned from the externally restricted funds, designated funds and endowments funds. When the investment income earned from those funds are in excess over the expenditure, the excess is recorded as a direct increase in relevant fund and included in the statement of financial position under accumulated reserves and grants. Interest on investment of gold medal and scholarship funds are accounted on cash basis if not matured during the accounting period.

(d) Rent Income

Rental income arising from renting out university assets is recognized as exchange transaction revenue.

3.3.2 Revenue from non-exchange transactions.

Non-exchange transactions are those where the university receives value from another entity (e.g. cash or other assets) without giving approximately equal value in exchange.

Inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions, other than services in-kind, that meet the definition of an asset are recognized as an asset only when:

- It is probable that the University will receive an inflow of economic benefits or service potential; and
- The fair value of can be measured reliably

Inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions that are recognized as assets are recognized as non- exchange revenue, to the extent that a liability is not recognized in respect to the same inflow. The following are the specific recognition criteria in relation to the University non exchange transaction.

Recognition of Revenue from Non-Exchange Transactions

- An inflow of resources from a non-exchange transaction
- recognized as an asset shall be recognized as revenue, except to the extent that a liability is also recognized in respect of the same inflow.
- As an entity satisfies a present obligation recognized as a liability in respect of an inflow of resources from a non-exchange transaction recognized as an

asset, it shall reduce the carrying amount of the liability recognized and recognize an amount of revenue equal to that reduction.

Measurement of Revenue from Non-Exchange Transactions

Revenue from non-exchange transactions shall be measured at the amount of the increase in net assets recognized by the entity.

Government grant / transfers

Assets and revenue arising from government grants are recognized in the period in which the transfer arrangement becomes binding at the fair value. Where a transfer is subject to conditions and when there is a resulting present obligation as a result of the non-exchange transaction, University recognizes a liability until the conditions is fulfilled. Assets and revenue arising from government grants are measured at the fair value as at the date of recognition .Monetary assets are measured at their nominal value.

Recurrent grant

Government grants received for the recurrent nature expenditures are recognized in the statement of financial performance under non exchange transactions. The government grant of Rs 5,721,500,000 was received as recurrent grant for the year 2022.

Capital block grant and other transfers

Government Grants and other capital transfers received for the capital expenditure are recognized in the statement of financial performance in accordance with the requirement of SLPSAS 11 Revenue from Non exchange transactions with effect from the financial year 2022. Comparative year of year 2021 has been reinstated in the financial statements. Capital surplus / (deficit) arising from the capital transactions are accumulated under the Accumulated Fund – Capital in the statement of financial position.

Reclassification to accumulated - fund Capital

University adopt and applied SLPSAS 11 – Revenue from Non Exchange transaction standard with effect from the year 2022 prospectively. To harmonize the presentation of financial statements, comparative figures in relation to spent capital grant, Capital grant unspent. Gift and donations were reclassified in to “Accumulated surplus capital” in the statement of financial position accordance with the SLPSAS 11 and guidance issued by the APFASL.

Gifts, donations and goods received in kind

Gifts, donations are voluntary transfers of assets including cash or other monetary assets and goods in-kind that the University receives which are free from stipulations. Gifts and donations and goods in kind received are recognized as non-exchange revenue at its fair value when it is probable that the future economic benefits or service potential will flow to the University, and the fair value of the assets can be measured reliably.

3.4 Expenditure Recognition

Expenses incurred in carrying out all activities of the University are recognized on an accrual basis and charged to the statement of Financial Performance. The expenditure has been analyzed by program/ project/ object wise and analysis was classified under different expenditure headings based on UGC guidelines to comply with the common reporting format during the period. The expenses were reclassified as Capital and Current according to the requirement of SLIPSAS 11.

3.5 The Impact to the financial Statements due to adopt SLPSAS 11 Revenue from non-exchange Transactions

To harmonize the presentation of financial statements, the financial statement of the year 2021 was restated accordance with the SLPSAS 11 and guidance issued by the APFASL. The impact is as follows.

a) Impact to Financial Performance.

According to the SLPSAS 11 government grants, donations, gifts were classified as revenue and capital. Capital nature and recurrent nature grants were recognized fully in Income Statement and expenses were recognized according to nature of capital or recurrent separately instead of amortization of capital grants according to the LKAS 20. The Income Statement of year 2021

was restated to comply with the requirement of the SLPAS 11 and the surplus/ (deficit) was identified as current surplus/ (deficit) and capital surplus/ (deficit).

Capital Commitment

1. Urban Development Authority handed over the possession of the land Mahahenwatta Pitipana, Homagama, 20 acres to the University of Sri Jayewardenepura, to construct a building for the Faculty of Technology. Value of the land is Rs. 960 million and payment will be made by the Ministry of Higher Education. The land will be recorded as an asset to the Financial Statement of the University after the transfer of ownership of the land.
2. Divisional secretariat of Homagama, handed over the possession of the land called Kakunagahawatta of No. 587, Maththegoda, Homagama, 10 acres to the University of Sri Jayewardenepura, to construct a building for Faculty of Engineering. Value of the land is Rs.975 million and paid by the Ministry of Land in year 2020. The land will be recorded as an asset to the Financial Statement of the University after the transfer of ownership of the land.
3. The University has deposited Rs.13 million in Kesbewa divisional Secretariat to acquire the land at 4th Lane, Egodawatta Road, Borrelesgamuwa. Value of the land is estimated to Rs.52 million. Process of acquisition is being carried out by the University.
4. Maharagama Divisional Secretariat has handed over the possession of the land of Hemavimana, Sorath Mawatha, Gangodawila on 20.03.2014 and The Government Valuer has valued the land as Rs.0.5 million per perch. Extent of the land is 167 perches and estimate value is Rs.83.5 Million. However payment has not been settled due to the pending matter in compensation review committee (land acquisition) under the Ministry of Land with the land owner due to the disagreement of land value, valued by The Government Valuer.
5. The University has paid of Rs.74 million to the Western Province Council to relocate the Methsewana home at Rattanapitiya to Sunflower Village at Mulleriyawa. Out of the land extend of 10 Acres of Methsewana Land, 3.5 acres handed over the possession to the University and Faculty of Medical Science has been established. The University has taken step to acquire the remaining land and the land will be recorded as an asset to the Financial Statement of the University after the transfer of ownership of the land.
6. Two main construction projects were commenced in year 2020 as Design and Build Contract and reported as work In Progress as at balance sheet date .The Contract sums have been changed due to the price escalation and there is an additional commitment. Further there are outstanding bills value as stated below in addition to the interest claim bills due to the inadequate treasury allocation for the projects.

1. Vice Chancellor, Deans of the faculties and two Senate members are members of the Council of the University. Remuneration and other income paid to these members during the year of 2022 was Rs.78,787,563.72. There is no special payment made for involving decision making process of the University.
2. Post Graduate Institute of Management (PIM) located No 28, Lesly Ranagala Mawatha, Colombo 08 is a Post graduate institution incorporated under the separate incorporated act and affiliated to the University of Sri Jayewardenepura. The Director of the Post Graduate Institute is a member to the Senate of the University and authorization of the academic activities are carried out by the Senate of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura. Financial operation of the institute are governed by the Board of management of the Institute. Accordingly financial transactions of the Post Graduate Institute of Management are not recoded to the University of Sri Jayewardenepura.
3. Mr.Sujeewa Rajapakse a member of Council, Finance Committee, and Chairman to the Audit and Management Committee of the University is the Chairman of the Peoples Bank which the University has invested Rs.3,875,269,273/- on fixed deposits, Rs.40,021,397/- on saving deposits and 19 no of current accounts are maintained.
4. University transactions are mainly funded by the General Treasury of Sri Lanka and the amount of fund received and expenditure incurred are shown in the Financial Statements.
Transaction dealt with other government organization were arm's length transitions and there were no direct or indirect interest with the university.
5. The University obtain the service for coordinating of the "Methsewana" Land acquisition from Mr.H.T.Kamal Padmasiri, member of the Council of University of Sri Jayewardenepura and paid Rs.600,000/-.

Payment was disbursed directly to the students based on the amounts recommended by the University. It was not disclosed on the face of the statement of Financial Performance for the year end 31st December 2022.
2. Asian Development Bank (ADB) has approved the grant of \$35 million (Approx. Rs.6 billion) for the construction of building complex and equipment for the Faculty of Engineering under the project of Science and Technology Human Resource Development Project operated under the Ministry of Education. An Agreement for the Design & Construction of Building and Infrastructure facility for the faculty of Engineering has been signed by the Secretary ,Higher Education with Sanken Consultant (Pvt) Ltd in January 2021 for the value of Rs.3,625 million (Without

VAT) to construct Building Complex for the Faculty of Engineering of the University on ADB Funding. Following grant value was recognized in year 2022.

World Bank grant has been received to the University under the project of Acceleration Higher Education Expansion and Development (AHEAD) Programme operated in the Ministry of Education to improve the Higher Education Facilities of the University. World Bank Grant of Rs.1,980 million has been received from the year 2018 to 2022 to improve following areas.

Result Area 01 - Increasing Enrolment in Higher Education in Priority Disciplines for Economic Development - **Rs. 1,154 millions.**

Result Area 02 - Enriching Learning, Teaching and Assessment and English Language Skills Enhancement & Human Resource Development – **Rs. 601 millions.**

The remaining balance of the grant was received for the different projects and those projects are continuing and will be capitalized after the completion of the projects.

4. Rs.347 Million worth of Land and Building situated in Kalubowila which belongs to the University of Sri Jayewardenepura is currently used by University of Visual Art and Performing. Action has been taken by the University to get back the said property from the University of Visual and Performance.
5. Approval of the Cabinet of Ministry was granted on 13th February 2014 to carryout project worth Rs.618 million under the Urban Department Project for the construction of an International level Conference Hall, Gymnasium and Sports Complex with a Swimming Pool. Rs.5,794,676 payment has been paid in year 2016 to Central Engineering Consultancy Bureau (CECB) for consultancy fee and preparation of plans. Budgetary allocation has not been received and project could not be able to start. The University has made continuous follow up for getting budgetary allocation to implement this project.
6. Chemicals and Glassware stock verification is carried out by the University to the balance sheet date of 31.12.2022 and stock value has been adjusted to the Financial Statements in year 2022.
7. The provision was made for the non-moving items of maintenance inventories in the year 2022.
8. The Exchange gain arising on US dollar Fixed deposits and US Dollar Account Maintain at the Faculty of Medical Sciences is Rs.144 Million. Further balance of savings account and fixed deposits maintain in USD were converted to functional currencies at the spot rate as at Balance Sheet date.
9. The University operated Forest Field Research Station at Yagirala. The land is belongs to the Forestry Department of Sri Lanka. The University incur cost related to the research activity.

Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements and Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements of the University of Sri Jayawardenapura for the year ended 31 December 2022 in terms of Section 12 of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

1. Financial Statements

1.1 Opinion

The audit of financial statements of the University of Sri Jayawardenapura for the year ended 31 December 2022 comprising the statement of Financial Position as at 31 December 2022 and the statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154(1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read in conjunction with Sub-section 107 (5) of the Universities Act, No.16 of 1978 and provisions of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018. My report to Parliament in pursuance of provisions in Article 154 (6) of the Constitution will be tabled in due course.

In my opinion, the accompanying financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the University of Sri Jayawardenapura as at 31 December 2022 and of its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

1.2 Basis for Opinion

I conducted my audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards (SLAuSs). My responsibilities, under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of this report. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

1.3 Other Information Included in the Annual Report 2022 of the University

The other information means the information included in the 2022 Annual Report of the University, which was expected to submit to me after the date of this report, but not contained in the Financial Statements and my audit report thereon. Management is responsible for this other information.

My opinion on financial statements does not cover the other information and I do not express any assurance or opinion thereon.

My responsibility in connection with my audit of financial statements is to study the above identified other information and evaluate whether the other information is substantially mismatched with the financial statements or my knowledge gained in auditing or another manner.

In the study of Annual Report of the University for the year 2021, if I conclude that there are substantial misstatements, I should communicate that matters to the governing body for correction. If there are misstatements further to be corrected, those will be included in the report which I table in parliament in accordance with Article 154 (6) of the Constitution in due course.

1.4 Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of financial statements that give a true and fair view in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards, and for such internal control as management determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the University's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intend to liquidate the University or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the University's financial reporting process.

As per Sub-section 16(1) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, the University is required to maintain proper books and records of all its income, expenditure, assets and liabilities, to enable annual and periodic financial statements to be prepared of the University.

1.5 Auditor's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

My objective is to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Appropriate audit procedures were designed and performed identify and assess the risks of material misstatement in financial statements whether due to fraud or errors in providing a basis for the expressed audit opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- An understanding of internal control relevant to the audit was obtained in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the University's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of the management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the University's

ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. However, future events or conditions may cause the University to cease to continue as a going concern.

- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

I communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during my audit.

2. Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

2.1.1 National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018 includes specific provisions for following requirements.

2.1.1. I have obtained all the information and explanation that required for the audit and as far as appears from my examination, proper accounting records have been kept by the University as per the requirement of Section 12 (a) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

2.1.2 The financial statements presented by the University are consistent with the preceding year as per the requirement of section 6 (1) (d) (iii) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

2.1.3 The financial statements presented includes all the recommendations made by me in the previous year as per the requirement of section 6 (1) (d) (iv) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

2.2 Based on the procedures performed and evidence obtained were limited to matters that are material, nothing has come to my attention;

2.2.1 to state that any member of the governing body has any direct or indirect interest in any contract entered into by the University which are out of the normal cause of business as per the requirement of section 12 (d) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

2.2.2 to state that the Corporation has not complied with any applicable written law, general and special directions issued by the governing body of the University as per the requirement of Section 12 (f) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018, except for the following observations.

2.2.4 to state that the resources of the University had not been procured and utilized economically, efficiently and effectively within the time frames and in compliance with the applicable laws as per the requirement of section 12 (h) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

2.3 Other Matters

- (a) Sums totaling Rs.2,090,357 received from the University Grants Commission in the years 2020 and 2022 for the expenses of the Centre for Gender Equity/Equality had not been used for the relevant purposes.
- (b) No action had been taken even in the year under review to settle retention money totaling Rs.80,446,328 related to 94 contract works carried out during the period from 2013 to 2019.
- (c) Although Rs.74 million had been paid to the Western Provincial Council to acquire the land with 7 acres on which the “Methsewana Home” is situated, the acquisition of 03 acres of the land has not been completed thus far. Furthermore, despite the payment of Rs.13 million to the Divisional Secretary, Kesbewa in the year 2018 for the Boralesgamuwa land and Rs.2.5 million to the Divisional Secretary, Maharagama in the year 2013 for 3 parcels of land, it has not been possible to acquire those lands even by 31 December 2022.
- (d) Due to the violation of bonds sums totaling Rs.77,235,211 remained recoverable as at 31 December 2022 from 22 from 41 academic and non-academic staff who had proceeded abroad. Although 05 officers had expressed their consent to recover Rs.5,188,694 from their University Provident Fund, that amount had not been recovered even by 31 December 2022.
- (e) Without determining the capability of carrying out the project through a proper feasibility study, a sum of Rs.5,794,676 had been spent in the year 2016 as consultation fees relating to the construction of an auditorium and for the preparation of its plans. Nevertheless, that task had not been done even up to the year under review.

Halgabawatta land at Egodawatta 4th Lane

A request dated 11.03.2016 has been referred to the Secretary to the Ministry of Education to purchase the Halgabawatta land situated at 4th Lane, Boralesgamuwa and the need to construct the student hostel thereon has been stated in the letter.

A letter has been referred to the Attorney General inquiring the ability to acquire the land while a partition cases is pending and the Attorney General has expressed his opinion on 03.05.2017. Accordingly, acquisition process was initiated.

On 03.07.2017, the University has been informed to deposit 25 percent of the land value in the Divisional Secretariat and submit the relevant receipt.

The main objective of the University is to establish a student hostel system.

Hewimana Dawatagabawatta Land

Being unsatisfied with the assessment made by the Department of Valuation, the owners of this land have lodged a complaint with the Compensation Review Committee. After the appointment of new

members to the Compensation Review Committee following the year 2017, the meetings have been commenced in 2022. When inquired about the current status of this land form the Reviewing Committee in 2023, we were informed that the relevant trial was concluded and the report was being prepared.

Kekunagahawattia, Maththegoda

Following the acquisition of this land by the Divisional Secretary, Homagama, the possession thereof has been vested in the University on 31.07.2017. It has been informed that the particulars have been referred to the Homagama Land Registry for registering the ownership of the land in accordance with the Gazette notification related to the transfer of ownership and that the registration will be given to the University soon after it is received upon completion of the process.
