VICE-CHANCELLOR'S REVIEW – 2022



It is a great pleasure to pen a message to the Annual Report 2022 of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka at this memorable occasion of the fulfilment of its very successful 27 years of being a National University in Sri Lanka. The Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka is located at Pambahinna, 162 kilometres away from the capital from the Colombo – Badulla A4 highway near the town of Belihuloya and covers an area of approximately 253 acres.

At present, the University consists of eight (09) Faculties. They are; Faculty of Graduate Studies, Faculty of Agricultural Sciences, Faculty of Applied Sciences, Faculty of Geomatics, Faculty of Management Studies, Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages, Faculty of Technology, Faculty of Medicine and Faculty of Computing. The Faculty of Medicine is located in Kuruwita, Ratnapura. The total number of internal students of the university in the year 2022 was 8146. The number of internal students enrolled for undergraduate programmes during the year was 2022 and 829 students were enrolled for postgraduate studies. In addition, 3265 students were registered for the courses offered by the Centre for Open and Distance Learning. The University has a total academic staff of 321, 33 administrative and executive staff, 22 academic support staff and 384 non – academic staff.

However, despite this trying condition, through the commendable dedicated service of the innovative and capable academic, administrative and non-academic staff of the university and excellent support of the students, academic programs of the university including, lectures, practical as well as examinations were accomplished using different alternative methods. Further, the General Convocation of the university was also held on time despite all the restrictions and difficulties in the wake of the pandemic situation.

The Physical development activities of the university were conducted throughout the year without any discontinuation. Those includes, construction of building complexes for the Faculty of Applied Sciences (Rs. 453Mn), Faculty of Agriculture (Rs.798Mn.), Faculty of Medicine (Rs. 1014Mn.), Faculty of Technology (Rs. 2050Mn.), University Library (Rs.315Mn),

construction of buildings under AHEAD project at Faculty of Applied Sciences (Rs. 31Mn.), Faculty of Social Science and Languages (34 Mn), construction of boundary wall for Helabojun Hala, Supply & Installing, Configuring of Data System, renovation works of U halls, renovation and development number of activities at the Agriculture farm. Also, necessary actions were taken to submit the concept papers related to the Design and construction of the Resource Management Building, Waste Water and Sewerage Treatment Plant and proposals for two new faculties, Faculty of Sports and Faculty of Veterinary Animal Sciences.

The University has also taken steps to facilitate students and academic staff to enhance the research culture of the University. In the year 2022, three international conferences and five students' research sessions were held. Further, the staff of the university were able to secure nearly Rs.500Mn research funds for 16 outside funded research projects. 05 patent applications were submitted during the year and 02 Licensee agreements and 03 MoUs were signed with industrial partners for the commercialization of the outcomes of researches.

Under the SMART university concept, development of systems for students' information management, staff information management as well as for the management of physical resources were implemented. Actions were taken to make administration of the university more effective and efficient by establishment of different administrative bodies such as Senior Management Committee, Students Support Services and Welfare System etc. Ten (10) policies were developed to make sure the fair governance at the university. To provide the community with a better service, the capabilities of the staff were improved by providing required training by conducting 26 workshops and training programs during the year.

Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka was able to be success in the year 2022 as a result of the remarkable service and commitment of the staff and students of the university. Also, I gratefully acknowledge the University Grants Commission and the Ministry of Education who provided a visionary leadership and support throughout the year. My heartfelt thanks also go all of them for their dedicated work.

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1. THE UNIVERSITY

1.1 HISTORY OF THE UNIVERSITY

The history of Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka (SUSL) can be traced back to 1991 when it was initially established as an Affiliated University College at Belihuloya. In 1995, a committee was appointed by the Minister of Education and Higher Education to study the possibilities of re-structuring the Affiliated University Colleges in the country. In accordance with the recommendations made by the Committee, the government decided to upgrade Sabaragamuwa Affiliated University College to the status of a National University by amalgamating it with two other Affiliated University Colleges located at Rahangala and Buttala. They were renamed as Uva Campus of Sabaragamuwa University. Before the amalgamation, the Affiliated Colleges at Belihuloya and Buttala were affiliated to the University of Sri Jayewardenepura. Rahangala Affiliated University College was amalgamated with the University of Peradeniya. With the three amalgamated affiliated University Colleges, the Sabaragamuwa University was ceremonially declared the opening on February 2, 1996.

Subsequently, the Affiliated University Colleges at Rahangala and Buttala were converted into the Faculties of Agricultural Sciences and Applied Sciences and shifted to Belihuloya main campus in 2001 and 2008 respectively.

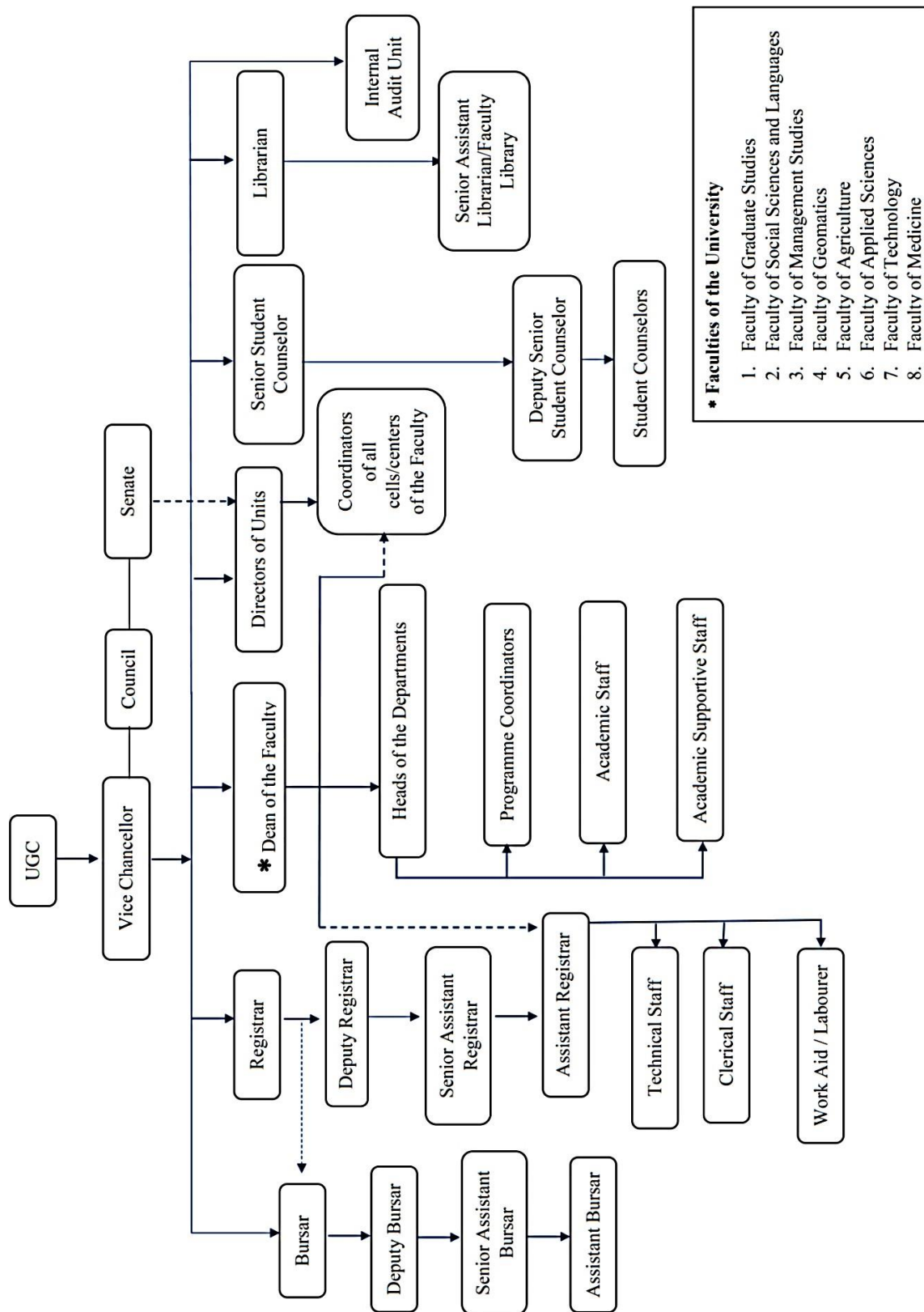

2.1 FACULTY OF GRADUATE STUDIES

2.1.1 BRIEF HISTORY

Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka (SUSL) offers its graduate qualifications through the Faculty of Graduate Studies (FGS). The University Grants Commission at its 928th meeting held on November 9, 2015, granted the approval to establish the Faculty of Graduate Studies. Within this broader spectrum, FGS offers a wide range of postgraduate studies related to the fields such as Agricultural Sciences, Computing & Information Systems, Geomatics, Humanities, Management, Physical & Natural Sciences, Social Sciences, Sports Sciences and Physical Education, Medicine, Technology, Indigenous Knowledge and Community Studies. The students who follow the graduate degree programmes available in these fields certainly benefit in widening their research based knowledge not only to enhance the career progression but also to redefine the existing ontologies to reach beyond national spatiotemporal horizons.

At present (2022) the FGS conducts Twelve (12) Postgraduate programs. Among the programs offered there are Eight (8) taught programs leading to graduate qualifications at master level, two (2) Postgraduate Diplomas including Postgraduate Diploma in Business Administration, Master of Business Administration (MBA), MBA in Finance, MBA in Marketing, MBA in Tourism, MSc Ayurvedic Hospital Management, MSc Surveying Sciences, Master of Information Technology, MA English & Education and Research Higher degree programs leading to MPhil and Ph.D. qualifications. Further, the Faculty of Graduate Studies plans to offer Master of Business Economics, MSc in Business Economics, MSc in Plantation Crop Production and Management and MSc in Sustainable Crop Production in near future. All these programs are aligned with the Sri Lanka Qualification Framework (SLQF) and the subject benchmarks of the University Grants Commission in Sri Lanka.

Altogether there are 829 active postgraduate students in the Faculty of Graduate Studies and the objective of the FGS is to provide an opportunity as well as to facilitate effective and efficient delivery of study programmes through quality teaching and research training to produce individuals with graduate qualifications in their respective disciplines who are competent in facing the challenges of development both locally and internationally.

The Faculty of Agricultural Sciences of Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka was initially established at Rahangala in 1995 and was shifted to the main premises at Belihuloya in 2001. From 2001, academic programs were conducted with limited facilities at Belihuloya. In 2005 and 2018 the faculty was able to win competitive World Bank grants of Rs.82.5 million and Rs.120 million respectively to develop infrastructure and other academic facilities. A comprehensive curriculum revision was undertaken and the degree programme was renamed as Agricultural Sciences and Management.

2.2.2 DEGREE PROGRAMMES CONDUCTED BY THE FACULTY

The Faculty is composed of three Departments of study such as Agribusiness Management, Export Agriculture and Livestock Production. The Faculty of Agricultural Sciences offers the following four year honours degree programmes.

BSc Hons (Agricultural Sciences and Management)

(Students can specialize in four fields such as Agribusiness Management, Agri-Environmental Resource Management, Crop Improvement & Plant Protection, Crop Production Technology, Animal Bio-resource Technology & Management, and Aquatic Bio-resource Technology & Management.)

BSc Hons (Food Business Management)

The Department of Export Agriculture offers three academic modules in Agri-Environmental Resource Management, Crop Improvement & Plant Protection, and Crop Production Technology. During the first four semesters (first 2 years), students need to follow core-courses for their general study on Agriculture followed by specialization either in Agribusiness Management, Agri-Environmental Resource Management, Crop Improvement & Plant Protection, Crop Production Technology and Animal Bio-resource Technology & Management, Aquatic Bio-resource Technology & Management for two more semesters (in the 3rd year). Students must select their field of specialization at the end of the second year, according to their preferences. Farm Practice, Computer Sciences and English courses are offered in the first three years and students must reach a satisfactory grade for each course in each semester to complete the degree. In addition, elective courses are offered during the third year second semester and final year first semester. Students must select two elective courses in third year and four elective courses at final year according to their preferences. The second semester of the final year BSc Agricultural Sciences and Management student is allocated for industrial training while both semesters to the final year of Food Business Management Degree Programme allocated for industrial training which is a vital and specific component of the degree programs and students must undertake a research in the specialized field. The medium of instruction of the degree program is English.

The Faculty organizes programs as the practical components of the degree programme in collaboration with farmers in the area to ensure that knowledge and skills are exchanged between students and farmers. As a result the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences has developed close links with the surrounding communities. Furthermore, students are given an opportunity to visit various industries to get exposure to operational aspects of the industry and research organizations.

2.3 FACULTY OF APPLIED SCIENCES

2.3.1 BRIEF HISTORY

The Faculty of Applied Sciences of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka was initially started as the Buttala Affiliated University College (BAUC) on 21st June 1993. The BAUC offered two diploma courses, one in Food Science and Technology and the other in English Language. With the elevation of the Affiliated University Colleges to fully fledged national Universities in early 1996, three Affiliated University Colleges; Sabaragamuwa Affiliated University College, Uva Affiliated University College and Buttala Affiliated University College were amalgamated to form the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka and the BAUC became the Faculty of Applied Sciences of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka.

With effect from March 2008, the faculty has been relocated in the main university premises at Belihuloya.

The Faculty comprises five departments: The Department of Natural Resources, The Department of Physical Sciences & Technology, Department of Food Science & Technology, The Department of Computing & Information Systems and The Department of Sport Science and Physical Education.

The Faculty offers B.Sc. (Special) degree programs in Food Science and Technology, Environmental Sciences and Natural Resource Management, Chemical Technology, Computer Science and Technology, Applied Physics, Computing and Information Systems, Sport Sciences and Management and Physical Education for the students who gain direct entry to the Faculty on the basis of their performance at the GCE (Advanced Level) examination.

The degree programs are designed to be four-year degree programs with an exit point at three years for the students who graduate with a general degree in B.Sc. in Physical Sciences and Technology and Environmental Sciences and Management. The rest of the degree programs are strictly four-year degree programs.

The selection of the students for the B.Sc. degree programs in Sport Sciences and Management and Physical Education is done on the basis of the G.C.E. (A/L) results as well as the performance at a selection test (Written examination). The students who wish to get enrolled for the degree programs in Sport Sciences and Management and Physical Education are also required to face an examination for physical fitness in addition to the selection test. However, the selection procedure has been changed by the UGC through a circular and there will not be any further aptitude tests for the recruitment of undergraduates for the Faculty.

All degree programs offered through the faculty are designed to cater to the current job trends and demands both nationally and internationally. They are conducted exclusively in English. These degree programs are designed as interdisciplinary by incorporating subjects as Computer Science, Economics, Management, etc. that has facilitated our students to perform well once graduating serving a wider field than being specific and narrowed to than specialized field.

Apart from the academic activities the Faculty also contributes to the development of the community and the nation through extension and knowledge Dissemination programs. The staff and the students participate in such activities annually.

Department of Computing and Information Systems

The Department of Computing and Information Systems which offers a B.Sc. Honours in Information Systems was established in 01st March 2011, though the Degree programme was

Initiated back in 2008. The curriculum is specifically designed to produce skilled graduates both in Computing and Information Technology. At present the department has three well established laboratories and the student capacity of the department is 312.

The demand for the above degree programme has greatly increased thorough out the years and annual intake has reached the maximum capacity of 80 students per batch. The department has close collaborations with private computer industries to obtain technical support in conducting lectures and practical as well as to provide opportunities for the undergraduates to carry out their mini projects and final year projects. This also has increased the opportunity for the undergraduates to secure job opportunities immediately after graduation. The staff of the Department consists of two professor, five senior lecturers and eleven probationary lecturers.

Department of Food Science and Technology

The Department of Food Science and Technology was established in 2005 even though the B.Sc. degree in Food Science and Technology was offered under the Department of Natural Resources since the inception of the Faculty in 1996. The range of the study areas includes Food Science Technology core, Applied Food Technologies, General Sciences, Statistics, Computer Science & Technology, Food Marketing, Industrial Economics and courses in scientific communication and career development. The degree program is designed for the students who wish to pursue professional careers in the field of Food Science and Technology. The knowledge and skills gained from the degree program enable the graduates to cater to the growing demand for Food Scientists & Technologists both in government and the private sector, locally and abroad. The degree also paves an excellent path for postgraduate studies in related disciplines of Food Science and Technology. At present, the Department academic staff comprises one professor, seven senior lecturers and two probationary lecturers. There are several eminent senior academics and industrial experts who contribute as visiting Professionals in their specialized fields. The Department has five well-equipped laboratories for conducting undergraduate lab sessions and relevant research, namely, Food Analysis Laboratory, Food Microbiology Laboratory, Food Processing Laboratory, Meat Processing Laboratory and Dairy Processing Laboratory and the current student capacity of the department is 150.

Department of Natural Resources

The Department of Natural Resources was established in 1996 offering a B.Sc. General degree in Natural Resources. The degree program offered by the Department is designed to cater to the current job market in the fields of Environmental Protection, Natural Resource Management and Conservation, Biodiversity Conservation and Management, Environmental Advocacy and Ecology both in Sri Lanka and around the world.

In 2006, the Degree Programme which was initially offered as B.Sc. in Natural Resources as a three-year general degree program was upgraded and restructured to offer a Degree programme as Environmental Science and Natural Resources Management which has improved the job opportunities for the graduates. Currently the degree program is oriented in three major streams viz. Environmental Science, Biological Science and Earth Science with awarding two degree programs as B.Sc. (Special) in Environmental Science and Natural Resources Management – 4 years and B.Sc. (General) in Environmental Science and Natural Resources Management – 3 years. The degree also paves an excellent path for postgraduate studies. The Department has the capacity to enroll sixty students per year. At present, the academic staff of the department consists of ten faculty members including five professors, five senior lecturers and one lecturer.

Department of Physical Sciences & Technology

The Department of Physical Sciences & Technology conducts degree courses in three major disciplines; namely, Chemical Technology, Applied Physics and Computer Science & Technology. Mathematics, Statistics, and Management Studies are conducted as supporting tools for the programme. The Department offers four-degree programs namely: B.Sc. (Applied Sciences) Special Degree in Chemical Technology (Duration: 4 years), B.Sc. (Applied Sciences) Special Degree in Computer Science & Technology (Duration: 4 years) B.Sc. (Applied Sciences) Special Degree in Applied Physics (Duration: 4 years) and B.Sc. (Applied Sciences) Degree in Physical Sciences (Duration: 3 years).

All theoretical course units conducted by the department are heavily supported by a practical component which provides the preliminary experience to perform confidently. And also, the Mini projects conducted throughout the third and the fourth academic years stimulate the students' creative and innovative thinking. The Final year project (research or industrial training) for one entire semester exposes the undergraduates to the working environment and provides hand on experience in industry before the graduation. The environment in the campus and the teaching programs were all designed in a manner to establish this goal and also to produce specialists in their respective fields. Additionally, it is also creditable that the Department offers the only Degree in Applied Physics in the entire University System in the country. The Department has 4 well-equipped laboratories namely; Physics Laboratory, Chemistry Laboratory I, Chemistry Laboratory II, Chemistry Research Laboratory and the



Student capacity of the department is 117. The staff of the department consists of one Chair Professor, one Senior Professor, three professors, eight senior lecturers, eight probationary lecturers, one temporary assistant lecturer, and one temporary lecturer.

Department of Sport Sciences and Physical Education

Two-degree programs namely B.Sc. Special Degree in Sport Sciences & Management and B.Sc. Special Degree in Physical Education have been awarded since 2008 through the Faculty of Applied Sciences. The Department of Sport Sciences and Physical Education was established in 01st March 2011. The courses of Sport Sciences & Management degree programme is specially designed to produce graduates with basic scientific sport skills and management skills required for today's teaching sports at primary, secondary and tertiary education levels and at other industries and organizations. The degree programme in Physical Education is specially designed to produce graduates who are competent the scientific basis of physical education activities and practices. The duration of the degree programs are four years and at present there is a great demand for the degree programme which is significantly shown by the increasing number of student intake each year and at present the intake has reached the maximum capacity. The both degree programs are well supported by practical activities and projects that has enabled to produce skilled and competent graduates within four years. The department also has many collaborations with sports organizations facilitating the students to participate in many national and international gaming competitions and coaching programs. The Department has two well-equipped laboratories namely; Exercise biochemistry Laboratory and Research Laboratory and the student capacity of the department is 374. The staff comprises of six senior lecturers, two lecturers, six probationary lecturers, two instructors and two temporary assistant lecturers. The service of eminent sport specialist is also obtained to conduct both practical and theory courses for the student



2.4 FACULTY OF GEOMATICS

2.4.1 BRIEF HISTORY

The Faculty of Geomatics is one of the five faculties of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka and was established in 2004. It is the successor of the Department of Surveying Sciences, which introduced the B.Sc. (Surveying Sciences) degree programme in 1997. This was the first time in the history of the university system in Sri Lanka that such a degree programme was introduced by a university fulfilling a much felt need of the country. The degree programme is a four year course leading to a special degree. The first batch of the students admitted to the degree programme in 1997 and graduated in 2022.

2.5 FACULTY OF MANAGEMENT STUDIES

2.5.1 BRIEF HISTORY

The Faculty of Management Studies was commenced in September 1996 as the Faculty of Business Studies, with two departments, i.e. Department of Accountancy and Finance and Department of Business Management, offering a three-year degree. After the completion of the foundation year and two specialization years, a degree in Bachelor of Science could be obtained in Financial Management, Business Management, Marketing Management, and Tourism Management. Accordingly, six batches obtained their BSc Special degrees and passed out in the years of 1997, 1998, 1999, 2000, 2001 and 2002. In 2003 the Faculty was renamed as the Faculty of Management Studies and the duration of the degree programmes conducted by the Faculty was changed from three years to four years with the approval of the UGC.

Presently the Faculty of Management Studies comprises four departments; Department of Accountancy and Finance, Department of Business Management, Department of Marketing Management and Department of Tourism Management and seven degree programmes are being offered.

2.6 FACULTY OF MEDICINE

2.6.1 BRIEF HISTORY

The Faculty of Medicine at the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka is the latest addition to the chain of Medical Faculties in Sri Lanka. It was established in the year 2018 under Gazette Notice No. 2082/32 of August 01, 2018. It becomes the 8th Faculty at the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. The medical profession caters to one of the most crucial needs of the society, therefore, it stands to reason that medical degrees are among the most challenging and competitive qualifications to pursue. This Faculty comprises 15 Departments that are dedicated to achieving all aspects of its academic mission and objectives. The academic elements of the MBBS Degree Program are based on four main disciplinary pillars; theoretical education, clinical care, community engagement, and research. The Faculty of Medicine is established in Kuruwita temporarily where the preclinical studies of the degree program are conducted. Further, a new faculty building is constructed on a land in New Town, Ratnapura and the professorial unit is constructed adjacent to the Teaching Hospital, Ratnapura. Moreover, the Administrative Building of the New Faculty Premises was received and ceremonially inaugurated by the Vice-chancellor of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka on the 19th of October 2022. Further, the faculty would be equipped with both human resources and physical resources with state-of-the-art technologies to provide the best academic and learning environment for the students. The Teaching Hospital, Ratnapura provides all clinical training facilities for the students. The faculty accommodates 100 students per intake and at present with 04 batches of students enrolled for the MBBS degree program totaling up to 354 students.

2.7 FACULTY OF SOCIAL SCIENCES AND LANGUAGES

2.7.1 BRIEF HISTORY

The Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages had its beginning at the same time, when the University commissioned her study programs in 1996. The Faculty initially possessed two Departments of studies i.e. the Department of Languages and the Department of Social Sciences. The third Department of the Faculty, The Department of English Languages Teaching was initiated in 2004 while the fourth, The Department of Economics and Statistics commenced in 2009. The Department of Geography and Environmental Management was established as the fifth Department in 2015. The Faculty began its academic operations in November 1996 with the intake of students from the former affiliated University Collage, who were permitted, with their Diplomas in English, to study for a degree after two years. The Faculty started register students with Advanced Level qualification only from the year 1998.

In pursuit of its vision and mission, the Faculty offers Honors Degrees through its Departments. Breaking from the initial concept of three year Honors degrees in the Faculty, in 2007, the Faculty introduced four-year Honors Degree Programs in Economics, Statistics, Geography, Political Science, Sociology and Anthropology in addition to its three year Social Sciences Honors Degree Program. Four-year Honors Degree Programs in Sinhala, Tamil, English, German, Japanese, Chinese and Hindi have also been introduced with effect from 2013. In 2014, the Faculty introduced Bachelor of Arts Honors in Information and Communication Technology and in 2015, Bachelor of Arts Honors in Translation Studies. At present, the Faculty offers four-year Honors Degrees and three-year General Degrees only. The Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages prepares students for professional careers, by providing them with a broad understanding of the humanistic tradition in combination with a sound knowledge of subjects in several disciplines. Our programs emphasize the ability to apply this knowledge to problems and tasks in the contemporary world of work. We strive to develop students' capacity for independent and critical thought, logical analysis, effective communication, and informed participation in teamwork. Therefore, the Bachelor of Arts program integrates classroom work and students' independent reading and writing with hands-on research and project work.

The only Arts faculty in Sri Lankan University System got "A" grade to all degree programmes in the University Grants Commission. The Department of Information Technology is the 6th department which is attached to the Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages under the Gazette extraordinary No. 1903/63 February 27, 2015.

3.1 THE LIBRARY

3.1.1 DESCRIPTION OF THE LIBRARY

The Main Library provides its' services for the entire University to achieve the standard of excellence in their academic programs. The Management Faculty Library serves the needs of the Faculty of Management Studies. The Agricultural Sciences Library serves the needs of the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences. The Faculty of Medicine owns separate branch Library. The collections and services of the library are designed to match the needs that range from basic support of the curriculum to the advanced research requirements of patrons.

The SUSL Libraries deliver customer focused quality information products, services and programs, creatively adjust to changing information needs and innovatively respond to new challenges at National and International level.

The collection of books and periodicals of all libraries in the end of 2022 was approximately 134000 (Purchased + Donation) including purchased books, donation books, pamphlets, audio visual materials and e-resources received to the Library.

The SUSL Library is using KOHA open-source software for Library automation. Collection has been organized as Lending Section, Reference Section, Permanent Reference Section, Periodical Section, Other Collection & Past paper Collections.

3.1.2 IN HOUSE ACTIVITIES

Library Committee

The Library Committee, the Sub-committee of the Senate is the principal management body of the Sabaragamuwa University Library. The Library Committee has been scheduled to be held on each and every month regularly. The Librarian plays the role of Secretary of the Committee. The Chairman of the committee is generally the Vice Chancellor of the University.

Objectives of the Libraries

In fulfilling the main objective of developing the university through self-studies and self-improvement, the university libraries in the country play a major role. The Sabaragamuwa University has three branch libraries: the library of the Faculty of Management Studies, the library of the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences and the Faculty of Medicine Library, in addition to the Main library. The Main library serves the needs of five faculties at the moment - the

Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages, the Faculty of Applied Sciences, the Faculty of Geomatics, the Faculty of Technology and the Faculty of Graduate Studies. The Faculty libraries for Agricultural Sciences, Management Studies and Medicine serve the needs of their undergraduates. At present SUSL is actively involved in developing e-information provision.

The SUSL network expects to expand its facilities for patrons with development of the new library building for the main library. Enhancing physical resources such as bibliographic material received from donors and purchased by the library will be focused on this direction apart from the human resources that would expect to increase quantitatively as well as qualitatively align with establishing of the new building.

Inter Library Loan (ILL) Service, and collaboration with existing library networks such as Sri Lanka Science and Technology Information Network (SLSTINET), Health Literature, Library, and Information Services (HELLIS), Agricultural Information Network (AGRINET) ensure the barrier-free, fair, and equal information access to the users at SUSL and in other HEIs and research institutions.

Regular magazine donation by the Library Assistants Union-SUSL to the school libraries in the vicinity of SUSL ensure the equal access to information, social equity and library marketing through this community outreach initiatives.

Cultivation of vegetables, fruits and other crops and maintenance by library in align with the Green Library Project which will be commenced from 2023 under library committee approval.

Basic practices of rainwater harvesting during rainy season reduce water consumption as the collected rainwater is used for gardening purposes by the janitorial staff of the library.

Promoting mental well-being by enhancing work-life balance and entertainment through a one-day library staff trip on 07.12.2022 to Down-South, Sri Lanka. Farewell occasions, birthday celebrations, service celebrations ensure unity among the library staff.

Promoting the library environment as a place for reading, reference, and research works. In addition, 24/7 reading hall facilities are provided throughout the year. The library opening hours are extended on demand of the user request. The newly established Cyber Zone facilitates users with internet access with better bandwidth to access VLE and other online based platforms.

Promoting lifelong and self-learning opportunities through the newly established “Research Cube”. Internet connection is provided, and the allocated PC can be used to research related activities. The cupboard in the cube is to store the documents of researchers until the research / project is completed. The library academic staff support in literature searching, introducing searching techniques, conducting literature survey, citation and referencing, Turnitin similarity checking and plagiarism prevention, predatory publication prevention, layout designing of dissertation/ thesis, developing, and maintaining the research profile and career profile and CV writing.

Conducting training workshop sessions to enhance IT skills in order to increase the productivity and performance of the library staff.

Promoting online learning through the providing access to e-resources including scholarly e-databases, e-journals, e-books, e-resource packs with animated video clips, e-government information sources, uninterrupted internet facilities through the newly established Cyber Zone, scholarly videos in the official YouTube channel of the library. The digital repository maintained by the library is a showcase of the institutional research and publications of the entire university community. The barrier-free access to the digital repository guarantees “information access for all”.

The library established a digital scanning unit and initiated a digital scanning project with the newly purchased digital scanner. Hands-on training for specially identified staff to engage in the operations of the newly established digital scanning unit. This is utilized to digitally transform the conventional library services into the next level and reduce the paper use in the library. This unit mainly facilitates 2 library services:

Current contents and index service – The main library, SUSL commenced a current content service (CCS) to disseminate the information regarding the recent addition of periodicals. The current contents can be accessed through the main library website (<https://www.sab.ac.lk/lib/periodicals>). This digestive information service includes the packages of current contents of academic journals and research proceedings, magazines, reports and handbooks, Index to the past examination papers and postgraduate theses and dissertations, scanned newspaper cuttings, Web links to government publications.

Newspaper cutting service – The printed version of the scholarly articles by SUSL community and others will be available in the periodical section. The scanned copies of the paper cuttings can be accessed through <https://www.sab.ac.lk/lib/periodicals>.

The information related to Sabaragamuwa Province, Rathanapura District and Samanalawewa projects are preserved in e-repository through the collaboration with NSF, Sri Lanka. The “Sabaragamuwa Collection” is physically available in the main library. The collection contains classics, SUSL Research and publications, SUSL handbooks, SUSL reports, SUSL Newspaper articles, Faculty handbooks, Pamphlets, newsletters etc. A part of this collection has been transferred and is available at the SUSL Museum for preservation purposes of cultural heritage for future generations.

Paper usage is reduced as much as possible by limiting printed works, and increasing online documentation, online sharing and scanning. The library due clearance forms have been converted to online- form. The user reminders are sent via e mails. The minutes of library committee are distributed as e-documents. Invitations for the human library events are distributed via e mail and WhatsApp. Library fine-collection is done by an electronic payment system. The default setting of all the printers is double side printing. Used envelopes are reused for internal communication. The stamps collection is developed based on the received stamps through the letters and donated to the public library-Balangoda. Under the weed out policy, selected materials can be donated upon the recommendations.

Waste management is a regular practice in the library. Waste is separately disposed to 3 different-colored dustbins. Plastic usage is reduced by using alternatives for disposable stuffs and replaced with ceramic mugs, clay water bottles, clay pots, lunch boxes, fountain pens, cloth serviettes etc.

Healthy food and beverages are served at library events such as Human library events.

All the PC are sleep mode activated, fans and lights are switched off in the library areas where daylight and natural ventilation can be used.

Library profession related flyers for training/workshops/ seminars/conferences and e-newspapers are distributed through the WhatsApp group of the library staff and other SUSL groups.

Official library website, Facebook page, YouTube channel, Twitter page are used to mirror the library services, functions, operations, rules and regulations, events, news; brand and promote the library within the university community and beyond.

Instant chat service enabled in the library website reduces the payments for other communication channels and facilitates users with quick responses.

Integrated library management system (KOHA) enhances effectiveness and efficiency and reduces human errors being a replacement for manual operations.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (QAC) for the library functions as a key unit to enhance productivity, ensure authority and reliability, assure the performance/service and product quality and standardize the library and library related activities.

Asia Foundation in collaboration with Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka launched a program on e-story books for children through the Zoom platform.

3.2 CENTRE FOR COMPUTER STUDIES

3.2.1 INTRODUCTION

The Centre for Computer Studies provides many IT related academic and technical services to the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. The centre has been conducting and supervising academic programmes of different faculties, preparing IT curricula and providing training for academic and non-academic staff as well as academic supportive staff. The CCS has been providing University web service and email facility for the entire university community. Campus-wide Internet and networking facility, virtual learning environment with other network services, e-learning facility and hardware software maintenance services are the technical services provided by the Centre for Computer Studies.

3.2.2 HISTORY

The history of Sabaragamuwa University Computer Centre goes back to the time of inauguration of Affiliated University College (AUC) of Sabaragamuwa Province in 1991. It started at one of the residential building then own to Samanalawewa Hydro Electrical Power Project and now D1-4 quarters of Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. Initially, it equipped with 10 numbers of Tatung 286 computers featured 1Mb RAM, 40MB Hard disks and an OKI 9-pin dot-matrix printer and at the time of inauguration of AUC, late Hon. President Ranasinghe Premadasa unveiled the plaque of the centre.

At that time AUC enrolled students for Diploma programmes and conducted three diploma courses called Diploma in Accounting & Finance, Diploma in Tourism Management and Diploma in English. The Core Course of Computing offered by the computer centre was compulsory component to obtain the diploma produced by all programmes.

After some times, with the donation of Rs. 15,000/= from the Balangoda District Judge who launched a program to donate funds for social works from the fines collected from the drugs victims, initiated to start the construction of existing computer centre building with the help of the staff, students and villagers by “Shramadana Campaign” and finally completed using the government funds. It was the first building constructed simultaneous with the old auditorium for the AUC in addition to the buildings acquiring from the Samanalawewa Project.

Initially it was recruited one staff member to computer centre as an Instructor-in-Computer-Technology for conducting the lectures and practical for the core courses. Meanwhile, two other instructors were recruited to the computer centre cadre to extend the work it carried out and it was the only centre which had an approved cadre in the AUC system.

After upgrading the AUC into full-fledged national university as Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka in 1996, computer centre started to render its services to the different degree programs. Especially for non-IT, faculties by means of designing and preparing course materials for IT related subjects and conducting lectures and practical classes. Further, center contributed technological knowledge for preparing and evaluating tender documents for purchasing of computers and other ICT related equipment for the university and training of clerical staff of the university for effectively use of ICT for their day to day works as well as helping to academic staff for preparing their postgraduate thesis and in preparing teaching materials etc.

When expansion of the university and its functions, computer centre was renamed as Centre for Computer Studies and re-organized under a Director and started helping for conducting ICT related courses for the degree programmes especially for Faculty of Management Studies and Faculty of Social Sciences & Languages and constructed another building adjacent to the existing centre for broadening its services. At the same time university Local Area Network was planned and commissioned and got connected to the Internet via LEARN and started providing and maintaining the Internet and network services to the entire university community. Launching Sabaragamuwa University Web Site and providing E-Learning environment are such land marking services offered.

Meanwhile, to strengthen the services provided by the Centre for Computer Studies the cadre provisions has been increased according to the 2012 approved cadre list of UGC.

Computer Applications Assistant and the Technical Officers are assigned for the solving of software and hardware problems of computers and accessories in each faculties, faculty computer centers in addition to the other places such as centers and offices of the entire university. Mr. Sanjeewa Premalal and Mr. Janaka Senarath are currently involving to do such work as well as to report about the faultier of equipment's to the respective authorities to get decisions to repair them.



3.2.4 CURRENT STATUS

On request of the different faculties, the academic services provided by the centre are mainly limited to Faculty of Social Sciences & Languages, Faculty of Management Studies and to the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences.

Other IT services such as Internet and web service are provided for entire university community. Other than that computer center is providing maintenance-support for services running in the network which are installed by other parties such as library system, IP Phone system, IP Camera system, Wireless networks etc.

At present most of the faculties have built their own complexes and they have their own computer centers within faculty premises for conducting their IT related academic programs. Therefore, no need of using the existing buildings of the CCS for conducting their programs further, instead they can be utilized for widen the services offered by the Centre such as conducting training programmes for non-academic and administrative staff as well as assisting the academic staff to fulfilling their IT-related needs.

The CCS supervises all computer related academic activities in these five computer centers and maintains the campus-wide network including all the servers required to provide network services such as web, e-learning, DNS, email, digital library system, student information service and network troubleshooting services.

In year of 2013, infrastructure facilities and academic programs related with IT have further improved due to allocations from the consolidated fund by the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. With this fund, the university managed to increase the Internet bandwidth from 20Mbps to 100Mbps and increase the number of computer facilities to all academic and administrative staff members at their work places.

Due to the high demand of the internet usage of the university, internet providers requested to increased bandwidth up to 225 Mbps in 2018. It is increased up to 700 Mbps with the dialog 100Mbps backup link along with the SLT. Accordingly, the computer center proposed to increase the internal bandwidth of the fiber backbone and currently the university internet connections are running with the bandwidth of 600Mbps.

Free Wi-Fi areas implemented for the students inside the university to provide a better learning environment to them. According to that all faculties covered with Wi-Fi facility. Furthermore, CCS has initiated free Wi-Fi project with the ministry of education to increase Wi-Fi zones for the student's hostels and study areas.

Since the covid-19 pandemic situation, university system had to conduct all the academic activities, students' evaluation process and all other university activities thorough online.

Therefore, as a Center for Computer Studies, we had to facilitate those activities with maximum capacity.

In addition to VLE (Virtual Learning Environment), separate server has been bought and installed as separate VLE for exam purposes of each faculties including Faculty of Graduate Studies and Centre for Open and Distance Learning.

Zoom (Zoom's secure, reliable video platform powers all of your communication needs, including meetings, chat, phone, webinars, and online events.) accounts have been created for each academic staff and other selected staff of the university to process the activities of the university in online manner.

Turnitin (Turnitin is an Internet-based plagiarism detection service run by the American company Turnitin) accounts have been created for the academic staff of the university as per their requested.

University digital repository has been implemented and there are more than 1500 articles in there for digital usage.

CCS Helpdesk

The CCS Helpdesk is the first point of contact for all of the IT related technology needs and issues at the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. The Helpdesk handles email, and in-person requests from students, faculty, academic staff, administrative staff and non-academic staff on IT related matters of their day to day activities.

CCS Student Helpdesk

The CCS Student Helpdesk is staffed technical workers employed by CCS to assist users in the residence computer centers under the CCS of each faculty with computer related issues.

Services

The service center staff of the CCS handles all the engineering, technical, electronic, electrical, and computer repairing, troubleshooting inside the University. This will help to carry out all the University activities such as not only the academic activities but also administrative activities very smoothly and effectively.

Main services rendered by the Centre for Computer Studies are:

In addition to academic services and academic support services, centre for computer studies is rendered following services to university.

- Technical Support and Preventive Maintenances of Computer Systems
- Network Installation, Configuration and Troubleshooting
- Electronic, Electrical, Telephone System Maintenance
- Technical Support for Lectures, Special Events, Event Handling at the Auditoriums and Computing Service Centre Training Programs.

The CCS provides e-mail facility with unlimited storage capacity for all the academic and administrative staff members and all the students under the xxx.sab.ac.lk university domain.

SUSL Mail

The CCS joining with the Microsoft Corporation and provides other e-mail facility with 1 GB storage capacity for all the academic, administrative, non-academic and all the students under the ms.sab.ac.lk domain.

Virtual Learning Environment (VLE)

The CCS provides necessary infrastructure facilities for e-learning and Virtual Learning Management for all the academic and students to share lecture materials and conduct assessments.

Examination Virtual Learning Environment (EVLE)

The CCS has bought separate server for EVLE and installed EVLE separately for each faculty to facilitate for online examinations.

Web-cast

CCS provides facilities to web-cast special university events like conferences, convocation, awarding ceremonies, etc. CCS provides human resource as well as equipment (HD Camera, Network cables, etc) to such events.

Zoom Accounts

Zoom accounts have been created for all the academic staff and other selected staff of the university.

Turnitin Accounts

Turnitin accounts are created for academic staff of the university as they request.

Campus-Wide Network

Our campus-wide Local Area Network is run and maintained by the Centre for Computer Studies. It is administrated by our Assistant Network Managers within the server room. The server room consists of CISCO routers, proxy server, DNS server, CISCO switches, web server, e-learning sever, virus guard server (centralized server) etc. Performance of the network functions and the E-learning system are increased by upgrading the three servers namely Proxy, DNS and E-learning during the year 2014. Separating and partitioning of the server

Room from the existing computer lab, physical security and the easiness of maintenance of the servers are assured. Also by commissioning the alternative power generating system using a 20KVA standby generator and four 2KVA UPS systems, availability of network functions are guaranteed during the 24 hours a day and 7 days a week.

All the eight faculties are now inter-connected with fiber optic backbone and willing to upgrade the backbone in next few years. At present our commodity Internet bandwidth is 600Mbps and physical link is capable of handling signals of 100Mbps bandwidth.

Goals of the year 2022:

- Recruiting new Technical officers to facilitate the entire university.
- Integrating payment gateway for online payments of the SUSL.
- Purchasing necessary Hardware and Network maintenance tools for the service center.
- Rendering computer repair services to the nearby rural schools.
- Preparing, allocating and configuring server space for all online systems of SUSL

Goals achieved during the year 2022:

- Provided 2 months training to the newly appointed Technical Officers where they were able to perform software, hardware and network related tasks at the various offices and departments of the university.
- Configured and integrated the Bank of Ceylon payment gateway as the 2nd payment gateway to the SUSL Website.
- Provided computer repair services to the rural schools
- Provided nearly 35 computers to rural schools after fully repairing, which are discarded by the university.
- Completed the internal network cabling of the Student Wi-Fi project which was initiated in the year 2021

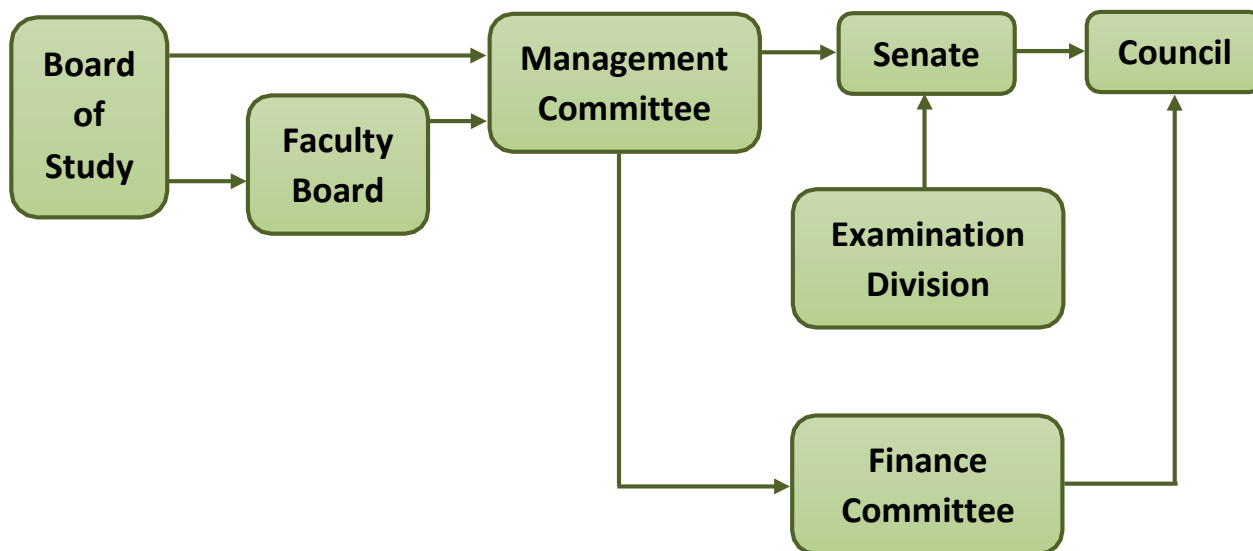
Initially, the unit was a Community Development Centre with the aim of providing job oriented certificate programmes on selected fields to the youth in the area.

CQA is primarily to safeguard academic standards and quality of higher education qualifications and to inform and encourage continuous improvement in the management of the quality of higher education. Later, in line with the Commission Circular 09/ 2019 the IQAC was renamed as the Centre for Quality Assurance (CQA).

CQA of Sabaragamuwa University oversees quality assurance for all teaching and learning processes, student support and institutional development. CQA ensures that the Sabaragamuwa University operates in conformity with the Sri Lankan Qualification Framework (SLQF) and academic standards and accreditation set forth by Quality Assurance and Accreditation Council of Sri Lanka (<http://www.eugc.ac.lk/gaa/>). The University's internal QA processes are complying within the Internal Quality Assurance Policy Framework.

The CQA is headed by a Director, who is guided by the Senate Standing Committee on Quality Assurance (SSC-QA). The SSC-QA is chaired by the Vice-Chancellor of the University, and is constituted as per the guidelines issued by the University Grants Commission in this regard. Faculty level quality assurance activities are managed by the Faculty Quality Assurance Committees of the Faculty Quality Assurance Cells, which were established as per the QA By-Laws.

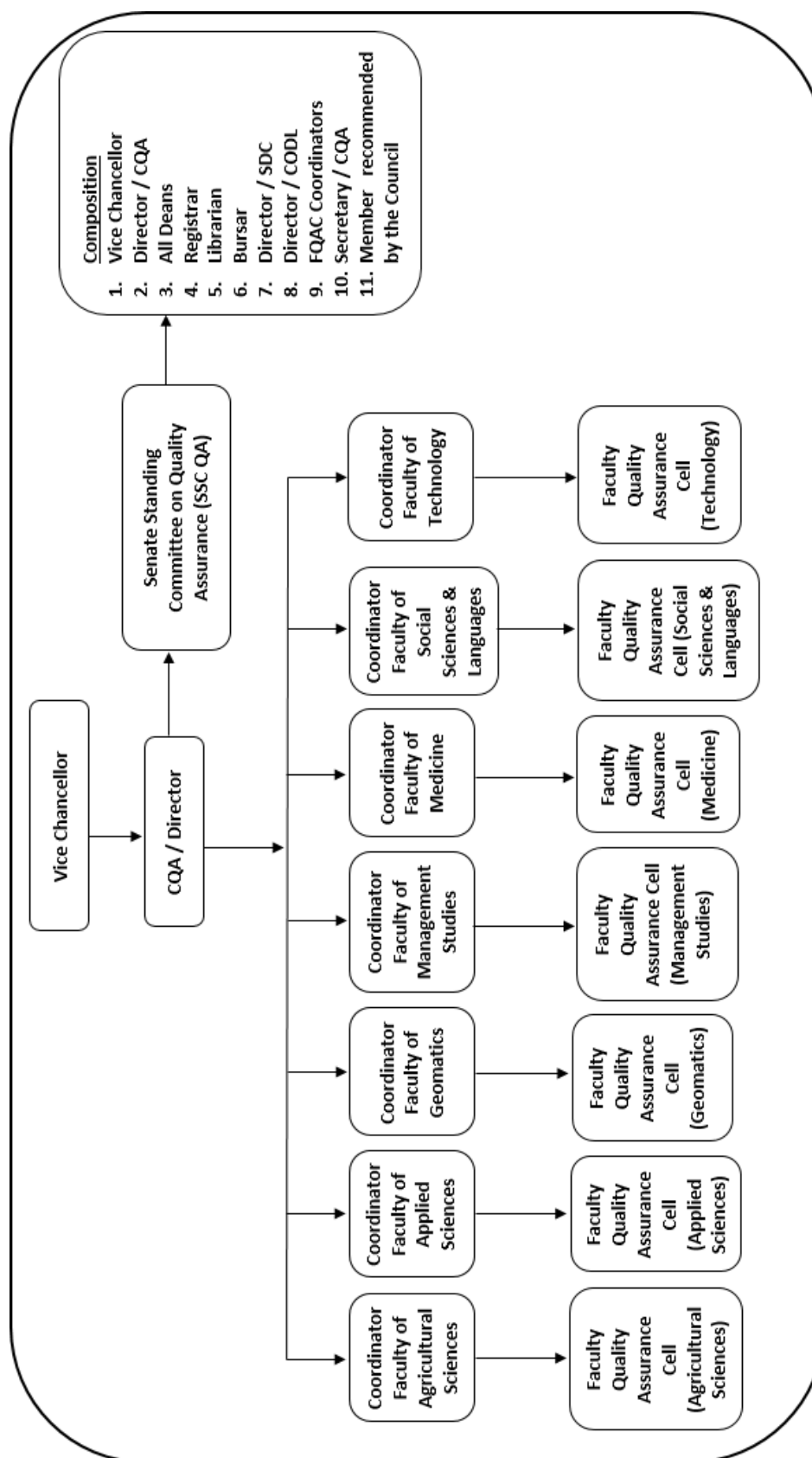

Memorandum of Understandings Signed during the Year 2022

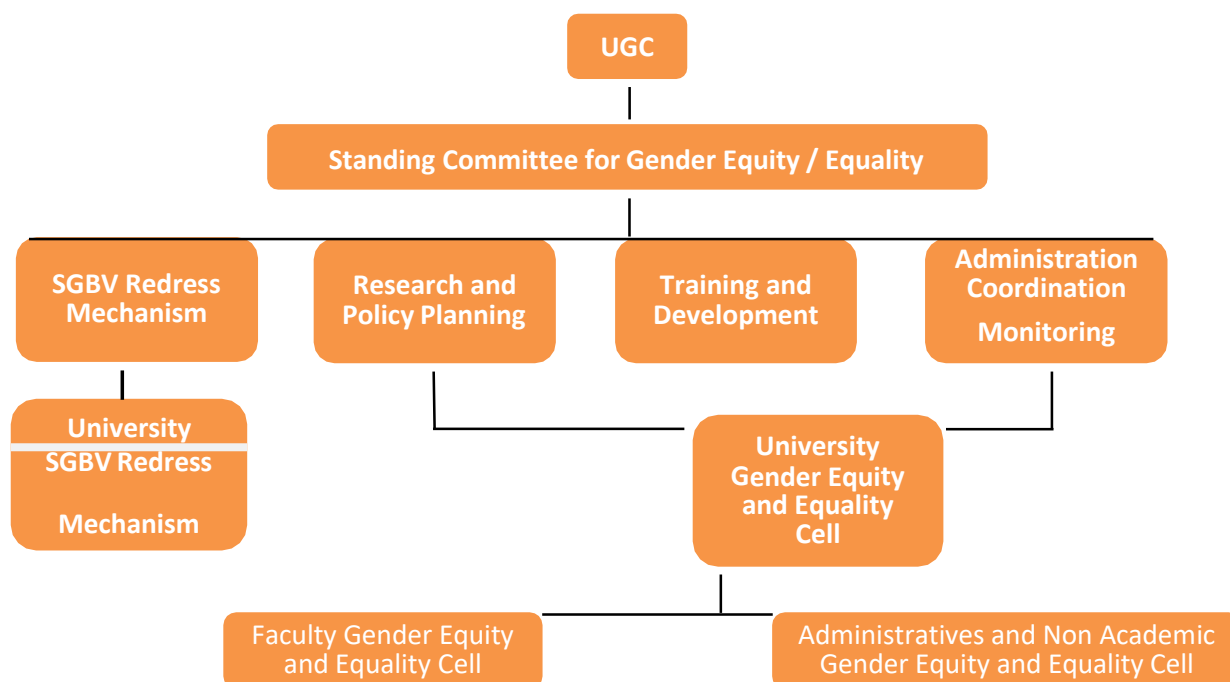
4.8 CENTRE FOR GENDER EQUITY AND EQUALITY

4.8.1 BRIEF HISTORY

Gender inequalities and violence including that of sexual and gender-based violence in the Universities have been reported as significant shortcomings in the Sri Lankan University System. As a solution, University Grants Commission (UGC) has taken up the initiative to minimize all forms of violence including SGBV by promoting all state universities to establish Gender Equity and Equality Focal Points. Accordingly, the Centre for Gender Equity and Equality (CGEE) of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka was established in January 2017, with the objective of instigating a gender-sensitive university sub-culture that allows students and university staff (academic/administrative/non-academic) to pursue their work without discrimination and oppression. The CGEE/SUSL has a solid policy framework on gender equity and equality and the stipulated functions of CGEE/SUSL are to provide training on gender equity and equality for the establishment of a core team of gender experts, to conduct research, review policies and contribute policy inputs at the university level, to do the curricular reforms to inculcate the concepts and practices of GEE, to prevent and respond to SGBV by empowering staff and students to prevent and respond to SGBV and to inquire complaints of sexual and gender-based violence and propose to university councils for disciplinary actions to offenders and facilities to victims. Further, CGEE/ SUSL currently has eight faculty cells, with the intention of facilitating the CGEE by creating gender sensitive environment at the faculty level.

4.8.2 BRIEF INTRODUCTION

Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka is committed to the promotion of Gender Equity and Equality (GEE) and women's empowerment where all students, academic, administrative and support staff, female and male, enjoy equal opportunities, human rights, and free from all forms of discrimination and harassment. As such members of the University community have the responsibility of ensuring that it is free from gender inequality and Sexual and Gender Based Violence (SGBV)

Thus SUSL policy on GEE is designed to promote equality between women and men; to eliminate unlawful discrimination and harassment; and to provide an inclusive working, learning and social environment in which the rights and dignity of all its staff and students are respected to assist them in reaching their full potential. The university will work to remove any barriers which might deter people of the highest ability from applying to SUSL as staff or students.

11. HOSTEL DATA – 2022

As the University is in a remote, considering the difficulties in finding the residential facilities for undergraduates by themselves, all the students whose permanent residencies are more than 20 km away from the University are provided hostel facilities by the University. So, about 46.5% of the undergraduates are received the University provided hostel facilities, in each year.

The University has provided accommodation in its own hostels only for 934 male students and 925 female students. Other students have been provided with accommodation in rented houses for 376 male students and 1556 female students.

The University spends more than 12 million per annum for rented houses to accommodate the students.

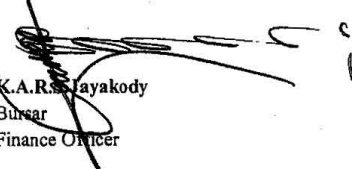

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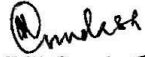

For the Year Ended December 31, 2022

1. General Information

1.1 Legal and Domicile Form

Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka is a Government University which was established under the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978 and domiciled in Sri Lanka. At present university has 08 Faculties.

- Faculty of Graduate Studies
- Faculty of Agricultural Sciences
- Faculty of Applied Sciences
- Faculty of Geomatics
- Faculty of Management Studies
- Faculty of Medicine
- Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages
- Faculty of Technology

The Faculty of Graduate Studies and Faculty of Medicine are located in Rathnapura. All other faculties are situated at main premises at Pabahinna, Belihuloya, approximately 160 kilometres away from the Colombo-Badulla highway.

1.2 Principal Activities & Nature of operation

The university primarily caters to local students to promote and develop Higher Education and Research in the fields of Agriculture, Applied Sciences, Geomatics, Management Studies, Medicine, Social Sciences & Languages and Technology .

1.3 Financial Period

The Financial period of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka represent Twelve months period from 01st January 2022 to 31st December 2022.

1.4 Date of Authorization for Issue

The Financial statement for the year ended



31st, December 2022 of the Sabaragamuwa university of Sri Lanka was approved and authorized to issue by the special meeting of the University Council held on 14th March 2023.

1.5 Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements

1.5.1 Statement of Compliance

The financial statements of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka have been prepared in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards (SLPSASs) issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Sri Lanka.

The financial statements comprise the Statement of Financial Position, Statement of Financial Performance, Statement of Changes in Funds & Reserves, Cash Flow Statement and Notes to the Financial Statements. All accounting policies adopted by the University are applied consistently with those of the previous year, where necessary comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to the changes, in presentation of current year figures. The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below.

1.5.2 Basis of Measurement

The Financial Statements have been prepared on historical cost basis except where appropriate disclosures are made

with regard to the fair value clarified by relevant notes.

1.5.3 Comparative Information

Comparative information including quantitative, narrative and descriptive information is disclosed in respect of the previous period for all amounts reported in the financial statements in order to enhance the understanding of the financial statements of the current period and to improve comparability. When necessary, comparative figures have been rearranged to conform to the current year presentation.

1.5.4 Functional and Presentation Currency

The financial statements are presented in Sri Lankan Rupees, which is the functional and presentation currency of the University. All financial information presented in Sri Lankan Rupees has been rounded to the nearest rupee.

1.5.5 Significant Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The preparation and presentation of financial statements in conformity with SLPSASs, requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates and judgments



used.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an on-going basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods. Any changes in accounting estimates and critical judgments are disclosed in the relevant notes to the financial statements.

1.5.6 Going Concern

Financial statements have been prepared on the assumption that the University is a going concern basis.

2. Summary of Significant

Accounting Policies

2.1. Assets and the Basis of their valuation

2.1.1 Property, Plant and Equipment.

(a) Recognition and Measurement

Property, Plant and Equipment are recognized when, it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the asset will flow to the University and the cost of the asset can be measured reliably.

All items of Property, Plant and Equipment are initially recognized at cost. After initial recognition subsequent measurement of

Property, Plant & Equipment are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation except classes of Land.

Assets acquired through the non exchange transactions recognized at its fair value as at the date of acquisition. Property, Plant and Equipment include the assets acquired through the Government grants, Projects, Research grants, internally Generated funds and Donations. The value of property plant & equipment received as gifts and, donations were recognized as revenue from Non exchange transaction in accordance with the SLPSAS 11 . Repair and maintenance cost are recognized in the statement of financial performance as incurred.

(b) Subsequent Expenditure

Subsequent expenditure incurred for the purpose of acquiring, extending or improving assets of a permanent nature in order to carry on or increase the earning capacity of the assets has been treated as capital expenditure. Expenditure incurred to replace a component of an item of Property, Plant and Equipment that is accounted for separately, including major inspection and overhaul expenditure, is capitalized. Other subsequent expenditure is capitalized only if it is probable that the future economic benefits embodied within the part will flow to the University and its cost can be measured reliably.



(c) Revaluation of Property Plant & Equipment

Property, Land, Building, Plant & Equipment have been revalued by a professionally qualified person in year 2006 and excess value has been accounted to the Revaluation surplus account accordingly.

All class of Motor vehicles except vehicles No 226-5147, SG-RA-1220 and AHEAD grant vehicles No SG-NE- 0859, SG-RH-3529 have been revalued during the year 2022 by the member of profession in Government Valuation Department. Revaluation surplus arising from the revalued vehicles has been transferred to Revaluation reserve and included in the accumulated fund and reserves in the statement of financial performance.

(d) Depreciation

Depreciation is recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on a Straight – Line basis over the estimated useful life of Property, Plant and Equipment items from the date that they were made available for use . Lands are not depreciated.

Depreciation is provide in full in the year of it is available for use and no depreciation is charged in the year of disposal. Depreciation on Property, Plant and Equipment purchased through project ,

research grant and restricted funds are charged to the Statement of Financial Performance.

(e) De recognition

An item of Property, Plant and Equipment is derecognized upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on de recognition of the asset is calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount and included in the Statement of Financial Performance in the year, the asset is derecognized.



2.1.2 Work- in- Progress & Rehabilitation

Capital work-in-progress & rehabilitation is stated at cost. These are expenses of a capital nature directly incurred in the construction & improvement of Property, Plant and Equipment which are awaiting

for the capitalization. Capital work-in-progress & rehabilitation expenditure are transferred to the relevant asset category in Property Plant and Equipment, when the full cost is reliably measured and when the asset is available for use. Capital expenses incurred during the year which are not satisfied the recognition criteria as at the date of the Statement of Financial Position are shown as Capital Work-in-Progress and Rehabilitation.

2.1.4 Intangible Assets

Intangible assets are recognized when it is probable that future economic benefits or service potential that are attributable to the asset will flow to the university and the cost of the intangible asset can be measured reliably.

All intangible assets acquired separately are initially measured at cost. Subsequently it will be carried at its cost less any accumulated amortization under cost model in accordance with the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 20 (SLPSAS). The cost of intangible assets acquired in a non-exchange transaction is their fair

value at the date of the exchange.

All intangible assets with finite useful lives are amortized on straight line basis over its estimated useful life and charged to the statement of Financial performance as follows ,

(a) Computer software

Acquired computer software licenses are capitalized on the basis of the costs incurred to acquire and bring to use. These costs are amortized over their estimated useful life of five (5) years on straight line basis .

(b) Human Capital development & Quality Assurance expenses

As University has insufficient control over the expected future economic benefits arising from human capital development and quality assurance cost for these items to meet the definition of an intangible asset. All the capital nature expenditure incurred for the Human Capital Development and Quality assurance is recognized as an expense when incurred and charged to Statement of Financial Performance.

(c) Internally Generated intangible assets Research Expenses

As per the SLPSA 20 , No intangible assets arising from research phase shall be recognized and Expenditure on research shall be recognized as an expenses when it is incurred . Accordingly all the expenditure incurred for the research



expenses recognized as an expenses and charged to the statement of financial performance.

(d) Development Expenses

All internally developed intangible assets are recognized only if the recondition criteria are met in accordance with the SLPSAS 20 section 55 .

2.1.5 Investments

Investment in Fixed deposits & Saving relating are stated at cost and interest accrued on short term investment is accounted as a receivable in the financial statement and interest income relating to the restricted funds such as endowment funds , designated funds and projects are recognized on the realization and credited to the relevant restricted fund account and included in statement of financial position .

2.2 Inventories

2.2.1 Inventories (Stocks)

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realizable value after making due adjustment for obsolete items and the cost was determined based on First In First Out (FIFO) method. The cost includes

expenditure incurred in acquiring the inventories and bringing them to their existing location and condition. The inventories of the university include stationery items , consumables , maintenance stocks and medical stocks .

2.2.2 Live Stock

Live Stock consists living animals held for the teaching and research activities managed by the Farm of Faculty of Agriculture Sciences. Live stock are measured on initial recognition and each reporting date at its fair value less cost to sell.

A gain or loss arising on recognition of Live stock at its fair value and changes in fair value are included in surplus or deficit for the period in which it arises as per the provision of SLPSAS 18.

2.2.3 Farm product Stock

Yield stock consist harvested product of the Agriculture farm . Valuation of Yield stock was based on the market price at the date of verification.

2.3 Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash in hand, cash in current account ,call deposits and Bank borrowings that are payable on demand .



2.4 Liabilities & Provisions

2.4.1 Liabilities

All known liabilities as at the date of statement of financial position are included in the financial statements and obligations payable on demand or within one year of the date of statement of financial position are treated as current liabilities in the statement of financial position. Liabilities payable after one year from the date of statement of financial position are treated as non-current liabilities in the statement of financial position.

2.4.2 Provisions

A provision is recognized in the Statement of Financial Position, when the University has an obligation as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of assets will be required to settle the obligation and the obligation can be measured reliably.

2.4.3 Capital Commitments and Contingencies

Contingencies are possible assets or obligation that arise from past event and would be confirmed only on the occurrence or non-occurrence of uncertain future events, which are beyond the Universities control. University does not recognize contingent liabilities and capital commitments, but discloses details of any contingencies in the notes

to the financial statements, unless the possibility of an outflow or inflow of resources embodying economic benefits or service potential is remote.

Following litigations cases were continued as at the financial position date and no provision has been made in the accounts with regard to liabilities arising out of litigation activities..

2.4.4 Defined Benefit Plan - Retiring Gratuity

Defined benefit plan is a post-employment benefit plan, other than a defined contribution plan Accordingly Provision for gratuity was made in accordance with Gratuity Act No.12 of 1983. The gratuity liability is not externally funded and not actuarially valued.

As per the University Grant Commission circular No.05/0219 dated on 04th June

2019 , Academic allowance and MCA (Monthly compensatory allowance) paid for the staff are considered for the Gratuity calculation in terms of the Gratuity act no.12 of 1983 with effect from 01st June 2019.

2.4.5 Defined Contribution Plan – University Provident Fund , Employees’ Trust Fund and Pension scheme.

A defined contribution plan is a post-employment plan under which an entity pays fixed contribution into a separate entity and will have no legal or constructive obligation to pay a further amount. Obligations for contributions to defined contribution plans are recognized as an expense in the statement of financial performance as and when they are due.

Employees are eligible for ‘University provident Fund Contributions, Employees Trust Fund Contributions and University Pension Fund in line with respective statutes and regulations. These are recognized as an expense in the Statement



of Financial Performance as incurred. The university contributes 8% , 3% and 7% of gross emoluments of the employees to University 'Provident Fund and Employees' Trust Fund and University pension fund respectively.

2.5 Restricted funds and Grants

Where the grants/donations are received for use in an identified project or activity, such funds are held in a restricted fund account and , unutilized funds are held in their respective fund accounts and included under accumulated fund and reserves in the statement of financial position until such time as they are required. Where expenditure of such approved grant exceeds the income received and if there is certainty that the balance will be received, such amounts are recognized as receivables in the statement of financial position.

2.6 Designated Funds

Any fund designated by the Univerity for a specific purpose with the approval of Council are identified as a Designated

Funds. Unutilized funds are held in their respective fund accounts and included under accumulated fund and reserves in the statement of financial position until such time as they are required.

2.7 Endowment funds

Where assets are received as an endowment, only the income earned from such assets may be recognized and used as income. Investment income and other gains realized from such endowment investments are allocated to the appropriate funds, unless the relevant agreement or minute provides otherwise.

Endowment funds such as gold medal and scholarships held under the deposits were reclassified and presented under the Endowment funds in the Statement of Financial Position under accumulated funds and reserves .



2.8 Accelerating Higher Education Expansion And Development (AHEAD) Grant

Accelerating Higher Education Expansion and Development (AHEAD) is a World Bank funded project for Sri Lankan Government to support the higher education sector with the objectives of expanding enrolment in priority disciplines, improve the quality of degree programs, and promote research and innovation in the higher education sector. Ministry of Education is the implementing agency of this project. University Grant Commission and Operations Monitoring and Support Team (OMST) are coordinate and support for the project activities of the universities.

Since the above project is operated separately through Operational Technical Secretariat office (OTS) of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka, Grant receipt and expenses of the AHEAD operations have been included in the financial statement from 2021 financial year. Capital assets acquired through this grant including Property Plant & Equipment, completed construction works and Human capital development expenditure are recognized as revenue from non-exchange transaction in accordance with SLPSAS 11 in the statement of Financial performance and accumulated under capital surplus/ (deficit) in the statement of financial position.

During the period of 2018 to 2022, Sabaragamuwa University has been awarded several grants under AHEAD Project, and Summary of the grants given in Note No 35.

2.9 Revenue Recognition

Revenue comprises gross inflows of economic benefits or service potential received and receivable by University during the year and represents an increase in net assets/equity. University recognizes revenue following the established criteria of SLPSAS 10 (Revenue from Exchange Transactions) and SPSAS 11 (Revenue from Non Exchange Transactions).

2.9.1 Revenue from Exchange Transaction

(a) Undergraduate & other internal income

All the income derived from the undergraduate degree programmes and other internal income are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on the cash basis.

(b) Income generated from self-financing activities

Self-financing activities ranging from consultancy, postgraduate taught courses, external degree programmes, are conducting on cost recovery and non – profit basis. The income, expenditure and contribution for development votes of self financing activities have been disclosed under note 30 of the statement of financial performance.

The Surplus of Income over the expenditure of the Self financing activities recognized to the development votes as per the University Grants Commission Circular 4/2016.

(c) Interest Income

Interest income received for the period is recorded as exchange revenue in the statement of financial performance except for the investment income earned from the externally restricted funds, designated funds and endowments funds. When the investment income earned from those funds are in excess over the expenditure, the excess is recorded as a direct increase in relevant fund and included in the statement of financial position under accumulated reserves and grants.

(d) Rent Income

Rental income arising from renting out university assets is accounted for on a straight-line basis over the rental terms and included in revenue.

2.9.2 Revenue from Non

Exchange transactions.

Non-exchange transactions are those where the university receives value from another entity (e.g. cash or other assets) without giving approximately equal value in exchange.

Inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions, other than services in-kind, that meet the definition of an asset are recognized as an asset only when:

- It is probable that the University will receive an inflow of economic benefits or service potential; and
- The fair value of can be measured reliably.

Inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions that are recognized as assets are recognized as non- exchange revenue, to the extent that a liability is not recognized in respect to the same inflow.

The following are the specific recognition criteria in relation to the University non-exchange transactions.

(a) Government Grant / Transfers

Assets and revenue arising from government grants are recognized in the period in which the transfer arrangement becomes binding at the fair value. Where a transfer is subject to conditions and when there is a resulting present obligation as a result of the non-exchange transaction, University recognizes a liability until the conditions is fulfilled.

Assets and revenue arising from government grants are measured at the fair value as at the date of recognition .Monetary assets are measured at their nominal value.

(b) Recurrent Grant

Government grants received for the recurrent nature expenditures are recognized in the statement of financial performance under Non exchange transactions.

The Government grants of Rs. 2,150 Mn was received as recurrent grant for the year 2022.

(c) Capital Block Grant and other Transfers

Government Grants and other capital transfers received for the capital expenditure are recognized in the statement of financial performance in accordance with the requirement of SLPSAS 11, Revenue from Non exchange transactions with effect from the financial year 2022.

Capital surplus / (deficit) arising from the capital transactions are accumulated under the Accumulated Fund – Capital in the statement of financial statement.

2.9.3 Reclassification to Accumulated - fund Capital

University adopt and applied SLPSAS 11 – Revenue from Non Exchange transaction standard with effect from the year 2022 prospectively.

To harmonize the presentation of financial statements , comparative figures in relation to spent capital grant , Capital grant unspent , gift and donations were reclassified in to “Accumulated surplus capital “ in the statement of financial position accordance with the SLPSAS 11 and guidance issued by the APFASL .

Gifts, Donations and Goods in Kind received

Gifts, donations are voluntary transfers of assets including cash or other monetary assets and goods in-kind that the University receives which are free from stipulations.

Gifts and donations and goods in kind received are recognized as non-exchange revenue at its fair value when it is probable that the future economic benefits or service potential will flow to the University, and the fair value of the assets can be measured reliably.

During the year 2022, university received 0.53 Mn worth of assets and fair value recognized under Revenue from Non exchange transaction in the Statement of Financial Performance.

2.10 Expenditure recognition.

The expenditure has been analyzed by Program/project/object wise and analysis was classified under different expenditure headings based on UGC guidelines to comply with the Common Reporting Format during the period of which they are incurred. All expenses incurred in respect of undergraduate education have been recognized on accrual basis and charged to the Statement of Financial Performance.

2.11 Statement of Cash Flows

The Statement of Cash Flows has been prepared in accordance with SLPSAS 02 Cash Flow Statement under the indirect method.

2.12 Events after the reporting period

The materiality of events occurring after the reporting period has been considered and appropriate adjustments, wherever necessary, have been made in the accounts

2.13 Foreign Currency Transaction

Transaction currencies other than Sri Lankan rupees are converted in to Sri Lankan rupees at rates which approximate the actual rates at the transaction date.

2.14 Inter division's transaction

Financial statement has been prepared by eliminating the Interdivision transactions and outstanding balances. Following interdivision balances are eliminated,

Rs.16.01 Mn Payable balance to the Center for Open & Distance Learning (CODL).

Rs 4.57 Mn Payable balance to the Faculty of Graduate Studies (FGS).

2.15 Related Party Transaction

The key management personal of the University are the members of the University Council & the members of the senior management personal. The University Council is the executive body and governing authority of the University which consist of the Vice-Chancellor, Deans of the faculties, two members elected by the Senate and the external members appointed by the University Grants Commission.

There is no any contracts entered between the university and any member of the key management personal who is having direct or indirect interest and there is no any Related-party transactions, including sales, purchases, loans, transfers, leasing arrangements , guarantees , amount receivable from or payable to related parties other than the employee remuneration and allowances for services provided during the period.

2.16 Comparison of Budget and Actual Amounts

Budget and accounting basis is differ. Budgets to the university is approved cash basis annually. Although University financial statement covers all the financial activities of the university, budgets are approved only for the Government grants. The Statement of Comparison of Budget and Actual amounts compares the final budget to actual amounts calculated on the same basis as the corresponding budgetary amounts

3. Losses/Damages/Discontinuance

3.1 Losses & Damages

Due to the explosion of Chemistry Laboratory of Faculty of Applied Sciences damages happened to the Furniture fittings, Glassware, and Other equipment 2019. Total estimate value was Rs. 617,229.52 Out of this value Rs. 454,899.32 has been capitalized with the entire faculty building. Due to the unavailability of the original cost loses are not taken to the accounts as an expenses in 2019. All other items are consumable and identified as expenses at the time of purchased.

During the current financial year (2022) Garbage building (Waste Recycle Centre) at Mungasthna destroyed by fire by the Ultra Kleeen (Private) Limited (Janitorial Service Contractor). Total estimate value of the building is Rs 2,190,889.92 and action taken to the recover the cost from final bill of Janitorial service. Recoverable value and the net value of the building (Cost less Depreciation Rs 1,053,182.97) Rs. 1,137,706.95 recognized as disposal gain of the building in current year financial statements

3.2 Discontinuation

During the current financial year 2022 due to expiring of the contract agreement of rented out building of Foreign Employment Bureau at Ratnapura for Faculty of Medicine discontinued and all fixing stated to remove and re-fixing at new Medical faculty building at Galkaduwwatta Retnepurs.

All the re-fixing works were being continued end of the reporting date 31st December 2022. Hence, total value of fixing Rs. 18,427,139.00 did not depreciated current financial year

4. Other Grants

Following Capital grants are operating with the university and all transaction are operated independently and all the transaction are taken to accounts after the project expiration as per the project agreement.

4.1 Confucius Institute

All the receipts and payments of the project are accounted under Restricted funds

4.2 STHRD Project

University has signed an agreement with the Science & Technology Human Resources



Development Project funded by Asian Development Bank for faculty of Technology. Total Grant Value is Rs 2192 Million and USD 3.24 Million for 4 years. Project period expires on June 2024.

4.3 Construction of Faculty of Medicine Project (Funded by Saudi Fund for Development)

Ministry of Education has signed an agreement with the Saudi Fund for Development on behalf the University for Medicine faculty building complex. Total grant value is USD 50 Million.

The Report of the Auditor General in terms of section 12 of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 on financial statements and other legal and regulatory requirements of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka for the year ending on 31st December 2022.

1. Financial Statements

1.1 Opinion

Financial Statement of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka as at 31st December 2022 and Financial Performance Statement, Net Asset Change Statement and Cash Flow Statement for the year ending on that day and notes on Financial Statements, Summary Important Accounting Policies Financial Statements for the Final Year as at 31st December 2022 jointly read with the subsection 107 (5) of the Universities Act, No. 16 of 1978 were audited under my direction in terms of the provisions provided in the article 154 (6) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka and National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018. This report contains my views and observations which I intend to publish with the Annual Report of the University in terms of subsection 108 (1) of the Universities Act. My Report will be tabled in Parliament in due course in accordance with the article 154 (6) of the Constitution.

Apart from the impact of the facts described in the base section for the qualitative opinion in my report, I firmly believe that the financial status of the University as at 31st December 2022 and its financial performance and cash flow for the final year ending 31st December 2022 is in factual and equitable position in accordance with the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

1.2 The Basis for the Statistical Opinion

(a) Due to non-review of useful life of non-current assets and intangible assets respectively, as per paragraphs 65 of Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 07 and paragraph 103 of Sri Lanka

Public Sector Accounting Standard 20 , fully depreciated assets of Rs.1,405,884,194 were still in use at the end of the year under review. Accordingly, the estimated error had not been revised according to Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 03.

(b) Since Rs.4,440,449 collected from the officers who breached the bonds in the previous year was not transferred to the bond breach fund, the balance of the fund as on 31st December 2022 and the deficit of the recurring consolidated fund were shown to be less than that amount.

(c) Rs.97,480, 511 given in previous years for the World Bank Project to Accelerate Higher Education Extension and Development (AHEAD) had been accounted as the income in the reviewed year instead of being adjusted accordingly as per the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard .03 Accordingly, the year's surplus was more than that amount in the financial statements.

(d) Due to errors in the calculation of depreciation of property, plant and equipment, the depreciation of the reviewed year was over-accounted by Rs.25,487,787, and the surplus and the net value of property, plant and equipment were less than that amount in the financial statements.

(e) As Rs. 1,255, 557 payable to the contractor for a building completed in July 2022 had not been accounted for, the balance of property, plant and equipment and the capital creditor balance at the end of the year under review had been shown less than the value.

(f) Recurring expenditure of Rs.5,628, 910 spent on repairing lockers and beds during the year under review had been capitalized and the annual surplus and the value of property, plant and equipment were understated and overstated respectively in the financial statements.

(g) In the accounting of reduction of the advances given for the commencement of work of the building in the Faculty of Agriculture, in financial statements, the value of unfinished work was understated by Rs.6,020, 086 and the balance of unsettled advance was overstated due to non- recording of VAT

(h) By not accounting the commencement advance of Rs.28,265,340 given for the construction of the para-clinic building of the Faculty of Medicine, the balance of the advance account and the capital grants were recorded less than that amount in the financial statements at the end of the year under review.

(i) As on December 31 of the year under review, Rs.44,852, 000 of bursary was payable, but it was accounted as Rs.38,180,000, which resulted in the understatement of bursary revenue and receivable bursary balance by Rs.6,672,000



(j) The bond value amounting to Rs.170,642, 885as at 31December 2022was not disclosed in the financial statements.

(k) The net value of 10items of chemicals was over-accounted for by Rs.5,232, 260due to misidentification of the unit cost while calculating the stock value at the Faculty of Applied Sciences. Therefore, the remaining stock balance and the surplus of the year were overstated in the financial statements. Also, the value of 106stock items whose unit cost could not be identified due to improper maintenance of stock records and bin cards was not accounted.

(l) As the assets of Rs.2,683,360 purchased for the Faculty of Applied Sciences by ERASMUS project grants were not accounted, the balance of property, plant and equipment and capital grants were shown in the financial statements less than that amount.

(m) Adjustments were not made in the financial statements for the over-allocation of audit fees of Rs.468, 000for the past two years and no allocations were made in the financial statements for the audit fees related to the year under review.

(n) Due to the decrease in the interest rate of the property loans in the previous year, Rs.1,412, 765 refunded from the bank was accounted as the revenue of the reviewed year instead of reconciling with the profit of the previous year, and the interest income due at the end of the accounting year was overaccounted by Rs.1,274,461. Accordingly, the surplus of the reviewed year was Rs.2, 687,226 and the interest income receivable was overaccounted by Rs.1,274, 461and the recurring consolidated fund was understated by Rs.1,412, 765in the financial statements.

(o) Due to the fact that the accrued expenses were overaccounted by Rs. 3,568,546 and the expenses related to the previous year were accounted as expenses of the reviewed year, the surplus was understated by Rs.4,672,889 and the recurring consolidated fund and current liabilities were overstated by 1,104,343 and Rs.3,568,546 respectively in the financial statements.

(p) An expense related to the year 2023 and paid in the same year was debited and credited to the previous payment account and the accrued expenses account in the year 2022 by Rs. 1,105,231 respectively. Because of this, current assets and current liabilities were shown more than that amount in the financial statements.

(q)8 ,510, 176rupees of payable capital expenditure related to previous years had been written off against non-current assets without formal approval. Also, it was not identified in detail which assets were written off. Furthermore, depreciation allocations related to those assets amounting to

Rs.7, 852,560 had been debited to the relevant asset accounts. Accordingly, at the end of the year under review, property, plant and equipment were understated by Rs.657, 616and payable capital expenses by

Rs.8,510, 176 and the balance of the depreciation allocation account was overstated by Rs.7,852,560 in the financial statements.

I have done auditing as per Sri Lanka Audit Standards. My responsibility as per such audit standards is further described in the “Responsibility of the Auditor in relation to the auditing of financial statements”. I firmly believe that the auditing evidences I have gathered are adequate and appropriate to provide a base for my statistical opinion.

1.3 Other information included in the 2022 Annual Report of Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka

“Other information” include the information that are gathered before the date of this audit report and entered in the university annual report 2022, but the information which are not included in the financial statements and in my audit report. The management should hold responsibility for these other information

My opinion on financial statements does not cover these other information and I do not provide any certification or present an opinion on these information

As per my auditing on financial statements, my responsibility is to read the “other information” when received and to check whether there is a quantitative misinterpretation between the other information and the financial statements as per my knowledge

If I conclude that there is a quantitative misinterpretation based on the other information that are gathered before the date of this audit report and based on the activities performed by me , such should be communicated to the management. I do not have anything to report in this regard.

1.4 Responsibilities of the parties in the management and control of financial statements

It is the responsibility of the management to prepare and present these financial statements in accordance with the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards and to determine the internal controls required to enable the preparation of financial statements without quantitative misrepresentations due to fraud or errors.

In preparing the financial statements, it is the responsibility of the management to determine the viability of the University and to disclose matters relating to the continued existence of the University unless the management intends to liquidate the University or discontinue operations in the absence of any other option.

Responsibility for the financial reporting process of the University rests with the governing parties.

As mentioned in sub-section 16 (1) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, the university shall maintain proper books and records on its own income, expenditure, assets and liabilities so as to prepare the Annual and Current Financial Statements of the University.

1.5 Responsibility of the Auditor in relation to the auditing of financial statements

Overall, my goal is to provide a fair proof that there is no quantitative misrepresentation of financial statements, fraud and errors, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. While fair certification is a high level of certification, auditing in accordance with Sri Lanka Audit Standards does not always guarantee that it will detect quantitative misrepresentations. Fraud and misconduct, individually or collectively, can lead to quantitative misrepresentations and are expected to affect the economic decisions made by users based on these financial statements.

I conducted the audit in accordance with the Sri Lanka Audit Standards with professional judgment and professional skepticism.

- Furthermore, base of my opinion is to obtain adequate and appropriate audit evidence to avoid risks posed by fraud or error by designing appropriate audit procedures in time to identify and assess the risk of quantitative misrepresentations in financial statements due to fraud or errors. The effects of fraud are far greater than the effects of quantitative misrepresentations, which can lead to fraud, misrepresentation, forgery, intentional evasion, or evasion of internal controls.
- Gained an understanding of the internal governance of the University in order to design appropriate audit procedures from time to time, but does not intend to express an opinion on the effectiveness of internal governance.
- The fairness of the accounting policies and accounting estimates used and the relevance of the relevant disclosures made by management were evaluated.
- The relevance of using the basis of the continuity of the University for accounting was determined on the basis of the audit evidence obtained as to whether there is quantitative uncertainty about the continuity of the university due to events or circumstances. If I conclude that there is sufficient uncertainty, my audit report should

focus on the disclosures made in the financial statements, and if those disclosures are not sufficient, my opinion should be distorted. However, continued existence may end on future events or circumstances.

- The overall presentation of the financial statements, including the appropriate and fair inclusion and disclosure of underlying transactions and events for the structure and content of the financial statements were assessed.

The governing parties were briefed on the important audit findings identified during my audit, key internal governance weaknesses and other issues.

2 Report on other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

2.1 The National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 contains special provisions regarding the following requirements.

2.1.1 In accordance with the requirements set forth in Section 12 (a) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, I have obtained all the information and clarification required for the audit, except for the effect of the facts described in the Basis for the Assessed Opinion in my report. The investigation revealed that the University had maintained proper financial records.

2.1.2 The financial statements submitted by the University as per the requirement mentioned in Section 6 (1) (d) (III) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 correspond with the previous year.

2.1.3 The recommendations made by me during the last year as per the requirement mentioned in Section 6 (i) (d) (iv) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 are included in the financial statements submitted.

2.2 In restricting the action taken and the evidence obtained to quantitative facts, none of the following statements came to my notice.

2.2.1 In accordance with the requirement of Section 12 (d) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, any member of the Council of the University may be directly or indirectly involved in any contract other than the normal business situation.

2.2.2 Not acting in accordance with the requirement of Section 12 (f) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 or in accordance with any applicable written law or other general or special directives issued

2.2.3 The powers, tasks and functions of the University have not been complied with as required by Section 12 (g) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018.

2.2.4 As per the requirement mentioned in Section 12 (d) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, the resources of the University have not been procured and utilized in accordance with the relevant rules in a timely manner, efficiently and effectively except for the following observations.

- (a) The second phase of the University's Faculty of Applied Science Building Complex Project - Part I was awarded to a construction company on 18 November 2018 for a contract value of Rs.452,409,980 (including VAT). Since this project is a design & built (turnkey) contract, the approved cost and plans should not be revised, but the additional work of Rs. 24,625,295 was approved without making additional provisions. While the provision set aside for taxes could not be used for other payments, the additional works were paid for using the tax savings from the reduction of the value added tax (VAT) rate from 15 percent to 8 percent. Although Rs.3,000,000 was proposed to be paid for the Solar energy system in the final bill, the payment was suspended due to insufficient completion of the work subject. Also, although Rs.6,579,931 was paid for 02 work subjects in the additional work estimate and Rs.3,600,000 for the solar street lighting system included in the original estimate, the related original plans and proposals were not obtained. Further, extra payments of Rs.328,269 were made for additional work.



- (b) Under the Science and Technology Human Resources Development (STHRD) project, the supplier had been selected to purchase 839 different book units for Rs.25,871,615 in the year 2021, contrary to the guideline 7.10 of the Government Procurement Guidelines. Accordingly, 74 percent of the total procurement or 449 books worth Rs.21,062,900 were purchased from an organization with no prior experience in the supply of books and periodicals. The price of 97 books was much higher than the current market price, resulting in a financial loss of Rs. 5,611,926 and it was revealed that 61 books worth Rs. 4,516,000 were used books. The need to purchase 14 books among them which were worth of Rs. 2,499,400 was unclear. Also, there was a loss of Rs. 565,650 due to various weaknesses in purchasing and payment for brochures that can be downloaded for free from the internet.
- (c) In December 2021, contracts were signed for Rs. 61,440,000 for the cleanliness and garden maintenance of the university in the year under review. Although the terms of the agreement required cleaning service workers to log their arrival and departure with fingerprint machines, not all workers complied. Also, during the period from January to September 2022, Rs.354,016 was also paid for two persons who did not provide any service to the University cleaning service.
- (d) In purchasing an Optical Mark Reader machine for the Faculty of Medicine, the University had incurred a loss of Rs. 1,270,585 because of the price fluctuations caused due to the failure to evaluate the bids and award the bids during the relevant period.
- (e) In the period from 2016 to 2019, a total of Rs.1,370,300 was paid on 08 occasions for developing a software for the fixed asset register and entering data into the software, but even by May 2023, the work of developing of the fixed asset register had not been completed.

2.3 Other Matters

- (a) During the period from 2018 to 2022, a total of Rs.433,826,884 had been paid as research allowances to 335 officers of the university's academic and non-academic staff, but by the end of the year under review, none of the officers had submitted related research reports.
- (b) Although research allowances amounting to Rs.66,258,551 were given to 41 officers belonging to the academic staff from the year 2015 to the year 2020, the details of the national and international contributions from those research projects were not submitted to the audit.
- (c) In the European Community Action Scheme for the Mobility of University Students / ERASMUS project allocation, 08 officers who participated in foreign programs were erroneously paid Rs. 1,760,745 more in travel expenses and composite allowances.



(d) From the year 2015 to the year 2022, 66 undergraduate candidates who were registered for postgraduate courses had not completed their studies within the period set by the university, and only 12 of them had extended the period.

(e) Due to the fact that a foreign student abandoned his studies in January 2022, the remaining Rs. 3,544,756 from the Foreign Student Scholarship Fund had not been sent to the said fund or taken into the government's revenue until December 31, 2022.

(f) Although the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka has been aware of the "2030 Agenda" regarding sustainable development goals, due to the fact that the sustainable development goals to be achieved according to its scope have not been identified, the goals, base data, milestones to reach the goals and indicators for measuring progress are also not identified.

(g) Rs. 2,201,150 payable to the Mahapola Higher Education Scholarship Trust Fund from the year 2019 and Rs. 2,380,750 payable to the University Grants Commission from the year 2018 were also not settled during the year under review.

(h) Although the Committee on Public Enterprises had ordered on August 9, 2017 that the playground and the pavilion of the university, which had been built at a cost of Rs. 123,052,693 in 2014 should be completed, the actions had not been taken to repair the playground using its retention money of Rs. 5,156,160 even by May 2023.

(i) According to a personal request of a member of the local council of Imbulpe, the council had given approval to a contractor of a road development project implemented by the Road Development Authority to cut 500 cubes of soil from the university grounds free of charge. Although the security officer had used a log that the soil was taken, there was no information about the Lorries that arrived and the amount of soil that was taken.
