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01. Chairman's Message

When discharging powers and functions vested with the Land Survey Council in terms of the Survey Act, No. 17 of 2002, the responsibilities of the Council are registration of surveyors, the issue of annual practising licences for registered surveyors, implementation of continuing professional development programmes, and maintaining professional discipline of the registered surveyors. The responsibilities further include holding inquiries on the complaints made by the general public against the registered surveyors, dissemination of details of the registered surveyor to the general public and maintain cordial relationship with other professional bodies. I am extremely contented that the Land Survey Council has been succeeded in 2018 towards strengthening the practitioners to deliver qualitative surveying services of high professional standards.

Action was taken during 2016 to regularize the land surveying activities pursuant to the provisions of the Survey Act in a context where the Act has been enacted more than a decade ago. Subsequent to the formulation of technical guidelines, action was taken to oversee the land surveying activities through the said technical guidelines.

In short, the intention of formulation of regulations is to encourage each surveyor to conduct his/her duties properly and in compliance with specified standards. I firmly believe that discharging of duties by each surveyor in compliance with the said regulations, which have come to fruition with the participation and commitment of all the stakeholders in the field of surveying, will pave the way towards betterment of the professional surveyors as well as the country in general. Pertinent to the facts revealed during experimentation, action is being taken to amend/ improve relevant regulations and to publish them in the Government Gazette.

A dedicated website for the Land Survey Council i.e. www.landsurveysurveycouncil.org has been launched during the year and it has been identified as one of the most successful means to reach the professionals as well as the general public. Registrations at the Council and delivering of information have been carried out in more efficient manner through this website.

The Land Survey Council has taken steps to approve and conduct several continuing professional development programmes in order to maintain professional development and conduct of the registered surveyors. The interest shown by the registered surveyors to take part in the said programme was noteworthy.

I take this opportunity to extend my gratitude to the entire staff of the Land Survey Council including actg. Secretary, Accountant (part-time) and members of the Council including its Vice President for their support and dedication towards proper functioning of the Council during the year under review in a context where a shortage of staff was existed.

02. Vision and Mission

Vision

To ensure the optimal and sustainable utilization of our physical and natural resources for national development whilst maintaining the integrity of a proper regulatory framework for land surveying and thereby strengthening the professional environment focusing on land surveying services with qualitative as well as professional expertise in a competitive global marketplace.

Mission

To ensure that the profession of surveying and its practices are well regulated and that those who are entering the profession receive education and training commensurate with the modern technological demands and ethical standards expected from the profession, so that practitioners maintain the highest standards of professional conduct.

03. Land Survey Council

Pursuant to the provisions of the Survey Act, No. 17 of 2002, the Land Survey Council was established at the ground floor of the Surveyor General's Office Building located at No.150, Bernard De Soyza Mawatha, Colombo 05 in March 2003 and it has been functioning at the said location since its inception.

Provisions for the constitution of the Council are provided in Section 27 of the Survey Act. In accordance with the said provisions, the Council consists of 07 members and the procedure for their appointment to the council is described below.

(a) Ex-officio Members

- i. Chairman - The Surveyor General
- ii. Vice Chairman - A registered surveyor not below the rank of a Deputy Surveyor General nominated by the Surveyor General
- iii. Member - The Director of the Institute of Surveying and Mapping established by the Institute of Surveying and Mapping Act, No. 21 of 1969

(b) Appointed Members

- i. Member - Three registered surveyors, who possess wide experience and proven capabilities in land surveying, nominated by the Surveyors' Institute of Sri Lanka incorporated by the Surveyor's Institute of Sri Lanka (Incorporation) Act, No. 22 of 1982.
- ii. - One academic, in the field of Education, Administration, Management or Engineering from a University, nominated by the University Grants Commission established by the University Grants Commission Act, No. 16 of 1978.
- iii. Those appointments are made by the Minister.

04. Functions assigned to the Land Survey Council

The Functions of the Council are elaborated in the Section 37 of the Survey Act as stipulated below.

- (a) To maintain standards and procedures relating to land surveying and professional discipline among persons engaged in land surveying.
- (b) To receive applications from surveyors for registration as registered surveyors and to register such surveyors where the Council is satisfied that such surveyors possess the prescribed qualifications and experience and have the ability and skills to practice land surveying.
- (c) To receive applications from registered surveyors for the issue of annual practicing licences and to issue such licences to surveyors where the Council is satisfied that such surveyors possess the knowledge and skill to practice the profession of land surveying.
- (d) To promote the maintenance of high standards of professional education among persons engaged in land surveying.
- (e) To promote programmes which provide for professional development by improving the knowledge and skills of persons practicing land surveying and those who are required to obtain an annual practicing licence.
- (f) To recognize academic and professional qualifications in land surveying, establish practical experience requirements and conduct qualifying examinations and professional interviews for candidates for registration as registered surveyors and for the issue of annual practicing licences.
- (g) To negotiate and administer reciprocal arrangements with the relevant authorities in the foreign countries for the purpose of securing uniformity and reciprocity in the education, training and recognition of persons engaged in land surveying.
- (h) To co-ordinate with the institutions engaged in education and training with respect to activities related to land surveying and land information in Sri Lanka in order to maintain specified educational standards.
- (i) To co-ordinate with other relevant organizations in Sri Lanka in the maintenance of high professional standards.

05. Powers vested with the Land Survey Council

The powers vested with the Land Survey Council in terms of the Section 38 of the Survey Act are as follows.

- (a) To acquire, hold, take or give on lease or hire, mortgage, pledge, sell or otherwise dispose of, any movable or immovable property;
- (b) To accept gifts, grants or donations whether in cash or otherwise, and to apply them for discharging its functions;
- (c) To appoint such officers and servants as may be necessary for carrying out the work of the Council;
- (d) To determine the remuneration payable to the officers and servants so appointed;
- (e) To appoint committees for the effective discharge of its functions;
- (f) To establish a social security scheme, and provide welfare and recreational facilities for its officers and servants;
- (g) To make rules in respect of the administration of the affairs of the Council;
- (h) Generally, to do all such other things as are necessary to facilitate the proper discharge of the functions of the Council.

08. Activities of the Land Survey Council

1. Registration

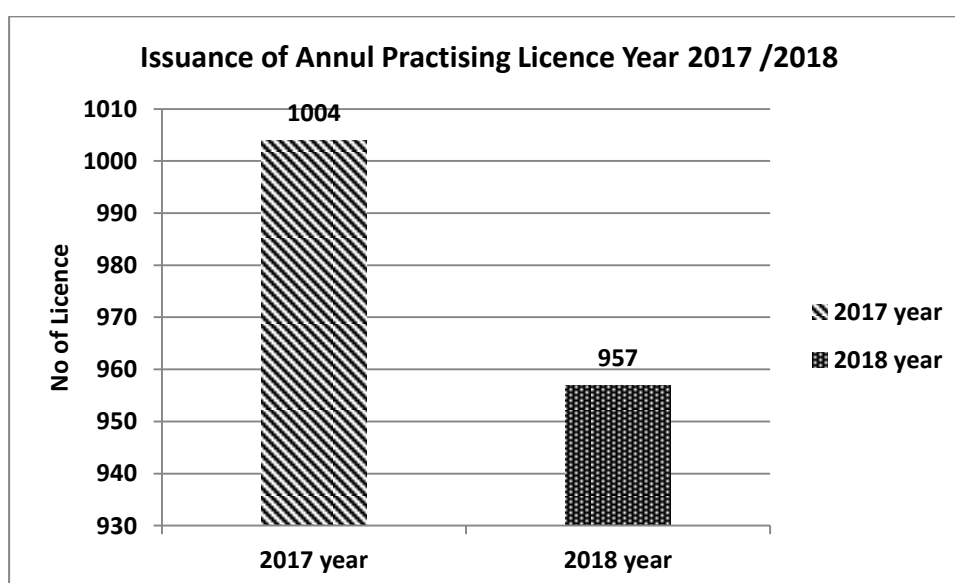
Upon receiving applications by the Council during the year under review from 01 January to 31 December 2018 for registration as a surveyor, the prescribed qualifications, experience and skills for the purpose of engaging in land surveying were examined.

Of the applications received, the Council has registered 62 new surveyors where the council was satisfied with the qualifications, experience and skills of the said persons. Accordingly, the total number of surveyors registered at the Council was 2163 as at 31 December 2018.

2. Annual Practising Licence to Practice Land Surveying

Receiving of applications from the registered surveyors to obtain annual practising licences for the year under review was commenced in September 2017. Upon examination of the knowledge and competencies of the applicant surveyors by the Council, the Council has issued 957 annual practising licences during 2018. In comparison with the number of annual practising licences issued in the previous year which stood at 1004 there was a drop of 3.6%.

The number of annual practising licences issued by the Land Survey Council to the registered surveyors in 2017 and 2018 is shown in the Graph 01.

The basic details viz. name with initials, registration number, and National Identity Card Number of the registered surveyors who have obtained the annual practising licences up to 28 February 2018 during the year under review was published in the Government Gazette No. 2011/24 of 23 March 2018 by the Council.

Moreover, all the particulars of the registered surveyors who have obtained the annual practising licences viz. registration number, name with initials, name in full, residing district, address, telephone numbers, email address, number of the annual practicing license etc. have been included in the official website of the

Council (www.landsurvecouncil.org). The said information is being updated once in daily.

3. Information to General Public

Currently, the general public is well aware on the services provided by the Land Survey Council. As a result, there is a significant increase in the number of people who seek personal details of the registered surveyors who engaged in surveying relevant to the survey plans which dates back to more than hundred years. Further, requests are being received frequently seeking those details through electronic mail. The staff of the Council is committed to provide such information expeditiously and accurately and whenever if it is possible to provide requisite information at the same instance they will do so. In response to the public requests, the Council has provided the requisite information on 191 occasions during the year under review.

Action has been taken by the Council to maintain a database of all registered licensed surveyors which contains private address, registration number, contact numbers, number of the annual practicing license etc. Steps will be taken to include a photograph of each registered licensed surveyor to the data base. With the inclusion of their contact numbers to the data base, the general public can directly contact them to obtain copies of survey plans etc. However, a methodology to obtain copies of the old survey plans prepared by the licensed surveyors has yet to be formulated. This has been identified as a major issue confronted by the general public. Therefore, the Council, having cognizant of the importance of the matter, has considered to develop an applicable methodology in this regard.

4. Public Complaints received by the Land Survey Council

One of the main functions entrusted to the Council is to conduct investigations into the complaints received from the general public with respect to professional misconducts of the registered surveyors. Inquiries into such complaints are held pursuant to the provisions under Section 46 of the Survey Act. The Council members convene once in every month to conduct inquires and they usually conduct 6-7 such inquires in each council meeting. It enables the general public to

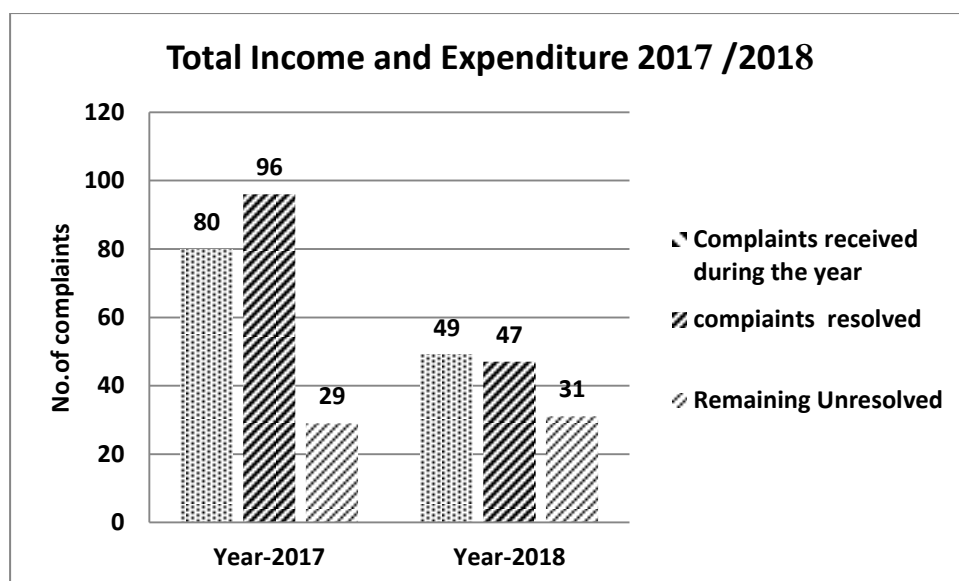
resolve their land related issues and pave the way to maintain professional conduct of the surveyors as well.

On some instances, the Council is not a position to make orders due to the nature of certain complaints, viz., cases subject to court proceedings, complaints which do not have sufficient evidence to substantiate the charges, court commissioned surveys carried out pertinent to court orders, complaints which fall outside the statutory purview of the Council. On such instances the complainants will be advised to solve their problems through court proceedings.

The following is a list detailing complaints received in 2018 but yet to be resolved and the inquiries completed in 2018.

The total number of complaints received during the year 2017 was 96 and 49% deduction in respect to receiving complaints was observed in 2018. The total number of complaints resolved in 2017 stood at 91 and number of complaints resolved in 2018 decreased by 48%. The said data is shown graphically in the Graph 02.

5. Action taken on the misconduct of registered licensed surveyors

On instances when the Council determines that a registered surveyor is guilty of professional misconduct, a penalty can be imposed pursuant to Section 47 of the Survey Act, No. 17 of 2002.

As described in the Section.4 above, subsequent to holding inquiries into the complaints, the Land Survey Council had imposed penalties on the respondent surveyors as detailed below during 2018.

09. Educational and Training Programmes

1. Continuing Professional Development (CPD) Courses

Continuing Professional Development (CPD) is essential component with respect to the subjects related to land surveying. As provided in the Section 37 of the Survey Act, one of the functions of the Council is to implement continuing professional development programmes to enhance knowledge and skills of persons practising land surveying and desirous of obtaining annual practising licence. Therefore, the Land Survey Council encourages the participation of all registered licensed surveyors in training courses/ workshops on surveying with relevance to novel technologies and methodologies.

The orientation programmes for apprentice surveyors who wish to pursue surveying as a private practitioner and programmes on developed technologies for experienced surveyors are being conducted separately. In addition to the programmes conducted by the Council, the said programmes are being implemented by other reputed institutions such as the Surveyors' Institute of Sri Lanka and other District Licensed Surveyors' Association etc., under the supervision of the Council.

2. Workshops of Surveyors who wish to obtain licences for the first time to practising surveying

The Land Survey Council annually conducts orientation courses for the registered surveyors who obtained annual practising licenses for the first time to pursue a career of a professional surveyor. Resource personnel in the caliber of eminent registered surveyors with wide experience and proven capabilities are selected to disseminate knowledge and understanding in surveying to the newly registered surveyors.

3. Continuing Professional Development Programmes conducted by other External Organizations

The Surveyors' Institute of Sri Lanka and Licensed Surveyors' Association in Districts are very keen to conduct continuing professional development courses for registered surveyors and registered licensed surveyors. Such courses are conducted under the supervision of the Land Survey Council and the Council is very contented about the commitment of such organizations in this regard.

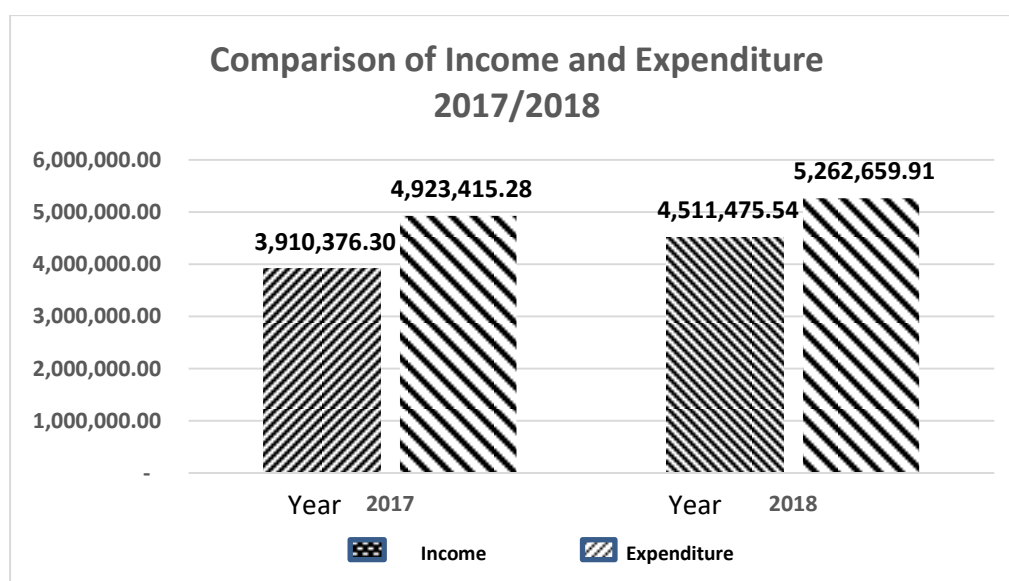

10. Financial Management

1). Total Revenue and Total Expenditure

During the year 2018, the revenue earned by the Land Survey Council was Rs. 4,511,475.54 and the expenditure stood at Rs. 5,262,659.91. In comparison to year 2017, the revenue and the expenditure of the Council has been increased by Rs. 601,099.24 and Rs. 339,244.63 respectively.

Total revenue and expenditure in respect of 2017 and 2018 is presented in Graph 03 below.

2). Funds of the Council and Financial Management

The manner in which monies to be collected to the fund of the council is provided under Section 56(2) of the Survey Act. Accordingly, all sums of money as may be available to the Council out of the Consolidated Fund and all sums of money as may be received by the Council in the exercise, performance and discharge of its powers, duties and functions entrusted to the Council under the Survey Act should be paid into the fund. Further, all sums of money as may be received by the Council by way of gifts, grants or donations should also be paid into the fund. Pursuant to Section 56(3) of the Survey Act, there shall be paid out of the Fund all sums of money as are required to defray the expenditure incurred by the Council in the exercise, performance and discharge of its powers, duties and functions entrusted to the Council under this Act.

The Land Survey Council has not received any provision from the General Treasury since 2018. Thus, the Council has defrayed all its institutional and administration expenses from the fund in the exercise, performance and discharge of its powers, duties and functions. All sums of money of the Council is managed by the Council itself.

The main source of revenue for the Council's fund is the income received from issuing annual practicing licences for the surveyors. In addition, revenue is collected to the Fund by means of conducting training programmes and workshops, issuing necessary information to general public, receiving public complaints and investigation charges levied from accused surveyors etc.

The balance as @ 31.12.2018 in the Fixed Deposit Account of the Land Survey Council amounted to Rs. 6,516,499.77.

3). Audit of Financial Activities

The financial activities of the Land Survey Council are subject to an annual audit performed by the Auditor General. Further, an Audit and Management Committee has been appointed by the Council and it comprises of following members.

- i). A Representative from the General Treasury (Chairman)

- ii). Secretary of the Land Survey Council (Secretary)
- iii). A Representative from the Department of Auditor General (Member)
- iv). Two members of the Council (Members)
- v). Accountant of the Council (Member)

This committee is convened once in three months and examined the Council's activities in detail. Subsequently, the committee reports are referred to consideration and necessary action of the Land Survey Council. The Report of the Auditor General for year 2018 has been included in this Annual Report.

Detailed Report of the Auditor General on the Activities of the Land Survey Council including the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 December 2018 in terms of Section 13(7)(a) of the Finance Act, No. 38 of 1971

The audit of the activities of the Land Survey Council including the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2018 was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154(1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read in conjunction with Section 13(1) of the Finance Act, No. 38 of 1971 and the provisions of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018. The results of the audit conducted in terms of Section 13(7)(a) of the Finance Act, No. 38 of 1971 is issued through this report.

1.2 Responsibilities of the Management and the related parties for the Financial Statements

The management is responsible for preparation of the financial statements in accordance with the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards and present in fair manner and for determination of internal control that is necessary for enabling the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatements, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, it is the responsibility of the management to assess the ability to continue the Council as a going concern and it is also the responsibility of the management to prepare the accounts on the going concern basis and to disclose the matters related to going concern, unless it either intends to liquidate the Council or to cease the operational activities when there is no other alternative.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the financial reporting process of the Council.

In terms of Sub Section 16(1) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018, the Council shall require to maintain proper books and records of all its income, expenditure, assets and liabilities to enable preparation of annual and periodic financial statements of the Council.

In terms of the Section 39 of the National Audit Act, No.19 of 2018, the proposed actions to be taken with reference to matters referred to in this report should be submitted to me within three months from the date stipulated in this report.

1.3.1 Scope of the Audit

My objective is to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement due to fraud and error, and to issue the auditor's report that includes my opinion. Although reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but it is not a guarantee to the effect that an audit conducted in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards will always detect material misstatement when they exists. Misstatements can be arisen to a quantitative extent due to the effects of fraud and error on individual or aggregate basis, and it is expected to influence on the economic decisions taken by the users on the basis of these financial statements.

I undertook the audit in terms of Sri Lanka Auditing Standards with professional judgment and professional scepticism. I also:

- identify and assess the risks of material misstatements of the financial statements whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions or the override of internal control.
- obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the Council in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the internal control.
- evaluate appropriateness of the accounting policies adopted and the reasonableness of accounting estimates used and related disclosures made by the management.
- conclude on the appropriateness of the use of going concern basis of accounting based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Council's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my audit report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of the audit report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Council to cease to continue as a going concern.

- evaluate whether the financial statements are appropriately and reasonably inclusive of transactions and incidents underlying the structure and contents of the financial statements including disclosures.

The scope of the audit also extended to examine as far as possible and as whenever required the following;

- Whether its organization, systems, procedures, books, records and documents have been properly and adequately designed from the point of view of the presentation of information to enable a continuous evaluation of the activities of the Council, and whether such systems, procedures, books, records and documents are being maintained effectively;
- Whether the Council has complied with an applicable written law, or other general or specific direction issued by the governing body of the Council;
- Whether the resources had been procured and utilized economically, efficiently and effectively within the time frames and in compliance with the applicable laws.

1.4 Financial Statements

1.4.1 Internal Control on Preparation of Financial Statements

An entity is required to maintain a properly devised a system of internal accounting controls sufficient to provide reasonable assurance that transactions are executed in accordance with management's general and specific authorization, transactions are recorded as necessary to permit preparation of financial statements in conformity with applicable relevant reporting standards and to maintain accountability for assets, access to assets is permitted only in accordance with management's general and specific authorization and the recorded accountability for assets is compared with the existing assets at reasonable intervals and appropriate actions be taken regarding any differences.

2.0 Financial Review

2.1 Financial Outcomes

The operational outcome of the year under review was a deficit of Rs. 751,184/- and its proportionate deficit for the previous year was Rs. 1,013,039/-. Accordingly, an increase of Rs. 261,855/- in the financial outcome had been observed. A increase in the workshop income by Rs. 643,629/- was the main contributory factor for the said increasement.

The main reason for increase of registration revenue by 378% in comparison to the previous year was the increased number of registered surveyors. Licence Fee revenue had been decreased by 5% and it was observed that revenue received directly to the bank had not been identified.

2.3 Ratio Analysis

In terms of the Statement of Financial Position submitted, the current ratio of the institution during 2018 and 2017 was 5.3 and 2.3 respectively. The current ratio was prevailed at a higher position in the year under review compared to the previous year. The main reason for this was the transferring of unidentified revenue of Rs. 3.34 million into the cumulative fund.
