

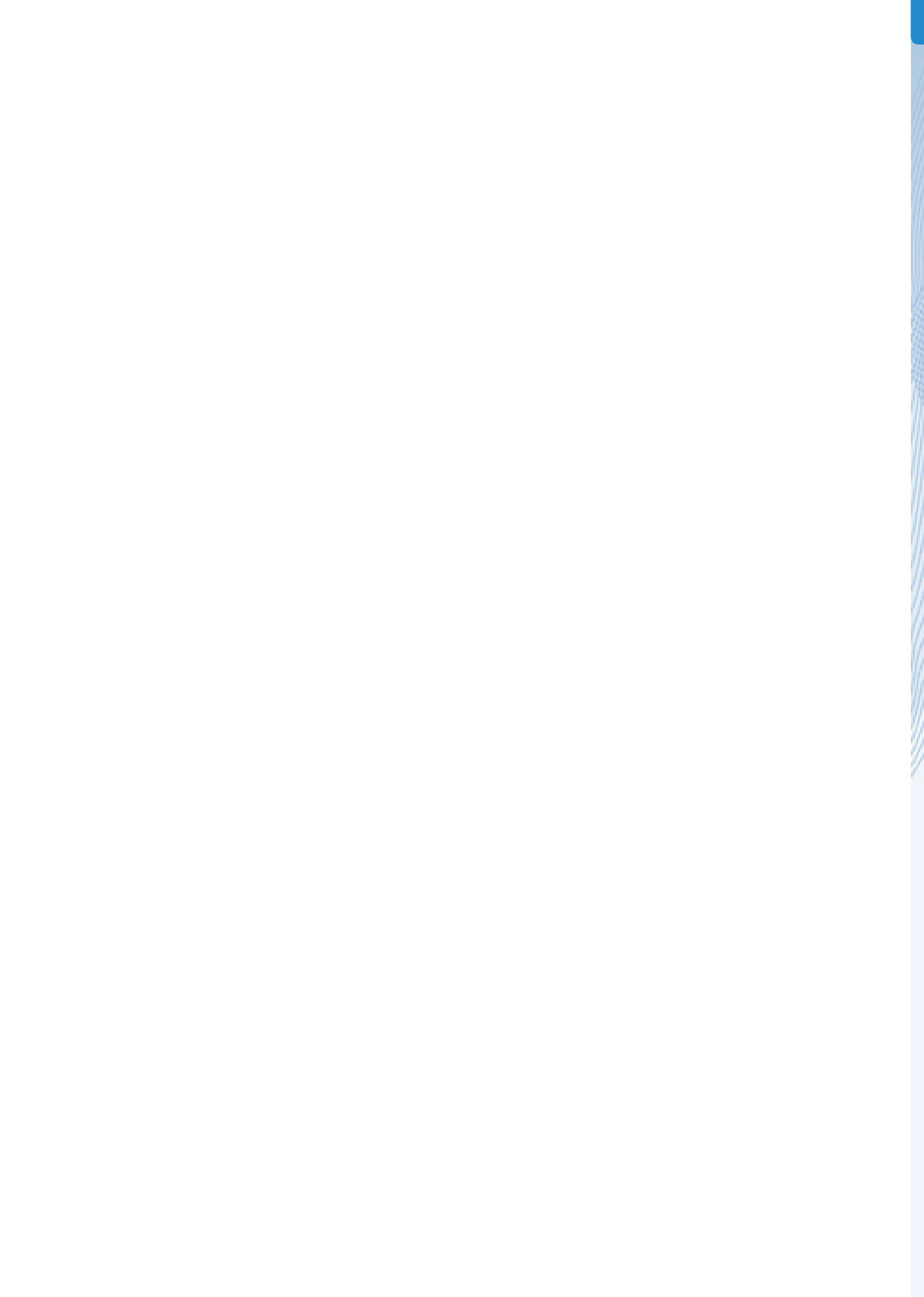

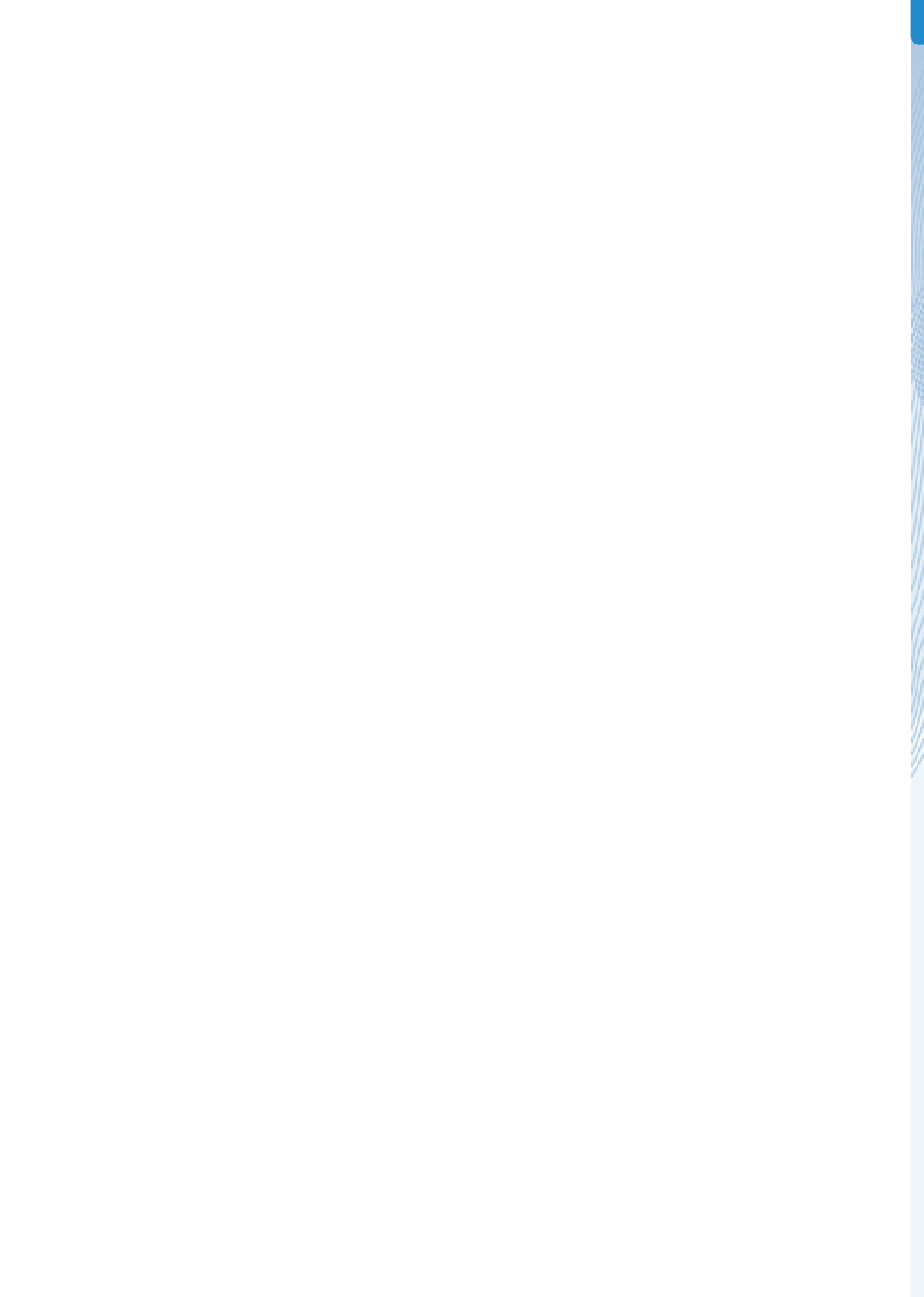

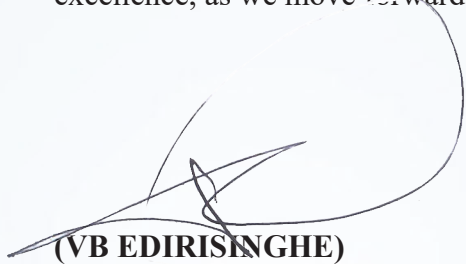

1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 Introduction

a. During the financial year 2024, Sri Lanka Air Force has contributed in line with Sri Lanka Air Force Annual Action Plan for the year 2024 giving top priority of national security to the country. In addition to the primary role of effective utilization of air power for the defence of the nation, the SLAF has contributed nation development activities to country. Especially, in response to circular issued by Ministry of Finance and Planning in respect of controlling of expenditure during the financial year 2024, the SLAF has revised its Annual Action Plan after 2nd quarter of 2024 and prioritized the activities in Annual Action Plan. In the face of complex challenges like the economic challenging situation of the country, the SLAF advanced important initiatives in FY 2024 that will have a positive impact on the Government expenditure management landscape in the years ahead.

b. In the year 2024, the Sri Lanka Air Force had continued its leading role in developing domestic air transport, which is identified as a prerequisite for development of tourism in the country. The Sri Lanka Air Force also played a major role in national calamities and disasters by active participation in casualty evacuation and timely engaging troops. Annual Performance Report 2024 includes analysis of Annual Action Plan 2024. Further, established activities during the year 2024 for accomplishment have been analysed against the actual performance and highlighted for intended planning of 2024.

c. Analysis of Annual Action Plan with Budget

(1) The Annual Performance Report is set out on the same basis as the Annual budget with Annual Action Plan. It reports performance against the targets set out in the Annual Action Plan for the 2024. Each section contains a short performance summary and assessment at the front, supplemented by an essay providing additional background on some relevant aspects of defence related activities during the year.

(2) The Annual Budget is designed deliberately to evolve over time to reflect emerging top level priorities and changes in the way the Department is organized. Consequently, although the overall structures remain consistent, there is inevitably a certain amount of change from one annual budget to the next at the top level supporting objectives and the way they are bridged and presented.

(3) At the highest level, objectives of the Sri Lanka Air Force are set out in par with the Annual Action Plan. The Annual Performance Report therefore starts with a summary of performance as of 31st December 2024 against the targets set in the Annual Action Plan of year 2024 including subsequent revision budgetary allocation. The spending review is provided throughout the report.

d. Departmental Financial Statements 2024

(1) The Sri Lanka Air Force is required to prepare Financial Statement for each financial year detailing the resources required, held or disposed during the year and the way in which it has been used. The financial statements are prepared on a cash basis in accordance with Financial Regulations and Treasury guidelines. Further, as per the treasury circular financial statements have been prepared based on public sector accounting standards.

(2) They must give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Department, the Net Resource outturn, resources applied to objectives, recognized gains and losses, and cash flows for the financial year. The Department Financial Statement for 2024 is attached with this report.

e. Strategic Framework for Performance Management

(1) Performance Management is a multi-phase process setting strategic goals and priorities, creating program activities, monitoring program activities collecting data and measuring progress towards achievement of goals, using performance and evaluation information to influence program and resource allocation decision making and communicating results to stakeholders.

(2) The SLAF's performance management is guided by a high-level *Annual Action Plan (AAP) of the year 2024*.

1.2 Vision, Mission and Core - Competencies

a. Vision

“Ensuring national security through effective employment of airpower”

b. Mission

“To train, equip and deploy a professional Air Force exploiting our core competencies to undertake air operations in support of national security”

c. Core – Competencies

The core competencies of an organization are the major determination of driving the organization towards achieving its goals. The SLAF also has number of unmatched core competences as follows:

(1) Military Flying and Air Defence Capability. SLAF is the sole entity capable of conducting military flying and Air Defence operations in Sri Lanka.

(2) Innovative Adaption for Limited Resources. Through its history, SLAF has shown a unique adaptability in the utilization of limited resources and is application for achievement of maximization effect under varying circumstances.

(3) A Professional, Motivated Workforce with Diverse Operational Experience. The SLAF possesses a rich heritage of traditions inherited from the RAF, a well-defined training and professional development structure, a wealth of experience gained in the application of Air Power in diverse operations conducted since its inception, which has produced a dedicated, motivated and highly adaptive professional force.

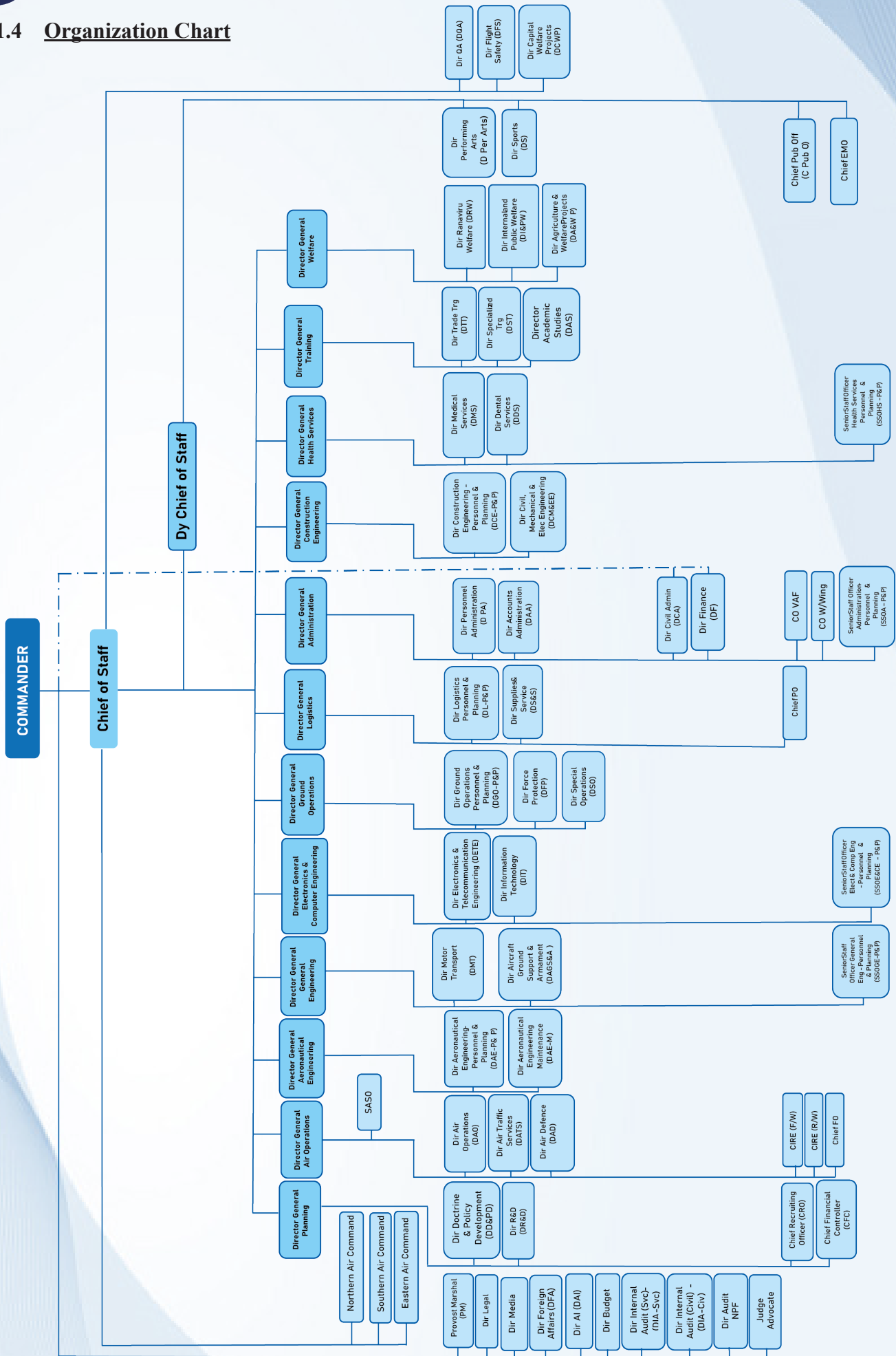
(4) Effective, secure, responsible exploitation of the electromagnetic spectrum and cyberspace for national security.

(5) Through possession of an exclusive island wide secure telecommunication, IT and Radar network, the SLAF has the unique ability to exploit the electromagnetic spectrum for communication and Air Surveillance and cyberspace for information management.

1.3 Key Functions

- a. To safeguard the territorial integrity and sovereignty of Sri Lanka by employing air power, through all mediums above the surface of the country.
- b. To provide air support and transport to land and Naval forces.
- c. To provide rescue facilities and transport at the request of the Government.
- d. Provide engineering and logistics service to maintain aircraft, road transport, electronic equipment and other plant and machinery.
- e. Provide troops for internal security operations.
- f. Undertake Non- Military Air Operations and carryout research and development projects connected with national development.
- g. Actively participating in Peace Keeping Forces of the UN by providing human resources, aircraft, and vehicles.

1.5 Main Office / Directorates and Divisions of the Sri Lanka Air Force and its brief Description in the year 2024

a. Office of Chief of Staff

(1) Introduction. Office of Chief of Staff is headed by the Chief of Staff. The responsibilities align with the SLAF's strategic goals and objectives, with coordinating Director Generals' operation and functions to achieve the SLAF objectives. Further, the Chief of Staff overseeing the functions of following divisions.

(a) Quality Assurance Inspectorate. The Quality Assurance Inspectorate (QAI) is established to perform Quality Assurance functions within the SLAF. QAI is headed by the Director Quality Assurance (DQA). He is responsible for the operational efficiency of the QAS in the inspectorate to the Chief of Staff, to whom has the right of direct access.

(b) Flight Safety Inspectorate (FSI). The Flight Safety Inspectorate is established to monitor and advice all aviation related activities conducted by SLAF flying squadrons, Bases, Stations and detachments. The FSI inspects the all flying squadrons, Academy, Bases and Stations with regard to the standards and all aspects of Flight Safety.

(c) Capital Welfare Project Division. The Capital Welfare Project Division (CWPD) is established under the Director Capital Welfare Project (DCWP), in order to supply fine aggregates for development works initiated by the Government and the Sri Lanka Air Force. SLAF has been entrusted with the responsibility of activating quarry projects in selected areas to meet the demand of random rubble required for the constructions. In addition to development purposes, this project is obliged to provide its products to military institutions for the establishment of military installations.

b. Office of Deputy Chief of Staff

(1) Introduction. Office of Deputy Chief of Staff is headed by the Deputy Chief of Staff (Dy C of S). The responsibilities include support to the Chief of Staff in overseeing SLAF administration and coordination of Directorates and Divisions. In addition, Dy C of S is responsible for overseeing the activities of sports and physical fitness of servicemen, public relations and disciplinary and training matters of other ranks. The Dy C of S also administers the Annual PFT, SLAF Excellence Awards, and the awarding of service and gallantry medals. The Dy C of S overseeing the functions of following divisions.

(a) Performing Arts Division. The Performing Arts Division was establishment as the only of the SLAF to cater the ceremonial and entertainment requirement of national interest, organizational interest as well as providing entertainment assistants for welfare of serving and retired SLAF personnel and civilians. Being one of the most reputed and established performance organization in the country, the Performing Arts Division has strengthened the revenue of the SLAF as one on the key profit generate of the organization.

(b) Sport Division. The Sport Division is dedicated to enhancing the physical and mental wellbeing of SLAF personnel through the promotion and development of sports. The division is responsible for planning and managing sports related activities, training programs, and long term personnel development.

c. Directorate of Planning

(1) Introduction. The Directorate of Planning is established in the SLAF to have a centralized entity for planning at AFHQ level. This Directorate undertakes the responsibility of overall planning and policy development, administration of R&D projects, human resource induction and financial management for planning activities in the SLAF.

(a) Chief Recruiting Office. Recruiting falls as the responsibility of Chief Recruiting Officer. The role and the responsibility of the Chief Recruiting Office is directed towards fulfilling vacancies available for Officers, Lady Officers, Airmen and Airwomen in the Sri Lanka Regular and Volunteer Air Force as and when authorized by the Commander of the Air Force.

d. Directorate of Air Operations

Introduction. The Operational shaper of the Sri Lanka Air Force comes under the purview of the Directorate of Air Operations. The Directorate is responsible for the areas of Air Operations, Air Defence & Air Traffic Controlling and Fire Fighting.

e. Directorate of Aeronautical Engineering

Introduction. The Directorate of Aeronautical Engineering is responsible for maintenance of the SLAF aircraft fleet in airworthy [Full Mission Capable (FMC)] condition through the application of standard engineering practices and ensuring flight safety. The SLAF inventory consists of 96 Aircraft of 23 types. These 96 Aircraft consist of 54 Fixed Wing and 42 rotor Wing.

f. Directorate of General Engineering

Introduction. The Directorate of General Engineering has been established to administer the General Engineering Trades of the SLAF. It primarily provides support facilities for the SLAF's primary role of flying. The Directorate administers ten (10) trades and two (2) major formations under its purview. The General Engineering Wing (GEW) & the Mechanical Transport & Overhaul Wing (MTR&OW) are the two formations. The directorate has specialist airmen in ten (10) trades but is served by Officers of the Technical Engineering branch who alternate between performing General Engineering duties and duties in the field of Aeronautical Engineering.

g. Directorate of Electronic and Computer Engineering

(1) Introduction. The Directorate of Electronics and Computer Engineering (Directorate of E & CE) was established in the SLAF for administration of Electronics, Telecommunications and Information Technology functions and to provide and maintain efficient Electronics, Telecommunications and Information Technology facilities. The Director General of Electronic and Computer Engineering overseeing the functions of Information Technology Division.

(a) Information Technology Division. The Information Technology Division was established in the SLAF as an independent Division. The primary role of the division is to design, develop and maintain all information technology (IT) systems and equipment including software systems, networks, hardware, data bases, multimedia designing and cyber security in order to achieve organizational objectives.

h. Directorate of Ground Operations

Introduction. The Directorate of Ground Operations was reinstated on 28th February 2014. The SLAF Regiment, consisting of 29 Wings placed under the Directorate of Ground Operations with the aim of preventing any external/ internal aggression by the enemy and to preserve/ secure the SLAF air assets and installations vital for operations.

j. Directorate of Logistics

Introduction. The Directorate of Logistics has been established in the SLAF to provide the necessary logistics support to conduct all Air Force operations, training, administration and welfare functions efficiently.

k. Directorate of Administration

(1) Introduction. This directorate is entrusted with all the matters concerned with the administration of the Sri Lanka Air Force and also with duties pertaining to General Discipline, Officers matters, Airmen/ Airwomen matters, Pay and allowances, Organizational matters and other administration matters.

(a) Civil Administration Division. The Directorate of Civil Administration has bounded with providing civilian employees to perform variety of services coming under different Directorates. It is also responsible to the Commander of the Air Force for an efficient administration and to exercise disciplinary control over civilian employees.

(b) Finance Division. The Directorate of Finance manages the financial activities of the SLAF in liaison with the treasury. The directorate ensures the availability of liquidity for all budgeted expenses and advise in the direction of spending.

m. Directorate of Construction Engineering

Introduction. The Directorate of Construction Engineering is established in the Sri Lanka Air Force for the formulation of Policy and to perform all functions encompassing different fields of Engineering Namely Civil, Mechanical and Electrical. The directorate is to utilize efficiently the approved technical manpower, other material resources and the allocated finances to meet all engineering requirements coming under the purview of the directorate.

n. Directorate of Health Services

(1) Introduction. As one of the main contributors to the technically intensive military force, the Directorate of Health Services (Dte of HS) will continue to be one of the key players in maintaining the health of the Sri Lanka Air Force. In addition to carrying out its main task of maintaining the health in the SLAF, D of HS will have to develop its capabilities to handle more in depth patient care activities in our hospitals. The Director General Health Service is overseeing the functions of division of dental services of SLAF.

(a) Division of Dental Services. As an essential preventive and curative health service, dental services must be made available to every individual of the SLAF conveniently and professionally. The Division of Dental Services is continuously improving the quality of dental services while expanding the service to all SLAF establishments.

p. **Directorate of Training**

Introduction. The Directorate of Training has established in the Sri Lanka Air Force to formulate training policy, plan and conduct of Initial, Basic, Advanced Trade Training, Specialized and Instructor Training, Promotion Examinations for Officers and Airmen/Airwomen. This Directorate will ensure that high standards are achieved and maintained at all SLAF training establishments.

q. **Directorate of Welfare**

(1) Introduction. The Directorate is responsible to the Commander of the Air Force for the welfare of all Officers/ Airmen and their families. As such the Directorate of Welfare is tasked with the responsibility of establishing and administering welfare organization for providing financial and other essential welfare facilities to uplift the standard of servicemen and their families. The directorate is responsible to ensure rehabilitation and welfare of the DIA (Disabled in Action) personal and NOKs of KIA (Killed in Action) personnel.

(a) SLAF Agro Unit. The SLAF Agro Unit of Sri Lanka Air Force has established for the uplift and coordination of Agriculture, Livestock farming and commercial ventures in the organization and to produce and provide farm products to all service and civil personnel in the Air Force as welfare measures.

(b) SLAF Welfare Project Unit. The SLAF Welfare Project Unit has been established to provide all essential commodities and other consumable items at concessionary rates for the consumption of members of the Air Force as a welfare measure. The operational functions of SLAF Welfare Project Unit involves with procurement of commodities and consumables from outside institutes, storing and distribution of same within the SLAF organization across the country where a considerable monetary transactions are taken place.

r. **Provost Division**

Introduction. The SLAF Police is primarily responsible in maintaining law and order and a high standard of discipline within the organization. Performing ceremonial duties such as VIP Motorcycle Escorts, Honour Guards, Crowd Controlling and Traffic Controlling are some of the key roles played on field by Policemen.

s. **Legal Division**

Introduction. The Legal Division of the SLAF was established as an independent component of the SLAF Command structure on 1st January 2007 with the intention of providing best, efficient, effective and accurate legal advisory service or any other legal services to the SLAF independently and transparently without being subjected to any influence whatsoever upholding the principle of Rule of Law in accordance with the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka.

t. **Media Division**

Introduction. The Sri Lanka Air Force as a Department under the Ministry of Defence, is responsible and answerable to the Public of Sri Lanka through the Ministry of Defence. However, in the course of its day to day operations, it may be necessary for the SLAF to interact directly with the general public both in the interest of promoting or preserving the public image of the organization or in response to communications initiated by those outside the organization. Considering that any and all communication between the SLAF and the general public has to be carried out with due cognizance of the implications to National Security as well as the due dignity and decorum of the Sri Lanka Air Force. It is imperative that the content and tone of all such communications are filtered by an authority under the direct purview of the Commander of the Air Force.

u. **Foreign Affairs Division**

Introduction. The Foreign Mission related to the United Nation (UN) in the Sri Lanka Air Force (SLAF) initiated its function on 01 September 2014. Six mission have been successfully performed in Central African Republic and five mission have been successfully performed in South Sudan. All foreign missions were performed under the supervision of Director Foreign Affairs at Air Force Headquarters (AFHQ) under the Commander of Air Force.

w. **Air Intelligence Division**

Introduction. The Air Intelligence Division was established on 23rd May 2017 to plan and execute all Intelligence matters in Sri Lanka Air Force. The division is responsible for the effective and efficient planning and execution of Air Intelligence Cell (AIC), Air Intelligence including Air Surveillance, Ground Intelligence, Global Intelligence and Cyber Intelligence in the purview of Sri Lanka Air Force.

x. **Budget Division**

Introduction. The budget division is established in the SLAF as an independent division. The primary role of the budget division is to obtain financial resources (provisions) to manage the activities of the SLAF and considerably influence respective Director Generals/ Directors for the optimum utilization of provisions which are allocated to them during a financial year in conference to Government Financial Regulations.

y. **Internal Audit Division**

(1) Internal Audit Division (Service). Internal Audit Division (Service) (IAD (S)) was established in the year 2011 in fulfillment of statutory requirements laid down in section 133,134 of Financial Regulations of the Government of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka and circulars of the Management Audit Department (DMA). Accordingly, as an independent division, the IAD (S) is a division directly reporting to the Commander of the Air Force and headed by Director Internal Audit (Service).

(2) Internal Audit Division (Civil). The Internal Audit Division (Civil) was established in 2017 in line with the COPA decisions, Financial Regulations 133 and 134, and DMA/01/2019 Audit and Management Circular. Further, IAD (C) is functioning independently under the direct supervision of the Commander of the Air Force.

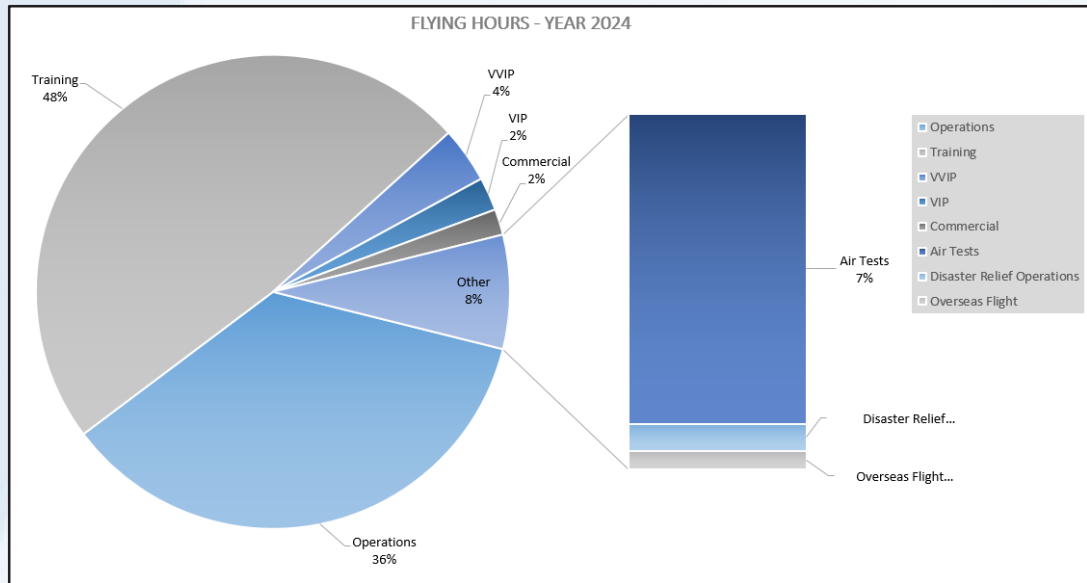

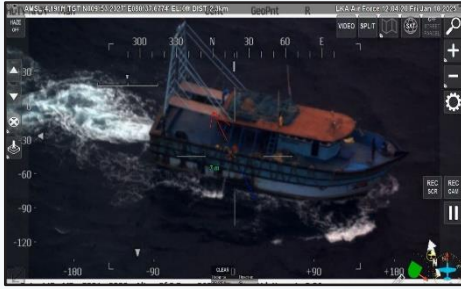

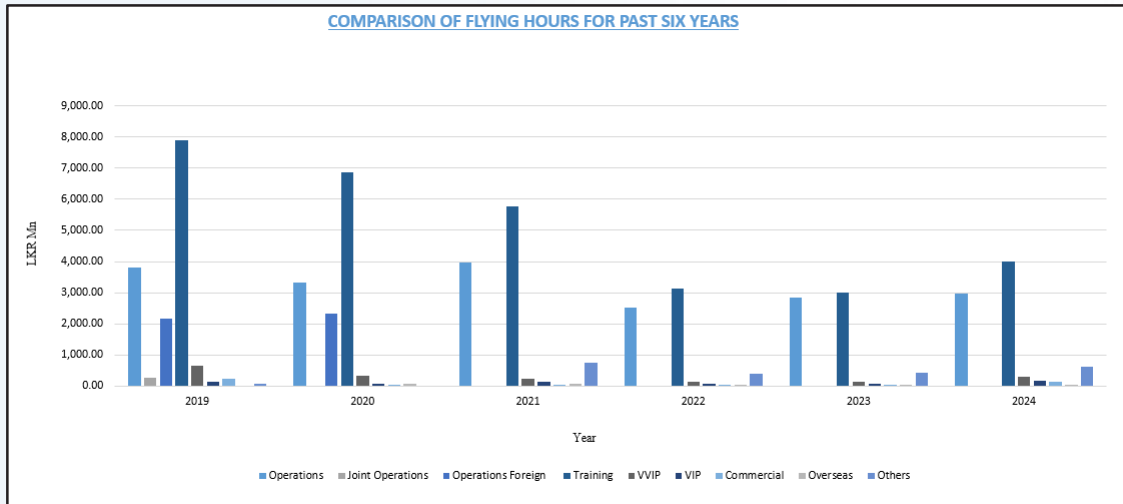

(d) Propeller Shop. The Wing has engaged with 16 Nos of Propeller rubber paces change/ Propeller blade repair / Leading edge repair / Balancing / overhaul jobs in terms of Y-12, C-150, PT-6 and B-200.

(19) AOW - Development in aircraft and aviation related activities.

The following maintenance works have been performed by the AOW during the year 2024.

(a) Delivery of SMR-858 Y-12 II Aircraft after Completion of Service Life Extension Programme at Aircraft Overhaul Wing (AOW) SLAF Base Katunayake - The AOW at SLAF Base Katunayake successfully completed the overhaul and service life extension of a Y-12 II aircraft, which was officially handed over to the No. 8 Light Transport Squadron at SLAF Base Ratmalana on 03 December 2024. This was achieved through a comprehensive refurbishment process that included structural inspections and repairs, detailed examinations of critical areas, and a thorough evaluation to ensure compliance with operational safety standards. The inspection was conducted entirely in-house by the skilled officers and technicians of the AOW, reflecting the SLAF's growing self-reliance and technical expertise in fleet maintenance. The service life extension significantly enhances the operational readiness of the No. 8 Light Transport Squadron, ensuring the continued availability of the Y-12 II aircraft for various missions, including troop transport, logistics support, and medical evacuation.



(b) Time Between Overhaul (TBO) Extension of the SJT-748 K-8 aircraft and service life extension of the SJT-1612 and SJT-1613 K-8 aircraft - The TBO life extension for the SJT-748 K-8 aircraft and the service life extension for the SJT-1612 and SJT-1613 K-8 aircraft were successfully accomplished at the AOW facility in collaboration with experts from the Original Equipment Manufacturer (OEM). The SJT-748 K-8 aircraft received a two-year TBO life extension, while both the SJT-1612 and SJT-1613 K-8 aircraft were granted a two-year service life extension, ensuring the continued fulfillment of advanced training requirements for the SLAF and maintaining operational capability.



(c) Overhauling of PT - 6 aircraft at AOW – The overhaul process for the SBT-188 PT-6 and SBT-1161 PT-6 aircraft has commenced, and the removal of all accessories for necessary repairs has been completed.



(d) The SFI-708 F-7BS has been assembled in its 'as-is' condition, utilizing resources at SLAF for storage purposes.

d. Directorate of General Engineering

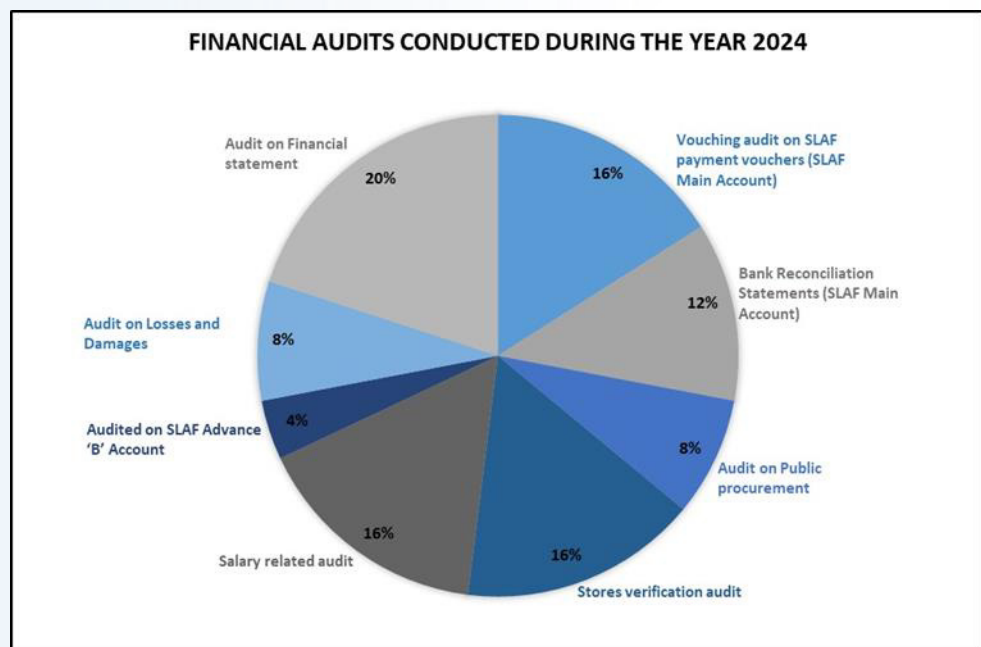

3.4 Summary Analysis of Financial Condition

a. **Financial Review**

(1) The SLAF has initially received budgeted provision LKR Mn. 69,199.00 for total Defence Expenditure for the year 2024. The actual total Defence expenditure for the year was LKR Mn 58,522.82 which represents LKR Mn 44,878.41 of recurrent expenditure and LKR Mn. 13,644.41 of capital expenditure.

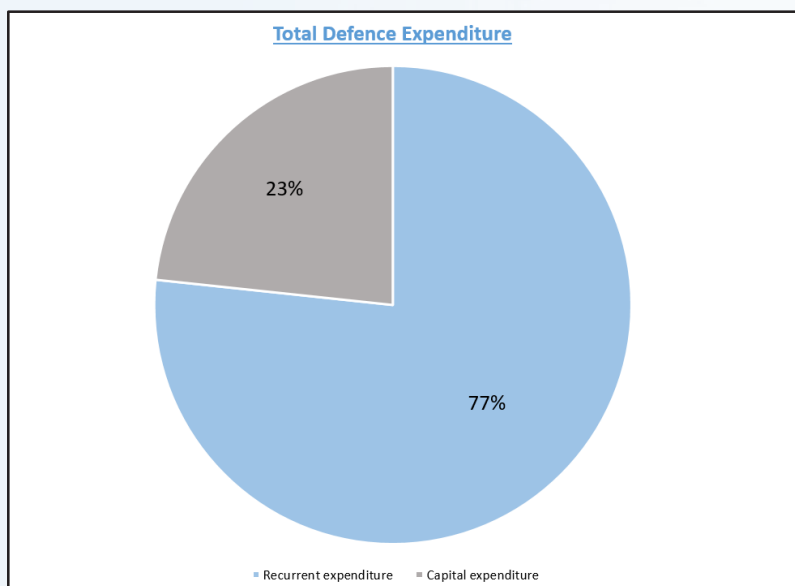

(2) However, the total net provision has increased by 19.16% whereas the actual expenditure has increased by 30.15% compared to the year 2023. However, Overall Defence expenditure in 2024 remained within the total provision voted by Parliament and the Control totals set by the Ministry of Finance and Planning of Sri Lanka.

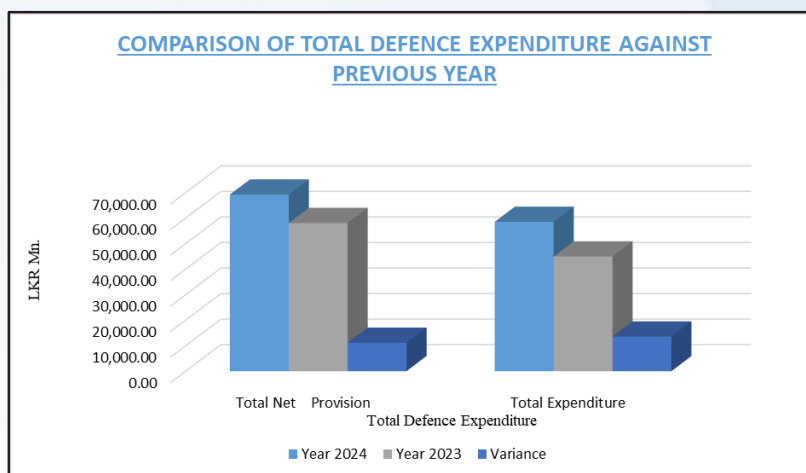

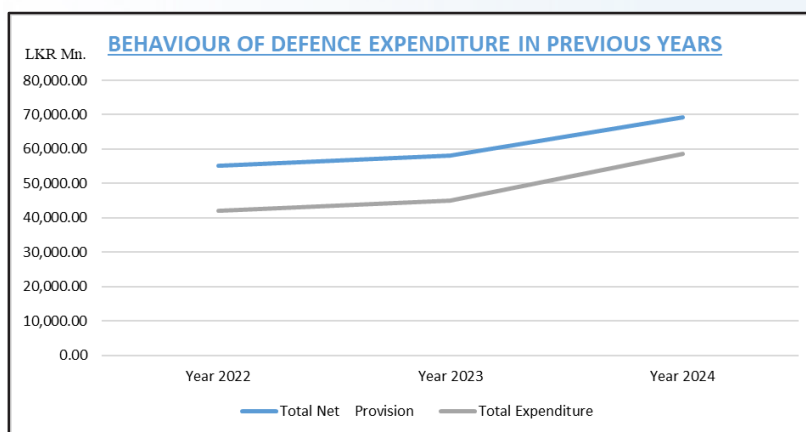

(3) Over the past three years, the defence expenditure of the SLAF has shown a steady upward trend in both total net provision and actual spending. In 2022, the total net provision stood at Rs. 55,235.71 million, with actual expenditure recorded at Rs. 42,016.45 million. This increased to Rs. 58,073.17 million in 2023, with actual spending rising to Rs. 44,964.92 million.

(4) By 2024, there was a notable rise, with the net provision reaching Rs. 69,199.00 million and actual expenditure significantly increasing to Rs. 58,522.82 million. This consistent growth reflects the government’s increased allocation and utilization of funds towards enhancing the national security, operational capabilities and infrastructure developments of the SLAF.

b. Financial Performance

The total aggregated revenue of SLAF for the year 2024 is amounting to LKR Mn. 54,652.51 which comprises LKR Mn.81.51 of revenue receipts and LKR Mn. 54,652.52 of non-revenue receipts. The total aggregated revenue has increased by 31.78% as compared to the year 2023.

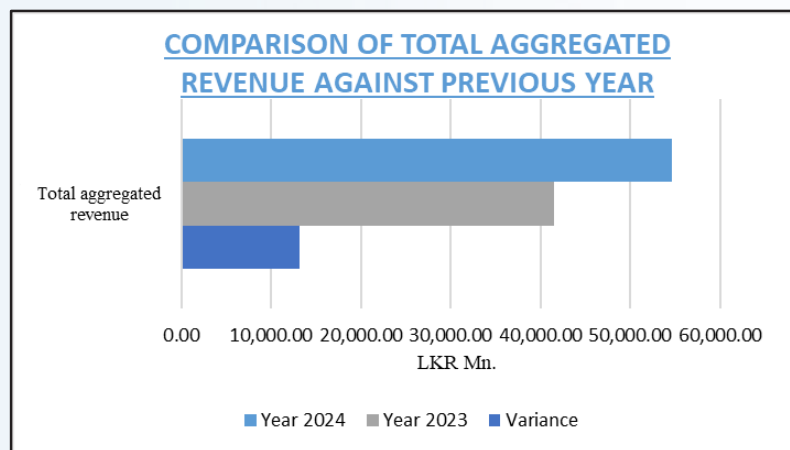

(1) Revenue Receipts

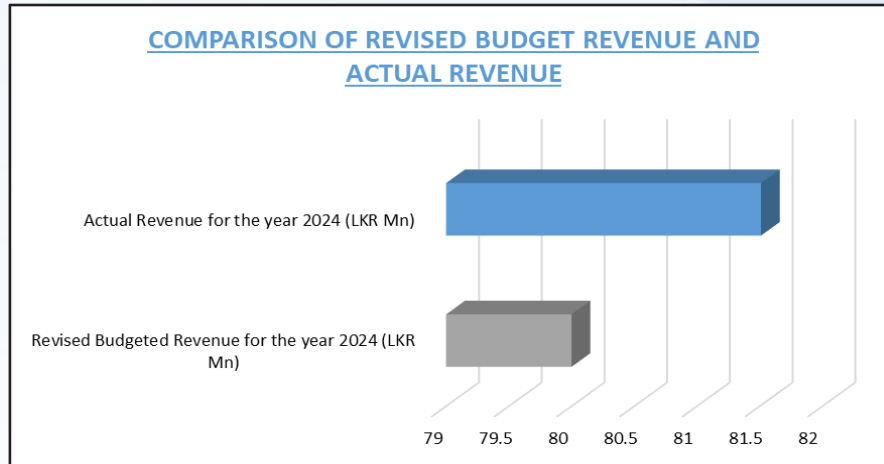

(2) Non-Revenue Receipts

The major receipts of SLAF for the year 2024 are non-revenue receipt amounted to LKR Mn. 54,652.52 This has been increased by LKR Mn. 13,192.48 compared to the year 2023. 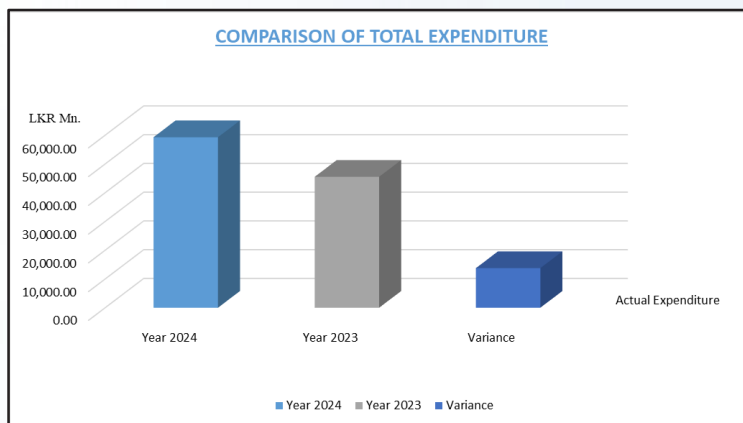

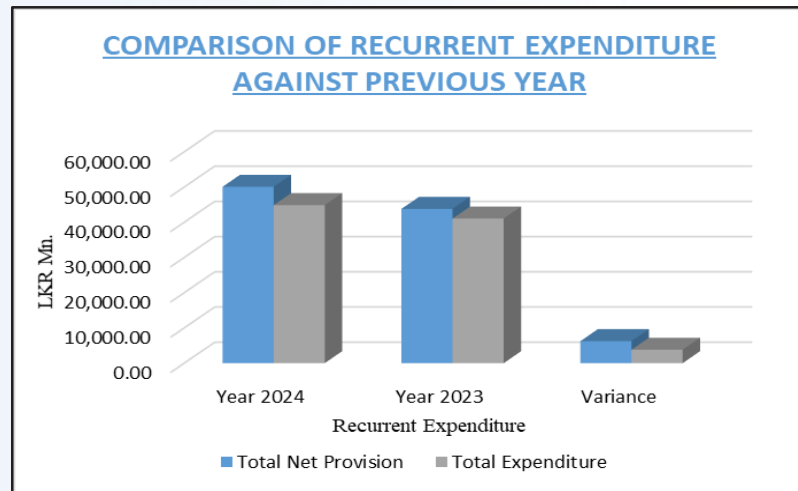

(5) Capital Expenditure

(a) The Sri Lanka Air Force has received initial provision for the total capital expenditure of LKR Mn. 19,120.00 with a view to provide the necessary infrastructure facilities, acquisition of capital assets, capacity building of servicemen and civil employees. The total net provision for the year 2024 has been increased by 34.13% as compared to the year 2023. However, compared to previous year actual expenditure was increased by 250.34%.

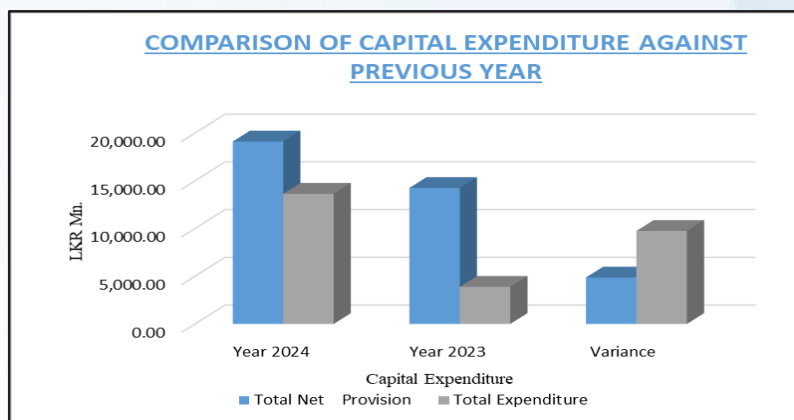

(b) Further, the actual expenditure of the year 2024 was LKR Mn. 13,644.41 which has resulted in 250.34% increase compared to the year 2023 due to receiving of KING AIR 360ER and KING AIR 350 Aircraft.

(c) Rehabilitation & Improvement of Capital Assets

The SLAF initially forecasted LKR Mn. 13,050.00 for the Rehabilitation & Improvement of Capital Assets during the year with the view of maintenance of viable asset base and its smooth operation. However, subsequently provision has reduced to LKR Mn. 4,719.00 due to transferred LKR Mn. 8,331.01 for acquisition of capital assets. The actual expenditure of the year 2024 was LKR Mn. 2,656.73.

(d) Acquisition of Capital Assets

The Sri Lanka Air Force initial provision was to acquire fixed assets amounting to LKR Mn. 4,870.00 mainly to provide, vehicles, furniture and office equipment, plant, machinery and equipment, building and structures. Subsequently provision was increased to LKR Mn. 13,201.01 due to transferred LKR Mn. 8,331.01 for acquisition of capital assets. The actual expenditure for the year 2024 was LKR Mn. 10,555.40.

(e) Capacity Building

Under the capital expenditure, Sri Lanka Air Force has originally forecasted LKR Mn. 300.00 for capacity building. The actual expenditure for the year 2024 was LKR Mn. 225.00.

(f) Other Capital expenditure

Under the capital expenditure, Sri Lanka Air Force has incurred an amount of LKR Mn. 207.27 as other capital expenditure against the total net provision of LKR Mn. 900.00.

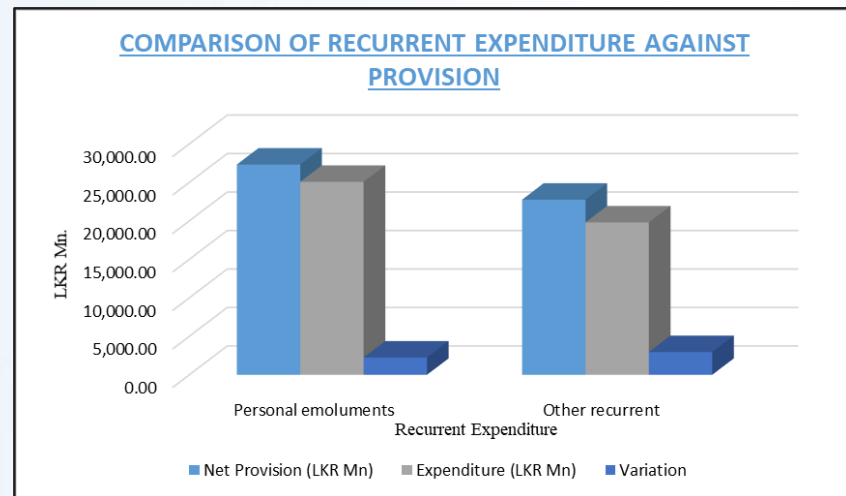

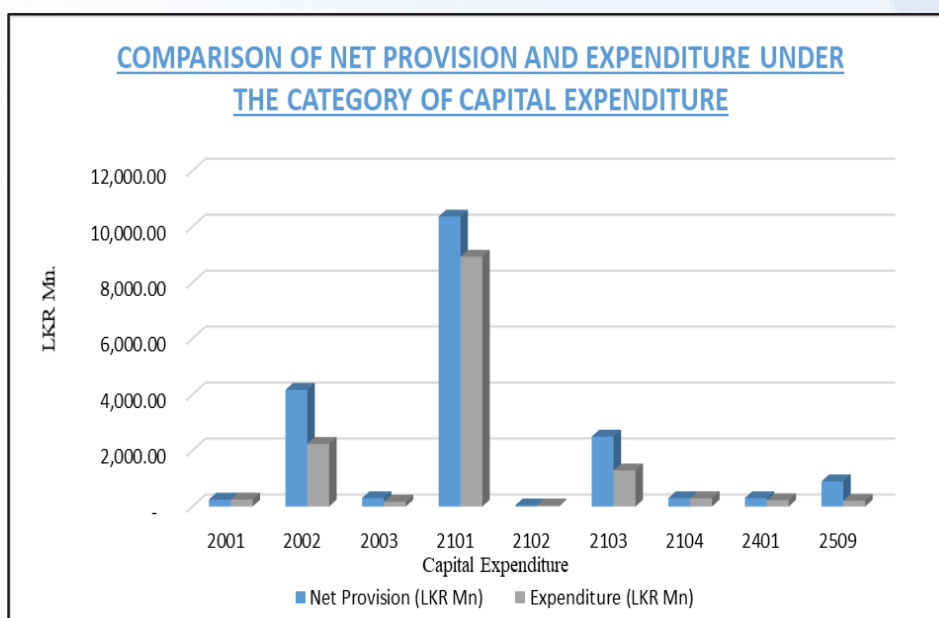

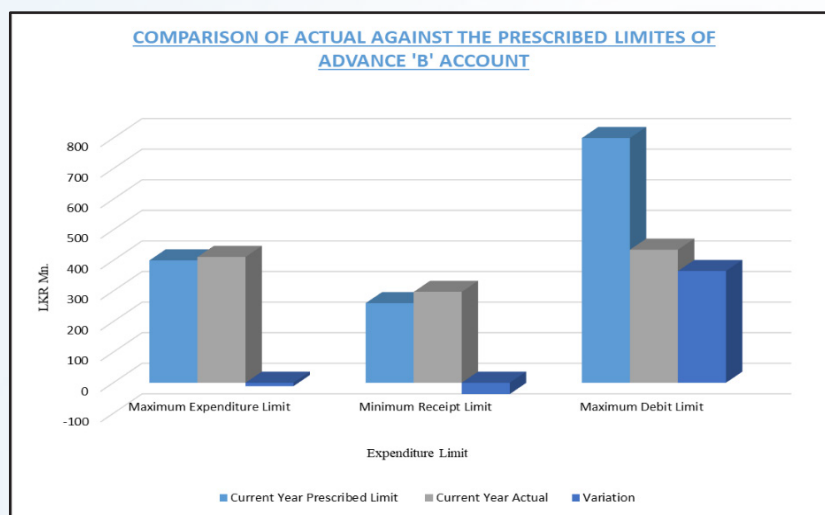

The Summary Report of Auditor General in accordance with Section 11 (1) of the National Audit Act, No 19 of 2018 regarding the Financial Reports of Sri Lanka Air Force for the period ended 31st December 2024

1. Financial Statements

1.1 Qualified Opinion

The audit of Financial Statement of Sri Lanka Air Force for the period ended from 31st December 2024 comprising the Statement of Financial Position as at 31st December 2024, the Statement of Financial Performance for the period ended and the Statement of Cash Flows has been carried out under my directions in pursuance of provisions in Article 154(1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka which should be read in conjunction with the provisions of the National Audit Act, No19 of 2018. This report includes my comments and observations with regard to these Financial Statements submitted to Sri Lanka Air Force in compliance with section 11(1) of the National Audit Act, No 19 of 2018. In terms of Article 154 (6) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka which should be read in conjunction with the section 10 of the National Audit Act, No 19 of 2018, the Auditor General's report will be submitted to the Parliament in due course.

In my opinion, the financial statements give a true and fair view of Financial Position of Sri Lanka Air Force as at 31st December 2024 and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the period ended in compliance with generally accepted accounting principles, excluding the impact of facts mentioned in Para 1.6 of this report.

1.2 Basis for the Qualified Opinion

I carried out the audit in pursuance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards (SLAuSs). My responsibility in relation to Financial Statements is further described in the section of Auditor's Responsibility in this report. I believe the audit evidences that I have obtained are sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

1.3 Emphasis of matter - Basis of preparation of financial statements

Attention is drawn to Note 1 to the financial statements, which describes the basis of preparation of these financial statements. The financial statements have been prepared for the needs of the Sri Lanka Air Force, the Treasury and Parliament in accordance with Government Finance Regulations 150 and 151 and Public Accounts Guideline No. 06/2024 dated 16 December 2024 as amended on 21 February 2025. Therefore, these financial statements may not be suitable for other purposes. My report is intended solely for the use of the Sri Lanka Air Force, the Treasury and the Parliament of Sri Lanka. My opinion in this regard is not modified.

1.4 The responsibility of the Chief Accounting Officer and the Accounting Officer in relation to Financial Statements

In accordance with Government Finance Regulations 150 and 151 and Government Accounts Guideline No. 06/2024 dated 16 December 2024 as amended on 21 February 2025, and in compliance with all quantitative aspects it is the responsibility of the Accounting Officer to ensure effective internal control which requires to enable the preparation of Financial Statements as reflecting a true and fair view and the preparation of Financial Statements free from material misstatements whether due to fraud and errors.

As per section No 16 (1) of National Audit Act, No 19 of 2018, Sri Lanka Air Force shall properly maintain books and records of all its income, expenditure, assets and liabilities, to enable annual and periodic financial statements to be prepared.

As per subsection 38 (1) (c), the Accounting Officer shall ensure that an effective internal control system is being carried out for the financial control of Sri Lanka Air Force and shall carry out periodic reviews to monitor the effectiveness of the system and accordingly shall make any alternations as required for the system to be effectively carried out.

1.5 Auditor's responsibility for the audit of Financial Statements

My objective is to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud and error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud and error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

In accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards, I exercised professional judgment and maintained professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement is higher than for one resulting from fraud, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, or the override of internal control.
- Obtained an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but No purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the internal control.
- Evaluating the fair and appropriate presentation of transactions and events underlying the structure and the content of Financial Statements, that included disclosures.
- Fair and appropriate presentation of transactions and events underlying the presentation, structure and content of the financial statements as a whole, had been evaluated.

The Accounting Officer had been informed regarding the significant findings, main internal control defects and other findings identified by my audit.

1.6 Comments on financial statements

1.6.1 Non-financial assets

- (a) While the total value of lands at the end of the year was stated as Rs. 32.68 billion in the Statement of Non-Financial Assets (ACA 6) submitted with the financial statements the value of the lands was Rs. 31.18 billion as per the information submitted to the audit. Therefore, a difference of Rs. 1.5 billion was existed between those values. Accordingly, the net assets of the Air Force had also been overstated by the same amount.
- (b) As at the end of the year under review, the Air Force is using 43 outsourced computer software amounting a total value of Rs. 53.91 million, and these assets had not been disclosed in the financial statements. Furthermore, the cost of 159 computer software programmes developed internally by the Air Force since 2009 to the year under review had not been calculated and disclosed in the financial statements.
- (c) The cost of work in progress in the current year was added to the opening balance during the years 2022, 2023 and 2024 and the year-end balance was included in the relevant statements of non-financial assets, and the costs related to the work completed in each year had not been capitalized as work completed. These un-capitalized amounts had not been disclosed through audit and the amount were not disclosed through the information called for audit as well. However, it was reported for the audit that the value of the works completed only at Katukurunda Air Force station was Rs. 108.98 million at the end of the year under review and the said amount also had not been capitalized.
- (d) The value of 60 buildings in extent of 93,206 square feet was not been disclosed in the financial statements due to not valuing and accounting.
- (e) The land and building on which the Sri Lanka Air Force Headquarters is located had not been valued and accounted. Therefore, the net assets of the Sri Lanka Air Force had been
- (f) Any military equipment was not included as non-financial assets in the financial statements of the Air Force, and, the net assets indicated in the Statement of Financial Position were understated by the value of those assets.
- (g) The value of vehicles including motor bicycles as at the end of the year under review in the statement of non-financial assets submitted with the financial statements is indicated as Rs. 5,622,660,629 and as per the information provided for the audit was Rs. 5,986,958,699, at the end of the year. There was a difference of Rs. 364,298,070 between those values.
- (h) The assessed value of other buildings belonging to the Air Force as at the end of the year under review has been reported to the audit as Rs. 10,715,366,053. The value of the buildings as at the end of the year under review in the Statement of Non-Financial Assets (ACA 6) submitted with the financial statements was Rs. 15,252,809,904, and there was a difference of Rs. 4,537,443,851.
- (j) Although Rs. 298,998,711 was depicted as purchases related to work in progress in the year under review, this balance has been reported as Rs. 518,000 as per the information called for audit. Accordingly, there was a difference of Rs. 298,480,711 between those balances.

1.6.2 Financial asset

The total of the classification summaries of individual balance at the end of the year under review was Rs. 434,602,652, while the balance of the Departmental Control Account was Rs. 434,859,171, leaving a difference of Rs. 256,519 between those balances. Furthermore, though it has been depicted that a total of Rs. 411,064,219 had granted as loan advances according to the Treasury printouts, that was Rs. 411,047,814, as per the balance sheet prepared as at 31 December 2024 and a difference of Rs. 16,405 was observed.

1.6.3 Lack of evidence for audit

While collecting outstanding loan balances from 579 Air Force officers for the period between 01 to 20 years, the Advance B Account was debited as re settlement of overpayments amounting to Rs. 2.14 million, No evidence was produced to the audit to confirm that those settlements had actually been made.

2. Report on other legal requirements

As required by section 6 (1) (d) of the National Audit Act, No 19 of 2018, I state the following.

- a. Financial Statements were consistent with last year
- b. Following recommendations given by me in relation to financial statements of previous year had not been implemented.

Physical and human resources of Sri Lanka Air Force had been utilized for the operations of these funds and for the income generated projects operated through these funds since these internal funds were not commenced as statutory funds in terms of Financial Regulation No 154, it was observed that the functions of these funds were not under the control of the treasury and the parliament.

3. Financial Review

3.1 Revenue Management

(a) At the end of the year under review the arrears of Hire Charges of charter flight revenue for the period between 06 to 21 years was Rs. 12,674,073.00 and it has been requested from the General Treasury to consider as irrecoverable an amount of Rs. 3,612,666.00 which were due from two private airlines in the years 2004 and 2008 and an arrears of Rs. 416,002.00 due from the Ministry of Ports and Aviation Services in the year 2006 which were included in the said arrears of revenue. The Air Force had not taken adequate measures to recover these arrears of Hire Charges of charter flight.

(b) In 2021, the airfield and buildings at the Katukurunda Air Force station were rented out to a private airline without a formal agreement, and no steps had been taken to recover the total rental income of Rs. 420,454 dues to the Air Force. Authority had been requested from the General Treasury to consider these arrears as irrecoverable.

(c) There was a loss of revenue amounting Rs. 567,165.00 from drone operations conducted using drones owned by the Air Force from 01 January 2024 to 30 August 2024 and through audit it was unable to disclose whether proper authority had been obtained to provide the relevant services free of charge.

3.2 Expenditure Management

3.2.1 Preparing estimates

Although it is the responsibility of the Accounting Officer to prepare estimates as completely and accurately as possible in accordance with Financial Regulation 50, the following shortcomings in the preparation of estimates persisted.

(a) Saving the provisions completely

Under the Indian Credit Line, a provision of Rs. 250 million had been allocated for the vote No. 224-1-1-7-2509, and this provision had been completely saved by the end of the year under review. Furthermore, although a provision of Rs. 150 million had been allocated for the vote 224-1-1-2-2509 Income Generated Commercial Projects – other, no expenditure had been incurred in relation to that during the year under review, and only an expenditure of Rs. 156,928.00 which should have been incurred from the vote 224-1-1-3-2509 UN Peace Keeping Missions – other had been incurred from this expenditure item.

(b) Underutilization of funds

Out of the total net allocation of Rs. 26.05 billion for 20 objects of recurrent expenditure, a total of Rs. 4.51 billion was saved due to non-utilization, and out of the total net allocation of Rs. 17 billion for 10 capital expenditure items, a total of Rs. 5.19 billion was saved due to non-utilization, The amount of savings ranged from 5.7 percent to 99.9 percent of the net provision made.

(c) Transfers of provisions

Due to insufficient provisions for 07 recurrent object class and excess provisions for 06 other object classes, a total of Rs. 525.23 million was transferred. It is observed that if this transfer were not made, the amount and percentage of provisions saved from net provisions would increase further.

3.2.2 Saving the provisions made by Financial Regulation 66

A total of Rs. 8.63 million had been transferred from other recurrent object classes to the object class **224-1-1-0-1402** (Postal and Communication), and the entire provision of this transfer had been left at the end of the year under review. Furthermore, a total of Rs. 513.63 million had been transferred for 05 recurrent object classes, By the end of the year, a total of Rs. 103.82 million or 20 percent had been saved. The percentage of this saving was within a range from 12 to 68 percent for each object class.

3.3 Reaching for Liabilities and Commitments

- (a) According to an audit sample test, liabilities amounting to Rs. 71.90 million, incurred on 16 occasions at the end of the year under review, had not been disclosed in the Statement of Commitments and Liabilities (Annexure III) presented with the financial statements.
- (b) Due to non-compliance with the provisions of Financial Regulations 94 (1) and 214, the value of the outstanding liabilities identified more than one month as per an audit sample was Rs. 4.15 million.
- (c) Although the relevant institutions were notified to submit confirmations of liabilities with a total of Rs. 721.93 million, which were included in the final balance of liabilities submitted as at 31 December 2024, confirmations were submitted only by four creditors for a total of Rs. 37.79 million by the date of audit on 27 May 2024.

Accordingly, liabilities of 684.14 million rupees had not been confirmed by twenty-nine relevant institutions. Out of the four creditors who had submitted confirmations, one's confirmation was not agreed with the balance of liabilities disclosed in the Air Force's financial statements and had provided confirmations of balances that were Rs. 4.63 million more than the value of the Air Force's liabilities.

3.4 Utilization of funds provided by other Ministries and Departments

A total allocation of Rs. 2.08 billion was granted by the Ministry of Transport and Highways and the Ministry of Ports, Shipping and Aviation to Air Force for the implementation of various projects and programs during the year under review, and at the end of the year, a total of Rs. 1.55 billion remained. These savings were between a range of 65 percent to 75 percent, and 75 percent of the Rs. 2 billion allocated for the development of the Hingurakgoda Airport had been saved by the end of the year and was failed to achieve the targeted development.

3.5 Non-Compliance with Rules & Regulations

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4. Operational Review

4.1 Performance

4.1.1 Not performing the Tasks

As per the action plan for the year under review, 61 tasks planned at a cost of Rs. 487.30 million had not been completed by the end of the year.

4.1.2 Not Achieving the expected level of completion

According to the action plan for the year under review, the range of percentage of progress achieved by the end of the year for 157 tasks planned at a total cost of Rs. 13.40 billion was from 0.52 percent to 89 percent.

4.2 Procurement

The followings are the findings of the audit sample examination of 06 procurements with a total of Rs. 112.76 million during the year under review.

(a) It has been stated that 05 procurements made at a total cost of Rs. 98.36 million have been made under the International Limited Competitive Bidding System, and although the minimum period for inviting bids should be 42 days as per the Procurement Guidelines 6.2.2, bidders were only given a range of time frame only for 7 days, 14 days, and 21 days. It has also been stated that the purchase of roofing sheets on 11 occasions at a cost of Rs. 14.41 million was carried out under the limited national competitive bidding system and although the minimum period for inviting bids should be 21 days as per the procurement guidelines 6.2.2, only 07 days were given to the bidders. This situation is observed as a violation of the aforementioned procurement guidelines as well as an attempt to limit price competition by limiting the number of bids received.

(b) The appointment of Technical Evaluation Committees was delayed by 20 to 28 days, and the procurement process was also been delayed by the same period. Due to these delays, Procurement Guidelines 2.6.1 (a) (i), (ii), (iv) and 5.3.1 (d) had been violated.

(c) While it has been stated in the procurement plan and bidding documents that the international limited bidding method has been followed in the purchase of Mess kit Shoes at a cost of Rs. 19.41 million and the purchase of Braid Materials at a cost of Rs. 17.56 million, and disregarding the criteria with the objective of limiting competitive bidding, these purchases were made under the international/national limited controlled bidding system.

(d) Considering the comparison of specifications related to the two prices submitted during the evaluation of the bids for the procurement of Mess kit Shoes at a cost of Rs. 19.41 million, both suppliers did not meet four key specifications. Although there were variations in two other specifications in addition to those specifications of the purchased supplier, the supplier with the highest specification variations was recommended and purchased. Although it was stated that the

lowest-priced supplier was recommended, as that supplier would have been the most expensive supplier when considering the supplier's customs and transportation charges. The government could have saved Rs. 3.81 million if it had purchased from the excluded supplier.

(e) It is questionable whether the relevant stocks were received with the proper standard and quality, as the entire stock was received at the warehouse without a test report from the institution that tested the specifications to see whether they were compared with the relevant specifications when purchasing 197,700 Braid Materials at a cost of Rs. 17.56 million.

(f) When inspected on 25th April 2025, out of the 650 Mess kit shoes received to the warehouse on 13th November 2024, 632 Mess kit shoes worth Rs. 12.84 million or 97 percent remained in the warehouse unissued and had been idle for almost 06 months. Further, out of 197,700 Braid Materials received to the warehouse on June 20, 2024, 139,418 Braid Materials worth Rs. 8.57 million or 70 percent were lying idle in the warehouse for almost 10 months when inspected on April 25, 2025.

(g) When purchasing of integrated valve and filter Assembly for rebuilding SUH 563 Bell 212 helicopter at a cost of Rs. 27.92 million, there was a delay of 23 days in appointing the Technical Evaluation Committee and 71 days in providing their recommendations, and due to this delay, the suppliers had informed that they could not provide the supply at the agreed price. Therefore, it had to obtain quotations again from the same supplier and purchase the said supply by paying an additional amount of USD 2,658 or Rs. 815,670.

(h) While purchasing 18,250 feet of roofing sheets on 11 occasions at a cost of Rs. 14.41 million, the criteria mentioned in paragraph 3.3 of the Procurement Guidelines were disregarded and this purchase was made under the limited controlled national bidding system with the objective of limiting competitive bidding and since a formal quality inspection report had not been obtained to confirm whether the zinc Aluminum or that the thickness of the sheets was 0.47 mm, the Technical Evaluation Committee had approved the purchase of the relevant roofing sheets without a formal quality inspection. Although zinc aluminum roofing sheets are not susceptible to corrosion, the roofing sheets purchased under order number PD/L/BRCE/23/11184 were corrosion-affected as at the date of audit on 08 February 2024.

4.3 Assets Management

(a) As at 31, December 2024, the Air Force has been using 639.2042 hectares of land in various parts of the island for a long period without legally acquiring the ownership, and the process of acquiring legal ownership of these lands has been very slow. Even though, not having legal ownership, the Air Force had carried out various constructions on these lands, the value of which could not be disclosed.

(b) Although the Air Force does not have legal ownership, the Air Force was still using 07 buildings, located in various parts of the island and value of which were undisclosed by the end of the year under review. The measures taken to acquire legal ownership of the buildings have been very slow.

(c) Without obtaining insurance coverage 04 cars, 43 vans, 159 cabs, 87 buses, 216 jeeps, 396 motorbikes, 48 three-wheelers, 260 lorries/trucks and 16 ambulances of Air Force were running - in during the year under review.

(d) The Air Force had 03 cars, 37 vans, 113 motorcycles, 57 cabs, 44 buses, 208 jeeps, 04 three-wheelers and 103 trucks that were not registered by the end of the year under review.

(e) The unregistered Honda Civic car bearing number *Guwan*-3419 and the Hero Honda Galamond motorcycle bearing registration number *Guwan* - 5544 (Reg. No. BFE-0010) had been

released to the Ministry of Defence without legal transfer even at the end of the year under review. The Air Force was also using 3 water bowsers belonging to the Disaster Management Center and an ambulance belonging to the Japan-Lanka Friendship Association without obtaining legal ownership.

(f) Although the extent of the land of Katukurunda Camp is 85 acres 02 roods and 21.62 perches, in 2015 the area was recorded as 81 acres 03 roods and 7.9 perches, which is 03 acres 0 roods and 14.53 perches less and it has not been able to resolve that so far. Out of the 21 plots of land used for the expansion of the runway, 02 plots of in extent of 0.6521 hectares had not been acquired by the date of audit.

4.4 Losses and damages

(a) An increase of Rs. 37,896 in relation with a loss and decrease of Rs. 390,283 in relation with two losses in the previous year that had not been written off had brought forward in the statement of writings-off from the books of the year under review.

(b) It was revealed that two loss and damage incidents with a total of Rs. 52.39 million that had occurred in the year 2023 were not included in the Registers of Losses and Damages which was revealed during an Audit Sample Test and that was also not been disclosed as losses and damages through the Statement of Writings Off From Books(Annexure II) submitted along with Financial Statements in the year under review.

(c) Even in the year under review, measures of recovering or writing-off of losses amounting Rs. 70.54 million in respect of 15 incidents over 10 years old, and losses amounting to Rs. 88.86 million in respect of 12 incidents over 05 years but less than 10 years was remained slow.

4.5 Management deficiencies

(a) The Air Force had hired 359 motor cars, 12 double cabs and 05 vans from external parties on rental basis within a range of Rs. 50,000 to Rs. 300,000 per month for the use of officers and to meet other transport requirement during the year under review. Although these vehicles can be used for a maximum of 3000 kilometers per month under these prices as per the agreement by taking measures to utilize maximum number of kilometers as per the agreement and reducing the number of hiring vehicles for gaining more benefits to the Government attention had not been paid to the same. During the year under review total amount of Rs. 574,459,025.00 had spent for these vehicles and there were 57 months used less than 500 kilometers, 141 months used between 500 kilometers to 1000 kilometers 1206 months used between 1000 kilometers to 2000 kilometers and 2169 months used less than 3000 kilometers.

(b) Although three unauthorized occupants had occupied the 01 acre 7.9 perches land received to the Katukurunda Camp as a donation in the year 2001, necessary measures had not been taken in this regard.

(c) At the Katukurunda Hanger 103.57 perches were leased out to 03 private companies who maintain their assets at an annual rental of Rs. 1,801,000, and although the relevant lease agreements expired on 31 October 2023, 21 January 2024 and 14 February 2024, there were no evidence of new lease agreements had produced to the audit.

(d) A land in extent of 39.81 perches had been acquired from Nuwara Eliya Pradeshiya Sabha for constructing an Observation Centre at, Shantipura, Kalapura, Nuwara Eliya on rental basis for Rs. 925,000 per annum from 01 August 2024, a cost-effectiveness analysis had not been conducted in comparison to the revenue generated by this Observation center.

(e) There were a total of Rs. 5,108,666 balance outstanding in disaster, property, flood, festival and special advance loans from 81 Air Force and Civilian officers, existing for a period of 01 to 28 years, which have not been able to recover so far from deceased, retired, and persons who had vacated their posts Air Force and Civilian officers. The observations in this regard are as follows.

i. The recovery process of outstanding loan balances of Rs. 4,790,536 from 59 civil employees who had left the service within a period of 28 years and Rs. 72,550 from 13 Air Force officers remained very slow. These Loan balances of Rs. 327,639, Rs. 3,273,799, Rs. 568,028 and Rs. 224,364 due from 11, 36, 05 and 3 civil employees were included in these loan balances which are exiting for more than 20 years, ten years and 05 years respectively and though those are subject to Section 4.3 of Chapter XXIV of the Establishments Code and para 4.3 of Public Finance circular bearing No.01/2024 dated 29 May, 2024, recovering process of these balances were deliberate.

ii. The total outstanding loan balances of Rs. 170,645 from 04 retired civil employees was outstanding for over a year while the total outstanding loan balances of Rs. 16,970 from 2 officers was outstanding for over 05 years. Further, the total amount of festival advance due from two Air Force officers was Rs. 12,500 and that had existed over a year. Although the provisions of Section 4.2 of Chapter XXIV of the Establishments Code and the provisions of Public Accounts Circular No. 262/2017 dated 29 December 2017 should be followed, the recovery of these loan balances remained inefficient.

iii. The total loan balance of Rs. 36,715 due from two deceased civil employees during the period between year and the 03years and the balance of Rs. 8,750 due from an Air Force officer as a Festival Advance had not been recovered as per the instructions given in the Public Accounts Circular No. 262/2017 and in accordance with the provisions of section 4.4 of Chapter XXIV of the Establishments Code.

4.6 Transactions in the form of financial irregularities

The General Deposit Account No. 6000-0-0-13-097 holds deposits for construction, and out of those deposits, deposits of Rs. 9.37 million had been paid to the non-statutory funds of the Sri Lanka Air Force on 16 occasions.

5 Human Resource Management

(a) The approved strength of commissioned officers in the Air Force at the end of the year under review was 2557, of which 494 vacancies existed. The approved strength of Non-Commissioned Officers (Other Ranks) was 34,381, of which there were 8,739 vacancies. Furthermore, the approved strength of Civil Staff (Senior/Tertiary/Secondary/Primary) was 3,385, of which there were 1,259 vacancies.

(b) During the year under review, a provision of Rs. 300 million had been allocated for the training of personnel for the Air Force, of which Rs. 75 million had been left at the end of the year. Although it was planned to conduct 182 local courses during the year according to the training plan, only 167 local courses were conducted. Although it was planned to conduct 151 foreign courses, 198 foreign courses were conducted, exceeding the training plan by 47 courses.

The Committee also ensures that the scope and coverage of its functions addresses the requirements laid down in above circular in respect of Government Department. SLAF Audit and Management Committee meeting has been carried out complied with Treasury circular.

(2) Principal Focus

The Audit Committee could focus personal attention to efficient operation of the committee and the risk areas of financial discipline reported by the Auditor General and the internal Auditors and immediate remedial action could be taken.

(3) Medium of Reporting

The proceedings of the Audit and Management Committee meetings are tabled at the meetings of the Board, where all key issues, concerns, actions taken, outcomes achieved or pending, and follow-up initiated, are clarified, discussed and Board approval obtained.

(4) Composition

(a) Meeting of the Audit and Management Committee of the Sri Lanka Air Force is held quarterly as per the laid down instructions given in the respective treasury circular. The composition of Audit and Management Committee is as follows.

(5) Secretary to the Audit Committee

The joint secretary (Joint Convener) to committee acts as Director Internal Auditor (Service) and Director Internal Auditor (Civil), who are Chartered Public Finance Accountant and Class I Government Accountant, functions as the joint secretary (Joint Convener) to the Committee.

(6) Internal Audit

Reviewed the independence, objectivity, and performance of the internal audit function as well as the adequacy of the Department's resources.

(a) Reviewed the Internal Audit Policy and circular which are issued by the Ministry of Finance and planning on Public Finance Management and the audits carried out based on the policy and circular instructions.

(b) Reviewed the effectiveness of the implementation of the Internal Audit Plan year 2024.

(c) Reviewed significant internal audit findings and management's responses thereto, with a view to taking timely corrective action.

(d) Evaluated the performance of the Director Internal Auditor (Service) and Director Internal Auditor (Civil) and reviewed the evaluation of the senior audit staff of the Internal Audit Division.

(e) Reviewed training and development needs and requirements for specialized training of the Internal Audit Division and the need for capacity building with special emphasis on investigation staff.

(7) External Audit

The external audit is carried out by the Auditor General in terms of the Constitution of the Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka. The Committee;

(a) Reviewed and followed up on audit issues identified by the Auditor General, pertaining to the audit for the year 2024.

(b) Reviewed the Report of the Auditor General to the Parliament of Sri Lanka on the accounts of the Sri Lanka Air Force for the year ended 31st December 2024, the Management Letter, and the management's responses there to and followed up on corrective measures taken by the Sri Lanka Air Force.

(c) Reviewed and discussed the key reports from the Auditor General's Department and action was initiated where deemed necessary.

(d) Audit Plan of 2024 submitted by Director Internal Audit (Service) and the Director Internal Audit (Civil) for the audit of the Financial Statements of Sri Lanka Air Force and its Sub imprest which were held at Bases and Stations level for the year ended from 31st December 2024.

(e) Timely submission of required information.

(f) Feedback from the management on the effectiveness of the audit processes relevant to their operational areas.

(8) Special Initiatives

Guided the office of the Director Internal Auditor (Service) and Director Internal Auditor (Civil) to train operational staff of the Sri Lanka Air Force on the importance of the Internal Controls to prevent and pre-empt frauds.

(9) Governance

The Committee, on an ongoing basis, reviewed the manner in which it implemented good governance practices with particular reference to the respective Government Circulars.

9. CONCLUSION

Overall, performance of the Sri Lanka Air Force during the year 2024 has demonstrated unwavering commitment, operational excellence and strategic foresight throughout the year.
