Message from the Director



It is a pleasure for me to present the Annual Report of the PGIM for the year 2019.

The PGIM remains the country's sole institute responsible for specialist training of medical and dental practitioners. Our 23 Boards of Study and 37 Specialty Boards conduct 135 programmes of study leading to MD and MSc degrees, PG Diplomas, PG Certificates, and Board Certification of specialists. Currently, there are 4144 Postgraduate trainees, including 970 new entrants, enrolled for these programmes. In 2019, we conducted 132 examinations, awarded 485 MD and 79 MSc degrees, 265 PG Diplomas, 67 PG Certificates, and Board Certified 211 specialists.

Prospectuses for three new training programmes (Master of Military Medicine, MD and Board certification in Laboratory Molecular Pathology, Post MD subspecialty training and Board Certification in Clinical Genetics) have been completed. Two PG Diploma programmes were upgraded to master's level. During 2019, 3 curricula and prospectuses of existing programmes were revised and 12 more are in the process of being revised.

Construction on our new academic building at Rodney Street was completed and became operational in August 2019. Furniture and office equipment for the building was purchased utilizing our generated funds.

I take this opportunity to thank members of the Board of Management, Boards of Study, Specialty Boards, Examination Boards, Trainers and Examiners for their contributions to the PGIM this year. I wish to especially commend our administrative and clerical staff for their commitment and diligence.

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HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

Medical education in Sri Lanka commenced in 1870 with the establishment of the Ceylon Medical College, which became the Faculty of Medicine in 1942 when the University of Ceylon was established. No postgraduate medical examinations were conducted by the University of Ceylon until 1952 when examinations for the degrees of MD and MOG commenced, followed by the degree of MS the next year.

At that time, there was no structured or organized postgraduate training. Postgraduate medical training was obtained in the United Kingdom and qualifications such as MRCP, FRCS, FFARCS, MRCOG, FRCR, MRCPPath, MRCPsych, FDSRCS etc awarded by the professional colleges in the UK were recognized for consultant appointments by the Ministry of Health and universities. In 1973, the Advisory Committee on Postgraduate Medical Education recommended to the Government that a supervised in-service training period of 3 years followed by an examination should replace training abroad. Accordingly, the Institute of Postgraduate Medicine (IPGM) was established in 1976 under provisions of the University of Ceylon Act No. 1 of 1972, and was attached to the University of Colombo. It was formally inaugurated on the 2nd of March 1976 by Dr. Halfdan Mahler, Director General of the WHO. Professor K.N. Seneviratne was appointed as its first Director.

However, the newly set-up IPGM was at a disadvantage as examinations of the UK professional Colleges continued to be conducted in Colombo, and local doctors preferred these to IPGM examinations. A review of the work of the institute became necessary. The government decided to stop the UK professional colleges from conducting foreign postgraduate medical examinations in Sri Lanka and to grant full recognition and preference to postgraduate medical degrees of the institute with effect from the 1st of January, 1980.

In order to achieve the objectives of the institute, it was re-established in 1979 under the provisions of the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978, and renamed the Postgraduate Institute of Medicine (PGIM). Dr. S.A. Cabraal was appointed as its first Director. Accordingly, PGIM Ordinance No: 1 of 1980 made under the provisions of the Universities Act referred to above came into force on the 10th of April, 1980. Boards of Study for various specialties were re-organized and courses of instruction and examinations were arranged for different specialties. They were Anaesthesiology, Community Medicine, Dental Surgery, Family Medicine and General Practice, Medicine, Obstetrics & Gynaecology, Ophthalmology, Pathology, Paediatrics, Psychiatry, Radiology and Surgery. In 1985, four more Boards of Study, Forensic Medicine, Microbiology, Otolaryngology, and Clinical Oncology were established. Professor R.G. Panabokke was appointed Director in 1990. Boards of Study in Medical Administration and Dermatology were established in 1994 and the Board of Study in Venereology in 2001. Dr. J.B. Peiris was appointed Director in 1995, followed by Professor Lalitha Mendis in 2002, Professor Rezvi Sheriff in 2006, Professor Jayantha Jayawardana in 2012 and Professor H. Janaka de Silva in 2014. The post of Deputy Director was established in 2011, and this post has been held by Professor Jayantha Jayawardana, followed by Professor Prashantha Wijesinghe, Professor Chrishantha Abeyseena and Professor Senaka Rajapakse. Amendments to the 1980 Ordinance took effect on the 1st of July 2014 and 23rd of February 2018. Several new Boards of Study and Specialty Boards were established under the amended Ordinance.

- Enhance training programmes to meet national health care needs.
- Contribute to formulate health and medical educational policies of the country.
- Extend and expand the activities of the institution in postgraduate medical education and research.
- Expand infrastructure facilities to ensure quality and accommodate the growing educational needs of the institute.

Objectives

- Produce human resources for health of high quality and sufficient quantity to meet the national demand.
- Maintain and improve skills and competencies of health personnel through continuing education.
- Innovate and design methodology that will facilitate in continuing education of medical personnel.
- Inculcate constructive attitudes and promote the habit of self-learning among the medical personnel.
- Promote the use of available resources and appropriate technology with regard to postgraduate education.
- Inculcate the concept of using a health care team approach in solving health problems.
- Evaluate medical education programmes in order to obtain information with regard to flaws and pointers for improvement.
- Arrange in-service programmes where preventive and curative care and nursing care are well integrated.
- Develop educational links with foreign institutions for mutual benefit in order to maintain high standards of postgraduate medical education in Sri Lanka. To be a financially and administratively independent institute, internationally recognized centre of excellence, producing specialists of high professional standards to meet the health needs of the country and contribute to regional and world health in a responsive manner.

14.1 Academic Activities

14.1.1. Registration

The PGIM conducted 135 postgraduate courses during the year 2019 leading to MD & Board Certification, Masters, Postgraduate Diploma and Certificates under the direct guidance of 23 Boards of Study, 33 Specialty Boards and 4 Interim Specialty Boards.

A total of 4144 Postgraduate trainees including 970 new entrants were enrolled to undergo training programmes leading to degrees of MD and Board Certification, Masters, Postgraduate Diploma and Certificates. Of them 3687 trainees were undergoing training programmes locally and while 457 were training in overseas recognized training centres.

14.1.2. Academic Emphasis

The academic emphasis in the year 2019 was also centered on introducing of new training programmes and the revision of curricula and prospectuses to enhance the quality of the exiting training programmes bench marking with the internationally accepted curricula and incorporating the latest techniques.

Series of workshops were held during this year too for trainers and examiners and relevant topics in order to equip them with new techniques, examination formats to enhance the quality, maintain the accepted standards of training programmes and examination from based on the recommendations of the reports of External Examiners of MD Examination from the Centres of Excellence in the United Kingdom, Australia, Singapore, India, USA, Pakistan and Turkey.

14.2. Evaluation and Examinations Activities

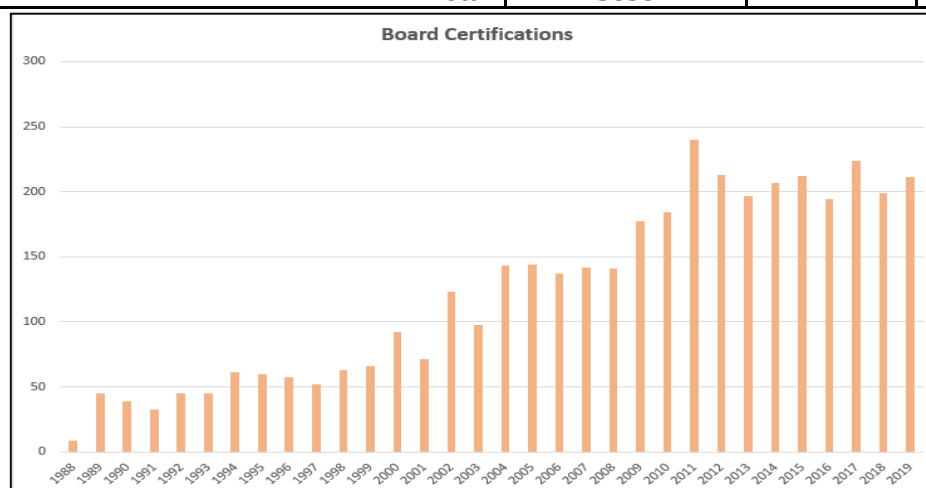

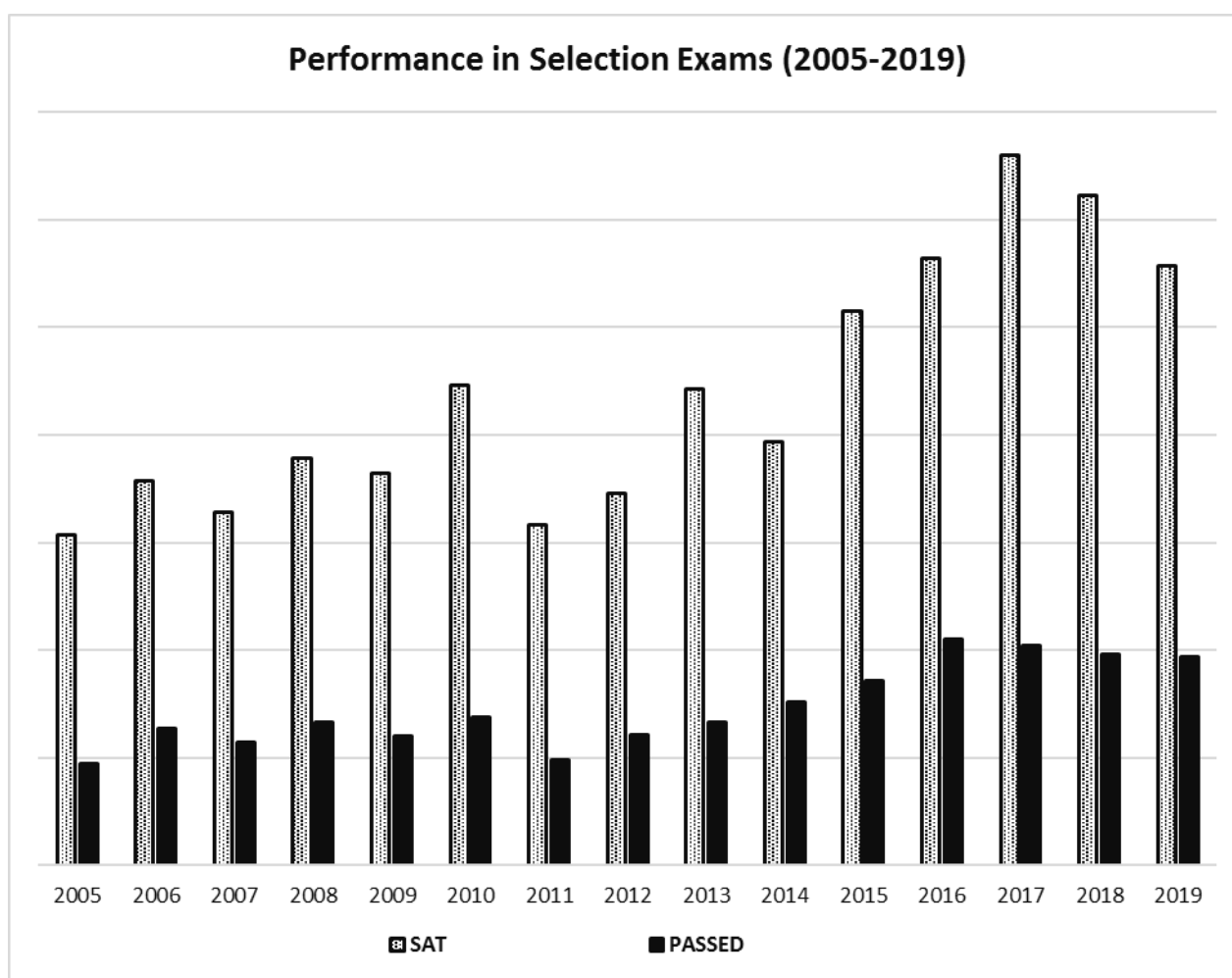

Construction of the building has been completed by the contractor, and handed over to the PGIM on 14th March 2019. This building was officially opened on 19th August 2019. Total contractual payment has been released, and yet to release the retention money.

14.5. Finance

Significant Accounting Policies for the Year Ended 31st December 2019

1. Basis of Accounting

The Financial Statements of the Postgraduate Institute of Medicine has been prepared on the historical basis of accounting, whereby the transactions are recorded at values prevailing at the dates when the assets were acquired, the liabilities were incurred and funds obtained; in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards laid down by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Sri Lanka and adopted by the UGC.

2. Conversion of Foreign Currencies

All foreign currency transactions are accounted for at the exchange rates prevailing at the date of the transactions; gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transaction and from the transaction of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognized in the income statement. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at exchange rates prevailing on the balance sheet date.

3. Revenue Recognition

I. Government Grants (Recurrent)

All Government Grants pertaining to recurrent expenditure is recognized at the time of actual funds received.

II. Government Grant (Capital)

Grant relating to purchase of property, plant and equipment are included in non-current liabilities as deferred income and are credited to the income statement on a straight line basis over the expected life of the related assets.

The Government Grant received for the continuation work of Rodney street is shown as unspent.

III. Course Fee

Course fees are recognized over the period of instruction. Where adequate information is not available to make such allocation to different financial periods, fees are recognized as income on a cash basis but the fees receivable for the year 2019 has been taken in to account.

IV. Investment Income

Investment income is recognized on accrual basis.

4. Inventories

I. Stationery

Stocks of stationery and other miscellaneous items are valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value. In general, cost is determined on a First in First out (FIFO) basis.

5. Assets and bases of their valuation

I. Property Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Property Plant and Equipment are recorded at cost of purchase together with any incidental expenses there on. The assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Assets received as grant have been valued at their fair value.

Impairment

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount, such reduction is recognized as an expense immediately.

Gain or loss on disposal

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with carrying amount. These are included in the income statement.

Depreciation

Assets, for which dates of purchase are known, depreciation is provided in proportion to the number of months completed or such assets were used from the date of purchase. Assets of which exact date of purchase is not known depreciation is provided for the whole year in which they were purchased. Depreciation will be provided on the year of the sale/disposal in proportion to the number of months the assets over the estimated useful life of assets.

Depreciation is charged on all property plant & equipment on the straight line basis to write off the cost over the estimated useful lives as follows.

Rates of Depreciation

• Buildings	-	5%	per annum
• Furniture & Office Equipment	-	10%	per annum
• Laboratory & Teaching Equipment	-	20%	per annum
• Library Books and Periodicals	-	20%	per annum
• Motor Vehicles	-	20%	per annum
• Cloaks	-	20%	per annum

II.Intangible Assets

An intangible asset is an identifiable non- monetary asset without physical substance. The assets shall be measured initially at cost. The cost of intangible asset comprises its purchase price, including import duties and non-refundable purchase taxes, after deducting trade discounts.

After initial recognition, an intangible asset shall be carried at its cost less any accumulated amortization and any accumulated impairment loss.

Impairment

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount, such reduction is recognized as an expense immediately.

Gain or loss on disposal

Gains or losses on disposal on intangible assets shall be determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset. These shall be recognized in profit or loss and included in the income statement.

Amortization

The depreciable amount of intangible asset with a finite useful life shall be allocated on the straight line basis to write off the cost over the estimated useful lives. Assets of which exact date of purchase is not known amortization is provided for the whole year in which they were purchased. Amortization will be provided on the year of the sale/disposal in proportion to the number of months the assets over the estimated useful life of assets.

Amortization is charged on intangible asset as follows.

- Software - 20% per annum

6. Receivables

Receivables are stated at the amounts that they are estimated to realize.

Interest Receivable

Interest receivable is at the balance sheet date calculated as per rates confirmed by the respective banks.

7. Cash & cash equivalents

Cash & cash equivalents comprise cash & bank balances and short term investments.

8. Cash flow statement

The cash flow statements have been prepared using the "Indirect Method" for the purpose Of the statement of cash flow. Cash & cash equivalents are comprised cash & bank balances, Short term deposits less bank overdraft.

9. Employee Benefits

Defined benefit plans

Provision is made in the accounts for retirement gratuities at rates applicable under the payment of Gratuity Act No. 12 of 1983. Although employees should complete a minimum period five years of continued employment to qualify for gratuity payments under the Act, provision is made from the commencement of employment on the assumption that all employees intend to continue in employment to at least five years.

Defined Contribution Plans -UPF & ETF

Employees are members of the University Provident Fund and Employees Trust Fund. Contribution to defined contribution plans, UPF, EPF & ETF are recognized as an expense in the income statement as incurred.

10. Comparative Information

Comparative information has been stated to comply with SLPSAS -1.

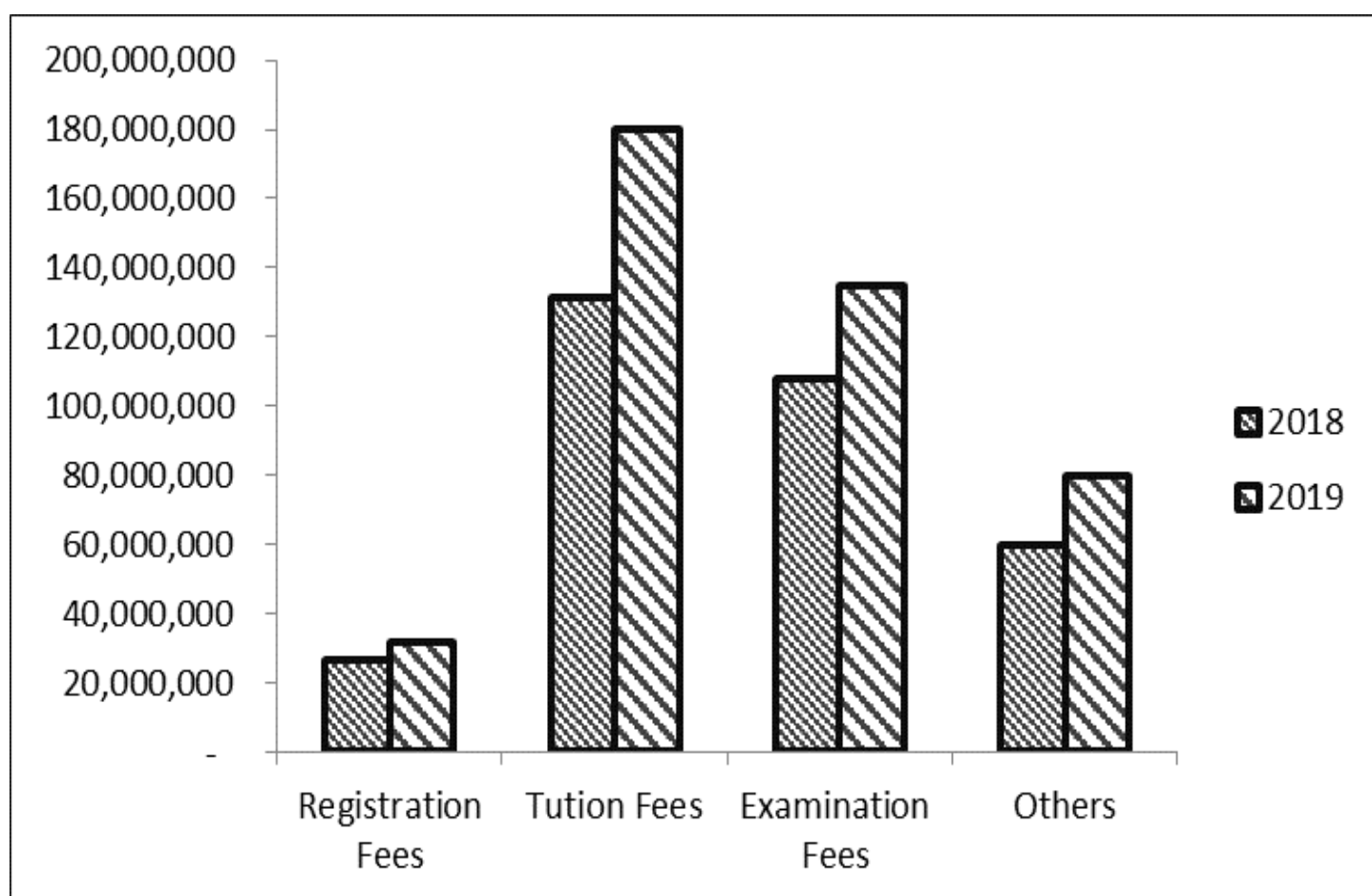

15. Report on Future expectations based on Sustainable Development

The Postgraduate Institute of Medicine endeavors at developing the Specialist Doctor's Service, in order to pave the way for Sri Lanka towards Sustainable Development through the generation of a society that is in good health.

Accordingly, our major objectives are set at improving the Specialist Doctor's Service in a qualitative manner and providing quality Specialist Doctor's services in a convenient and effective manner to every Citizen of the country (Rural and Urban both).

In this, the University Grants Commission, the Ministry of Higher Education, Technology and Innovation and the Ministry of Health work hand in hand with our Institution. There are two landmarks that our Institution regulates in order to reach Sustainable Development Goals.

One landmark is the increase of the number of Specialist Doctors through provision of a quality Medical Education. To achieve this landmark, the PGIM has created certain standards to ensure quality education. In this regard, the PGIM has established different committees to scrutinize postgraduate programmes and curricula to match national and global health demands.

The second landmark is to increase the health and life expectancy of the people of this country by prioritizing the improvement of the specialist Doctor's Service and accordingly introducing new Medical programs that are recognized as necessary, for example, Elderly Medicine programs, Human Nutrition programs, Child health programs. Additionally, the PGIM has revised curricula of different postgraduate programmes to include many health and life expectancy aspects.

The Country would easily reach its goal of Sustainable Development through the provision of facilities for every citizen of the country to obtain the services of specialized Doctors and the provision of a qualitative Post Graduate Medical Education to doctors with the aim of increasing the level of health of all the citizens and upgrading the health facilities of children as well as men and women of all ages in order to increase their healthy lifespan. Postgraduate medical education in which doctors develop competencies under supervision after completion of their basic medical qualification, and it is the final preparation step for certification and/or licensure of doctors.

The Postgraduate Institute of Medicine is the only institution currently responsible for conducting postgraduate Diploma, Masters and MD programs. The subject boards include relevant experts from all the universities. The MD program includes a minimum of one year of foreign training in a recognized centre in the UK, Australia, New Zealand, Singapore or India. The PGIM offers specialization in all major disciplines and most subspecialties. The Ministry of Health is responsible for providing cadre positions in all

specialties. The number of specialists in most disciplines is inadequate to fill even the existing vacancies. To fill all the vacancies, the PGIM offers courses to medical doctors and thereby produce specialist doctors in the country.

Necessary steps have been taken to collect data that required to fulfill the need for specialist Doctors of the country through the following methods.

1. Obtain details regarding the number of Doctors who serve as Specialist Doctors in Urban as well as Rural Hospitals.
2. Obtain information from the Medical faculties of all the State Universities.
3. Further, taking steps to identify particular diseases based on the gender and other health related requirements of the general public and train Specialist Doctors accordingly. For example: - Gynecology, Elderly Medicine.
4. Obtaining information through Military Hospitals and Police Hospitals.
5. Obtaining information via Private Hospitals.
6. Gathering information from Ministry of Health and Directors of Hospitals

Further this institution has been rendering an excellent service under the prime goals of Sustainable Development i.e. health and wellbeing.

To achieve the above, the infra structure of all hospitals including rural areas also to be equally enhanced, so that the specialist doctors could provide good services to all citizen of the country.

Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements and other legal and regulatory requirements of the Post Graduate Institute of Medicine affiliated to the University of Colombo for the year ended on 31st December 2019 in terms of Section 12 of the National Audit Act No 19 of 2018

1. Financial Statements

1.1 Qualified Audit Opinion

The Audit of Financial Statements of the Postgraduate Institute of Medicine affiliated to the University of Colombo for the year ended 31st December 2019 comprising the Statement of Financial Position and the Statement of Financial Performance, the Statement of Changes in Equity and the Cash Flow Statement for the year ended on that date and a summary of significant Accounting Policies and other explanatory information was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154(1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka and the provisions of Section 12 of the National Audit Act No 19 of 2018 read in conjunction with Section 108(1) of the Universities Act and Section 20 of the Post Graduate Institute of Medicine Ordinance No 01 of 1980 vested under Section 18 and Subsection 107(5) of Universities Act. This report will be tabled in the Parliament in due time as per Article 154 (6) of the Constitution.

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matters described in the section "Basis for the Qualified Audit Opinion" of this report, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the Financial Position of the Institution as at 31st December 2019 and its Financial Performance and the cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

1.2 Basis for the Qualified Audit Opinion

(a) Although the Assets have to be classified as current assets and Non current assets In preparing the financial statements as per Chapter No. 70 of Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting

Standards 01, the balances of deposits made for supply services, with a total value of Rs. 265,500, was classified as Current assets.

(b) The Non current assets of Rs. 259,173,247, which was a totally depreciated cost due to not annually summarizing the effective life of non current assets as per chapter 65 of Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards 07, were continued to be used further. Steps were not taken to revise the said estimated flow as per Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards 03.

(c) Although a trustworthy estimate was to be conducted using actuarial techniques, the Institute had allocated gratuities in a contradictory manner which was based on the salary of the employee at the time of leaving and the service period of the employee. Further, as the gratuities were not accurately calculated even according to the above practice followed by the Institute to calculate the gratuities, the balance of the gratuity allocation account was shown Rs. 15,555,439 less and the gratuities expenditure in Financial Performance Statement was shown Rs. 10,141,760 less.

1.3 Responsibility of the Management and Administrating Authorities for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these Financial Statements in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards and for such internal control as the management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatements, whether due to fraud or error.

It is the responsibility of the Management to decide upon the ability of the Institute to operate continuously, and the Management is also responsible for accounting on the basis of continuous operation of the Institution and to disclose matters that relate to the continuous operation of the Institute, in every instance other than when the Management decides to liquidate the Institution or to stop operating where no other option is available.

The responsibility over the financial reporting of the Institution is borne by the operating authorities.

The Institute has to properly maintain ledgers and reports on its own Income, Expenditure, Assets and liabilities in a manner that the annual and timely financial statements can be prepared in accordance with sub section 16 (1) of the National Audit Act No 19 of 2018.

1.4 Auditor's Responsibility over the audit of financial statements

My objective is to provide a fair confirmation that the financial statements are free from material misstatements arising due to, fraud and error and to issue the auditor's report that includes my opinion. Although reasonable assurance is of high value, it will not be an assurance that it will always disclose material misstatements when conducting an Audit as per the Sri Lanka Auditing Standards. Material misstatements may occur due to the individual and collective effects of fraud and error, and it is expected that it may affect the economic decisions taken by the users based on these financial statements.

The Audit conducted by me was done with a professional judgment and skepticism in accordance with the Sri Lanka auditing standards, and further

- My Opinion is based on obtaining sufficient and appropriate audit evidences to avoid the risks that may occur due to fraud or error by preparing suitable and well judged audit procedure in identifying and assessing the risks of material misstatements that may occur in the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error.
- Although an understanding of the internal control of the Institution was procured in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, I do not wish to make an opinion on the effectiveness of the Institute's internal control.
- The fairness of the accounting policies and the accounting estimates used and the appropriateness of related disclosures made by the management were evaluated.
- The relevance of using the basis of continuous operation of the Institute for accounting was decided based upon the audit evidence obtained regarding the existence of a quantitative indecision regarding the continuous operation of the Institution, by dint of instances or circumstances. If I deduce that there is adequate indecision, the attention of my audit report is to be directed at the related disclosures in the financial statements and if the said disclosures are insufficient my Opinion has to be modified. However, continuous operation might end upon future incidents or situations.
- The presentation, structure and the content of the financial statements that include the disclosures was evaluated and it was agreed that the transactions and instances that provided a base for that were entered in a suitable and a fair manner in the financial statements.

The administrating authorities were notified regarding the important audit findings, major internal control weaknesses and other such information identified during my Audit.

2. **Report on other legal and regulatory requirements**

The National Audit Act No 19 of 2018 includes special provisions with regards to the requirements mentioned below

- As per the requirement mentioned in Section 12 (a) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, except for the effects of the matters described in the section "Basis for the Qualified Audit Opinion" of this report, I have obtained all the information and explanations required for the audit, and the Institute had kept proper financial reports as evidenced by my review.
- As per the requirement mentioned in Section 6 (1) (d) (III) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 the financial statements of the Institute are consistent with the preceding year.
- As per the requirement mentioned in Section 6 (1) (d) (IV) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018 the financial statements produced include the recommendations made by me in the previous year.

Upon the procedure followed and evidences obtained and upon limitation to quantitative facts, nothing worthy of making the following statements came under my view.

- As per the requirement mentioned in Section 12 (d) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, that any member of the Institution has any direct or indirect connection that is

outside of a general business condition regarding any contract entered in to by the Institution.

- As per the requirement mentioned in Section 12 (f) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, that the Institute has acted in non compliance with any relevant written law or to any other general or special provisions issued by the administrative board of the Institute, apart from the following observations.

• As per the requirement mentioned in Section 12 (e) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, that the Institute has acted in non compliance with its Powers, Functions and activities. • As per the requirement mentioned in Section 12 (f) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, that the Institute's resources have not been procured and utilized in a thrifty, efficient and effective manner or within the time limits and in accordance with the relevant rules and regulations.	

3. Other Audit Observations

- (a) Although a period of 11 months to 05 years was spent after purchasing stock items with a value of Rs. 582,894 by 14th February 2020, it was observed that these items were not used and were held in reserve as unnecessary stock purchases.
- (b) Although necessary advances are to be provided based on a properly predicted budget estimate, advances amounting to a total sum of Rs. 931,700 provided on 41 occasions had been settled hundred percent within a period of 05 to 157 days. Further, from advances that were provided on 102 occasions amounting to a total sum of Rs. 3,185,755, only a total sum of Rs. 1,223,370 was spent.
- (c) According to the Board of Survey report of year 2018 an excess of 27 units pertaining to 09 items and a deficit of 36 units pertaining to 27 items was observed, but no action was taken regarding these excesses and deficits until the 15th June 2020 which was the Audit date.
- (d) The course income of Rs.915,750 to be received from the Health Ministry and which has been carried on from year 2009 and the receivable Buildings' rent for years 2015 and 2016 which is a sum of Rs. 1,681,685 was not recovered until the end of the year under review.
- (e) It was observed that there were 35 vacant positions in the Institution as at 31st December 2019, and two Officers were employed under the Academic Staff on Contract Basis.
- (f) Actions were not taken to purchase 08 items of a total value of Rs. 6,483,000, predicted in accordance with the Procurement plan, until the 12th February 2020.
- (g) A variance of Rs. 616 million was observed between the allocated funds of the Annual Budget Document and the Procurement Budget Document in purchasing fixed assets and in contractual functions, as there was no connection between the Procurement Budget and Annual Budget document.

Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements and other legal and regulatory requirements of the Post Graduate Institute Of Medicine affiliated to the University of Colombo for the year ended on 31st December 2019 in terms of Section 12 of the National Audit Act No 19 of 2018.

1.1 Basis for the Qualified Audit Opinion

- (a) Supply services continue to be obtained for the establishments cited in Audit Query HED/B/PGIM/2019/FA/01 and these supply service deposits are being classified and corrected as non current assets from year 2020.
- (b) It was noted to annually review the residual value and the effective lifespan of the assets cited in Audit Query HED/B/PGIM/2019/FA/01 and to take necessary measures for Accounting the same in this year (2020).
- (c) As allocation of provisions were accurately calculated as per Circular No 05/2019 issued by the University Grants Commission, measures have been taken to correct these adjustments through Journal. (Annex No. 01-J/N 0001B).

2. Report on other legal and regulatory requirements

- (a) Certain Examination related activities of the Post Graduate Institute of Medicine have to be conducted outside of the main Institution and in Medical Faculties such as Ragama, Karapitiya and Peradeniya and in relevant Teaching Hospitals. On such Occasions it is difficult to settle the advances obtained within a short time period, however measures have been taken to reduce this time period.
- (b) Although the Board of Survey Reports relating to Year 2019 have been finalized by now they were not completed, due to the Offices being closed for about a period of three months from 13th March 2020 and the difficulty in calling all the employees of the Institution to work in accordance with the rules and regulations pertaining to Covid 19 imposed by the Government, the issue has been forwarded to the Finance Committee.

(c) MSc. Medical Toxicology

Foreign Medical Officers participate in correcting the answer sheets of the above examination and the issuance of results were delayed due to their delay in forwarding the relevant marks despite several notifications.

MSc Bio Medical Informatics

The issuance of results of the above Study Program has been delayed due to several reasons.

1. The University Non Academic Strike that took place from 28th February to 17th April 2019, was one cause for this delay.
2. Practical results as well as the Examination results are taken in to consideration In issuing results of the above Study Program. This study program is newly introduced to Sri Lanka and the number of Specialists in this field is very limited. Further, the evaluation of assignments has been delayed for a certain time period. The Results Board could be conducted only after all the evaluation marks of the assignments have been received. The delay in issuing results has occurred as a result of this condition.

3. Other Audit Observances

- (a) The Toners of a value of Rs.68, 400 relating to the annex No 02 of audit Query HED/B/PGIM/2019/AQ/05, has been a remained in stock due to the respective printers being out of function. The rest of the stock is for the machines that are currently in use and would be used in the future.
- (b) All the advances relating to Annex No 3 of Audit Query HED/B/PGIM/2019/AQ/05 have been provided for the meetings conducted by the Academic and Examination Sections. Although steps are taken to pay advances for the number of participants that are expected to attend the meeting, this condition as to be faced in situations like this, where the number of participants actually participated in the meeting is less than the number of estimated participants. Further, the Staff was instructed upon paying more attention in preparing estimates in order to reduce this obtaining of extra funds as advances. Steps were also taken to issue internal instructions on settling advances without a delay.
- (c) Certain items cited under excesses and deficits relating to the Board of Survey Report of Year 2018, have not been at the exact location and were carried to other locations for particular requirements. Certain items were broken and damaged.
- (d) Although several reminders were forwarded to the ministry of Health regarding the recovery of these amounts, no favorable reply has been received so far and measures have been taken to obtain advice regarding making a future decision on this from the Board of Management of the Institution after notifying them.
- (e) It was impossible to fill the relevant vacancies during year 2019 due to the Circulars and Directions issued from time to time by the Ministry of Higher Education and the University Grants Commission, and necessary steps were also not taken to fill certain vacancies that existed. Some procedures have been halted according to Directions received.

The Temporary Research Assistant Post is the only Post in the Academic staff that could be filled on a contract basis in accordance with the approved cadre category. Permanent recruitments cannot be made for that Post.

- (f) From among the Items mentioned in Audit Query HED/B/PGIM/2019/AQ/01, 04 Printers have been purchased by 30/07/2020 and the procurement procedures required to purchase the Audio Visual Equipments have already been initiated. Measures to be taken regarding the purchase of the rest of the Items are to be initiated during this year.
- (g)
 - i. The Treasury not allocating funds for the funds estimated for purchase of fixed assets in the Budget and acting on behalf of only the allocated funds has caused this difference.
 - ii. An amount of Rs. 390,000,000 has been estimated for the new Building in Rodney Street and the remaining estimates have been prepared for the other procurements.
