Highlights - 2017

- The Times Higher Education World University Rankings 2016-2017 placed the University of Colombo within the top 980 universities in the world. It is the only global university performance table to judge the world class universities across all of their core missions – teaching, research, knowledge transfer and international outlook.
- Professor. Steve Chapman, the Vice Chancellor and President of Edith Cowan University, Australia and Associate Professor. Helen Bonavita, Dean International and Edith Cowan University, Australia visited the University of Colombo on 24 January 2017.
- The ceremony “Long Service Awards – 2016” was held on 17th January 2017 at the Faculty of Graduate Studies Auditorium at the university of Colombo.
- His Excellency Mr. Bryce Hutchesson, the High Commissioner of Australia for Sri Lanka visited Professor. Lakshman Dissanayake, Vice Chancellor of University of Colombo on 04 January 2017.
- Ambassador of the People’s Republic of China H.E. Yi Xianliang, delivered the 13th Annual Sujata Jayawardena Memorial Oration on Wednesday, 15 February 2017 at the BMICH on the topic “*One Belt, One Road – Sri Lanka – China Relations.*”
- His Excellency Mr. Riaz Hamidullah, the High Commissioner of People’s Republic of Bangladesh met Professor. Lakshman Dissanayake, the Vice-Chancellor of University of Colombo on the 8 February 2017 at the College House. During the meeting, The both parties explored the mutually beneficial areas to initiate collaborative projects between the two countries.
- The inauguration ceremony of the Legal Research Unit of the Faculty of Law, University of Colombo was held on 2 February 2017 at the Ceylon Room. The Legal Research Unit of the University of Colombo is a collaborative Centre for legal research in Sri Lanka in partnership with the Ministry of Justice.
- Mr. Naveen Wickremeratne, an undergraduate of the Department of Economics, Faculty of Arts of University of Colombo won the best research paper award at the 13th SAESM. It was a very special event for Sri Lanka, and it stands amongst the best SAESMs for the country, thus far for the very reason of a Sri Lankan winning the Best Research Paper Award for the first time in the history of SAESM.
- Professor. Afonso, the Dean of International Research Deakin University, Australia visited Professor. Lakshman Dissanayake, the Vice Chancellor of University of Colombo on 31 January 2017. During the meeting Professor. Afonso explained about the joint research project undertaken by the academics of both universities.

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1. OVERVIEW

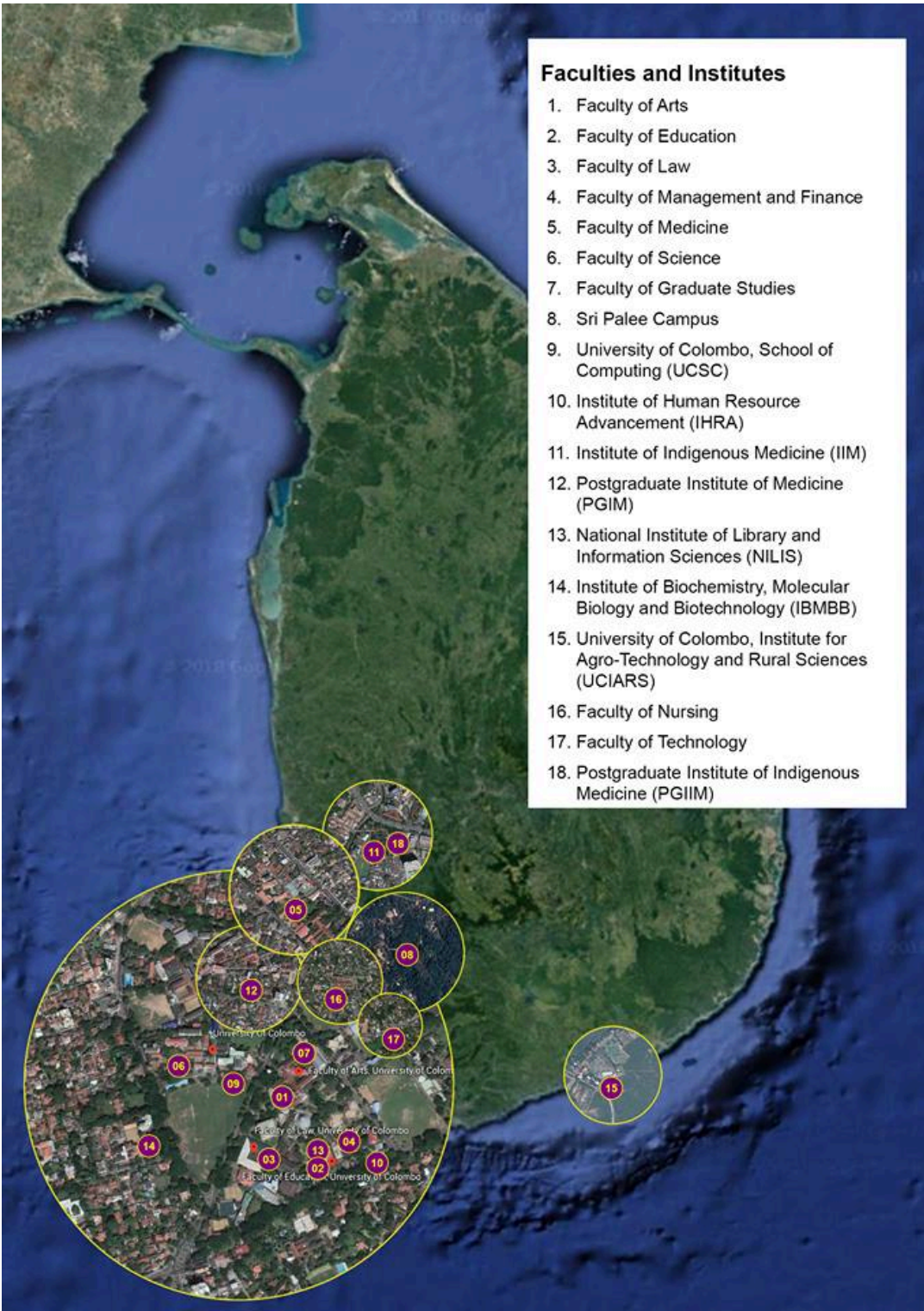

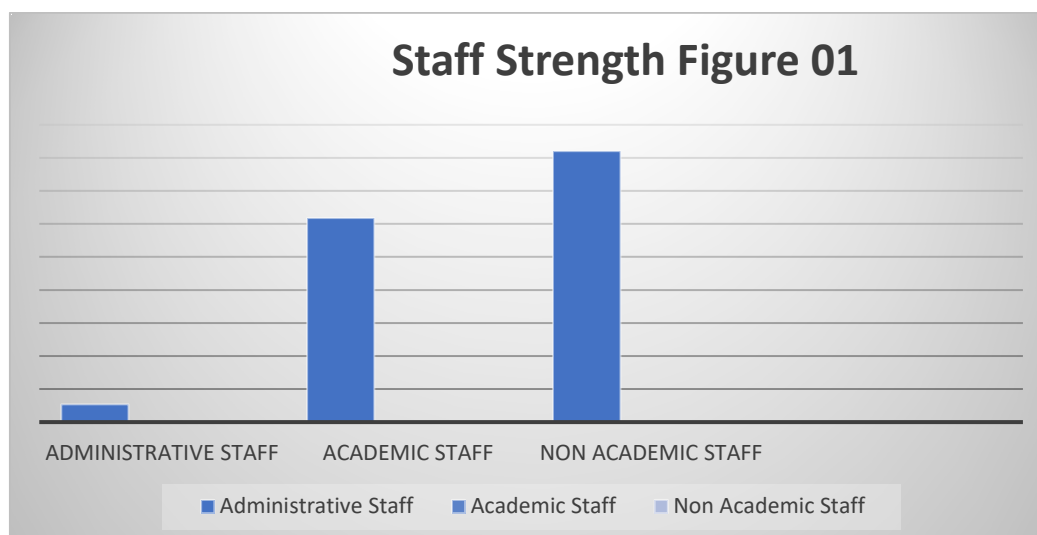

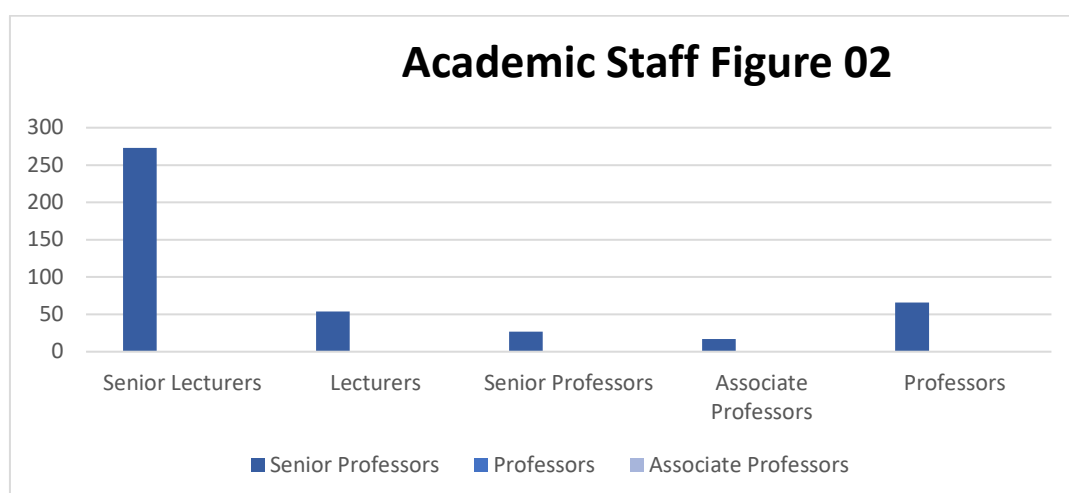
1.5 OVERALL PERFORMANCE

In 2017 the University continued to deliver its academic activities through Nine faculties and 56 departments of study.

The University of Colombo marched towards its goals with the assistance of 1492 staff members comprising 41.4% academic, 4% administrative and 55% as non-academic staff. (Figure 01)



The proportional distribution of the academic staff among Senior Professors, Professors, Associate Professors, Senior Lecturers and Lecturers were 6%, 15%, 4%, 63% and 12% respectively. (Figure-02)



Academic Performance

The University of Colombo with a proud history of over 143 years continues in its endeavour to meet the challenges of maintaining its position as a “Metropolitan University, Modern and International in Outlook and Character” The location of the University affords the student population all the advantages of a “Metropolitan University”, with easy access to international information/resource centres, libraries, theatres, sports complexes etc. Its central location within the City of Colombo provides easy access to a wide range of cultural, entertainment and business facilities. Backed by its long and proud history, together with a solid academic and administrative infrastructure which has stood the test of time, the University has progressed towards its goals in accordance with the Performance Improvement Strategic Plan (PISP) by embracing modern and innovative approaches to teaching, research and service to the community. The University of Colombo has a multi-cultural, multi-ethnic, multi- religious student and staff population fostering social harmony, cultural diversity, equal opportunity and unity. The faculties, campus, institutes and school of the university functioned very smoothly in a conducive environment for teaching, learning and research without any interruption during the year under review.

2. FACULTIES, CAMPUS, CENTERS AND UNITS

2.1 FACULTY OF ARTS

Introduction

The Faculty of Arts is the largest Faculty in terms of student population. The Faculty has eleven academic Departments for the following disciplines. Buddhist Studies, Demography, Economics, English, English Language Teaching, Geography, History, International Relations, Political Science & Public Policy, Sinhala and Sociology. In addition, the Faculty has five Teaching Units such as Arabic & Islamic Civilization Unit, Computer Unit (comprising of the Student Computer Unit and the Computer Teaching Unit), Journalism Unit and Mathematics Unit. The English Language Teaching Unit was upgraded to a Department with effect from June 2017. The above Departments and Units offer courses in the Humanities and Social Sciences. Apart from the undergraduate BA programme of Study, many Departments offer postgraduate and extension programmes. The postgraduate degree programmes vary from Postgraduate Diploma to PhD. Many students successfully completing the BA degree programmes, eventually register for postgraduate degree programs offered by the Departments of the Faculty.

During the year 2017, Prof Athula Ranasinghe functioned as Dean/ Faculty of Arts. Mr Saman Uyangoda, as Deputy Registrar, Faculty of Arts. During the year the following teachers functioned as Heads of Departments. Prof. Ven. M. Dhammajothi Thero (Buddhist Studies), Dr. Sunethra Perera (Demography); Prof. Rev. W. Wimalarathana Thero (Economics); Prof. Neloufer De Mel (English); Ms. Savithri Dias (English Language Teaching), Prof. Lasantha Manawdu (Geography), Dr. Nirmalie Wijegunawardane (History); Dr. Maneesha Wanasinghe Pasqual (International Relations); Mr. Mahesh Senanayake (Political Science & Public Policy); Dr. Latha Gurusinghe (Sinhala); and Dr. Chandani Liyanage till 15.05.2017 and Prof Premakumara De Silva from 16.05.2017 (Sociology).

The following teachers functioned as Co-ordinators of Units; Dr. N. Gafoordeen (Arabic & Islamic Civilization Unit); Prof. Samantha Herath (Journalism Unit); Prof. L. Manawadu (Computer Unit); Dr. D.D.P.M. Dunusinghe (Mathematics Unit).

Mission of the Faculty

The Mission of the Faculty is “to promote collectively scholarships, critical inquiry, competencies and skills in the Social Sciences and Humanities in keeping with the highest academic and ethical standards in teaching, research, training and evaluation. To provide students with not only specific skills and competencies but also a broad social and humanistic orientation, so that they could fit into the changing world of work with a sense of social responsibility and moral commitment.”

Major Events of the Faculty of Arts -2017

The third International Conference of the Faculty of Arts was held under the theme of “The Role of Humanities and Social Sciences in Research for Development” on 21 - 22 November 2017. The conference was opened for academics, postgraduate students from the Faculty of Arts, University of Colombo as well as the contributors from outside the University of Colombo. including internal participants and sixty-four papers were presented in the conference.

Prof. Amrit Sen, Department of English, Vishva – Bharathi, Santiniketan, India delivered the keynote address on the topic “Whither Research for Development”.

The Department of Demography held its third Annual Research Symposium on 15 December 2017 at the Faculty and 14 Extended Research papers were presented. The theme of the symposium was “Population and sustainable development” Ms Ritsu Nacken, UNFPA representative was the Chief Guest of the event. Prof. Lakshman Dissanayake, the Vice Chancellor of the University of Colombo and Senior Professor of Demography delivered the Professor G.W. Roberts Memorial Oration.

13th South Asian Economics Students Meet (SAESM) which was held in Kathmandu, Nepal from 29 January – 03 February brought a great glory to Sri Lanka and to the University of Colombo. Mr. Naveen Wickramaratne, an undergraduate attached to the Department of Economics won the best research paper award. The best research paper amongst the South Asian undergraduates was chosen out of more than 40 research papers presented by the undergraduates representing seven south Asian Countries. The third consecutive Tourism Leader's Summit and International Research Symposium organized by the Department of Economics was held on 3 and 4 October 2017 at the BMICH under the theme of "Sustainable Tourism for Development: way forward for Sri Lanka." The 22nd Meeting of Sri Lanka Forum of University of Economists organized by the Department of Economics was held on 07 June 2017 at the University of Colombo. Many distinguished economists representing 15 Universities in Sri Lanka attended for the forum.

The international student and staff academic exchange program between the Department of English and the Institute für Anglistik, Justus Liebig University (JLU), Germany, which was instituted in 2009, was successfully continued in 2017. Three students from the Department were selected to visit Germany in the first semester of 2017, and three German students from JLU registered for the second semester at the Department of English. Further, the Department signed a memorandum of Understanding with Technical University, Dresden, Germany which would enable teaching and research collaborations between the Department of English and Technical University, Dresden.

The second International Research Symposium of the Department of English Language Teaching was held on 28-29 September at the University of Colombo under the theme of "English as a Second Language: Knowledge, Learning and Production." It included 33 paper presentations, 05 workshops and 06 poster presentations.

The Department of Geography organized its first Undergraduate Research Symposium based on the dissertations of the final year undergraduates who were following the Special Degree in Geography on 19 July 2017. It included the following themes: Socio-economic dynamics and Developments, Exploring the drivers of Physical Environmental Changes, Human Behaviour: Domains and Impacts. Department also commemorated the World Environment Day on 14 June 2017 under the theme, "Connecting People to Nature" with a series of activities. The department also organized a cleaning campaign at "Sripada" on 07 and 08 January 2017 starting from Ratnapura Entrance. The main purpose of this project was to make our environment clean, pleasant and healthy for all living beings.

The Department of International Relations had been instrumental in getting International collaborations. There were two new memorandum of understanding; one is with University of Uppsala, Sweden which came in to place in 2017 and another with University of Massachusetts, Boston, USA, which is to be finalized in 2018.

The 7th Annual Research Symposium of the Department of Sinhala was held on 16 October 2017 from 8.00 am to 4.30 pm at M. B. Ariyapala Auditorium in the Department of Sinhala. The keynote address was delivered by Mr. Saminadan Wimal, Senior Lecturer, Department of English and Linguistics, University of Jaffna. The main theme of this symposium was "Inter – Disciplinary Nature of Sinhala Studies." Twenty-five Research papers were presented in the symposium.

The Dean's Award, Literary Competition was held on 13 December 2017 at the New Arts Theatre (NAT). The competition was held by covering various fields such as fictions, short stories, lyrics, poetry, literature criticism, Announcing, Photo Essay and short drama scripts. The certificates and awards were presented to the successful students after evaluating their performances in the above areas.

The Confucius Institute, Faculty of Arts in collaboration with the Gannam Normal University, China organized a Cultural event on 12 October. The event included Chinese Music & Dance. It was sponsored by the Confucius Institute Headquarters, China under the patronage of the Chinese Embassy.

Faculty Appointments

Dr. Iresha M Lakshman attached to the Department of Sociology functioned as the Director of Studies of the Faculty of Arts until 26/07/2017 and Dr. Ajith Balasooriya from the Department of International Relations was appointed as the the new Director of Studies. Prof. Chandrasiri Niriella of the Department of Sociology continued to function as the Co-ordinator, Information and Documentation Center.

Undergraduate Programs

In 2017, the total number of undergraduate population in the Faculty of Arts was around 2390. The academic activities for the new batch (2015- A/L) commenced on 13th February 2017 enrolling about 737 students. The course unit system is continued by offering a range of course units (500) to students including internship component for credit.

The Faculty of Arts continued to offer the study streams for those who opt for three-year degree at the Faculty from May 2015. The study stream was streamlined to the target selection of the study scheme specific course units offered by the departments / units in the Faculty. The concept aims to strengthen the connection between Departments and General Degree students to enhance a mutual sense of ownership.

Extension Courses and Community Service Delivery Programmes -2017

As in the previous years, a number of Extension Courses were offered by the Faculty of Arts during 2017, providing professional enhancement skills to the community at large and enabling the Faculty to remain the largest contributor to the University Development Fund.

The Department of Buddhist Studies launched a Chinese Language Certificate Course for Buddhist monk under the patronage of the Confucius Institute in 2017.

The Department of Economics offered three diploma courses: namely, A Diploma in Tourism and Travel Economics and Hotel Management, Executive Diploma in Business and Financial Economics and a Diploma in Micro Finance.

The Department of English offered Extension Courses in English for the general public, and undertook consultancies to various government and private institutions. It offered Diploma courses in Advanced English for Administrative and Academic Purposes, and English for Teachers of English (DETE) and a Diploma in English for English Medium Instruction Teachers (DEEMIT).

The Department of Geography launched two new Certificate Courses in 2017: An Advanced Certificate Course for A/L Geography Teachers and a Certificate Course in Computer Applications. With the continuation of Short Course in Geographical Information Systems (GIS).

The Department of International Relations offered an extension course titled Certificate Course in International Relations (CCIR) for the year 2017.

The Department of Sinhala also continued its Diploma Programme "Diploma in Sinhala" in 2017. It also introduced a Certificate Courses in Spoken Tamil and Written Tamil (04 months programme).

English Language Teaching Unit (ELTU)

The ELTU offered Certificate Courses in Business English and e-Diploma in Business English in M-learning platform.

The Journalism Unit conducted its Diploma in Journalism programme for the year 2017.

2.5. FACULTY OF MANAGEMENT & FINANCE

Vision

Inspired by historic links to the first University College of the country and inherited intellectual traditions, the University of Colombo strives to be a world class institution promoting human development through synergizing knowledge, education, research, and creativity, and entrepreneurship, whilst upholding democratic values in a plural society.

Mission

To be the most prominent and leading faculty in Sri Lanka for high quality academic and executive programs, research and consultancy in management and business studies within a creative and collaborative environment towards developing managerial competencies for betterment of the society.

Introduction

Established in May 1994, the Faculty of Management & Finance remains as a fast-growing faculty in the University of Colombo. The historical development of this faculty dates back to early 1980s' when the Department of Commerce and Management Studies of the University of Colombo was set up. As a department which operated under the Faculty of Arts, the Department of Commerce and Management Studies grew rapidly in 1980s and thereby became the department which accommodated the highest number of undergraduates in the Faculty of Arts. The long-lived dream of all interested parties for establishing a separate faculty for Commerce and Management education was materialized in May 1994 with the inauguration of the Faculty of Management & Finance. During the last two decades the undergraduate as well as the postgraduate student population of the Faculty has grown rapidly.

Leading through high quality research, learning, training, and consultancy in the field of management, business, and entrepreneurship within a creative and collaborative environment towards developing managerial competencies for betterment of the society is the Mission of the Faculty.

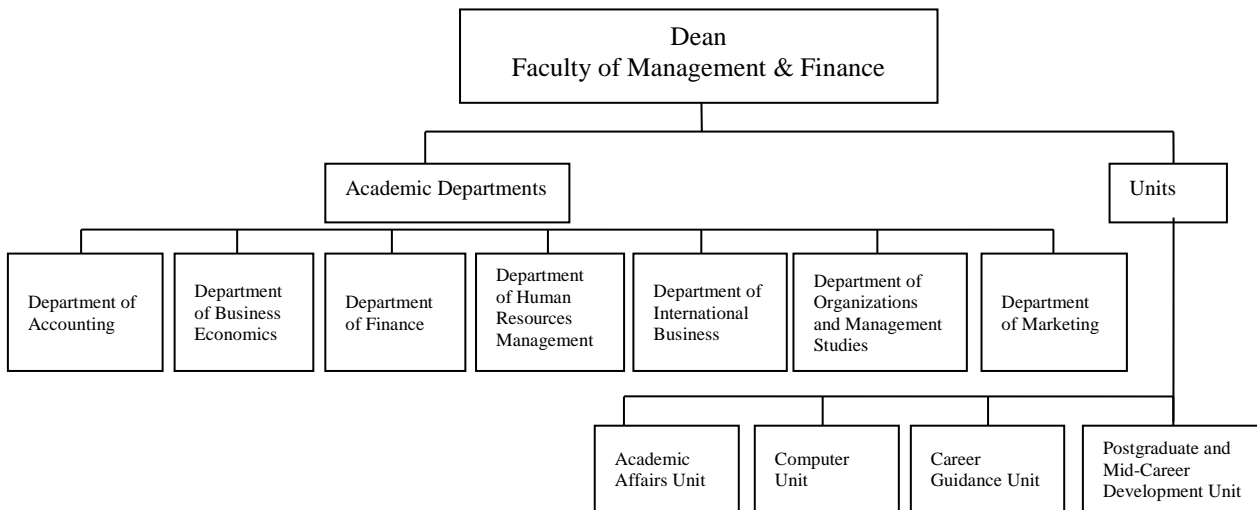
The Faculty of Management & Finance is committed to pursuing excellence in research, teaching, community services and university-industry cooperation and collaboration, whilst making all efforts to be the centre of excellence for management and finance education in Sri Lanka. In line with this objective the faculty re-structured its academic programmes which would make accessible to students in different field of studies such as Accounting, Business economics, Finance, Human resources management, Management and organizational studies, International business, Marketing, and Hospitality and leisure management. This re-structuring was planned with a philosophy of emphasizing disciplinary rigor, business practicality, and skill development.

The faculty is active not only in undergraduate studies, but also in graduate and executive education aiming at enhancing mid-career development opportunities for managers and developing capacities of academic and researchers in the field of management and finance. The faculty offers, postgraduate programmes in MBA with different areas of specializations namely MBA in accounting & information management, MBA in finance, MBA in human resources management, MBA in marketing, MBA in international business. Also, M. Phil / PhD, Executive MBA, and Postgraduate diploma in banking & finance, Executive diploma in business administration (EDBA), Diploma in small business management, Diploma in human resources management and Diploma in printing technology & management (PPTM) programs are offered by the faculty. In addition, a couple of undergraduate as well as postgraduate programmes are now in process. In 2017, the total number of students registered for the undergraduate and postgraduate programmes in the faculty exceeded to 2045 and 408 respectively. The year 2017 was a remarkable year for the history of the faculty because it was able to increase its undergraduate population by 100 students.

Currently, the faculty has seven academic departments providing academic leadership in different disciplines. The Academic Affairs Unit (AAU) at the faculty coordinates students' affairs especially in level I courses of the BBA programs. The faculty operates a Career Guidance Unit (CGU) to help students to find internship opportunities in the industry and also to provide career advice to undergraduates. The Postgraduate and Mid-Career Development Unit (PGMCDU) in the faculty coordinates all the postgraduate and extension programmes.

The programmes offered by the faculty and its curriculums are regularly updated to suit the industry requirements and incorporate the contemporary developments in the discipline. The programmes of the faculty are mutually beneficial and collaboratively linked with the industry. The increasing demand for programmes could be witnessed by increasing Z score which required to secure a placement in the faculty.

The organizational structure of the faculty is shown in the following diagram.



The faculty developed its strategic plan in 2015 for the next five years specially to achieve the following:

- encourage high quality disciplined-based research and scholarly publications to be on par with global standards
- promote research collaborations and partnerships within and outside the country for maximizing common aspirations and priorities.

The Teaching Faculty

The greatest strength of the Faculty of Management & Finance of the University of Colombo is its teaching faculty with well qualified and experienced academics. The faculty members obtained their academic and professional qualifications from well reputed universities and institutes all over the world and thus have brought diverse experiences, exposures, tradition and perspectives, which are definite requirements for training the academics and professional managers who very often need to cross the boundaries of cultures, disciplines and experiences in the continuous flux of their organizational lives. Currently, the academic staff consists of 03 Professors, 02 Associate Professors, 43 Senior Lecturers, 07 Lecturers and 19 Probationary Lecturers, totalling seventy-four (74) members.

The Career Guidance Unit (CGU)

The establishment of a Career Guidance Unit (CGU) within the faculty results from the clear necessity of proactively coaching for our undergraduates to become competitive in the labour market by bridging the gap between the labour market requirements and the competencies of undergraduates/immediate graduates.

The CGU aims at formalizing and administering the Industrial Training Program (ITP) of the faculty which is part of the curriculum in Level II Semester VIII. The role of the CGU is vital for finding internship placements annually to the entire batch, coordinating the ITP including its evaluation procedure and acting as a liaison between the undergraduates and the industry. The CGU does not look upon finding internships for the undergraduates as the boundary of its responsibility but continues its endeavors to ensure that all the immediate graduates to secure permanent employment in well-established organizations.

In addition, the CGU passionately looks forward to forming and sustaining mutually beneficial in collaborations with the private, public, and non-governmental (NGO) sectors. Such collaboration would be formed through a number of interactions including, but not limited to, conducting assessment centers, organizing an annual career fair, bringing the corporate sector experts to have dialogues with undergraduates

and the academic staff on producing employable graduates, and promoting joint research with corporate sector organizations on career guidance and career counseling.

The Postgraduate and Mid-Career Unit (PGMCDU)

The main objective of establishing the Postgraduate & Mid-career Development Unit (PGMCDU) is to develop, organize and ensure the smooth functioning of postgraduate and mid-career development programs in the faculty. At present, the PGMCDU conducts several MBA programmes including MBA in accounting, MBA in finance, MBA in Human resources management, MBA in marketing, MBA in international business and MBA general. It also conducts Executive MBA, and Executive Diploma in Business Administration (EDBA). In addition to regular Masters and Diploma programs, tailor made training programs on management are also organized by the unit on the request of organizations.

This unit has a unit coordinator, program coordinators and supporting staff. The unit coordinator provides the academic and administrative leadership to the overall activities of the unit, moreover every programme coordinator provides being academic leadership responsible for the smooth functioning of the activities of the program under his or her purview.

Staff Information (Administration)

Dr. R Senathiraja continued as Dean till 30.11.2017 and Dr. M.P.P Dharmadasa was elected Dean of the Faculty w.e.f. 1.12.2017. Ms. S.S Samarathunga, the Senior Assistant Registrar, and Mr.A.R.W.M.U.N Seneviratne, the Senior Assistant Bursar continued their positions this year too. Dr. B. Nishantha, Dr. K. Kajendra, and Mr. Ramesh Rajasuriya continue their positions as Head of Departments of Management and Organizations Studies, Marketing, and Business Economics respectively.

Dr. A.A Azeez continued as Head of Department of Finance until 13.09.2017 and from 14.09.2017. Dr. S. Buwendra was appointed Head of Finance. Dr. N.N.J Navaratne continued as the Head of Human Resources Management until 16.08.2017 and from 17.08.2017 Dr.(Mrs.) P. Kailasapthy was appointed Head of Human Resources Management. Dr. A.A.C Abeysinghe continued as Head of Department of Accounting until 15.01.2017 and from 16.01.2017 Dr. TN. Gunaratne was appointed Head of Accounting.

Staff Information (Promotion)

Five members of the academic staff applied for promotion to the position of Professor/Associate professorship during the year and 02 members were promoted to Senior Lecturer Grade-I. In addition, 01 member of the academic staff was promoted to the Senior Lecturer Grade - II.

Conference and Research

The International Research Conference, an annual event of the faculty was held in November 2017 in Colombo. It was an ideal platform to present and publish research papers of local and foreign academics and scholars. In addition, members of the academic staff have published a number of research papers in local and international journals.

Information Technology Development

The faculty introduced Learning Management System (LMS) during the year 2017 opening platform for students and staff to meet online and carrying out their academic activities on time. The system facilitates course registration, teaching material sharing, online examinations/test, discussion groups, assignment submission etc.

Infrastructure Development

The Faculty of Management & Finance received an allocation of Rs. 113 million in 2015 for a construction of a new building with 14 lecture halls. The construction was completed in 2017. In addition, Rs. 290.00 million rupees was allocated for an additional building in 2017 with the same capacity and a foundation was laid for it on 31.08.2017. The faculty planned to increase the intake of students by 100 after completion of the second building.

Understanding the national needs and demand for management education in Sri Lanka, the faculty expects to double its intake in future. With this intention, an activity for a new ten storied building for the faculty was included to the strategic plan of the university.

2.6 FACULTY OF MEDICINE

Introduction

The Faculty of Medicine is the second oldest medical school in South Asia and the forerunner of University education in the country. The Faculty of Medicine provides a large volume of honorary services to the health sector of Sri Lanka, the Justice Ministry and the nation. These include clinical services, preventive services, laboratory services and medico –legal services and supervision and training of intern medical officers and postgraduates for professional degrees, and serve in numerous national level committees on health, in an advisory capacity. The Human Genetics Unit also provides Genetic Evaluation and Counseling as an out patient service.

The clinical services are provided through five clinical departments of Clinical Medicine namely, Surgery, Paediatrics, Obstetrics & Gynaecology, and Psychiatry and the Family Medicine Unit. The academics give consultant level care for those admitted to the respective wards in three main teaching hospitals of the Colombo Group, namely the National Hospital of Sri Lanka, the Lady Ridgeway Children’s Hospital, and the De Soysa Maternity Hospital. The work entails regular ward rounds, on-call commitments to the wards, ward rounds during weekends, and supervision and training of junior staff. These are carried out throughout the year irrespective of University vacation and public holidays. The annual in-patient, out-patient loads and other services of some of the Departments are as follows:

- The Academic staff of the **Department of Forensic Medicine and Toxicology** conducts approximately 360 judicial autopsies/skeleton examinations in seven police areas around Colombo and specialized referred cases and second autopsies islandwide, Examination, documentation in approximately 4500 victims of violence in National Hospital of Sri Lanka/Lady Ridgeway Hospital, medico-legal management of victims and accused of sexual assault and sending specialist reports and providing oral expert evidence in courts in all 3 instances above.
- **The Department of Obstetrics & Gynaecology** provides clinical services in ward 15 and ward 3 at the De Soysa Hospital for Women and Ward 39 NHSL. Approximately 28,000 patients are seen in the clinics each year. There are approximately 6,000 admissions to the Obstetric wards (Ward 15 and Ward 03 DSHW) per year and approximately 3,500 deliveries per year of which about 1,000 are delivered by caesarean section. There are approximately 6000 admissions to ward 39 NHSL each year and approximately 800 major surgeries and 700 minor surgeries performed every year. The professorial unit conducts 3 general obstetric clinics, 2 clinics for medically complicated obstetric patients, three gynaecology clinics and one clinic for subfertile patients. The professorial obstetric unit functions as tertiary care referral center for high risk obstetric patients. Referrals are accepted from any part of the country at any time. The academic staff of the professorial unit provide 24 hours on call service to the obstetric and gynaecology wards. The professorial unit provide training for midwifery and Nursing students of the ministry of health. The academic staff conduct examinations for midwifery and nursing students, serve as members of technical evaluation committees, Technical advisory committees and guidelines committees of the Ministry of Health and assist in National maternal death reviews which are conducted annually.
- **The Department of Clinical Medicine** provide honorary clinical services as consultant physician to wards 41 and ward 48B of National Hospital of Sri Lanka, The average number of in-patients per year- 9000, Average number of clinic visits- 30000, provide laboratory services free for charge to patients in our two wards (41 and 48B), fee-levying laboratory service, Average number of blood tests per year 80000, Average number of urine tests per year 4000, provided teaching for 70 Elective students from overseas in 2016, and 100 elective students in 2017, supervise and train 8 intern medical officers every year, provide clinical training for up to 2 Senior Registrars in Medicine, 2 Senior Registrars in Nephrology, 01 Senior Registrar in Critical Care, 06 Registrars in Medicine and 3-4 sub specialty Registrars (Dermatology, Emergency Medicine, Venereology) during the given year, provide clinical training to post graduate students following PG Diploma courses in elderly medicine and family medicine, provide the clinical training component for PG Registrars in Community Medicine, The Academic staff in the Department contribute as examiners for many PGIM programs, both in the theory component and clinicals.

- **The Department of Surgery** (National Hospital of Sri Lanka): approximately 5500 in-patients and 7500 outpatient visits are recorded during the year. The department provides specialist services in GI Surgery, Hepato-pancreato-biliary Surgery, Vascular & transplant Surgery, Paediatric Surgery and Breast & endocrine surgery.
- **The Department of Pathology** is involved in undergraduate and postgraduate teaching, Research and Diagnostic work which include histopathology, Haematology and cytology. Specialized areas of diagnostic work include immunohistochemistry, prognostication of breast carcinoma, renal pathology, including transplant pathology, dermatopathology, urological pathology and Perinatal/fetal pathology and liver transplant pathology. Academic staff was involved in teaching at the integrated ward classes conducted by the Paediatrics, Obstetrics & Gynaecology, Medicine Departments and the Clinical stream and took part in small group teaching activities of the Community Stream, Behavioural Sciences Stream. They also supervised student research projects of the Community Stream. The academic staff conduct the Lectures and practical classes, examinations for Bsc Physiotherapy students and were involved in teaching activities for the Nuclear Medicine special degree and the Registered Medical officer's degree. In 2017, 4000 surgical biopsies and 375 cytology specimens were received. 50 adults and perinatal post mortems were conducted. 3000 Blood Pictures and 75 Bone marrow and trephine biopsies were reported.
- **The Department of Microbiology** is the national reference laboratory for the diagnosis of melioidosis. Handle culture isolates from the whole country and also do the PCR test for Mycobacterium tuberculosis as well as do culture for bacterial infections in state and private sector.
- **The Department of Community Medicine** takes part in the delivery of healthcare services in the University Community Health Project in the Kotte MOH area.

In addition to the training of medical graduates, the Faculty plays an important role in training paramedical staff by participating in the training programmes of the School of Radiography, School of Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy, School of Cardiography, Optometrists Training Programme, Nurses Training Schools, and the Post Basic Nurses Training School. The Department of Pharmacology conducts the Internal Pharmacy course for the Ministry of Health and assists the Ceylon Medical College Council by conducting the External Pharmacy Examination.

The Faculty has 147 members on the permanent academic staff, comprising of nine Senior Professors, thirty-two Professors, one Associate Professor, sixty-six Senior Lecturers, and thirty-six Lecturers. The extended Faculty included about ninety (90) Consultants in the National Hospital of Sri Lanka, the Lady Ridgeway Children's Hospital, the De Soysa Maternity Hospital, Castle Street Hospital for Women, Judicial Medical Officers in Colombo, Consultants and Medical Officers of the Chest Hospital Welisara, Rehabilitation Hospital Ragama, National Cancer Institute, Maharagama, Medical Officers at District Hospitals, Peripheral Units, and Municipal Dispensaries, Medical Officers of Health and about fourteen (14) General Practitioners.

In 1942, the Faculty had six Departments that included Physiology, Anatomy, Pathology, Medicine, Obstetrics & Gynaecology and Surgery. The Departments of Public Health and Forensic Medicine were added in 1949 and 1951 respectively. The Departments of Biochemistry and Pharmacology branched off from the Department of Physiology, Parasitology and Microbiology from the Department of Pathology, and Paediatrics and Psychological Medicine from the Department of Medicine. Departments of Medical Education, Allied Health Sciences and Medical Humanities were added during the year 2016 with the Gazette.

Notification on 09th August 2016. Accordingly, there are 17 departments at now. There are 5 Units in addition to these departments - the Parasitic Diseases Research Unit, the Human Genetics Unit, the Health and Wellness Unit, the Curriculum Implementation Unit, the Publications Unit, distance learning Unit and the Audio-Visual Unit.

One hundred and ninety-one (191) medical students from the 2016 A/L batch began their undergraduate programmes on 04.12.2017. This includes seven (07) foreign Medical undergraduates who joined under the MOU between the Faculty of Medicine and the Royal Government of Bhutan and also the foreign quota.

The Department of Pharmacology conducts the B.Sc. in Pharmacy a special degree programme in collaboration with the Science Faculty of the University.

The Faculty of Medicine continued under the Deanship of **Professor Jennifer Perera** who was elected as Dean of the Faculty on 20th February 2015. The administrative officers serving in the Faculty are as follows.

With a student population of over one thousand three hundred and fifty-six (1,356), and academic and non-academic staff amounting to about four hundred (400), space is an acute problem for the Faculty. The Department of Allied Health Sciences which conducts the B.Sc. Physiotherapy programme, is located away from the Faculty premises in a rented house. However, construction works of the second stage of the Pre-Clinical Building which started in April 2014 was completed in December 2016 and initiatives were taken to start the final stage at the beginning of the year 2017 and expected to complete the project in 2020 at a cost of Rs. 3.2 billion.

Students of the Faculty boycotted the lectures w.e.f. 04.02.2017, demanding abolition of SAITM from the government and they returned for lectures after nine months on 20th November 2017 with their achievements.

The National Authority on Tobacco and Alcohol (NATA), Expert Committee on Tobacco, Alcohol and Other Drugs of the Sri Lanka Medical Association (SLMA) and Alcohol and Drug Information Centre (ADIC) were the partners of implementation.

- **World University Games – 2017** - Akhila Imantha Nilaweera, of the A/L 2014 batch (MFC/AL/2014/509) of the faculty, participated in the 29th Summer Universiade (World University Games) 2017 held in Taipei, Taiwan for track and field events representing the Sri Lankan University Team. He was qualified to compete in three events; 110m hurdles, long jump and 100mx4 events. 2.7 FACULTY OF SCIENCE

Vision

The Faculty of Science to be a center of scientific and technological excellence nationally and internationally.

Mission

To develop honest, adaptable productive citizens: with multidisciplinary knowledge, creative thinking and analytical skills with a high degree of civic conscientiousness. To articulate and promote interaction with public and private sector and society at large, with the view to contributing towards the development of the nation. To institute mechanisms for partnership programmes for improving resources and infrastructure facilities.

Introduction

The Faculty of Science continued with seven Departments of study – Chemistry, Mathematics, Nuclear Science, Physics, Plant Sciences, Statistics and Zoology & Environment Science, and conducted courses leading to the B.Sc. General Degree (90 Credits and 120 Credits) and B.Sc. Special Degree (120 Credits). The faculty has introduced thematic four-year degrees for students who may decide to pursue postgraduate degrees under following Themes:

- Applied Statistics
- Business & Environment
- Sustainable Landscape
- Finance & Insurance
- Science & Management
- Biotechnology
- Information Technology & Electronics
- Information Technology

Annual Technical Sessions of the Faculty of Science in line with the University Annual Research Symposium 2017 was held on 17/11/2017 at the Faculty of Science premises under the theme of “*Science for Sustainable Development*”.

Undergraduate population of the Faculty during the year under review was 1626 with an annual undergraduate intake of 414. The Faculty has a permanent academic staff of 116 and temporary academic staff of 102. During the year under review faculty had 106 Administrative, and Non-academic staff members and 07 contract staff members.

A wide range of subject combinations are available for those following the general degree programs while special degree programs aim to produce students who are specialized in the respective subject area with a strong training in research. The Faculty continued to offer special degree programs in collaboration with the University of Colombo School of Computing (UCSC) and the Faculty of Medicine, University of Colombo. The programs conducted by the Career Guidance Unit (CGU) of the Faculty continued providing an opportunity for students to obtain industrial exposure and assisted them in developing their soft skills. The faculty has conducted second training Programme of Sinhala / Tamil language to its year 2017 new intake with the collaboration from the Department of Official Languages.

The postgraduate programs of the Faculty of Science are an important component of its academic activities. Several M.Sc. programs, many of which are long standing, were continued by the seven departments. These programs are well recognized and much sought after. There were 417 students following M.Sc Programme in 2017. During the year under review the number of M.Phil. and Ph.D. students were 126 and 52 respectively.

The Faculty of Science continued to interact closely with industry/ institutions through its commercial arm, the ‘Colombo Science and Technology Cell’. Strong links with local and foreign collaborators have also been

established at both department and faculty levels. In addition, 'services' are also provided to numerous organizations by specialized units in departments. The academic staff plays a prominent role in national development, through serving on committees, Boards, and as consultants and resource persons in the government and non-government sectors.

To cater to the steady increase in the demand for the programs conducted by the Faculty of Science, the Faculty obtained the Cabinet approval for the proposed construction of the Student Service Centre (SSC), Information & Learning Centre (ILC) and the Department of Statistics Building (DST). Construction work of the DST building was started during end of 2017 and it is expected that other two projects will commence construction in early 2018.

The faculty is in the process of preparing the documentation work of the proposed Biology Buildings (Blocks I and II) for the Departments of Plant Sciences and Zoology & Environment Science. Two External Degree Programmes, namely B.Sc in Financial Engineering and B.Sc. in Electronics and Automaton Technologies offered by the Faculty continued successfully during the year 2017.

2.7 FACULTY OF TECHNOLOGY

Introduction:

Established in 2017, the Faculty of Technology is one of the youngest faculties of the University of Colombo. In 2018, the Faculty would commence its academic programs under three disciplines, i.e. in Agricultural Technology, Environmental Technology, Information & Communication Technology and Instrumentation & Automation Technology to students who are qualified for university entrance from the G.C.E. (A/L) technology stream. These programs would be conducted by four academic departments namely,

- Department of Agricultural Technology
- Department of Environmental Technology,
- Department of Information & Communication Technology and
- Department of Instrumentation & Automation Technology

Currently, the teaching staff of the Faculty consists of 13 permanent members including a Senior Professor, 10 Senior Lecturers and 02 Probationary Lecturers. This number is expected to increase with the intake of the students to the Faculty with its full capacity. The Faculty of Technology aims to foster strong research and innovation culture among its students who are expected to graduate as technology professionals.

2.9 FACULTY OF NURSING

INTRODUCTION:

The Faculty of Nursing of the University of Colombo offers a four-year bachelor's degree in nursing (BScN). The Faculty of Nursing comprises of three academic departments. They are as follows.

- I. Department of Basic Science/ Social Science for Nursing
- II. Department of Fundamental Nursing
- III. Department of Clinical Nursing

The above departments are mainly responsible for conducting the Nursing degree programme with the help of the existing Faculties of the University of Colombo. In addition, the two units, i.e. English Language Training Unit and the Nurse Education Unit would be established within the Faculty of Nursing in order to strengthen the basic knowledge and skills of undergraduates in the respective areas to ensure their smooth progress in studies for a successful completion of the study programme.

The Faculty has 11 members on the academic staff consisting of 1 Professor and 10 Senior Lecturers.

Introduction

The Sri Palee Campus was established in 1996 as the Western Campus and subsequently named as the “Sri Palee Campus” and is affiliated to the University of Colombo from 11th 1998 in terms of Section 27 (1) of the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978.

The Campus continued to function with four departments namely, the Department of Mass Media, Department of Performing Arts, Department of Languages and Department of Computer Studies in 2016. Inadequate senior academic staff hindered the process of elevating these four Departments to the status of Faculties.

2.11 CENTRE FOR CONTEMPORARY INDIAN STUDIES (CCIS)

Introduction:

The Centre for Contemporary Indian Studies (CCIS) is a multidisciplinary research centre which promotes activities connected with developing knowledge in Sri Lanka on contemporary studies in India and strengthening Indo-Lanka relationship through an institutionalized network between the two countries. It was established in 2012 under a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) signed between the High Commission of India in Sri Lanka and the University of Colombo. The Centre functions under the Faculty of Graduate Studies (FGS) for academic and administrative matters and it is also linked with other faculties through its Advisory Board and Management Board. India and Sri Lanka are connected through social, religious, linguistic, cultural, economic and strategic ties which date back to several centuries. However, less importance has been placed on the study of contemporary developments and changes in India. By realizing that such research and study undertaken at Sri Lanka's seat of higher learning will play an important role in guiding and strengthening the social and economic development of the country and existing bonds of friendship between India and Sri Lanka, the Centre for Contemporary Indian Studies serves to deepen the understanding of contemporary India in Sri Lanka.

In 2017, the CCIS completed five years of its inception and new budget for the year 2017-2022 was approved by the Finance Committee of the University of Colombo. The centre received the 1st installment of its five-year budget in August 2017.

Vision of the CCIS

To evolve and grow as an academic hub for promoting research and knowledge on contemporary India.

Objectives

The chief function of the Centre is to provide an intellectual forum for academic staff and postgraduates working in the field of contemporary Indian studies and offer a base for research for its members in collaboration with other institutions. It hopes to nurture a new generation of interdisciplinary scholars, and to provide a forum for public dialogue among the academic, business, and foreign policy communities. Therefore, the Centre aims to serve as a focus for lectures, seminars and other research events in the field, including collaborative research projects. The CCIS welcomes links with other scholars, nationally and internationally.

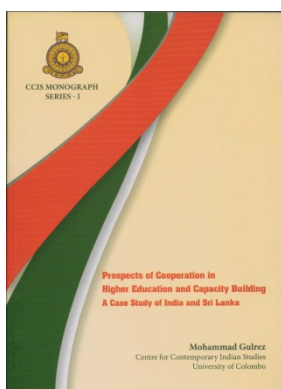

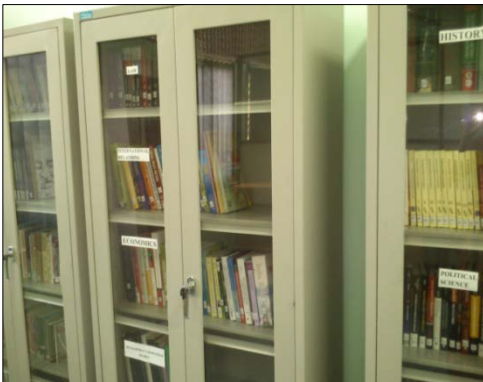

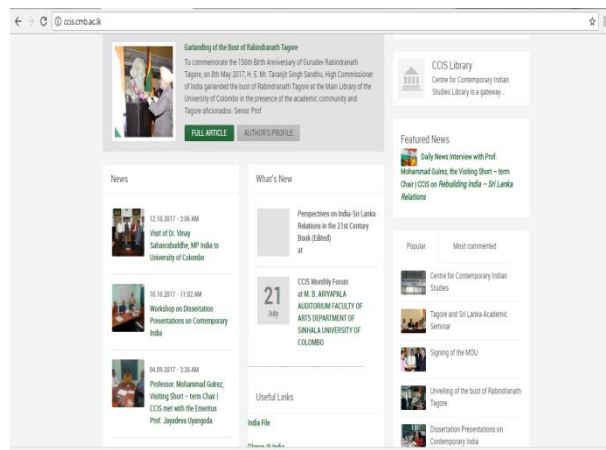

2.12 Centre for Gender Equality (CEGE)

INTRODUCTION

As per the request made by the Center for Gender Equity and Equality (CGEE) of the UGC to establish a gender focal point at each university, in December 2016, The Vice Chancellor appointed Dr. Subhangi M. K. Herath as the Acting Director of the gender focal point at the University of Colombo in order to develop the Center dedicated to promote gender equality of the university. Convincing the university community of the need to establish and maintain gender equality within the university was an extremely arduous task due to the ignorance of the university community of the importance concept of the concept of gender equality. However, on the 30th of March 2017 an empty room (201) was allocated from the former Faculty of Graduate Studies premises for the establishment of the Center.

The Centre was named the Center for Gender Equality and abbreviated to CEGE. Procurement process was immediately begun after securing a room to furnish and develop the Centre and a major part of furnishing and infrastructural development of the Centre was completed by the end of 2017.

Objectives of the Centre

- I. To promote a culture at the University of Colombo in which the dignity and equality of all persons are respected
- II. To make gender equality a theme of priority and promote gender equality in all aspects and activities involving the University of Colombo
- III. To prevent the occurrence of sexual harassment through targeted, preventative interventions
- IV. To adopt a zero tolerance on acts of sexual harassment and mechanisms to provide for the resolution of complaints through mediation and/or disciplinary action

2.14 DEPARTMENT OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Introduction:

The Department of Physical Education (DPE) undertakes all the work in relation to promoting and developing sports activities among the students at the University of Colombo. The department comprises the Acting Director and a team of Instructors of Physical Education (IPEs) who are in charge of the various sports available to students. The members of the DPE also work closely with the Amalgamated Club (Sports Council) which consists of the Captains and Vice-captains of all sports for a given year, in order to work towards victory in all its endeavours.

Facilities

The DPE offers students the best facilities in order to achieve the best results. The vast and well-maintained grounds of the University of Colombo cater to all the outdoor sports, including cricket, rugby, football, baseball, elle, and hockey. The basketball court and tennis courts are also located in close proximity to the grounds. The indoor gymnasium caters to volleyball, table tennis, badminton, karate, wrestling, taekwondo and other indoor sports, and the university swimmers have access to the NCC, Royal College and Police swimming pools. The DPE also boasts a well-maintained strength training hall and weight room, which is open to all students. The players receive the best in terms of coaching, physio and medical staff, and are given assistance in every possible way to achieve their full potential.

Competitions

The main competitions in annual calendar are the Sri Lanka University Games (SLUG) which takes place every three years, and the Inter-university championships which take place in other years. The University of Colombo has emerged overall Runners-up in the past two years, owing to the hard work and dedication of its athletes and coaching staff. The teams also participate at invitational, national and international competitions, and perform at a very high level. UoC was represented by 8 players in the Sri Lankan delegation that participated in the World University Games (WUG) 2017 in Taipei, which demonstrates the level of talent among its sportsmen and women. Teams are given a subsistence allowance for practice matches and for competition days and are given financial assistance in participating in invitational and international competitions.

Colours Awards

The final event in the DPE's calendar is the Colour Awards Ceremony, which was organised with the Amalgamated Club with much pomp and pageantry. The event celebrates and honours the athletes who made sacrifices in order to bring glory to the university through their sporting achievements.

2.15 HEALTH CENTRE

Medical Staff

Dr. K.D.I. Wasudeva works as Chief Medical officer. Dr.(Mrs.) M.A.P.W. Premathilake, Dr.(Mrs) D.S.K. Thennakoon and Dr.(Mrs) A.R.P. Rathnayake work as University Medical officers on contract. Dr.(Mrs.) I.P. Silva work as Dental surgeon.

Services:

In addition to routine medical and dental treatment following are some additional services provided by the health center.

- All new entrants were given a medical questionnaire to be filled by their practitioners. The filled questionnaire and medical examination forms were filed at Health centre.
- All the new recruits to University services (University of Colombo /UGC/PGIM/IIM/Horana Sripalee) were examined by University Medical officer regarding fitness for duty and relevant investigations are done.
- Medical and fitness screening of students for special events of sports such as weight lifting, rowing, wrestling, Road races etc.
- The staff of UGC/PGIM/IIM was provided with health care facilities.
- Free lab testing facility for undergraduates was commenced on 01.07.2017
- Emergency treatment facilities were improved, and an emergency bed was purchased and installed with others supporting facilities for emergency care.

Public Health Service.

The spraying of insecticide to potential mosquito breeding places (as a routine public health services activity) was carried out. The problems of frequent blocks in the sewage system were resolved by obtaining the services of private contractors and the municipality when health centre sanitary laborers were unable do this job. A special program was carried out covering hostels, canteens and all University buildings during dengue epidemics. New fumigator machine was purchased to carry out fumigation work during dengue epidemic periods.

Awareness program were conducted for employee in construction site regarding dengue prevention.

2.16 National Education Research and Evaluation Centre (NEREC)

Vision

To improve education and training at national and regional level by undertaking research, evaluation, development, dissemination activities and provide education information services.

Mission

To establish an energetic, forward looking, educational research, evaluation, testing and training institution that has a national and regional profile.

Introduction

The National Education Research and Evaluation Center (NEREC) was established in year 2000 with the objective of providing research-based findings for policy formulation. Thus, by virtue of its establishment, NEREC is committed to initiate and carry out research and evaluation studies pertaining to educational policy and student achievement in Sri Lanka. For more than a decade, NEREC has conducted national assessments of achievement of students completing various grades in consultation with the Ministry of Education (MoE) and the World Bank. The services of NEREC are available for both government and non-governmental organizations by way of seminars, workshops, capacity development training sessions and research, related to education and evaluation. Thus, NEREC is committed to create a vibrant research community dedicated to education research.

The study on the National Assessment of Achievement of Students Completing Gr. 08 in Year 2016 was completed and dissemination to the relevant stake holder including the officials of the Ministry of Education, National Institute of Education and the World Bank took place on 13th November 2017 at the Ministry of Education. This project was commissioned by the Ministry of Education with the financial assistance provided by the World Bank.

Future Plans

Civic Education Study – 2017 which is a replication of the 2003 study is being carried out and it is funded by the GIZ. Another study ‘Assessing Second National Language Communication Skills of Student Completing Grade 08’ will commence in February 2018.

2.17 STAFF DEVELOPMENT CENTRE

Introduction, with Vision & Mission

The Staff Development Centre (SDC), University of Colombo has successfully completed its twentieth year since its inception. The Staff Development Centre of the University of Colombo was established in 1997 under the first SDC in the national university system in Sri Lanka, due to a need to commence and establish a planned staff development in Sri Lankan universities.

The Mission of the SDC is "to enhance the quality of academic works undertaken by staff and students within the system of higher education in Sri Lanka, in general, and within the University of Colombo, in particular". In order to achieve this objective, the SDC facilitates to make university teaching/learning more effective, more relevant, student oriented and of internationally high standard. It also facilitates to develop skills and competencies necessary for more effective and efficient performance among all members of the staff of the University including academic and non-academic staff. The SDC undertakes related training programmes and workshops in order to promote career development of university staff, within the available financial and human resource limitations.

2. Objectives and Expected Activities of SDC¹

1. To extent support and assistance to academic staff in developing and enhancing the various skills needed to fulfill academic tasks such as preparation and reform of curriculum, teaching and research.
2. To provide support and assistance to non-academic staff in developing and enhancing the skills needed to fulfill various academic support services and activities.
3. To provide support and assistance to academic staff already in academic administrative positions (Heads of Departments, Deans of Faculties, Directors of Institutes and School, Rector etc.) or aspiring to take up such positions to acquire the skills and competencies required in the performance of academic administration.
4. To provide support to individuals and groups in the evaluation and review of teaching departments and other academic units, courses and programmes, and faculties.
5. To collaborate with individuals and groups throughout the University on projects which aim to enhance the quality of teaching and learning in the University.
6. To provide to teachers objective student feedback services on request
7. To contribute to the policies and general procedures within the University which relate to teaching and learning.
8. To contribute to the wider field of research and scholarship related to higher education.

9. To undertake publications in the areas of university staff development in general, and teaching and learning in particular, to be used within the University of Colombo and other institutions of higher learning.
10. To develop linkages among domestic and foreign university staff development organizations with similar objectives.
11. To raise funds through domestic and foreign sources, with the approval of the University Council, to carry out its activities, if resources placed at its disposal by the University are found inadequate.
12. To build up a resource and information centre in subjects related to university course structures, curriculum changes, methodology of university teaching and learning and research.

The SDC is continuing with its contribution to develop university education in an array of well-focused and diversified training programmes on all aspects related to all academic, administrative and other supportive staff members of the university successfully. The primary focus aimed at the academic staff is CTHE (Certificate of Teaching in Higher Education) course which is accredited by Staff and Educational Development Association (UK) as well as by the University Grant Commission of Sri Lanka. The other SDC course accredited by Staff and Educational Development Association (UK) is ASTHE (Accreditation of Senior Teachers in Higher Education) which was launched last year after a lapse of ten years, with the availability of a competent resource person to conduct this course for the senior academic staff this year. As this ASTHE course is to be conducted every two years (due to staffing limitations), it was not conducted under this year of review. The third SDC course on training university teachers is the short course in Making Teaching Effective (MaTE-2017). This was offered for the most junior academic staff members of the university. Further, short courses in English proficiency (at two levels), Tamil language course for beginners, a Clerical Skills course, a course in Minute Taking and a course in preparing academics for the IELTS, were also conducted by the SDC for university staff.

In addition, the SDC conducted several workshops for both academics and non-academics. These short courses/workshops in making teaching more effective and other related services were offered to all categories of staff of the university. The academics from universities, other than Colombo, also attended the above training.

The SDC of University of Colombo is making a significant contribution to enhance the capacity of academic and non-academic staff not only of University of Colombo but also other universities/institutes in Sri Lanka. During the year 2017, the SDC could successfully train 759 university staff members in different staff categories and from several universities in Sri Lanka, including applicants from private universities who also mixed readily with state university staff.

The SDC operates from its office complex in the University of Colombo.

Staff Development Programmes

Certificate in Teaching in Higher Education (CTHE) Course

The twentieth iteration of the Certificate in Teaching in Higher Education (CTHE) course was successfully completed by the SDC for University Staff, and was followed by 81 academics from different universities in Sri Lanka (University of Colombo, Sri Palee Campus, Institute of Indigenous Medicine (JIM), University of Moratuwa (including ITUM), Rajarata University of Sri Lanka, Wayamba University of Sri Lanka, Kothalawala Defence University and the Institute of Information Technology (a degree awarding private university)).

Short Course in Making Teaching Effective (MaTE 2017)

The Short Course in Making Teaching Effective (MaTE 2017) was conducted targeting the temporary junior academic staff (*e.g.*, Assistant Lecturers, Tutors, Demonstrators) of Higher Education Institutes, including the University of Colombo. This course, however, attracted the permanent academic staff from University of Moratuwa, National Institute of Social Development, the Institute of Information Technology and was followed by 29 academic staff.

In addition to the CTHE and MaTE2017 courses, the SDC also conducted short courses in English and Tamil Languages, a training course in Clerical Skills as part of office procedures, International English Language Testing System preparatory course (IELTS), a course in taking minutes of meetings, assisting teaching to facilitate assessment & learning, and 18 different workshops for the university staff during the year 2017 with the contribution of also from resource persons outside the SDC. 2.18 SOCIAL POLICY ANALYSIS AND RESEARCH CENTRE (SPARC)

The Social Policy Analysis and Research Centre (SPARC) of the Faculty of Arts, University of Colombo explores the critical areas of social and economic development as a focal point within the Sri Lankan universities. The SPARC activities are based on five thematic areas such as Research and Training, Advocacy and Networking.

Director – Dr Nishara Fernando

Objectives

- To facilitate independent research within Sri Lankan Universities on social development related issues.
- To facilitate interdisciplinary exchange between scholars from different backgrounds.
- To provide training and improve the quality of social science education.
- To strengthen local expertise within universities in poverty reduction and social policy formulation.
- To identify opportunities for social policy reforms in Sri Lanka.

Projects:

ASCENT (Advancing Skill Creation to Enhance Transformation)

Under the partnership agreement signed between the University of Huddersfield and the University of Colombo a research project on Advancing Skill Creation to Enhance Transformation (ASCENT) was launched in May 2016. Dr. Nishara Fernando is the ASCENT project coordinator of the University of Colombo. The aim of this project is to ensure building research and innovative capacities of the Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) was to deal with the challenges associated with developing societal resilience to disasters. This project consists of consortium of 13 European (Sweden, Estonia, Lithuania) and Asian HEIs (Bangladesh, Sri Lanka and Thailand.).

University of Moratuwa and University of Ruhuna are the other two local partners of this project. This project focuses mainly on developing capacities of junior academics by training them on various research skills such as, research methods, Disaster Risk Resilience, systematic reviews, to undertake high quality and policy/practice relevant research.

Initial research progress meeting was held at the University of Huddersfield, United Kingdom from 17th to 24th October 2016 attended by both Dr. Nishara Fernando and Prof. Siri Hettige attended.

The SPARC participated in the ASCENT Research Colloquium and Discussion Forum organized by the Faculty of Agriculture, University of Ruhuna funded by ASCENT consortium held from 27 February to 4 March 2017 at University of Ruhuna, Kamburupitiya and Fisherman's Bay Hotel, Weligama, The colloquium provided trainings on building the research profile, understanding the impact of research, online presence, interdisciplinary of research, fundamentals of advocacy and communication and case studies of international collaboration. Seventy Academics representing United Kingdom, Sweden, Estonia, Thailand, Bangladesh and Sri Lanka participated in the event.

As a sequel to the Research Colloquium and Discussion Forum held in February 2017, Second Advancing Skill Creation to Enhance Transformation (ASCENT) Research Colloquium and Discussion Forum was organized by the Faculty of Engineering, Naresuan University from 21st November to 24th November 2017 at Naresuan University Thailand. More than 60 participants from ASCENT partner (HEIs) shared their experiences related to research and Innovation in HEI out of which 10 were from Colombo University.

The 7th International Conference on Building Resilience entitled: Using scientific knowledge to inform policy and practice in disaster risk reduction, was held in Bangkok, Thailand from 27-29th November 2017.

A team of seven from the University of Colombo team presented their research papers under the themes of: Understanding disaster risk, strengthening disaster risk governance to manage disaster risk, investing in disaster risk reduction for resilience, enhancing disaster preparedness for effective response and to "Build Back Better" in recovery, rehabilitation and reconstruction.

Professor S.T. Hettige and Dr Nishara Fernando- Director SPARC, University of Colombo chaired two sessions at the conference.

Rapid Assessment on Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children in Sri Lanka National Technical Report (CLEAR)

The SPARC was given an opportunity to carry out a national study on Commercial Sexual exploitation of children in Sri Lanka, as an extension of the CLEAR project commissioned by the International Labour Organization (ILO). Dr. Subhangi M.K Herath functioned as the principal investigator of the study, while Dr. Nishara Fernando the co-investigator. The research was carried out in 6 districts of the country namely Colombo, Galle, Anuradhapura, Polonnaruwa, Rathnapura, Gampaha and Trincomalee from 24th of August to 31st of March 2017. The sample included 15 children from each district and also the key informant interviews were held with parents of the children and government officials related to the field. The final report on the Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children of Sri Lanka was presented at a validation workshop organized by the Ministry of Women and Child Affairs. The final report was handed over to the ILO on the 25th of September 2017. Project on strengthening the capacity on emergency response (Asian Disaster Preparedness Centre)

Colombo Branch Office of the South Asia Institute (SAI), University of Heidelberg

Prof. Siri Hettige from Colombo University was appointed the first chair for Sri Lankan Studies at SAI in April 2016 and Dr. Nirmal Ranjith Dewasiri from Colombo University was appointed as the second chair in April 2017.

Prof. Gita Dharampal Frick (Head of History Department, SAI) paid a visit to Sri Lanka on 18 and contributed until 30 March 2017 to promote SAI in Sri Lanka and also explored possible research collaboration with Sri Lankan Universities. She visited Peradeniya, Eastern, Jaffna and Colombo Universities and discussed with members of staff of history departments and Deans of faculties of Arts/Humanities about the possibility of forming research links. Also she delivered speeches to the Faculty of Arts and Humanities of all these universities.

Government and foreign funding are available for academics through processes of competitive application.

The University allocated Rs. 45 million for research and research promotional activities of the University from the Government funds. These funds were used for awarding Postgraduate Research Scholarships, Collaborative Research Grants, infrastructure Development Grants, Small Grants, Travel Grants, Foreign PhD grants in order to improve University and Faculty research promotional activities.

The University of Colombo Annual Research Symposium 2017 was held on 15th November 2017 at the University of Colombo under the theme of Research for Development: Challenges and Opportunities. Faculties held their Faculty Research Symposia/Conferences separately in conjunction with the University Research Symposium and 240 abstracts were published in the Symposium Proceedings.

The International Conference of the Faculty of Arts on theme The Role of Humanities and Social Sciences in Research for Development, was held from 21st - 22nd November 2017.

The 12th International Research Conference on Management and Finance (IRCMF), was held on 27th October 2017 successfully. The Conference created a unique platform for local authors to meet with their international counterparts to deliberate and debate their research papers in mutually beneficial atmosphere.

The President's Awards for Scientific Publication was held on 6th November 2017. The University of Colombo Scientific Affiliations were conferred for their research publications in 2015.

EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT / DAY CARE CENTRE

An early Childhood Development / Day Care Centre was established on 18.05.2006 for the children between 2 ½ - 12 years of age of the university staff. There are 12 Canteens and 4 Milk Bars in the University at present. Out of these 04 Milk Bars, 02 Milk Bars of Highland are run by Milco (pvt.) Ltd. The University has already taken action to charge a rental for space and for electricity every month from the Milco (pvt.) Ltd with effect from 01.09.2016.

The University reduced the monthly rental of the canteens from Rs. 5000/- to Rs.1000/- and this was approved by the Council at its meeting held on 17.05.2017.

PHOTOCOPY SERVICE

There are 08 Photocopy Service Centers in each faculty including in the Main Library. The University charges Rs.8000/- as monthly rental, Rs.5000/- for electricity and Rs.1500/- for an additional photocopy machine from each contractor.

All the building projects were monitored continuously by the Planning and Development Committee.

Main Buildings Projects and their current status

The construction of “Extension to the East Wing Building Faculty of Management & Finance” was completed in June 2017 at an investment of Rs.132Mn (Approx.).

Stage III of the new seven storied building complex for the Faculty of Graduate Studies, construction works were commenced in September 2016 and expected to be completed by the mid of 2018.

The construction of the 2nd Stage of the Pre-Clinical Department building complex (Construction upto first floor slab level excluding Auditorium) was completed in December 2016 at a cost of Rs.700mn (Approx.) for the Stage-II. The rest of the work of the same project, its construction works were commenced in June 2017 and expected to be completed by the mid of 2020.

The construction of “Extension to the West Wing Building Faculty of Management & Finance” was commenced in August 2017 and expected to be completed by August 2019.

The construction of “Six Storied Building for the Department of Statistics (DST) Faculty of Science” was commenced in August 2017 and expects to be completed by August 2019.

The construction of “Information and Learning Centre in Faculty of Science Premises” was commenced in November 2017 and expected to be completed by November 2019.

Cabinet decision was obtained to award the project for the “Establishment of a Faculty of Technology (Stage I) University of Colombo” and contract was given in December 2017. Construction works of the same project was expected to be commenced by January 2018.

The SCAPC held on November 2017 approved the awarding of “Student Service Centre at Faculty of Science Premises” to the successful bidder & University is awaiting the decision from the Cabinet for an award the contract.

Approval of the Cabinet of Ministers was received in March 2017 for “Construction of Proposed Help Zone, University of Colombo”. Accordingly, procurement work was commenced. The estimated cost for the project is Rs.530Mn.

A Project Proposal for the “Establishment of Faculty of Technology (Stage-II) for University of Colombo” was submitted to the Department of National Planning through the University Grants Commission in 2017. The university is awaiting the approval from the Cabinet of Ministers. The estimated cost for the project is Rs. 4,389Mn.

The Project Proposal of “Conversion of the Single-Story Psychiatry unit building to Ten (10) storied Clinical Sciences Building, Faculty of Medicine, UOC” submitted to the Department of National Planning through the University Grant Commission in the year 2017. University is awaiting the approval from the Cabinet of Ministers. The estimated investment for the project is Rs. 969Mn.

The Project Proposal for the “Extension of the New Arts Wing Building of the Faculty of Arts, UOC” was submitted to the Department of National Planning through the University Grants Commission in 2017. The university is awaiting the approval from the Cabinet of Ministers. The estimated cost for the project is Rs. 780Mn.

7 INTERNAL AUDIT



8.1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies to the Financial Statements

University of Colombo

1. General

University of Colombo has been incorporated under Universities Act No.16 of 1978.

The main Administration building is located at the College House, No.94, Cumaratunga Munidasa Mawatha, Colombo 03.

The Statements of Financial Position, Statements of Financial Performance, Statements of Changes in Equity, Statement of cashflow as at and for the year ended 31.12.2017 were authorized for issue by the Council on 14th March 2018

The Financial period of the University is from 01st January to 31st December 2017.

2. General Policies

2.1 Basis of Accounting

The Financial Statements of the University of Colombo have been prepared under the historical cost convention in conformity with Sri Lanka Public Accounting Standards for the accrual basis of accounts.

All accounting policies adopted by the University are consistently with those of the previous year, where necessary comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to the changes, in presentation of current year figures.

The Financial Statements do not incorporate with the accounts of the university students' societies and Colombo Science & Technology Cell.

The Colombo Science & Technology Cell established as a limited by guarantee, in line with the first schedule to the Companies Act No.7 of 2007.

2.2 Statement of Compliance

The Financial Statements of the University have been prepared and presented in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards (SLPSAS's).

This Financial Statement comprises of the statement of Financial Position, Statement of Financial Performance, Statement of Cash Flow, Statement of Changes in Equity and Notes to the Financial Statements.

2.3. Materiality and Aggregation

Each material class of similar items have been presented separately in the Financial Statements. Items of dissimilar nature or function have been presented separately unless they are immaterial.

2.4. Offsetting

Assets and liabilities, and revenue and expenses have not been offset unless required or permitted by the SLPSAS.

2.5. Going concern

The University has made an assessment of the University and its ability to continue as a going concern and is satisfied that it has the resources to continue in entity for the foreseeable future. Furthermore, the Council is not aware of any material uncertainties that may cast significant doubt upon the University's ability to continue as a going concern. Based on that the Financial Statements have been prepared on the going concern basis.

2.6. Events after the date of the Statement of Financial Position

All material events after the reporting date has been considered and where appropriate adjustments or disclosure wherever necessary have been made in the Financial Statements.

2.7 Functional & Presentation Currency

Items included in the Financial Statements of the university are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the university operated (the functional currency). These Financial Statements are prepared and presented in 'Sri Lanka Rupees' (Rs.), which is the functional and presentation currency of the University.

2.8 Transactions of Foreign Currency

All foreign exchange transactions are converted to Sri Lanka Rupees, which is the reporting currency, at the rates of exchange prevailing at the time the transactions were affected.

2.9. Rounding

The amounts in financial statements have been rounded-off to the nearest rupee, unless otherwise indicated as permitted by the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

3. Significant Accounting Policies

3.1 Current Assets

Current Assets classified in the Statement of Financial Position are those which will be recovered within one year after the Statement of Financial Position date.

3.1.1 Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash & Cash Equivalents comprise cash in hand, the bank balances and short-term investments.

3.1.2 Inventories & Stocks

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realizable value. In general, cost is determined on a first-in-first-out basis and includes expenditure incurred in acquiring the inventories and bringing them to their existing condition and location.

3.1.3 Receivables

A sum of Rs 43,349,296.82 is due from employees on account of breach of bonds and agreements as at 31.12.2017.

3.2 Non- current Assets

3.2.1 Property, Plant & Equipment

Lands, Buildings, Laboratory and Teaching Equipment, Fixtures & Fittings, Library Books and Periodicals, Motor Vehicles, Cloaks and Other Assets include the items acquired out of government grants, research grants, internally generated funds, and donations.

Basis of Recognition

Property, Plant and Equipment are recognized if it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the entity and the cost of the item can be reliably measured.

Initial Recognition

Equipment is capitalized on the basis of nature. Equipment is capitalized if it is tangible, has a life of more than one year and has a purchase cost greater than Rs.2,500.00. The life of an asset is dependent on its category within 8 categories, ranging from 4 to 20 years.

Subsequent expenditure on existing Fixed Assets

Expenditure incurred on tangible fixed assets is charged to the Statement of Financial Performance in the period it is incurred, unless it meets one of the following criteria, in which it is capitalized and is depreciated on the relevant basis.

- Market value of fixed assets has subsequently increased.
- Asset capacity increase.
- Sustainable improvement in the quality of output or reduction in operating cost.
- Significant extension of the asset life beyond that has already been confirmed by repair and maintenance.

Measurement after recognition

Cost Model

After recognition all the Property, Plant and Equipment except the classes of Lands, Buildings, Motor Vehicles, Laboratory and Teaching Equipment, Sports Goods, Other Equipment and Furniture & Fittings are carried at its cost less accumulated depreciation.

Revaluation Model

After initial recognition below classes of Property Plant and Equipment whose fair value can be measured reliably has been carried at revalued amounts, being fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses. Land & Buildings, Motor Vehicles, Office equipment, Lab & Teaching Equipment, Furniture & Fittings, Sports Goods.

Depreciation

Depreciation is recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on a Straight-Line Method over the estimated useful life of Property, Plant and Equipment items from the date that they were made available for use. Lands are not depreciated. The estimated useful life periods are as follows.

Depreciation is provided from the year of purchase and up to the year of sale based on the period used, with full depreciation being provided in the date of purchase and sale of assets.

Lease – Finance Lease

Leases in terms of which the University assumes substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership are classified as finance leases. On initial recognition, the leased assets under property, plant and equipment, is measured at an amount equal to the lower of its fair value and the present value of

minimum lease payments. Subsequent to initial recognition, the asset is accounted for in accordance with the accounting policy applicable to that asset.

Minimum lease payments under finance leases are apportioned between the finance expense and the reduction of the outstanding liability. The finance expense is allocated to each period during the lease term so as to produce a constant periodic rate interest on the remaining balance of the liability.

Maintenance of Premises

The University has a maintenance plan which is reviewed periodically and forms the basis of the ongoing maintenance of the estate. The cost of maintenance is charged to the income and Expenditure Account as incurred.

3.2.2 Capital Works in Progress

Capital expenses incurred during the year which are not completed as at the date of the Statement of Financial Position are shown as Capital Work-in-Progress, whilst the capital assets which have been completed during the year and put to use have been transferred to Property, Plant and Equipment.

3.3 Liabilities & Provisions

3.3.1 Current Liabilities

Liabilities classified as Current Liabilities in the Statement of Financial Position are those that fall due for payment within one year from the date of the Statement of Financial Position date. All known liabilities have been accounted for in preparing the Financial Statements.

3.3.2. Financial liabilities

Creditors and Accrued Expenses

Creditors and Accrued expenses are measured at fair value and are subsequently measured at amortized cost using effective interest rate.

3.3.3. Provision for Retirement Gratuity

Provision has been made in the Financial Statements for retirement gratuities payable under the payment of Gratuity Act No. 12 of 1983, based on the amount payable if all employees retire on the date of the Statement of Financial Position, subject to the assumption that every employee would be entitled to the payment even if any or some of them may not have completed the minimum period of service required to be eligible for the payment under the Act on the date of the Statement of Financial Position.

3.3.3. Contingent Liabilities

No provision has been made in the accounts with regard to liabilities arising out of litigation. The total estimated amount of liabilities as at 31st December 2017 is Rs3 million.

3.4. Equity

3.4.1. Capital Grant

Government Grant are recognized at their fair value where is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all affecting conditions will be complied with.

Government Grant and contributions from other organizations for the purchase of fixed assets or to finance capital projects are taken to the grants received in advance in the first instance. They are taken to the unspent capital grant accounts upon utilization of the grant for the purchase of assets which are capitalized or to income or expenditure for purchase of assets, which are expensed off. Donated tangible fixed assets, except for non-depreciable fixed assets donated for use by the University are valued and taken to unspent capital grant and the deficit taken to the relevant fixed asset category. Donated non-depreciable assets are taken to income or expenditure.

3.4.2. Recurrent Grant

Recurrent grants are recognized in the Statement of Financial performance on cash basis. Cost of rehabilitation of Fixed Assets and Capital Grants for construction and new work recognized either as work in progress or Capital Assets where necessary.

3.4.3. Designated Specific Funds

Surplus on income over expenditure of the activities are generally accounted under Designated General funds in the University Statement of Financial Position. Designated General Funds include funds set aside for specific or committed purpose such as planned operational activities of faculties, departments and self-financing activities of the University.

3.4.4. Endowment Fund

Endowments include restricted donations received by the University. Investment returns generated from endowments are used in accordance with various purposes established by the donors.

3.5 Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the University and the revenue can be reliably measured, regardless of when the payments is made. The following specific recognition criteria also be met before revenue is recognized.

- Tuition and other related fees for the academic year and all other income (including course and conference fees and consultancy fees) are recognized in the period in which the services are rendered.

- Non-endowment donations are recognized in the financial year they are received
- Interest income is recognized as it accrues in income or expenditure using the effective interest method.

3.6 Recognition of Expenses

3.6.1. Expenses in carrying all activities of the University is recognized on accrued basis and charged to the statement of Financial Performance.

3.6.2 All expenses incurred in respect of undergraduate education have been charged to the government recurrent grant.

3.6.3 All expenditure incurred in the acquisition, or improvement of assets of a permanent nature in order to carry on or increase the learning capacity of the students has been treated as capital expenditure.

3.6.4 Expenses are recognized in the income statement on the basis of direct association between cost incurred in the running of the University and in maintaining the capital assets in a state of efficiency has been charged to revenue in arriving at the surplus/deficit for the year.

3.7. Statement of Cash Flows

The cash flow statement has been prepared by using the Indirect Method in accordance with the SLPSAS 2 where by gross cash receipts and gross cash payments of operating activities, finance activities and investing activities have been recognized. Cash and cash equivalents comprise short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

3.8. Commitments and Contingencies

All discernible risks are accounted for in determining the amount of all known liabilities. Contingent liabilities are possible obligations whose existence will be confirmed only by uncertain future events or present obligations where the transfer of economic benefit is not probable or cannot be reliably measured. Contingent liabilities are not recognized in the Statement of Financial Position but are disclosed unless they are remote.

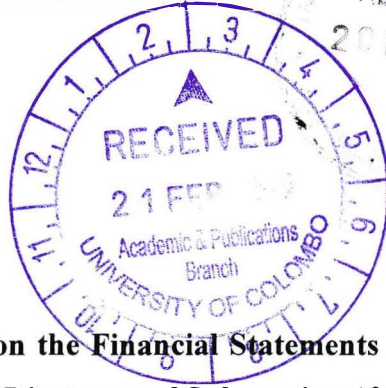

Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements of the University of Colombo for the year ended 31 December 2017 in terms of Sub-section 108(1) of the Universities Act, No.16 of 1978

The audit of financial statements of the University of Colombo for the year ended 31 December 2017 comprising the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2017 and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in equity and cash flow statement for the year then ended and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154 (1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read in conjunction with Section 13 (1) of the Finance Act, No.38 of 1971 and Sub-section 107 (5) of the Universities Act, No. 16 of 1978. My comments and observations which I consider should be published with the Annual Report of the University in terms of Sub-section 108 (1) of the Universities Act, appear in this report.

1.2 Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards and for such internal control as the management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatements, whether due to fraud or error.

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1.3 Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit. I conducted my audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards consistent with International Auditing Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAI 1000 – 1810). Those Standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgements, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatements of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the University's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the University's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. Section 111 of the Universities Act, No. 16 of 1978 gives discretionary powers to the Auditor General to determine the scope and extent of the audit.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my audit opinion.

1.4 Basis for Qualified Opinion

My opinion is qualified based on the matters described in paragraph 2.2 of this report.

2. Financial Statements

2.1 Qualified Opinion

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matters described in paragraph 2.2 of this report, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the University of Colombo as at 31 December 2017 and its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

2.2 Comments on Financial Statements

2.2.1 Non-disclosure of Transactions with related Parties

A Company Limited by Guarantee named Colombo Science and Technology Cell had been registered under the Companies Act, No.7 of 2007 in the year 2013 on the recommendation of the University Grants Commission and the Minister of Higher Education without the approval of the Cabinet of Ministers contrary to the Universities Act, No.16 of 1978.

The membership of the Board of Directors of this Company is held by 09 Lecturers including the Dean of the Faculty of Science of the University of Colombo.

The Head Office of this Company had been housed in a building belonging to the Faculty of Science of the University and the other physical and human resources including computer accessories of the University had been utilized, whereas an agreement had not been entered into on the utilization of the property of the University. Only a sum of Rs.246,144 had been paid to the University in lieu of the utilization of the resources of the University during the year under review.

2.2.2 Accounting Deficiencies

The following observations are made.

- (a) In the comparison of reports on Boards of Survey with the invoices relating to the year 2017 of the Maintenance Division, differences were noted between the prices of units of goods indicated therein. Accordingly, the value of the stock subjected to sample test as at 31 December 2017 had been over computed by Rs.9,088,403. Moreover, a stock valued at Rs.16,819 remained physically in the stores of the said Division, had not been shown as closing stocks in accounts.
- (b) A stock valued at Rs.10,804,891 remained as at 31 December 2017 in the Faculty of Medicine and the Faculty of Science. However, that stock had not been shown in accounts as the closing stock.
- (c) Advances totalling Rs.223,050 granted in 02 instances in the year 2017 which remained unsettled as at 31 December 2017, had been brought to account as an expenditure instead of showing as unsettled advances in the financial statements.
- (d) The following deficiencies were observed in the examination of the cash flow statement.
 - (i) In addition to the value of Government grants shown under financial activities, unspent capital grants valued at Rs.542,597,096 which was a transfer between accounts of reserves and funds, had been adjusted as receipts of cash in the cash flow statement. Moreover, foreign currency profits valued at Rs.363,760 not received to the University under investment activities, had not been included.
 - (ii) Even though the balance of Rs.146,808 remained in a savings account, should be shown under cash and cash equivalents in the statement of financial position, it had been shown under investments.

- (iii) The sums of Rs.2,139,915 and Rs.174,478,148 shown as other receivables and advances respectively under non-current assets in the statement of financial position, had been shown under difference in working capital in preparing the cash flow statement.

2.2.3 Unexplained Differences

The following observations are made.

- (a) According to the Register of Sundry Advances relating to the Faculty of Science, the unsettled balance as at 31 December 2017 amounted to Rs.298,963. However, the balance shown in the financial statements amounted to Rs.358,963, thus observing a difference of Rs.60,000 in the value of advances.
- (b) Even though the balance of the Savings Account on Collection of Income from Courses amounted to Rs.690,282 as at 31 December 2017. However, according to the Letter of Confirmation of Bank Balances, the said balance was Rs.7,091,000, thus observing a difference of Rs.6,400,718.

2.3 Accounts Receivable and Payable

The following observations are made.

- (a) Out of the loan amounting to Rs.3,711,000 granted by the University to 15 officers, loan balances of Rs.1,348,995 remain between a period of 02 years and 15 years and those loan balances could not be recovered.
- (b) Out of the advances granted in the years 2015, 2016 and 2017 as Amalgamated Club Loan for settling of expenses relating to the Annual Sport meet of the University, a balance of Rs.4,474,645 had not been settled even by 14 September 2018, the date of Audit.

2.4 Non-compliance with Laws, Rules, Regulations and Management Decisions

The following non-compliances with Laws, Rules, Regulations and Management Decisions were observed.

(ii) Financial Regulation 371 In granting advances, the maximum limit of advances
and the Public Finance that can be granted at a time is Rs.100,000. Even
Circular No.03/2015 dated though advances totalling Rs.412,619 ranging from
14 July 2015 Rs.130,618 to Rs.150,000 in 03 instances in the
Sripalee Campus and advances totalling
Rs.4,153,393 ranging from Rs.150,422 to Rs.369,150
in 14 instances to 16 officers of the University had
been granted, the approval required therefor had not
been obtained.

Even though the advances should be settled immediately after the completion of the purpose for which it is granted, advances totalling Rs.361,540 obtained in 06 instances by the Sripalee Campus had not been settled even by 10 January 2018 and it was observed that the unsettled period ranged from 13 days to 12 months. Moreover, it was observed that advances valued at Rs.2,411,812 granted to persons and institutions by the University in 22 instances in the years 2012, 2016 and 2017, had not been settled even by 17 August 2018, the date of Audit. Further, action had not been taken even up to 14 September

2018 to settle a sum of Rs.804,260 granted in the year under review as advances to the Lecturers for research purposes

(c) **Universities Establishments**

- (i) Sections 3.1 and 3.2 of Chapter XX
- Even though the arrival and departure of all the academic and non-academic staff of the University should be recorded, the arrival and leave of 821 academic officers could not be verified. As such, the accuracy of salaries and allowances totalling Rs.822,509,565 could not be verified.
- (ii) Section 11.1 of Chapter XXII
- The Tribunal/Inquiry Officer should as far as possible sit continuously from day to day until a conclusion is arrived at, and the inquiry should be completed within three months. However, the disciplinary inquiry relating to a Lecturer interdicted on 25 April 2016 had not been concluded even up to March 2018 and a period of 01 year and 10 months had lapsed therefor.
- (iii) Section 3 of Chapter XXVI
- According to the report on Board of Survey on Library Books conducted in the year 2015 in the Sripalee Campus, 713 books valued at Rs.162,311 and 06 books valued at US\$ 126 had been misplaced and action had not been taken in terms of relevant Regulations relating to the lost books.
- (d) University Grants Commission Circular No.636 dated 14 July 1995
- In the issue of examination results, they should be issued within a period of 03 months from the date the examination was held. Nevertheless, a period between 05 and 12 months had lapsed for issuing

results of 06 examinations held during the year under review by the Sripalee Campus.

3. Financial Review

3.1 Financial Results

According to the financial statements presented, the financial result of the University for the year ended 31 December 2017 had resulted in a surplus of Rs.100,339,281 as compared with the corresponding surplus of Rs.176,157,091 for the preceding year, thus indicating a decline of Rs.75,817,810 in the financial result of the year under review as compared with the preceding year. Even though the Government grants and other grants had increased by Rs.143,645,382, the increase in the employees remuneration by Rs.274,467,864 had been the main reason for the above decline.

In the analysis of the financial results for the year under review and 4 preceding years, the surplus which was Rs.214,339,468 of the year 2013 had been Rs.100,339,281 with fluctuations by the year 2017. However, after readjusting the employees' remuneration, depreciation and tax paid to the Government to the financial result, the contribution of Rs.1,788,616,882 of the University for the year 2013 had continuously increased up to Rs.3,198,399,374 in the year under review.

3.2 Legal Action instituted by or against the University

Thirty seven legal proceedings relating to the University of Colombo had remained without being concluded from the year 2000 to 31 December 2017 and these legal proceedings belonged to a period ranging from 03 years to 17 years. Moreover, a sum of Rs.3,373,674 had been spent as legal fees for the year under review.

4. Operating Review

4.1 Performance

4.1.1 Function and Review

A building in the Colombo University premises had been allocated for the Virtual Campus University of Colombo – Coordinating Centre (VCUC – CC) since the year 2016. Moreover, assets valued at Rs.1,341,239 had been purchased in the years 2013, 2014 and 2015 by the Higher Education for the Twenty First Century Project (HETC). However, the assets purchased had remained idle due to failure in recruiting the staff approved for the year 2012.

4.2 Management Activities

The following observations are made.

- (a) The Bhikku Hostel of the University is maintained in a private building on lease rent from the year 2006 and a sum of Rs.3,900,000 had been paid for the year 2017 at a monthly rate of Rs.325,000. Even though clauses that the repairs of the hostel should be carried out by the lessee, was included in the lease agreement entered into on 18 January 2017, the hostel had not been repaired for many years. As such, the bathrooms and toilets had become unusable and the walls had become discoloured. A sum of Rs.25,555,000 had been paid as rent up to the end of the year under review for the hostel maintained on rental basis for over a period of 10 years. Even though the University was permanently in need of a Bhikku Hostel, it was observed that the said purpose had not been achieved even up to now.
- (b) In the examination of files on repairs of motor vehicles, notes relating to repairs identified as motor vehicle accidents and direct accidents were available in files. However, action had not been taken in terms of Section 6 of the Universities Establishments Code in this connection. It is observed that the impossibility of revealing information on accidents exists and that the

opportunity of claiming insurance coverage for repairs is also lost due to failure in taking action relating to accidents in such a manner.

- (c) Goods relating to 34 orders valued at Rs.1,917,285 sent to suppliers from January to November 2017 had not been supplied to stores even up to 31 December 2017. It had been informed to Audit that the said orders had been cancelled after the audit queries.
- (e) Even though the enrolment of 515 students was possible to the Faculty of Science, the number of students that had been enrolled for the academic year 2017 was only 404. Accordingly, it was observed that 111 students were deprived of the opportunity in entering University.
- (f) Sripalee Campus
- (i) The Boys' Hostel and 3 lecture halls of the Campus are very old and as repairs had not been carried out from a long period, it was observed that they were not in a condition fit enough for the students to proceed with their studies.
- (ii) It was observed that there was a lack of space facilities and minimum common facilities in the administrative building and a risk of cracking and sinking of a part of the building. In this condition, provisions of Rs.149.47 million had been made by the Ministry of Higher Education on 28 October 2016 on Cabinet approval for construction of a new building. However, necessary action had not been taken up to 08 October 2018 to construct the building.
- (iii) The Campus was not equipped with a gallery fit for the studies of students and even though lighting is necessary for practical examinations of students, the University had not provided them with those facilities.

- (iv) According to Work Norms and Time Tables, in the comparison of the number of lecture hours that should be conducted by each Lecturer with the number of lecture hours that should be conducted actually, instances were observed in which the number of lecture hours mentioned in the time table was not covered by the Lecturers.
- (v) Even though the academic affairs and examinations should be conducted on a year planner, it was observed that 05 examinations had been held for 04 Courses without such an expected date.

4.3 Operating Activities

According to financial statements, the value of goods which can be auctioned was shown as Rs.2,888,935 and out of that, goods valued at Rs.1,455,582 were those which had been decided to be auctioned in the years 2014 and 2016. However, those goods had not been auctioned even up to the end of the year under review.

4.4 Breach of Agreements and Bonds

A sum of Rs.43,349,296 was recoverable as at 31 December 2017 due to breach of agreements by 32 Lecturers. The balance of Rs.18,358,698 recoverable from 10 Lecturers out of them had lapsed for a period ranging from 21 to 40 years. Nevertheless, no amount whatsoever had been recovered.

4.5 Staff Administration

The following observations are made.

(a) Academic Staff

The number of approved posts in the academic staff stood at 753 while the number of vacancies as at the end of the year under review stood at 190. Out of these, 30 posts of Senior Professor and Professor had been vacant and a sum of Rs.143,602,216 had been paid for obtaining the service of 263 visiting Lecturers in the year 2017.

(b) Non-academic Staff

- (i) The approved cadre of the Non-academic staff stood at 1,119 while 278 posts were vacant as at 31 December of the year under review. Out of 301 approved posts of Management Assistant, 66 were vacant. Moreover, the Vice Chancellor had informed the Audit that there are delays due to filling these vacancies through the Register sent by the Ministry of Higher Education.
- (ii) Five and 19 posts of Technical Officer and Technical Officer (Information Communication) respectively had been vacant and no Scheme of Recruitment had been issued by the Commission for the posts of Technical Officer (Information Communication). As such, the Vice Chancellor had informed the Audit that the said vacancies could not be filled.
- (iii) In addition to his duties, a Senior Lecturer of the Faculty of Law of the University had been appointed to the post of Senior Legal Consultant which was not included in the approved cadre, on a decision taken at the 499th meeting of the Council held on 9 September 2015 and he had been paid a sum of Rs.12,000,000 in the year under review from the Administration Fund.

4.6 Utilization of Motor Vehicles

In terms of University Grants Commission Circular No.13/2015 dated 18 September 2015, the posts such as Vice Chancellor, Registrar, Bursar, Librarian and Dean are entitled to official motor vehicles. Even though payments should be made by adding the fuel allowance to the monthly salary for motor vehicles allocated for them, fuel had been supplied for allocated motor vehicles by University fuel orders without paying as an allowance. Accordingly, it was observed that fuel had been supplied by fuel orders, exceeding the monthly fuel allowance. Even though the fuel allowance payable from January to August 2017 for 07 officers amounted to Rs.1,053,540, the value of fuel supplied by orders amounted to Rs.2,345,437. As such, it was observed that a sum of Rs.1,291,897 had been spent in excess over the entitled fuel allowance.

5. Sustainable Development

5.1 Achievement of Sustainable Development Goals

The University of Colombo was aware of the Year 2030 “Agenda” of the United Nations on sustainable development and had taken action to identify the goals and targets, focal points in reaching those targets and the indicators for achievement of those targets. Activities necessary for the implementation of objectives such as poverty alleviation programmes, budgeting according to gender equality, empowerment of disabled persons, enhancement of environmental sustainability and conservation of water and energy had been commenced in the year 2017.

6. Accountability and Good Governance

6.1 Budgetary Control

Variances ranging from 40 per cent to 153 per cent were observed between the budgeted expenditure and actual expenditure relating to 20 Recurrent Objects. Provisions of Rs.52,902,908 received from the Treasury for the projects of Empowerment of Research, Internationalization of Universities, Improvement of Knowledge and Institutional Development and Human Capital Projects under capital grants had been transferred to the Objects of Improvement of Buildings and Acquisition of Fixed Assets during the year. As such, it was observed that the budget had not been prepared and reviewed from time to time and made use of as a realistic instrument of control.

7. Systems and Controls

Deficiencies in systems and controls observed during the course of audit were brought to the notice of the Vice Chancellor of the University from time to time. Special attention is needed in respect of the following areas of control.

2.2.1		It was assigned to the Secretary to the Ministry at the 93 rd meeting of the Public Affairs, held on the 04 th July 2017 at 2.30 p.m. at the Action Committee Room No 05, to take action in this regard.
2.2.2		
(a)		In the month of June 2018, the stock value was corrected by the correction of measuring unit
(b)		These stocks are chemicals. In the year 2018, steps have been taken to conduct a stock verification and to take these into accounts.
(d)		In the year 2018 internal control systems has been set up to avoid these errors.

(i)		Do not agree. This was not a money transfer between accounts, but was included in the government grants, as it was received as cash receipts. 			<p>recommendations made by the Committee appointed by the Vice Chancellor have been placed before the Management Committee meeting held on 16.08.2018. Based on the recommendations of the Management Committee, action will be taken in the future.</p> <p>The rent for the official quarters given to the Registrar of the University of Colombo has been recovered by the University from the year 2001. The Council of the University at its 487th meeting held on 10.09.2014 decided to assign that as the Official Residence of the Registrar and decided not to recover the rent in respect of that residence. As such, monthly rental for the official residence of the Registrar has not been recovered from the Registrar from 01.12.2014. [Annexure 2.4 (a), (i)]</p>
			<p>As recommended by the Committee appointed by the Vice Chancellor, the officers who have been staying in the official quarters over five (05) years to be vacated from the official residences after giving three months' notice. This recommendation has been placed before the University Management Committee held on 14.08.2018. Based on the recommendations of the Management Committee, action will be taken in the future.</p>

			<p>A preliminary inquiry was held against the driver who drives KR-2293. Accordingly, based on this preliminary inquiry report and the Police report, salary increment of the driver's has already been suspended and in lieu of the cost of damages caused to vehicle, the insurer, the Sri Lanka Insurance Cooperation, by way of its cheque No. 662672 dated 26.11.2018 paid to the University an amount of Rs. 3,596,050.00 as insurance compensation.</p>
			<p>In terms of the circular the maximum advances payable shall be Rs. 100,000.00 and action will be taken in accordance to that limit. Further, in the future according to the service requirements it is intended to discuss with the Treasury officials regarding the need to obtain advances over and above the maximum limit.</p>

			From now on, according to the Financial Regulations 371, the academic staff members and other officers have been informed to settle the advances immediately after the completion of the event.

			<p>According to the semester system and the continuous evaluation methods in place, the Academic staff members' works in accordance with the practical practices for academic activities and the time of relevant lectures and according to the required research and library services etc.</p> <p>Further, kindly note that each lecturer's time of arrival and departure has been confirmed through the students attendance records obtained at the end of each lectures.</p>
			<p>While Mr. Chandana Kasthuriarachchi was serving as the Head of the Department in the Department of Social Sciences of the Faculty of Education, University of Colombo, a written complaint was lodged by 18 academic staff members, including the Dean of the Faculty, that he had behaved in an unruly and unethical manner towards the other fellow lecturers, staff members and students. After the Complaint was placed before the Council of the University of Colombo at its 502nd meeting held on 11-11-2015, the Council decided to appoint a committee to conduct a preliminary inquiry. The Preliminary Inquiry was started on January 16, 2016 and consequent to the inquiry, a report was placed before the Council at its 507th meeting held on 22-04-2016, and it was decided to interdict him with half pay with immediate effect. On the approval of the Council at its 511th meeting held on 20.07.2016, Mr. Kasthuriarachchi was issued with a charge sheet requesting him to submit his reply on 25.08.2016.</p> <p>Subsequently, in order to conduct the formal Disciplinary Inquiry, an Inquiry Officer and a Prosecuting Officer were appointed as approved by the Council at its 512th meeting held on 19-08-2016, and in the meantime, Mr. Kasthuriarachchi has appointed his own Defense Officer. Later, Mr. Kasthuriarachchi sought permission to replace his previously appointed Defense Officer and thereafter having obtained the approval, on 21.11.2016 with concurrence of all the parties concerned, the Inquiry was commenced.</p>

			<p>On the first day of the Disciplinary Inquiry, the Defense Officer of Mr. Kasthuarachchi raised an objection with regard to the charge sheet issued against him and accordingly, as the charge sheet had to be amended and to be issued in the Sinhala language, and in order to grant necessary time the Council approval was obtained and again the Charge Sheet was issued on 28.02.2016 in the Sinhala language.</p> <p>In conducting disciplinary inquiry against any employees, the approval of the Council needs to be obtained in accordance with the provisions of the Establishments Code of the University Grants Commission. However, the Council meets only once a month, hence following the above procedure takes considerable time and the period of three (03) months shown in the Establishment Code is not sufficient, and if actions were taken without the approval of the Council, it could lead to be challenged at the Courts on the validity of the decision. Similarly, due to the non-academic staff strike in the university system, disciplinary investigations could not be conducted for nearly two (02) months.</p> <p>Further, in determining the date and time for the inquiry, the convenience of the Inquiry Officer, Prosecuting Officer, Defending Officer and the witnesses are considered and fixed on mutual agreement, and fixing such a date and time was not an easy task. Even on the dates fixed so, there were instances on several occasions due to an inconvenience as a result of personal or official requirements of a lawyer, the Inquiry had been postponed, and again getting a date for next date of trial too had resulted in the same way.</p> <p>However, hitherto 33 trials have have been already held and from the accused officer's side still some more witnesses are scheduled to be summoned. Again the inquiry has been scheduled to be held on 15.10.2018.</p> <p>The university has taken all the steps to conclude the disciplinary inquiry as soon as possible. When conducting the disciplinary inquiry each and every witness had to face preliminary examination, cross examination, and re-examination, and as it cannot be determined beforehand or fair, the university was not in a position to limit the number of examinations.</p>
			<p>In order to write off the lost books from the inventory, approval of the Finance Committee was sought and according to its approval 391.4.2.3, the lost books have now been written off from the Library Inventory.</p>

			By now all the results of the relevant examinations have been released. Furthermore, in the future action will be taken to release the results within three (03) months.

Especially, breach of contract and bond violation case lawsuits are transferred to the District Court, acting in accordance to the legal procedures such as sending proxies, summoning witnesses, hearing cross examinations, filing appeals against judgments in higher courts, etc., takes time and a definite timeframe cannot be determined as to when the case could be concluded.</p> <p>E.g. In a case that was filed in the District Court in 1997, in connection with a breach of contract and bond violation the judgment was given in the year 1007, and since then, the case has not been concluded as a result of appeals made to the Supreme Court.</p> <p>Furthermore, when fixing a date for next hearing, a mutually convenient date and time convenient to all parties concerned and to the court itself has to be decided and the recourse is likely to take place again in three or six months. 		<p>Attend to the repairs of the bhikku hostel has been included as a condition clause in the lease agreement signed for the hostel. In addition, payment of monthly rent has been delayed. The owner of the house has carried some maintenance activities that had been pointed out by the university. Though he had not caused enough repairs. Please note that as the bhikku students refused to go to another hostel, We have to rent the Green Path house again and again.</p> <p>Although a bhikku hostel is required for the University of Colombo, it has been delayed due to the fact that a suitable land could not be found for the construction of this building and in the letter sent to the Chairman of the University Grants Commission by the Vice Chancellor on 09.05.2018, the need for a Bhikku Hostel was highlighted and so far no response has been received yet.</p> <p>As the Green Path house is used as a Bhikku hostel, other students could be admitted to it and because of the reason Bhikku students continued their objections it has been impossible to rent another house. However, even though on several occasions it has been advertised to obtain them another suitable house, it was not possible to obtain a suitable house for this purpose. This has led to the continuation of renting this Green Path hostel.</p>
(b)		<p>When a university vehicle meets with an accident, a separate file is opened and the relevant information is included in to file to take steps to claim compensation through the Sri Lanka Insurance Corporation for the damages caused to the vehicle.</p>
(c)		<p>Of the orders that had been sent to the supplier from January to November 2017, the items relevant to 07 orders amounting to Rs. 741,423.65 have been received by December 2017, and the items relevant to the balance 27 orders have not been received and steps have been taken to cancel those orders (the relevant document is attached) [Annexure 4.2 (c)]</p>
(d)		<p>The students, for all the courses of the university, are selected and sent by the University Grants Commission. This happens in several stages. However, all the students selected and sent by the University Grants Commission do not register themselves. Therefore, there are vacancies. Since there are practical and theoretical courses in the Faculty of Science the University Grants Commission has been informed that students could not be registered after two weeks from the date of commencement of the</p>

		academic year. However, there are instances where students were registered even after that two weeks period on the special approval from the Dean of the Faculty of Science.

(i)		By now all the repairs have been completed.
(ii)		For the procurement processes for the administrative building, there was a decision, to prepare the bidding documents internally within the university and due that there was time delay. By now for the preparation of procurement document, a Works Engineer has been appointed and It has been reported at the 192 nd meeting of the Planning and Development Committee that the relevant documents were due to be submitted on 28.09.2018. Accordingly, steps have taken to expedite the matter.
(iii)		By now the documents related to the procurement of Lightning Protection System has been submitted to the Procurement Committee.
(iv)		The numbers of lecture hours have been completed, but the above observations appear to have been occurred due to lack of relevant documentation. By now necessary steps have been taken to duly maintain the relevant attendance registers for lectures.
(v)		The 5 examinations mentioned here were conducted in relation to external courses (Masters, Postgraduate Diploma and Certificate Courses). The majority of these students are employed in media institutions and when there were clashes between their official duties and the dates of examinations, having considered their requests dates of examination have to be changed. Steps will be taken to avoid these situations as much as possible in the future.

The university had taken various steps to find the present addresses of seven (07) of these lecturers, but their addresses could be traced. Hence, legal action could not be taken against them. Therefore, at the 385th meeting of the Finance Committee held on 08-12-2017, it was decided to write off these amounts as bad debts.

Of them Mr. RMH Sooriyapala has credited a sum of Rs. 197,275.80 bond money to the credit of the account of the university on 19.09.2018.

The bond agreement of Mr. EC Vasanthan amounting to Rs. 6,229,073.24 and the Attorney Generals' Department has been informed to take legal action against him to recover that amount on 09-01-2012. The Attorney

		<p>Generals' Department has also send Letters of Demands to recover that money from Mr. EC Vasanthan and his sureties.</p> <p>Although, the amount of the scholarship received by Mr. EC Vasanthan was inquired again through the Ministry of Health by the Attorney Generals' Department on 22-02-2013, no response was received in that regard. According to a decision taken by the University Legal Sub-Committee, the relevant parties have been informed again to find out the details about the scholarship.</p> <p>By now, by releasing the funds that were lying in to the credit to Mrs. F.M.D. Gunarathne's Universities Provident Fund and Pension Fund, a sum of Rs. 372,243.85 and Rs. 144,166.86 have been recovered by the University on 30.08.2018 and 07.09.2018 respectively. To recover the remaining balance Mrs. FMD Gunarathne has been informed.</p> <p>Of the amount of Rs. 2,931,113.58 due from Mrs. H.M.H. 		<p>Of the 753 approved number of cadre, as at 31.12.2017 there were 563 lecturers and the vacancies were only 190.</p> <p>Even though the vacancies were 190, It has been taken faculty, department and unit wise and shown as the overall total. In the University there are nine (09) faculties and under which there are departments and units amounting to 69. The total number of vacancies within a department or unit would have been a very small number like one or two.</p>
		<p>Moreover, due to the retirements, resignations, and leaving of posts taking place each year, recruitments also taking place and the occurrence of relative vacancies cannot be avoided. During the year 2017, some vacancies occurred in the staff through seven (07) retirements, 03 resignations, 01 vacation of post, and 02 deaths.</p> <p>Further, the recruitment method for the suitable recruitment of academic staff is a long process. (i)		<p>Table 1 – the explanations regarding the filling of vacancies in the posts shown as Annexure 4.5 (b) -1 are given below.</p> <p>Action has been taken to obtain the necessary approvals for the relevant leaving of posts (retirements, resignations, promotions, dismissals, transfers) and by now relevant approval has already been granted.</p> <p>Due to the Local Authorities election for the period from 01.12.2017 to 01.02.2018 (03 months) recruitments had to be suspended temporarily.</p> <p>The filling of vacancies in the post of Management Assistant should be carried out from a list of candidates obtained from the Ministry of Higher Education. However, all the vacancies were not filled due to the following reasons or as the applicants in the names list had not fulfilled the following requirements.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • the delay in receiving the names lists from the Ministry • The number of applicants in the lists are inadequate to fill all the vacancies • Some of the candidates in the names list do not have the basic educational qualifications • failure to pass the written recruitment examination • failure to demonstrate adequate skills at the interviews • There were 66 vacancies in the post of Management Assistant and of which only 70% of the vacancies could be filled. The remaining 30% of the vacancies are allocated to be filled by the University Grants Commission by promotion by calling applications from the junior employees. <p>However, by the end of the year 2017, 26 vacancies in the post of Management Assistant were filled.</p>
(ii)		<p>The University Grants Commission has not yet issued a Scheme of Recruitment for post of Technical Officer (Information and Communication Technology) to fill the vacancies in the post. Therefore, despite the approval of 19 posts, it has not been possible fill the vacancies. The University Grants Commission has already been informed to make available the relevant Scheme of Recruitment as soon as possible.</p>

		<p>According to the Scheme of Recruitment, to be recruited to the post of Technical Officer, the prospective candidate should have passed the GCE (A/L) Science stream and completed one year of technical training. However, most of the applicants in the list received from the Ministry of Higher Education did not have satisfied these qualifications. As an alternative, the Council has approved to recruit on contract basis without the one year of training and recruit to the permanent posts after obtaining the required qualification. Accordingly, three (03) candidates from the list received from the Ministry of Higher Education were appointed on permanent basis and 13 were selected to be appointed on contract basis.</p> <p>As per the reasons indicated above in I, II and III, there are 24 vacancies in the Technical Officer post at the end of the year 2017.</p> <p>Further, by now for the recruitment to the post of Technical Officer two (02) names lists have been received from the Ministry of Higher Education and it is further learned that steps have been taken to conduct the selection examination to recruit from the internal candidates and as well as those who are in the said lists.</p>
(iii)		<p>As there are large number of cases against the University as well as filed by the University, and having considered the importance of the need for a senior legal advisor to handle the legal affairs, the Council of the University at its 499th meeting held on 09.09.2015 decided to appoint Mr. N. Selvakkumaran, who has extensive experience in the field of law and serving as a Senior Lecturer Grade I and as the Dean of the Faculty of Law for a long time, as the Senior Legal Advisor, and to pay him a monthly allowance for his services, in addition to his duties in the substantive post. Accordingly, the payments have been made according to an appointment made on contract basis.</p> <p>[Annexure 4.5 (b), (iii)]</p>

		<p>For the official vehicles assigned to the officers, fuel has been provided through university fuel orders made under the approval of the Council. Unlike other state offices, in our university, which offers student centered education, where continuing education is to be maintained, this is the most efficient way of doing things.</p>



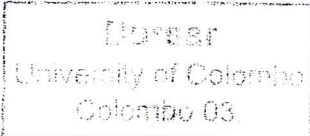


