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## THE EMBLEM OF THE UNIVERSITY



The emblem of the University takes the form of a circle with three concentric circles placed close together on the periphery, all on a background of yellow. In the center of this circle is a smaller concentric circle enclosing a full bloom lotus, *Nelumbo nucifera*, in abstract form, and consisting of two tiers of petals one underneath the other. In the center of the circle, stylized stamens enclosed in two concentric circles surround the receptacle. Between the outer set of concentric circles and the central lotus is a wide circular band carrying the motto of the University on the upper half of the band, while the name of the University appears in the lower half, both written in Sinhala characters. The motto, taken from an ancient Buddhist text, reads;

*Vijja Uppatatam Settha*

(‘among all that rise knowledge is greatest’)

## REVIEW OF VICE CHANCELLOR

### BRIEF INTRODUCTION

The history of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura goes as far back as 1873 when the Most Venerable Chief Incumbent, Hikkaduwe Sri Sumangala Thero established this distinguished centre of learning as a “Pirivena” (Institute of Buddhist and Oriental Studies) named “Vidyodaya” meaning “Awakening of Knowledge”.

The University of Sri Jayewardenepura commenced on 16th February 1959 as the Vidyodaya University with the enactment of the Vidyodaya University and Vidyalandara University Act No. 45 of 1958. At the inception the University was located in Maligakanda and was shifted in 1961 to the present location. In 1972, with the enactment of the University of Ceylon Act No. 1, Vidyodaya University was given the name Vidyodaya Campus, as all universities were called campuses under that decree. But it was revised again in 1978, and Universities Act No.16 of 1978 made them universities. With this turn, Vidyodaya Campus was named University of Sri Jayewardenepura.

### COMPOSITION OF THE UNIVERSITY

The present faculty composition of the university is five : the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences, Faculty of Applied Sciences, Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce, Faculty of Medical Sciences and the Faculty of Graduate Studies. The previous year, necessary action was taken for the establishment of two more faculties namely the Faculty of Engineering and Faculty of Technology. During the year under review much has been done in their progress.

Apart from these the Postgraduate Institute of Management (PIM) located in Colombo 8, is also affiliated to the University of Sri Jayewardenepura.

In addition, the university has also been entrusted with a block of 40ha from the Yagirala Forest Reserve which is managed by the Sri Lanka Forest Department. This area is given to the Department of Forestry and Environmental Studies of the Faculty of Applied Sciences for promoting education and research. There is also a Research Centre built by the university which helps the researchers and those who have an educational interest in this area. It also serves as a Visitor Centre for the public who prefer to gain experience in rainforest life along with the surrounding villagers.

The Faculty of Medical Sciences offers Medical and Para-Medical Degrees and two State Hospitals, namely, Colombo South Teaching Hospital, Kalubowila and Sri Jayewardenepura General Hospital, Sri Jayewardenepura are functioning as Teaching Hospitals of the Faculty.

The university is also a part of the “World Class University Project”, which is initiated and funded by the Ministry of Higher Education, taking progressive steps to improve the quality of our institution.

Since the establishment of the University Seven (07) Chancellors and Twenty Four (24) Vice-Chancellors have been appointed by the President of the Democratic Republic of Sri Lanka to the University of Sri Jayewardenepura as given in Table 1.

## SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

### INTER-UNIVERSITY CHAMPIONSHIP GAMES

This year was a very successful one for the sports sector. The University won the entire championship for the first time in the games' history. Excepting a few events, the players were able to win all other events, which resulted in a huge difference margin with those at the second place, in the overall win.

### RESEARCH AWARDS

In an effort to encourage and promote research culture within the university, the first ever Research Awards Ceremony was held on 18th November 2015, for research done in year 2014. The winners were chosen under different categories among both veteran and new researchers, and it also included a Best Researcher Award.

### CEREMONIAL REMEMBRANCE OF FOUNDERS

Commemorations of the founder of this University, then known as Vidyodaya Pirivena, Most Venerable Hikkaduwe Sri Sumangala Thero, and the first Vice-Chancellor of this University Most Venerable Welivitiye Soratha Thero were held on 29th April 2015 and 17th July 2015 by Rev. Dr. Kirinde Assaji Thero and Emeritus Professor Malani Endagama respectively.

### FACULTIES OF TECHNOLOGY AND ENGINEERING

The establishment of the two new Faculties, i.e. Faculties of Technology and Engineering took another step forward with the receipt of UGC approval during the year under review.

### REFURBISHED ENTRANCE GATE

As the first project to be completed from the Township Project, the renewed entrance gate was ceremonially opened on 26th November 2015.

### NEW LOCATION FOR EXTERNAL EXAMINATIONS UNIT

The External Examinations Unit was shifted to its new location after acquiring the property facing the University. It was declared open on 11th July 2015.





## THE WORLD CLASS UNIVERSITY PROJECT (WCUP) – AN OVERVIEW YEAR OF 2015



Background: WCUP objectives were to focus on four parts which serves as measures for the University ranking: (A) 60% on Research and Citation (B) 2.5% on International Outlook (C) 7.5% on Industry Outcome (D) 30% on Teaching. The world ranking (WR): At the time the Present Director took over office WR was at 5,969 in July 2013, by 2014 July was 3090 (upliftment of 2879 positions) during which period 14 workshops conducted by the WCUP with the participation of international academics (Around 40). The fall of WR by 1192 from 2014 July to 2015 July, has been revised by 530 upliftment to 3752 during which period International workshop was held with 32 international faculty and 11 international participants ) (All International travel awards received by foreign funding bodies).

**Funds distributed:** 46,953,560 LKR in 2011 to 2013 for 19 for PhD research projects and 92,325,688.39LKR for laboratory equipments and other expenditure till July, 2013.

MoU Signing for between University of Sri Jayewardenepura (USJP) and; Northern Kentucky University (NKU), USA on 10th June 2015



A 7 day IBRO- APCR neuroscience workshop was organised at USJP on December, 2015 with participation of Honorable Ministers, 32 internationally acclaimed academics from Harvard Medical School, University of Cambridge, European Graduate School for Neuroscience, Netherland,, Washington DC, Jiao Tong University Shanghai, China, Kyoto Prefectural University, Japan etc. and clinicians, 11 international participants, 35 from Sri Lanka with more than 100 participants for each of 5 symposia: As a reflection of the symposium on “The use of natural products in health” Sri Lankan government released as Rs. 50 million to fund research Ceylon cinnamon.



## FACULTY OF MANAGEMENT STUDIES AND COMMERCE

The Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce is the pioneering management faculty in Sri Lankan university system which is regarded as the Centre of Excellence in Management Education in Sri Lanka. Yet, the Faculty's role in Sri Lankan higher education sector is not restricted to the undergraduate education. The Faculty is also committed to Continuous Professional Developments and Lifelong Learning of the leaders in the World of Work. Therefore, it offers – in collaboration with the Faculty of Graduate Studies – a range of highly recognized postgraduate programmes, including PhD, MBA, MPA and M.Sc. in Management. ## FACULTY OF GRADUATE STUDIES

Faculty of Graduate Studies (FGS) in the University of Sri Jayewardenepura was established in 1996 under the provisions of the Faculty of Graduate Studies Ordinance No. 3 of 1987. Since then this Faculty expanded with its activities by bringing all the postgraduate courses of the university under its purview and coordination. Initially it was established in temporary building of the university and then shifted to a new building on 18th October 2010 with all the modern facilities to meet the postgraduate work.

FGS functional model differs from the existing undergraduate faculty model. FGS consist of Study Boards instead of Departments. These Study Boards are the active decision making units of the Faculty. Initially there were six Study Boards and a new Study Board which focuses on multidisciplinary studies was established in 2011 with the senate & council approvals. The seven Study Boards of the faculty are given below:

- Humanities
- Social Sciences
- Management and Commerce
- Life Sciences
- Physical sciences
- Medical Sciences
- Multidisciplinary studies

With the establishment of two new faculties ie. Engineering and Technology, there would be two new study boards added to the existing structure.

FGS model is focused to initiate multidisciplinary research activities among the members of the Study Boards interactively as the study boards consist of mixture of academics from various disciplines from the different faculties.

Each Study Board is chaired by a senior academic with a high level of professional caliber. The members of the study boards are the academic members of the university who are actively involved in research work, postgraduate supervision. Those who serve as the coordinators in postgraduate programs are also included in the Study Boards.

The decisions taken in the above seven Study Boards will be taken up for discussion, further consideration and for recommendation to the approval of the Senate by the Faculty Board meeting chaired by the Dean of the Faculty.

Faculty Board of the Graduate Studies consist of the deans of all four faculties, three senate nominees, three council nominees and the Chairpersons of the Study Boards as invited members.

There are two major types of degree programs offered by the Faculty namely; the research degrees (Ph.D., M Phil, MA & M Sc) and degrees offered by course work where a research component also is involved.

The degrees with course work and a research component have been designed to provide necessary conceptual background to the candidate through lectures, required practical training, industrial training and field work in specific areas. These programs are offered at two levels namely; the postgraduate

diploma level or the M Sc, MBA, MPM, or MA. In some programs progression is possible from the postgraduate diploma to the Master level degrees.

Recently the Multidisciplinary Study Board initiated compulsory course units for the Ph D students. The students registered in this Study Board have to complete this course unit component during its first year and it is a requirement for the upgrading from M Phil status to Ph D level. Management Study Board also initiated a new Ph D Program and the candidates registered for this Ph.D. Program have to follow one year course work component before commencing their research project.

Faculty of Graduate Studies (FGS) has awarded 121 Ph D degrees, 160 M Phil degrees, 101 MA degrees, 1100 MSc degrees and 281 Master of Business Administration 1421 Postgraduate Diplomas from 1996 to 2015 and there is a significant increase of student numbers registered for postgraduate degrees.

The web page of the Faculty provides all the information of the faculty activities. It will be helpful for the candidates to get all the required information through the internet and make their decisions efficiently. A staff member is being trained to update the Faculty web site regularly. A Management Information System is being developed for the Faculty with a view to enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of the functions and to provide a high quality service to the students. A Learning Management System is also being developed for the Faculty which will facilitate both teachers and students to participate in the teaching learning process.

It is expected to take a strong initiative within the next five years to progress the FGS from its present status to a level of a Graduate School. It is envisaged that a Graduate School will have greater administrative and financial autonomy to conduct all the Faculty activities. Steps have been taken for this progression from 2014 onwards to reach its effective level at the end of 2020.

The following new developments have been introduced to the Faculty in 2015 with a view to further enhance the quality and relevance of postgraduate programs;

- Establishment of a Quality Assurance and Accreditation Cell in the Faculty
- Establishment of a Curriculum Development Committee comprising of members from Study Boards

With a view to produce a postgraduate with knowledge, skills and attitudes to contribute effectively to the nations development process, a separate program called 'Graduate Professional Skills' which is focused on communication, entrepreneurial, leadership, personnel effectiveness, teaching, teaching research related to seeking new knowledge and adaption of same for practical use has been introduced by the Faculty.

A University – Industry Hub is being established in the Faculty with the following short term and long term objectives;

*Identification of industrial research needs (Gap Analysis)*

*Develop courses to match the above requirement within the National Qualification Framework (NQF)*

*Create a platform to share and collect knowledge on research needs*

*Create formalized links with state sector relevant to different disciplines to share findings from the research platform in order to address national level/policy level decisions.*

Based on the above, following courses have been identified for further development to Postgraduate Diploma/Degree levels and will be offered through the Multidisciplinary Study Board.

- Corporate Sustainability
- Good Governance
- Counseling
- Technology

In addition to the above, measures have been taken to introduce on demand postgraduate certificate courses which will be tailor made to industry requirements and topical importance. Some of these courses will be offered with a on line component to reach a wider audience.

With a view to share knowledge across the disciplines, an international conference on Multidisciplinary approaches had been introduced in 2014. This will be further strengthened by the introduction of the Research Symposium of the Faculty of Graduate Studies from this year which will be a forum to present, debate and share research findings stemming from research in the different disciplines in the Faculty and outside. While adding novel knowhow to the national and global knowledge it will sharpen the soft skills of the researchers which is a vital aspect.

## PHYSICAL EDUCATION DIVISION

### **Introduction**

The formulation & implementation of sport activities for University students, training of sportsmen and sports women for 38 sport events and the organization of sport events are the main functions of the Physical education Division. Inter University tournaments, giving formal training for tournaments organized by the National Sports Association or international, the administration and maintenance of grounds for different games are the other activities of the Physical Education Department.

The present Acting Director of Physical Education is Mrs, Thamara Kumari Jayasekara. Mr. T.S.A. Amarasena, Mrs. N.Nishanthi Vidanage and Mrs. Ramani Kulathilaka serve as permanent sports instructors and Mr. Lal Chandrakumara serve as an instructor on contract basic and Mr. M.G.S.S.Keerthirathna serve as temporary instructor of Physical Education.

### **Objectives of the Physical Education Department**

1. To give an understanding on the values of Physical Education to internal students of the University and to give them a physical development through mental development.
2. To provide an opportunity for improvement of sports activities and skills.
3. To encourage sports participation by playing tournaments, with internal and external sports bodies.
4. To develop discipline by encouraging sports activities among students.

A Sports Advisory Board consisting of members of the academic and administrative staff. Sports council consisting of sports captains have been established for supporting sports activities in the University. Every year office bearers will be selected for the sports council.

### **Colours Award**



The Outdoor basketball court is situated next to the volleyball courts and is mainly a hard court made of tar. These are available for university students and staff members.




### **Tennis Courts**

The pool is available for university students, staff members, and for outsiders as well upon request.



### **Cricket Ground**

The University cricket pitch is mainly a grass surfaced 65m full length area. This well maintained ground has one matting pitch & two clay pitches. The ground has an adjacent one storied- pavilion & changing rooms with attached wash-rooms for players & referees. This ground is located in a very picturesque environment. ## LIBRARY

Under the direction of the Librarian Dr. Nayana Wijayasundara, 01 Deputy Librarian, 05 Senior Assistant Librarians, 02 Assistant Librarians (from 14.12.2015), 01 Assistant Registrar (Library Services), 01 Assistant Network Manager and 52 non-academic staff were carried out duties in the library.

During the year, 1190 books were purchased at a cost of Rs. 3,362,835.83 from the annual allocation and 62 foreign and local periodicals were purchased at a cost of Rs. 6,559,871.43. Two electronic databases JSTOR (at a cost of Rs. 854,872.82) and Research4life (at a cost of Rs. 132,143.40) were purchased. 1018 books (valued at Rs. 2,842,075.04) and 50 periodicals were received as donation and 15 periodicals on exchange basis.

In addition, access to 05 other electronic databases; Emerald, Taylor & Francis, Wiley Online, SAGE Research Methods, Oxford Journals, was provided to patrons through the UGC consortium, CONSAL.

During the year 2015, 2525 books were processed by the Processing Division and the amount consisted of 95 Ceylon Room (CR), 119 Permanent Reference (PR), 294 Scheduled Reference (SR) and 2017 Lending (L) books.

About 3,110 readers were registered including Academic Staff (53), Non-academic staff (39), Undergraduate students (2,700) and Diploma & Postgraduate students (318) during the year 2015. With that the total number of registered users was increased to 17,181.

The rate of fulfillment of Inter-library loan requests was 91.32%.

15 workshops were conducted by the library for the staff (05) and students (10) in order to enhance the awareness of information resources and information literacy skills.

During the year 2015, 02 PhD, 01 MSc., 01 PG diploma, 02 degree and 03 diploma studies were carrying out by the library staff.

Internal Audit Division is headed by the Deputy Internal Auditor. Audit program for the year is prepared and submitted to the University Council for its approval with recommendation of the Audit and Management Committee.

The Audit and Management committee appointed by and responsible to the Council Comprises of three Independent Non Executive direction members of Council.

It was headed by the Chairman who was the Council member of the University in the Non Executive capacity and consisted of two other Council members in the Non Executive capacity. In the year 2015 committee had met 5 (Five) times and discussed following important areas;

- a) Reviewing the existing systems, procedures and any deviations. Submitted suggestions to the Councils for its approval to improve the existing systems.
- b) Reviewing the queries raised by the Auditor General and the answers given by the relevant head of the Department. Matters were discussed with relevant head of the Dept. in order to ensure correct implementation and avoid repetition of such errors.
- c) Internal Audit reports are reviewed and discussed with management with view to further strengthening the Internal Control environment within the university.







## Summary of Significant Accounting Policies to the Financial Statements University of Sri Jayewardenepura

### 1. Reporting Entity

#### 1.1. Legal & Domicile Form

University of Sri Jayewardenepura has been incorporated under the Universities Act No.16 of 1978. The main Administration is located at the Gangodawila, Nugegoda.

#### 1.2. Date of Authorization for Issue

The Financial Statements were authorized for issue by the Council on 09th June 2016.

#### 1.3. Reporting Period

The Financial period of the University represent from 01st January 2015 to 31st December 2015.

### 2. Basis of Preparation and other Significant Accounting Policies

#### 2.1. Basis of measurement

The Financial statements of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura have been prepared under the historical cost convention and accrued basis in conformity with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards except for following,

#### 2.2.1. Comparative Information

All accounting policies adopted by the University are applied consistently with those of the previous year, where necessary comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to the changes, in presentation of current year figures.

#### 2.2.2. Statement of Compliance

The Financial Statements of the University have been prepared and presented in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards (SLPSAS's).

These Financial Statement comprise the statement of Financial Position, Statement of Financial Performance, Statement of Cash flow, Statement of changes in equity & notes to the Financial Statements.

### **2.2.3. Materiality and Aggregation**

Each material class of similar items have presented separately in the financial statements. Items of dissimilar nature or function have presented separately unless they are immaterial.

### **2.2.4. Offsetting**

Assets and liabilities, and revenue and expenses have not been offset unless required or permitted by a SLPSAS.

### **2.2.5. Going concern**

The university have made an assessment of the University and it's ability to continue as a going concern and is satisfied that it has the resources to continue in entity for the foreseeable future. Furthermore, the council is not aware of any material uncertainties that may cast significant doubt upon the university's ability to continue as a going concern. Based on that the financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

### **2.2.6. Events after the Reporting Period**

All material events after the reporting date has been considered and where appropriate adjustments or disclosure wherever necessary have been made in the Financial Statements.

### **2.2.7. Functional& presentation currency**

Items included in the financial statements of the University are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the University operates (the functional currency). These financial statements are prepared and presented in 'Sri Lankan Rupees' (Rs.), which is the university's functional and presentation currency.

### **2.2.8. Transaction of Foreign Currency**

All foreign exchange transactions are converted to Sri Lanka Rupees, which is the reporting currency, at the rates of exchange prevailing at the time the transactions were affected.

### **2.2.9. Rounding**

The amounts in financial statements have been rounded-off to the nearest rupee, except otherwise indicated as permitted by the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

## **2.3. Property Plant & Equipment**

The University's Property Plant & Equipment includes Land, Buildings, Laboratory and Teaching Equipment, Office Equipment, Furniture & Fittings, Library Books and Periodicals, Motor Vehicles, Cloaks, Sport Goods and Other Assets include the items acquired out of government grant, Research grants, internally generated funds, and donations.

**a. Basis of Recognition**

Property, Plant and Equipment are recognized if it is probable that future economic benefits associate with the item will flow to the entity and the cost of the item can be reliably measured.

**i) Initial recognition**

The cost of an item of Property Plant and equipment is the cash price or its fair value at the recognition date.

**ii) Subsequent expenditure on existing Property Plant & Equipment**

Expenditure incurred on tangible fixed assets is charged to the statement of Financial Performance in the period it is incurred, unless it meets one of the following criteria, in which case it is capitalized and depreciated on the relevant basis.

- Market value of fixed assets has subsequently increased
- Asset capacity increase
- Sustainability improvement in the quality of output or reduction in operating cost.
- Significant extension of the asset life beyond that confirmed by repair and maintenance.

**iii) Measurement after recognition****Cost Model**

After recognition all the Property Plant and Equipment except the classes of Land, Buildings, Motor Vehicles, Laboratory and Teaching Equipment, Sports Goods, Other Equipment and Furniture & Fittings are carried at its cost less accumulated Depreciation.

**Revaluation Model**

After initial recognition below classes of Property Plant and equipment whose fair value can be measured reliably has been carried at revalued amounts, being fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses. Land & Buildings, Motor Vehicles, Office equipment, Lab & Teaching Equipment, Furniture & Fittings, Sports goods, Other Assets.

**iv) Library Books & Cloaks**

Cost of Library books & Cloaks are written off on the straight line basis over a period of 5 years.

**b) Depreciation**

Depreciation is recognized in the statement of Financial Performance on the straight – Line basis on each component of an item of property, plant and equipment other than freehold land.

Depreciation of an asset begins when it is available for use and ceases at the earlier of the

date that the asset is classified as held for sale and the date that the asset is de-recognized. The estimated useful life periods are as follows.

**c. Derecognition**

The carrying amount of Property Plant and Equipment derecognized at the disposal or when no future economic benefits or service potential is expected from its use or disposal. The gain or loss arising from the derecognition shall be included in surplus or deficit when the item is derecognized.

**2.3.1. Capital Work- in - Progress**

Capital expenses incurred which are not completed as at the reporting date are shown as Capital Work - in - Progress, Capital work in progress would be transferred to Property, Plant and Equipment when it is available for use.

**a) Current Assets**

Current Assets classified in Statement of Financial Position are those which is expected to be realised in, or is held for sale or consumption in, the entity's normal operating cycle, held primarily for the purpose of being traded, expected to be realised within twelve months after the reporting date or cash or a cash equivalent.

**b) Inventories**

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value, after making due allowances for obsolete and slow moving items. In general, cost is determined on first-in-first-out (FIFO) basis and includes expenditure incurred in acquiring the inventories and bringing them to their existing condition and location.

**c) Advances to Staff & Receivables**

Advances to staff and Receivable comprise, Employee Advances, Deposits, Trade Receivables.

**d) Cash & Cash Equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents are defined as cash in hand and demand deposits and short term highly liquid investments readily convertible to known amounts of cash and subject to insignificant risk of change in value. For the purpose of cash flow statement, cash &

cash equivalent of cash in hand and deposits in banks. Investments with short term matured six months less for the date of acquisition are also treated as cash equivalents. The cash flow statements are reported based on the indirect method.

## **2.4. Accounting for Government Grant for Capital Expenditure**

### **2.4.1. Capital Grant**

Government Grant for the Capital expenditure has presented in the Financial Statements in accordance with the LKAS 20 due to the absence of SLPSAS. According to the accounting standard capital grant has recognized as deferred income in the statement of financial position and amortized over the useful life of the asset.

### **2.4.2. Contribution to Capital Outlay from Outside Grants**

The value of Property Plant & Equipment purchased out of generated funds & various project funds were shown as “Contribution to Capital Outlay from outside Grants”

### **2.4.3. Recurrent Grant**

Recurrent grants are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on cash basis. Cost of rehabilitation of Fixed Assets and Capital Grants for construction and new work recognized either as work in progress or Capital Assets where necessary.

### **2.4.4. Internally restricted Net Assets**

Internally restricted net assets include funds committed for specific purpose.

Faculty Development Funds represent the cumulative position of Faculties/Departments Funds with net unspent balances at the year end.

### **2.4.5. Endowment Fund**

Endowments include restricted donations received by the University investment returns generated from endowments are used in accordance with the various purpose established by the donors.

## **2.5. Liabilities and Provisions**

### **2.5.1. Current Liabilities**

Current Liabilities are stated at their book value.

### **2.5.2. Provisions**

Provisions are recognized when the University has present obligations (legal and constructive) as a result of a past event, where it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

### **2.5.3. Provision of Retiring Gratuity**

Provision for gratuity has been calculated as per the Gratuity Act.No.12 of 1983 based on the amount payable all employees retire on the date of the financial position, subject to the assumption that every employee would be entitled to the payment subject to the non-completion of minimum period of service required. The benefits plan is funded through annual allocation.

## **2.6. Revenue Recognition**

### **2.6.1. Government Grants for Recurrent Expenditure, Student Bursaries and Mahapola**

Revenue recognized on cash basis.

### **2.6.2. Income from Fee Levying courses**

Income from fee levying courses are recognized on expenditure based on periodic basis.

### **2.6.3. Finance Income**

Interest income is recognized on accrued basis using effective interest rate method according to LKAS 39 due to the absence of SLPSAS.

### **2.6.4. Expenditure Recognition**

Expenses in carrying all activities of the University recognized on an accrued basis and to the charged statement of Financial Performance.

## **2.7. Statement of Cash Flows**

The cash flow statement has been prepared by using The Indirect Method in accordance with the SLPSAS 2 whereby gross cash receipts and gross cash payments of operating activities, finance activities and investing activities have been recognized. Cash and cash equivalents comprise short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

## **2.8. Commitments and Contingencies**

All discernible risks are accounted for in determining the amount of all known liabilities. Contingent liabilities are possible obligations whose existence will be confirmed only by uncertain future events or present obligations where the transfer of economic benefit is not probable or cannot be reliably measured. Contingent liabilities are not recognized in the statement of financial position but are disclosed unless they are remote.

Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements of the University of Sri Jayawardanapura for the year ended 31 December 2015 in terms of Section 108(1) of the Universities Act, No 16 of 1978.

The audit of financial statements of the University of Sri Jayawardanapura for the year ended 31 December 2015 comprising the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2015 and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in equity and cash flow statement for the year then ended and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154 (1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read in conjunction with Sub-section 107 (5) and Section 108 of the Universities Act, No. 16 of 1978. My comments and observations which I consider should be published with the Annual Report of the University in terms of Section 108 (1) of the Universities Act, appear in this report. A detailed Report in terms of Section 108 (2) of the Universities Act will be furnished to the Vice Chancellor of the University in due course.

## 1.2 Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards and for such internal control as the management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatements whether due to fraud or error.



### 1.3 Auditor's Responsibility

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My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit. I conducted my audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards consistent with International Auditing Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAI 1000 – 1810). Those Standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgments, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatements of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the University's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the University's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. Section 111 of the Universities Act, No 16 of 1978 gives discretionary powers to the Auditor General to determine the scope and extent of the audit.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my audit opinion.

## 2. Financial Statements

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### 2.1 Opinion

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In my of opinion, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the University of Sri Jayawardanapura as at 31 December 2015 and its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.



## 2.2 Comments on Financial Statements

### 2.2.1 Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards

Although the bond value that remained recoverable from the lecturers who proceeded abroad on academic leave and breached the agreements had been brought to account as an income receivable on accrual basis up to 31 December 2010, it had been disclosed by the notes to the accounts that the policy of accounting under the cash basis would be adopted with effect from 01 January 2011. As a result of changing of this policy, the bound value amounting to Rs.40,812,562 brought to account under the accrual basis for the years preceding the year 2011 had not been retrospectively adjusted and corrected as required by the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 03.

### 2.3 Accounts Receivable and Payable

The following observations are made.

- (a) Action had not been taken to settle the advances amounting to Rs.1,310,000 paid to the Urban Council, Maharagama and brought forward from the year 1990 even up to the year under review.
- (b) Out of the advance of Rs.2,268,483 paid to the contractor for the renovation of laboratory building and the New Art Theater in the year 2011, a sum of Rs.1,764,013 remained recoverable in respect of the work not done had not been recovered even in the year under review.
- (c) Out of the advance amounting to Rs.400,000 obtained on 20 August 2014 by a lecturer for carrying out research study on the awareness of the reproductive health and the spread of sexually transmitted diseases among the inmates of the Welikada Prison, a sum of Rs.366,720 had not been settled even by August 2016 and the relevant research as well had not been carried out.



- (d) Advances of Rs.684,373 older than 10 to 14 years included in the balance of Rs.1,141,097 shown as the Sundry Advances in the financial statements as at the end of the year under review had not been recovered even in the year under review.
- (e) Out of 14 security bonds debtors totaling Rs. 93,549,873 as at the end of the year under review, a sum of Rs.16,411,708 remained recoverable for more than 15 years had not been recovered even in the year under review.
- (f) Out of the 18 quarters owned by the University, 16 quarters had been given to the officers without entering into agreements and out of the house rental amounting to Rs.321,300 remained receivable for the year under review, a sum of Rs.258,300 or 80 per cent had not been recovered.

2.4 Non-compliance with Laws, Rules, Regulations and Management Decisions.

The following on-compliances with Laws, Rules, Regulations and Management Decisions were observed.

(a) Section 3.1 of Chapter XX and Section 1.6.1 of Chapter X of the Establishments Code of the University Grants Commission and Higher Education Institutions.	Although instructions had been given to formulate a methodology to establish the arrival, departure and the leave of the academic staff at the Committee on Public Enterprises, action had not been taken accordingly.
(b) Section 2.1 of Chapter XXVI of the Establishments Code of the University Grants Commission and Higher Education Institutions.	A Board of survey on the library books had not been conducted after the year 2005.



- (c) Treasury Circular No.IAI/2002/02 dated 28 November 2002. A Register of Fixed Assets had not been maintained on the computers and computer accessories of the University.
- (d) University Grants Commission Circular No. 803 dated 16 May 2002 and Third Paragraph of the Letter No.DMS/7777/TDP/SJP dated 16 September 2014 of the Director General of Management Services. When recruiting the officers to the posts of Project Manager, Project Administrative Officer, Quantity Surveyor and the Technical Officer required to the Urban Development Project of the University, those recruitments had been made irrespective of the educational qualifications, experience and age limits and without being published the relevant vacancies.

## 2.5 Transactions not Supported by an Adequate Authority

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The following observations are made.

- (a) Without obtaining the approval of the Universities Grants Commission in terms of Section 45.2 (XV) of the University Act, No.16 of 1978, a sum of Rs.153 million had been invested in fixed deposits during the year under review. Out of the funds usable for the physical and academic development of the University, the total amount thus invested in the fixed deposits as at the end of the year under review was Rs.862 million.
- (b) Without approval of the Ministry of Higher Education, the University had recruited 61 Temporary Demonstrators and Instructors exceeding the approved cadre of the academic staff included in the Human Resources Plan. It had been reported to audit that, the increase in the number of student enrollments and increase in the number of courses had attributed to the above recruitment.



### 3. Financial Review

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#### 3.1 Financial Results

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According to the financial statements presented, the operations of the University for the year under review had resulted in a deficit of Rs.17,883,619 as against the surplus of Rs. 145,069,392 for the preceding year, thus indicting a deterioration of Rs.162,953,011 in the financial results during the year under review as compared with the preceding year. Although the Government Grants had increased by Rs.529,744,143, decrease in the internal income by Rs.41,135,151 and increase in 8 items of expenditure by Rs.636,061,991 had mainly attributed to the above deterioration.

An analysis of the financial results of the year under review and four preceding years revealed that, the surplus in the years 2011 had turned out to be a deficit in the year 2012 and it had gradually increased again and had become a surplus by the year 2014, whereas it had deteriorated by 112 per cent in the year under review. When taking into consideration the employees' remuneration and the depreciation for the non-current assets, the contribution amounting to Rs.2,629,820,066 in the year 2011 had gradually deteriorated up to a negative value by the year 2013 and thereafter it had gradually increased and had become Rs.2,234,235,101 by the end of the year under review.

#### 3.2 Unusual Increase in the Expenditure

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The travelling expenses amounting to Rs.9.97 million in the preceding year had increased up to Rs.27.59 million by Rs.17.62 million during the year under review. The expenditure for the foreign tours in the year under review amounted to Rs. 23.57 million and it represented 85.43 per cent of the total travelling expenditure.



### 3.3 Legal Cases Instituted Against the University

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The following observations are made.

- (a) A case in respect of taking over a land for the expansion of the activities of the Examination Division had been filed against the University by the owner of the respective land in the Sri Lanka Human Rights Commission.
- (b) Three officers had filed 03 cases in the Labour Tribunal against the dismissal, termination and not granting service extension while another three officers had filed 03 cases against the University in the court in connection with sending retirement, treating as vacated the service and non-payment of Gratuity.

## 4. Operating Review

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### 4.1 Performance

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The following observations are made on the progress of the conduct of lectures according to the Lecture Norm Plan and the Action Plan of the Department of Social Sciences and Humanities.

- (a) The minimum number of lecture hours required to be allocated according to the Lecture Norm Plan had not been allocated to 11 lecturers out of the 18 permanent lecturers served in the Department. Accordingly, a female lecturer who is required to cover at least 12 hours in a week had not been allocated even a single lecture hour.
- (b) Although there were 11 lecturers who had not been granted the minimum number of lecture hours, the service of two visiting lecturers had been obtained for 150 lecture hours relating to 05 subjects.



- (c) It was observed that the coverage of the syllabus of 22 subjects within an academic period of 15 weeks had been at a lower range from 47 per cent to 73 per cent.

#### 4.2 Management Activities

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The following observations made.

- (a) In order to follow a Doctorate degree under the assistance granted by the National Center for Advanced Studies in Humanities and Social Sciences (NCAS) of the University Grants Commission, an agreement had been entered into with a professor of the Department of Sinhala and Mass Media on 08 November 2006 and provisions amounting to Rs.250,000 had been granted. Although the Doctorate degree had not been completed despite the lapse of 09 years by the end of the year under review, no action whatsoever had been taken by the University in that respect.
- (b) A block of land, 10.7 perches in extent belonging to the University had been leased out to the People's Bank for a period of 25 years and having reached to a concurrence to vest the relevant building with the University at the end of the period of lease, an agreement had been entered into by both parties. Nevertheless, that agreement had not been registered. Further, this building had not been assessed once in every 05 year as required by the agreement and the rental had been recovered on the assessed value pertaining to the year 2008. Accordingly, an adequate rental had not been recovered.
- (c) As cheques had been issued without correctly assessed the cash receipts and the time periods relating to those receipts, there were negative balances in the cash book in several instances during the year under review. Accordingly, instances where this negative balances had increased up to Rs.139 million were also observed.



### 4.3 Operating Activities

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The following observations are made.

- (a) For the project initiated by the University of Sri Jayawardenepura in the year 2011 under the world university project implemented with the objective of upgrading the local universities to a higher standard among the universities in all over the world, provisions amounting to Rs.121.69 million had been granted by the end of the year under review. The following observations are made in this connection.
- (i) Although a sum of Rs.117.24 million had been spent from the inception of the project up to the end of the year under review, a sum of Rs.22.76 of that sum had been utilized for the expenses outside the estimate and irrelevant to the project.
  - (ii) In the gradation of the world universities, as 60 per cent marks are allocated for the researches and citation, 24 reaches had been planned to achieve that target and the provisions of Rs.54.06 million had also been made. Out of that, only 05 researches had been completed by the end of the year under review and another 05 researches had been abandoned halfway. Not even a progress report had been presented relating to two out of the remaining researches operated at a slow pace.
  - (iii) Although laboratory equipment valued at Rs.68 million had been purchased with the intention of providing common laboratory facilities for the promotion of researches, those equipment had been under the custody of the Faculty of Applied and Medical Sciences even by the end of the year under review. Although a sum of Rs. 495,664 had been spent for the reservation of space facilities for the common laboratory, it had been abandoned subsequently.
  - (iv) The University which stood at the 5330 rank among the other universities in the world in the year of commencement of the project in



2011 had advanced up to the rank of 2758 in the year 2012 and it had declined up to the rank of 3091 by June in the preceding year. According to the reports published in September of the year under review, the rank of the University had further gone down up to 4268.

Accordingly it was observed that, the University had failed to achieve an operating performance sufficient to satisfy the measurements and components required for upgrading the Sri Jayawardenapura University to a higher rank within the world university grading even during the year under review.

- (b) For 17 consultants appointed for the proposed Faculty of Engineering and Technology, a sum of Rs.8,025,000 had been paid as allowances up to 30 June in the year under review. When enquiring about the approvals of the University Grants Commission and the Department of Management Services and the basis used for the determination of the allowances, it had been reported to audit that the relevant expenditure had been incurred as preliminary expenses of the Faculty of Engineering and Technology on the approval of the Council.

#### 4.4 Underutilization of Funds

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Although the Reward Funds comprising the funds granted by the donors for awarding rewards to the students who demonstrate various skills should be invested to maintain those funds without turning into the zero in value, out of 73 Reward Funds totalling Rs.22,525,707 as at the end of the year under review, only a sum of Rs.17,636,055 had been invested.

#### 4.5 Idle and Underutilized Assets

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The following observations are made.

- (a) Although the tenure of the land, 41.31 purchase in extent purchased with the objective of providing hostel facilities for 300 students at Rs.1.6 million on 05



May 1998 had been vested in the University on 06 August 2003, the land had not been utilized for the relevant purpose even up to the end of the year under review.

- (b) The stock balance of toners purchased for the computer printers and the photocopy machines included the obsolete and slow moving stocks valued at Rs.4,323,216 and as a result of purchasing 19 kinds of toners despite the availability of a considerable stock and without placing orders in keeping with the requirements, a stock of toners valued at Rs.2,021,408 had remained in the stores unattended.
- (c) There was a stock of paints valued at Rs.191,416, textiles valued at Rs.377,087 and computer diskettes valued at Rs.73,138 older than 05 years, whereas action had not been taken to properly dispose of those stocks or to take other suitable steps.

#### 4.7 Identified Losses.

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The approval of the Cabinet of Ministers had been granted for the Drain Water Disposal Project of the University with the contract valued at Rs.70 million on 06 August 2003 and a sum of Rs.2,336,090 had been paid to the Water Supply and Drainage Board for the preparation of preliminary plans relating to the said constructions. Without being recovered the money paid for this project which had been discontinued halfway, it had been brought forward under the Work-In-Progress Account.

#### 4.7 Personnel Administration

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The following observations are made.

- (a) The approved cadre of the University as at 31 December of the year under review stood at 1853, out of which the posts relating to 293 officers had remained vacant. It included 121 vacancies of the posts of Lecturer and it had been an impediment to achieve the objectives of the University.



- (b) Although permanent appointments had been granted for 9 Senior Professors, 51 Professors promoted on merit basis and 7 Associate Professors, the approval of the Department of Management Services had not been obtained for those newly created posts.
- (c) Although approval had been obtained only for 210 posts of Temporary Lecturer, Demonstrator and the Tutors, 54 persons exceeding that amount had been recruited.
- (d) Nine posts of Typists and 8 posts of Stenographer which were not currently important had been in vacant, whereas attention had not been drawn on the creation of timely important posts in lieu of those posts.
- (e) The total number of staff recruited permanently and temporarily to the approved and un approved posts was 1681. Accordingly, the cost per employee of the year under review was Rs.1,152,475 and it was Rs.914,638 in the preceding year, thus indicating an increase of Rs.237,837 in the cost per employee.
- (f) In terms of to Section 20.5 of Chapter X of the Establishments Code of the University Grants Commission and the Higher Education Institutions, the Saturdays, Sundays and public holidays fall within the period of no pay leave should be reckoned as the days on no pay leave. Nevertheless, certain employees who were on no pay leave on Fridays and Mondays had not been dealt with considering the Saturdays and Sundays as the days on no pay leave.
- (g) A Probationary Lecturer recruited for a vacancy of a post of lecturer in the Department of Finance on 15 July 2015 on a request of the Head of the Department had been granted academic leave for a period of 5 years with effect from 11 August 2015, which was, 6 days after he assumed duties. In granting approval for this lecturer ,who was expeditiously recruited for making the affairs of the Department of Finance easy, to proceed abroad on full pay leave subsequent to a service of 6 days, no attention had been drawn on taking steps in a manner not to hindrance the maintenance of affairs of the University.
- (h) Although a Probationary female Lecturer who had been recruited on 06 April 2006 should be obtained a post graduate degree within a probationary period of 03



years and submit the research report in accordance with Section 21.1.1 of Chapter III of the Establishments Code relating to the University Grants Commission and Higher Education Institutions, the post graduate degree had not been obtained within the period of probation. Although the above Section further specifies that the service should be terminated in case of failure to obtain the post graduate degree within 6 years, contrary to that, further period of 03 years had been granted.

#### 4.8 Vehicles Utilization

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The following observations are made.

- (a) There were 15 allocated vehicles and 30 pool vehicles belonging to the University as at 31 December of the year under review and 05 of which had been at condemned position. Although all other vehicles except the vehicles reserved for the officers should be included in the pool and maintained properly, some vehicles had been deployed for the affairs of the academic departments without proper supervision.
  
- (b) In the preparation of vehicle log books and daily running charts according to the Financial Regulation 1645 and monthly summery on the tours according to the Financial Regulation 1646, adequate care had not been exercised on the instructions in the Financial Regulations.

### 5. Accountability and Good Governance

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#### 5.1 Internal Audit

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An adequate number of officers had not been deployed for the Internal Audit Division and the staff consisted of the Deputy Internal Auditor and 3 officers of the Clerk Grade only.



## 5.2 Budgetary Control

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While the actual internal income was Rs.305.84 million in the preceding year, the internal income of the year under review had been estimated at Rs.188.01 million. However, the actual income of the year under review was Rs.443.68 million and an income exceeding 136 per cent of the estimation had been earned. Accordingly, it was observed that income estimates had not been prepared realistically so as to use the budget as a financial control instrument.

## 5.3 Unresolved Audit Paragraphs

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The following observations are made.

- (a) The academic allowances of Rs.1,437,882 included in the salaries paid to a female lecturer released for service in the Government or Government affiliated institutions on the basis of salary reimbursement and had been informed that it could not be reimbursed from the institution concerned and as such it had not been recovered from the relevant lecturer.
- (b) A sum of Rs.24 million had been paid to the Western Provincial Council in the year 1994 for the purchase of a block of land 05 acres in extent from the Methsevana land for the Faculty of Medicine. Nevertheless, the activities relating to the taking over of the relevant land were progressing slowly and without assessing the block of land already taken over and bringing it to account, the total amount paid had been further shown in the financial statements as unsettled capital advances.
- (c) Even though the land and the building situated at Kohuwala purchased for Rs.61.5 million in the year 2014 had been transferred to the Institute of Aesthetic Studies of the University of Kelaniya as they were not suitable for



the requirements of the University, this transfer had not been brought to account and an asset which was not being used by the University had been included in the financial statements.

## 6. Systems and Controls

Deficiencies in systems and controls observed during the course of audit were brought to the notice of the Vice Chancellor of the University from time to time. Special attention is needed in respect of the following areas of control.

The outstanding balance has arisen in the cash book as the funds have been accounted as at the last date of the month, instead of being accounted as at the date of the receipt of funds from the Treasury. Action has been taken to correctly account based on the date of receipt with effect from November 2015. In general, the balances of the bank accounts of the University can not be negative.

(i) Although a sum of Rs.117.24 million had been spent from the inception of the project up to the end of the year under review, a sum of Rs.22.76 million of that sum had been utilized for the expenses outside the estimate and irrelevant to the project.

(iii) Although laboratory equipment valued at Rs.68 million had been purchased with the intention of providing common laboratory facilities for the promotion of researches, those equipment had been under the custody of the Faculty of Applied and Medical Sciences even by the end of the year under review. Although a sum of Rs. 495,664 had been spent for the reservation of space facilities for the common laboratory, it had been abandoned subsequently.

The summary on 18 research reports furnished, is shown below.

Action has been taken to grant provisions allocated to the researches abandoned, to new researches.

It was decided at the commencement of the project to establish this laboratory at the official residence of the Vice Chancellor. However, due to lack of space following the decision taken by the Government to establish a faculty for engineering and technology, the offices of the faculties of the engineering and technology were established in this house. This has been in use since the year 2015 for the activities such as, preparation of preliminary plans relating to the establishment of those faculties, conducting the meetings of the consultancy committee on the improvement of subject streams, and maintaining the offices of the academic, administrative and non-academic staff. As such, the expense of Rs. 495,664.00 incurred on the repairs of this house which needed repairs, was not futile.

<p>(iv) The University which stood at the 5330 rank among the other universities in the world in the year of commencement of the project in 2011 had advanced up to the rank of 2758 in the year 2012 and it had declined up to the rank of 3091 by June in the preceding year. <b>4.5 Idle and Underutilized Assets</b> The following observations are made.	
(a.) Although the tenure of the land, 41.31 perches in extent purchased with the objective of providing hostel facilities for 300 students at Rs.1.6 million on 05 May 1998 had been vested in the University on 06 August 2003, the land had not been utilized for the relevant purpose even up to the end of the year under review.	Approval has been granted by the Ministry to construct a housing scheme consisting of 22 houses for the staff of the University. At present, action is being taken to obtain the decision of the Procurement Committee of the Ministry. It is scheduled to commence the construction of the housing scheme during the year 2017.
(b.) The stock balance of toners purchased for the computer printers and the photocopy machines included the obsolete and slow moving stocks valued at Rs. 4,323,216 and as a result of purchasing 19 kinds of toners despite the availability of a considerable stock and without placing orders in keeping with the requirements, a stock of toners valued at Rs. 2,021,408 had remained in the stores unattended.	A Committee has been appointed in this connection, and a report of inquiry has been obtained. The Committee has recommended to write off this stock purchased for the year 2013, from the books. (c.) There was a stock of paints valued at Rs. 191,416, textiles valued at Rs. 377,087 and computer diskettes valued at Rs.73,138 older than 05 years, whereas action had not been taken to properly dispose of those stocks or to take other suitable steps. <b>4.6 Identified Losses</b> The following observations are made.	
The approval of the Cabinet of Ministers had been granted for the Drain Water Disposal Project of the University with the contract valued at Rs.70 million on 06 August 2003 and a sum of Rs. 2,336,090 had been paid to the Water Supply and Drainage Board for the preparation of preliminary plans relating to the said constructions. Without being recovered the money paid for this project which had been discontinued halfway, it had been brought forward in the Work-In-Progress Account.	The preliminary plan in this connection had been completed by the Water Supply and Drainage Board. However, as the Urban Councils (Boralesgamuwa / Maharagama) had commenced projects relating to the disposal of waste water, the possibility of connecting the disposal of waste water of the University thereto, had been taken into consideration. Hence, the University had decided to abandon the project as further implementation of this project would not be productive.

Although permanent appointments had been granted for 9 Senior Professors, 51 Professors promoted on merit basis and 7 Associate Professors, the approval of the Department of Management Services had not been obtained for those newly created posts. (c.) Although approval had been obtained only for 210 posts of Temporary Lecturer, Demonstrator and the Tutors, 54 persons exceeding that amount had been recruited. (d.) Nevertheless, certain employees who were on no pay leave on Fridays and Mondays had not been dealt with considering the Saturdays and Sundays as the days on no pay leave. In granting approval for this lecturer, who was expeditiously recruited for making the affairs of the Department of Finance easy, to proceed abroad on full pay leave subsequent to a service of 6 days, no attention had been drawn on taking steps in a manner not to hinder the maintenance of affairs of the University.</p>	<p>In accordance with the provisions set out in the Circular, No. 88 of the Commission, it is possible for any Lecturer to obtain leave to read for a doctorate.
