4. Vice-Chancellor's Review

4.1 Brief Introduction

The University worked towards achieving its goals with the assistance of 515 staff members comprising 151 academic, 24 executive, 5 library staff, 11 academic Support Staff and 324 non-academic staff members. The total student population was 3038 (1200 Male and 1838 Female) in the four faculties out of which 811 were provided with hostel facilities (377 male and 434 female). A total of 1029 students received Mahapola scholarships and 989 students received Bursaries. The employment record of our graduates was on the higher side recording an average figure of 75.28%.

4.2 Achievements

The General Convocation was held on 30th July 2015 at the University auditorium. The Convocation was held in two sessions. The Convocation Address was delivered by Dr. Chandra Embuldeniya, former Vice Chancellor of Uwa Wellassa University and Dr. Rohan M. Fernando, Director and Head of Business Development & Plantation of Aitken Spence and Managing Director for Elpitiya Plantations. A total of 477 graduands received their degree. 01 PhD, 56 Masters, 14 Postgraduate Diplomas and 494 bachelor's degrees were awarded.

Three undergraduate research symposia were organized and conducted by three faculties during 2015. These symposia were based on the research work conducted by the students as part of their academic work.

The construction work of one hostel at Makandura and another at Kuliypitiya were completed and handed over to the students. 4 more new hostels with a capacity of 400 occupants in each, are being constructed and will be completed during 2016. The construction work on new access road Phase II to Makandura Premises was commenced. It is expected to complete the work in early 2016. 2nd Phase of Agriculture & Plantation Management faculty building was completed and handed over to the university. It is being occupied now. Animal farm unit which was housed at the faculty premises of Livestock, Fisheries & Nutrition was shifted to the 5 acre land, purchased from the Coconut Cultivation Board. Steps have been initiated to purchase 12 acres of that flat from Kuliypitiya for the expansion of the premises. The identified land is located bordering the present land at Kuliypitiya from two sides.

Our academic staff members of the four faculties have published 324 research articles during year 2015 out of which 30 were in indexed journals. Five local awards and three international awards were received for their work. Several undergraduates were identified for their entrepreneurial skills and were awarded with cash prizes by the National Entrepreneurship Development Authority (NEDA) to assist their enterprises. The Staff Development Center and the Career Guidance Unit were actively involved in many activities during 2015, developing skills and abilities of students and staff.

Three new special degree programs were introduced in the faculty of Applied Sciences. These were in addition to B.Sc. (General) and B.Sc. (Joint Major) degree programs.

4.3 Failure & Justification

Delays in construction work of several projects were observed during 2015. They were Bachelor Staff Quarters project and the Playground at Kuliyaipitiya. Hopefully they are expected to complete by the end of 2016.

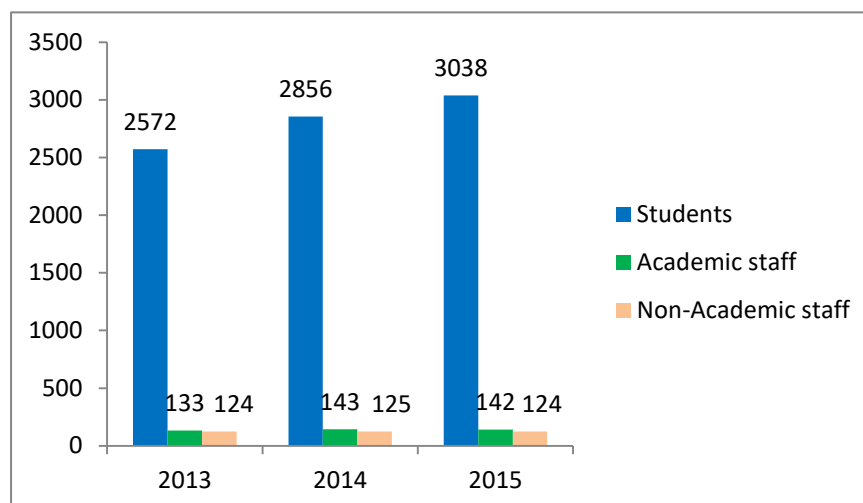
4.4 Future Plans

During 2016, some of the ongoing projects will be completed. They are, access road, Makandura, 4 hostels (400 capacity in each), playground, bachelor's quarters at Kuliyaipitiya, purchase of new land for Kuliyaipitiya and Makandura and construction of family quarters at both premises. Preliminary work for establishment of a new Medical faculty will be initiated during 2016. Further, establishment of a new Technology faculty/Departments are also planned. 225 new students under Technology stream will be absorbed in 2016, for three degree programs, namely B.Sc. (Bio systems Engineering), B.Sc. (Engineering Technology) and B.Sc. (Nano Sciences & Technology). 75 students for each degree program will be recruited from those who have sat for G.C.E. A/L examination in 2015.

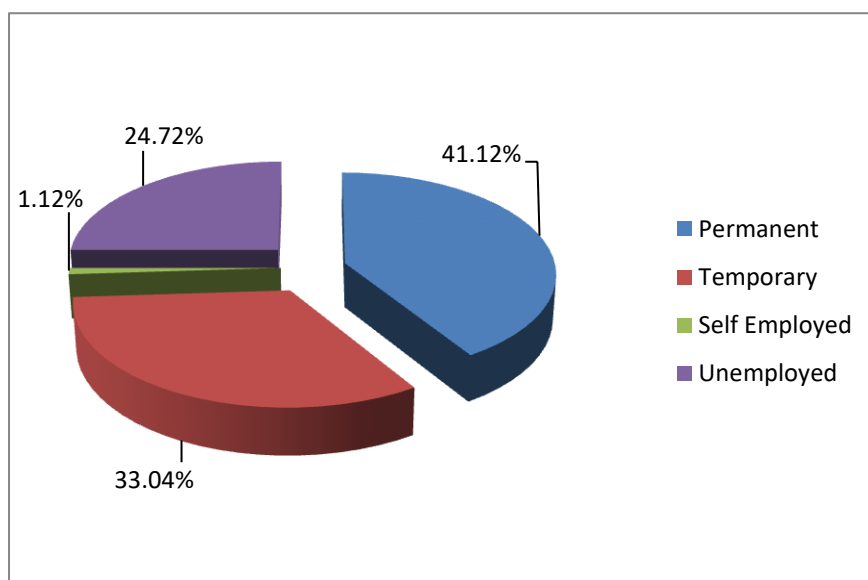
All degree programmes in Wayamba University of Sri Lanka are being conducted in English from first year to final year. 477 students were graduated in the convocation held in the year 2015.

Overall employability of the Wayamba University was reported as 75.28%.

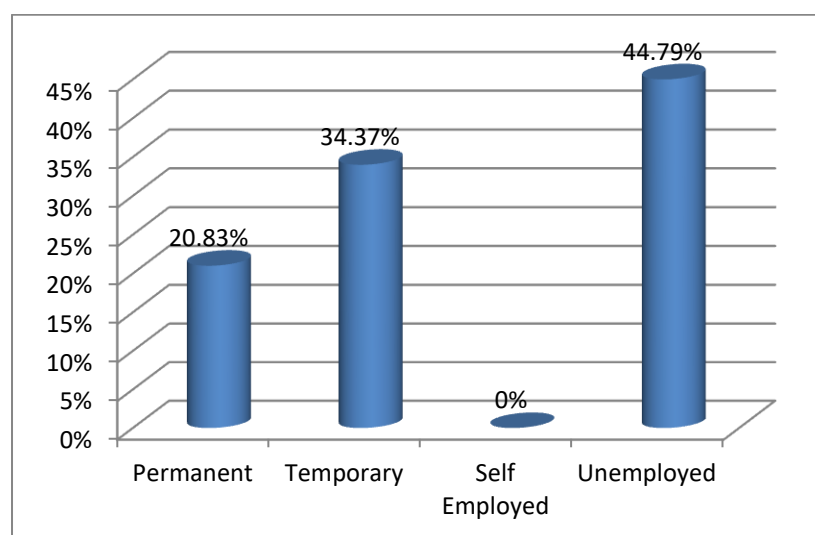

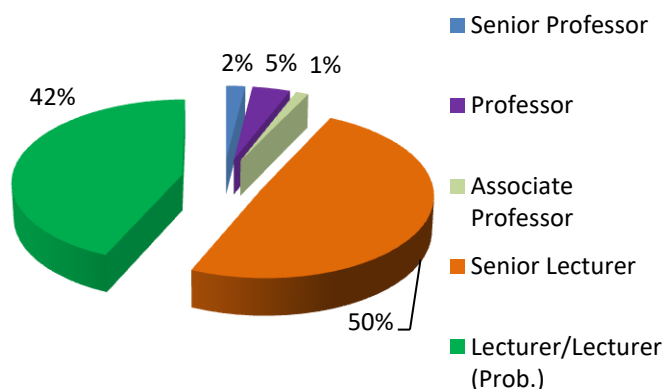

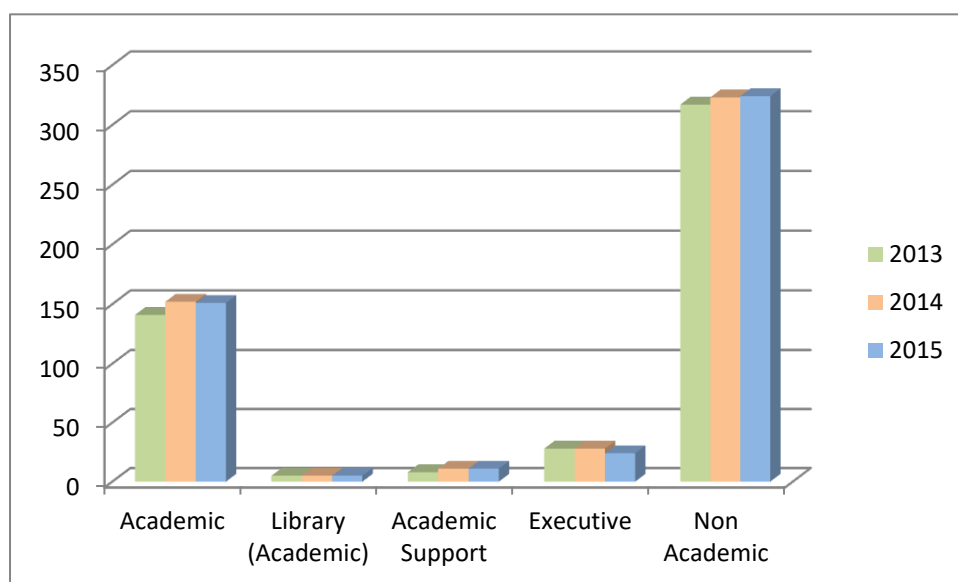

12. Library

12.1 Background Information

The Library of the Wayamba University of Sri Lanka consists of two Libraries. One is serving for Faculty of Applied Sciences and Faculty of Business Studies & Finance at Kuliypitiya premises and the other Library is serving for Faculty of Agriculture and Plantation Management and Faculty of Livestock, Fisheries & Nutrition at Makandura Premises.

12.2 Building

12.2.1 The Library at Kuliypitiya

The Library at Kuliypitiya was established in left side of the first floor of old administrative building. After shifting the administrative office of the University, the Library received other part of the building which expanded to the present Library. Now entire floor area of the Library building has 7326 square feet approximately and capacity of seating is 91 seats.

12.2.2 The Library at Makandura

The Library at Makandura is situated in the middle of two Faculties and closer to the main road of the premises. The Library has a new separate two story building, the floor area of 7200 square feet approximately and capacity of seating is 125 seats. The new building was opened on 27th July 2006.

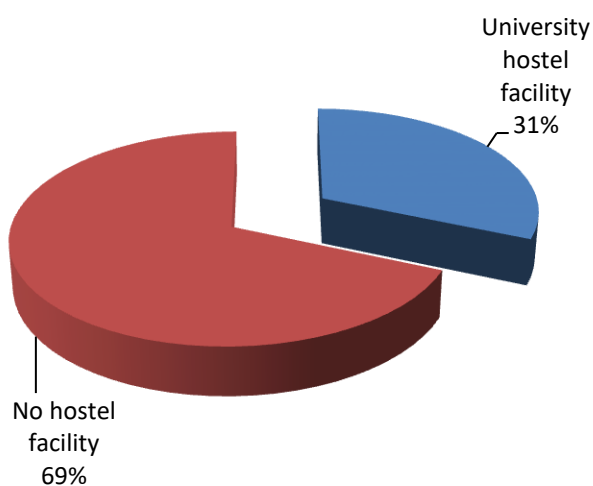

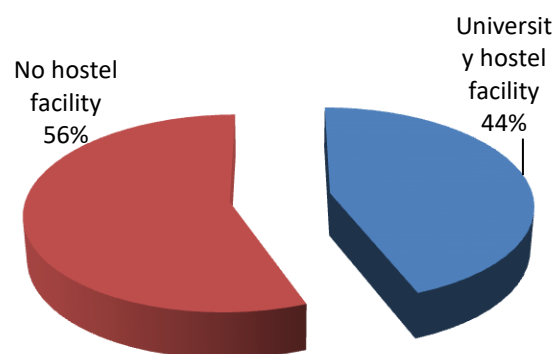

Hostel Facility 2015 – Male

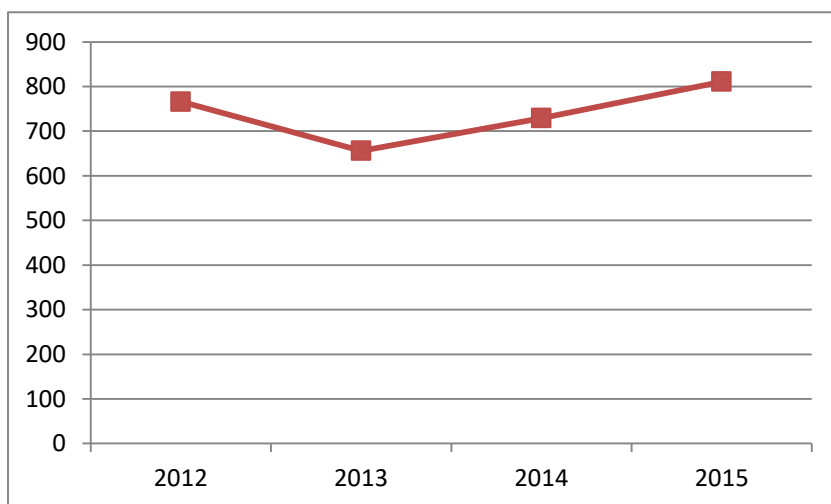


Hostel Facility 2015 - Female

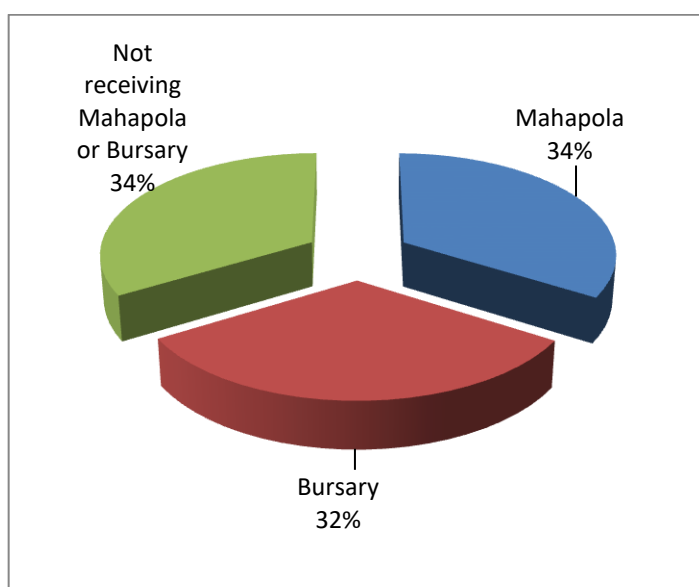

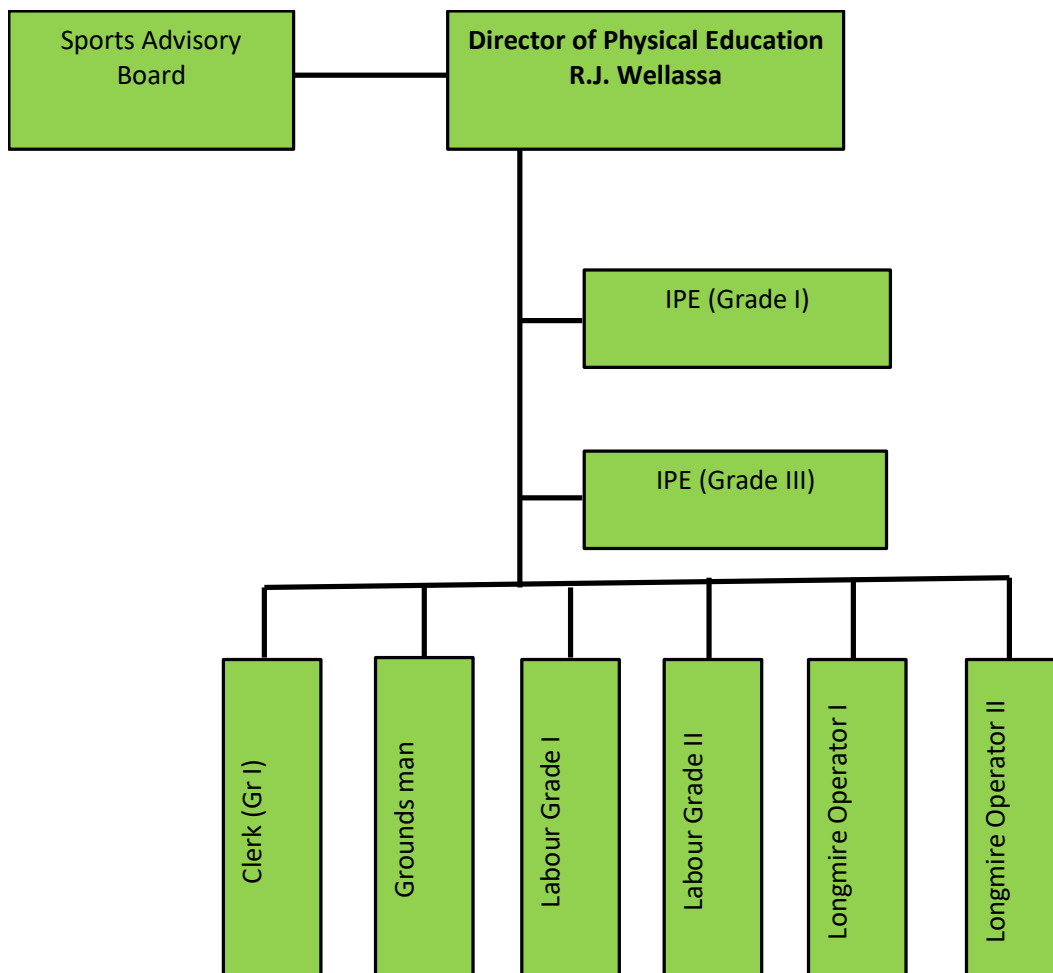

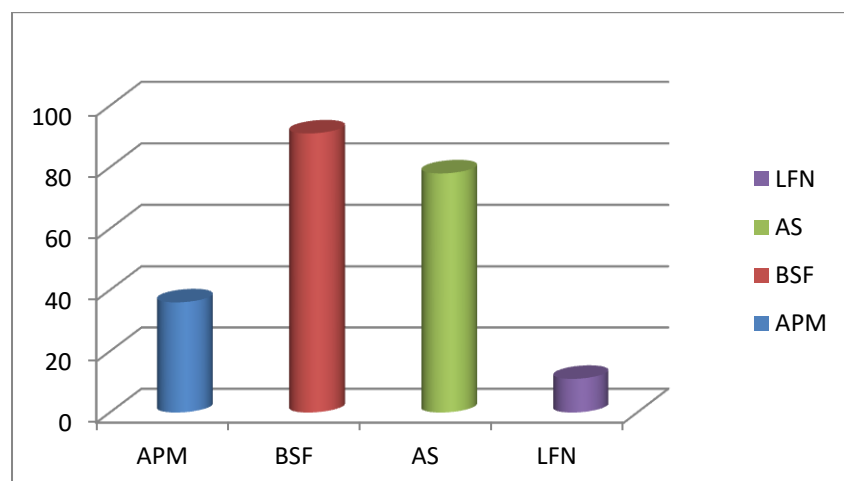

Inter Faculty Freshers' Point Chart

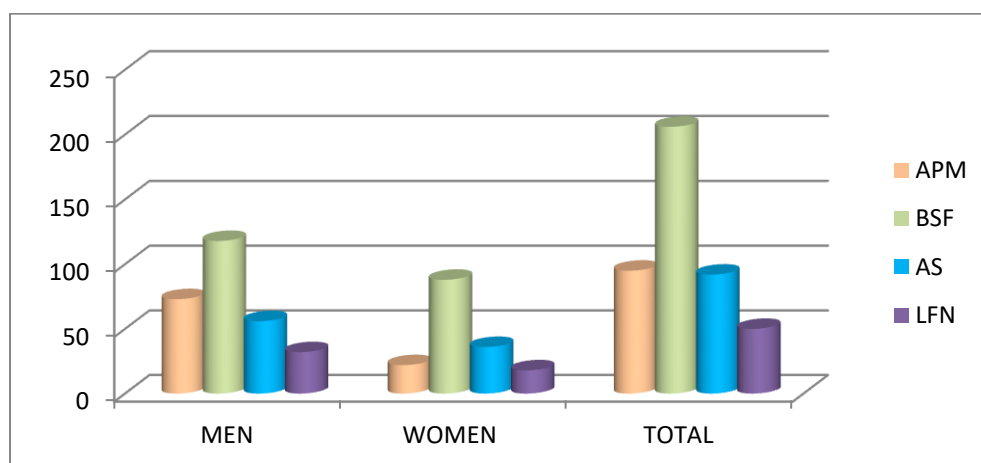

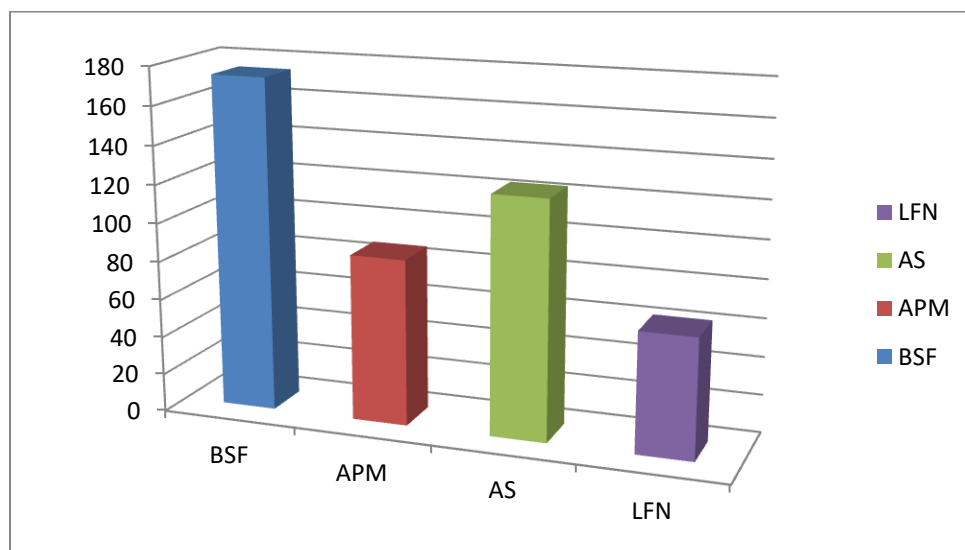

Inter Faculty Point Chart

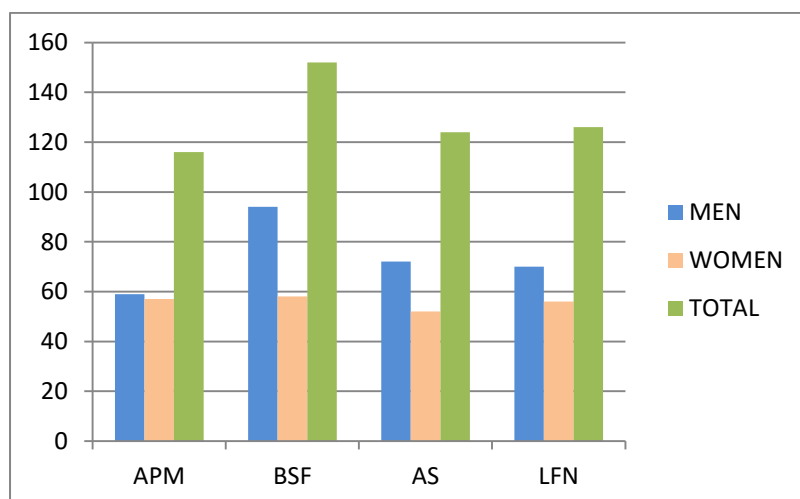

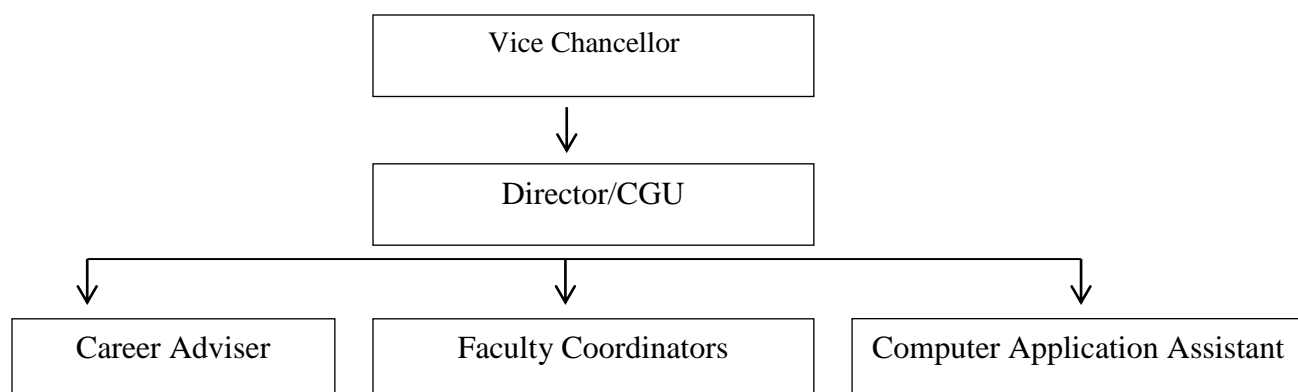

It is committed to the support of academic activities by promoting on-campus information literacy, and by providing a suitable information technology environment. To ensure the smooth proceeding of educational and research activities, the center also offers comprehensive services using the latest advances in information technology. These services include running servers (mail, web, and LMS), maintaining the networks that form the university's IT infrastructure, promoting e-learning initiatives such as computerization of teaching materials and the use of learning management systems, and providing support to departments and units in order make their information and data available online.

21. Information Communication Technology Center

Makandura Premises

21.1 Introduction

The ICT Centre of Makandura premises was established to cater the knowledge on Information Technology for students to meet the challenges in rapidly developing communication system in their relevant field. It will facilitate to acquire computer literacy and to perform their career hereafter.

The ICT Centre is continued to offer courses on Information Technology and Advanced Computer Applications to the Faculty of Agriculture and Plantation Management and course on Information Technology to the Faculty of Livestock, Fisheries and Nutrition. For statistics related courses conducted by the Departments are supported by the ICT Centre especially for practical. Further, two courses, Information Technology and e-Commerce and Management Information Systems are conducted to the students of External Degree of Plantation Management which is offered by the University. The Centre now expands its services by offering several IT related course for the benefit of the people in North-Western Province.

The ICT Centre is opened from 8.00 am to 8.00 pm in week days, 8.00 am to 5.00 pm on weekends. In examination period opening duration is 8.00 am to 10.00 pm on week days.

The English Language Teaching Unit (ELTU) conducted English courses for the 1st, 2nd and 3rd year students of the two faculties situated at Makandura. ‘Academic English’ course was offered to the 1st year students of the Faculty of Agriculture and Plantation Management and ‘English for Science’ course was offered to the 1st year students of the Faculty of Livestock Fisheries and Nutrition. ‘Business English’ course was offered to the 2nd year students of the Faculty of Agriculture and Plantation Management and ‘Academic English’ course was offered for the 2nd year students of the Faculty of Livestock Fisheries and Nutrition. The ‘Certificate Course in Business English’ for the third year students was not offered this year. The Intensive English Course for the new entrants to the University was held successfully for the students of both faculties at Makandura in January 2015.

23.2 Training and awareness programmes conducted

Students from both faculties at Makandura premises participated in English day competitions.

The instructors recruited to teach in the Intensive English Course were trained by the coordinator on methods used in English Language Teaching and several discussions were held on good practices in teaching. The ELTU held regular meetings to share knowledge and experiences of staff members. The certificate course in English through e learning – intake 5- was started in October with 30 participants enrolled from the community outside the university. The Coordinator participated in the International Programme on Management and Administration at the Asian Institute of Technology, Bangkok, Thailand. This programme was held from 10th – 17th May 2015.

23.3 Staff position

The ELTU consists of one permanent English Instructor and four English Instructors on temporary basis. In addition, one Computer Application Assistant and a laborer are available in the English Language Teaching Unit at Makandura. Duty lists were prepared for the CAA and the labourer in January 2015.

23.4 Progress during the year

Faculty level English Day competitions were held and the students were encouraged to participate in the university level competitions. Students from both faculties at Makandura Premises won first places in the General Knowledge Quiz at the University Level competitions. In addition, they won second and third places in other competitions as well. All English programmes were conducted successfully. The awarding of certificates for the participants of The Certificate Course in English through e Learning intake 5 for the external candidates was held at the Makandura premises. The Vice-Chancellor and Heads of the departments were present. The certificates of the Certificate Course in Business English were distributed among the internal students who participated in the course.

23.5 Constraints if any

The major constraint in the ELTU is the lack of permanent staff for teaching.

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23.6 Suggestions

The ELTU Makandura suggests recruiting staff on permanent basis to conduct classes. The instructors at the ELTU need training on technical applications of e learning programmes.

24. Medical Center

There were two functioning medical centers in Wayamba University of Sri Lanka. The both Medical Centers in Kuliyapitiya and Makandura premises played a key role in promoting health in Wayamba University in 2015 as it was done in 2014.

While Kuliyapitiya Medical center comprised of most of the basic facilities which were needed for the treatment of students and staff members, construction of Makandura Medical Center stage II was in progress.

The staff of Kuliyapitiya premises was the same as year 2014 which comprises of one nurse, one public health inspector, one pharmacist, one stenographer, one attendant and one laborer, Medical center in Makandura premises got the same staff without Computer Application Assistant and Laborer.

There were two medical officers in the University till April 2015, one each appointed to each medical center. Since May 2015 there was one medical officer who covered up the duty of both medical centers. All new batches of faculties were given a lecture on general health and medicals at the commencement of the courses.

The medical certificates of newly appointed University staff and newly entered students for the year 2015/2016 were certified by the Medical Officer. Medical Examination was done for staff members who were needed extension of service, for the students who were selected for the sports events and Canteen workers.

Other than treating minor ailments of students and staff medical center played a major role in prevention of diseases and health education of University students. There were many health promotion programmes done in year.

1. Mass screening programme for non-communicable diseases
2. Mass screening programme for thalassemia
3. Health Education Programme on community health and sexually transmitted diseases.
4. Sterilization Programme for Stray Dogs and Cats
5. Anti Rabies Vaccinations Programme
6. Annual Food Sampling and Water Sampling Programme
7. A Programme on detecting breast diseases among University Female Students was started in December 2015.

In general, the medical staff as a team was able to help the total University community both at Kuliyapitiya and Makandura premises within its limits during the year 2015.

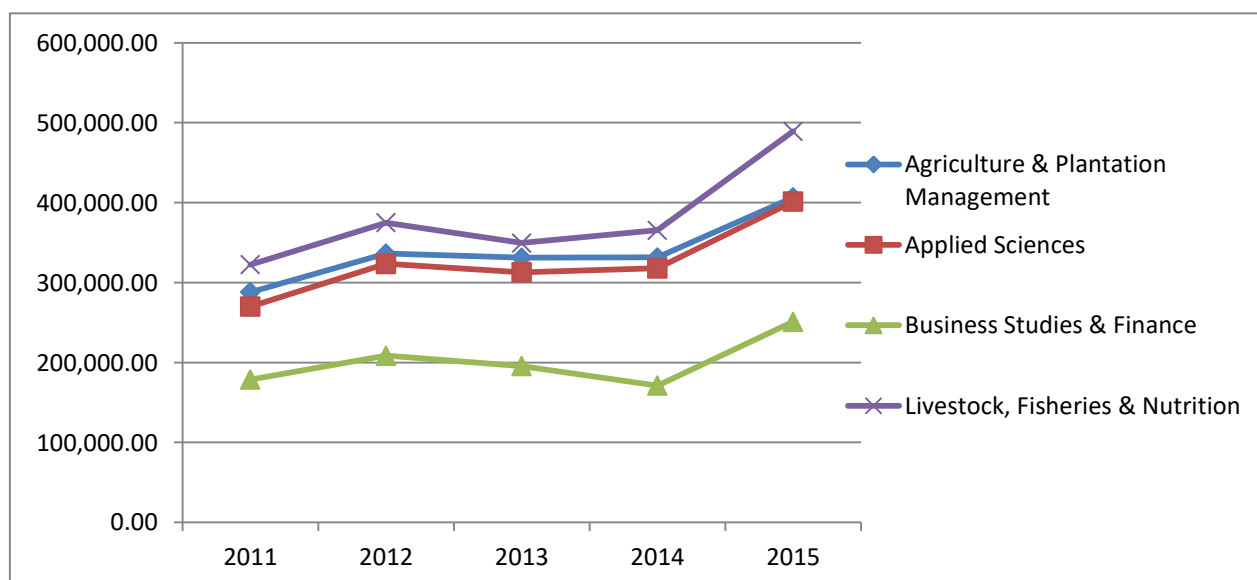

a. Closing balances of the Bank Accounts maintained by the University as shown in the balance sheet have been reconciled with the relevant cash books. The respective Banks were requested to send in their confirmation of balances direct to the Auditor General. This amount is equal to the short term commitments.

b. The stock value shown in the Balance Sheet amounting to Rs. 27,879,627.03 was arrived on physical verification of stores. This verification was done in order to establish the ownership, existence and the value of the items including the manner in which the accounting records are maintained for stock items. Verified balances of Stocks have taken into Books of Accounts

c. The value of work in progress as shown in the Balance Sheet was Rs. 837,300,064.25. Valuation of work in progress was also carried out in keeping with the Sri Lanka Accounting Standards.

d. The balance shown in the General Reserve for the year 2015 is Rs. 1,055,693,647.73 when compared to Rs. 948,026,342.57 for the year 2014. This is a result of adjustments made in respect of depreciation and gratuity in the General Reserve Accounts as shown in the Balance Sheet. However, it is necessary to note the following information in respect of the depreciation account for the year 2015.

Application of the concept of depreciation in Annual Accounts, as given in the UGC Circular No.649 of 5th October, 1995 is followed in the year under review. The total Depreciation value for the year 2015 is Rs. 152,595,639.50.

e. The provision of Rs. 93,633,771.55 is made for retirement gratuity as at 31st December 2015. The provisions are made according to the gratuity act and the directives given by the University Grants Commission. An equal investment for this provision is unavailable.

Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements of the Wayamba University of Sri Lanka for the year ended 31 December 2015 in terms of Section 108(1) of the Universities Act, No. 16 of 1978.

The audit of financial statements of the Wayamba University of Sri Lanka for the year ended 31 December 2015 comprising the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2015 and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in net assets and cash flow statement and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154(1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read in conjunction with Sub-section 107 (5), and Section 108 of the Universities Act, No. 16 of 1978. My comments and observations which I consider should be published with the Annual Report of the University in terms of Sub-section 108(1) of the Universities Act appear in this report. A detailed report in terms of Sub-section 108 (2) of the Universities Act, will be issued to the Vice Chancellor of the University in due course.

1.2 Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards and for such internal control as the management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatements whether due to fraud or error.

1.3 Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit. I conducted my audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards consistent with International Auditing Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAI 1000-1810). Those Standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatements of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the University's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the University's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements.. Sub-sections (3) and (4) of Section 13 of the Finance Act, No. 38 of 1971 give discretionary powers to the Auditor General to determine the scope and extent of the audit.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my audit opinion.

1.4 Basis for Qualified Opinion

My opinion is qualified based on the matters described in paragraph 2:2 of this report.

2. Financial Statements

2.1 Qualified Opinion

In my opinion, except of the matters described in paragraph 2:2 of this report the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Wayamba University of Sri Lanka as at 31 December 2015 and its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

2.2 Comments on Financial Statements.

2.2.1 Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards

The following observations are made.

(a.) Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 01

Even though assets and liabilities shall not be offset unless permitted, out of payable scholarship fund of Rs.201,145 as at 31 December of the year under review a sum of Rs.44,427 had been shown in the statement of financial position.

(b.) Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 03

Although the assets costing Rs. 451,864,242 had been fully depreciated as the useful life of non-current assets had not been reviewed annually, they had still been in use. Accordingly, action had not been taken to revise the error in the estimate.

(c.) Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 07

Even though an asset should be depreciated on a systematic basis throughout its useful life since it is made available for use, library books valued at Rs. 307,045 purchased during the year 2006 and 2008 had been capitalized in the year under review. Hence, adjustments had not been made with respect to depreciations of the preceding year.

2.2.2 Accounting Policies

The total of the Government capital grants amounted to Rs. 2,918,722,000 by the end of the year under review, and the assets acquired by utilizing those grants had been depreciated. However, action had not been taken to account the amortization in that connection.

2.2.3 Accounting Deficiencies

The following observations are made.

(a.) The sum of Rs. 73,843 retained in hand in the construction of a storeroom for the Physical Education Unit, *Kuliyapitiya* had been settled on 15 December 2013 by crediting the Buildings Account instead of the Cash in Hand Account.

(b.) Action had not been taken to identify and account the direct receipts to the bank totalling Rs. 1,197,000 in respect of the period from February 2003 to September 2015.

2.2.4 Lack of Evidence for Audit

Schedules, Register of Fixed Assets and physical verification reports with respect to fixed assets valued at Rs. 1,836,129,051, were not made available to audit.

2.3 Non-compliances with Laws, Rules, Regulations and Management Decisions

The following non-compliances were observed.

2.4 Accounts Receivable and Payable

The following observations are made.

- (a) A sundry debtor balance of Rs. 17,932, and receivable hostel fees amounting to Rs. 261,867 had remained outstanding over a period of more than 05 years.
- (b) Action had not been taken even by the end of the year under review to settle the balance totalling Rs. 29,097,110 in respect of creditors, retention, and deposits relating to a period of 02 to 04 years, and 06 items of liabilities amounting to Rs. 691,987 that had been shown under other liabilities.
- (c) Monies amounting to Rs. 7,575,176, and Rs. 3,638,359 payable to the second stage of the Faculty of Agriculture and Plantation Management, *Makandura* that had been handed over after completion in 2013, and the first stage of the Faculty of Business Studies and Finance, *Kuliyapitya*, respectively, had not been settled even up to 31 December 2015.
- (d) Action had not been taken to settle 17 years old advances amounting to Rs. 386,045 that had been paid to external parties.
- (e) Action had not been taken to settle a sum older than 01 year amounting to Rs. 409,698, a sum older than 02 years amounting to Rs. 697,516, and a sum older than 03 years amounting to Rs. 935,641 shown in the accounts payable as at 31 December 2015.

3. Financial Review

3.1 Financial Results

According to the financial statements presented, the financial result of the University for the Year ended 31 December 2015 had resulted in a deficit of Rs. 140,081,000 as compared with the deficit of Rs. 101,915,000 in the preceding year. As such, an increase in the deficit of the year under review by Rs. 38,166,000 was observed as compared with the preceding year. Although the Government grants for recurrent expenditure had increased by Rs. 145,242,000, the increase in the deficit had mainly been attributed by the increase in the employee remuneration, and depreciation by sums of Rs. 115,979,000, and Rs. 55,042,000 respectively.



4. Operating Review

4.1 Performance

Differences were observed between the approved and actual number of students enrolled in each academic year for the faculties of the University. Although 200 students had been approved for the Faculty of Applied Sciences for the academic year 2013/2014, the number of students actually enrolled was 182. The approved number of students for the Faculty of Livestock, Fisheries and Nutrition was 170, whereas the number of students enrolled was 100. As student enrollments had not been made according to a proper methodology, action had not been taken by the top management to enroll the specified number of students.

4.2 Management Activities

The following observations are made.

- (a) Due to failure in procuring the bunkbeds and equipment valued at Rs. 10,728,976 that had been ordered in the year 2015 for 05 students hostels handed over in the year 2014 after completion of the constructions, those hostels could not be allowed for use of the students even by the end of the year under review.
- (b) The manner in charging fees differs from course to course and there were instances in which fees were paid in full or by installments. Books had not been maintained in a manner enabling to identity of those payments.
- (c) Lecture hours, field hours, and practical hours had not been separately planned when the Visiting Lecturers for the Faculty of Agriculture and Plantation Management, and the Faculty of Livestock, Fisheries and Nutrition had been appointed. In making payments, differences were observed between the approved lectures, practical hours and the number of hours performed.
- (d) Goods valued at Rs. 1,647,590 that had been purchased under the livestock development programme, had not been entered in the stock registers of the University.

(e.) Ownership of Lands of the University

The following observations are made.

- (i) Certificates of transfer had not been obtained in respect of the Plot No. 452 in Plan No. 992 of the *Kuliyapitya* premises, Plot Nos. 1,2, and 7 in Plan No. 4490 of the *Wennappuwa* premises, and the Plan No. 10661 of the *Makandura* premises.
- (ii) Although a sum of Rs. 10 million had been paid to the Coconut Research Institute with respect to the land of 05 acres in extent at the *Makandura* premises, a deed of transfer had not been obtained in that connection.
- (iii) The University had obtained 09 plots into possession under 06 plans, but a Registry of Fixed Assets had not been maintained thereon. The values of those lands had not been obtained by being assessed separately.

4.3 Idle and Underutilized Assets.

The buildings constructed by incurring a sum of Rs. 2,484,494 in the year 2014 under the Livestock Development Programme of the Faculty of Livestock, Fisheries and Nutrition had remained unused even up to 31 December of the year under review.

4.4 Contract Administration

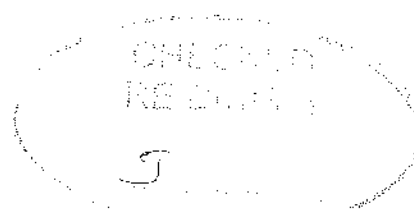
The following observations are made.

- (a.) Although a delay ranging from 09 to 23 months had occurred for the completion of 05 contracts relating to the constructions of the University, action had not been taken to charge liquidated damages in that connection.
- (b.) Approval of the Cabinet of Ministers had been received for the consultancy firm to construct the proposed cafeteria building with a floor area of 8392 square feet for accommodating 500 students and staff members simultaneously at an estimated cost of Rs. 45 million under the condition that the cost shall not be revised.



The following observations are made in this connection.

- (i) The initial estimate for the entire building had been prepared on 19 December 2012 at a cost of Rs. 38,000,000. However, the estimated cost had been increased up to a total of Rs. 56,300,000 by dividing the estimate into 3 phases comprising the first phase for a sum of Rs. 20,000,000, the second phase for a sum of Rs. 14,400,000 and the third phase for a sum of Rs. 21,900,000.
- (ii) Although the Institute had prepared the cost estimate for the first phase of the building at a value of Rs. 20,000,000 with the agreement of the Consultancy Firm, a revised estimate to the value of Rs. 34,000,000 had been prepared for the procurement process.
- (iii) As the initial cost estimate for the entire building valued at Rs. 38,000,000 had been revised without any justification in a manner that the cost only for the first phase amounted to Rs. 34,000,000, the total estimated cost amounted to Rs. 70,300,000. Accordingly, the limit of expenditure amounting to Rs. 45,000,000 that had been approved by the Cabinet of Ministers, had been exceeded by a sum of Rs. 25,300,000.
- (iv) In terms of the Public Finance Circular, No. 02/2012 dated 07 August 2012, approval of the Cost Estimate Examination Committee had not been obtained in respect of the said revision of cost.
- (v) Although it had been agreed to pay a fee of Rs. 2,280,000 for the entire building in respect of the consultancy services, the fee had been increased to Rs. 4,218,000 due to the revision of cost.
- (vi) Following instructions of the Consultancy Firm, the Technical Evaluation Committee had not taken action to reach an agreement with the contractor who had furnished the lowest bid thereby turning down the lowest bid, and recommending the second lowest bid. As such, the contract value had increased by a sum of Rs. 7,988,576.



5. Accountability and Good Governance

5.1 Action Plan

The following observations are made.

- (a.) In terms of Section 04 of the Public Finance Circular, No. 01/2014 dated 17 February 2014, an annual Action Plan should have been prepared including activities for achieving the objectives of the relevant Act together with a long-term vision. However, the plan for the year under review furnished to audit had not been prepared in accordance with the Circular.
- (b.) Three projects with an estimated cost of Rs. 3,500,000 that had been planned to be implemented during the year under review in accordance with the Action Plan, had not been implemented due to non-receipt of provisions.
- (c.) A sum of Rs. 17,337,712 had been incurred in excess of the provisions of 06 projects implemented during the year under review, and the excess represented a range of 11 to 83 per cent.

5.2 Budgetary Control

Overestimates amounting to Rs. 71,913,000 had been prepared with respect to 50 items of the Budget, and expenses amounting to Rs. 52,807,000 had been incurred in excess of the budgeted provisions of 29 Objects. A provision of Rs. 850,000 made for 02 Objects in the year under review, and the total provision of Rs. 12,926,804 made for the Information Technology Development Project during the years 2014, and 2015, had been saved. Accordingly, it was observed that the budget had not been made use of as an effective instrument of control.

5.3 Tabling of Annual Reports in Parliament

The annual report of the University should have been tabled in Parliament within 150 days of closure of the financial year in terms of Section 6.5.3 of the Public Enterprises Circular No. PED/12 dated 02 June 2003. However, the report for the year 2013 had not been tabled even by 31 December of the year under review.



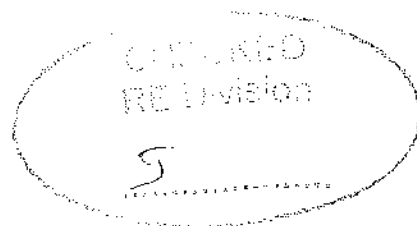
06. Systems and Controls

Deficiencies in systems and controls observed during the course of audit were brought to the notice of the Vice Chancellor of the University from time to time. Special attention is needed in respect of the following areas of control.

2.2 Comments on Financial Statements

2.2.1 Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards

The following observations are made.

(a) Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 01

Even though assets and liabilities shall not be offset unless permitted, out of payable scholarship fund of Rs. 201,145 as at 31 December of the year under review a sum of Rs. 44,427 had been shown in the statement of financial position.

This account shows the funds received for the award of scholarships / medals at the General Convocation to students who show special skills under the different Faculties, scholarships payments and the balance funds remaining for the different scholarships. The funds received for scholarships / medals are invested in fixed deposits and the scholarships / medals have been awarded based on the interests accrued in the relevant year.

(b) Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 03

Although the assets costing Rs. 451,864,242 had been fully depreciated as the useful life of non-current assets had not been reviewed annually, they had still been in use. Accordingly, action had not been taken to revise the error in the estimate.

From 01.01.2014 onwards, the Financial Division has entered into the Fixed Assets Software Package the details of assets acquired. The values of fixed assets of the University up to 31.12.2013 are being revalued at present and schedules have been drawn up. Accordingly, action is being taken to enter the revised values into the Statements of Accounts of 2016.

(c) Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 07

Even though an asset should be depreciated on a systematic basis throughout its useful life since it is made available for use, library books valued at Rs. 307,045 purchased during the year 2006 and 2008 had been capitalized in the year under review. Hence, adjustments had not been made with respect to depreciations of the preceding year.

The relevant advances paid for the purchase of library books for the years 2006, 2008 and 2009 have been settled in the year 2015. Based on the Inventory Service Certificates 7991 and 7992 forwarded by the Library for the settlement of advances, entries have been made in the accession registers for the year 2015. Therefore, depreciation adjustments have been made only for the year 2015.

2.2.2 Accounting policies

The total of the Government capital grants amounted to Rs. 2,918,722,000 by the end of the year under review, and the assets acquired by utilizing those grants had been depreciated. However, action had not been taken to account the amortization in that connection.

As per the Sri Lanka Accounting Standards No. 20 (LKAS 20), action will be taken for amortization in the preparation of the Government Capital Grants 2016.

2.2.3 Accounting Deficiencies

The following observations are made.

- (a) The sum of Rs. 73,843 retained in hand in the construction of a storeroom for the Physical Education Unit, *Kuliyapitiya* had been settled on 15 December 2013 by crediting the Buildings Account instead of the Cash in Hand Account.

Out of the direct receipts to the A/C 0002874770 of Bank of Ceylon, Kuliyaipitiya, Rs. 1,000,000 has been identified and accounted up to September 2015 as per the bank reconciliation details of August 2016. The Coordinators of relevant courses

have been informed of the unidentified amount of Rs. 197,000.00. At present, a methodology is being developed to systematically identify the course fees deposited directly to the bank by the students.

2.2.4 Lack of Evidence for Audit

Schedules, Register of Fixed Assets and physical verification reports with respect to fixed assets valued at Rs. 1,836,129,051 were not made available to audit.

Fixed Assets Registers and Schedules

Currently the process of revaluation of fixed assets is being carried out and schedules are being prepared accordingly. The progress of the said process is given below :

2.4 Accounts Receivable and Payable

The following observations are made.

- a) A sundry debtor balance of Rs.17,932, and receivable hostel fees amounting to Rs. 261,867 had remained outstanding over a period of more than 5 years.

Sundry Debtors - Rs. 17,932.08

A sum of Rs. 17,932.08 overspent in the year 2007 under the Research Project received from CARP (Council for Agricultural Research Policy) has been accounted as debtors in the year 2008.

Receivable Hostel Fees – Rs. 261,867.00

These hostel fees due from students are recovered from them at the time of their obtaining the University Degree Certificate. Since some students do not complete the degree programme it is not possible to obtain the due fees from them. Steps were taken to collect the due funds in accordance with the degree applications received for the year 2015.

- b) Action had not been taken even by the end of the year under review to settle the balance totaling Rs. 29,097,110 in respect of creditors, retention and deposits relating to a period of 02 to 04 years, and 06 items of liabilities amounting to Rs. 691,987 that had been shown under other liabilities.

Out of the amount of Rs. 28,907,110.00 given in the accounts as expenses payable Rs. 26,864,255.00 pertains to the year 2015. Most of these payable accounts have been settled as at present and action is being taken to settle immediately the balances brought forward for a number of years.

- c) Monies amounting to Rs. 7,575,176, and Rs. 3,638,359 payable to the second stage of the Faculty of Agriculture and Plantation Management, *Makandura* that had been handed over after completion in 2013, and the first stage of the Faculty of Business Studies & Finance, *Kuliyapitiya*, respectively, had not been settled even up to 31 December 2015.

Faculty of Agriculture & Plantation Management Stage II

Payment has been made for the above bills in 2016 under Voucher No. C222.

Faculty of Business Studies & Finance Stage I

Payment has been made for the above bills in 2016 under Voucher No. C345.

- d) Action had not been taken to settle 17 years old advances amounting to Rs. 386,045 that had been paid to external parties.

Since it has not been possible to locate all documents pertaining to these advances taken for library books and journals at the time of the Wayamba Campus of the Rajarata University of Sri Lanka (1996-1999), they have been shown as unsettled capital advances in the accounts.

As per the recommendation made at the 54th Meeting of the Audit Committee the approval has been sought by letter dated 26.09.2016 addressed to the Secretary of the Ministry of Higher Education & Highways to write off these advances in accordance with the Financial Regulations 108. The Secretary, Ministry of Higher Education & Highways, by his letter dated 27.10.2016, had informed that action should be taken according to the instructions of the Public Finance Circular No. 02/2016. (Annexure 03).

- e) Action had not been taken to settle a sum older than 01 year amounting to Rs.409,698, a sum older than 02 years amounting to Rs. 697,516, and a sum older than 03 years amounting to Rs. 935, 641 shown in the accounts payable as at 31 December 2015.

The answer given in 2.4 (b) applies.

3. Financial Review

3.1 Financial Results

According to the financial statements presented, the financial result of the University for the year ended 31 December 2015 had resulted in a deficit of Rs. 140,081,000 as compared with the deficit of Rs. 101,915,000 in the preceding year. As such, an increase in the deficit of the year under review

by Rs. 38,166,000 was observed as compared with the preceding year. Although the Government grants for recurrent expenditure had increased by Rs. 145,242,000, the increase in the deficit had mainly been attributed by the increase in the employee remuneration, and depreciation by sums of Rs. 115, 979,000 and Rs. 55,042,000 respectively.

Agree with the observation.

4. Operating Review

4.1 Performance

Differences were observed between the approved and actual number of students enrolled in each academic year for the faculties of the university. Although 200 students had been approved for the Faculty of Applied Sciences for the academic year 2013/2014, the number of students actually enrolled was 182. The approved number of students for the Faculty of Livestock, Fisheries & Nutrition was 170, whereas the number of students enrolled was 100. As student enrollments had not been made according to a proper methodology, action had not been taken by the top management to enroll the specified number of students.

Faculty of Applied Sciences

On inquiry by the University Grants Commission from the Faculty of Applied Sciences with regard to the number of students expected to be admitted for the Academic Year 2013/2014, the Faculty of Applied Sciences had informed that the Faculty expected to admit 200 students for the said academic year.

Accordingly, the Student Registration and Welfare Branch had taken necessary action with the aim of admitting 200 students for the Faculty of Applied Sciences for the Academic Year 2013/2014. As per the data supplied by the Student Registration and Welfare Branch, by 19.02.2015, 205 students had been admitted to the Faculty of Applied Sciences in four stages (the initial registration of students and three stages of filling of vacancies) and academic programmes had been commenced for these students, the University Grants Commission had been

informed that the admission of the expected number of students for the Faculty of Applied Sciences had been completed.

However, even after the commencement of academic programmes pertaining to the academic year 2013/2014, due to the students being transferred to other Universities by the University Grants Commission a decrease can be seen in the number of students enrolled; further, due to certain flaws in the system of filling of vacancies, even after a considerable time of the commencement of the academic programmes, filling of vacancies created had not occurred. Since the admission of new students again and again would adversely affect the quality of the academic programme and the newly admitted students would miss part of the programme, the number of vacancies that occurred remained as they are.

Faculty of Livestock, Fisheries & Nutrition

Giving an opportunity for the students initially registered for the degree programmes of this Faculty to later admit themselves for other degree programmes and informing the students directly of such opportunity, is done by the University Grants Commission. This is directly conveyed to the students by the University Grants Commission. The vacancies so created in the Faculties are also handled by the University Grants Commission. The Universities cannot control this process.

4.2 Management Activities

The following observations are made.

- (a) Due to failure in procuring the bunkbeds and equipment valued at Rs. 10,728,976 that had been ordered in the year 2015 for 05 students hostels handed over in the year 2014 after completion of the constructions, those hostels could not be allowed for use of the students even by the end of the year under review.

The Hostels which had been completed and handed over in the year 2014 have been given to the students and one Hostel at Kuliyaipitiya is due to be given to the students in the near future.

The reason for the inability to provide bunk beds speedily, was that initially it had been decided to manufacture them with wood but later it had been decided to construct them with steel.

- (b) The manner in charging fees differs from course to course and there were instances in which fees were paid in full or by installments. Books had not been maintained in a manner enabling to identify of those payments.

This has been discussed with all Course Directors and Administrative and Financial Coordinators on 11.11.2016 and it was informed that separate books are maintained for all courses. Further, it was declared that in all courses, at the time of permitting students to sit for examinations and when awarding certificates, it is checked whether the full payment has been made. It is kindly informed that, if necessary, the books maintained for the courses can be obtained from the Administrative Coordinators for purpose of checking.

- (c) Lecture hours, field hours, and practical hours had not been separately planned when the Visiting Lecturers for the Faculty of Agriculture and Plantation Management, and the Faculty of Livestock, Fisheries & Nutrition had been appointed. In making payments, differences were observed between the approved lectures, practical hours and the number of hours performed.

Faculty of Agriculture & Plantation Management

A regular attendance register is maintained at the Faculty Office of the Faculty of Agriculture & Plantation Management for the Visiting Lecturers. The relevant Department of Study which obtains the services of the Visiting Lecturer duly records the arrival and departure of the Visiting Lecturers concerned and action is taken to make their payments accordingly. In the year 2014 there is no discrepancy between the approved number of hours of lectures and practical classes and the number of hours executed.

Faculty of Livestock, Fisheries & Nutrition

Dr. Bandula Ranaweera

Dr. Bandula Ranaweera had been assigned 35 lecture hours and 30 practical hours under the subject LFN 1324. Out of this, 35 lecture hours and part of the 30 practical hours had been conducted as field trips under his instructions. The rest had been fulfilled by the Temporary Demonstrators and Assistant Lecturers of the Department.

Dr. J C Edirisinghe

The 15 hours initially approved for Dr. J C Edirisinghe on the subject LFN 3222 had been taught for 30 hours on the request of the Faculty of Livestock, Fisheries & Nutrition.

Prof. D A M Perera

Although Dr. D A M Perera had been assigned 30 hours to teach the subject Principles of Food Marketing and Business Economics, he had conducted 7.5 hours less due to the following reasons :

- Lectures for the year had commenced on 21st April 2014 and had been completed on 08th August 2014. Out of this fifteen week period, reasons such as mid-semester examination and presentations, prevented lectures by several weeks.
- Further, at each day of lectures, an extra ½ hour of lectures had been conducted but has not been entered into the lecture record book.
- Due to the practical nature of the subject, in addition to lectures dissemination of knowledge has been carried out by involving the students in practical activities, and such time spent had not been recorded.

- (d) Goods valued at Rs. 1,647,590 that had been purchased under the livestock development programs, had not been entered in the stock registers of the University.

This activity had been carried out under Livestock Development Project of the Department of Livestock & Avian Sciences of the Faculty of Livestock, Fisheries and Nutrition. The Works Supervisor of Makandura Premises had recommended that the goods had been received by the University and have been utilized for the above project and the payments have been made with the approval of the Head of the Department and the Dean of the Faculty.

(e) Ownership of Lands of the University

The following observations are made.

- (i) Certificates of transfer had not been obtained in respect of the Plot No. 452 in Plan No. 992 of the *Kuliyapitiya* premises, Plot Nos. 1, 2, and 7 in Plan No. 4490 of the *Wennappuwa* premises, and the Plan No. 10661 of the *Makandura* premises.

The Order of Transfer for Plan No. 992, Plot No. 452 of the land called “Bakmeegahakumbura” has been produced to the Government Audit Division.

Although the land “Bogahaowita” - Plan No. 4490, No. 1, 2 and 7 had been handed over to the Wayamba University of Sri Lanka by the Wennappuwa Divisional Secretary for the establishment of the proposed Faculty of Engineering, the land had not been legally transferred to the University. Therefore, a certificate of transfer has not been obtained.

Plan No. 10661 - A land belonging to the Coconut Research Institute consisting of 5 acres has been given for the use of the University, but this land has not been legally handed over and therefore, transfer certificate has not been issued. The process of transfer is underway.

- (ii) Although a sum of Rs. 10 million had been paid to the Coconut Research Institute with respect to the land of 05 acres in extent at the *Makandura* premises, a deed of transfer had not been obtained in that connection.

Coconut Research Institute has pointed out that there was no legal basis to return the Rs. 10 Million which had been paid to the Institute for the transfer of the land of 05 acres belonging to the Institute to the University. By letter No. MPE/DEV3/01/Wayamba/04 dated 21.03.2016, the Secretary, Ministry of Plantation Management has informed the Secretary, Ministry of Lands that this transaction was not a purchase but obtaining a development value as per a valuation. However, since by this time large scale development has taken place, we have, by letter dated 20.04.2016, requested the Secretary of the Ministry of Lands to legally transfer the land to the Wayamba University of Sri Lanka. (Annexure 05).

- (iii) The University had obtained 09 plots into possession under 06 plans, but a Registry of Fixed Assets had not been maintained thereon. The values of those lands had not been obtained by being assessed separately.

At this time preparation of Fixed Assets Register is in progress.

4.3 Idle and Underutilized Assets.

The buildings constructed by incurring a sum of Rs. 2,484,494 in the year 2014 under the Livestock Development programme of the Faculty of Livestock, Fisheries & Nutrition had remained unused even up to 31 December of the year under review.

Since the basic and essential requirements for housing animals, such as electricity, water, security fence, security guard during the night and a security hut have not been completed the farm has not yet been brought up to the standard for utilization as a farm. Therefore, it is hoped to inform the completion of the work once the above items are fulfilled.

However, with effect from 11.02.2016 it has been possible to obtain a security guard for this farm. Although, water which is an essential factor for the animals

has not yet been established from the day a security officer was appointed, animals have been installed and the farm is maintained. Daily water is supplied through the expenses and labour of the academic and non-academic staff on duty at the Department of Livestock & Avian Sciences.

Although the essential requirements have not been fulfilled, from the day a security officer was assigned the farm was being maintained on a praiseworthy level.

4.4 Contract Administration

The following observations are made.

- (a) Although a delay ranging from 09 to 23 months had occurred for the completion of 05 contracts relating to the constructions of the University, action had not been taken to charge liquidated damages in that connection.

For all 05 contract work, recommendations have been received from the Sri Lanka State Engineering Cooperation on the factors pertaining to the delays and extensions of time have been granted accordingly.

Granting of extensions instead of the payment of interest as per the agreements, rainy days, delays and changes in providing consultation and designs by the project engineer have had an effect on delays in payment of bills.

- (b) Approval of the Cabinet of Ministers had been received for the consultancy firm to construct the proposed cafeteria building with a floor area of 8392 square feet for accommodating 500 students and staff members simultaneously at an estimated cost of Rs. 45 million under the condition that the cost shall not be revised.

The following observations are made in this connection.

- (i) The initial estimate for the entire building had been prepared on 19 December 2012 at a cost of Rs. 38,000,000. However, the estimated cost had been increased up to a total of Rs. 56,300,000 by dividing the estimate into 3 phases comprising the first phase for a sum of Rs. 20,000,000, the second phase for a sum of Rs. 14,400,000 and the third phase for a sum of Rs. 21,900,000.

- (ii) Although the institute had prepared the cost estimate for the first phase of the building at a value of Rs. 20,000,000 with the agreement of the Consultancy Firm, a revised estimate to the value of Rs. 34,000,000 had been prepared for the procurement process.
- (iii) As the initial cost estimate for the entire building valued at Rs. 38,000,000 had been revised without any justification in a manner that the cost only for the first phase amounted to Rs. 34,000,000, the total estimated cost amounted to Rs. 70,300,000. Accordingly, the limit of expenditure amounting to Rs. 45,000,000 that had been approved by the Cabinet of Ministers had been exceeded by a sum of Rs. 25,300,000.

These canteens had been planned as quite small projects to provide facilities immediately for the increasing student numbers. Initially, approval had been granted to construct a canteen of 8,392 sq.ft under a rough estimate of Rs. 45 million provided by the project consultant.

Later, in view of the need for management of the limited space and the canteen should be further developed and extended in future, the project consultant had submitted proposals for a canteen consisting of a first storey of 7,984 sq.ft. and a second storey of 7,984 sq.ft. to be constructed in three stages. The total number of square feet was 15,968.

In this case, for the reinforcing of the slab of the first storey to suit the second storey, reinforcing the foundation, inserting a staircase and a staircase railing which were not included in the original estimate and for the in-built kitchen equipment of the canteen a large additional cost than the original estimate had to be borne.

However, together with the additional expenses, 11,872 sq.ft. of the contract has been completed. From the balance remaining after the payments, action will be taken to make further developments to the second storey.

Accordingly, an area of more than 8932 sq.ft. has been completed within an amount of Rs. 45 Mn. and it is kindly informed that the expenses have not exceeded the approved amount.

- (iv) In terms of the Public Finance Circular, No. 02/2012 dated 07 August 2012, approval of the Cost Estimate Examination Committee had not been obtained in respect of the said revision of cost.

You have stated the facts in this audit query taking into consideration the proposals for future developments as a whole.

Future action has been planned, after obtaining the approval of the Department of National Planning, to consider the proposed Stage II as an extension to the Canteen and the development of the 2nd storey as a new project.

Since this is not a revision of the cost the approval of the Cost Estimate Examination Committee is not required.

- (v) Although it had been agreed to pay a fee of Rs. 2,280,000 for the entire building in respect of the consultancy services, the fee had been increased to Rs. 4,218,000 due to the revision of cost.

The payments due to the consultancy firm is only the payment relating to the consultancy services provided for this contract. The second stage of future developments are proposed as a separate project and payments for any services provided by a consultancy firm will be made under that project.

- (vi) Following instructions of the Consultancy Firm, the Technical Evaluation Committee had not taken action to reach an agreement with the contractor who had furnished the lowest bid thereby turning down the lowest bid, and recommending the second lowest bid. As such, the contract value had increased by a sum of Rs. 7,988,576.

The Contract has been awarded to the Lowest Substantively Responsive Bidder as per the report of the Technical Evaluation Committee. Two other bidders had been rejected due to the inadequacy of dates of the bid bonds and non-submission of bid guarantees as per the bidding conditions, which are considered as major deviations.

5. Accountability and Good Governance.

5.1 Action Plan

The following observations are made.

- (a) The terms of Section 04 of the Public Finance Circular, No. 01/2014 dated 17 February 2014, an annual Action Plan should have been prepared including activities for achieving the objectives of the relevant Act together with a long-term vision. However, the plan for the year under review furnished to audit had not been prepared in accordance with the Circular.

All efforts are made to prepare the Action Plan of the Wayamba University of Sri Lanka in accordance with the objectives given in the Public Enterprise Circular No. PPD/RRD/01/04/2014/01. However, in some instances, due to timely considerations and various constraints, it has been necessary to change the objectives.

- (b) Three projects with an estimated cost of Rs. 3,500,000 that had been planned to be implemented during the year under review in accordance with the Action Plan, had not been implemented due to non-receipt of provisions.
- (c) A sum of Rs. 17,337,712 had been incurred in excess of the provisions of 06 projects implemented during the year under review, and the excess represented a range of 11 to 83 per cent.

Only a sum of Rs. 45 Mn. had been allocated for constructions from the total budget estimates and accordingly, revising the original estimate a certain percentage had been set apart for projects of high priority and those with bills in hand.

The grant that should be set apart initially had been valued approximately but a very small percentage had been set apart from the budget allocation.

Since the allocation given in the budget was not sufficient, setting apart a certain percentages for different projects, payments had been made requesting for

additional allocation with the receipt of bills for the different projects, and not based on the actual requirements of the projects.

5.2 Budgetary Control

Overestimates amounting to Rs. 71,913,000 had been prepared with respect to 50 items of the Budget, and expenses amounting to Rs. 52,807,000 had been incurred in excess of the budgeted provisions of 29 Objects. A provision of Rs. 850,000 made for 02 Objects in the year under review, and the total provision of Rs. 12,926,804 made for the information Technology Development Project during the years 2014, and 2015, had been saved. Accordingly, it was observed that the budget had not been made use of as an effective instrument of control.

- Estimates are prepared based on the actual expenditure of the previous years and the plans and different assumptions for the forthcoming year. Variations in the macroeconomic conditions cause such variations and action will be taken to minimize such variations in the future.
- Although funds had been set apart under the following expense heads in the Budget of 2015 no expenses had been made during the said year.

The University Grants Commission by letter dated 31.08.2015 had granted an allocation of Rs. 10 Mn. for Information Technology Development projects of the Faculty of Agriculture & Plantation Management and the Faculty of Livestock, Fisheries & Nutrition in August 2015. The related procurement activities of the purchases were in process at the end of the year and as at 31.12.2015 purchase orders to the value of Rs. 8.6 had been issued. These equipment have been received in 2016 and the details of the payments are given in the annexed schedule.

5.3 Tabling of Annual Reports in Parliament

The annual report of the University should have been tabled in Parliament within 150 days of closure of the financial year in terms of Section 6.5.3 of the Public Enterprises Circular No. PED/12 dated 02 June 2003. However, the report for the year 2013 had not been tabled even by 31 December of the year under review.

Annual Report 2013

At present 07 copies of the Annual Report of 2013, prepared in all three languages have been submitted to the Ministry of Higher Education. Thereafter, the date for submission of the annual report to the Parliament is given by the Ministry of Higher Education. Action will be taken to submit the Annual Report 2013 after receiving from the Ministry a date for submission to the Parliament.

06. Systems and Controls

Deficiencies in systems and controls observed during the course of audit were brought to the notice of the Vice-Chancellor of the University from time to time. Special attention is needed in respect of the following areas of control.

<u>Area of Systems and Controls</u>	<u>Observations</u>
(a) Contract Administration	Period of contract had been continuously extended in case of delays without liquidated damages being charged.

The delays in projects have been due as a whole to the following reasons :

1. Inability to pay the bills within the stipulated period. (In the delays of bills due, related interests or extensions of time have to be granted.)
2. Natural conditions - rainy days.
3. Due to the delays in submission of consultations and drawings by the consultancy firm.

The Contractors hold the right to request for time extensions due to the above factors.

Accordingly, with the recommendation of the State Engineering Corporation, extensions of time have been given without charging liquidated damages.

In future, in order to control such situations, conditions will be included in the agreements with the consultancy firms.

In order to fill the vacancies in the academic staff, applications have been called through newspaper advertisements and recruitments have been made in some departments of study. Interviews are being held for recruitments in other departments. Further, action is being taken to place newspaper advertisements for positions still remaining vacant. Accordingly, the number of vacant positions has been minimized. Due to this reason, appointment of Visiting Lecturers can be reduced in future.
