4. THE UNIVERSITY

4.1 INTRODUCTION

The Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka is situated on the left of the way to Samanalawewa reservoir and is over 160 kilometers away from *Colombo – Badulla* highway. The University comprises of five (05) Academic Faculties, namely,

- Faculty of Agricultural Sciences
- Faculty of Applied Sciences
- Faculty of Geomatics
- Faculty of Management Studies
- Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages

In addition to these five Faculties, there are six study centers. They are as follows:

- Centre for Computer Studies
- Agri – Business Research and Development Centre (ABRDS)
- Career Guidance Unit
- External Degree Programmes and Extension Services Unit
- Staff Development Centre

In the year 2009, five faculties offered twenty eight BA / B.Sc. Degree Programmes, based on the Semester or the Course Units System of study, to a student population of about 2378. The annual intake of the University is in the region of about 265 students. Apart from some of the Degree Programmes offered by the Faculties of Applied Sciences and Social Sciences, which are of three-year duration, the rest extend over to a four-year period. The medium of instruction of all science – based programmes is English. Wherever possible, the Lecturers strive to assist undergraduates by presenting the relevant course materials in Sinhala or Tamil medium as the case may be. The students reading for a degree at the Sabaragamuwa University could also select optional courses even from another Department within their own Faculty (inter – departmental courses), while following the major and minor subjects.

Apart from all these Faculties, Study Centers and Units, the University has an Affiliated Academy named Sri Lanka Military Academy (SLMA). This academy situated at Diyatalawa prepares army cadets for the Degree of Bachelor of Military Studies awarded by the University.

DEGREE PROGRAM:

The Faculty of Agricultural Sciences offers a four year B.Sc. (Agricultural Sciences) program as per the old curriculum and a new program of four year B.Sc. (Agricultural Sciences and Management) as per the revised curriculum introduced in 2008. The new degree program will solely be offered after 2 years when the 2 batches of students who are following the old curriculum have passed out.

The Faculty is composed of 3 Departments of study as Agribusiness Management, Export Agriculture and Livestock Production. The Department of Export Agriculture offers 2 academic modules as Plantation Agriculture and Horticulture. The Agribusiness Management is unique for the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences of Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka.

During the first four semesters (First 2 years), students need to follow core-courses for their general study on Agriculture followed by specialization either in Plantation Agriculture or Horticulture or Livestock Production or Agribusiness Management for 2 more semesters (In the 3rd year). Students must select their field of specialization at the end of the second year according to the results in previous years and their preferences. Farm Practice, Computer Science and English are compulsory courses offered in the first three years and student must reach satisfactory grade for each course in each semester to complete the degree. In addition, we offer elective courses during the final year and students must select 4 elective courses according to their preferences during the first semester of their final year (In the 4th year). The final semester of the final year is allocated for Institutional or Industrial Training, which is a vital and specific component of the program, and Problem Analysis in Plantation Agriculture or Horticulture or Livestock Production or Agribusiness Management, in which student needs to identify a problem in the company/industry and needs to analyze it and provide recommendations. The medium of instruction in the whole degree program is English.

The Faculty organizes programs as practical components to consult farmers in the area so that knowledge and skills would be exchanged between students and farmers. Hence, the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences has developed an intimate relationship between the villages. Furthermore, we arrange vital 'Off Campus Tours' with the aim of developing skills and assisting some courses in the program.

Each Department has its own Mission as follows:

Department of Agribusiness Management

Department is geared to develop students' analytical, business and entrepreneurial skills to produce agro-entrepreneurs and agribusiness managers for the present and future.

Department of Export Agriculture

Department of Export Agriculture is to produce graduates who possess knowledge and skills in advanced agricultural technologies and are capable of managing horticultural and plantation operations of any scale.

Department of Livestock Production

Department strives to produce future leaders and innovators who can bear major responsibilities and perform roles for the enhancement of the livestock sector.

5.2 FACULTY OF APPLIED SCIENCES

VISION AND THE MISSION:

The Faculty has its own vision compatible to that of the University corporate plan for nation building through its products. The vision of the Faculty is to extend its facilities and services to develop as a premier centre for higher education and advanced research in the field of technology, thus enabling students following the degree programme to obtain a sound knowledge and acquire multi-disciplinary skills.

The mission of the Faculty is to search for and disseminate knowledge in the areas of learning that will make a useful contribution to the development of critical manpower requirements of the nation; contribute to education, science and technology and socio economic upliftment of the communities of the nation.

HISTORY OF THE FACULTY OF APPLIED SCIENCES:

The Faculty of Applied Sciences of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka was initially started as the Buttala Affiliated University College (BAUC) on 21st June 1993. The BAUC offered two diploma courses, one in Food Science and Technology and the other in English Language. With the elevation of the Affiliated University Colleges to fully fledged national Universities in early 1996, three Affiliated University Colleges; Sabaragamuwa Affiliated University College, Uva Affiliated University College and Buttala Affiliated University College were amalgamated to form the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka and the BAUC became the Faculty of Applied Sciences of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka.

With effect from March 2008, the Faculty has been relocated in the main campus premises at Belihuloya.

DEGREE PROGRAMMES:

The Faculty comprises three Departments - Department of Natural Resources, Department of Physical Sciences and Technology, and the Department of Food Sciences and Technology.

The Faculty offers B.Sc. (Special) degree programmes in Food Science and Technology, Environmental Sciences and Natural Resources Management, Chemical Technology, Computer Science and Technology and Applied Physics, Computing and Information Systems, Sports Science and Management and Physical Education for the students who gain direct entry to the faculty on the basis of their performance at the GCE (A/L) examination. Students for Food Science and Technology degree programme are selected through a separate window from the GCE (A/L) Examination bioscience stream, while students selected from the Applied Sciences window for the GCE (A/L) stream are entitled for degree programmes on 'Environmental Sciences and Natural Resources Management' and 'Physical Sciences' respectively.

The selection of the students for the B.Sc. degree programmes in Computing and Information Systems, Sports Sciences and Management and Physical Education is done on the basis of the G.C.E. (A/L) results as well as the performance at a selection test. The students who wish to get enrolled for the degree programmes in Sports Sciences and Management and Physical Education are also required to face an examination for physical fitness in addition to the selection test.

Even though the Faculty conducts Four Year (Special) degree programme, students who enroll for B.Sc. degree programmes in Environmental Sciences and Natural Resources Management, and Physical Sciences have an option to exit at the end of the third year.

The degree programmes are designed to suit the needs of the rapidly changing economic environment opportunities for graduates who pass out from the University. The programmes are conducted exclusively in English. The Faculty also contributes to the development of the community and the nation through its extension programmes.

The Department of Food Science and Technology which offers B.Sc. special degree in Food Science and Technology has 66 full-time students at present. The B.Sc. degree in Food Science and Technology is science based, interdisciplinary and also highly flexible. The range of the study area includes Food Science core, General Sciences, Environmental Science, Statistics, Computer Sciences, Marketing, Economics and courses in career development. The degree program is designed for the students who wish to pursue professional careers in the field of food science and technology. Our degree program has been formed mainly targeting the jobs in the private sector; however our students are capable of working in many relevant government institutes as well. The degree also paves an excellent path for postgraduate studies in the field of food science and technology.

One Professor and seven Probationary Lecturers in the internal lecturing panel are involved in the delivery of this program. However, there is also input to the courses from well recognized persons as visiting lecturers in some subjects. The permanent staff in the Department contribute to the teaching of programs in Natural Resources and Physical Sciences as well. The Department has two laboratories, namely Food Microbiology Laboratory and Food Processing and Analysis Laboratory.

The Department of Natural Resources of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka was established in 1996 offering a B.Sc. General Degree in Natural Resources. The degree program offered from the Department of Natural Resources is designed for the students who wish to pursue professional carriers in Environmental protection, Natural Resource Conservation, Management, Research planning, Environmental Advocacy or Ecology and is conducted by an Academic Staff comprised of expertise excelled in relevant study areas. The program aims to provide students with a comprehensive perspective on Environmental Science and Natural Resources by disseminating knowledge in a wide range of core and supportive courses.

On successful completion of our program, a student should have developed knowledge and understanding in depth, critical ability and independence of thought in the chosen area of study; be well motivated and well placed to meet the recruitment needs of employers.

By 2006, the programme has been restructured and enhanced the program as Environmental Science and Natural Resources Management. Currently the degree program is oriented in three major streams viz. Environmental Sciences, Conservation Biology and Earth Sciences with awarding two degree programs as BSc (Special) in Environmental Science and Natural Resources Management – 4 years and BSc (General) in Environmental Science and Natural Resources Management – 3 years. The degree also paves an excellent path for postgraduate studies. The annual intake has been increased up to 50 students.

The staff of the Department consists of one Senior Professor, three Senior Lecturers, three Probationary Lecturers and one Temporary Lecturer. All Probationary Lecturers are reading their PhD studies and the Senior Professor is working as the Vice Chancellor of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka.

Under the IRQUE Project funded by the World Bank, the Faculty of Applied Sciences National Symposium -2009 was organized by the Department of Natural Resources. Many resource persons in different fields were invited and made spaces to share their research experience with our students. Students received very rare opportunity to accompany with expert scientists to

gain their knowledge. In addition one diploma course is being conducted for school leavers by the Department.

The Department of Physical Sciences and Technology conducts degree courses in three major disciplines; namely, Chemical Technology, Applied Physics and Computer Science and Technology. Mathematics, Statistics, and Management Studies, Accounts are conducted as supporting tools for the programme.

Degrees Awarded

- BSc (Applied Sciences) Special Degree in Chemical Technology (Duration: 4 years)
- BSc (Applied Sciences) Special Degree in Computer Science and Technology (Duration: 4 years)
- BSc (Applied Sciences) Special Degree in Applied Physics (Duration: 4 years)
- BSc (Applied Sciences) Degree in Physical Sciences (Duration: 3 years)

Special features of the programme

- All theoretical course units are heavily supported by a practical component which provides the preliminary experience to perform confidently.
- Mini projects conducted throughout the third and the fourth academic years stimulate the students' creative and innovative thinking.
- Final year project (research or industrial training) for one entire semester exposes the undergraduates to the working environment and provides hands - on experience in industry before graduation.

Since its inception in the year 1997, the main intention of the Department has been to produce quality graduates who are at least comparable or better than those graduating from established Universities in the country. The environment in the campus and the teaching programmes were all designed in a manner to establish this goal and also to produce leaders in their respective professions.

To create such a situation the study programmes were all designed with a bias towards applied sciences rather than the basic sciences. Additionally, it is also creditable that the Department offers the only Degree in Applied Physics in the entire University System in the country. Additionally, the Department has also designed all degree programmes to provide students with a thorough knowledge in computer science and also English to enable them to be considered favourably while competing with graduates from more established Universities for relevant job opportunities in the country.

Though formation of the Department is under process, the degree program in Computing and Information Systems has been started by the Faculty of Applied Sciences, Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. In Sri Lanka, today, the demand for personnel in Information and Communication Technology far exceeds the available numbers and as such, has hindered the development of many a sector. Also, there is an intensive move by the government sector institutions to facilitate and increase the number of graduates and also skilled personnel in Computer Science and Information Technology, including those with specialist knowledge. The introduction of a new degree program in CIS would achieve the following objectives:

- a) To take the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka into the arena of technological innovative, especially in ICT.
- b) To prepare and mould students for the growing demand in ICT-intensive job market.
- c) To enable students from non-science-based study programs to follow optional course in ICT.
- d) To increase IT resources and infrastructure facilities in the University.
- e) To provide ICT training and consultancy services to the local community.

The introduction of bachelor's degree programs for the discipline of sports and physical education from the year of 2008 is a historical event. In the history of university education in Sri Lanka, bachelor's degree programs have not been offered for these subject areas by any university in the country.

1. Bachelor of Science Special Degree in Sport Sciences and Management

The course overview is:

- The program offers a comprehensive education in the area of sport sciences and management.
- Students mainly undertake studies in scientific basis of sports and management skills of those activities simultaneously with studies covering the theory and practice of teaching sports.
- Four years of full-time study leads to the award of a B.Sc.
- In general, a student may qualify for the award of Honors first class, second class upper and second class lower divisions.
- A minimum total of 120 credits points must be successfully completed for the award of this degree.

The program objectives and learning outcomes are:

- Attain competencies in managing a broad range of sports activities.
- Demonstrate sports activities skilfully.
- Critically analyze and apply the scientific theories to develop sports performance.
- Develop a broad range of communication skills and abilities to work as a member and a leader of a team.
- Develop advanced problem solving skills and a capacity for critical thinking for personal and social wellbeing.
- Identify life-long physical activities that maintain physical fitness and develop healthy citizens.
- Develop the ability to identify and apply ethical reasoning in the teaching of sports and physical education skills from examination of issues faced by the teachers who teach such activities.
- Do research to gain new wisdom in the area of sport sciences.

2. Bachelor of Science Special Degree in Physical Education

The course overview is:

- The program offers a comprehensive education in the area of PE.

- Students mainly undertake studies in scientific basis of PE activities and management skills of those activities simultaneously with studies covering the theory and practice of teaching HPE.
- Four years of full-time study leads to the award of a B.Sc.
- In general, a student may qualify for the award of Honors First Class, Second Class Upper and Second Class Lower divisions.
- A minimum total of 120 credit points must be successfully completed for the award of this degree.

The program objectives and learning outcomes are:

- Attain competencies in managing a broad range of physical activities.
- Demonstrate physical activities skilfully.
- Critically analyze and apply the scientific theories to develop physical performance.
- Develop a broad range of communication skills and abilities to work as a member and a leader of a team.
- Develop advanced problem solving skills and a capacity for critical thinking for personal and social wellbeing.
- Identify life-long physical activities that maintain physical fitness and develop healthy citizens.
- Develop the ability to identify and apply ethical reasoning in the teaching of sports and physical education skills from examination of issues faced by the teachers who teach such activities.
- Demonstrate professional competencies of a physical education teacher.
- Do research in the area of physical education.

GOALS:

The Faculty of Applied Sciences of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka has set the following goals for the year 2008:

- Improving the quality and the relevance of the undergraduate degree programmes offered by the Faculty through the implementation of the key activities of the IRQUE/QEF Grant.
- Development of the teaching and research skills of the academic staff
- Development of the academic and soft skills of the students.
- Career development of the academic staff by equipping them for postgraduate studies and short – term training programmes.

The Faculty started admitting students with Advanced Level qualification only from the year 1998.

The Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages prepares students for professional careers, by providing them with a broad understanding of the humanistic tradition in combination with a sound knowledge of subjects in several disciplines. Our degree programmes emphasize the

ability to apply this knowledge to problems and tasks in the contemporary world of work. DEPARTMENTS AND DEGREE PROGRAMMES

The Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages consists of three departments that are responsible for the award of degrees, the **Department of Economics and Statistics** the **Department of Languages** and the **Department of Social Sciences**.

1. Department of Economics and Statistics

The Department of Economics and Statistics offers a three year Bachelor of Arts Special (Social Sciences) degree together with the following Four Year Special Degrees; Bachelor of Arts (Special) Economics and Bachelor of Arts (Special) Statistics.

2. Department of Languages

The Department of Languages and Department of English Language Teaching currently offer 09 subjects as follows; Sinhala (**SIN**), Tamil (**TAM**), English (**ENG**), Hindi Studies (**HND**), Chinese Studies (**CHI**) German Studies (**GER**) Japanese Studies (**JPS**), Journalism (**JRN**), Japanese Language (**JPL**), Computer Studies (**COM**).

The first six subjects mentioned above may be taken as Major or Minor Subjects. JPS is only offered as a major. The next three may only be taken as Minor Subjects at present.

3. Department of Social Sciences

The Department of Social Sciences offers a three year Bachelor of Arts Special (Social Sciences) degree together with the following four year Special Degrees; Bachelor of Arts (Special) Geography, Bachelor of Arts (Special) Political Science and Bachelor of Arts (Special) Sociology and Anthropology.

The students have the freedom to select subjects from any of these three departments, while the curricula of many of the subjects were designed to provide students with the option of selecting different courses even within a selected subject.

4. Department: of English Language Teaching

The Department of English Language Teaching functions as a service Department for the entire University. The DELT was established in 2004 in place of the former English Unit (ELTU), in line with the academic emphasis the University places on English studies. It offers compulsory English language course for the degree programmes conducted by the Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages.

ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE FACULTY:

International Achievements

The staff of the Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages reached a standard level as researchers. Most of the members of the staff have presented research papers in national and international symposiums.

National Achievements

The staff of the Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages has contributed to national level seminars and workshops and has provided consultancy services for various institutions.

Institutional Achievements

1. Establishment of Department of Economics and Statistics

The Department of Social Sciences submitted a proposal to the Senate to establish a new Department of Economics and Statistics. The proposal was approved by the Standing Committee on Social Sciences and Humanities of the University Grants Commission (UGC) in 2008 and it was referred to the main Commission of the University Grants Commission for its approval. The UGC granted its approval to establish a new department as the *Department of Economics and Statistics* on March 2009 and it was published in the Gazette as extraordinary No. 1602/19 dated 21st May 2009. The Department of Economics and Statistics was established in the new Faculty building complex on 22nd October 2009.

2. IRQUE – QEF fund Batch -3

In response to the project proposal sent by the Faculty to the IRQUE, the Faculty received a **Rs.20 million** worth grant from IRQUE – QEF fund Batch -3 to improve the quality of the undergraduate studies. The Faculty expenditure from the grant mainly focused on,

- Improvement of Teaching and Learning Process
- Improvement of The Teaching Capacity in the English medium
- Improvement of Research and Analytical skills of the Students
- Improvement of Social behavior and Attitudinal Skills of students.

The Faculty obtained modern teaching equipment, multimedia kits and office furniture from the financial assistance gained through the grant. The grant also contributed to the Faculty to develop its human resources by paving the path to provide training for both staff and students. The students were trained on cultural performance (30 students), on internet based learning (160 students), on Stress Management (40 students), on collecting data in the Sabaragamuwa Province (all the students in the Faculty). The Faculty established a student counseling centre named '*Sith Arana*' with the support of academic staff for the benefit of all the students in the University.

The Faculty organized workshops for its academic staff on:

- Counseling (20 academic staff members)
- High tech in Teaching (15 academic staff members)
- Technical Writing in English (15 academic staff members)
- Teaching in English Medium (25 academic staff members)
- Short overseas training on English literature and culture, English writing skills and Social Work and SPSS (12 Academic Staff members).

3. Curriculum Revisions

Two experts were appointed to revise and develop the curricula of the Faculty in 2008. Curriculum revision process of the Faculty was completed in 2009. The Department of

Languages designed Four Year Special Degree Programmes for all the languages courses. Six months internship programme for students, compulsory English and CIT together with some essential general subjects were incorporated in the new curriculum and the Faculty decided to implement the new curriculum for the 2011 intake.

4. New Faculty Building Complex

Construction of the first stage of the new faculty building complex has been completed in 2009 and its opening was held on 13th August 2009. Construction of the second stage of the new Faculty building complex started the same day.

6. TEACHING RESOURCES

6.1 THE LIBRARY

PROFILE:

The Sabaragamuwa University Library fulfills the main objective of developing the University through learning and research within the university by self studies and self improvement. The Library guides the users to enhance their retrieval of information by using online methods. Therefore, the Library provides a separate area at the periodicals section with personal computers for users to gain their knowledge at the main Library and the Faculty of Management Studies Library too. The Faculty of Agriculture Library uses its e-learning unit for this purpose.

The Information Resource Centre strives to provide a vibrant environment for teaching and learning within the campus which meets the current information needs of staff and students while facilitating the acquisition of the information skills that form the basis of lifelong learning.

The Academicians were engaged in a research oriented environment during this year and it is a fruitful way of showing their innovations through the guidance of the learning centers. The Academic staff has been motivated by the authority granted financially for their research work. Therefore the Library was activated by helping them by providing relevant information at the correct time. The Library has served the internal community as well as the researchers from outside the University too. The Library of Sri Lanka Military Academy, Diyathalawa and their users are also benefited by the SUSL Library.

GOALS:

The main goal set by the Library was to develop the Libraries to be able to transact as an electronic Library. Therefore it has taken steps to do the library Automation as the first phase. The Library has moved for new Software which has been very popular in Sri Lanka and worldwide famously known as "LIBSYS". The University Grants Commission supported us by providing financially under the scheme of special IT allocation. Through this the SUSL Library has stepped up to develop as an electronic Library as targeted. Through this Software in future, the SUSL Library can keep the contacts with the peer groups as well as the International sites. This software will support us in retrieving all information by web OPAC being developed through the website of the Sabaragamuwa University. In future this University will be able to expand its services online:

1. Provide access to a wide variety of resources by print and online to meet the current information needs of staff and students for their academic purposes
2. Facilitate the acquisition and development of the information skills that form the basis of lifelong learning
3. Foster a love of reading for pleasure as well as entertainment
4. Raised the ideas to teach library skills programme for the undergraduates
5. Win the resources required to provide a high quality service to the user community
6. It has methodically reached to provide its services updated.

GOALS ACHIEVED DURING THE YEAR:

The Main Library and the Faculty of Management Studies Library received ten computers and peripherals with computer tables and chairs under procurement plan for their users.

6.2 CENTRE FOR COMPUTER STUDIES

INTRODUCTION

Centre for Computer Studies is a separate academic body in Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. It provides main services; such as internet facility to the university, web mail service, networking services, e-learning facilities, maintenance services (hardware and software) and resource persons for some of the faculties.

PRESENT STATUS:

In the year 2009, infrastructure facilities and academic programs related to IT have been further improved at the Sabaragamuwa University due to allocation from the consolidated fund by the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. With this fund, the University managed to maintain Internet and email facilities for all academic and administrative staff members at their workplace Official quarters of the Vice Chancellor, Registrar, Bursar and Deans have been provided with Internet links.

At present, there are physically separate computer centres attached to the five Faculties; namely, Applied Sciences, Social Sciences and Languages, Management Studies, Agricultural Sciences and Geomatics.

The Centre for Computer Studies supervises all computer related academic activities of these five computer centres and maintains the campus-wide network including all the servers required to provide web and email services.

FACULTY OF APPLIED SCIENCES

The Faculty of Applied Sciences consists of three Departments; Department of Physical Sciences, Department of Food Science and Technology and Department of Natural Resources. Another two departments will be formed as soon as possible in the near future namely Department of Computer Science and Information Systems and Department of Sports Science and Management. This Faculty offers B.Sc. degree programmes in Physical Sciences, Natural Resources, Food Science and Technology, B.Sc in Computing and Information Systems, B.Sc in Sport Science and Management and also B.Sc in Physical Education.

Computer and IT - related facilities:

- Two computer centers; namely computer center I and II.
- Computer center I consists of 50 computers with the latest configuration
- Computer center II consists of 55 computers with the latest configuration
- All the software are up to date and licensed
- Both computer centers are fully networked
- 16 hours internet facility to students and 24 hours for staff members
- Provided with e-learning facility with the e-learning server which is located at Centre for Computer Studies server room.
- Multimedia projector installed at each computer centers as well as lecture halls too rather than having a conventional lecturing pattern
- Excellent IT environment for the studies
- Printing, scanning and photocopying service for the students as well staff members at a reasonable price

FACULTY OF GEOMATICS

The B.Sc. Degree Program in Surveying Sciences, still a unique programme in the university system in Sri Lanka, is heavily biased toward mathematics and engineering principles. In order to comply with these strict requirements, the students in this Department are expected to follow an intensive course in programming languages such as Pascal and C. Among the compulsory applications included in the curricular, the following need special mention:

- Use of Computer Aided Design (CAD) software for preparation of survey plans of small blocks and site surveys
- Development of software for adjustment of triangulation
- Computer assisted plotting of cadastral plans
- Design of computer programmes for scientific tasks
- Processing of satellite images
- Geographical information system (GIS)
- Global positioning system (GPS)

Computer and IT related facilities:

- The computer centre of this Faculty is equipped with about 80 computers
- All are networked together and given access to the Internet throughout 16 hours per day
- Up to date software and powerful virus guard
- Multimedia projector for all the lecture theaters and labs
- E-learning facility
- Specialized software for the studies
- All staff members are provided with good computers with internet facility
- Printing, scanning and photocopying service for the students as well staff members at a reasonable price

FACULTY OF SOCIAL SCIENCES AND LANGUAGES

The Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages comprises of four Departments; Department of Languages, Department of Social Sciences, Department of Economics and Statistics and the English Language Teaching Department. During their First Year, all the students in this Faculty are offered compulsory courses in computer awareness. This enables the students to obtain a rich knowledge in computer skills needed to store and retrieve information, organize and present data clearly so as to enhance the quality and the impact of their presentations and Semester Examinations. Moreover, all students receive basic computer training in latest operating systems, office automation software and an overview of the fundamentals of software development technology.

- Two computer centers namely computer center I and computer center II
- Altogether 130 computers are allocated for the students' use
- All computers are good in configuration with networked environments
- Internet facility available for all computers
- Multimedia projectors are fixed in both computer centers
- All the computers are equipped with good software collection
- All the staff members are provided with computers with Internet facility
- Printing, scanning and photocopying service for the students as well staff members at a reasonable price

FACULTY OF MANAGEMENT STUDIES

The students are initially provided with a general introduction to the computers. In the fields with special relevance to management studies, they are given lectures in computerized accounting and management information systems. Subsequently, much advanced topics, such as statistical analysis and database management systems are offered to them that would mould the students to cope with rapid technological advances in the business world today.

FACULTY OF AGRICULTURAL SCIENCES

The Faculty of Agricultural Sciences, situated about 1 km from the main Belihuloya campus, comprises three Departments; Department of Agri-Business Management, Department of Livestock Management and Department of Export Agriculture.

COMPUTER SERVER ROOM AND CAMPUS-WIDE NETWORK

The server room consists of CISCO routers, proxy server, DNS server, CISCO for subnet switch, web server, e-mail server, e-learning sever, virus guard server (centralized server) and software routers for additional sub netting. The wide area network is now extended up to Faculty of Management and Faculty of Social Sciences at its new location. All the faculties are inter connected with fiber-optic backbone and wireless links. At present our band width is 10Mbps.

CONTRIBUTION FOR RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT

The University has effectively utilized the available IT resources to enhance research output of the Academic Staff. The University website (www.sab.ac.lk) now hosts two refereed research journals, namely, the Sabaragamuwa University Journal and the Journal of Agricultural Sciences. Articles in these two journals can be downloaded in PDF format through the Internet.

7. STUDY CENTRES

7.1 CAREER GUIDANCE UNIT

As the first activity, steps were taken to widen the awareness of students about the services provided by the Career Guidance Unit of the University. This was done through notifications sent to undergraduates through Deans of Faculties and the student unions. In addition, this was successfully done by taking this as an agenda item of every meeting held with students by the Senior Student Counselor. As a result of this awareness programmes, it was noted that the number of students visiting the Career Guidance Unit to inquire for various career opportunities and relevant matters increased.

Student participation was arranged for the 'All Island Inter University Best Speaker's Contest 2009' organized by the Gaval Club of the University of Kelaniya, in April. Three students participated in the contest from Faculties of Social Sciences and Languages and Geomatics and proceeded up to semi final levels.

A seminar series was started to address the First Year undergraduates of each Faculty separately on 'How to become a productive graduate?' to make them aware about the career guidance services of the university, general disciplines and behavior in hostels and the university premises in order to guide them for a successful university career. The first seminar

was held in the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences on 8th June 2009. The Dean of the Faculty was the main resource person and some staff members also participated. The second seminar was held for First Years of the Faculty of Applied Sciences on 8th July 2009 and the Dean of the Faculty, Heads of Departments and many staff members participated. These two seminars were very successful and it was found that they were highly effective to change the attitudes of the students. These programmes were appreciated at the UGC standing committee on student welfare as the committee has also taken a decision to introduce Career Guidance activities to undergraduates from the beginning.

A very successful workshop on 'Career discipline and the Personality' was held on 14th July 2009 with the assistance of the Career Guidance Unit of the Colombo University. Mr. Ajith Jayawardena, Career Guidance Counselor of the Colombo University participated as the resource person. Nearly two hundred final year and third year undergraduates participated in the workshop and they have evaluated that it was a very interesting and fruitful event.

A Career Advisor to the Career Guidance Unit was recruited for the first time in the history of the university and the first seminar conducted by him was organized in August on 'Introduction to career guidance services in SUSL'. After this introductory seminar, students get used to obtain the service of the career advisor at necessities. It was noted that his service was obtained by a number of academic and non academic staff members as well.

Taking part in organizing the orientation programme for the new students taken to the university in 2009, Career Guidance Unit contributed much for guiding the fresh students towards positive thinking and attitudes. A special session on Career Guidance was included in the orientation programme and took part in arranging other activities such as personality development programme, community works and religious activities.

Steps were taken to establish close links with the career guidance units of the other universities and a number of nongovernmental organizations. A representative team from the Career Guidance Unit of the Moratuwa University visited the CGU in September and a number of NGOs also visited and had progressive discussions about organizing future career guidance activities. The limiting factor in organizing career guidance activities is the availability of free time for undergraduates, but measures have been taken to minimize the problem and organize activities to provide the maximum benefit to undergraduates.

7.2 EXTERNAL DEGREE PROGRAMMES AND EXTENSION SERVICES UNIT

GOALS:

The mandate given by the University Corporate Plan to the External Degree Programmes and Extension Services Unit is as follows;

'Establish an institute of External Degree Programmes and Extension Services (EDPESU) which could offer a wide range of courses and programmes and to achieve a student population of 5,000 by 2010'.

From the year 2008 to 2009 the number of students increased by 285. The total number as at December 2009 is 2157. To achieve the objective the exponential expansion of the unit is inevitable.

HISTORY:

The Staff Development Centre of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka commenced its activities from April 1998. Former Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Dayananda Somasundara. Prof. S. Sandanam, Mrs. C.L Amarasekera, Dr. K.K.D.S. Ranaweera, Dr. Gamini Fonseka are the past Directors of the Staff Development Centre. Prof. Mahinda Rupasinghe is holding the present Director position and Dr. P K Dissanayake is holding the Deputy Director position.

8. ENROLMENT, EXAMINATION RESULTS AND GRADUATION

ENROLMENT OF STUDENTS:

Table (I) illustrates the number of students enrolled for the Degree Programmes in various fields of study. It is a noteworthy factor that the percentage of female students in the Degree Programmes of the Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages has outnumbered the males. There are 511 female undergraduates as against 123 males in this Faculty. As a result of this high density of female students, the expenses of the University for Welfare Services and security are high. But the percentage of female students in the Faculties of Agricultural Sciences, and Applied Sciences are almost the same as male students. Gender distribution in the Faculty of Geomatics is a contrast to that of the Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages. This may be due to the dearth of knowledge/information regarding this valuable degree programme of the University, which was started in the year 1996, in the University system.

9. STUDENT SERVICES

STUDENT WELFARE FACILITIES:

Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka, when compared with the other Universities has to pay more attention on the welfare of its undergraduates.

I. Accommodation Facilities

All students, male and female have to be provided with accommodation by the University, as the area is a low density area in respect of population.

The University has provided accommodation in its own hostels only for about 520 male students and 377 female students out of 2378 students' populations. All the other students have been provided with accommodation in houses rented out in the vicinity with bare, minimum facilities.

The University spends over 6 million by way of rent to accommodate the students.

IV. Canteen Facility

All the students' canteen services are provided by the student unions because there were no outside caterers who responded to the tender notice published by the University repeatedly. However the students unions provide a meal at Rs.15 and the University has to subsidize this by providing crockery, cutlery, electricity, water and gas etc.

9.2 THE UNIVERSITY STUDENTS UNION

The University Students Union comprises of five Faculty Student Unions. All the Student Unions are provided with separate offices with furniture and communication facilities. The University has allocated Rs. 59,875/- for the year 2009. This allocation is to meet the other requirements of the Unions such as stationery and communication etc.

The main service provided by the Student Unions is the running of all students' canteens. The Student Unions have taken over this responsibility as there were no outside caterers who respond to the tender notice published by the University repeatedly. This may be because of the location of the University or the low price of meals expected by the students. However the students unions provide a meal at Rs.15 and the University has to subsidize this by providing crockery, cutlery, electricity, water, gas etc.

10. THE STATUTORY REPORT ON THE ANNUAL STATEMENTS OF ACCOUNTS OF THE SABARAGAMUWA UNIVERSITY OF SRI LANKA FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31ST DECEMBER 2009

Forwarded herewith are the Financial Statements of Accounts and the annual statements of Accounts for the year ending 31st December 2009. These Accounting Statements have been prepared and submitted in terms of Section 106 (1) and 107 (b) of the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978 as amended by the subsequent legislation including the university (amendment). Act No. 7 of 1985 and in terms of the Finance Act No. 38 of 1971.

This year too the presentation and interpretation of Accounts have been done in a manner similar to that of the previous year by maintaining consistency and adhering to the fundamental Accounting Assumptions, Principles. Sri Lanka Accounting Standards where appropriate for Public Sector Perception and generally accepted accounting practices which are usually followed in presenting Annual Statements of Accounts of a University.

Income and Expenditure in respect of Extension Programme conducted at Belihuloya and Buttala and of other self-financing projects were consolidated in the Statement of Accounts.

Following are the Salient features that are needed to be highlight in the Annual Accounts.

1. As shown below the total Government Grant for Recurrent and Capital Expenditure for the year 2009 was Rs. 535,796,450 as against Rs. 554,905,480 received for the year 2008.

3. Excess of Expenditure over income in the year 2009 was Rs. 78,382,602 when compared with Rs. 48,684,527 for the year 2008.
4. According to the SLAS No. 10 adjustments for the General Reserve Account as follows.

5. The assignment given to the consultant Management Frontiers has successfully completed the Assets Register and value up to 31.12.2005. The management consultant introduce and calculated the depreciation for the year 2006 on the generally accepted method, namely the full year depreciation is charged in the year of purchase an No depreciation is charged in the year of disposal. And also this depreciation method is adopted in using the rates given in the UGC circular 649 from the financial year 2006.

This method of calculating depreciation was approved by our council at its 117th meeting held on 20/01/2007. Accordingly University follows that method to depreciate our asset for the year 2009 and hope to continue in future.

6. Lands and Buildings at Rahangala have been given to the Defense Ministry with effect from 2007-06-28 on exchanging of land belongs to the Defense Ministry extending of 50 Acres at Belihuloya to the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. Action has been taken to value the land at Belihuloya by the Department of valuation. Therefore the

value of Lands and Buildings of Rahangala is shown in Disposable Account until the valuation of Belihuloya land which is given to the University is obtained.

Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka for the year ended 31 December 2009 in terms of Section 108 (2) of the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978 and Section 13 (7) (a) of the Finance Act No. 38 of 1971

2. Financial Statements

2.1 Opinion

So far as appears from my examination and to the best of information and according to the explanations given to me, I am of opinion that the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka had maintained proper accounting records for the year ended 31 December 2009 and except for the effects on the financial statements of the matters referred to in paragraph 2.2 of this report, the financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Sri Lanka Accounting Standards, give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka as at 31 December 2009 and the financial results of its operation and cash flows for the year then ended.

2.2 Comments on Financial Statements

2.2.1 Accounting Deficiencies

- (a) The preparation of plan has been completed in order to include it in the asset account of the University. Basic assessing activation is being done by the valuation department. It has been mentioned in the letter of the valuation Department sent on 07/06/2010. Steps have been taken to receive the valuation report to include the value of it in the accounts.
- (b) The general manager of Ceylon Electricity Board at that time, assured through his letter date 06/06/2008 that he would take measures to recover the sum of Rs. 1,017,750/- which was spent to repair the Internet cable system from the contractor who built the parapet walls & pay the above sum to the University. However as this amount had not been paid up to time, the Audit & Management committee met on 01/04/2010 decide to make a written request to the public utility commission in recovering this amount.
- (c) The electricity bill & telephone bill chargers credited to the account as miscellaneous income will be credited to the relevant accounts according to the auditing advice.
- (d) Relevant accounts have been corrected as shown by the auditing. Relevant officers have been advised to be responsible not to make such differences in the coming year.
- (e) Out of these 9 items, 8 item type (75 units) except National flags. (110 units) were transferred from the Buttala stores when it was established in Belihuloya. 3 water pumps have already been included into the stores stock. The other 6 items have been included to the stock the same way as the prices of those items had not been mentioned.

As shown by the audits, 9 item types will be include in the Stock register of stores removing the national flags which we used for various function.

- (f) This is accepted as a deficiency occurred in presenting the accounts. Steps will be taken to include livestock value under non financial differences and mention it in the cash flow statement.

2.2.2 Accounts Receivable and Payable

- (a) Steps have been taken to settle.

- (b) Most of the loans out of sum of Rs.1, 233,888 have not been able to recover as shown by the auditing due to the death, resigning, from the service and dismissal etc... Most of these loans have not been able to recover due to taking legal actions.

The Balance of distress loan of Mr. Sandanam cannot be recovered as University Grant Commission has retained the provident fund of him as his Permanent address and his guardians cannot be traced. The sum of Rs. 5,100/- that had to be recovered as employee's loan balance of Ms Irangani Rupasingha who went on transfer on 26/03/2010.

Similarly steps will be taken to recover the sum of Rs. 183,306/- that has to be recovered from Ms. RSS Somasundara who has gone on no pay leave. Once she reports to work, it can be recovered.

2.2.3 Non – compliance with laws, rules and regulations

- (a) As the preparation of the fixed assets register has been completed. It can be forwarded for auditing.
- (b) Steps have been taken to prepare fixed assets survey report from 2010 on words. As the fixed survey is being carried out by an appointed board at present.

2.2.4 Transactions not supported by adequate authority

According to the decision arrived at the 142th University Council meeting, the approval of the UGC was sought in reply to this the University Grant Commission in its letters dated 19/05/10 has informed to come to a settlements with the bond signed with University of Paradeniya Although the particular lecturer had informed through the letter dated 11/05/2010 that he would take steps accordingly. It has not been reported so far. Therefore, council decided to grant him 30 days for this purpose. After that relevant steps would be taken informing the council.

3.2.1 Performance

- (a) The cost incurred per student has gone up compared to the previous year due to the payments incurred on salaries of newly recruited employees to fill the vacancies and payment of the increased cost of living allowances of the employees and recruiting 140 more students compared to the previous year and providing their hostel and other facilities.
- (b) The urban Development Authority has informed the university that once the charges for surveying, a sum of Rs. 200,000/- which was required to be paid before handing over the land to the university.

3.2.2 Contract Administration

Although a written request was made from the insurance ombudsman on 19/09/2009 to recover balance sum of Rs. 1,179,637/- of mobilization fund report of the contractor for the construction work of the third phase of building of the Faculty of Agriculture, no response was received from the concerned.

A letter of demand was sent on 09/06/2010 asking to make above payment to the MBSL Insurance Company with immediate effects. If no action is taken with regard to these measures it would be taken to inform the Attorney general to take legal action to recover this sum of money.

3.2.3 Delayed Projects

This contract offer was cancelled as the contractor who was selected under the open bidding system failed to produce bonds demanded in the main contract letter & approval for new open bid has been requested from the secretary of Ministry of Higher Education on 25/02/2011. It was unable to commence constructions as the approval has not been granted.

3.2.4 Management Inefficiencies

- (a) It has been declared that the excess payment was RS. 600/- in the reply to No: SP/RP/D/SAB. U/ 2009/04 audit query under the title payment for visiting lectures. The amount Highlighted by the audit report Rs. 11,150/- was due to mistaken entry of lecture hours as Rs. 11,750/- and it has been mentioned in the reply. Excess payment Rs. 600/- has been charged.
- (b) The precedence followed by the University for supplying and fixing curtains is calling tenders mentioning the no of windows. Further it is clearly mentioned that the supplier should check for no of windows and place the bid. Accordingly the suppliers are selected and the payments are made on the certification given by the Department head that the task has been successfully completed. For the faculty of Agriculture sciences building. Same procedure has been followed since the total payment has not been made the excess amount Rs. 102,450/- mentioned by the audit report will be deducted in making the total payment.
- (c) Four camping tents purchased for the use of Tourism Management Dept: could not be tested due to unfavorable whether condition. (We had to test tents and accessories in outdoor for ultra violation and seasonal adaptability) Therefore, 20% of the payable amount was retained. Until they are checked. Since the supply institute had failed to provide the ground sheets appropriately, remaining 20% of their money is expected to be used in purchasing them. The tents already provided by the suppliers and are being used for department studies.

3.2.5 Idle and Underutilized Assets

- (a) The spares of floor beds have already been placed at place near “B” rooms (since there’s no space around stores). They are used only for renovation of spare, beds, because they are of different shapes as they have been purchased from different institutes. They cannot be assembled into floor beds due to safety reasons. Such beds can be collapsed due to weakness in assembling of different parts and the University has to bear a high risk, steps have been taken prepare single beds from the possible these spares.
- (b) Faculty of Applied Sciences shifted to the premises of Belihuloya without any approval from council/ Ministry of Higher Education/ University on the 20/10/2011. A decision taken at the chief organizer’s office of the parliament on 13/12/2007, Faculty of Applied science was established in Belihuloya premises on the 15/03/2008 due to the above decision, it was impossible to send either the students of applied science or any other faculty It is obvious that the idling situation of the building in Buttala was beyond our control. But the external courses already conducted at the premises were continued with maximum effort using the buildings available there. By now the authority to use those building has been temporarily vested to the UGC and they are utilized by the UGC as a staff development centre.

3.2.6 Identified Losses

- (a) The stock shortages valued at Rs: 53,695/- and stock excesses valued at Rs. 132,024/- exposed in the stock verification held on 31/12/2009 have been properly computed, following financial regulation. Stock excess has already been included and corrected while the stock shortage was due to non inclusion of 177 National flags. 177 National flags have been included to the stock under current market prices.
- (b) The laborer recruited under the UGC circular No 749, as a grade iii laborer for confirmation of service, as she failed to produce certificate to prove qualification, the then administration has extended the probation period by 04 years without terminating her service. Further, her salary increment has not been granted. As she has further failed to produce educational certificate, council has decided to expel her on the 07/02/2006. She has filed a case under the case no: LTB/40/136/2007 against the decision of the council. The University had to pay a compensation for her as labour tribunal considered the extension of probation period and the suspension of increment as punishment. Thought there was a possibility to produce an appeal, the cost and labour was considered and was paid. The compensation decided by the labour tribunal.
- (c) Although the responsible officer, regarding the accident has already been informed that the due expenditure made by the university on repairing the cab

no: 57-6465, he has failed to settle it. He has been sent a reminder on 16/05/2010 and again a reminder on 30/06/2011. If he further failed to settle the payment, measures are taken to charge that money through the vice chancellor of the University where, he serves, at present.

3.2.7 Internal Audit

Since the UGC appointed a Senior Assistant Internal auditor to the University on the 01/09/2009 it was unable to submit the audit queries for the year 2009 and the half yearly Internal Audit report. By now the internal audit report for the year 2010, has been submitted to the auditor general. Measures are taken to submit half yearly internal audit report and Audit queries following financial regulation 134(3)

3.2.8 Budgetary Control

The University under goes a regular development process as it was established without basic infrastructure such as building, new faculty & departments are introduced with its expansion so that it is difficult to use budget as an effective instrument of management control . However, every possible measure is taken to use budget as an effective instrument of management control.

4 System and Control

Following the guidance of audit report, necessary measures have been taken on budgetary control, maintain of books and record internal audit, utilization of assets and contract administration with the assistance of the council.
