#### 1 Introduction

Dehiwala Zoological Gardens was started by Mr. John Hagenbeck early 1920's as a private collection in 11 acres where animals are kept until they are dispatched to foreign zoological gardens. It was officially taken over by the Government on the 1st of July 1936.

It was established as an independent public department in 1946 and later administrative and management functions were subjected to National Zoological Gardens act no 41 of 1982.

At present, Dehiwala National Zoo, Pinnawala Elephant Orphanage, Sri Lankan Zone of the Pinnawala Zoo and the Ridiyagama Safari Park as well as Gonapola Farm are managed by the Department of National Zoological Gardens.



#### 2 **Operational Units**

#### 2.1 Dehiwala Zoological Garden



Dehiwala National Zoo with a history of more than 80 years was initially started by a German national named Mr. John Hargenbeck in early 1920's as a private animal collection in 11 acres. It was taken over by the government in 1936 and now operates within 23 acres.

Dehiwala National Zoological Gardens has a collection of local and foreign mammals, birds, reptiles, birds, and several species of fish with educational value.

Under the Dehiwala Zoological Garden Development Master Plan, activities such as improving of animal welfare activities, improving of public facilities like development of the road network are being in progress.

#### 2.2 Pinnawala Elephant Orphanage

Pinnawala Elephant Orphanage was established in 1975 with an extent of 25 acres in Pinnawala Rambukkana by the Department of Wildlife Conservation with 05 orphaned Elephants. Later administration of Pinnawala Orphanage was handed over to the Department of National Zoological Gardens in 1982

At present, in order to maximize the welfare facilities & minimize the chaining

of elephants, activities like allocation of a free movement area for elephants, widening of the tank set apart for bathing of elephants, improving of facilities like observation decks, cafeterias are being conducted.



2.3 Pinnawala zoo



This is the first Open Zoo in Sri Lanka and first step of Sri Lankan Zone was opened for the public on 15<sup>th</sup> April 2015 and plan has been prepared to construct World Zone in future.

This zoological garden which consists of attractive parks and large animal enclosures built under modern zoological garden concepts gives new experience for the visitors.

An open area for butterflies, enclosures for Monkeys and an enclosure for Flamingo birds would be added in near future.

#### 2.4 Hambantota Safari Park



The first stage of the Safari Park, which built in a 500 acre land in Ridiyagama, Hambantota was declared open in 28<sup>th</sup> March 2016. Its prime objectives are making contribution for the eco-tourism while giving safari experience for the Sri Lankans and conducting breeding programs for the animal species in the Zoological Garden.

Under the phase one zones of African Lion, African herbivore, and Asian Elephant are in operative now while Bengal Tiger zone, Asian animal zone, Sri Lankan Leopard zone, Sri Lanka Sloth Bear zone, Australian zone and Animal Conservation Centre will be open in future.

In addition Small Animal Kingdom consists of birds, smaller members of the cat family, primate species and butterflies as well as a sales center with the aim of uplifting living standard of nearby communities will also be open in future.

#### 2.5 Animal Forage Farm at Gonapola



This farm started in in an area of 16 acres in 1997 at Gonapola in Horana with the objective of providing certain portion of fresh and nutritious foods for the herbivorous animals in Dehiwala zoo.

Animal Conservation Centre and Animal Quarantine Centre would be also established in here in order to obtain the contribution of the Gonapola Animal Farm more productively. In the year 2016, food worth of Rs.3.403 million sent to the Dehiwala Zoo from this farm.

## 3 Animal Conservation and breeding

#### 3.1 Animal collection

Department of National Zoological Gardens provides home for around 4878 animals as at 31.12.2016 in order to achieve its main objective of protecting the endangered species of the world. A summary of animals resided in different operational units of the Department as at 31/12/2016 as at follows.

- Study on Body measurements of Red Eared Turtle (Trachemys scripta) in Dehiwala Zoo
- Research on Captive behaviors of Barking Deer (Muntiacus muntjak) in Dehiwala Zoo
- Research on an episode of acute enteritis in a captive population of Guanaco (*Lama guanicoe*)
- Research on Biological research on parasite infection of wild Guppy
- Research on Biological research on external parasites attach to snakes

Research studies conducted by external researchers at the Dehiwala National Zoological Garden within the year 2016.

- Research on Factors affecting the population size and the distribution of Spot Billed Pelican (*Pelecanus philippensis*) is conducted by under graduate of University of Kelaniya.
- Research on study of the Feeding Behavior of Mouse Deer (*Moschiola meminna*) in captivity is conducted by under graduate of University of Ruhuna

Three studies have been conducted by the Pinnawala Elephant Orphanage with regard to their institution.



- Evaluating children demographic factors and teacher's idea about conservation of elephants in PEO





## 6 Development activities of the Department National Zoological Gardens

#### 6.1 Main Development activities of the Dehiwala Zoological Gardens

Several development activities were carried out at the Dehiwala National Zoological Gardens in the year 2016 with the objective of providing animal welfare and public entertainment.

In line with the modern zoological gardens concepts, modernization activities of the Dehiwala National Zoological Gardens have been initiated since the year 2011 by providing animal enclosures with more room for animals and more facilities for visitors. Enclosures for the members of cat family and an exotic aviary park have been constructed within the year 2016. Several development activities like modernization of Reptile Park, repairing of garbage incinerator, have also been implemented within the year 2016. Rs 107.632 million (90.314 million from the Government Consolidated Fund and Rs. 17.318 million from the Zoo Development &Welfare Fund) has been spent for the development activities there. As at end of the year 2016, cumulative expenditure of the Mega Development plan of the Dehiwala Zoo was Rs. 588.273 (427.716 million from the Government Consolidated Fund and Rs. 160.557 million from the Zoo Development &Welfare Fund). As at end of the year 2016, 50% physical progress of the Dehiwala Zoological Garden Mega Development Plan has been achieved.

## 6.3 Development activities of the Pinnawala Zoo

After the completion of construction of Sri Lankan Tiger enclosure and mixed deer enclosure, exhibition for public was started from 17.04.2015. Newly constructed Crocodile enclosure and Bear enclosure were also open for the public from the mid-2016.

During the year 2016, for the development activities, Rs.mn 81.55 has been spent (63.82) million from the Government Consolidated Fund and Rs.17.73 million from the Zoo Development &Welfare Fund). As at end of the year 2016, cumulative expenditure of Rs. 1067 million was spent (627.88 million from the Government Consolidated Fund and Rs.439.25 million from the Zoo Development &Welfare Fund) and during the same period physical progress of 20% has been achieved.

#### 6.4 Development activities of the Hambantota Safari Park.

During the year 2016 Hambantota Safari Park involved in activities like construction, creating facilities and other infrastructure for visitors in the areas of Lion Zone, African Herbivore Zone, Asian Elephant Zone, Operational Area and Residential area. Rs 292.415 million (265.144 million from the Government Consolidated Fund and Rs. 27.27 million from the Zoo Development &Welfare Fund) has been spent for the development activities in the year 2016. Cumulative expenditure as at 2016 was 1,930.28 (Rs. 1, 11.73 million from the Government consolidated Fund and Rs. 818.55 million from Zoo Development &Welfare Fund). As at end of the year 2016, the Safari Park project has achieved a 78% physical progress.
