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Message from the Director of Social Services

The Department of Social Services was established on 1st February, 1948 in accordance with the recommendation of the Commission appointed under the chairmanship of Sir Ivor Jennings for this purpose in 1944. At present the Department of Social Services is committed to its endeavor under the purview of the Ministry of Social Services.

On account of the well planned implementation of various programmes with its follow - up related to all actions and activities, identified under the subject scope through the participatory development approach from the national level to grass root level in 2013, annual financial progress was able to be achieved by utilizing 99.42 % in recurrent expenditure and 79.63 % in capital expenditure. Considering the performance of the Department in 2013, 100 Million provisions were received in 2014 for the renovation of the Vocational Training Institutes for the disabled persons under the special development programmes and it has showed 76.55 % progress. Other capital programmes have reached to 91.21 % progress. For 2014, capital provisions and recurrent provisions were Rs. 126.615 Million and Rs. 328.233 Million respectively in the Department, subject to 03 programmes.

National Programme for Community Based Rehabilitation (C.B.R), which had been functioned under the ministry since 1990, was included in the purview of the Department in 2013 owing to the success of the activities of the Department. The Department was able to be achieved around 75% of the expected level by Implementing the continuous evaluation & monitoring process, enriched by the day calendar with activities prepared in accordance with the strategic plan & cooperate plan from 1st January 2014 to 31st December and in line with the *Dahas Pubuduwa* Programme.

Under the patronage of the Department of Cultural Affairs and their financial contribution, an Island wide dancing and music competition for the disabled persons was held within the combined approached by the government and Non government organizations, in collaboration with our Department.

2 Million Provisions were received by the World Health Organization (WHO) for three day residential training to train 500 Social Services Officers, Social Services Assistants and Development Officers on the promotion of leadership, uplift of skills and attitudes towards team work. Consequently, the officers seemed to performed their duties with energetic and up lift of their hidden talents. Accordingly, the strong labour force was able to be established in the Department in 2014.

Under the sister school friendly programme, 15 officers were granted an opportunity for an educational tour in this year too under the sponsorship of the Korean Government (KOICA). Meanwhile Korean Group also came to observe the Vocational Training Institutes under the Department of Social Services for the purpose of exchanging the experiences successfully. Korean Government, in this regard, has granted a one month special residential training for two Vocational Instructors rely on the success of the Vocational Training Institutes under the Department of Social Services.

The trainees learned at the Vocational Training Institutes have obtained the relevant victories in district, provincial and international level as same as in 2013. Several Courses of the vocational Training Institutes were able to be turned into NVQ Certificate Courses for the first time.

The Department has been proficient to prepare the community based action plan for 2015 and more physical progress has been achieved in 2014 compared to 2013. Particularly, 2014 is identified as the year of achieving the required mental toughness for obtaining the higher targets furthermore within the spiritual and strong attitudes development of the officers. Notwithstanding the various crises arisen contrary the achievement of successful targets of the Department, all the success have been accomplished with the cooperation of all including the former Secretary Mrs. Emelda Sukumar, all Senior Staff Officers and other Officers, to whom my heartiest gratitude is extended. I will always owe a great deal of gratitude toward the all staff severed in the Department for their invaluable dedication in achieving the due targets. I further tribute to all District Secretaries, Additional Secretaries, Divisional Secretaries and Assistant Divisional Secretaries for their cooperation in numerous ways. I must appreciate as well the staff including the Secretary of Finance for their assistance in connection with the finance activities of the Department. I must not forget the endless commitment of the Provincial Directors of Social Services, officers in charge of the Social services and specially the officers, who work in the Divisional Secretariats, where the officers of the Department of Social Services are not attached, with regard to the subject.

Additionally, the sponsorships extended by each is greatly needed and deeply appreciated because, considering the whole island unitary, sponsors and facilities, that are provided for the programmes by various Non-governmental organizations at the time they deal from divisional level to national level, are higher than that the annual provisions provided by the Consolidated Fund.

There is no any doubt that the victories, we have achieved in 2014, while reaching to the expected targets, will be the stimulus of more success in 2015.

2014 year can be causally named as the successful year, in which, the Department of Social Services, within the new creative approach, has successfully completed the numerous based programmes, with the help from many supporters of intervention. Therefore I am happy as an employee who is paid from people of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka. Above all, I have the expectation and ambition to be the forerunner of human development for together building a nation of human being with merit happiness and pride. I expect that all parties would extend their heartiest intervention and cooperation to the maximum for this purpose.



(Renovation of the Vocational Training Institute for Persons with Disabilities)

As a result of the various requests made by the Department of Social Services to the General Treasury, strongly emphasizing the eager need of the disabled youth, who are to be actively contributed in the country's development, the General Treasury provided 100 Million provisions in 2014 for the renovation of the Vocational Training Institutes, that are functioning in support of the persons with disabilities under the Department of Social Services.

Accordingly, considering this is as a special project, necessary actions were taken to provide the required infrastructure facilities for improving the vocational training for disabled persons, based on the necessities at the vocational training centres of the Department of Social Services. In subsequence, required arrangements were made for the success of this project within one year, following the preparation of an action plan, while reviewing its progress continuously. Further, the Department was able to start two training sections for Electronic and Repair of Three wheelers & Motor Bicycles at the Wattedegama Vocational Training Institute, under the project in this year. Consequently, the said project was implemented under the following activities.


Welfare Programmes for Persons with Disabilities

As per the annual statistics, it is seen that the disabilities among the people are increasing due to human activities and various environmental reasons. However, at present the disabled person owns a value, acceptance and identity in the society despite his any kind of disability. Withal, they are actual partners of the social development. Hence, the responsibility, which is committed to this Department, is to create friendly environment required to live in the society with dignity and honor for persons with disabilities.

For this purpose, following the identification of their skills, they should be empowered to act as a valued group whom are admired by the society. Programmes are being implemented for persons with disabilities, in connection with the referring them to the national development process while empowering the required protection of them, their rights and vocational skills. Currently, the society has built up to provide them with the opportunity of sharing their knowledge, skills and experiences about not only the basic needs like health and education, but also technology & communication, art and sports, with the world. Following activities are being implemented by the Department of Social Services under this programme.

- I. Providing vocational training for the young people with disabilities.
- II. Early detection & required intervention for the children with special needs and expansion of the Child Guidance Centres.
- III. Providing artificial hands, limbs and legs to the disabled persons
- IV. Providing financial assistance to voluntary organizations of social services
- V. Providing vocational training for the spinal code injured persons whom are referred from the Ragama Rehabilitation Hospital and Divisional Secretariats.
- VI. Protection to mentally retarded boy children who do not have guardians.
- VII. Visually Handicapped Trust Fund
- VIII. Providing sign language interpreter services

Institutes of department of Social Services



Above Vocational Training Institutes are established in Gampaha, Hambantota, Kandy, Colombo, Puttalam, Rathnapura Districts and Child Guidance Centre in Maharagama to provide admission for persons with disabilities. In accordance with the recruitment procedures, young people (male & female) between 16 – 35 years of age are qualified for the vocational training. One year residential training will be provided. Trainees have opportunity to follow various courses including National Vocational Qualification (NVQ) Courses accredited by the Tertiary and Vocational Education Commission, such as repair of air conditioner and refrigerators, motor mechanism, food technology, repair of television & radio, fur and leather products industry and shoe repair industry and etc. During the training period food, medical facilities, residential facilities and even daily allowances are also provided.

In addition to the training courses, these trainees have the opportunity to improve their sports and aesthetic talents. They have chances of representing the game event in both national and international levels. The trainees, who are completed the training successfully, are provided the certificates, tool kits for self – employments and employment opportunities, additionally follow up activity will also be continued for them.



Jayaviru Sevana Institute

Department of Social Services runs an institute for providing protection and residential facilities to the mentally restarted boy children who lost their parents and guardians. The said Institute is located in Puwakpitiya and that can provide services for 50 children at a time. There were 47 children obtained services in 2014. It has been emphasized that the said institution to be expanded as the tendency for requests of residing the mentally restarted boy children is rapidly increasing day by day.

In subsequence, Rs . 7 Million has been granted to start the new construction of the phase one, for allocating residential facilities to 100 children and Rs. 6 Million has been allocated for the year of 2015 as per the project proposal submitted to the General Treasury by the Department of Social Services. New construction of the first phase was able to commence in 2014.

Child Guidance Project

Child Guidance Centre – Maharagama

A doubted situation arises if a growth defect or a stunted growth of a child is in the family or when a child is identified as having some disability, the child should be referred to the Child Guidance Centre. This is the institution, which is located in Nawinna, bears the state responsibility by means of raising parent's mental level, early intervening towards the development of the child, providing basic services and coordinating the health, early childhood, education and welfare services.


Accordingly, the children, those who are benefitted with the services of this project, will interact to special educational units or normal schools following their proper development.

Objectives of the project

- Introduce a more effective methodology of early intervening in the children who are discovered to have or be at risk of developing a handicapping condition or other special need that may affect their development.
- Strength the service network including the institutes of various fields in connection with the service delivery for children with disabilities.
- Strength the early childhood education and inclusive education of the children with special needs.
- Provide counseling services for raising the mental level of parents and family members.
- Expand the project into other districts.

Target Group

- Children with special needs from 0 to 05 years of age.



Services Provided

1. Educating the parents with small kids for developing the children (Individual / Group Classes)
2. Providing the services of Speech Therapy, Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy
3. Preschool teacher training courses
4. Counseling programmes for raising parent's mental level
5. Medical Clinics

The Child Guidance Centre has provided therapeutic, educational and other services to 104 children with special needs, in this year, while the counseling services have been provided to 252 parents of them. 22 children, who have been developed, were able to be interacted to special educational units and normal schools, while one child to a special school.

Preliminary actions have been already taken to expand this project into other areas of the island from the year 2015.

Visually Handicapped Trust Fund

The objective of this fund is to provide equal opportunities to visually impaired persons and take action according to the rules approved by the Assembly of the United Nation.

The positive commitment to the growth of new attitudes has been gradually arisen on the disabled persons in Sri Lanka following the declaration of 1981 as the International Year of Disabled Persons (IYDP). As a sequel to this direction an Act of Parliament No. 09 of 1992 to establish a fund for visually impaired persons was passed by parliamentary of the Domestic Republic of Sri Lanka. This was published as a Gazette Notification on 6th March 1992. The Government of Sri Lanka has initiated various services in support of the disabled persons in Sri Lankain line with this Act.

Visually Handicapped Trust Fund is being implemented by the Management Committee. The Secretary to the Ministry of Social Services becomes the Chairperson-in-Office until the next Secretary to the Ministry will be appointed. The Management Committee will meet once a month. Activities of the fund are audited by the Auditor Generals' Department and Internal Audit Division of the Ministry.

The mission of this fund is inter alia to provide services needed to persons with visual impairment, rehabilitate and provide relief. Specialty of this fund is the creation of equal opportunities to visually impaired persons and takes action in pursuance of the rules and regulations convened by the United Nation.

Objectives

- Provide educational and vocational training facilities to visually impaired persons.
- Provide guidance and financial assistance for self-employment when necessary and employment opportunities for visually impaired persons.
- Provide opportunities to follow scholarly courses and vocational training for visually impaired persons. Facilitate them with self- employments.
- Implement the welfare schemes for the betterment of the persons with disabilities.
- Provide marketing facilities for articles produced by visually impaired persons
- Act in order to remove the obstacles that would prevent visually impaired persons exercising equal rights and opportunities

Main functions of the Visually Handicapped Trust Fund

1. Providing assistance to maintain sports activities and its development.
2. Providing assistance to education and cultural activities.
3. Providing Bursary Payments to visually impaired undergraduates.
4. Providing financial assistance to visually impaired G.C.E. Advance Level students.
5. Providing Eye Lenses to the low income persons.
6. Providing medical assistance for the prevention of blindness.
7. Implement rehabilitation programmes for visually impaired persons.
8. Paying consultancy allowance for conducting training on mobility and orientation.
9. Maintaining welfare center for visually impaired women.

Chapter 3

The Project for Rehabilitation and Socialization of Drug addicts

Quantitative increase in the toxic drug addicts is among the current crisis in Sri Lanka. Contributing them as a productive group to the society and country's development is a one such commitment to the Department of Social Services.

Jayaviru Samadhi Home

This home provides several preventive and rehabilitation programmes to drug addicts and persons to be addicted to drugs. At present, these addicts are treated through the residential rehabilitation programmes, anti-toxic treatments, skills development and mental treatments and so on at the Jayaviru Samadhi Home.

Samadhi Home has been upgraded as a treatment centre to rehabilitate drug addicts through psycho therapeutic & psychological counseling methods and medical scientific approach.

In 2014, there were 106 people rehabilitated here. About 80% among the beneficiaries represent the Western Province and majority of them were Heroin addicts. The rest addicted to Ganja, Alcohol, Intoxicated tablets and Tobacco. These beneficiaries were of different age groups varied from the age of 15 to 55 years. About 80% of the affected persons were of among the age group of 15 to 35 years. Most of them were educated at schools up to grade 8 to G. C.E Ordinary Level. One of them did not follow the school education and unfortunately one graduate was also among those beneficiaries in this year. The specialty of this case is the said addicted graduate is a Public Officer. Remarkable matter in 2014 is one beneficiary was able to sit for the G. C.E Ordinary Level while he was taking the residential treatments.

These beneficiaries are sent to the Samadhi home due to the court decisions and voluntary basis. Majority among these beneficiaries were under the voluntary basis. Following programmes have been conducted at the Rehabilitation Centre in 2014.

These programmes will help not only improve them physically and mentally but also to develop them spiritually. Located premises of Samadhi Home and its surroundings help very much in the physical and mental development of beneficiaries. They have the opportunity of spending their leisure time effectively by means of engaging in the agriculture & animal husbandry and the harvest of these are used in the food requirement for the Institute.

Cultural and artistic skills have been developed through improving the friendliness of beneficiaries and their enjoyment has also been improved more creatively. Therefore it is expected to make a creative man through above programmes.

Vocational training courses have been scheduled to commence in 2015 for beneficiaries aiming to spend their leisure time effectively and to improve their living status following the rehabilitation.

For this purpose, 462 officers have participated and the incurred expenditure was Rs. 1, 955, 347. 00.

Chapter 5

Community Based Interactive Development National Programme for Disabled Persons - C B I D

Objective

Pursuance to the National Policy on Disabilities, empowering disabled persons in knowledge and skills to enable them to enjoy their rights and perform their duties and responsibilities in the manner of contributing them towards the national development within the prevailing socio - economic system and creating opportunities through ongoing social development programmes to integrate them into the society.

Background

Persons with disabilities are also equal members of the society. They should be treated with equal social rights such as education, health, employment, accessibility facilities, welfare and any other requirement within the existing structure. It is an internationally accepted right for co-existence.

The process which was embodied in the community development for developing disabled persons to enjoy their rights and perform their responsibilities, creating equal opportunities for them and integrating them into the society could be interpreted as the 'Community Based Rehabilitation'. In implementing this programme, the steering committees, which consist of various Ministries & Departments, some Non-Governmental Organizations and resource persons at a variety of national, provincial, district, divisional and rural levels, have been established, while divisional and district '*Swashakhi*' (Self - Reliance) organizations, comprised of disabled persons and their family members, should be set up to empower them.

Human resource development and changes in the negative attitudes should be implemented in each and every section.

Activities

1. Implementing programmes for empowering the persons with disabilities and their family members in knowledge, attitudes and activities.
2. Training them by voluntary workers to perform their daily routine activities as an independent person at home, society, pre – school, university and working place etc.
3. Referring disabled children to access services including the education opportunities for them through the interactive educational system or specialized educational system.
4. Empowering them by means of their economy, provide employment opportunities in collaboration with Ministry of Labour and Private Sector as well as make them for prior preparation towards the employments.

5. Taking actions to provide vocational training through vocational training institutes at regional or national level.
6. Integrating disabled persons into programmes implemented by other Ministries and Departments – such as DiviNeguma, Sports, Cultural programmes.
7. Making them actively participation towards various religious, cultural and social programmes.

Strategies to be adopted for this purpose

- Updating National Steering Committees comprised with inter ministries and non – governmental organization.
- Having prepared a five year plan for C. B. I. D. Programme, implement accordingly, in accordance with the decisions arrived at the National Steering Committee.
- Having conducting the District Committees headed by all District Secretaries, Update the knowledge of implementing the National Policy of Sri Lanka on Disability.
- Conducting workshops on the new trends of C. B. I. D. Programme and reporting and noting for Social Services Officers, Social Development Assistants and Child Rights Promotion Officers serving in all Divisional Secretariats in all Districts.
- Conducting interactive workshops for field officers in divisional level.
- Conducting workshops for rural leaders in the level of Divisional Secretarial Divisions.
- Establishing and empowering the Swashakthi Organizations that consist of persons with disabilities.
- Establishing the Parent Associations of the persons with disabilities and educating them.
- Conducting training workshops for voluntary workers.
- Conducting field work training workshops and collecting & reviewing of monthly progress reports of Provincial Assistant Officers.
- Conducting training courses for officers on sign language as the sign language is a recognized language in Sri Lanka.
