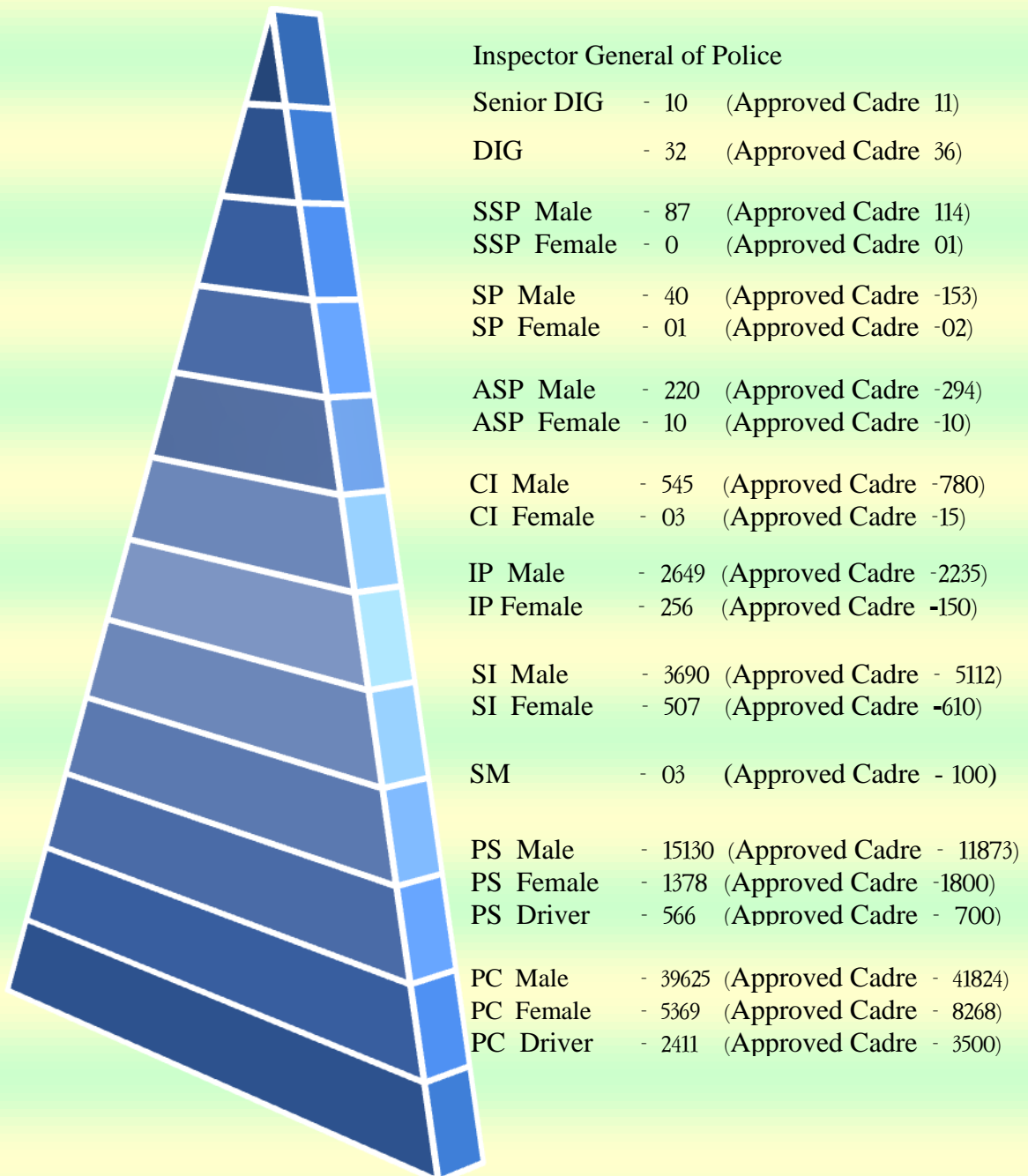
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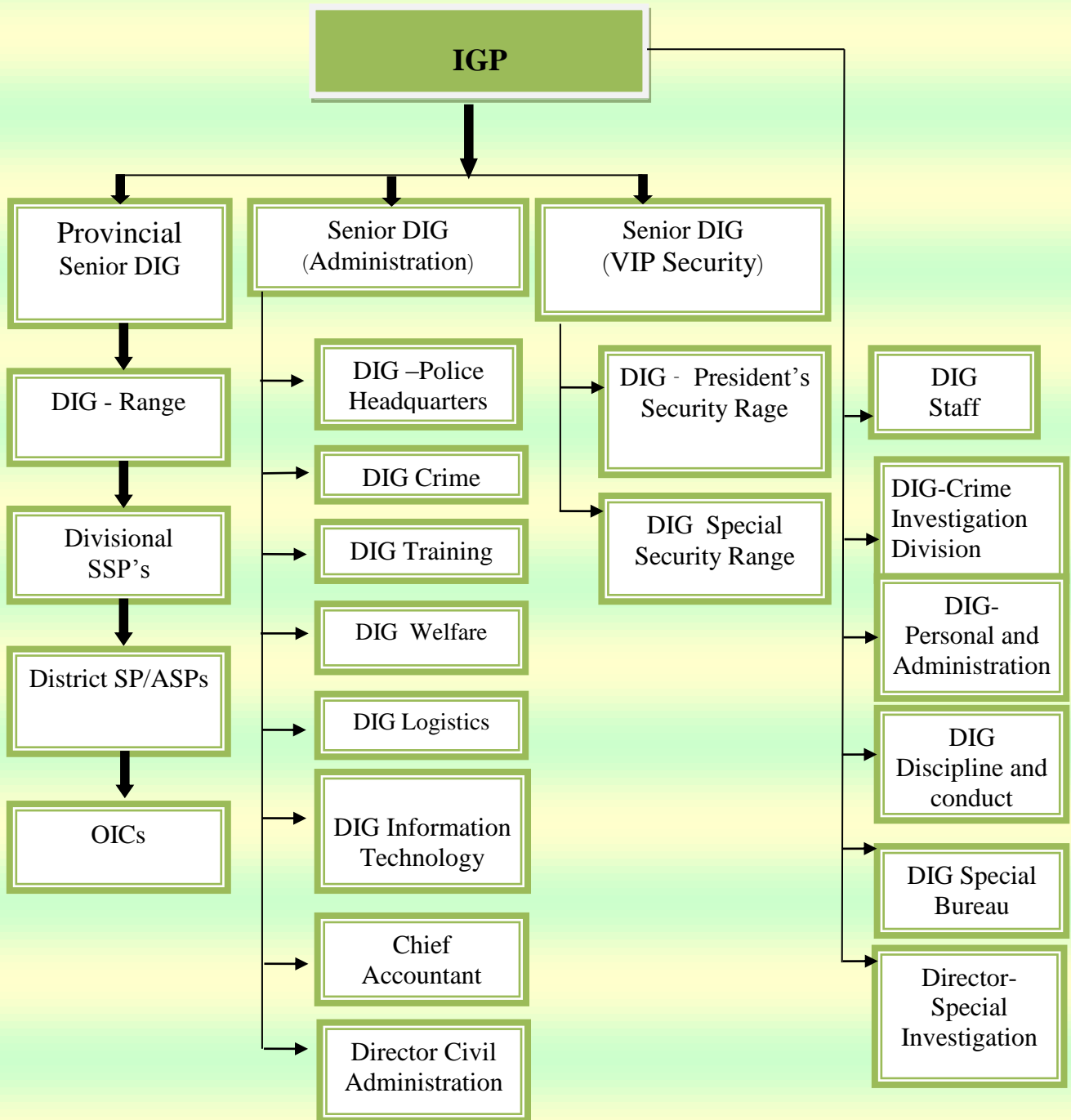

## Rank Hierarchy and Strength

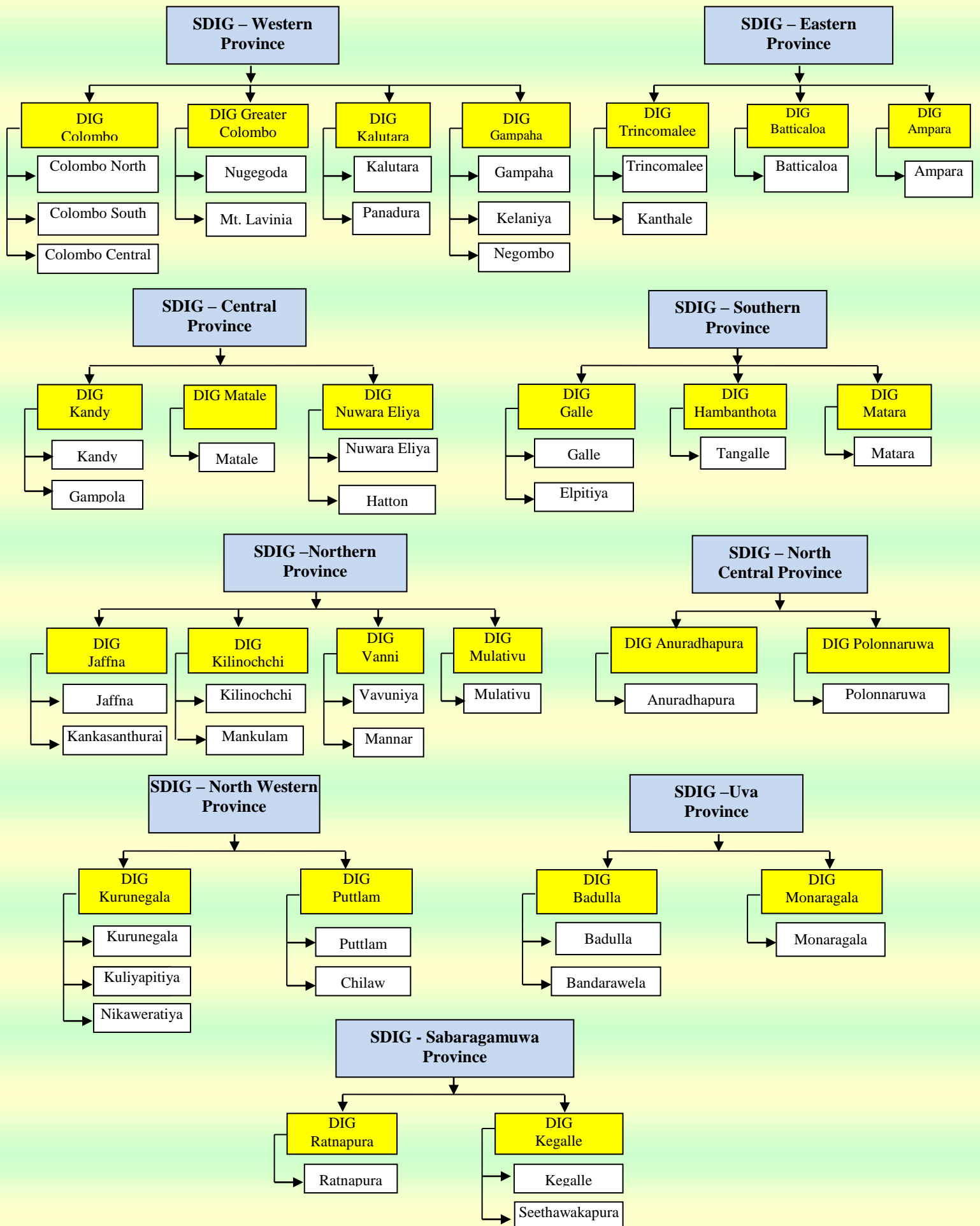


Approved carder is 84145 and there are 73209 personnel in service at present. STF cadre is not included.

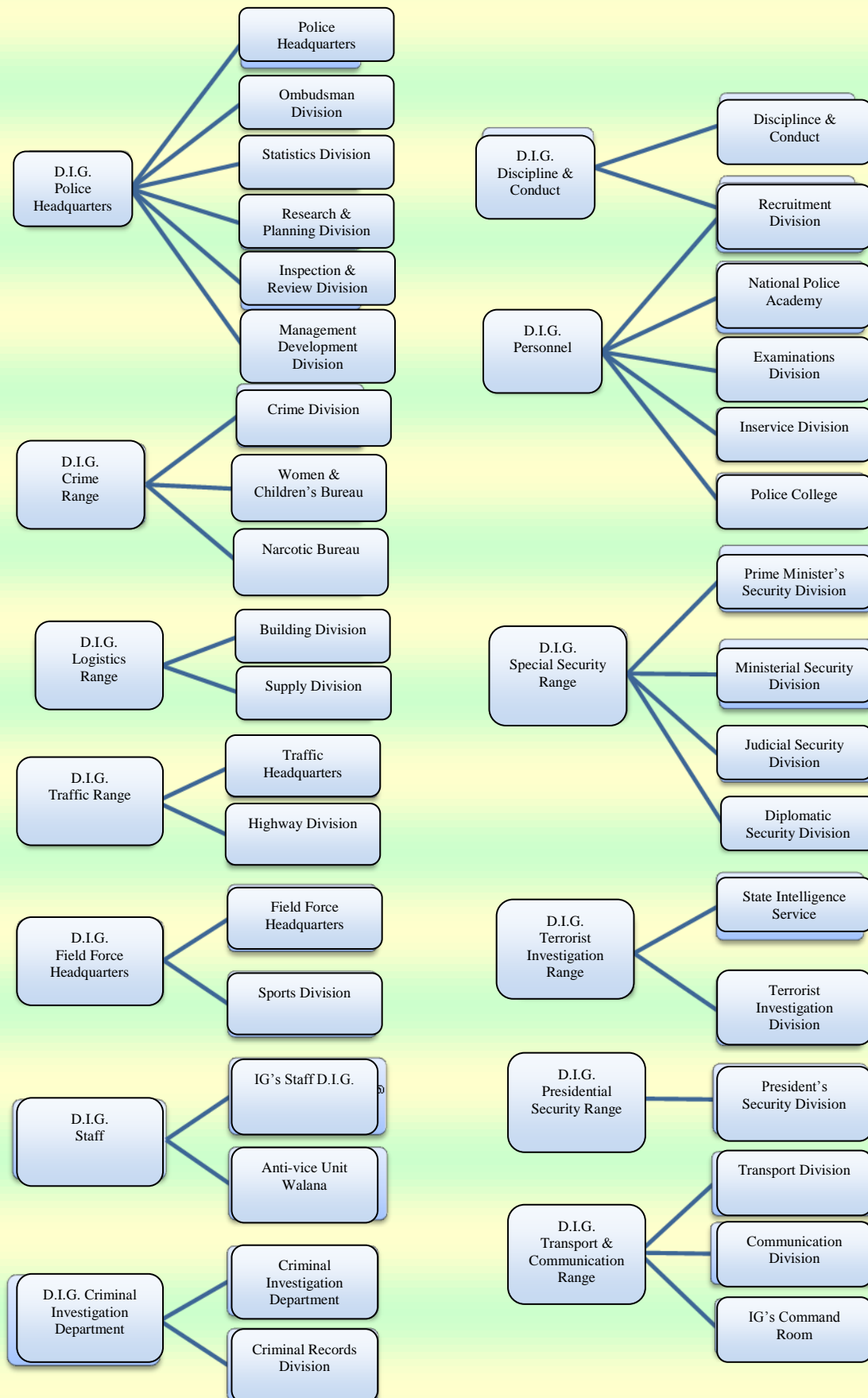
## 1.1 Police Administrative Structure



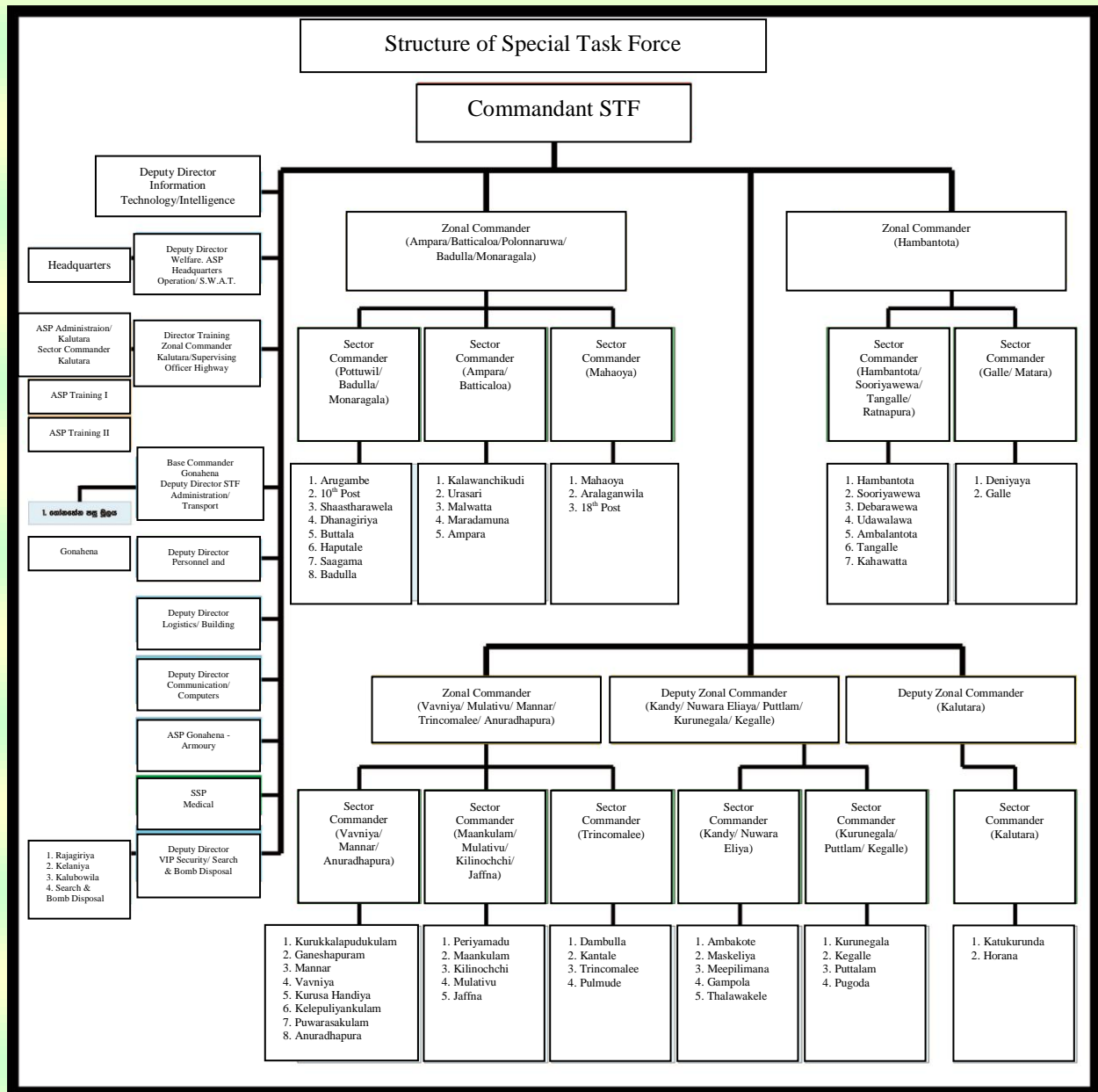
## 1.1.1 Structure of Territorial Police Divisions

## 02. Crime Prevention & Investigaion

### 2:1. Prevention of Crimes

Crime prevention & solving is one of the major objectives of the police and it is one of the crucial factors, which ensures social well-being and people's ability to live confidently without fear of crimes.

Identifying and arresting criminals and warrantees are necessary to minimize crimes. As per the instructions of Inspector General of Police, a special course of action was designed to arrest criminals absconding from police and persons who have been issued warrants for various crimes. Thus the police was able to contribute directly towards prevention of crimes through their ability to identify IR criminals, to make proper inquiries and to produce a large number of warrantees to the courts after taking them into custody.

Furthermore, an analysis of 2013 crime data quantitatively illustrates the special duties performed by the police in bringing about an environment free from crime and violence by solving special crimes such as plundering, homicide, abductions that take place in the country as well as other crimes in the aftermath of the war.

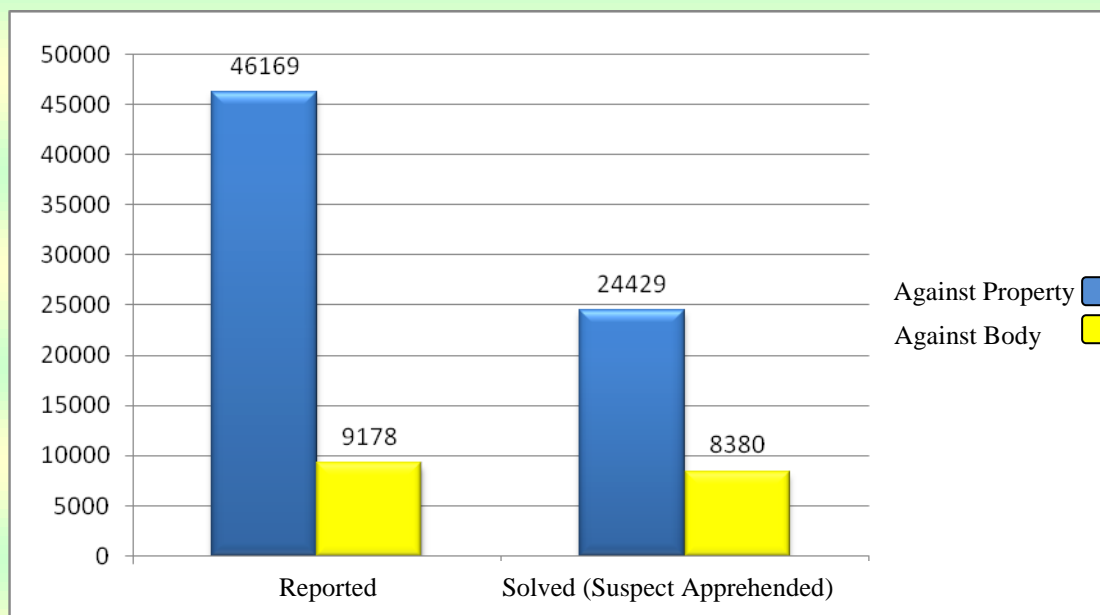

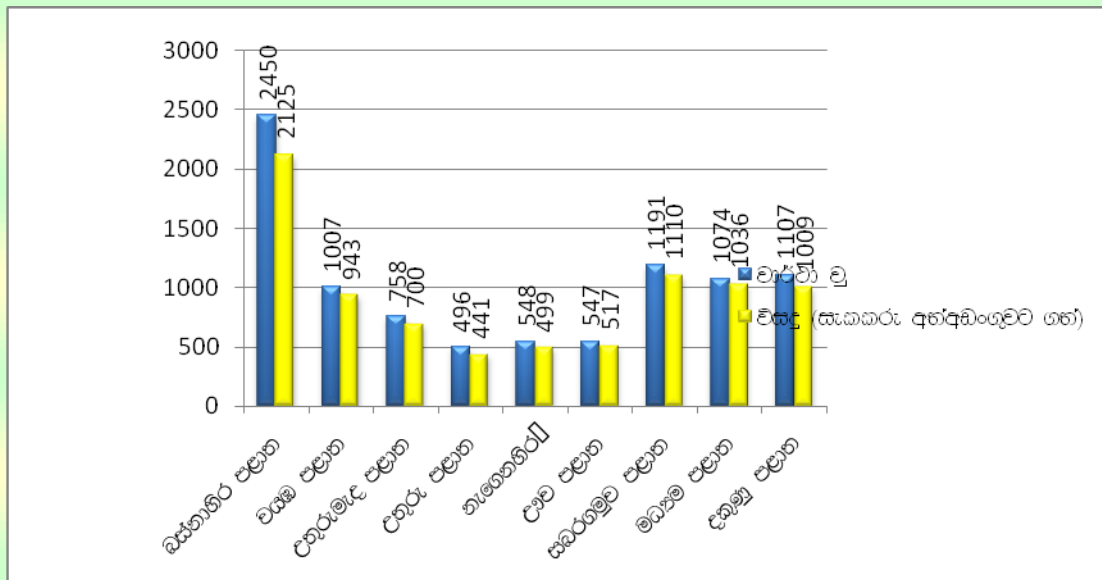

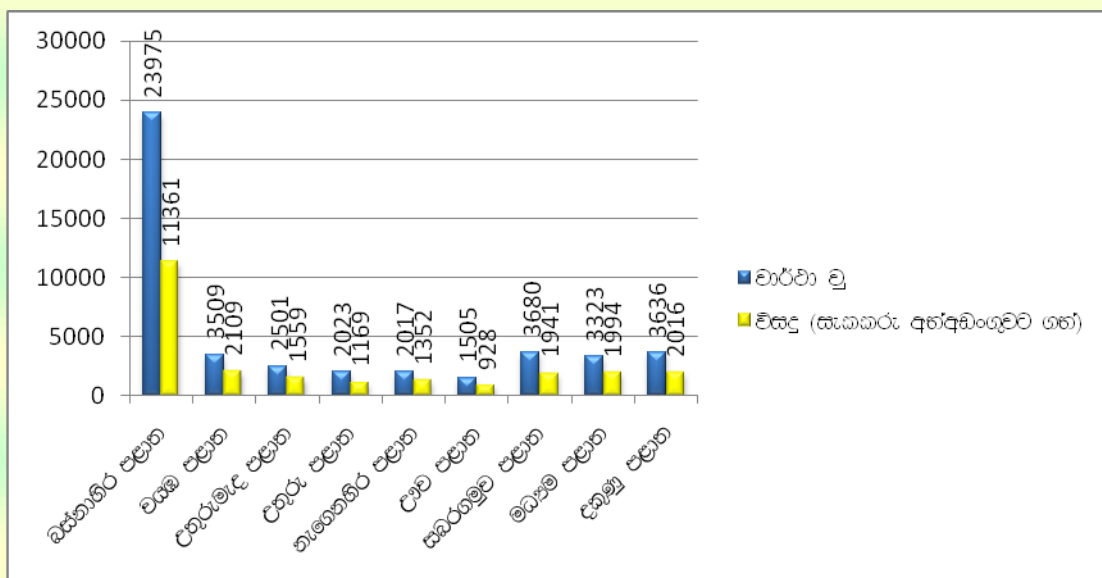
## 21 Graph: Total Number of Crimes Reported and Solved – 2013

- The total number of crimes reported in 2013 was 55347. 9178 crimes out of those were committed against body and 46169 were against property. The percentage of crimes against body is 16.58 and the percentage of total crimes against property is 83.42. Compared to the previous year a 3% decline can be observed in the rate of

reportings with regard to crimes. There is a 2% decline in offences against property and 8% decline in offences against body.

- With regard to solving crimes, the total percentage of solving crimes has increased from 54% to 59%. This 5% marks a positive development. Furthermore, the increase in the percentage of solving crimes against property from 46% to 53% shows a development of 7%. It has been able to maintain the percentage of solving crimes against body at a percentage of 91% in both years.
- According to the above data, a good progress can be observed in terms of solving crimes against body and property. Furthermore the 3% decline observed regarding the increase and reporting of crimes in 2013, show the contribution of all the police officers towards prevention of crime. In 2013 the police targeted towards solving a 60% of crimes and the ability to reach a target of 59% can be pointed out as a significant achievement.

## **2.2 Crime Data Analysis**

- When analysing crime data, it is an essential feature to carry out the analysis according to the crimes that have an impact not only on a certain area but also on the society. The respective data analyses with regard to the following crimes will be presented later.
  - Homicide
  - Raping
  - Plundering
  - Burglary
  - Gold Chain snatching
  - Theft

## Data Analysis

- In 2012, 646 cases of homicide have been reported. In 2013, the number of crimes has decreased by 60 to 586 cases.
- On provincial level, North Central and Sabaragamuwa Provinces show a slight increase with regard to the number of homicide cases but the total number of homicide cases shows a 9.2% decline which is by 60 cases.

- In 2012 85% cases were solved after taking suspects into custody and in 2013 that percentage has increased to 89%. This shows a development by 4%.
- The number of total unsolved homicide cases was 64 in 2013. The investigations are being carried out to solve those crimes.
- The percentage of solving crimes shows a positive trend in all provinces except of Eastern, Uva and Sabaragamuwa provinces.
- A significant progress has been achieved with regard to the prevention and solving homicide cases, which is considered one of the main crimes reported.

## Data Analysis

- In 2012, 2212 rape cases have been reported. In 2013, the number of rape cases has decreased by 19 to 2193 cases.
- On provincial level, Western, Northwestern, Nothorn, Uva and Sabaragamuwa Provinces show an upward trend with regard to the number of rape cases but the total number of homicide cases shows a 1% decline compared to that of 2012.

- In 2012, 93% cases were solved after taking suspects into custody and in 2013 that percentage has increased to 94%. This shows a development by 1%.
- The number of total unsolved rape cases was 142 in 2013. The investigations are being carried out to solve those crimes.
- As a whole, the percentage of solving crimes shows a positive trend.
- A significant progress has been achieved by the police with regard to the prevention and solving homicide cases, which is considered one of the main crimes reported.

### Data Analysis

- In 2012, 6552 plundering cases have been reported. In 2013, the number of plundering cases has decreased by 1804 to 4748 cases.
- The total number of plundering cases shows a 28% decline compared to that of 2012.
- In 2012, 48% cases were solved after taking suspects into custody and in 2013 that percentage has increased to 54%. This shows a development by 6%.

- The number of total unsolved plundering cases was 2177 in 2013. The investigations are being carried out and plans are being made to solve those crimes as well.
- The percentage of solving crimes shows a positive trend in all the provinces except in Northern Province.
- A significant progress has been achieved by the police with regard to the prevention and solving plundering, which is considered one of the main crimes reported.

## Data Analysis

- In 2012, 1302 gold chain snatching cases have been reported. In 2013, the number of gold chain snatching cases has decreased by 452 to 850 cases.
- On the provincial level, although the incidents with regard to gold chain snatching shows a growing trend in Western, Northwestern and Southern provinces, the total number of gold chain snatching cases shows a 35% decline compared to that of 2012.

- In 2012, 48% cases were solved after taking suspects into custody and in 2013 that percentage has increased to 57%. This shows a positive development by 9%.
- The number of total unsolved gold chain snatching cases was 369 in 2013. The investigations are being carried out and plans are being made to solve those crimes as well.
- The percentage of solving crimes shows a positive trend in all the provinces except in North Central and Uva Provinces.
- A significant progress has been achieved by the police with regard to the prevention and solving of gold chain snatching, which is considered one of the main crimes reported.

## Data Analysis

- In 2012, 16763 burglaries have been reported. In 2013, the number of burglary cases has decreased by 640 to 16123 cases.
- On the provincial level, although the incidents with regard to burglaries shows a growing trend in Western and Northern provinces, the total number of burglaries shows a 4% decline compared to that of 2012.



- In 2012, 32% cases were solved after taking suspects into custody and in 2013 that percentage has increased to 38%. This shows a positive development by 6%.
- The number of total unsolved burglary cases was 10016 in 2013. The investigations are being carried out and plans are being made to solve those crimes as well.
- The percentage of solving crimes shows a positive trend in all the provinces.
- A significant progress has been achieved by the police with regard to the prevention and solving of burglaries, which is considered one of the main crimes reported.

## Data Analysis

- In 2012, 11704 thefts have been reported. In 2013, the number of thefts has decreased by 268 to 11436 cases.
- On the provincial level, although the incidents with regard to thefts shows a growing trend in Western and Eastern provinces, the total number of thefts shows a 2% decline compared to that of 2012.

- In 2012, 51% cases were solved after taking suspects into custody and in 2013 that percentage has increased to 59%. This shows a positive development by 8%.
- The number of total unsolved thefts was 4692 in 2013. The investigations are being carried out and plans are being made to solve those crimes as well.
- The percentage of solving crimes shows a positive trend in all the provinces.
- A significant progress has been achieved by the police with regard to the prevention and solving of thefts, which is considered one of the main crimes reported.

## 03. Court Orders

### 3:1. Executing Warrants 2012- 2013

- Executing Court Orders is one of the basic as well as statutory responsibilities of the Police. Out of those, executing warrants issued by Courts is one of the special duties which should be performed by the police for bringing about justice.
- According to a special survey with regard to executing warrants conducted in 2012 under the guidance of the Inspector General of Police, it had been revealed that the executing warrants was poorly carried out. Then a special operation was launched to arrest warrantees. This operation was carried out and follow-up action was taken by the police headquarters under the supervision of the Inspector General of Police.
- In 2012 the police were faced with the challenge of executing 93705 warrants. Thus the total number of warrants executed in 2012 was 70344 and it marks 75% of the total number. Furthermore, 46918 open warrants and 23426 date warrants were executed in 2012 and as a percentage they record 69% and 92% respectively.
- In 2013 the police were faced with the challenge of executing the remaining 23361 warrants and after executing 14351 warrants out of those the police had achieved a progress of 61%.
- In this field the Police have been able to achieve promising results in 2013. The Police were able to achieve the same level of productivity that they had achieved in 2012 in 2013 as well.

## Data Analysis

- In 2012, a total number of 70344 warrants have been executed by Sri Lanka Police. The number of remaining warrants to be executed for the year was 23361. Therefore 69% of open warrants, 92% of date warrants and 75% of total warrants had been executed in 2012.
- The total number of warrants to be executed for 2013 was 23361. Out of those 14351 warrants had been executed and the percentage of total warrants executed is 61%. Thus the percentage of open warrants executed is 58% while the percentage of date warrants executed is 97%.

- The number of remaining warrants for 2014 that could not be executed and remained unexecuted during 2012 and 2013 were 9010. Out of those, 8957 were open warrants while 53 were date warrants.
- Being able to take criminals into custody by executing around 70% of the warrants which could not be achieved in 2012 and 2013 during the process of bringing about justice, can be pointed out as signs of two successful years.
- Thus, Sri Lanka Police has provided a positive contribution to courts to serve justice by taking criminals into custody.

## 4. Crimes against Women & Children

### 4.1 Grave Crimes against Children

Persons under 18 years of age are legally classified as children. Sri Lanka Police is under the legal obligation to protect children and to take legal actions against those who commit crimes against children. If a crime is among 21 grave crimes and its victim is a child, such crimes are considered grave crimes against children. Having sexual intercourse with a girl under 16 years of age even with her consent is at the top of the list of grave crimes against children.

- Total number of crimes committed against children in the year 2013 is 3647. This marks a decline of crimes committed against children compared to that of year 2012. It has been reduced by 157. In the year 2012, 79% of the crimes against children have been solved while this has been increased by 87% in the year 2013.
- Accordingly, Sri Lanka Police has taken a commendable effort to reduce the crimes against children and to enforce the law during the year, 2013.

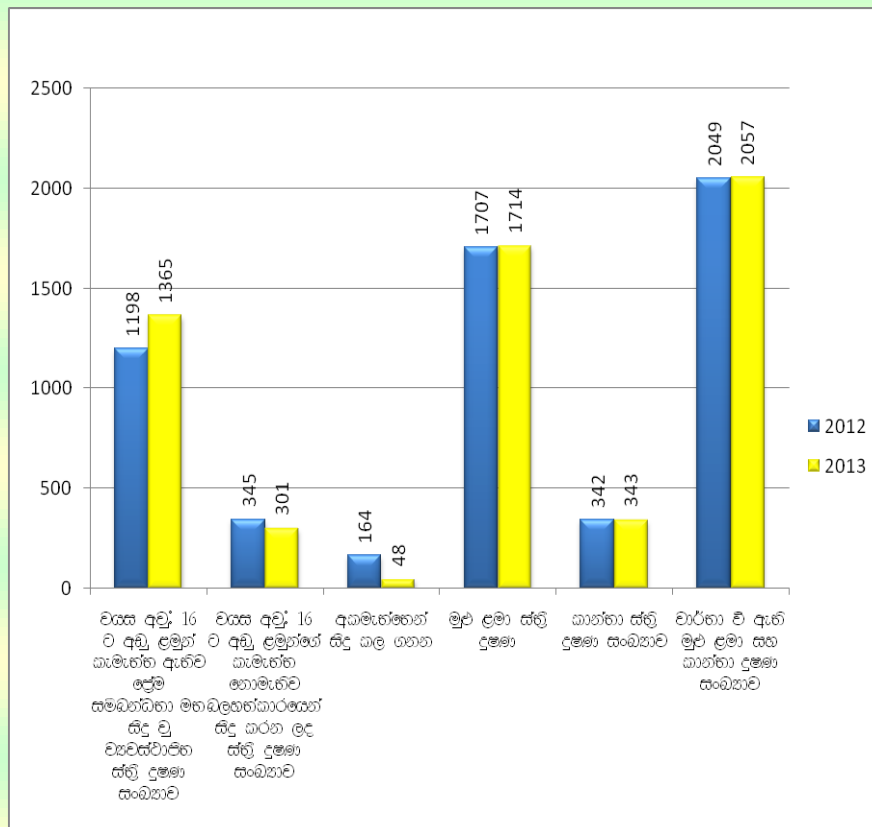
## Data Analysis

The total number of grave crimes committed against women in the year 2013 is 870. It has been reduced by 237 compared to that of the year 2012. The percentage of solving grave crimes against women in 2013 is 74% and it has been increased by 4% compared to the year 2012. Accordingly the Police has successfully taken steps to prevent grave crimes against women and to ensure law and order.

#### 4.4. Women and Child Abuse (raped) 2012/2013

- Sri Lankan Police always pays a special attention to cases with regard to women and child abuse as a separate field, hence, special investigation processes have been established and preventive measures have been taken.
- Police has taken steps to separate the crimes regarding raping children from all other such crimes. Rapes that have taken place with child's consent are identified as statutory rapes.

#### Data Analysis

The total number of petty crimes committed against women in the year 2013 is 7226. It has increased by 567 compared to the year 2012. The percentage of solving crimes in 2013 is 91% and it has decreased by 2% compared to the year 2012.

Sri Lanka police has achieved a positive development in terms of solving crimes against women and children during the year 2013 as a whole. The majority of the crimes against children have been reported from Western, North-Western and North Central Provinces while the number of statutory rapes reported has increased by 14%. A large number of rape cases that had been reported had occurred with the consent given while having a love affair.

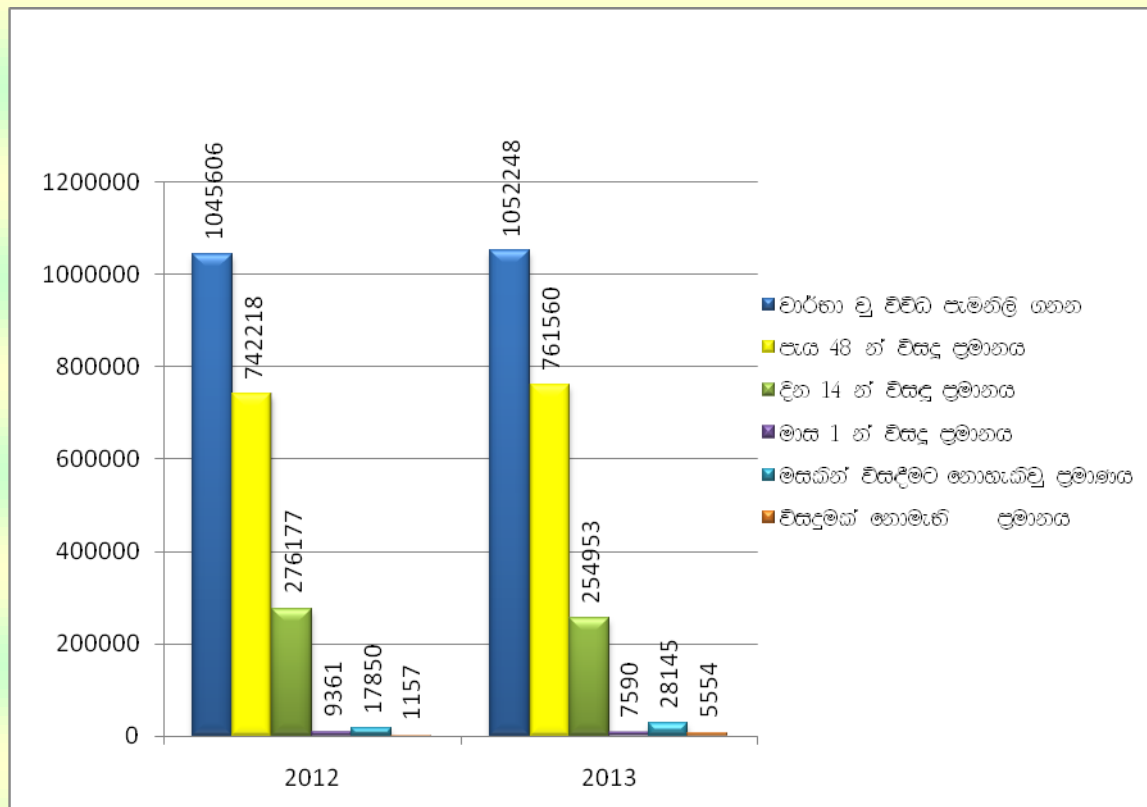
## 5. Investigation of Miscellaneous Complaints

- Other than the crimes and minor crimes, complaints and disputes received by the Police that can hardly be considered as crimes are called various complaints.
- Investigation of various crimes is a special service provided by the Sri Lankan Police and the total number of various complaints received by the Police Stations throughout the country annually is nearly 1 million.
- Sri Lanka Police has been appreciated by the people during the year 2013 because of the speedy actions taken by the police officers to solve various crimes within 48 hrs. as per the instructions of the Inspector General of Police by IG's circulars.
- By giving priority to solve family disputes over various complaints which has been received by the Police and through issuing advice the various crime branch has helped strengthen the family units preventing them from breaking apart. Eventually, there has been a progress in this field during the year, 2013.
- The Police has contributed to building a society without crimes and has helped build unity among the family units and other sectors by solving various crimes.

## 5.1. Graph Investigation of various complaints 2012/2013

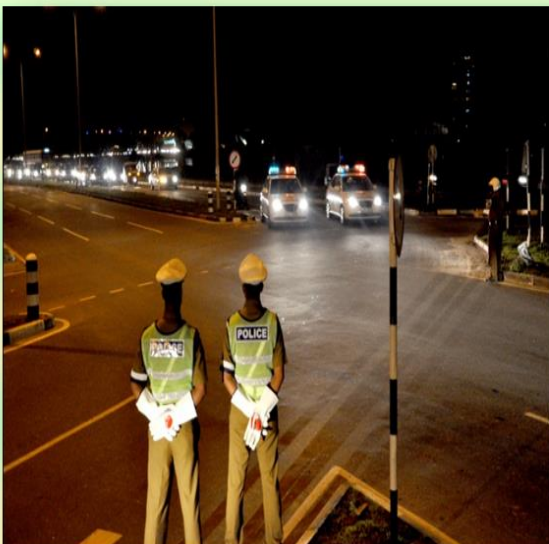


### Data Analysis

- The total number of various complaints reported in 2013 is 1052248. It has increased by 6642 compared to the figure 1045606 reported in the year, 2012. The percentage of solving various complaints in the year 2012 which was indicated as 99% still remains the same for the year 2013.
- The Police had been able to maintain 72.3% in terms of solving various complaints within 48 hours as targeted in the year, 2013.
- Out of the total number of complaints 24% had been solved within 14 days.
- The number of complaints solved within a month is 7590 and that amount is 0.72% out of all the complaints.
- The number of complaints that was not solved within a month is 28145 and that amount is 2.6% out of the total 5554 complaints which cannot be solved.
- According to the analysis above, Sri Lankan Police maintained 99% of solving crimes for more than 1million various crimes which had been reported to 432 Police Stations throughout the country. This was a target achieved during the year, 2013 and this has to be appreciated as a great service done by the Police in terms of solving various problems faced by the People.

## 06. Traffic Management and Road Safety.

### 6.1. Accidents



Traffic Management and ensuring road safety, which is the most commonly seen duty performed by the police, is a very especial and hard duty. The number of road accidents had been a major challenge that we had to face with the dawning of the year, 2013. Well-

organized plans were introduced to reduce accidents. We got successful results through these initiatives. Many officers were trained for road traffic duty and those who followed the traffic management course were deployed for the duty. Due to the development of the road system which is part of the development process of the government and the management of the road system with the support of the Police, the road system has become a safe place for the pedestrians, travellers and drivers and eventually, this has been a progress in the year, 2013.

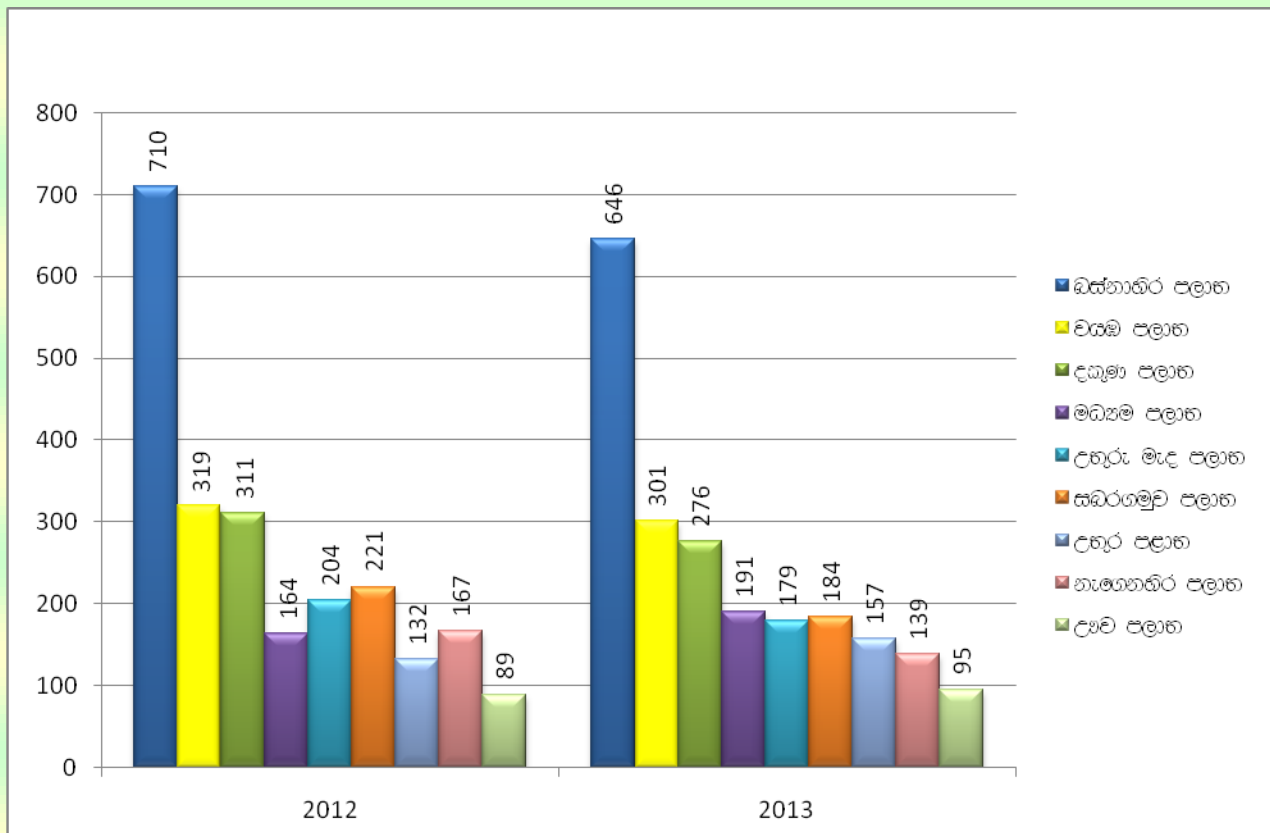
Many activities had been initiated during the year, 2013 in terms of reducing fatal accidents by 25% as instructed by the Inspector General of Police. Under this programme, all the people including drivers, pedestrians and school children were made aware about the traffic laws and road accidents by the traffic Police and the commitment of the police officers helped achieve the above target during the year, 2013.

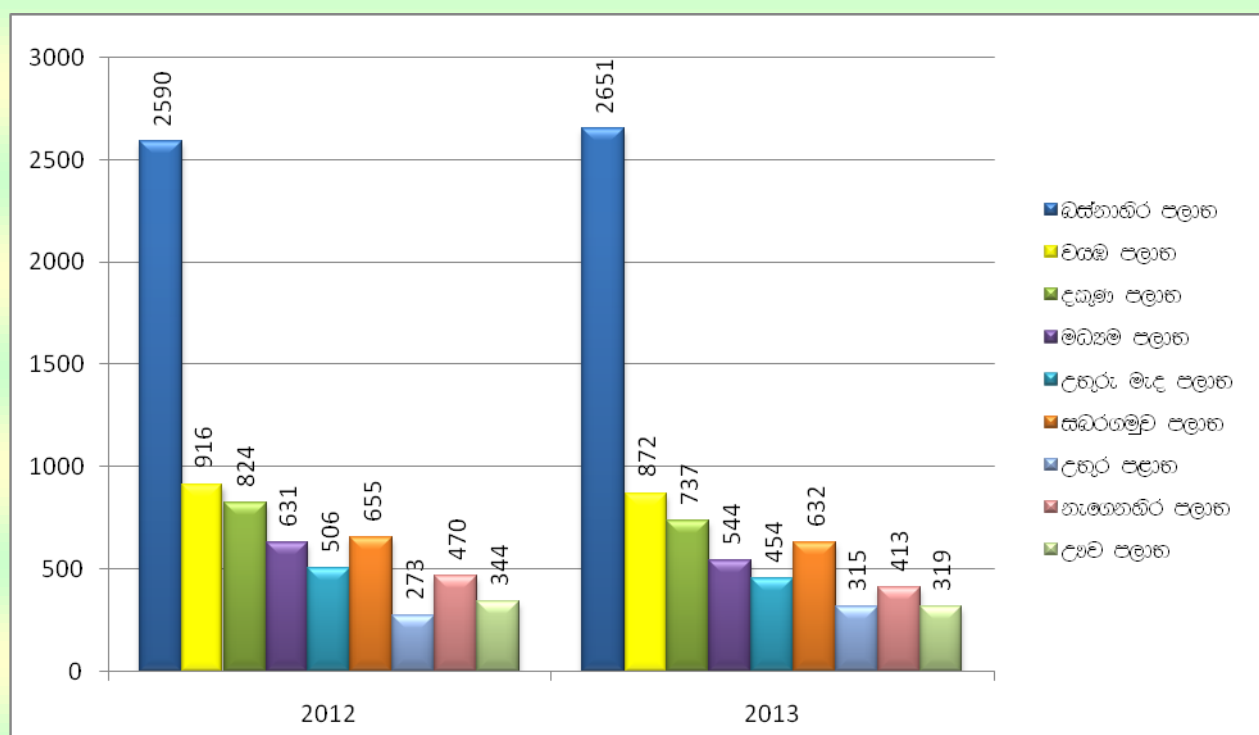

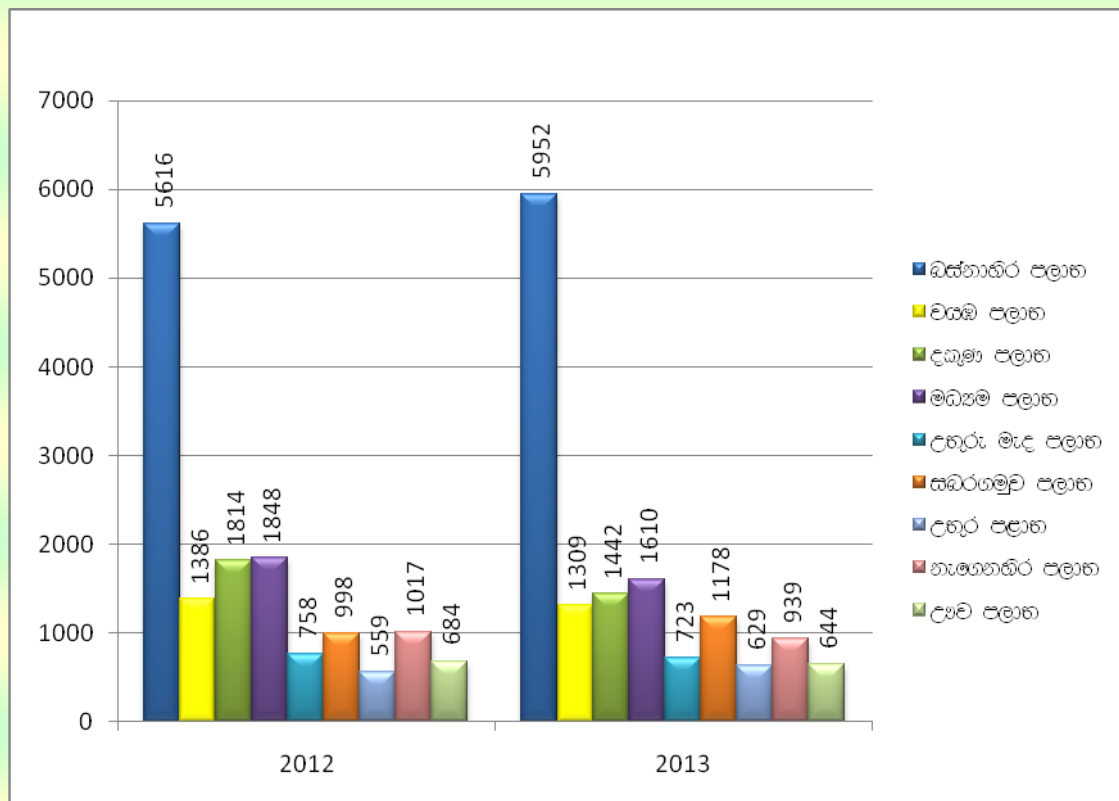
**6.1.1 Graph - Fatal Accidents- 2012/2013 (Provincial Level)**



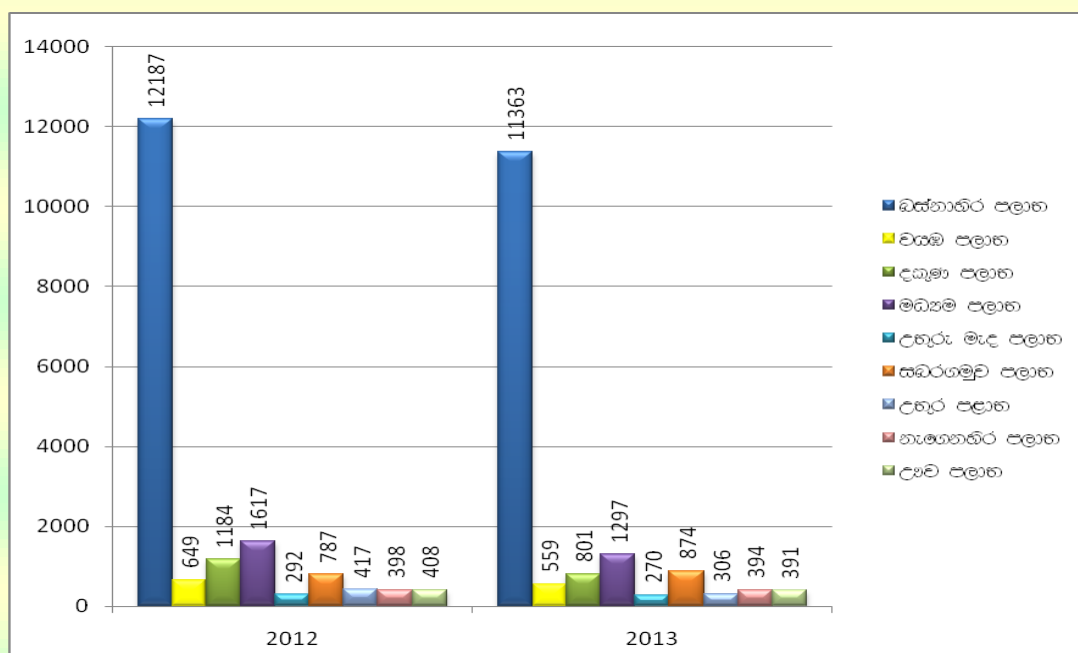
**6.1.02 Graph Fatal Accidents - 2012/2013 (Provincial Level)**

## 07. Prevention of Corruption - 2013

- Heroin, cannabis and illicit liquor are believed to be the main cases of corruption at the moment in Sri Lanka. Special operations both nationally and regionally have been initiated in 2012 and 2013 concurrent to the main concept of the Government *Mathata Thitha* and also as a means of fulfilling of the duty of the Police to prevent corruption.
- Operations at national level were implemented by the Police Narcotic Bureau,
- Police Special Task Force and Antivice Division –Walana and the operations at the regional level were implemented by the SDIGs who are in charge of each range. All these operations were managed by a special unit headed by the Inspector General of Police.

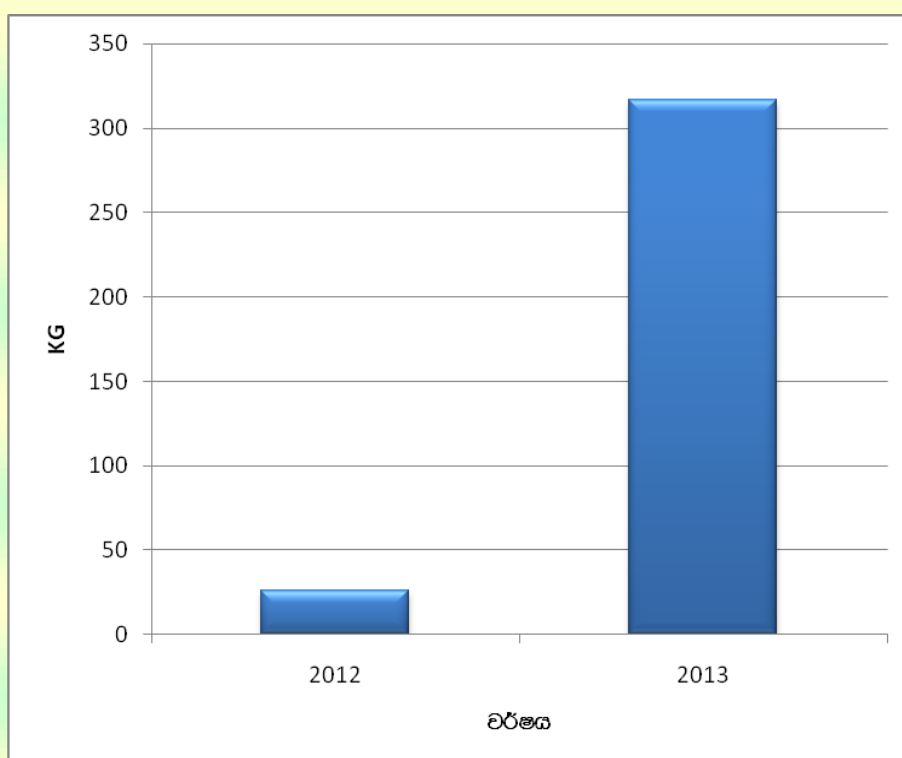

### Data Analysis

- 316kg, 715g, 720mg of Heroin has been taken into custody by the Police Narcotic Bureau and the other Police Stations throughout the country in the year 2013. This is an increase of 286kg, 64g, 259mg of Heroin compare to the previous year, 2012.
- 296kg, 708g, 786mg of Heroin has been taken into custody by the Police Narcotic Bureau alone and 261kg, 292g, of Heroin container which was taken into custody on 31<sup>st</sup> August, 2013 also included for this raid.

- Provincially, there had been more raids in the Western and Southern Provinces compare to the year, 2012. But Heroin racket can be mostly seen in the Western Province.
- It has been reported that number of raids has been increased in Eastern, Central, North Central, Uva and North Western Provinces compare to the year, 2012.
- However, it should be mentioned that we have not been able to reach to the target as we planed in 2014. One of the main annual targets of the Sri Lanka Police is to eradicate drug racket from the Sri Lankan soil. Sri Lanka Police is committed to achieve that target and determine to be successful in the year 2014 avoiding the weaknesses that we experienced in the year, 2013.

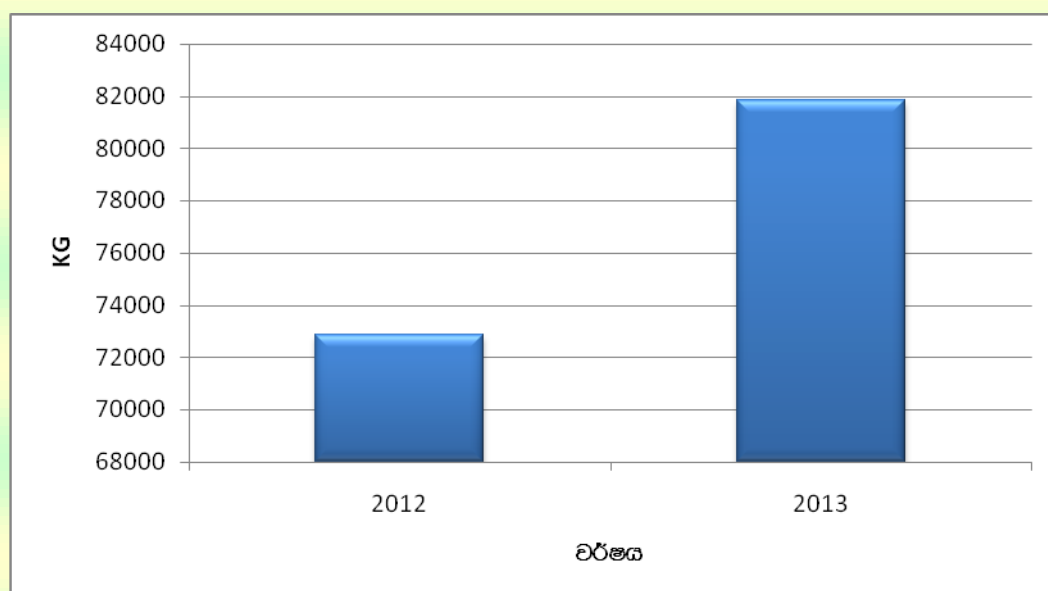

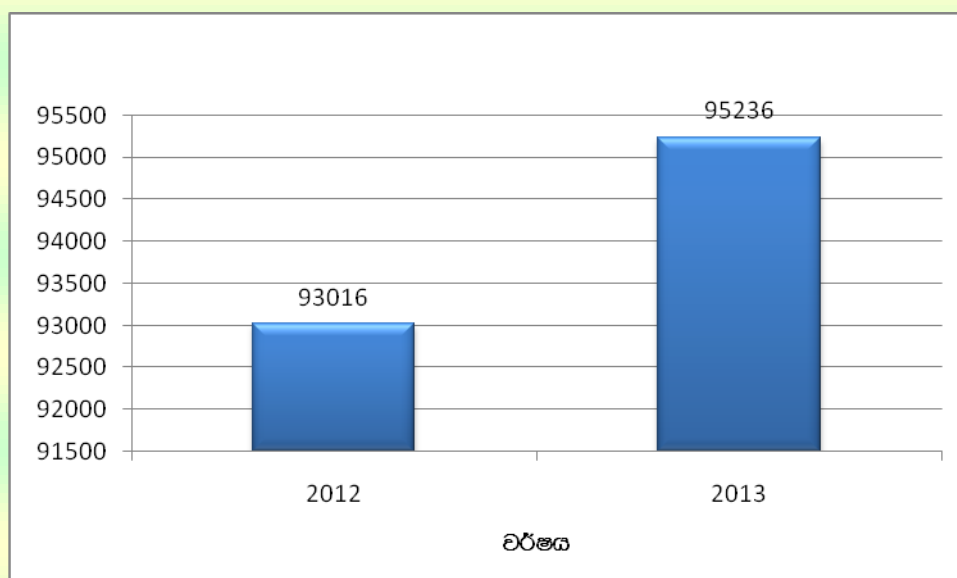

This service is open to the public for 24 hours and very popular among People and it has been praised by them.

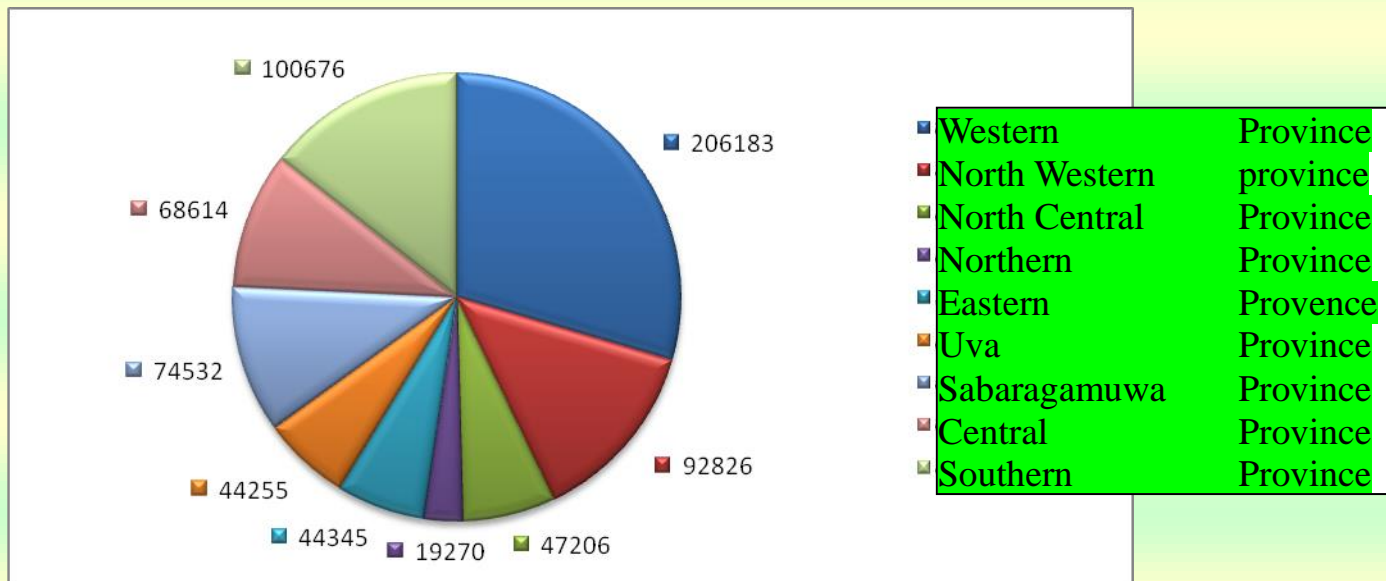

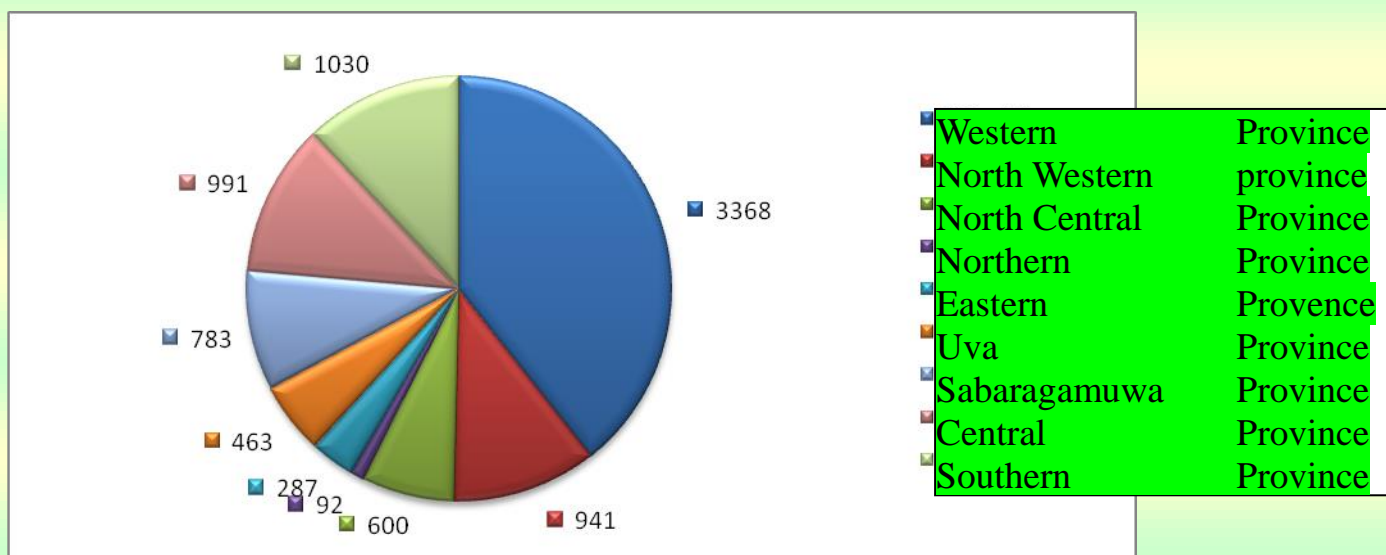


## Classification of 119 calls – Provincially

Police 119 service had received 638829 emergency complaints, 7833 non-emergency complaints and 4530 confidential information in 2013. The total number of complaints is 71292. Investigation had been carried out with regard to these complaints without any delay by sending Police teams and given relief to those who had made the complaints.

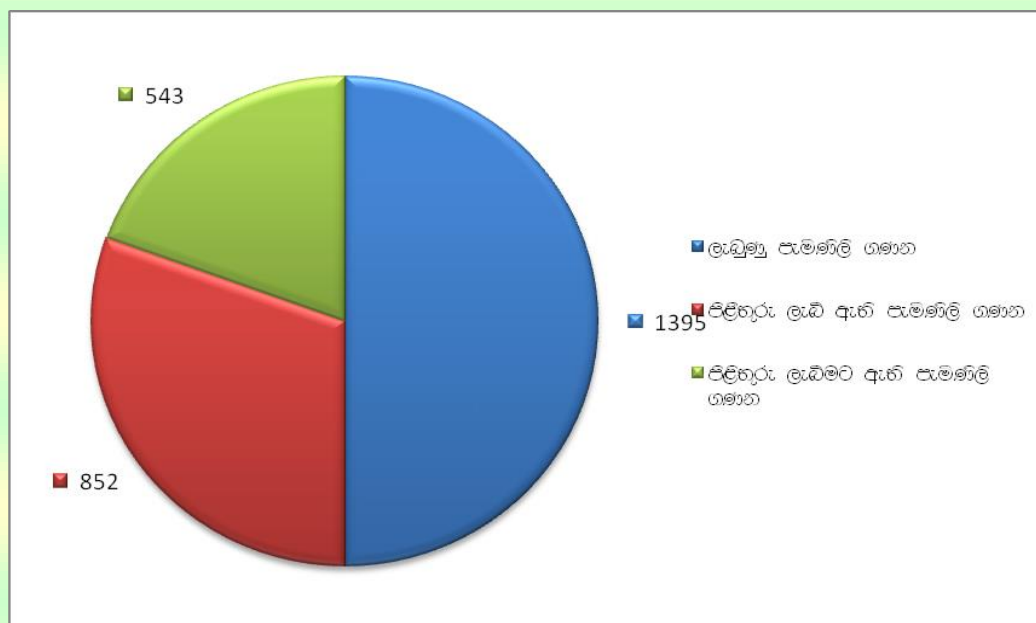

### 11-3 - IG'S Help Desk



IG's Help Desk was launched from 11<sup>th</sup> November 2012. ## 12. Security of the Tourists - 2013

With the intention of promoting tourism in fast developing Sri Lanka during the post war period, Sri Lanka Police provides special security to the tourists.

It is a responsibility and a duty of the Police to provide security for both local tourists and foreign tourists who visits this country. With the hope of achieving this objective, the Police Tourist Division was established attached to Police Headquarters on 1<sup>st</sup> June 2007.

This service is provided islandwide by Tourist Police Units established in the areas where tourists mostly visit such as Southern coastal belt, Eastern coastal belt, cultural triangle and special sacred places.

Those Police Units help tourists when drowning at sea or other inland reservoirs, take legal action against harassments, abuses, stealing and delivery of poor service. This unit established in 2013 clearly shows the contribution of police.

### **13. Life Saving Service**

Police life guards performing duties in various areas in Sri Lanka provide the special public service of rescuing people who face various accidents in water.

The life guards have given assistance to the public during various natural disasters that occurred in 2013. They have given special contribution towards saving lives of public in many National Festival in Sri Lanka such as Poson Festival in Anuradhapuraya, Annual Festival in Kataragama, church feast at Thalavila and “Wasantha Senakeliya” at Nuwara Eliya.

During the above festivals they have been able to rescue more than 50 people who had faced accident while bathing in reservoirs.

Deploying Police life guards along the coastal belt of Sri Lanka lives have been rescued in 2013 as follows.

Covering about 20 Police Divisions Police Life Savings Association Conducts workshops on Swimming and life-saving for the public and the school children in 2013 and provides necessary knowledge in this field.



## **14. Protection of Environment**

### 14.1. Contribution towards beautification of Independent Square and Diyawanna Park

Environment Protection Division was established on 02<sup>nd</sup> August 2000 with the objective of enforcing law with regard to environment protection procedures to prevent the damages caused to the environment with the ending of the war and to maintain co-ordination with the other institutions which are concerned about the environment. This division functions under the supervision of a Senior Superintendent of Police and there is an Environment Unit at every Police Station in the Island.

#### **The Duties of these units are**

- i). Environment protection
- ii). Giving assistance required for waste management
- iii). Urban beatification
- iv). Prevention of Dengue
- v.). Beatification of Police Stations and premises

Environment Protection Unit has been able to fulfill their duty with the co-operation of the following institutions in 2013.





#### **14.2 Contributing to the Duties of the Central Environmental Authority**

1. Giving assistance in doing field examinations before issuing environmental protection license to industrial and business places.
2. Checking whether the industries and businesses which hold environmental protection licenses are violating the conditions of the license.
3. Giving assistance to Central Environmental Authority to perform Emission Tests on the vehicles and to check whether the horns of vehicles make disturbing noises.
4. Giving assistance to perform field examinations regarding environmental problems at any place in the island
5. Calling investigation reports from relevant Police stations and taking necessary legal action with regard to the environmental problems directed by the Complaints Unit of the Central Environmental Authority.
6. Carrying out investigations with the help of the officers of the Central Environmental Authority to take necessary legal action regarding the complaints received directly or over the phone by the Police Unit of Central Environmental Authority.

#### **14.3 Help Prevent Dengue**

1. National Dengue prevention weeks were declared and programs have been organized as follows.
  - i. First National Dengue Prevention Week from 06.02.2013 – to 12.02.2013
  - ii. Second National Dengue Prevention Week from 01.07.2013 to 07.07.2013.
  - iii. Third National Dengue Prevention Week from 07.10.2013 to 13.10.2013
  - iv. Conducting a National Dengue prevention week slandwide covering homes, public place and Government Institutions from 01.11.2013 to 01.12.2013.
  - v. Before commencement of the new school term for 2014, declaring a dengue prevention week under the supervision of Police officers from 26.12.2013 to 01.01.2014

From 01.01.2013 to 31.12.2013, 15585 court cases have been field under articles 262 of Sri Lankan Penal Code against premises in all Police Divisions islandwide, which were found to be conducive to dengue mosquito breeding. Within a period of 07 months from 01.01.2003 to 31.07.2013, Rs. 76462985.00 has been recovered as fines from 12075 cases.



## 15. Civil Defence Committees

### 15.1. Community Police Service

This service has been established on 11<sup>th</sup> October, 2008 and it bears an important role in creating a peaceful environment where everyone can live without fear of crimes. Upholding this concept, various programs are conducted islandwide to get the co-operation of Police to protect law and order.,

Accordingly community Police committees were successfully established in 2013 on Grama Niladhari Divisional level, Divisional Secretary level, District and national level.

### **15.2 Guarding Unprotected Railroad Crossings with the co-operation of Civil Defence Committee**

As it had been observed that the accidents at unprotected railway crossing were increasing every day, H.E. the President ordered Inspector General of Police to launch a prevention Program. This course of action was taken from 04<sup>th</sup> July 2013 to secure the rail Gates with the co-operation of Civil Defence Committee.

There are 634 unprotected railway crossings and protection has been provided directly by civil security Committee members with the patronage of Police to cover all those gates.

Through this process, 03 members of civil security committee have been appointed on hourly service for watching the gates. They are paid an allowance of Rs. 7500/= per month by the Government and have given a jacket and a torch to identify them. This



process is completely operated and supervised by the Police. After starting this, accidents have not been reported except 01 in unprotected railway crossings.

The only accident occurred was a vehicle accident which was driven against the signal of the civil security officer and that proves how successful this process has been in 2013.

This service done through civil security committees is a very important service in the country.







## 16. Development of Human Resource

### 16.1 Recruitment to Sri Lanka Police and Training at Police College

After eradicating LTTE terrorism in Sri Lanka, Police Stations were established in the areas where the majority of Tamils are residing and the recruitment of Police officers was done in Tamil medium for the convenience of them. Thus the Recruitment Division has taken measures to recruit Police officers according to the increasing population and has contributed towards expanding the Police service.

During the year 2012 and 2013, officers have been recruited in Sinhala and Tamil medium as follows to fulfill the shortage caused by the annual retirement of officers, deaths, disabilities and termination of services on disciplinary grounds and had given them training by the Police College.
