At a time the national mindedness and nationalistic feelings are resurfacing under the guidance of His Excellency the President Mahinda Rajapaksa, it has become our bounden duty to take our knowledge of indigenous medicine to the global community.

Be it any field of knowledge, be it traditional wisdom, be it a tradition of art; their universality and perpetuation can only be ensured if they become a legacy of the entire human kind. Pursuing this aspiration shall be the prime responsibility of the Department of Ayurveda.

Further, more and more ayurvedic practitioners, nurses, labourers were recruited to boost the expansion of the indigenous medicine. Measures were also adopted to felicitate traditional medical practitioners to encourage them to further expand their services.

Participating in the Deyata Kirula national exhibition and inculcating the importance of Ayurveda among the young and the old too is a praiseworthy effort. Two other important achievements during the last year was the establishment of 'Hela Weda Medura' in each district to make indigenous medical service feely available to the rural masses and the introduction of Korean acupuncture clinic at the Yakkala Ayurveda hospital.

By conducting promotional programs for adding indigenous medicine to the National Telephone Directory in the year 2012, not only a significant progress was achieved in the indigenous medical sector but more tourists could be attracted especially for the Panchakarma treatment.

Every year, the Ministry of Indigenous Medicine together with the Department of Ayurveda conducts the national ceremony for oil anointing of Sinhala New Year under the state patronage, distributing the herbal oil required for this purpose throughout the country extending its blessings for the creation of a healthy nation. While extending my hearty congratulations to the Department of Ayurveda I wish that it would be able to make Sri Lanka the noblest country in the world.

Introduction

Department of Ayurveda

Due to the close ties with India from olden days, the system of Ayurveda Medicine spread through Sri Lanka.

Established under Act No 31 of 1961, the Department of Ayurveda plays a pivotal role as the institution responsible for executing the functions and the mission of the Ministry of Indigenous Medicine. The Commissioner of Ayurveda was designated as the head of the Department of Ayurveda by the Ayurveda Act No 31 of 1961 charged with the responsibility of leading the Department for the development of the system of indigenous medicine.

The performance report of the Department for the year 2012 presents a concise account as regards the progress made by the Department in 2012 in carrying out administrative duties and functions assigned to the Department of Ayurveda.

Without confining the responsibilities and basic functions of the Department to traditional and statutory activities, the Department of Ayurveda launched development programs in 2012 for the implementation of the 'Mahinda Chintana- Vision for the future'.

The Department of Ayurveda which functions under the auspices of the Commissioner for Ayurveda is bound to execute the following major tasks.



Ayurveda Act No . 31 of 1961 and statutory matters

The Department of Ayurveda and affiliated statutory bodies have been established under the Ayurveda Act No. 31 of 1961. Extracts from the Act which outline the objectives of the Ayurveda Act No. 31 of 1961 are outlined below.

Ayurveda Act (No. 31 of 1961)

An Act to provide for the establishment of a Department of Ayurveda; for the registration of ayurvedic hospitals, ayurvedic pharmacies, ayurvedic dispensaries and ayurvedic stores, for the establishment of an Ayurvedic Medical Council to register Ayurvedic practitioners, Ayurvedic pharmacists and Ayurvedic nurses, and deal with matters relating to their professional conduct; for the establishment of an Ayurvedic College and hospital board to discharge certain functions in relation to the College of Ayurvedic Medicine, the Central Hospital of Ayurveda and the pharmacy, herbarium and dispensary attached thereto; for the establishment of an Ayurvedic Research Committee to discharge certain functions in relation to research in Ayurveda; to repeal the Indigenous Medicine Ordinance, and the Ayurvedic Medical Council Ordinance No 17 of 1941; to make consequential amendments in the Medical Ordinance, the Poisons, Opium and Dangerous Drugs Ordinance, and the Food and Drugs Act No 25 of 1949; and to make provision for matters connected with or incidental to the aforesaid matters.

(Endorsed by Parliament on 2 June, 1961)

Department of Ayurveda

The Department of Ayurveda is the principal institution established under the Ayurveda Act. The following are the major functions expected to be carried out by the Department.

Subject to the availability of provisions granted from the Consolidated Fund of Sri Lanka, the Department shall be responsible for carrying out the following objectives:

(a) the provision of establishments and services necessary for the treatment of disease, and generally for the preservation and promotion of the health of the people according to Ayurveda, Sidhdha and Unani systems of medicine;

(b) the encouragement of the study of, and research in, ayurveda by the grant of scholarships and other facilities to persons employed or proposed to be employed in the Department and by the grant of financial aid and other assistance to institutions providing courses of study or engaged in research in ayurveda; and

(c) the taking, development or encouragement of measures for the investigation of disease, and for the improvement of public health, according to ayurveda

In addition, the role of the Department of Ayurveda has been extended towards various development and welfare measures in keeping with the current, timely needs.



For the year 2012, 215 applications were received for the registration of dispensaries and 173 applications filled in accurately and without mistakes were registered and certificates were issued.

Recommendations were made to the Ayurveda Corporation in the year 2012 to issue 209,320 kilograms of cannabis to the registered manufacturers and practitioners.

In addition, recommendations have been forwarded to the Department of Exercise to obtain 71720 litres of rectified spirits for the registered dispensaries.

A total of 440 applications were issued for the registration of Ayurveda sales outlets, pharmacies, suppliers and transporters and of them 220 were completed and returned to the Department.

- **National ceremony for anointing oil and other public ceremonies**

15.04.2011 – The national ceremony for anointing oil was held under the patronage of Prime Minister Hon. D.M.Jayarathne at the premises of the Natha Devala, Sri Dalada Maligawa, Kandy.

- **Mobile clinics**

As per the requests made for mobile clinics, curative services were provided to patients by the Borella Ayurveda Teaching Hospital, Yakkala Wickremarachchi Ayurveda Hospital and provincial ayurvedic departments with the approval of the Ayurveda Commissioner.



The Department assigned 27 clinics to Ayurveda hospitals at Borella, Yakkala and Nawinna. The amount spent on mobile clinics was Rs. 466,201.00

- **Popularization of herbal drugs and herbal porridge**



With the aim of encouraging more and more people to consume local herbal drinks, herbal gruel and herbal drinks were provided free of charge at public and other ceremonies with the approval of the Ayurveda Commissioner. The amount spent in the year 2012 on popularizing indigenous herbal drinks was Rs. 267,761.00.

- **Popularization of local foods**

With the intention of familiarizing local foods among schoolchildren, a programme was implemented in 4 schools selected from the Colombo District to popularize indigenous food items. The Department allocated provisions amounting to Rs. 7119 to conduct this programme in four schools.

- **Ayurveda exhibitions**



With the aim of enhancing knowledge of people on herbal plants, exhibition of herbal plants were conducted on requests made to the Ayurveda Department. Accordingly, the Department participated in 17 exhibitions including “Deyata Kirula”.

- **Awareness programs for schools**

The Development Division conducted two program to create awareness among schoolchildren about the indigenous herbal plants consequent to requests made by schools and other institutions.

The number of herbal gardens established by the Department so far is 6.


